





The report concludes with the summary that building form and style, landscaping, the waterfront walkway and accommodation for the automobile are all interrelated concerns for Ganges.

NO FIXED DIRECTION

The booklet makes it clear that it is not intending to prescribe fixed, absolute solutions. It doesn't venture future responsibility for implementation or maintenance of parks, landscaping and sidewalks.

It is intended as a guide manual; an aid to planners, builders and residents; a focus on Ganges and its possibilities.

It looks to the unique, attractive and humane model island centre that Ganges could be.

List vegetables that did well with this year's poor conditions

It seems to me that all the vegies which did well this year, considering the cool spring and summer, should be well known to all island gardeners. If we can be assured of a good harvest even under this year's growing conditions, all will benefit, be they gardeners, friends and neighbours, or purchasers of our local produce.

Well, to this end I will list those vegies which did well for us, at the coolest end of the island, the Beaver Point area. And I hope, and I hope very strongly, indeed I am counting on it, that all of you will do the same, make a little list and send it in to me, c/o *Driftwood*, or Foxglove or home, so we may share this vital information with all our neighbours and friends.

So, here goes. Peas: both bush types, "Little Sweetie" an edible hull sugarsnap type and "Laxton's Improved Progress", an old and proven standby.

Lettuce: "Early Curled Simpson", nice, as always.

STEADY SUPPLY

We were very pleased with our beets. We sowed "Little Egypt" for an early supply with a 34-day maturity, around April 1, and "Long Season", 78 days to maturity, around May 20. From the middle of May until now we have had a steady supply of beets and greens.

"Long Season" stays sweet and tender no matter how large they grow and are an excellent storage beet. There are still about 20 roots out in the garden and doing well.

As for tomatoes, we did not get any red ones, but had bushels of green ones. I would especially like to hear from people who had vine-ripened tomatoes this year.

We grew "Ultra Girl VFN" (56 days), "Beefeater VFN" (60 days), "Springset VF" (62 days) and "Bush Beefsteak" (62 days). The best results were obtained by eight plants, two of each of the above, grown in individual four-inch pots and set out on April 25.

The later planting, although the

plants were larger, never did catch up with the early planting. So the gamble paid off.

We intend to plant a few tomatoes early each year. If there is no late frost we will be well rewarded early in the season and if there is a late frost, we will not lose much.

Of the green bush beans both "Tendercrop" (46 days) and "Spring Green" (41 days) did well, although we much preferred "Tendercrop" as the other seemed tough in comparison. We did not grow our old standby "Blue Lake" (54 days) this year, although we intended to.

OUTSTANDING

Our outstanding success in our battle to get the cucumbers going was "Dasher" (46 days) followed somewhat half-heartedly after much prodding by "Sweet Slice" (62 days). "Dasher" was my joy and hope, as it grew and spread vigorously, while I had to seed (outdoors) and transplant (from the greenhouse) a grand total of four times.

The other two varieties did not amount to a hill of beans, although "Liberty" and "Double Yield Pickling" did well the previous year. "Dasher" is of the "compact" type of vine, takes much less space than the ordinary type and fits comfortably into even the smallest garden. Now if it were an open pollinated type I would be totally happy with it.

For pumpkins we only planted one variety, "Spirit" (99 days), which provided us with the other welcome sight of lush and vigorous growth.

A DOZEN

We had about a dozen pumpkins for Hallowe'en, the largest at about 15 lbs. It is recommended for cool summer areas.

Of the squash, "Early Butter-nut" (75 days) produced about a dozen fruit, but it could have been better.

We did not get any peppers or melons this year.

"White King" chard, "Bonanza" cabbage, "Perfect Snoball" cauliflower, "Cleopatra" broccoli and "Extra Long Type Nantes" carrots did well and are still doing so.

All seeds came from Stokes seeds, St. Catharines, Ontario. Their catalogue provides a wealth of cultural information; get one, if you haven't got one already. Stokes seeds are also available at Foxglove, from bulk.

Vegie varieties which will do well here, even under adverse conditions, will be vital to all islanders. So let us all do our bit and make that list, so that we may share this information. I enjoy talking to you through this column but now we need to hear from all of you for the benefit of all of us.

The next couple of articles are going to be about you and your successes. So don't let me down.

