Enjoy "Hoppy's" prints, postcards, calendars

Galiano's "Hoppy" has just had another very successful exhibition at the Bau-Xi Gallery in Vancouver.

In recent years Elisabeth Hopkins' paintings have received critical acclaim and have sold like hot cakes in both Toronto and Vancouver. They have been reproduced in calendars, cards and prints. Elisabeth greets her success with evident enjoyment but also with a delightful scepticism.

Interesting preliminaries to the exhibition were articles on Elisabeth by two Galiano novelists: The Unwalled Garden by Audrey Thomas in the September issue of Interface and Elisabeth Hopkins by Jane Rule in the October 12th to November 8th issue of Vancouver Calendar Magazine.

Both younger women are good friends of the 87-year-old Miss Hopkins, and their warm affection and respect for her pervade both articles. That the articles have much in common is not surprising: the biographical details, descriptions of paintings and accounts of the artist's life-style. The differences reveal much about the subject, but also about the authors themselves.

PERSONAL EXPERIENCE

The article by north-ender Audrey Thomas has, as do most of her novels, a major "personal experience" element. The artistic analysis is secondary to the personality and opinions of the painter. Much is related through conversation and quotation. This approach reveals the conscious attitude of the artist to her work, but one feels that Elisabeth is not an "intellectual" painter and that much of her motivation must lie in deeper levels of consciousness.

Jane Rule is a near neighbour of Hoppy, a close friend and mentor.

Her article certainly does not lack the personal touch and generous enthusiasm, but in addition she attempts a more serious intellectual and philosophical analysis.

The fact that "Elisabeth rejects philosophical or religious interpretations of painting...and is amused by symbolic interpretations (of her own work by others)" does not mean that, subconsciously, her religion and philosophy might not be influencing Miss Hopkins' paintings. Jane recognizes a quality of "religious innocence" in the role played by animals in the "magic climate" of Hoppy's landscapes.

It is too late to visit the exhibition and, for many of us, too expensive to hope to own an original Hopkins painting, but prints, postcards and calendars are available to give us an impression of Hoppy's unique charm as a painter.

Bonzai Pots

The fact that a bonzai container must have two drainage holes generated a great deal of perplexity at the recent Galiano Garden Club meeting. In lieu of a rational explanation the following legend was "discovered" in a search of Japanese literature.

It was in the reign of the illustrious Emperor Yin Thon nearly eight centuries ago that a visiting merchant from Cathay told the imperial gardener of the custom practised in his country of growing miniature trees in earthenware containers. The gardener requested permission of the Lord High Chamberlain to bonzai specimens of the rare and treasured Pine of the Islands. His petition was granted.

For several years the pines flourished in the royal

conservatory. One night a series of loud cracks was heard from the conservatory. The residents of the imperial palace trembled, fearing an earthquake, but no tremors followed and they returned to their pillows.

BROKEN POTS

As the light of day seeped through the parchment windows the court hurried to the conservatory. There on the floor lay the shards of broken pots and the irretrievably damaged bonzai trees.

The emperor raved at the incompetence of his gardeners but none dared suggest a remedy. Then spoke Felicia (the Japanese name being translated into the Latin), the youngest daughter of the emperor. "Imperial Papa, are not these pots unnatural? Is not a tree a living creature? The tree drinks water from the sky and draws nourishment from the soil as do we. Yet bound in a pot it has no way..."

At this there was an audible gasp from the assembled courtiers and a maidenly blush spread over the fair cheeks and the eyes looked demurely down.

All were hushed at the temerity of the youngest daughter. The emperor frowned and paused for he was a deliberate cogitator. Slowly, as the sun rises in glory above the horizon, a smile dawned on the imperial face. "Call the imperial potters," he ordered.

Three renowned craftspersons, Shardi-li, Li-shard and the lady Pi-

zon, bowed low before his imperial highness. "Make me bonzai pots," the emperor commanded, "and made them of one hand-width deep and of many shapes, but in each base let there be two orifices."

And so it was, and the bonzai trees in Japan flourished from that time on because of the favourite daughter's felicitous suggestion.

