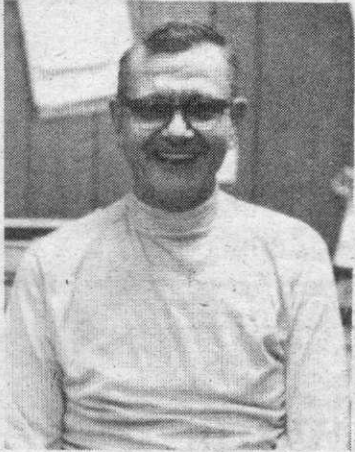

It Spring For Islands Trust

Three at Mayne



L. J. "BUD" KREISSL

Bud Kreissl, navy veteran and retired pathologist, retired to Salt Spring Island in the 70's and built a home overlooking Stuart Channel. He has been one of the most outspoken critics of the provincial policies on domestic water, both as a retired medical officer and, latterly, as an elected trustee of the North Salt Spring Water District. He has asserted that a close link exists between planning and water supplies and he spoke out for both during his two years as local trustee and champion of the community plan.



DAVID LOTT

Native born Englishman, David Lott came to Canada in time to enlist for the Second World War. He was wounded at Falaise in the D-Day landings while serving as gunnery officer with the Royal Canadian Artillery. After the war he married a West Vancouver bride following his graduation from Guelph in veterinary medicine. He has served overseas, as a veterinarian, in East Africa, Ethiopia and Ghana. He has had property on the island since the 1950's.



CHARLES SUTCLIFFE

Charles Sutcliffe has lived here since 1974. He came from Hong Kong, where he was commissioner of police. "I have the time and feel the duty to do something for the island. I would like to further the aims of the official community plan." He is an active member of the Royal Canadian Legion, the Salt Spring Island Sailing Club and Salt Spring Island Planning Association.

Mayne Islanders have one election and one referendum to consider on Saturday.

Voters will name two trustees to the Islands Trust and they will decide whether they want Sunday and holiday shopping.

John Mundie, local trustee for the past term-and-a-half, has withdrawn from public affairs.



ED WILLIAMS

Water is the key to the future of Mayne Island, says Ed Williams. Water supplies must be carefully studied. Williams is an employee of the BC Ferry Corporation at Village Bay. He has lived on Mayne Island for the past eight years and was on Salt Spring Island before that. He is concerned over provincial reaction to the Trust. "I don't like to see the Trust powers being usurped by the Cabinet," he said last week. He has taken a stand on two island controversies. There is a case for an island airstrip, he told *Driftwood*, but not in the proposed location. Of the Bennett Bay wharf furore, he feels that the Mayne Inn wharf should be available for the use of patrons but not for the "general public".



JOAN SPRAGUE

Housewife and community spokesman, Joan Sprague is seeking a further term as Mayne Island local trustee. She has participated in the successful conclusion of the zoning and subdivision bylaws for Mayne Island during the past year. "I am still committed to maintaining the rural residential nature of Mayne Island," she said this week. She sees the Islands Trust as the potentially effective vehicle for the protection of the islands. And she is committed to working towards that end.

ll vote for school trustee

Two South Pender candidates for the Islands Trust are running as a team. Bill Norton and Joan Noble were elected two years. During those two years two new bylaws covering zoning and subdivision have been produced for South Pender and both are now in force. The two candidates have watched the sale of large tracts of land on South Pender with some anxiety. Both feel that their work of the past two years in the production of the land control bylaws will be invaluable in the future maintenance of South Pender as a tranquil, rural island.



BILL NORTON

Mrs. Noble is a native Manitoban who has spent most of her life in British Columbia. She came to the island 6½ years ago from North Vancouver, where she was employed as a secretary. She believes that all the powers contained in the Islands Trust Act should be accorded the Trust by the promulgation of those sections not yet implemented.

Bill Norton is a retired army officer.

Cecily Overall is a retired educationalist. She took early retirement and came to Pender to enjoy her freedom. She was 14 years with the faculty of education at the University of British Columbia. Before that she had taught for 20 years, mostly in British Columbia schools. She has expressed concern at the school situation on Pender and has urged that an alternate class could readily be set up in the school without resorting to a "free school". Such a class would be acceptable to those parents looking for it and for those children more suited to it, she suggests. "I have watched and helped in the development of several such classes, all within existing school systems," she stated.

A modern school facility with a competent staff and a student-teacher ratio like the islands should result in an excellent standard of education, contends Miss Overall. She is happy to play the role of mediator in trying to bring the two sides together.



RON PITHER

Founder of a community newspaper on Mayne Island and an active community worker, Ron Pither is seeking election to the Islands Trust. A member of the West Coast Environmental Law Association, he has identified himself with conservation matters for several years. He took part in the recent Pender Island Farmers' Institute debate on the future of the Islands Trust.

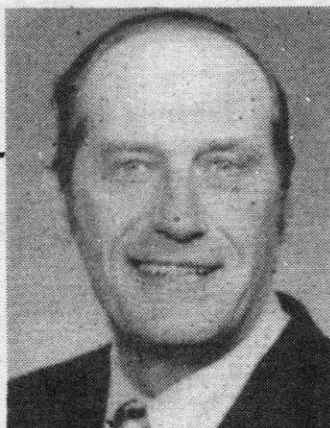

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Jewellery, painting, crafts on display at Kenton House

An exhibition by three island artists drew a good crowd to Kenton House Gallery at Salt Spring Island Sunday.

