

*Jim Scott looks to revival of independent, community farm*

# Ex-editor, bookseller turns to goat farming at Be

in the last 100 years of mankind's history have we begun to rely less on the small independent farm. Raw milk dairies are almost unheard of: only three or four operate in B.C. today.

The reason for our reliance on the large dairy is, in part, due to government decree and the phenomenal cost of a grade A pasteurized dairy.

Although in the past goat dairies were deemed a dubious investment, the last 20 years has seen a move back towards goat's milk and goat milk products.

**BEING BUILT UP**

The large U.S. dairy goat herds that were butchered for meat and fertilizer after the second world war are slowly being built up again. There have been more scientific findings favouring goat milk over cow milk, for protein, vitamins and minerals. Several national and international organizations have been formed to promote the advancement of goat dairying.

The many islands in Georgia Strait are recognized as being one of the finest goat-raising areas in Canada. The climate is good: almost all the work that is done on a July day can be done on a January day.

**TREES PLENTIFUL**

Trees are plentiful for timber to build houses and for wood to light

stoves. The rain forests also provide browsing territory, rich in salal, ferns and evergreen boughs, which the goat turns into milk, more efficiently than a cow eating hay.

Unfortunately, however, farming on the islands has been made more difficult as the price of land has been driven upwards by the influx of people wanting small lots.

The farmer's livelihood is, at best, a tenuous one. He sweats his life away carving a farm out of the woods only to have the bureaucrats in government regulate his business out of existence.

**A MAVERICK**

The farmer working his land is often considered a maverick by officials who represent his community.

Jim Scott of Salt Spring Island is one of those maverick-types: a backwoods guerrilla, as he describes himself. He began farming 78 acres at Beaver Point three years ago. His motivation comes partly from his political convictions.

He said that he is convinced a misinformed and/or corrupt government, hand in hand with big business, could one day create a famine: one that will strike everyone in Canada and the United States. The only way of avoiding intense hardship is to revive the independent, community farm in North America.



Almost as efficient as a chainsaw, the goat can clear the land and produce high-quality

milk from the roughage. Owner-farmer Jim Scott of Beaver Point

plans on raising 80 of these little angoras for their fleeces, which are sheared twice a year.

**ECONOMIC SENSE**

Scott has found a way of doing this. Albeit the farming methods are labour intensive, the results make good economic sense in the long run. By raising a goat dairy herd he accomplishes two important and basic steps: after the initial logging of the land is completed, the goats take care of all the slash and weeds and then produce a high-grade milk which is then turned into a saleable product.

Because raw milk cannot be marketed at this time, Scott and his partner Tom Stokes, a biochemist, plan on marketing a line of goat milk cosmetics. This spring there will be goat milk shampoo, skin lotion, hair conditioner and hand soap, bearing the Dana Farm Soap label, available in local stores.

**OFF MARGINAL LAND**

Goats are the only domestic animals that can produce milk off marginal land that hasn't been developed. Natural browsing plus a grain supplement is all they need to produce 500 gallons of milk per year, valuable fleeces and meat for the table.

He and his wife Wendy and their partner Mary-Lou Cuddy had dreamed of having a farm. The good economic sense of goat farming made their dream a greater possibility. For 12 years, he said, they saved their money and looked for suitable land on Vancouver Island.

It was purely by chance, he said, when they were offered the property on Bullman Road. It had been destined for a subdivision, but for some reason the developers changed their minds.

**HOUSE BUILT, LAND CLEARED**

Now, four years later, a large log house has been built, three and a half acres have been cleared and work is about to begin on a barn which will include living space for 35 milk goats, a 400 sq. ft. milk house, a lab for cosmetics production, hay storage area, a grooming pen for the angoras and a hospitalization pen.

The project is a big one, and some people might wonder what background an ex-publishing editor has that would qualify him to run a large commercial dairy.

Jim Scott's family roots are with a dairy farm in Pennsylvania. The Maurer creamery covers three counties, he said, and is the largest independent creamery in that state. He lived there until his 12th birthday, then moved with his parents to a farm in Colwood on Vancouver Island. He lived on the farm in Colwood until he entered university.

**NO FARM THERE NOW**

Now there is no farm there anymore, only residential housing. But the old adage holds true: you can take the farm away from the country but you can't take the country away from the boy.