Trail of crime at Pender

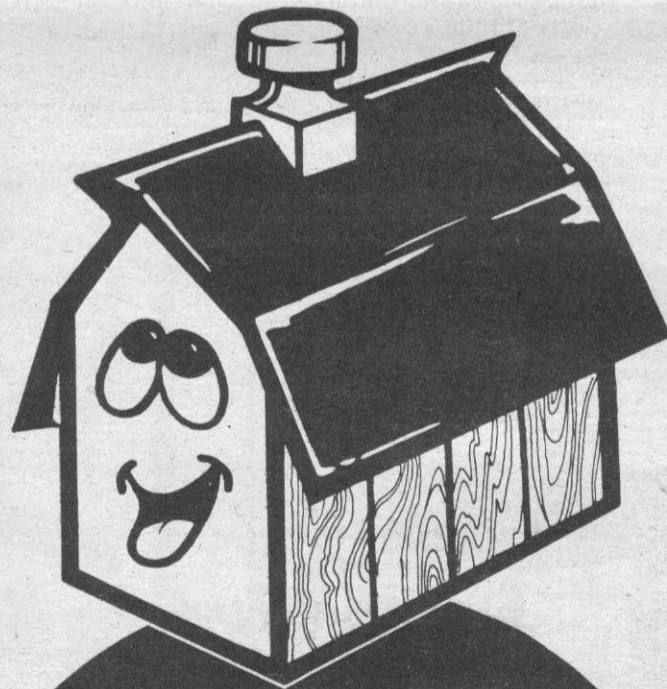
The trail led around Pender Island and three Salt Spring Islanders face criminal charges as a result.

Early Christmas shopping can be done at Craft Fair

Once a year the Community Centre on Ganges Hill plays host to the craftspeople of Salt Spring Island with an event that gives the community a chance to do some early shopping for Christmas.

The Christmas Craft Fair, slated for November 27 and 28, is in its fourth year, and each year it grows and shines just a little more.

The Community Society charges a commission on sales, and the money is used for various projects.

Several community-based organizations use the centre on a regular basis, paying a nominal sum towards lighting and costs of upkeep.

One of the latest additions to these groups is the Women's Centre. This occupies the space formerly held by the Family Centre and is open to women of all ages.

The Community Centre is an old

building, full of history and equally full of drafts. It costs a lot to heat: between \$3,000 and \$4,000 a year. It is about the largest single item the Community Society has to bear and there are no government grants available either.

Compared to the Montreal Expo Stadium, which (after its \$70 million roof is installed) will cost \$500,000 a year to heat, the Community Centre's heating bill is reasonable.

The Community Centre is not concerned with recreation for the well-to-do. It is concerned with improving the quality of life for those whose resources are strictly limited: the handicapped, those who are excluded from the work force, the elderly who need help in keeping up with the inflationary spiral, the families who, for one reason or another, are having difficulties of many different kinds.

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No recommendation to approve split

No recommendation was made by the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee last week when an application was received to subdivide a seven-hectare parcel in the agricultural land reserve.

Paul Minvielle asked for the subdivision whereby he might sell the smaller parcel of two hectares.

The trustees were advised that in 1978 the land commission approved the subdivision of the lands east of the applicant's property on Kitchen Road provided that the portion of the subject property be retained as one legal parcel.

The present application does not appear to conform with that decision, the committee was told, although it is consistent with the split-lot provision of the island subdivision bylaw.

SPLIT LOT

The property in question is split by Kitchen Road and the subdivision bylaw was recently amended to give special consideration to the separation of such split lots. A split lot is one which is divided into two parts by a highway but yet remains legally one property, although access is restricted between the two parts.

The Salt Spring Island Advisory Planning Commission has recommended approval of the Minvielle application. Planner Deane Strongitharm also noted that the parcel which is sought for separation is now treed and has a rock bench running through it.

Owner told the commission that the property is not suitable for agriculture.

The committee decided that the application would be returned to the land commission without recommendation.

Culvert stolen

The culvert pipe, all 30 feet of it, was just lying there, so someone helped himself.

The Saturna highways crew reported the 10-inch pipe missing and presume it was stolen sometime within the past five weeks.

The RCMP on Pender Island are interested in hearing about anyone seen carrying the culvert around.

New policy tabled one week

Region takes close look at payments after recommendation from auditors

The payment of expenses to regional directors is being closely and carefully analyzed by the Capital Regional Board.

Last week the finance committee of the regional board examined a proposal for a guide to expense claims. It was prepared by the regional solicitors and submitted to committee members.

The action follows the recommendation of an accountant and a lawyer who urged that a clear ruling be offered to directors. Both consultants had been engaged in the examination of claims for expenses by Salt Spring Island regional director Yvette Valcourt.