Craft jewellery made by Nicholas Gaitt, paintings by Louise Woodward and silver jewellery made by Bruce Pearson were on display.

Bruce Pearson exhibited a collection of jewellery including silver bracelets and earrings. For Pearson, working with silver is a relatively new endeavour, but the island artist is experienced in a variety of art forms.

He studied art at Winnipeg and at Dauphin before attending the Alberta College of Art. In 1969, Pearson was an instructor at Calgary's Studio 22 and later at the Allied Arts Centre.

In 1972 he came west and worked on the Vancouver City Art Project in the area concerned with park landscaping concepts. For several years Pearson was engaged with landscaping and the diverse nature of his work resulted in his working with the planning of landscaping at the P.N.E. grounds and later, at the Capilano salmon hatchery.

CO-ORDINATOR

In 1973 Pearson was co-ordinator and consultant at the Lyn Canyon Ecology Centre in North Vancouver.

Pearson left Vancouver to move to Galiano Island in 1977. On Galiano, the Canadian artist took up carpentry work.

A newcomer to Salt Spring, Pearson's work will be on exhibition at the Empress Hotel at the annual exhibition.

Paintings displayed by Louise Woodward were largely island-inspired.

Woodward's sandstone and rock subjects give an impression of heaviness and bulk while her water-colours are less cumbersome and less well-defined. Using water-colour, Woodward chooses more delicate subjects, taking oyster shell and developing the patterns to a disproportionate degree. In her paintings, Woodward makes microscopic the more intricate, almost microcosmic features of the characteristically unseen Salt Spring Island scene.

DEVOTED TO SCULPTURE

Louise Woodward studied at the Victoria College of Art, at British Columbia Fine Arts College, at the Fine Arts College at Langara and throughout her studies devoted

herself in particular to sculpture.

Presently, Mrs. Woodward is studying for an art history degree.

Nicholas Gaitt comes from Surrey, England, but has lived in British Columbia nearly all his life.

Following completion of school, Gaitt was employed as a hair stylist before he studied theatre and English in Vancouver.

Eight years ago, Gaitt moved to Salt Spring Island and began making crafts. He insists that he is a craftsman as well as a jeweller.

The jewellery and crafts displayed at Kenton House by Nicholas Gaitt were simple but for the materials of which they were made. **MAPLE SALAD SET**

Gaitt pointed out a salad server set made of carved maple and fitted by brass inserts with ivory handles. He wore on his lapel what he considered his favorite piece, a brooch measuring one inch in length and less than an inch wide but containing more than 15 pieces of local and exotic woods.

He admitted that he enjoys the simplicity of his shapes and the allowances made by working with various materials, including ebony from India, ivory, whale's tusk and seal tusk from northern Canada and an assortment of wood from local and foreign regions.

Gaitt surveyed his collection at the gallery and examined a two-inch box carved from maple with a snug-fitting lid.

"This doesn't pay the rent. Cheap jewellery pays the rent but these pieces here are the true pieces of art," Gaitt explained. The box was priced at \$65.

Along with Bruce Pearson, Nicholas Gaitt will be displaying his work at the Empress show later this year.

The Kenton House show continues until November 16, during which time all the work will be offered for sale.

Shellfish harvesting ban lifted

A partial lifting of the ban on shellfish harvesting has been announced by the department of fisheries and oceans.

The east coast of Vancouver Island, from Shelter Point (south of Campbell River) to Victoria, including Denman and Hornby Islands and the Gulf Islands, was reopened effective November 1. The Strait of Juan de Fuca, south of Bonilla Point to Victoria, has also been opened again.

Recreational harvesting of oysters, clams and other bivalve molluscs was closed in May due to red tide.

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Who can vote?

Anyone who lives on the Island can vote if they:

- are 19 years of age or older
- have lived on the island for 3 months, in B.C. for 6 months AND in Canada for 1 year.
- are a Canadian citizen or a British subject

People who own property on the island can vote here if they qualify for all of the above except the 3 months of residence on the island.

The time is now!

As a seven-year member of the Parks & Recreation Commission and a father of three, I have long recognised the need here not only for proper swimming facilities, but for a place for youth to meet and enjoy programs which are possible in a community rec. centre. Now, in fact, there is very little for youth in the evenings and the need for them to meet and enjoy in a healthy atmosphere is most important.

I also recognize the problems of many of our older citizens, who have nowhere to drop in and enjoy varied programs on a daily basis. Swimming (and use of a hydrotherapy pool) are most important aids for all of us in keeping fit - even more so, as one gets on in years.

The planned theatre would be second to none anywhere for its size. The combination gym/theatre now available at the elementary school is uncomfortable - and unless there is a loud production it is difficult for viewing and hearing. It is also unsuitable for rehearsals during the week - there is no room for props and apart from this there is often competition for space between the theatre group and the various athletic groups who regularly use the gym.

A further reason for a new theatre became evident when we were told that Mahon Hall is in bad shape with possibly five years left. The theatre proposed - which has comfortable seating, good acoustics and viewing would attract far more use than is now available - concerts, live theatre, films, lectures, demonstrations - not only utilizing our own local talents, but bringing other interesting attractions from other places.

A study of economics usually reveals that the best time to buy anything is last year, so let's all get out, consider our neighbours' needs and vote "yes" to this excellent and well-researched plan.