Scott came to Salt Spring in 1976 from Duncan to manage a small bookstore in Ganges. Mary-Lou continues to work as a regional librarian in Duncan, where she commutes each day. As Scott put it, Mary-Lou subsidizes the farm: he has quit his job in Ganges to work full-time with the goats.

His goal is not to make it rich in the cosmetic business but instead to develop a farm that will one day serve as an important source of food for the Salt Spring community: strictly something out of the writings of Thomas Jefferson, Scott's source of inspiration.

**COST OF CLEARING HIGH**

Clearing the land using expensive machinery is an obstacle to farming that Scott hopes he has overcome. The cost of clearing 10 acres of land may be as high as \$15,000. Few people can afford that cost, nor can a 10-acre field generate enough revenue to offset the investment.

Keeping to his convictions, he chose to clear the land in traditional fashion, first by using a herd of goats to eat the slash, then pigs to burrow up the roots and stumps.

Presently he is leasing 10 acres of land to grow grains to supplement their diet. Oats, barley and rape are being planted for the goats, while the pigs' grain requirements will be largely fulfilled with goat milk. Twelve pounds of goat milk, Scott said, will replace 10 pounds of grain fed to a pig.

**IMPORTANT PART**

Pigs are an important part of the farm, both for their land-clearing

and for their meat. Scott hopes to break even on the pigs, he said, with the sale of the meat after they have cleared the land.

The logistics of using pig-power for land-clearing is simple. Scott uses six pigs in a pen which he moves to various locations around the property. The pigs devour everything and fertilize the soil with their manure. If ducks are put into the same pen they will eat the undigested grain in the pigs' manure, then pass on their own contribution to the soil.

At this rate Scott will have a suitable seed bed within two years. If a machine were used to do the job, he said, the recovery rate of the land could be as long as five years.

**BUTCHER PIGS**

After the pigs are finished he will set the butcher kids, or young goats destined for slaughter, out to clear off any volunteer weeds and thistles. Nettles and thistles contain 27% available protein, which helps explain why goats don't mind foraging for their food. Their hay supplement will be thrown on the ground for them and the hay seeds that get buried will produce a volunteer grass crop.

Hay has to be given to the goats each day before they are turned loose to forage. If their bellies are full when they leave the barn they will be inclined to pick and choose the better roughage that they find in the bush.

Rocks still have to be picked off the clearing by hand before the first grain crop can be planted. Scott said that he plans on raising sheep on the volunteer grass crop for one or two years before planting barley and oats. Sheep, he said, will only be used in the clearing process.

**WOOD-LOT, GRAZING AREA**

In this manner 25 of his 78 acres will eventually come into cultivation. The rest of the land will be managed as a wood-lot for firewood and lumber, and as a grazing area for approximately 120 goats.

Breeding a good herd of animals is important to any farm, whether it be chickens, cattle, hogs or goats. One reliance on modern technology that Scott has is a computer link-up

with MacDonald College in Montreal.

The importance of the computer is in the information it gives him about his own animals. Each week, samples of milk from his herd are sent into the provincial government lab in Vancouver. The information from there goes to the computer along with details on what a particular goat is eating. All very official and recorded by the Canadian goat society.

The resulting information tells the farmer the volume and quality of milk a particular goat produced, and what type of food the animal ate.

### FOR BREEDING PROGRAM

This advanced milk recording program gives Scott accurate information which he can then use in his breeding program. He will know which does in the herd are the most efficient food converters.

This, he explains, is an integral part of his goal: to provide good, proven breeding stock for people who want to buy a family goat for their milk supply. A pedigree, along with other records, will be available for milk goats and for the expensive angora goats.

The price of an angora goat, Scott said, begins at \$350. A coat woven from two fleeces retails for \$800 in the city.

He said he has one milking doe that didn't dry up for 23 months. For a family who wants a milk goat without having to raise kids, a two-year milker would be ideal.

It's important to cross only good bucks with good does and Scott has paid over \$1,000 each for some of the breeders. To get a good breeder goat now, Scott said, you would have to import it from the U.S.

"We hope to have the same quality breeding stock available here for anyone who wishes to establish a dairy."

### FOR COSMETIC USE

But for the time being all the milk produced on the farm will be for cosmetic use only.

Dana Farm Soap Factory Ltd. will subsidize the breeding program, and if Scott's dream comes true, goat milk soap will also bring about a pasteurized dairy.

He and his partners will have 3,500 bottles of shampoo on the market in March. The profits made from the shampoo, Scott said, will buy enough equipment to reduce labour on the soap-making process. By next Christmas, he added, there should be a gift box containing one of each item at a cost comparable with other organic cosmetics.