Accountant R. Adams and solicitor Robert Orr had reduced the total overpayments made to director Valcourt from an original estimate of about \$2,400 to a net \$912.37.

The examination gave rise to the report that the Municipal Act is confusing and all directors should be provided with some guidance.

The committee meeting was joined by both consultants and directors asked for clarification of some of their observations.

Chairman Jim Campbell was prompt to challenge the statement of the auditor that proper distinction of the expenses which are reimbursable under section 267 and those which fall under section 788 of the Municipal Act requires a level of understanding of the act "quite beyond that which could be expected of any director".

Director J.D. Watts agreed with the challenge and suggested it might better have said "...which could be expected of every director."

The analysis of the auditor's report broke down to specifics.

Was a director entitled to remuneration for the cost of making telephone calls after someone in the region has called for information?

Lawyer Orr figured that if the matter was political, then it would

be part of the expenses already allowed each director as part of his indemnity. If it were administrative it could be collected through a claim under section 788.

"How does the treasurer find out which is which?" enquired Campbell.

"Hopefully, no director would lie," replied Orr.

Did Orr know that directors' compensation is made in proportion to the demands of the office in each electoral area, asked K.A. Hill.

ALL UNDERPAID

"I think all you people are underpaid," responded the lawyer. "You're all under the minimum wage."

Campbell burst a bombshell when he told the committee that no committees are legally appointed by the region. Committees are named by the chairman at the inaugural meeting each year and never substantiated by the board, he asserted.

"The chairman strikes committees for good order and management," he stated. The exchange between the chairman and Saanich director Mel Couvelier grew until the latter withdrew from the meeting.

Of telephone calls, Watts urged that either a policy be defined or payment for calls be ruled out and the board require that they be met from the director's expenses.

Valcourt urged that she should be permitted to charge against the regional district the cost of preparing a precis of the Ganges sewer story for use in a court action. It was prepared on behalf of her constituents, she claimed. It had been disallowed by the auditors as a "political" expense.

OTHER DIRECTORS

The debate switched to a section included by the lawyer that "there was some evidence which would indicate that other directors may too have claimed expenses under section 788 'improperly'."

Campbell stated that he made no charges for telephone calls. He felt that the one-third of his indemnity set aside for expenses was ample compensation.

K.A. Hill asked for a submission of all claims made by all directors during the past year. His request, he admitted, would preclude the committee from reaching a conclusion the same day.

Campbell does make an additional charge when he attends meetings. He charges expenses for his absence from home while attending meetings. He is away from home for 26 hours every time he attends a Wednesday meeting, he told the board.

His reference to other directors was prompted by the comment from Dennis Young that expenses were not scrutinized, explained the solicitor. Valcourt had asked for a five-year list of all claims for expenditures, he reported, because she was sure that there had been other instances of making phone calls.

ALLEGATIONS

They were "allegations", he added. It was a better word than "evidence".

The evidence was peanuts, suggested Norma Sealey.

She had been given some lists of expenses claimed, said Valcourt, and she had found a director had charged 750 miles a month in addition to travelling to meetings. He charged a per diem rate of \$30, even to attend a social banquet.

"You mean mine?" asked Campbell. "Yes," was the reply.

Al Beasley reported that he has never charged an expense account and has accepted only his annual indemnity.

Watts expressed his preparedness to accept the auditor's report on the Valcourt expense account, although he felt a policy should be adopted whereby no telephone calls could be chargeable.

OBVIOUS

It was obvious that the Oak Bay director did not have to contend with long-distance calls, objected the Salt Spring Island director.

Campbell felt that he is overpaid in his representation. He said he would not suggest that an indemnity of \$7,636 is too much for the Salt Spring Island director, but he urged that it is enough and that the one-third expense account contained in it is sufficient for most expenses without claiming more.

Motion by K.A. Hill was passed only to discover that he is not a member of the committee. He moved the tabling of the matter for two weeks and, when in possession of the necessary documents, the establishment of a rate and guideline on expenditures.

There was a quick exchange between the two island directors before the committee adjourned.

Campbell charged living out expenses at \$30 a day, said the Salt Spring director. She charges \$2.40 a day.

"I work hard on the farm and I need more," explained the Saturna Islander.

The discussion was tabled to 8:30 am on Wednesday.

Slug owner's handbook—Part V

Always keep your pet on leash

This selection dedicated to the Canadian economy — the biggest slug of all.

With training the slug, it is extremely important that you earn your slug's total respect immediately to let your pet know from the beginning who is boss.