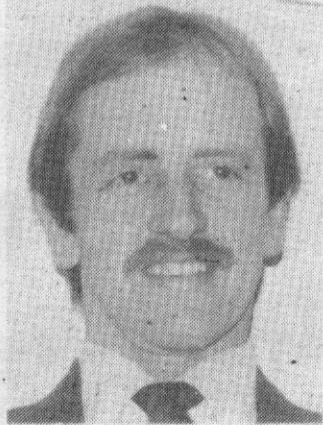

As a resident of Mayne Island and a concerned agricultural land owner, I support appropriate development and suitable economic, social and environmental planning for the Gulf Islands.

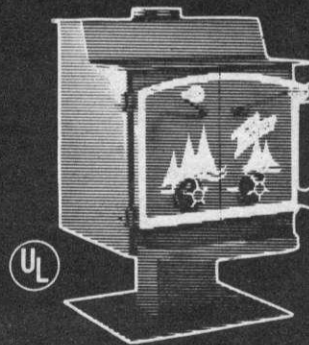

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Switch from commerce to crafts a big one for island potter

Eight years ago island potter Mark Meredith gave up Vancouver business life to find solace on Vancouver Island. He found himself a semi-urban corner of Cadboro Bay where he established himself as an aspiring potter.

For Meredith the move represented a change of role and of lifestyle. For 14 years he was engaged in structured work force, first as a labourer, slinging beer and truck driving in Prince Rupert in the mid 60's and later in Vancouver working for shipping magnate L. Dreyfus.

Meredith found his way into Vancouver's institute of technology and decided on marketing as a career. He avoided accounting studies and attended B.C.I.T. for two years.

"I didn't see daylight for 20 months," explained Meredith. "It was a long course but by the time I was 25 I was right into using what I'd learned."

West Vancouver-born Meredith was stepping up at the age of 25, dealing with various firms across Canada and dedicating himself to his work.

CAUSE TO RECONSIDER

A short digression into the smaller business world of Capilano gave Mark Meredith some cause to reconsider his selling career. The nature of his work wasn't as mobile or as independent as he would have like it to be. As a result, he forfeited his training years and experience at a Vancouver firm to look for work better suited to his ideals.

He studied at a school of pottery in Vancouver before he left the city for his retreat on Vancouver Island. The switch from commerce to crafts was a big one in Meredith's life.

"Guys I was working with, who were out to make a million, thought I was an absolute nut when I quit the business and turned to making pottery," Meredith laughed. "I suppose it came from the workshops my friend's father had. I'd go to someone's house when I was a kid and their father would be in his workshop doing something he was interested in when he wasn't working at his regular job. I wanted a workshop. But a full-time workshop."

BOUGHT A KILN

Meredith purchased a kiln when he moved to Cadboro Bay and he

planted it behind a pharmacy next door in a clump of trees. He experimented with raku pottery and attended workshops to explore pottery skills.

"There's the throwing and the centring and everything related to the clay end of pottery but the glaze is the mysterious part of the procedure. There are hundreds of variables in glaze usage. The learning process in potting has been rewarding; patience, waiting and letting things happen or take shape are applicable to the art as well as to life in general."

In 1977 Meredith celebrated his 35th birthday on Salt Spring Island. In 1979 he rented the late Harry Nichols' residence on Vesuvius Bay Road.

His studio is located at the Bittancourt-built home (circa 1880) and his finished work is displayed in the original 1880-built post boxes which once served the north central part of the island.

Potting will take anything from four to eight hours of Meredith's day while chores related to horses, chicken raising, sheep tending and hay selling will cover the rest.

In the dampness of the west wing of the old Nichols home, the pots finish drying aided by a small

electric heater. Tongue and groove decor and the listing floor boards add antiquity to the art of potting.

Meredith's work is sold on Vancouver Island as well as on Salt Spring. The annual arts and crafts show at Mahon Hall keeps Meredith busy for about five months of the year.

Lung abnormalities

According to the British Columbia Lung Association, lung function testing indicates that 25% of the Canadian population suffer lung abnormalities due to emphysema, chronic bronchitis or asthma.

Director still awaiting legal opinion on bus levy wrangle

Regional Director Yvette Valcourt reported to Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce annual meeting last week on the bus levy.

Bus levy is imposed by the Capital Regional Board on all the capital region in order to finance the urban buses. For some 18 months the islands have been protesting the taxation of island people for a service they don't enjoy and will, in all probability, never enjoy for many years.

The pleas have been heard by the Capital Regional Board on a number of occasions. Directors have been served with innumerable petitions and pleas for relief from a levy many islanders have protested.

Early appeals were for exclusion of the islands from that area served by urban transit. There have been six votes on the matter. The bus levy debate has been approved one meeting and cancelled the next.

It has been the subject of a veto by the chairman when subsequent legal advice suggested that the

delay was not within the terms of the Municipal Act. An approval of the elimination of the islands by one board would be reversed by another, when alternate delegates failed to share the opinions of their regular contemporaries.

The matter was finally settled when the board recently approved a resolution to relieve the islands from the burden of paying for urban transit.

Director Valcourt told the Chamber that her earlier motion at a board meeting had been wrongly interpreted as defeated by the chairman several months ago. Subsequent debates had seen it rejected.

She is awaiting further legal advice on the matter, she told the meeting.

Several weeks ago she invited the Salt Spring Island Planning Association, the unofficial planning group, to pursue the legal status of the long debate. Cost will be born by the grant enjoyed by regional directors in electoral areas.

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Salt Spring Players deserve a theatre

A wise typography professor once warned us that we lose most of our readers by the third paragraph. He was referring to news stories in particular, but I wouldn't be surprised if that's how readers will be feeling about rec centre reviews by now; it's all been said. But naturally, I have something to add.

