At 86 Mary Gyves Brenton recalls details of the 19th century. She taught at several island schools and remembers incidents from each. Her pupils still return and visit.

Mary is surrounded by her family in the heart of the Burgoyne Valley, which has been her home for most of her life.

The valley setting of the Brenton home is scarcely changed from the day when her late brother, Michael Gyves, built his home to the north of hers. The level fields surrounding the house are fenced and cleared as they were fenced and cleared after her father settled there more than 100 years ago.

Only the rush of the traffic up and down the island breaks the peace of the valley; a peace which has endured through the centuries.

This was Burgoyne School before Mary Brenton was a

student. Taken probably around 1900. The school was later converted to a private home.

Property rezoned when map was drawn, trustees are told

Two commercial lots on St. Mary Lake have been rezoned "water-

shed" without prompting from the owners or other residents of the area.

Last week the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee received a letter from a law firm in Vancouver asking for "all steps necessary to restore C-4 zoning to his property".

The committee learned that the two lots, adjacent to the North Salt Spring Waterworks District, were inadvertently drawn as watershed when the zoning map was prepared.

Trustees were also informed that although the zoning was in error, the error stands and the property is, in fact, now zoned for limited residential use and not available for a resort or other commercial use.

If it is to revert to commercial zoning, then there must be a zoning amendment bylaw and a public hearing before it can be put back, the committee learned.

Lynn Ramsay, writing on behalf of the owner, Gary Bennett, told the committee that the change greatly affects the value of the property.

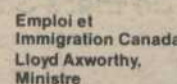

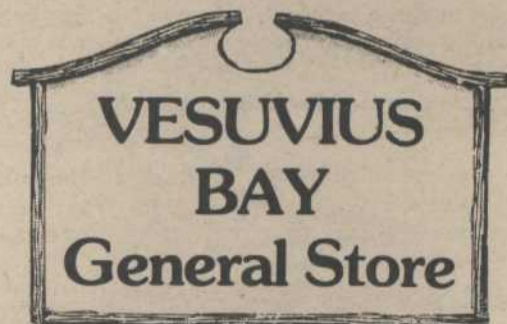
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New incentive program at Saturna School

Jacques Campbell and her parents farm 900 acres of South Saturna. Jacques grew up on the island, graduated from high school at Salt Spring, then worked in Victoria, Halifax and Victoria. She studied two years at Northern Lights College.

When you're filling in forms and it says "occupation" what do you write?

Farmer.

That phrase, "How can you keep them down on the farm now that they've seen the city", how does that apply to you?

I'm glad that I lived in the city because it makes me appreciate what I have. I'm glad because I'm not sitting at home—not that I sit at home wondering what it would have been like.

What are some comparisons between the city life and farm life that are important to you?

Pastimes and work - basic occupation is so different. On a farm, you're only through at 5.00 if you choose to be. Farm life isn't as structured. For me, on the farm, I feel rewarded by my own efforts. In an office, you only get a reward if someone else thinks you've done something - you don't get to reward yourself. And I do prefer the physical atmosphere.

What aspect of farming do you enjoy most?

Puttering! I prefer early spring, late winter with sheep lambing and cows calving and early gardening - none of that late stuff - weeding.

What areas would you like to gain more expertise in?

Understanding the problems that arise with livestock, more knowledge along the lines of a vet. But I'm not prepared to go to university.

Why are you raising beef and sheep?

They're a good combination - complement each other with the grazing. The sheep eat short grass and the cattle eat longer grass; cattle keep down some kinds of weeds and sheep others. Because of our weather we don't have to keep the animals sheltered.

Do you think that in the future B.C. will be raising more of its own food?

I hope so, we could support more. We could increase cattle or sheep. I prefer sheep, just because they're easier to handle!

How would you describe the farm?

Hard to compare. In Dawson Creek the large grain farms have cattle as a sideline. We're certainly low-density - not a feedlot - very low-density family farm! We can take the extra hour to do something - when you hire someone you have to keep them busy, busy.

In what directions do you see the farm going?

We want to be much more self-sufficient in feed. We can handle a small increase in livestock, with some selective culling and replacing of breeding stock. Always there's repairs, constant repairs and upkeep. Repairs are very time- and money-consuming.

What's the prognosis for the family farm?

It's so hard to tell, depends on where you are. One day you hear they're going to be what will hold us together, next you hear they're all disappearing.

You took the agriculture course at Dawson Creek - was it applicable to a family farm?

Yup, I'd often thought of study-

ing agriculture somewhere. I decided a few years before I went that I would go. It was what I hoped it would be. It was suited to someone like me who had grown up on a farm.