Your pet needs to know the rules, so establish them from the very start to escape much grief at a later date.

Don't let your slug roam the neighbourhood; always keep it on a short leash; respect others' property; always carry a Slimer Primer in your walks, and particularly, don't allow your pet to chase cars, the postman or gardeners.

Around the home it's a good idea to let your slug know early that you will not tolerate climbing on the furniture, crawling on the ceiling or begging at the table. And remember, a house-trained slug means a happy home. Teaching your pet to stay on the paper until his job is done is simple yet pleasing aesthetically and sanitorily.

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Slugs not in top 10 of worst offenders

The forests of British Columbia face serious problems from many insects or diseases and the latest issue of a forestry magazine lists 10 of the worst offenders.

Sad to say, from the point of view of some weirder Gulf Islanders, slugs don't rate as a top-10 menace in B.C.

Leading the list is dwarf mistletoe which is a parasite growing and feeding from Douglas fir, lodgepole pine, larch and coastal hemlock.

Mountain pine and spruce bark beetles rank two and three, followed by the western spruce budworm. But no slugs.

Various rots attack roots of trees and remain around for many years to cause problems. The one treatment to ensure being rid of rot is removal of infected stumps.

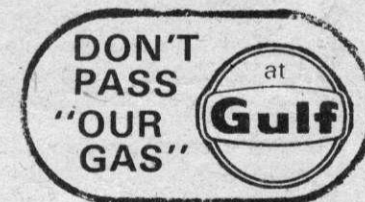
Unfortunately, eradication of slugs isn't quite as easy although folk medicine holds that the creatures do have a fondness for beer.

The Douglas fir, bark and foliage, face hazards from tussock moths and bark beetles. The moth eventually dies off as a result of a virus and the beetles can be confined in a trap tree.

No one has yet been able to find a virus or trap to deal with slugs.

Cone and seed pests as well as plantation insects and diseases finish the top-10 list hazing B.C.'s forests. The article comes to the conclusion that careful forest husbandry can prevent or eradicate many of the problems.

But being a husband hasn't seemed to curtail the activities of the slugs, particularly on Salt Spring Island.

Grants offered by CMHC for new ideas in housing industry

A Penticton construction firm is experimenting with a new way of pouring concrete floors and Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation is helping with the costs.

CMHC has, for the past year, been offering grants for what is called Housing Technology Incentives Program. The Penticton firm, for instance, received \$10,000 to develop a new forming system for poured-in-place concrete floors and beams.

The grants program, open to any Canadian individual or company, is aimed at financing well developed and novel ideas which promise direct benefit to the housing industry.

Since the program has been launched in September, 1980, 39 projects such as the Penticton idea

have been financed for more than \$350,000. The annual budget of the scheme sits at close to \$800,000.

TO GET PRIORITY

CMHC has indicated that ideas for energy conservation, residential rehabilitation and innovations to help the disabled would receive priority for 1981 and 82.

Applicants, says CMHC, are expected to share part of the costs of the proposals. The idea would more likely be eligible if it has potential to provide knowledge or experience of benefit to the housing industry.

Another criterion being looked at is whether the idea improves the performance of housing rather than enhancing the competitive position of the applicant.

If the idea being developed is a new wrinkle, tested and demonstrated on-site, CMHC may well be interested.

THREE INSTALMENTS

If accepted, the project would receive CMHC contributions in three instalments. The final payment comes when the project is completed and a report on it submitted to the federal agency.

CMHC also points out: "Applicants are responsible for obtaining necessary municipal and provincial permits or licences; absorbing cost overruns; handling production and marketing; investigating tax implications of the CMHC contributions."

Anyone with an idea which bears pursuing should get in touch with the Housing Technology Incentives Branch of CMHC. Who knows, maybe that idea will pay for itself.

JEAN HOWARTH:**Saturna provides absolute change from Toronto****BY PRISCILLA JANSZEN**

I've briefly met Jean Howarth several times in the last 10 years. I see a small, very articulate, energetic woman who is very fond of human beings. Jean first answered the questions on a personal level then used them as a springboard for us to consider the larger perspective of the human condition.

She is at ease with words and obviously enjoys considering and contemplating how we all live in this world together. I very much enjoyed the interview. We disagreed heartily on some issues but appreciatively.

Jean's life interests me in that she is beginning to deal with a common island situation. What happens when you retire from an exciting, challenging, fulfilling life, full of variety, to a small, gorgeous island of 185 people, who live fairly independent lives?