It's appropriate that 500 people went to see *Arsenic and Old Lace* last week. They will all understand when I say that although I thoroughly enjoyed the production I was a bit stiff by the time it was finished, both from craning my neck and stretching the other parts of my body that weren't too comfortable for too long. So, I will assume that's 500 more votes in favour of the complex which will include a new theatre. The Players have brought a great deal of delight to audiences for several years now. They have attained an excellence that has earned them a real theatre, complete with sound equipment, proper lighting and better seating.

I could go on about how much a swimming pool would benefit the community, especially the student population, but I'm at the point where your interest is ebbing fast, (third paragraph) so I'll just conclude with the thought that the Recreation Commission has presented us with a project that deserves our serious consideration. It is a well-planned proposal brought forth in sincerity, through a great deal of effort from a committee of volunteers with our best interests at heart.

It will affect directly or indirectly, every person on this island. If you have children, or plan to; if you have grandchildren, or will some day; if you enjoy swimming, or the theatre, or arts and crafts, don't let the cost scare you away. Where else can we get so much for so little? If we do it now!

I've never felt this way about Remembrance Day before. Shame on me, but I've always been of the opinion that the horror should be forgotten. I grew up in a generation that never saw war, except on the big screen. And perhaps that's where the difference lies. It's not real enough to us. I remember my father promising me that it would never happen again - you know, 'the war to end all war'.

And now the headlines give us 10 years.

It has me terrified. I feel it growing. I've listened to an interview with a fellow who makes bomb shelters. Inquiries about his shelters increased considerably after the U.S. election of Ronald Reagan as president. And today I heard an interview with Fanya Fennell that touched me deeply.

Fennell is the author of *Playing For Time*, a story of her years in an extermination camp during World War II and how she survived because of her musical talents. Some of you may have seen the movie recently featured on TV, starring Venessa Redgrave. It was very moving, but you must read the book.

One woman's viewpoint

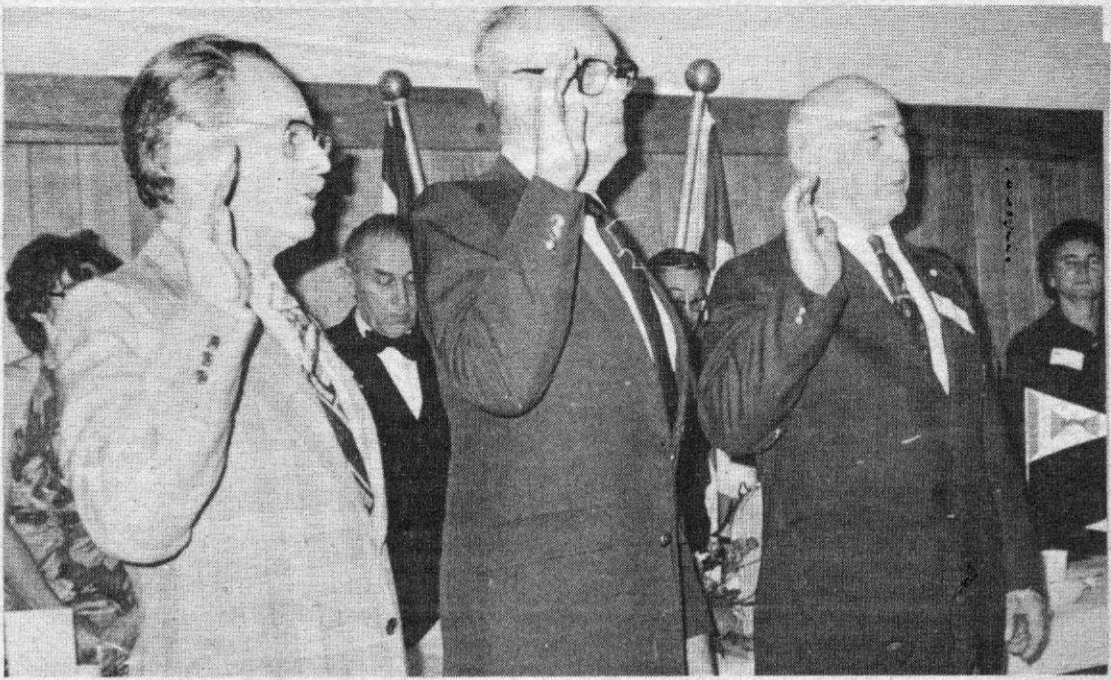

The terrifying certainty that Fennell expressed during the interview was that it would all happen again. She is sure that another Holocaust is coming. She lives in Paris where open hatred of Jews is once more expressed by obscene writing on shop windows, vandalism and killing.

Mary Daly, one of the most radical feminist writers of our day, refers to war in her book *Gyn/Ecology*:

"Wars among nations, corporations, administrations belong to (the) category of invasion and defense. This sort of 'violation' belongs to the arena of boys' games and essentially has nothing to do with women's priorities. Yet, countless women are in fact killed, maimed, and raped in these war games, and the energy of millions more is sapped and diverted by loyalty to one side or other of these idiot battles."

But we are not helpless. We can tell our children. Let them know what war is - the true horror of it - and let us not forget.

New Power Squadron

November 1 saw the beginning of a new Power Squadron in the Gulf Islands. The Pender Island Power Squadron received its charter from Chief Commander Oliver Summers, and with the assistance of District Commander L.F. Cashman, received the pledge of the young squadron's first executive.