Do you have any goals?

Yes, to make the farm run better as a farm.

How long will that take?

Depends on how ambitious I am! **Is Saturna enough for you socially?**

Yeah, the natives are friendly and I keep in touch with friends I've made over the years.

Was it hard to come back?

No. Most people think I'm 17 and that can be annoying. People here think it's unusual I'm farming but at Dawson Creek I knew lots of kids who were studying agriculture and going to return to their family farms.

I am fortunate there is the opportunity to farm - not everyone has it. Also, that my parents have made room for me. I'm glad to be here and I have no desire to leave.

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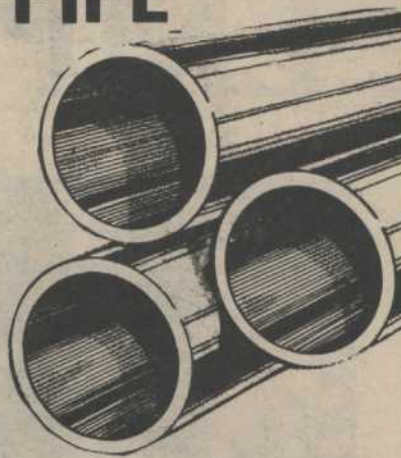
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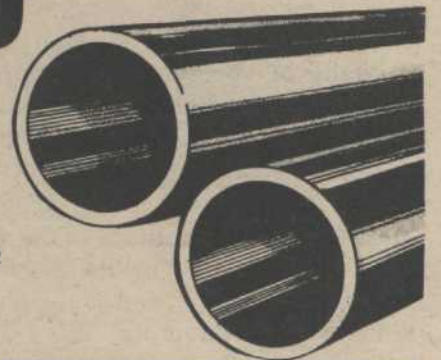

ANNOUNCING BRITISH COLUMBIA'S NEW EMPLOYMENT STANDARDS ACT.

HOW THE NEW LAW PROTECTS YOU, THE EMPLOYEE.

British Columbia has a new law that protects the rights of employees better than ever before. The Employment Standards Act (1981) covers virtually every aspect of employment, and sets out clearly the responsibilities of employers.

The following is an outline of the major areas affected by the law. Further information, and leaflets, may be obtained at any provincial Ministry of Labour office.

Wage protection and new minimum wage

As of December 1, 1980 the minimum wage in British Columbia was increased to \$3.65 an hour for persons 18 years and over, and to \$3.00 an hour for persons under 18.

The new Act stipulates when employers must pay wages, which deductions are allowable, which details must appear on pay statements, and what employees' rights are on termination of employment.

Hours of work and overtime

Most employees (with certain exceptions) are entitled to a half-hour eating period every five hours, and to 32 consecutive hours off each week. There are also new regulations regarding shifts.

Overtime pay at 1½ times the regular rate must be paid for the first three hours worked beyond the normal eight-hour day, and double time after that.

Annual vacations and general holidays

Employees are entitled to two weeks paid vacation after each year worked, and three weeks after five consecutive years of work. Most people who work on any of the nine general holidays must be paid overtime, and must also receive another day off later.

Maternity leave

Maternity leave is a right in this province and employees must be reinstated in their job, or a comparable one, on their return.

Up to 18 weeks leave, without pay, may be taken. During the absence, all benefit plans must be continued, provided the employee pays her normal share.

A leaflet is available dealing with Maternity Leave.



Farm and Domestic work

There is now a minimum daily wage of \$29.20 for live-in domestics and most agricultural employees (except piece-workers).

Farm labour contractors are required to be licensed, must pay employees each week and, in addition, all wage rates must be displayed at the work-site.

A leaflet is available dealing with Farm and Domestic Work.

Termination of employment

Employers are required to give minimum periods of written notice when laying off an employee. These are: two weeks for employees who have worked at least six consecutive months; and three weeks, after three years, increasing by one week per year of employment to a maximum of eight weeks.

There are a number of circumstances in which written notice is not required.

A leaflet is available dealing with Termination of Employment.

Complaints

Employees who have a complaint or an enquiry should contact the nearest office of the Employment Standards Branch, Ministry of Labour. The Branch will provide further information and assist employees in resolving their problems.

Employee protection

Employers are prohibited from terminating, suspending or disciplining any employee who files a complaint under the Employment Standards Act.

Employees are also protected under the Act from employers persuading them to accept work by false representation or misleading advertising.

GALIANO NEWS

Neighbourhood Watch program is sponsored

Galiano Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Neighbourhood Watch program on the island. Constable Glenn Hanna will address a public meeting in the Community Hall on Thursday, Mar. 26 at 7.30 p.m. to explain this widely used and successful program.