I first came to Saturna Island in 1949. A friend, a well known author and poet, whose name I totally forget at this time, had spoken glowingly of the island. He felt Lyall Harbour had great potential as a poet's retreat.

One Sunday I decided I had to come or all the lots would be gone. I took the *Princess Mary* from Vancouver, and landed on North Pender. At that time the boats didn't service Saturna. I rode in the back of a truck across the island.

The Moneys met me in their boat at Hope Bay. Then when I saw Saturna — you know when you see Saturna standing separate from the others — I knew I was going to live there. And one way or the other I have been living there ever since. I bought a lot, paid \$400 for it — it wasn't waterfront.

I worked writing feature articles to get the money. My niece Heather Ditto now owns it. I was the first Howarth on Saturna. Graham came later! Seven or eight years ago, Lou and I tramped all over East Point looking for the place I wanted. I bought several

lots there. I was working for the Vancouver *Province* at the time.

FELL IN LOVE

I'd invite friends over to visit me and of course, they'd all fall in love with Saturna. Bev and Eileen Campbell, Carneys, Doug and Betty Collins, Crosbys, everyone lives here now except me!

My life, my work in Toronto is fascinating and intense. I work for the *Toronto Globe and Mail* as senior assistant editor, writing a fiction column twice a week and editorials on national and provincial politics — the economy and energy, of late.

I started with the *Calgary Herald*, writing feature stories — colour writing with opinions and observations as opposed to news stories where the facts go down both sides of the issues. Next, on the CBC in Vancouver, I had my own talk show. I worked for them for seven months. I'd still be with them if I really liked them.

The CBC needs more freelance work done and less "hosting" if they are really going to plumb the talent of the country. You have to get a lot of artistic minds together to get the best. After, I wrote a general column for the Vancouver *Province*, "Jean Howarth".

Discrimination in my field against women? Every single job I've worked at in the radio and newspaper trade. I've found men, all important men, men who are real leaders, co-operative.

IT'S ABILITY

I'm not saying I haven't had any rows with anyone! People of both sexes, if they were threatened by a comparison of ability, could create jealousy and clogged communication. I have worked in a variety of places and found this to be true: it's ability rather than sex. Having a family wasn't my bag but I don't have any less respect for the women who choose the very important job of raising and creating families. I respect Lou Money immensely.

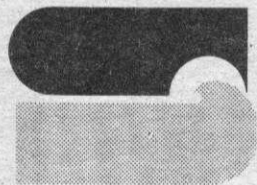
Politics? I was asked to run by all three parties at one time in B.C. I had a vigorous life in the province and they knew my name was well known. No, that doesn't make me cynical. I'm just not a political animal.

Islands Trust looking at proposal

Islands Trust has asked for a detailed outline from the wastewater branch of the ministry of the environment of the safeguards to be adopted in the discharge of effluent from a proposed Salt Spring Island laundromat.

At the meeting last week the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee heard reports of concern over the planned dumping of effluent from Ganges in Burgoyne Valley.

Planner Deane Strongitharm told the committee that there is an application before the branch for permission to discharge between 1,200 and 2,700 gallons of effluent per day. He termed it "grey water".

Concern for the quality of groundwater is within the Trust mandate, said Strongitharm. He urged diplomacy in approaching the wastewater branch.

Trustees were fearful of the effect of the discharge on the groundwater.

"I would want our concern to be taken seriously," noted chairman John Rich.

The important aspect of the

application is the monitoring afterwards, said Mike Humphries.

"It was made clear at Comox that the province needs a monitoring agency, independent of politics, which would report back to the wastewater branch."

A member of the public asked the committee whether the discharge of effluent is permitted under the zoning bylaw.

Gordon Wallace recalled an instance on Pender, where sewage had been spread on a field for years.

RESTRICTIONS

The committee was told that close restrictions are imposed on the number of properties permitted, yet effluent can be brought in and dumped on the property next door.

Do the people dumping the water own the land, asked Wallace. He was advised that they do not. Then, he replied, it is a commercial proposition.

Renting a home is not a commercial undertaking, countered the chairman.

"Dumping of effluent is a

commercial undertaking," emphasized Wallace, "and we should enquire into it."

The applicants have explained that the use is only proposed until the Ganges sewer is installed, said Rich.

Close check on the groundwater and provision for its protection must be paramount, agreed the committee.

The planner will write to the wastewater branch, successor to the pollution control branch.