The new squadron was sponsored by Salt Spring Island Power Squadron and is the culmination of three years of hard work by Training Officer Lt. Cmdr. Peter

Bingham and his assistants, who regularly commuted from Long Harbour to Otter Bay to provide instructors and training material. Members of the new squadron were enrolled in the Salt Spring Island Squadron until there was a sufficient number qualified to start the Pender Islands group.

Salt Spring Island Power Squadron was represented by Commander Jim Napper and Mrs. Napper, Lt. Commander Ted Coombes and Mrs. Coombes, Squadron Commander (Ret'd) Jack Potheary and

Lt. Commander Peter Bingham. As a memento of the occasion Commander Napper presented the new squadron with a cheque for \$100 and a mounted bell which was completely designed and constructed by Squadron Cmdr. (Ret'd) Jack Potheary.

A Bent Props Award was also donated by Salt Spring for use within the new squadron. This is one more link in a chain of over 150 Power Squadrons, all of which share the objective of teaching safe boating.

Curtis supports plea for urgent water study

Domestic water supplies on Salt Spring Island are at the cross roads. Unless a detailed survey of available water is undertaken soon, the island could find itself desperately short.

This warning was given to the Islands MLA, Finance Minister Hugh Curtis last week.

Local Trustees David Lott and Bud Kreissl, with North Salt Spring Water District Trustee Roy Lochhead called on the minister in Victoria.

They outlined the serious water problems faced this year by users of St. Mary Lake water and they urged that the provincial government undertake a survey of water needs and water supplies on the island.

The survey is urgently needed, the minister was told, and it is needed urgently now.

They received a sympathetic hearing, reported Kreissl afterwards.

Curtis told *Driftwood* this week that he has written of his concerns for a water study on the island to Environment Minister Stephen Rogers.

He has also asked Rogers to give it urgent priority.

Vehicle checks

RCMP at Ganges will be looking for bald tires, brake and muffler defects and vehicle lighting defects in the weeks to come.

Spokesman for the Ganges detachment stated that many island cars are not road-worthy and that periodic road checks will be made.

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Candidates meeting draws 20

Twenty people attended an all-candidates meeting Saturday at the School-Community Centre on Pender Island.

Running for Islands Trust on South Pender are Bill Norton, Alan Brooks and Joan Noble. North Pender Island trustees have been elected by acclamation. They are Gordon Wallace and Emil LeBlanc.

Cecily Overall and John Zacharias, the school board candidates, were present, as was David Nichols from the Magic Lake area, to answer questions on the water and sewer referendum.

Brooks spoke first, stating that he was an independent but part of a new team representing residents, non-residents and visitors to South Pender. He would work for better communication between the Islands Trust and South Pender. He would have all the minutes of the meetings either mailed or published in the *Pender Post*, and would have the Advisory Planning Commission meetings advertised and open to the public.

Brooks said he would work for coastal management, including oysters, clams and commercial interests, and control of wildlife and hunters. Brooks complained the Islands Trust had only held one zoning bylaw open meeting.

MORE POWER

Joan Noble, South Pender Island incumbent, said she has found that the Trust does not have the full power to cover many items. She will work to obtain more power for the Trust. She stated she has no party affiliation, no property interests and is only interested in serving all the people of South Pender.

Bill Norton, also an incumbent, said he supports the environmental approach and the forthcoming new regional plan should soon be completed.

According to Norton, several large tracts of land have been sold on South Pender Island and these will be thoroughly checked by the Islands Trust if he is elected.

To date, any South Pender Island subdivision applications have gone through according to the law. He refuted Brooks' idea that public meetings should be held by the Trust because if the applicant follows the law there is no need for a public meeting.

DISAPPOINTED

Cecily Overall, a South Pender Island resident and school board candidate, said she was very disappointed by the withdrawal of some students by parents not satisfied with the Pender Island School. She feels it is a good school and would like to have all the students under one roof.

She would work for a compromise to eliminate the present divisions. She thinks there are numerous parents who are confused by the present situation.

Overall said the present school board has failed in its responsibilities in that it has not involved the talent available from residents.

She would try to institute a change in the school set-up, and pointed out that the present mill rate on the Penders is lower than

most school districts.

John Zacharias, the incumbent, has 35 years' experience as teacher and principal.

He said he believes a swimming pool program for the islands, taking into consideration the mill rate and the funds available, would have very productive results, especially in an area where all children live surrounded by water. In his opinion, money spent on this is of far greater value than untried, experimental ideas.

"In the past," said Zacharias, "there have been many field trips, some have been good, all are expensive, and some have not been worthwhile from a cost standpoint. DISCUSSED FOR SIX MONTHS"

"With regard to the alternate class situation on Pender, six months were spent in discussion by

the school board, and with the full backing of the chairman, they agreed that an alternate class would have to wait until such time as there were 150 pupils in the Pender Island School, in order to justify the expense."

He went on to state that there are now over 70 experienced islanders involved in helping in the school and he considers the school has done its best. The school board outlook must be practical and realistic, he said.

Gordon Wallace, North Pender Island trustee, said he was very disappointed by the small turn-out, particularly after many complaints in the past that not enough public meetings are held. He noted none of those who had complained of this to him were visible at the meeting.

Some questions and answers on recreation complex

From the Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission

In the past few weeks almost a dozen informational meetings on the recreation complex have been hosted in private homes all over Salt Spring Island. The major concerns of islanders and our answers are as follows:

Why build a new building when we already have so many halls?