GALIANO NEWS

Sound Waves and Skitsophrenia a great success

When an overflow audience, standing in the aisles and sitting on the floor, is determined to have a good time and the performers are so obviously enjoying themselves, criticism becomes mere pretension. As Dogberry says in *Much Ado about Nothing*, "comparisons are odorous."

By the criteria of community and school participation and support, *Sound Waves and Skitsophrenia* in the Community Hall on Saturday was a great success. Nearly 30 musicians and over 20 actors provided a mixed bag of entertainment from the opening can-can to the final one-act play and a "home-movie" supplement.

Music was provided in various modes by the ukelele groups from Galiano School trained by Elizabeth Brinson, the varying combinations of Chris Bird, Loney Rockafella, Steve Nemtin, Sky Haenen and Greg Gammon, and the singing of the Porlier Sisters.

Humour was supplied by the vaudeville duets of Mary Harding and Frank Greenhalgh who also compered the show. Comedy was the common element in the two one-act plays and two skits which provided most of the hilarious interludes, some not entirely intentional.

GOOD TRAINING, DIRECTION

Galiano School intermediate students showed poise, a sense of timing and the results of good training and direction in their presentation of the play *Shades of Ransom* and the skit *I'm Dying!* The clarity of diction was excellent from such young performers and the utilization of every student in the class much to be commended.

The most serious contribution to the evening's entertainment was the play *Senior Citizens' Complex* written and produced by Joe Fleming. Performed almost as slap-stick comedy, this play, like a clown, sought to conceal with laughter the tears and tragedy of old age.

Two old men, ably played by Joe Fleming and Frank Greenhalgh, squabble over the rights to a bench and then combine to taunt two female residents portrayed by Johanna Newmoon and Akasha Haenen. The ancients join to protect each other from the machinations of Bridget, broguishly played by Audrey Thomas. The paths of two lonely old men, forced to be allies by their own physical infirmities and their minority position in the Complex, was masked at the climax by a "punch-line" ending.

The final item of the evening was the showing of a "home movie" made by Glenda Rassmussen. This was accompanied by dialogue and music supplied by Loney Rockafella, Greg Gammon and Steve Nemtin. Despite its technical flaws this short film showed originality and innovation and deserved the applause that greeted its ending.

COMMUNITY CLUB

After being dormant for three years the North Galiano Community Club came to life by staging a very successful bazaar and art exhibition at the North End Community Hall on Saturday. Executive spokesman Woody Coward noted that the success of the function can be attributed to the support received from all over the island, as many well-wishers from the south end came up to encourage their friends.

The executive recently conducted a mail survey of residents of

the North Galiano community to determine their wishes. A strong response was received, and 80% were in favour of the continuation of the Community Club and were willing to support it by taking out memberships and attending its functions. However, only a handful expressed a willingness to serve on the executive. This reluctance will present problems which it is hoped can be solved by the time of the general meeting, to be held in January.

If the club is to implement its declared objectives of acting as a focal point for the discussion of community issues and improving the facilities available for fire protection at the north end, it will need all the active support it can obtain.

Members of the Sunday School class accompanied by their teachers, Joan Callaghan and Shay Foster, spent time on Saturday cleaning up the cemetery. Leaves were raked clear of the area and

general tidying up accomplished. At the conclusion of their chores the children and teachers enjoyed a wiener-roast.

noon tea and the possibility of winning a most attractive door prize.

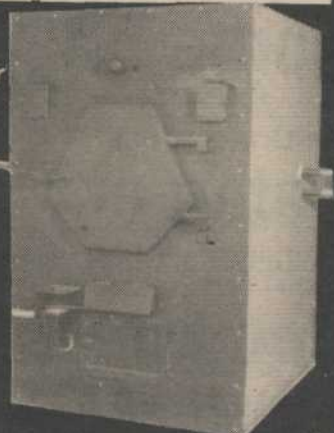

Story confirms reports about atrocities in Central America

As bidden by the Ten Days Committee, I'm reading the October United Church *Observer*. A special supplement on Central America is both grim and gratifying. Hugh McCullum has been there, and he re-affirms all the reports on atrocities which have been recorded in this column for the past three years.