Discussion revolved around plans for a laundromat at Ganges but no mention was made of the applicants.

Break-ins at Mayne

The homes of four weekenders on Georgina Point Road, Mayne Island, were recently broken into. The residents report the loss of various items, money and liquor.

The RCMP are investigating the incidents.

know what various sides think and comprehend their motivations. Am I an observer? No, I'm related to the human race quite closely.

Everybody has some principles they adhere to. People find them in religions or codes of behaviour. Most of the major philosophies have "love your neighbour and treat others as you would have yourself be treated" as their basis. **EVIDENT IN PREACHING**

The other consistency is that the tenets are more evident in the preaching than in the living. Early on I made a basic choice — to work. I've worked all my life.

I'm a good newspaper person and a good writer — very productive. Many causes interest me, they often arise from my work. I worked for three months as a probational nurse in a mental institution and became very interested in the rights of mental patients. We raised quite a furor in the press. But, in fact, mental patients have less rights than before we started. The road to hell is paved with good intentions.

We felt delighted, initially, but then it proved to be not much real gain. You don't know until you try and maybe this is a necessary falter. I suppose I'm a passionate person, most of my acquaintances would say that.

WILL BE HARD

Retiring? I've been wondering about that. Saturna, yes. I should imagine that it's going to be quite hard. I definitely want to write a few books. The *Toronto Globe and Mail* is one of the world's elite papers, renowned for its integrity.

Life is very intense there! I love the variety of lives, how the people chose to do it — that I'm involved with. Life is about as exciting as you want to make it. I've worked from day to day and project to project to project all my life. Working at the *Globe and Mail*, that's satisfying.

I love Saturna — its beauty and quality of people. You find this in many small communities — a quality of human life. The different social, age and financial groups freely mix on Saturna. In my column, I write about an imaginary island — Madrona.

Everyone knows they know where it is — it's every small community they grew up in or their mother did. Recently a man wrote to tell me he had discovered the actual identity of the island, somewhere in Newfoundland. Because he thought the islanders so worthy he is leaving them a considerable sum of money in his will!

Part of Saturna's value to me is the absolute change it provides in my life. Both parts of my life are high quality. I meet again some of the people I value most in the world. Certain people are valuable just because of how they live their lives.

Coming for a short time yearly, I might not see someone for several years then I'm surprised by how much they've changed. Some people stick in my mind as I first met them, stopped in time. I remember Lou Money carrying four-year-old Johnny on her back up the community hall hill.

I love Saturna. I never knew a man who lived on Saturna and shaved every day!

Break-in?

Children must go to school but they mustn't break into locked classrooms.

A teacher at Salt Spring Elementary became suspicious when three juveniles were seen leaving a classroom which should have been locked.

Police are investigating the incident.

Oak, fir infested

Some 30 acres of forest land on Salt Spring Island is infested with western oak looper but the situation is not serious, according to forestry officials.

The looper attacks Gary oak and Douglas fir and is causing severe defoliation on land within an ecological reserve on Mount Maxwell.

Bob Ericson, a pest survey officer at the Pacific Forest Research Centre in Saanich, said the pest is a native of B.C. and has been found on the Saanich Peninsula for many years.

The looper causes very little mortality in the trees, said Ericson, and the infestation normally runs its course within two or three years. There are some natural parasites which control it, he said.

The research centre was first notified of the looper's presence late last summer by the ecological reserve warden for the area. The reserve contains 65 hectares on the slopes of the mountain.

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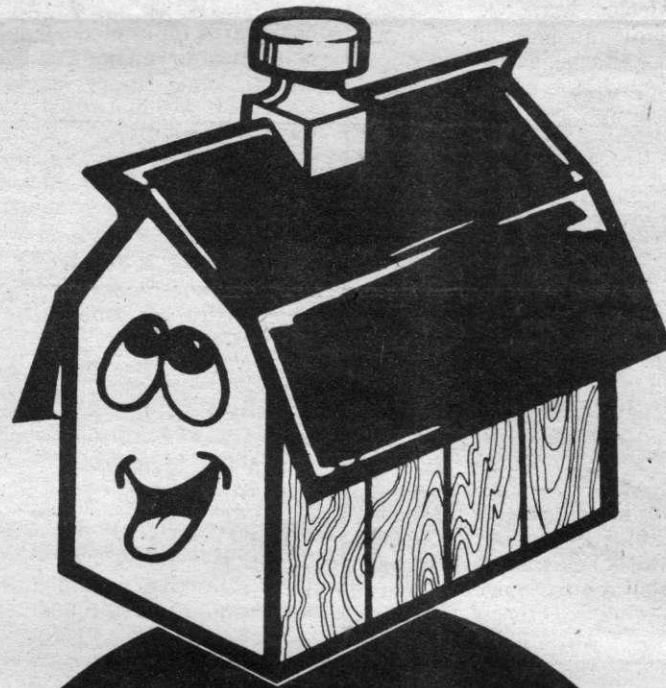
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Down Through the Years with Driftwood