All the existing halls are regional and date back to a time when the island was divided and without proper roads to unite people. To choose any one hall (for example, Beaver Point Hall which is the only one with enough land, Beaver Point Park, 37 acres) for developing an adequate facility would send "northerners", "easterners" and "westerners" to their poison pens. Mahon Hall, the only hall centrally located, has inadequate parking and was given up by the school district to the recreation commission because it couldn't meet fire and safety and health standards set by the education ministry.

It's also an energy guzzler. All the existing halls will continue to serve their neighbourhoods while the new facility will serve the total island. The recreation director we would hire could plan and supervise programs for all the halls for more improved use of existing and new facilities.

Will you give up supervision of Mahon Hall if the referendum for the new building is passed and if the second referendum is defeated?

The answer to the first question is no. The commission has voted to continue operating Mahon Hall and to negotiate with the school board for a long-term lease. The Community Arts Council has expressed a willingness to put funds into repairs. The commission has applied for improvement grants from federal funds.

To the second question, the answer is also no. Although the loss of the one mill would mean we would have no money to maintain Mahon Hall, we have the options of raising user fees, applying for more grants and asking the CAC and school board to fund all repairs.

Why don't you just build a pool and use the Activity Centre for the rest?

Two reasons:

1. A pool with needed auxiliary space and personnel will cost \$1 million and couldn't possibly bring in enough money to pay for it. A

pool is always a deficit. The other activities will bring in enough money to lower the pool deficit.

2. The Activity Centre is used more and more by the growing school population. It is never available for community use during the day. Because it is a multi-purpose room, it serves no one purpose adequately. We have heard complaints from the players, musicians, the audiences who can't see or hear adequately, the basketball shooters and everyone else who has ever been in the Activity Centre. The community has already outgrown the centre. We have responded to community requests for a proper auditorium.

Are your cost figures for the building accurate?

Yes. Costs have been guaranteed by Farmer Construction Co. of Victoria to be accurate for six months past the referendum. We would of course prefer to have local firms do the work. If the local tradespeople will get together and meet CRD requirements for a performance bond and meet or go under published cost figures, we want to award them the jobs.

Why didn't you include an ice-skating/curling rink?

It is too expensive and too limited in its use. Everything included in the proposed centre can be used 365 days of the year. Roller skating could be supervised in a parking lot area in good weather.

How do you know the 2 mills for operating the centre won't go up?

We have been promised the payment of half the deficit by the school district for three years. This occurred after we arrived at the two mill figure. This amount of two mills, therefore, has built-in leeway of \$30,000.

The two mill figure includes all staffing. Also, the mill increases in value yearly as salaries increase, so there doesn't have to be more taxation. Also, user fees can be adjusted up or down. For example, islanders could be charged one dollar for swimming while tourists could be charged two dollars. Taxpayers and residents deserve a break.

Why did you include arts and crafts space when the questionnaire two years ago showed people didn't think more arts and crafts space was needed?

At that time, Mahon Hall hadn't been evaluated as unfit, in need of costly repairs. We have provided only minimal space for arts and crafts teaching, since the CAC prefers Mahon Hall.

How long will the new building be adequate? Will you be coming back in a couple of years with another referendum? Are we too small a population to support such a facility?

The architect planned this for the current population, as well as for future growth. The building can accommodate a population of 5,000 to 10,000 people. We are already over 5,000 and growing. We expect this facility can handle our indoor recreational needs for the next 20 years.

Will it destroy Mouat Park?

No. The four acres for the project are four lots of the 10 lots designated on Ganges maps at the beginning of Seaview Ave. There are already picnic tables on the site (barely used). So this area has already been opened up to the public.

The new building will not encroach on the green belt that most residents don't know exists. We have repeatedly been asked where Mouat Park is.

How will senior citizens who don't drive get there?

It will be the responsibility of the commission to arrange with service organizations to set up a volunteer system of helping our neighbours. Isn't that what "community" is all about.

As a commission, we take the responsibility for offering all islanders a year-round facility to enrich our leisure hours and spend them in healthful, constructive ways. We

hope all those who told us they wanted these facilities will get out to vote.

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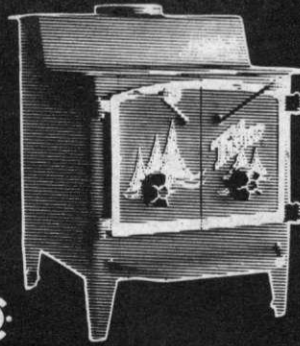
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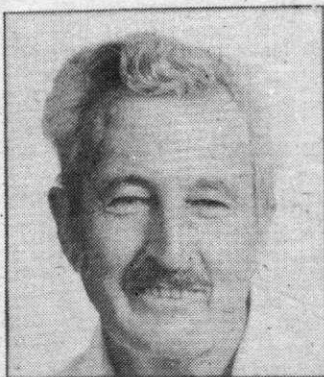

Egypt topic of guest speaker

The regular meeting of Silver Maynes Senior Citizens Association was held in the Agricultural Hall at Mayne Island on October 6. A delightful buffet supper was enjoyed by the large crowd in attendance.

To allow more time for the guest speaker to describe his travels in Egypt, the business session was held over until the next meeting.

The speaker was Tony Rogers, principal of Mayne Island School, who needed no introduction having shown slides of other travels at previous meetings.

His preliminary talk described the people he met in Egypt, who he said were very friendly, very kind and honest.