From time to time I've been accused of exaggeration (and sometimes I've pleaded guilty to journalistic licence) and criticized for reporting things of which I have no first-hand knowledge.

It occurs to me, without disrespect, that our New Testament would be even shorter had it been confined to those with first-hand knowledge of Jesus. But here's a highly respected journalist and editor, bringing the Bad News to a much wider audience than we are privileged to reach - thanks be to God!

As Nicaragua is our special study, I turned to this section first and read:

ONE YEAR FREE
"To arrive in Nicaragua after El Salvador and Guatemala is to breathe a sigh of relief. This impoverished country is only one year free of the most criminal regime in Central American history..."

"Today, as you stroll the still battered streets, you can watch the young Sandinista soldiers -- women and men -- holding hands, playing with kids, laughing with the toothless old men and helping with the reconstruction. Yet Nicaragua is giving American foreign policy-makers fits because it is supposedly Marxist in its political philosophy."

Hugh McCullum had previously visited Nicaragua in 1972 to report on an earthquake which levelled the central core of Managua, killing 12,000 people. He now says:

"Eight years later, despite more than \$100 million in aid money, the

core is as I left it, only now the rubble is covered with weeds and vines. Dictator Anastasio Somoza managed to siphon it all off to his myriad companies and land holdings, while the people suffered."

SHATTERED NATION
Somoza left a shattered nation with a \$1.5 billion foreign debt and only \$3.5 million in the treasury! Not bad for a used-car-salesman from Philadelphia and his sons! They controlled 60% of the arable land in Nicaragua, and owned the national airline and shipping company, the largest newspaper, the main TV network, the Mercedes-Benz franchise and much more. No wonder it took an 18-month revolution to remove them! Nicaragua has a long way to go, but the fear is gone.

"Laughter rings out. Hope is the predominant feeling and the people represent a dynamic intention to rebuild. No one I could find, even the critics, want to turn the clock back. The Somositas have left, and those who stayed, from all sectors, are committed to a new liberated Nicaragua."

While some of us in Canada are deploring the "swing to the right" in our society, another respected journalist, Sydney J. Harris, writes boldly on "the rise of fascism", deploring its refusal to be known as such in the U.S.

"It has no business masquerading as 'Americanism' or 'conservatism' or 'patriotism' when its whole philosophy of man is based on a hate-filled exclusiveness that would shock and affront the conservative American patriots who founded the country."

THEY DON'T UNDERSTAND
"What is distressing about this movement is the tacit or open support given it by men who genuinely think of themselves as 'conservatives' and who do not understand the implications of right-wing radicalism any more than the German industrialists understood what would happen to

them when Hitler swept into power in Germany."

Last week I quoted from David Pollock's *Models for Action*. Here are more questions:

"We asked about political power and which interests and elites around the world oppose change. We recognize that people the world over have a deep-rooted desire for security and always resist any change which is imposed from the outside. Only when people understand and participate in change does it seem acceptable."

"When we first started raising such questions, many trained economists made us feel pretty amateurish, until we began to realize there are many trained economists around the world, principally in the Third World, who thought our questions were the fundamental ones to ask. We began to understand that economists in this country do not have a monopoly on truth, but rather a particular point of view."

ANSWERS

I promised you some answers. Two Ontario women found indications of answers as they worked on world development issues within their parish (Bishop Cronyn Memorial Church).

"We have observed the unity of all issues. Whether the problem is world hunger or human rights on a global scale, or the suffering of the person next door, all problems are grounded in some externally or internally imposed lack of freedom: freedom for individuals to develop within their society as full human beings, as children of God."


"We have observed that global issues can be reduced to the point where each of us stands at this moment, that each person is part of the problem and part of the solution. And that in Christ, one need not be overwhelmingly frustrated by such a discovery. Rather we should be encouraged."

"For if our wills are pointed in His direction, He will allow each of us to bloom where planted for the sake of all others."

Constitution is topic

Stuart Leggatt speaks at Ganges

Stuart Leggatt, MLS for Coquitlam-Moody, spoke to a gathering of NDP Club members and guests at the Salt Spring Elementary School library last Thursday. His discussion topic was the Canadian constitution.

After a review of Canada's regional characteristics and differences, Leggatt stated he would always be a Canadian before a British Columbian. The essential dream of this country must be a nationalistic one, he said, and "we cherish those differences which distinguish us from the U.S."