Although most people on Galiano carry out an informal watch on their neighbour's property, especially when it is not occupied, there is more to the official Neighbourhood Watch program and it deserves full support. It is hoped that there will be a good turn-out on Thursday evening.

School News

The Gulf Islands School Board has received notice that the ministry of education has allocated \$298,000 in the 1981 budget for construction at Galiano School. Trustee Jim Ripley and principal Ken Gaylor are naturally elated with this development.

However, a great many problems will still have to be overcome before the staff and children benefit from improved accommodation. It is probable that half of this sum will be in the form of a provincial grant with the other half to come from local school tax.

The letter from the ministry refers to construction of a new classroom and a library with unspecified further additions. Trustee Ripley hopes that this will include an activity room large enough to double as a gym and that it will be possible to design this so that it can be expanded in the future if additional money becomes available or if the community decides to become a partner with the school board in a combined-use facility.

FAR FROM NEW SCHOOL
This is far from the new school that many people hoped for. The old building, which has been renovated to comply with fire and safety regulations, will be retained and the addition built behind it on the same rocky ridge. It remains to be seen whether the reconstruction will include proper storage space and staff room.

Trustee Ripley hopes to involve the principal, staff and parents in planning for the additions. When an architect is appointed it is hoped that he will meet with the local committee to hear their views and incorporate their ideas, as far as possible, in the design.

The final plans will have to pass

ministry of education scrutiny and receive the approval of the multiplicity of municipal and provincial officials without whose consent construction cannot commence.

Basketball is in full swing with two training sessions a week. Coaching the school team is Loney Rockafella and under his direction the girls and boys are making good progress. Other Gulf Island elementary schools are urged to sharpen their basketball skills to take up the challenge of the Galiano team.

Fire Courtesy

We mentioned in last week's *Driftwood* that now is the perfect time for garden bonfires. Within a month increasing dryness will prohibit the lighting of fires without a permit.

However, fire chief Chester Williams would like anyone intending to start a large fire, for example to clear a construction site, to inform the fire department of his intention in advance. Last week ferry crews were reporting to the fire department that quite a large fire was burning in the Bluff Road area.

It will save the fire chief the trouble of checking out such calls if he is warned in advance of plans to burn.

Mary Ausmun

News has been received of the death of Mary Ausmun last Wednesday. Riley and Mary Ausmun were for many years residents of Galiano until ill health forced them to move to the mainland.

The Ausmuns were noted for their gardening skills and their cottage on Gulf Drive was always surrounded by a colourful display of flowers. Mary was predeceased by Riley just over a year ago.

Nature Notes

Parviflora

Small flowers! The wildflowers of a Gulf Island spring are characterized by rapid growth, early blooming and small size. The niches of the rocky south-facing bluffs have little soil and are soon baked dry by the warming sun, so the wildflowers that occupy these sites must spring to life, bloom and ripen their seeds or bulbs in the few short weeks between March and May.

Look for Little monkey flower, the smallest of the three monkey flowers that grow on the Gulf

Islands, its yellow trumpets decorated with scarlet dots on the lower lip. The Latin name, *mimulus*, meaning a little buffoon, describes the grinning ape-like face that can be seen in the tiny flowers.

A few flowers of fringe-cup can now be seen on the still damp short grass lawns at the top of the bluffs. At the top of a stem, only a few inches high, half a dozen pink, round buds will open into soft pink flowers with five petals so deeply three-cleft that they appear fringed. The botanical name is *lithophragma parviflora*, meaning stone-wall small-flower.

Blue-eyed Mary

Another *parviflora* is *Collinsia*, blue-eyed Mary. This is a flower of the short grass and conglomerate bluffs and in places forms a blue carpet draped over the cliff edge. There is a larger species, *collinsia grandiflora*, found on Lion Islet although the two are so alike it is hard to tell which is the small and which is the large flowered.

One of the saxifrage family can be seen blooming on the bluffs. As its name implies (*saxum*-rock and *frango*-to break) this plant prefers a rocky habitat. The delicate flowers have five white petals spotted with red, orange or yellow.

North End Clean-up

Two weeks ago a successful work party of 13 people spent two hours cleaning and burning outside the North End community Hall. About \$3.50 worth of beer bottles were salvaged and the parking lot space doubled in size.

Volunteers are needed for further outside work around the hall this Saturday between 1 and 3 p.m.

Squirrels

Last Wednesday morning about 7.30 a.m., as Peter Denroche was driving the school bus north past the Community Hall, a squirrel crossed the road in front of him and headed into the bush. For Peter, who has lived on Galiano for 50 years, this was the first squirrel he had ever seen on the island.

