has been the case in the last two years. However it must be remembered that the rainfall last December was rather on the high side, and continued into January and February, and much of the earlier summer was of a rather damp nature.

It will help our winter water supply and keep a reserve of moisture in the land.

We have so many more people who are using our water supply, the sum total of which depends on what the land retains from the rainfall, and that amount had decreased so materially in the past 25 years, initially by logging, and later by wholesale clearing, that conservation is a must.

Our rainfall, though not constant, does not vary too much... an average of 600 mm. Bear in mind that an average of 200 mm gives desert conditions.

Family council director meets with islanders

Several Salt Spring Island organizations were represented at a meeting last week with Constance Hawley, executive director of the B.C. Council for the Family.

Now three years old, the B. C. Council for the Family was established as a direct result of the 1976 B. C. Conference of the Family, which brought together community and religious leaders to discuss recommendations concerning all aspects of social reform.

As an on-going organization, the B.C. Council for the Family committed itself to the belief that the family is the source of society's strength and began developing programs aimed at educating people to improve the quality of family life for everyone.

Hawley explained that the council began by attempting to answer one basic question: What is a family?

"Well, we soon discovered that once you start to define, you exclude people, and we didn't want to exclude anyone.

"We're a motley group," said Hawley. Members of the council include people from all walks of life, from religious leaders to politicians, all ethnic groups and community agencies, businesses and individuals.

The council avoids taking a stand on current issues such as abortion because, as Hawley explained, that would also exclude people with conflicting opinions.

As a non-profit society, it has only one major goal: to strengthen family relationships by giving support wherever it is needed.

Now a network extends throughout the province with 50 branch members all developing education and support programs such as parent study groups, single parent

support groups, marriage preparation courses and many more programs with help available from the council.

Except for a government grant which pays for office space and two staff members, the society is run completely by volunteers and collects money solely from memberships and contributions.

Local organizations belonging to

the B.C. Council for the Family and represented at the meeting are the Family Centre, the Community Society and the Parents Co-operative Nursery School. Individual membership entitles you to receive the council's newsletter, published four times a year, as well as an annual report. Strikers win tournament against Sooke Warriors, Duncan Raiders

On Saturday, Oct. 4 the Salt Spring Strikers sponsored a three-team mini-tournament at Portlock Park. The event was a resounding success, not only for the Strikers, who won the tournament, but for all the teams that competed.

Besides the Strikers, the Sooke Warriors, second place team in Division 5C, and the Duncan Wes-Can Raiders, second place team in Division 5B, participated.

The Duncan Raiders, as expected, were the strongest of the three teams. As they were a "B" level team, we knew that they would have strengths that neither Sooke nor ourselves would have, and it was obvious what one of them was the minute they arrived: size!

They were huge, with over half their team being a good foot taller and 30 pounds heavier than the biggest player on either Sooke's team or the Strikers. The other, much to their credit, was their individual player skills. All their players exhibited good ball control and many had those little moves that make soccer so exciting to watch.

GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP

Although they possessed a tremendous height and weight advantage, on no occasion during the two games that they played did they use this unfairly, and their

good sportsmanship made them all the more welcome at our tournament.

Sooke, as usual, were their scambly, fast-moving selves, and although they lost their first game against the Strikers, the fact that they were able to hold the Duncan Raiders to a 1-1 tie is indicative of their ability.

If they can be faulted at all, it is that they have a one-man offence. If he is closely checked, they have no offence at all.

Although their tournament record of one loss and one tie was the same as the Raiders, they took second place as they, like the Strikers, are a "C" level team, where the Raiders are a "B" level team.

ONLY TEAM WITH A WIN

The Strikers were the only team to register a win in the tournament, as they beat Sooke 2-1 and the Raiders 1-0.

As with most of our contests against Sooke, we found ourselves under early pressure, and our defence was hard pressed to hold them off.

With five players absent, and many boys playing unfamiliar positions, it took the Strikers most of the first half to gel as a team. During the first 15 minutes of the game, Sooke scored and held a 1-0 lead until 10 minutes from the end.

In the second half, the Strikers

put continuous pressure on Sooke, but due to the excellent play of their defence, came up empty-handed. Sooke's coach knew our strategy, and had our wingers completely boxed in.

UP THE MIDDLE

Without our wingers, it was necessary to direct our charges up the middle, but this is where Sooke is the strongest, and few of these attacks even resulted in shots on goal. Our half-backs were pushing the ball through for our forwards, but Sooke's goalie was rushing out and clearing these off to the sides.

With 10 minutes left in the game, Stuart Lyon brought the ball up out of the mid-field and this time, instead of pushing the ball through, he chipped the ball towards the net from the 20-yard line. The goalie was already rushing out of his net in anticipation of another push-through pass, and by the time he realized his mistake, the ball was over his head and in the back of the net.

On the next charge up the field, the goalie remained in the net, but this too turned out to be a mistake, as it gave Jeff Moger the chance he needed to corral a through-pass. His hard shot went through the goalie's hands, to put the Strikers ahead 2-1 and give them the win.