TEN YEARS AGO

Long-range development plans for the Gulf Islands were being completed by planners of the Capital Regional District. The plans, with three variations, were awaited with anticipation by residents. One set of plans envisaged a bridge from the Saanich Peninsula to Salt Spring to connect with another bridge from Salt Spring to Galiano. The choice of plans was to be left with the planning committee of the CRD.

The weatherman reported a high temperature for September, 1971 of 72 degrees with a low of 42. The rain fall measured 2.78 inches. A year previous the statistics read: high 74, low 43, rain 1.94 inches compared to 1969 readings of: high 80, low 45, rain 4.58 inches.

A Ganges resident expressed concern about access to the village from Fulford if a serious accident should occur on Ganges Hill. In a letter to various officials, the resident pointed out the volume and make-up of traffic using the two-lane highway could mean problems if a serious accident occurred.

Thunder echoed across the harbour and lightning split the skies as a storm lashed Ganges, leaving behind large hail stones littering the ground.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

The Gulf Islands branch of the B.C. Historical Society met on Mayne Island. Guest speaker was a representative of the Vancouver Indian Centre who explained some of the problems facing native people in education and in trying to fit into contemporary society.

Arrangements for Remembrance Day were the topics discussed at a meeting of the Gulf Islands Legion on Saturna. Another item talked about and decided upon was a raise in the annual membership fees to \$6 per year. Pensioners would be charged

only \$5.

In a front-page editorial, Driftwood criticized the proliferation of picketing and protests. A boycott of a meat market in Alberni was singled out for scrutiny. The editorial commented: "So many of these protests seem to rise from a very superficial look at a problem. The protesters see only where they are personally affected and fail to look deep enough into a situation to find its cause."

For the band the occasion was a rehearsal but for the 60 young Salt Springers, the three hours of music was a break from boredom. The weekly meeting of the youths at the Ganges United Church included music by the Nite Lites as well as the showing of a film.

The Centennial Caravan was on its way to Salt Spring Island. The caravan, two trailers of displays of Canadian history and heritage, was touring British Columbia as part of the celebration of the nation's 100th birthday.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

The principal of the Salt Spring Elementary School, Jack Evans, earned his master's degree in education. Evans received the scroll at the fall convocation at the University of B.C.

Swans invaded Prevost Island. An observer counted 35 of the white birds on that island and several more were seen at parts of Salt Spring.

The Morrises, father Fred and son Bob, won tournaments at the Salt Spring Golf Club. The senior Morris took the play-off in the fall tournament two up over Jack Scott. Son Bob won the First Flight, four and three, over Nels Degnen.

With a note that editorials are not to mould public opinion but to keep it from getting mouldy, *Driftwood* questioned the wisdom of the PTA for choosing to endorse a candidate for the election of school trustees. While stating that teachers should have political leanings and the right to express them, the editorial wondered if it were a proper thing for teachers as a group to decide whom to support as their employer.

The Salt Spring Lions were preparing for a talent night as a means of raising funds. The event was open to all comers in two

classes, junior and senior. The judgment of an applause meter would decide the winner.

Extension announced by ministry

To help small logging operations in British Columbia face the uncertain lumber and plywood markets, the ministry of forests has announced a six-month extension of minimum stumpage rates.

Bob Thomas, director of the valuation branch, noted that two extension of the minimum rate have been granted and a third extension to May 31, 1982 was required.

"Market conditions have failed to improve," said Thomas, "and the government feels another extension of the relief measure is needed."

The minimum stumpage rates were introduced in June of 1980 and apply to holders of one of four types of logging operations licences: all licences issued under the Small Business Enterprise Program; all licences qualified for the small operator concession; all licences for hand logging; all licences appraised as market loggers.



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Outer Gulf Islands have had 'dirty end of stick' — Roddick

Vern Roddick, candidate for the Capital Regional Board in the Outer Gulf Islands, spoke at a "get-acquainted" meeting recently at the school-community centre on Pender Island.