Leggatt pointed out that some of the most important past ventures of Canadians have been socialist ones, such as pioneering the use of aircraft by T.C.A.-Air Canada to move people throughout the north in former years, C.B.C. Radio ("probably the best in North America") and the Medicare program.

He then compared these to the present day "bottom-line" tactics of Air Canada (phasing out unprofitable runs), and the current "sell-out" of C.B.C. T.V. to the advertisers, though only \$80 million of their \$550 million budget comes from advertising.

Trudeau is right to patriate the constitution, said Leggatt, but it needs an effective amending formula, and must be a co-operative rather than a competitive constitution. Adequate protection of individual rights is also essential.

In giving an example of the kind

of problems Canada faces, Leggatt pointed out that while a government will not hesitate to expropriate an individual's land for highway construction, CPR/Marathon Realty is able to hold to ransom governments needing land for city development.

A question and answer period followed the talk. Discussion included the bill of rights and Broadbent's actions in Ottawa.

There were several exchanges on the need for expansion of Petrocan,

the possibility of gas rationing and gas pricing. Leggatt said that gas price increases are necessary, but that they should not go to the oil companies.

Leggatt downplayed the importance of emerging western separatist movements. When Quebec, with a large French-speaking majority, did not separate, it seems unlikely that a less clearly differentiated western movement will be successful in doing so, he said.

October building permits double over last year

The number of building permits issued in the Gulf Islands in October was almost double the number issued during the same month last year.

Last month there were 31 permits sold in the islands: Salt Spring 18; Pender, four; Galiano, six; and Mayne, three. Total value of the construction was \$1,429,766.

In October 1979 there were only 17 permits sold and total value was \$667,009.

Eleven of those permits went to Salt Spring; four to Pender; and two to Galiano.

For the first 10 months of 1980, figures show that 116 permits were issued at Salt Spring; 34 at Pender;

22 at Galiano; 35 at Mayne; and 10 at Saturna. Total value of the building was, at Salt Spring, \$5,907,453; Pender, \$1,496,034; Galiano, \$890,813; Mayne, \$1,341,764; and Saturna, \$417,308.

Permits issued during the calendar year to the end of October 1979 in the Outer Islands numbered about the same as this year. There was a big difference in figures for Salt Spring, however, where 70 permits were sold, with a value of \$3,273,321.

At Pender there were 33 permits sold and value was \$1,582,961; Galiano, 21 permits, \$828,714; Mayne, 32 permits, \$1,141,791; and Saturna, 10 permits, \$270,014.

'Elusive' craftspeople are asked to contact society

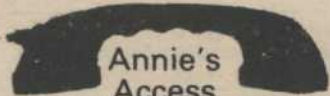

Hazardous coffee makers recalled

The Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and the Sunbeam Corporation (Canada) Ltd., are warning owners of some Sunbeam coffee makers to stop using them immediately because of a potential shock hazard.

Sunbeam personnel have found a manufacturing error which resulted in substandard electrical spacing. In some instances, the spacings may be so narrow that the metal warming plate may become electrically alive. To date, CSA has received no reports of injuries.

Approximately 2,000 units of this new product have been distributed across Canada since September 1980.

The coffee makers can be identified by the following marking die-stamped faintly on the bottom of the product: "Model CM-2, 125V AC 60 Hz 1300 Watts, Sunbeam Corporation (Toronto) Ltd., LR 42804, (CSA Monogram), Made in Hong Kong, (Date Code) 'GE' & 'SE'."

If you have one of these coffee makers, stop using it immediately, CSA advises, and take or send the product to the Sunbeam appliance service company in Victoria or Vancouver.

This problem exists only with model "CM-2" and date code "GE" and "SE". No other Sunbeam models or date codes are affected.

Units which have been repaired and corrected new products can be identified by the letter "S" marked on the bottom of the product and on the outside of the carton.