The temperature in Cairo, a city jam-packed with people was 65-70°. A night shot showed a mosque all lit up, with modern architecture combined with the old. High-rise apartments are in evidence and the usual slum areas revealing the poverty of the people.

SLOW LANES

The streets were fairly wide with slow lanes for the donkey carts. The people lead a very primitive life. Every kind of dress is worn by

both men and women and western style is adopted by the more affluent.

Most of the roads were very dusty and temperatures in the summertime were known to be as high as 130°. Egypt was a Christian country before it became Moslem.

The mosque was open to visitors and a place to wash was provided outside. Inside there was a large open courtyard with walls featuring abstract designs. Alabaster oil lamps were used and there was carpeting throughout. The view of the city from the mosque was quite smoggy.

A visit to the pyramids was interesting. They are located 10 miles outside of Cairo. The guide was a very sophisticated lady who spoke both English and French.

The pyramids are monuments of ancient Egypt, and they tell the story of the Nile civilization. Connected with them were temples which were always east of the pyramids. The pyramid was usually erected during the life of the pharaoh who was to occupy it.

Of the several groups of pyramids the one at Giza is the most important. Here is found the Great Pyramid erected by Khufu of the Fourth Dynasty. This pyramid covers 13 acres, is 451 feet high, contains 3,657,000 cubic yards of stone masonry, weighs 6,848,000 tons and is composed of 2,300,000 blocks. There are about 75 pyramids in Egypt.

At the hotel in Luxor when Rogers was there it rained. It only rains once a year in Luxor.

A visit to the Aswan Dam, built in the early 60's, was very interesting. It was supposed to provide an unlimited supply of water but history has proved this statement to be untrue.

As for beauty, it is a lovely thing to see a greenhouse full of bedding plants, some even starting to bloom, according to inclination, for many bedding plants start to bloom in packs. They also sell very well at that stage.

But further, we can decorate our greenhouse with permanent plants, such as ivy in hanging pots. We can also over-winter our hanging baskets. This spring we did not have to buy nepeta, trailing lobelia (it seeded itself from last year to my delight), geraniums and fuchsias.

SAVED MONEY

The last two, being the more expensive elements in a hanging basket, saved us some money and they were also larger and more profuse in bloom, as this was their second season. So, here is another pleasant opportunity to make a little money, by growing hanging baskets!

Indoor plants also benefit greatly from a spell in the greenhouse. Any of ours which are not doing too well go into the greenhouse for rest and recuperation. We got a lovely little maidenhair fern from Foxglove some time ago and it promptly gave up the ghost.

Maidenhair ferns are classed as difficult and I didn't blame it, for it went from grower to Foxglove to our place in a short period of time. It is a bit much for a "difficult" plant. So I took it into the greenhouse for recycling of pot and soil, but did not get around to do it.

Well, a few weeks later, there it was, proudly displaying a mass of new healthy fronds. I also found out that it can take a lot of light, as

it got full southern exposure, in summer, in our greenhouse.

PROFIT AND PLEASURE

So, we can grow vegies, annuals, perennials and tropicals, for profit and pleasure. The insulated propagating box is also an excellent place to root cuttings, we have about a dozen new escallonias, now transplanted and well under way. At present there are about 50 tropical cuttings growing their roots in there. And next year we will grow some of our table vegies in it in the middle of winter.

Now then, to arrangement of a greenhouse. We need about 32 inches in width for either one or two benches, running the length of the greenhouse and the same for walking space. So, the narrowest greenhouse should have about five feet of clear width inside.

Ours is nine feet wide with two benches along the length, a comfortable walk in between and a potting bench at the far end. Height of the benches is between 32 to 36 inches, according to personal preference. We also have a full-length shelf, a little narrower than the bench, underneath the top shelf. This is excellent space for freshly transplanted seedlings, providing shade and relief from sun and heat until they are established in their new containers.

Also, it's an excellent place for the growing of shade-loving plants, as well as storage for flats, pots, potting soil and other assorted objects.

SOLAR-HEATED FOR SEEDLINGS

Watering is accomplished with a 100-foot-long garden hose with a shut-off at the business end. Left lying in the sun the water in the hose is gently heated by the spring sun, so that we have solar-heated water for the freshly sprouted seedlings and after this is used up,

the usual run-of-the-hose water for the established plants.

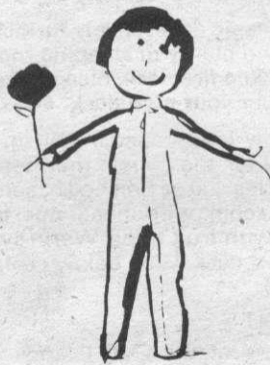
Ventilation is accomplished by two heat-sensitive vent operators which require no other energy than the ambient temperature to open or to close the two vents. It's simple, dependable and economical and allows one the freedom to leave for the day without worrying about over-heating the greenhouse.

Summer shading is accomplished by deciduous trees which leaf-out late, such as walnut. This allows full sun in winter and spring and starts to provide light shade in late May and denser shade as the season advances and the leaves grow.

If you don't have a couple of handy walnut trees, the tree of heaven (Ailanthus Altissima) would do, as they leaf-out late and are fast growers, although they sucker freely.

Other than this, or in the meantime, a loose bamboo blind or slatted roll-up cover to provide dappled shade in the heat of summer will work well.

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Who can vote?