According to Stokes, many of the amino acids, vitamins and minerals that are often added to other products in the laboratory are found naturally in goat milk.

Eventually, when goat dairying becomes feasible, Scott will invest in a proper dairy. He said that if he were to start now he would have to sell the milk at double the price of cow's milk.

As well as the economic changes that have to occur, there remains the hard fact of public opinion towards drinking goat milk. It is a negative attitude which will hopefully change.

A favourite saying of goat breeders is, "Cows have four teats and goats have two, so if God wanted us to drink cow's milk he would have given us four hands."

## Down Through The Years With Driftwood

**FIVE YEARS AGO**

As restrictions have been placed on the weights to be carried over Crofton and Vesuvius wharves, the province has announced no plans for the upgrading of island ferry services. Salt Spring Island is limited to a gross load of 60 tons and a limit of 30,000 pounds. The half-century-old *Pender Queen* is unable to carry vehicles in excess of six tons gross. The wharves are limited to 40,000 pounds. Six years ago the Vesuvius ferry was handling loaded logging trucks and cement trucks. Six years ago the *Salt Spring Queen* was permitted a gross load of 100 tons and six years ago the *Pender Queen* had no weight limit. Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce has met with little encouragement from Victoria for the future. The *Bowen Queen* is the only Salt Spring ferry capable of handling all loads at all times.

**Victim of a cabin fire** on Galiano Island, three-year-old Samian Taranov, is recovering in Victoria General Hospital. The boy and his mother, Elizabeth Sunflower Taranov, were airlifted to Victoria on Thursday afternoon by an air-sea rescue helicopter. Parents expressed initial reluctance to have the child treated in hospital, but finally consented. The treatment provided by the limited facilities in the Coon Bay cottages was reported to have been quite effective. Fire, which destroyed the abandoned cottage, was attributed to the victim playing with matches.

Everything movable was stolen from the site of the burned-out X-Kalay hotel at Vesuvius last week. Spokesman for the group, Bev Wing, reported that thieves had removed charred pots and pans and vegetables from the root cellar.

**TEN YEARS AGO**

Mrs. Grace Gilbert of North Beach Road has the gull's number. She reports seeing a numbered gull last week. His wing bore the number, 34. There was no indication of who might have tagged the bird.

Roads on Salt Spring Island aren't finished yet. Hector Gerow, roads foreman, reports that the widening and deepening of ditches has alarmed the Chamber of Commerce. The shoulder of the road will now be widened with gravel and the ditch

narrowed as a result, he explained. Resurfacing of island main roads has resulted in a metalled road two feet greater in width than before. The new shoulders are needed to allow a wider, usable road.

**School budget** in the islands stands at nearly \$750,000 this year. Trustees last week declined to pare it down although it represents more than the permitted 10% increase over last year's.

**Ghost was laid** last week when the old Bittancourt home on Dean Road was destroyed by fire. The house has been rumoured haunted for many years. The fire was set to destroy the building and it was controlled by firemen at the scene. House was built by Reid Bittancourt and was the oldest house on Ganges Hill. Ghost was supposed to be that of Florence Bittancourt, but nobody of that name has ever lived there.

**Former postmaster** at South Pender and resident of the island for many years, John Freeman, died in the Veterans' Hospital in Victoria on Sunday. He was born 77 years ago in Cornwall, England.

**FIFTEEN YEARS AGO**

**Tom Portlock**, president of Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce, has asked the island provincial centennial committee to clarify its program in light of the Fulford Hall Committee's plans to go ahead on another project for the centennial. Island committee is under the chairmanship of Col. M. F. Peiler.

**Sir Winston Spencer Churchill**, a man whose like we shall never see again, died early Sunday morning after a brief illness. The 90-year-old British statesman has left his mark on the pages of history.

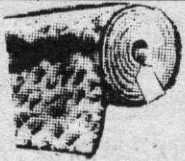

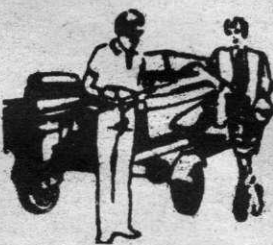

# Lay school of theology to take place at Salt Spring

Four Salt Spring Island churches are sponsoring a lay school of theology on the island, to take place in mid-February.