The Fowles family are travellers and keeping still is something they

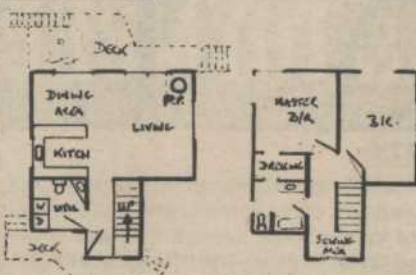

Call for committee to examine possibility of building pool

The plans for the proposed recreation complex had been formulated, approved, and the feasibility study funds had been placed at the commission's disposal, before I was elected to office last November. The funds were allocated, through the regional district, by the previous director and I have no quarrel with that!

It was not my intention or my duty to *dictate* or *demand* that the Recreation Commission change their plans on the proposed complex.

Very shortly after my election to office, I was invited by the Recreation Commission to participate and to accompany them to the CRD to receive the presentations of the firms who were invited to submit a bid for the designs and plans of their recreation proposal. I was certainly in support of the Recreation Commission's choice of architect John Di Castri and I still feel that the choice was a very sound one.

The Recreation Commission has spent many months, days and long hours, and have been very devoted workers for what they believed in. A lot of *credit* and *deserved recognition* is their due. I certainly have no quarrel with that!

UNANSWERED QUESTIONS

I do, however, take exception to the undue pressure and backbiting, and especially the demands

placed on me, to approve and sanction without question the decisions made by the commission. Many unanswered questions about the proposal, such as water, sewage disposal, etc., were not worked out in time to initiate the bylaw, to hold a referendum.

It was, however, my duty to bring the proposal to referendum, before the ratepayers, in order to be assured that the majority rules. It was also my duty, to present to the ratepayers, the facts as I have stated them in my report, and to be certain that the health permit would be satisfactory.

I do also take exception with the written and verbal statements that I did not give the Recreation Commission *guidance* or *full support of their decision*, etc. My responsibility is to all members of the community, and I certainly feel that my report of November 5 in *Gulf Island Driftwood* was the result of many weeks of research on the subject, "Recreation for Salt Spring Island". The report is based on *documented facts*, and the Recreation Commission should have no quarrel with that!

SPECIAL COMMITTEE

I now request the Recreation Commission to pursue the request of the community as per guided by the Master Plan. I request that a special committee be formed by the commission to research the possibility of a swimming pool to be built with school and community participation. I believe that this is

the way to go. *United*, we could persuade whatever government department to let us benefit from the hundreds of thousands of *our school tax dollars* being spent in other districts that possibly have the facilities we require here.

We are now paying a very high school tax structure, and this has no reflection on the school board or school administration either in any way. The equalization school tax structure as prescribed by the ministry of education, or other ministries, set out the rules and now it is time that we stand united and make *our demands* on the ministry to keep what is rightfully *ours*, so that we can provide for the children of the community the necessary water safety programs, and possibly enrich the lives of our senior citizens, etc. I would not, however, endorse a separate tax base, or an escalating tax structure of any significance to provide this facility.

I sincerely hope that this community will *unite* their efforts to bring forward the wishes of the majority. I personally will help all I can, and I am certain this will hold *true for the the island as a whole!*

Findhorn

Spiritual retreat in Scotland is topic at meeting

Seventy-five Pender Island residents turned out at the Legion Hall November 16 for a talk by two Victoria residents.

Gay and Rob Dill spoke of Findhorn, a spiritual retreat in Northern Scotland where they spent some time two years ago.

Mrs. Dill, assisted by her husband has been teaching Yoga on weekends and during the summer on the Penders for several years. The Dills own property on South Pender but live in Victoria where Mr. Dill is an architect. Presently he is taking a year off from his work to spend time as co-ordinator of a health and social science project at James Bay.

Two years ago the Dills, with their children, spent time in late August at Findhorn and found it an experience that changed their lives.

FOUNDED IN 1960'S

Peter and Eileen Caddy founded Findhorn in the early 1960's. At that time they were employed at a large hotel in the neighbourhood, and one day Eileen Caddy felt they must quit their jobs and move to the small community of Findhorn to live close to nature and plant a garden and work with the soil. With their children they moved into a small trailer where they spent the next seven years.

Findhorn is located on Moray Firth in northern Scotland. It is a treeless, barren landscape facing north, with a windy, rainy climate.

In spite of this, in one short year Eileen, with Peter's assistance, made the poor soil grow magnificent vegetables and fruits of enormous size. Eventually, the gardens expanded over the years to grow many kinds of vegetables, fruits and flowers, a remarkable feat in an otherwise barren countryside.