Two days later his wife, Marjorie, heard the distinctive chatter of a squirrel when walking past the booming ground in Whaler Bay.

During the past year squirrels have been sighted by Pat Park, Dennis Oldroyd and Ruby Garner in the area between Sturdies Bay Road and Bluff Park.

It is interesting to speculate why squirrels have only been seen on Galiano in the past two years and how they managed to get to the island.

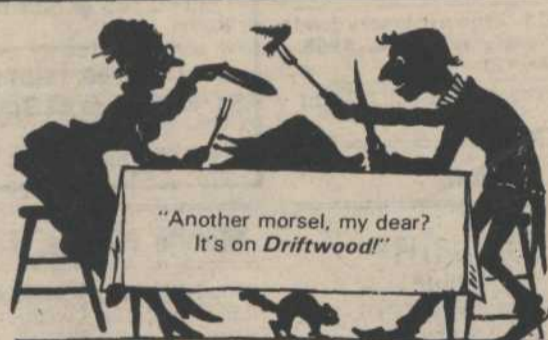

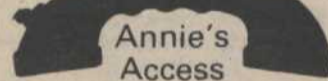

Hospital volunteers

Thrift Shop raised about \$35,000 last year

Lady Minto Hospital volunteers who work at the hospital contribute an intangible dimension to the lives of hospital patients. It is a gift that defies any attempt to put a price on it.

Hospital Auxiliary Thrift Shop workers are in a different category. Their aim is to raise money to support their fellow workers at the hospital, and to make possible many gifts of furnishings and equipment to the hospital itself. Their services have a distinct material value in relation to the raising of these funds.

Volunteers working week by week, serving in the Thrift Shop; working behind the scenes sorting and pricing, or at home washing and ironing soiled garments, (no wonder the Shop always looks so clean!) have raised approximately \$35,000 net in the past year.

Consider the volunteers' 6,500 hours of work in 1980; multiply this figure by the minimum wage for each hour of service, and one realizes the specific value of the work done.

Thrift Shop convener Mrs. Mary Yellowlees gives full credit to her

loyal and efficient fellow workers for the success of the Thrift Shop, now in its 10th year of service to the hospital and the public. When the shop was closed for the Christmas season, Mrs. Yellowlees and her helpers gave the place a good housecleaning and a repaint job. "They were perfect work-mates," said their enthusiastic convener.

The past year brought a new and more spacious look to the shop. Clothes racks were rearranged; tiers of shelves were replaced by tables to allow better display of articles. One important addition to the shop is the handsome display cabinet made by Tom Watson. This holds the more unusual items, referred to as "treasures". Mrs. Cathy Oliver is in charge of this section.

There is never any shortage of stock for the Thrift Shop, thanks to the generosity of Gulf Islanders and their off-island friends who keep it well supplied with a wide range of articles. This abundance of material for shelves and racks is reflected in the really low prices charged for goods. Because so many bargains have been picked

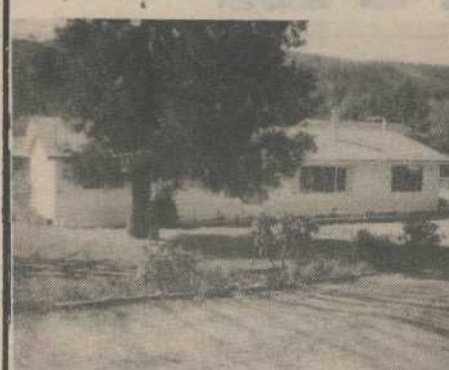

Local support is sought to stop logging

Local residents are being asked to provide their support in a fight to save 12 square miles of virgin watershed in the Queen Charlotte Islands.

One proposal to be considered by the provincial government at the end of this month would see the Windy Creek watershed being logged, with one-sixth of it, or two square miles, set aside as a reserve.

Windy Creek is located on an island which lies off the east coast of Moresby Island.

Environmentalists, meanwhile, are urging the ministry of environment to place the entire watershed in an ecological reserve. According to local supporters of the latter

proposal, that option is being backed by the federal fisheries department.

Windy Creek is described as having an exceptional salmon run while the watershed contains some of the world's largest sitka spruce, red cedar and hemlock.

Those who wish to register their support for the second option are urged to write to Environment Minister Stephen Rogers or sign the petition at Sunshine Farm Foods in Ganges. Deadline for doing so is the end of March.

Region to ask minister to reconsider

The Capital Regional Board will prepare a background report on the story of the Gulf Islands exclusion from the urban transit levy and this will be presented to Municipal Affairs Minister Bill Vander Zalm.