Roddick was introduced by Bill Norton, who said it was hoped that this would be a meeting to get organized and to encourage voters to go to public meetings to understand the issues.

Roddick said he was running for two reasons: to find out what is going on at the Capital Regional District and in turn to let the people of the Outer Islands know what is going on.

It has been his experience, he said, that it is difficult to get

information in specific areas. For instance, a grant-in-aid saw \$3,000 allotted to the Outer Gulf Islands, but he could not find out where the money went.

Roddick said in the past the Outer Islands have got "the dirty end of the stick", that there has been no input from islanders.

Roddick has lived on Pender for 15 years. Besides being for two years an alternate director on the Capital Regional Board, he has been president of four Pender Island organizations. He is at present chairman of the Islands Trust board of variance and a member of the board of directors of Lady Minto Hospital, Greenwoods, and the Pender Island Health Care Centre.

The highways ministry is to prepare a design for the Crofton Road intersection, or the hospital corner at Valcourt Business Centre and the court house.

Other minor improvements are to be undertaken, including beautification of the core intersection.

The transportation committee has examined many options for an alternate route through Ganges, trustees were told on Tuesday. Although every route examined had some drawbacks, the recommended route, lying to the west of Ganges Hill, represents the "route of least conflict", reported planner Deane Strongitharm.

The new alternate route is not offered as a bypass, the committee was warned. It is designed as a two-lane highway, an extension to the existing network of roads in Ganges. It is not foreseen by the committee or the ministry as a road to ultimately replace Fulford-Ganges Road. It is seen, simply, as

an alternative route around the core area when it is completed.

CORE AREA

Area in which the island committee and the highways ministry have failed to agree is the core area intersection.

The Islands Trust had proposals to revamp the traffic pattern through Ganges, but the ministry was not excited. To achieve some improvement to the traffic pattern the committee has proposed that the present road pattern through Ganges be maintained but with improved directional signs, curbing, other signs, landscaping and no-parking zones.

ACCESS ONLY

It is proposed that any future access to Mouat's Mall from Lower Ganges Road be lined up with Hereford Ave. and that it be provided to serve the parking area of the commercial precinct.

The transportation committee, finally, urged that road improvements include either the provision of or opportunity for sidewalks, curbing and general beautification. It also asked for active liaison between the highways planning branch, district highways office, North Salt Spring Waterworks District and the Islands Trust to co-ordinate works and improvements with the implementation of the Ganges sewer.

Recommendations of the committee were accepted by the Trust Committee and a display will be mounted in Ganges in the near future to enable all islanders to see what is being planned.

Among the long-term projects left to the future are improved road alignment on the west side of the core intersection, south of McPhillips Ave.; relocation of the Ganges fire hall; future access to Mouat's Mall and a study of the impact of an alternate route on downtown traffic demands.

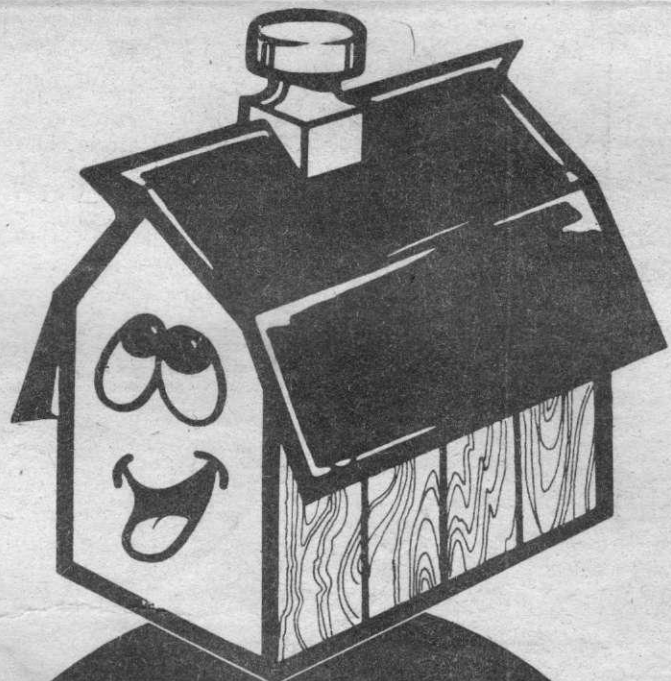
The entire project is being costed and when these preparations are completed, said Woodley, the drawings will be available for public viewing sometime near Christmas.

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