HUSTLE THEY DID

The Strikers knew they would have to hustle if they were going to make any kind of showing against the Duncan Raiders, and hustle they did. For the first 15 minutes of the game they totally controlled the play.

The only goal of the game came during that first 15 minutes, and once again it was from the foot of Stuart Lyon, a chip from the 20-yard line that caught the Duncan goalie out of position.

After 15 minutes of continuous hard work, the Strikers began to tire, and Duncan slowly began to take control and force their style of play on the Strikers. During the last seven or eight minutes of the first half, Erin Fewings, Striker goalie, was called on to make a dozen hard saves.

The boys came off at half totally exhausted, but beginning to realize that they could actually pull this one off. All they had to do was keep Duncan off the scoreboard for another 30 minutes.

PLAYED DEFENSIVELY

During the whole of the second half the Strikers did something that they have never done before: they played defensively. They stuck to Duncan's players like glue, and no matter which of them got the ball, he had a Striker right on top of him, making life difficult.

The Raiders were getting shots, but very few were good shots because they could not shake their checks. Finally, after 30 thoroughly hectic minutes, the final whistle blew, and the score remained 1-0.

An important message for British Columbia Retailers

As of January 1, 1981, Bill 56, The Holiday Shopping Regulation Act, will come into effect in British Columbia. The Bill prohibits you from operating any form of retail business in British Columbia on Sundays and other holidays UNLESS your business is specifically exempted as provided by the Act itself.

In this Act:

Holidays are defined as Sunday, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Victoria Day, Dominion Day, British Columbia Day, Labour Day, Thanksgiving Day, Remembrance Day, Christmas Day, December 26 (Boxing Day), and any day designated for special observance by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

According to the Act, if you are in the business of selling goods or services which are not for resale, your goods or services are sold by hawkers or peddlers, or if you charge admission to a place or facility for educational, recreational, cultural, or amusement purposes, you are in the retail business and are affected by the provisions of the Act.

You MAY operate your business on holidays if you sell or offer for sale ONLY goods or services in one of the following classes:

- 1) foodstuffs, antiques, newspapers, periodicals, handicrafts, and sundries in a total sales and display area open to the public of less than 225

square meters and employing no more than four persons to serve the public in the retail establishment;

- 2) fresh fruits and vegetables;
- 3) hygienic, cosmetic, pharmaceutical, or therapeutic goods and sundries only during those hours when prescription drugs are dispensed to the public;
- 4) nursery stock, flowers, and horticultural and gardening supplies;
- 5) rental, servicing and repair of, and the sale or offering for sale of fuel, lubricants, and accessories for motor vehicles, boats, and aircraft.
- 6) rental of goods and equipment for sports, recreation, and use about the home and garden;
- 7) prepared meals;
- 8) living accommodation;
- 9) self-service laundries and other coin-operated services;
- 10) live and cinematic productions, displays, exhibits and facilities for educational, recreational, cultural, or amusement purposes and the sale or offering for sale of goods and services incidental to those purposes.

New owner of the Harbour House Hotel at Ganges is Ian Hamilton of Edmonton, Alberta. Takeover date was October 1.

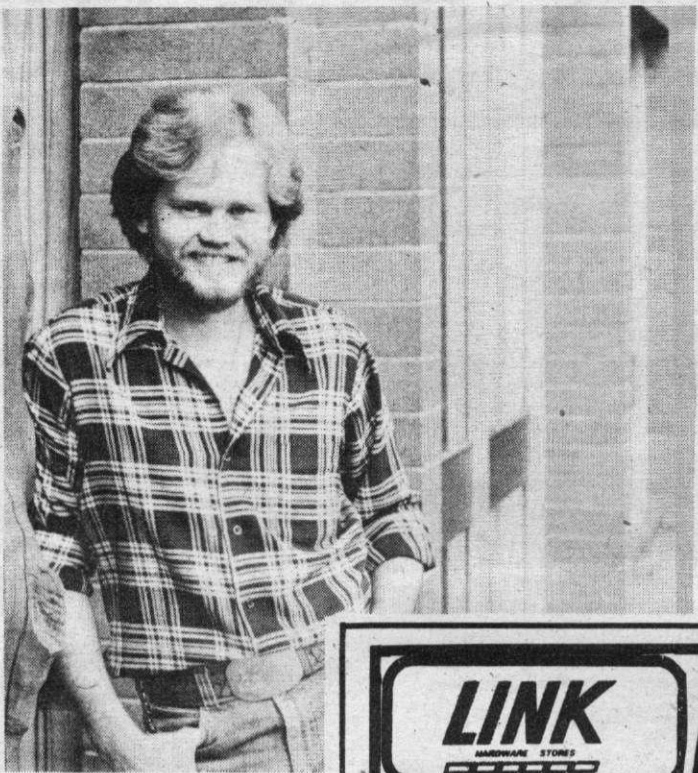
New manager of the hotel is also an Edmontonian. He is Allan Levin, a restaurateur in the Alberta city for seven years prior to his move to the west coast.