Driftwood learned this week that the United, Anglican, Community Gospel and Roman Catholic churches decided to sponsor the school following a meeting late last year with the founder of the Victoria Lay School of Theology, Rev. Canon Thomas Bailey.

Three courses will be offered in conjunction with Gulf Islands School District on February 15 and 16. Introduction to the Old Testament, the Gospel Parables and Three Significant Christian Personalities are the titles of the courses. Each will consist of three 50-minute lectures.

Rev. John Bailey of the Anglican Parish of Salt Spring Island said that all who register will take the first course and can choose between the second and third courses.

Canon Bailey of Victoria will give the Old Testament course. He was

formerly John Albert Hal lecturer for the Diocese of B.C. and a professor at the Vancouver School of Theology.

The Gospel Parables will be taught by the Rev. Dr. Marlow Anderson, who was at one time a professor at Waterloo University and is presently on the staff of St. Mary's, Oak Bay. He is also a lecturer in the extension department of the University of Victoria.

Three Significant Christian Personalities will be covered by Rev. P. Bergin, Pastor S. Hildebrandt and Rev. John Bailey, all of Salt Spring Island. The personalities to be discussed are Pope John XXIII, St. Paul and St. Thomas Aquinas.

On the evening of Friday, February 15 the lectures will run from 7.30 to 9.30 pm. On the Saturday lectures will begin at 10 am and conclude at 3 pm.

Registration is \$5 per person or \$9 a couple. Further information can be obtained from any of the participating churches.

# Galiano Island

Galiano Weavers and Spinners Guild members held their annual general meeting on Thursday, January 17 in the Community Hall. The past year has been a busy one for the guild.

Three major workshops were held; in double-weave, basketry and spinning. Many mini-workshops, talks and demonstrations were arranged for a wide exchange of information and ideas. The guild members displayed their work at the Annual Exhibition and Sale, at their Christmas Sale and also participated in the Arts and Crafts Show of the Galiano Club and the Lions Club Fiesta. Their wares were also on sale at a Flea Market in the hall.

From the profits made at sales the guild made donations to UNICEF, Council of Clubs, Galiano School Walkathon and the Children's Christmas Party Fund. The guild has recently had made available to it a multi-harness loom purchased by the senior citizens through a New Horizon grant. This will enable members to undertake advanced weaving.

The slate of officers for the coming year is as follows: president, Lucy Miley; vice-president, Dorothy Lupton; secretary, Mary Jean Elliott; treasurer, Phyllis Stafford; and program co-ordinator, Kathleen Partington. New members will be most welcome at meetings, which are held every Tuesday at 1 p.m. at the Community Hall.

### NATURE NOTES

The Gulf Islands play host to six or seven members of the woodpecker family. One of the most attractive in appearance and most humourously named is the "red-breasted", yellow-bellied sapsucker.

This is considered a "race" of the ordinary yellow-bellied sapsucker and is found only in the Pacific northwest. Both the breast and head of the male bird are a brilliant red. This bird has been recently seen in the Bluff Park area, drilling rows of its regularly spaced holes low on the trunks of deciduous trees such as the maple. The bird returns to the holes when sufficient time has elapsed for them to have filled with sap, which the sap-sucker then extracts with his feathered tongue; hence the name.

The sap-sucker supplements his diet of dilute maple syrup with grubs for protein. Sufficient sap is now rising in the maples for the holes to overflow and trickle down

the trunk. For those with ambition to make maple syrup from our local Douglas maples, now appears to be the time to drill the holes, push in the spigots and hang the buckets.

### NOISES IN THE NIGHT

Residents in the Cain Peninsula and southeast corner of Galiano were awakened from sleep by loud noises in the early hours on Friday.

The Coast Guard hovercraft was out on a search and rescue mission, looking for a small cabin cruiser with three occupants which had set out from Crescent Beach the previous day and had not arrived at its destination.

The hovercraft roared down narrow Gossip Channel at about 4 a.m. Later, in daylight, it went into the shallow confines of the head of Whaler Bay, having to get off its air cushion and set down on the water in order to turn around to come out.

Fortunately, the missing boat with the three men on board turned up safe and sound later that day at Sidney. Surely nobody will complain about disturbed sleep for such a worthy errand.

Wind and rain proved to be the undoing of a huge alder tree which had its roots in a stream near this writer's home. The runoff of water, plus a quick gust of wind, saw the big tree fall on the roadside, missing the power line on the other side of the road, and the fence not far away.