As word of the gardens spread, people began to arrive from many parts of the world and some stayed on to help and contribute to the community. One such was David Spengler who stayed for three years and Findhorn began, due to his influence, to develop further.

PURCHASED HOTEL

Then it came about that the hotel where Eileen and Peter had been employed went on the market. The means to purchase it were found by the friends of Findhorn, and so from a simple beginning grew Findhorn as it is today, known throughout the world.

After attending a lecture in Victoria given by Eileen and Peter Caddy, Mrs. Dill told the audience she and her husband felt they should go to Findhorn. Everyone shares in the work and there are always 300 to 400 people there.

Some just go for a day-long tour, others for a week and some stay permanently. The shorter one's stay the higher the cost, while for those staying permanently there is no charge. There are countless projects to become involved in and now Findhorn and the surrounding community have almost become

one. Before a group starts on a project, the members hold an "attunement" in which they hold hands and affirm to work together in tolerance and love for success in the project.

FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD

Rob Dill said there were people at Findhorn from all over the world, from children to people in their 80's, from a variety of cultures and all contributing energy and love. The groups usually consist of 15 to 20 people

and in a week develop a very strong relationship.

A member of the audience asked Rob Dill what he got out of the time spent at Findhorn. He said it put him in touch with his inner self, so now he knows he can sit down and turn inside for guidance, knowing it is there and that it can be found.

When asked if it was Christian, Dill said, "It is the new-age concept of Christianity, it is very interna-

tional, not Christian in the narrow sense."

The talk was sponsored by the Farmers' Institute.

Allister Skinner takes Salt Spring pulpit

New United Church minister on Salt Spring Island is the Rev. Allister Skinner. He has accepted the appointment following the retirement of Rev. Dr. Vern McEachern.

A man with a broad knowledge of Canada, from coast to coast, the new island minister is also a world traveller. He has lived in Africa and the Orient and has been closely identified with his calling in both instances.

Allister Skinner is a native son of Cape Breton Island and comes west with very distinctive memories of island living. The geography is remarkably similar, he finds, on the west coast and even the people are just like east coast islanders.

In latter years the minister has been on the west coast. He came to Salt Spring Island from Delta, where he served for six years. Previously he was in Alberta.

Allister Skinner, of Scots descent, married a Scottish girl, Iona. They have two children, Andrea, 10 and Ian, seven, in their new home on Maliview Drive.

YOUNG PEOPLE

His particular concerns have been working with young people, recalled the minister. He hastened to add that he does not see the

world as exclusively populated by the young, but that youth programs are an essential part of his ministry.

On the mainland he took part in the Youth Court Diversion Program under which a young person may be referred to a local committee instead of appearing in court.

Basically, the program requires that the culprit make restitution, apologize to the person who suffered loss or damage and to contribute a prescribed number of community work hours.

Allister Skinner was in Kenya before he was ordained. He went to East Africa in 1962 with Cross Roads International, a volunteer program whereby help is provided to the developing nations.

He was engaged in the construction of an athletic field and stadium. He also worked on the construction of a school addition and a hospital extension.

The organization is multi-denominational and the projects with which he was associated in Kenya were underwritten by the Society of Friends, or Quakers.

Later, he and his wife went to Japan, Taiwan, Hong Kong and Korea. It was a voluntary project to study and work and teach in

those lands abutting on the Pacific Rim.

TEACHING

During that time he spent one stint teaching at the university in Hong Kong, while Mrs. Skinner was teaching high school.

He still regrets the restriction on travelling to China. They didn't try entering that country when they were warned that their safety could not be guaranteed. Which meant

that they would be entirely on their own.

The Skinner family are settling in to their new island home and enjoying the very different community here.

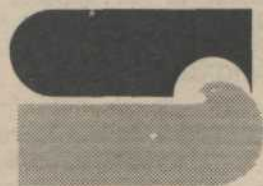

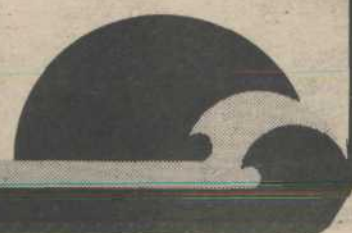