Anyone who lives on the Island can vote if they:


- are 19 years of age or older

Breakwater sought at Fulford Harbour for boats and plane

Surprise was expressed when an application was received last week by the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee for approval of a rock breakwater at Fulford Harbour.

Both Salt Spring Island trustees, David Lott and Bud Kreissl, expressed surprise that the applicants would spend such a sum for the storage of two boats and a sea-plane.

Applicants were Otter Bay Logging Co. Ltd.

It was noted that the applicants had sought a log dump facility in the same area within recent months. It had been refused.

Application had been referred to the committee from the lands branch for the construction of the breakwater and wharf.

Trustees expressed some concern for the effect on the unstable shoreline.

They also asked for some input from the Ferry Corporation in view of the proximity of the proposed breakwater to the ferry wharf.

Decision will await further information.

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Islanders will decide on Sunday, holiday shopping

Seven-day shopping in the islands? It will come if the islanders want it.

All islanders will be invited to vote on the Holiday Shopping Bylaw when they go to the polls on Saturday.

If they vote "No" only small general stores will be open on Sundays and holidays. A "Yes" vote will remove all restrictions and Sundays and holidays will be normal shopping days.

Provincial government has ruled that all stores will remain closed on Sundays and official holidays unless the community specifically asks for them to be open.

Saturday's vote is an invitation to the community, by the Capital Regional District, to vote for wide-open shopping, seven days a week.

REMAIN OPEN

Stores of less than 225 square metres, or approximately 2,400 square feet, selling foodstuffs, antiques, newspapers, periodicals, handicrafts and sundries and employing not more than four persons in serving the public will be permitted to remain open irrespective of the results of the vote.

Stores selling fresh fruits and vegetables will be permitted to open whether the vote is approved or not.

Stores may sell cosmetics and hygienic, pharmaceutical or therapeutic goods during those hours when prescription drugs are dispensed to the public.

Nursery stock, garden supplies, garages, marinas, airport servic-

ing, sports equipment sales and rental, prepared meals, or restaurants, hotels and motels, laundromats, theatres and amusement centres are all unaffected by the voting.

Through the main street of Ganges, these stores will be permitted to remain open on Sundays and holidays, whether the bylaw is approved or not: Embe Bakery, Harbour Grocery, Ralph's Meat Market, Ganges Western Drug Mart if the dispensary is open, Gulf Island Trading Co., Shell station, Rita's Inn, Ganges Marina, Kana-ka Place, Cottage Teashop, Flowers and Wine Shop, those stores selling craft work, handicrafts or antiques, Island Garage, Ganges Auto-Marine.

NOT OPEN

Those which would be prohibited from opening unless voters call for a wide-open Sunday, would be the K&R food store and Mouat's, hairdressers, radio sales and service, Gulfstream, Carolee's, Salt Spring Automotive Supplies.

This list is compiled by *Driftwood* from the provincial and regional legislation.

While it is as accurate as can be ascertained ahead of the legislation, it is not offered as a direction to merchants, but as an approximate guide for voters.

Mayne Island development

Condominium report denied

A report in a Vancouver newspaper that a nine-unit condominium project was to be built at Mayne Island was denied last week by a Vancouver woman.

Jennifer Iredale, a spokesman for Kara Resources Ltd., told *Driftwood* in a telephone interview last Friday that the report in *The Vancouver Sun* October 31 was false. She said the development for which they have applied at Campbell Bay is a bare land strata consisting of 10 waterfront lots in a 23-acre piece of property.

The 23 acres are part of a quarter-section owned by her father, architect Rand Iredale. The land is in an area of 10-acre-average lot sizes but the developers would prefer to see a cluster development rather than subdivide the whole property, she said. If the Islands Trust grants Kara Resources permission to go ahead, the remainder of the property will be left in its natural state.

Nine of the 10 lots, which will be approximately 2½ acres each, will be offered for sale. In addition, there will be about one acre of common ground, as well as some common facilities such as a dock and the caretaker's residence.

Iredale felt that their proposal was a "better quality" development than others on the islands. The common dock, for example,

would ensure that each of the future lot owners would not build his own moorage facility.

A two-storey, 81-year-old, heritage-designated house is being barged to Mayne from Vancouver to provide a home for the caretaker. Iredale, who is interested in heritage buildings, will be living part-time on Mayne during the next few months while she fixes up the old house.

Kara Resources and Rand Iredale were recipients of the 1980 Heritage Canada Regional Award of Honour for restoration of the Steamboat Heritage House on West 8th Avenue in Vancouver.

Iredale said the Campbell Bay development was being carried out with a view to improving the island. Condominiums, she said, would be out of place in the Gulf Islands.

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Vesuvius traffic pattern change coming soon

Work on the traffic pattern at Vesuvius is planned during the winter months, reports Tom Toynbee.

As chairman of the municipal affairs committee of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce, Toynbee recounted the success which had followed the transportation committee's plea for improved traffic handling at the Vesuvius ferry terminal. Transportation committee is a function of the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee.

Protest against the traffic pattern was initiated by a *Driftwood* reporter many months ago. Shirley Culpin revealed that every motorist who drove past the ferry line-up was liable to a fine for dangerous driving and that to be completely obedient to the law a driver should wait in line for two hours, even if he is only driving to the Vesuvius Inn, located at the ferry terminal.

The ferry corporation has purchased property at the terminal and work is imminent, the Chamber was told.

Toynbee is the Chamber delegate to the committee.

New parking provisions will permit off-street parking of ferry traffic on a three-quarter acre parcel acquired from Arbutus Court.