Not even the best of fallers could have placed it so well. This tree was one of the bigger ones, measuring about three feet at the butt and was a welcome addition to the wood supply.

### LADIES SERVICE CLUB

Twenty-two members of the Galiano Ladies Service Club held their first meeting of 1980 in a new location, Page Drive Lounge, on Monday, January 14.

A blazing fire, comfortable chairs and a cozy atmosphere proved much more attractive than the austerity and rigour of the Community Hall in winter. It was a suitable time to look back on the club's efforts during 1979 and to look forward to the activities planned for 1980.

Group donations totalling \$600 have been given to UNICEF, (Cambodia), B.C. Crippled Children Fund, Central City Mission and the Salvation Army. The club plans to contribute early in 1980 to the Variety Club Telethon for Retarded Children, the Cancer Research Fund and the Heart Foundation.

Members also expect to volunteer their services to Greenwoods and to assist the children of Galiano by supervising after-school activities.

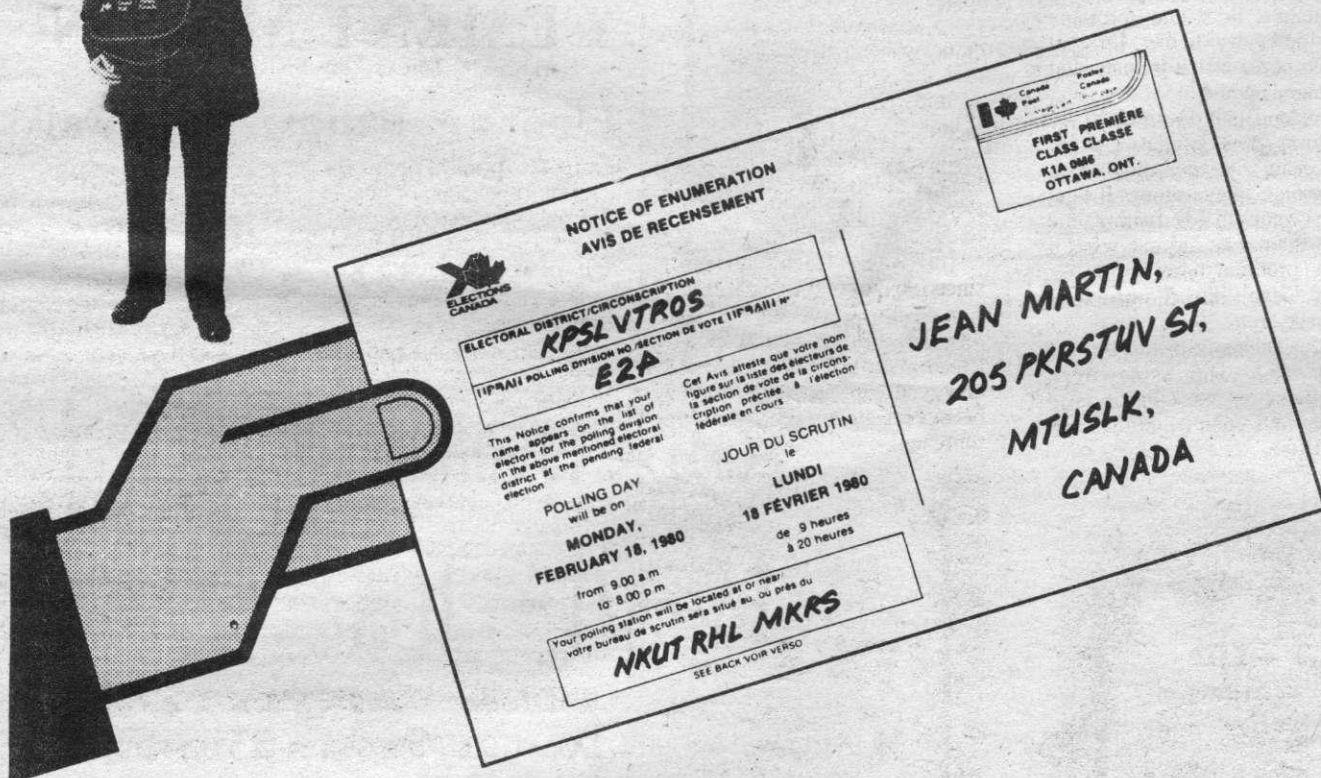

### DRIFTWOOD ASKED THEM:

# 'What do you think about the Ganges sewer proposal?'

Two *Driftwood* reporters went on to the streets of Ganges last week and questioned six people about the Ganges sewer proposal.

Their comments and their pictures are published here, in the first of what is to be a regular feature of the paper.

This column is in no way intended to be a public opinion poll, nor is it intended to reflect what the majority of local residents feel about various issues.



MARG BENNETT

"Something should be done about the pollution problem in the harbour. At one time you could swim here and eat the seafood caught near the public wharf but now you can't do either without risking your health.

"Eventually something has to be done about it because the problem is just going to get worse. It smells like raw sewage in Ganges. It isn't healthy. If a sewer system was put in for the village the health problems would be improved.

"Our tax money is used for everything else so it may as well be used for a sewer system. I should be more aware of the sewer debate but I know that it is not healthy in this area and we must have a change.

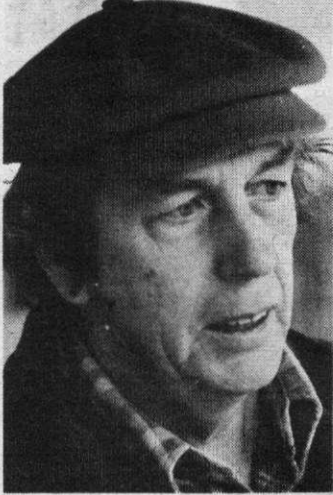


DICK ROYAL

"There's nothing wrong with pumping sewage into the harbour as long as there's nothing floating past my place. A sewer system for Ganges is just what we need. It would promote development, bring lots of people here, which is just what the island needs.

"As long as it doesn't cost me anything they can put a sewer system in wherever they want. Pollution of the harbour? If I get any sewage on my fishing line I'll just take a rag and wipe it off, no problem there.

"It doesn't hurt the people in Victoria and they pump six million gallons of it into the sea every day. The same thing happens in Vancouver and people there don't mind so why should we."



TOM VOLQUARDBEN

"A sewer system should have been installed in Ganges a long time ago. We couldn't put the system in now for one third of what the cost would have been 15 years ago. The longer we wait the worse it's going to get.

"The main reason we need a sewer system is because of the health hazard which exists without a sewer. Right now there is a hazard in having restaurants in Ganges located in close proximity to sewage outfalls.

"I haven't eaten downtown since 1969 for that reason. If you can smell sewage in the area then you can't be sure it's not in the food. I hope I don't get sick and end up in the hospital because it smells pretty bad up there too."



NORM HAYS

"No, I don't think it would make a lot of sense to have a sewer system in light of all the arguments against it. There have been some pretty intelligent people who have studied sewers and they've been saying that sewers aren't the answer.

"Maybe some areas need them, but for the moment we should be looking at some alternative to a big system. I was for the sewers at the beginning but I've changed my mind after hearing the arguments against them.

"We have to be looking at the fact that the harbour may be polluted even more if we put in sewers. So I'm not completely satisfied that we need them and the people against them have some good arguments."



CLIFF JONES

"This town has to clean up its act. I've been smelling the sewage ever since I got here. The whole political situation on this island is a big joke. They spend all their money on gathering information and then they don't make up their minds.

"If they had made up their minds in the first place and decided to build a sewer they could have used all the money spent on gathering information on something worthwhile. A sewage system is inevitable.

"Why not put it in now before the costs go up? If the political situation wasn't such a joke we wouldn't be having the problems that we're having now. The cost of a sewer is going to go up every year, so why waste time arguing about it?"



CHARLIE BASELEY

"My wife and I live in Vesuvius. Our septic tank could be used for six houses, not just one. I think that wherever sewage can be handled with a tile field then people should not have to hook up to sewers.

"Septic tanks are fine for uncrowded residential areas but for an area like downtown Ganges then you have to have a sewer system. I'm not too well versed in the problems of sewers but I think that where there is not good, adequate ground for a drain field there should be some other way of getting rid of sewage.

"As far as the pollution of the harbour is concerned I don't eat any seafood so I don't really know if there is a problem there. But it seems there are problems elsewhere with polluting harbours so we shouldn't let that happen here."

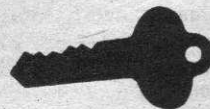

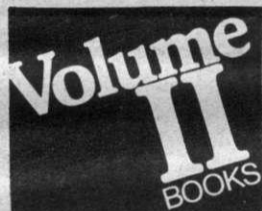