The procedure is intended to urge the minister to reconsider his decision to make the islands refund retroactive to April of last year.

Bylaw of the region calling for exclusion of the islands from the cost of city buses was delayed last fall by the minister. He objected to the terms of payment demanded of commercial and industrial users, which was all in one bylaw.

At the end of 1980 the minister assured the board that he would accept a new bylaw and make it retroactive, covering a refund of the transit levy already paid by islanders on their Hydro bills.

TO NOVEMBER

His most recent statement was that the refund would be retroactive only to November 1, 1980, the date of the disputed bylaw.

It was reported last week that the Salt Spring director had made a motion which failed to gain a seconder. It was not a motion, said the director this week. It was an observation.

Motion to present the sad tale to the minister, after the regional staff

has researched it, was brought in by Mel Couvelier and Don Rittaler.

This was the only area, suggested Couvelier, where the minister was not sure of his ground.

The information to be supplied will fill him in and the board hopes will encourage him to reconsider his decision. Vander Zalm's decision will cost islanders \$35,000 to \$40,000 estimated Valcourt this week.

FIVE YEARS AGO

The water taxi is an essential island service, contends Mayne Island operator Nigel Phillips. He said this week that the Phillips Marine Service has suffered at the hands of inflation with increased costs and that its future is threatened by rising prices. Fuel and high interest rates are crippling the operation, he explained, as everything goes up beyond the reach of the small operator. The water taxi operator is asking for government assistance for what he describes as an essential service to the islands.

Public participation in the planning of Ganges will be invited by the Committee for Planning the Community of Ganges. Nearly two weeks of fact-finding will get under way April 5 when the committee sets up a display centre at the Salt Spring Island Fire Hall. Visitors will view a selection of charts and exhibits and will be invited to complete a questionnaire. The committee has already collected considerable information about future planning, explained chairman Henry Elder. "The time is at hand when individual opinions will help in determining the needs and character of Ganges," he said.

A new concept in subdivision control was introduced to British Columbia with adoption of Salt Spring Island's subdivision bylaw. The averaging principle, whereby a parcel of land may be divided into lots of any size, provided the average size conforms with the bylaw, is a new venture in this province. The concept had been previously thought impossible to enforce.

A new provincial assessor has been appointed for Salt Spring Island with the announcement that Al Clark has been transferred to Saanich where he will serve in the same capacity. Garry Garras has been named to fill the vacancy created by Clark's departure. Garras, a native of Burnaby, will be the new appraiser and office manager and he looks forward to the quieter atmosphere of Salt Spring Island.

The livestock show will be withdrawn from the May Day activities, the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce was advised last week. At a May Day planning meeting in Ganges, Jan Harkema, president of the island Farmers' Institute, reported the decision to make a change had been approved by a meeting of 48 members. He pointed out that a two-day May Day would not be feasible.

TEN YEARS AGO

St. Mary Lake is to be a new, major source of domestic water on Salt Spring Island. Trustees of the North Salt Spring Island Waterworks District have announced plans to bring in water from the lake to augment the supply from Maxwell Lake. Introduction of water from the more northern of the

two lakes is expected to save consumers \$150,000. The water district has carried out extensive investigations of water supplies on the island. A modern filtration plant, however, will have to be constructed before water is taken from St. Mary Lake.

A number of Ganges residents have expressed concern over discoloration of water in the water system. The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce last week called for filtration of water from Maxwell Lake and its request will go before the North Salt Spring Waterworks District. The discoloration is not believed to be harmful.

The Salt Spring Island branch of the Royal Canadian Legion celebrated its 40th anniversary with a party last Saturday that was attended by the group's grand president Maj.-Gen. George Pearkes and his wife. In a brief address, Pearkes praised the efforts that the Legion has made to assist veterans, their families and the community in general.

A program sponsored by the provincial government for training instructors in the use of firearms may never get off the ground due to poor response by area residents. A minimum of 12 candidates are required before the hunters' training program will be allowed to get under way. The course has failed to attract that number thus far. The course was outlined to the Salt Spring Island Rod and Gun Club at its annual meeting and some enthusiasm was expressed at the time. The course also covers all aspects of woodlore and fishing.

Reports that a small boat destined for Ladner had been lost at sea proved unfounded when the vessel was discovered safely moored in Ganges Harbour. The travellers had decided to seek overnight shelter at Ganges after starting out from Brentwood.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

A Salt Spring Island woman had a number of garden plants seized and subsequently destroyed by officials of the Gulf Islands Ferry Company after boarding the Fulford-bound ferry with a station wagon full of camellias and roses. The action was taken as a result of a quarantine which was placed on the area by the federal department of agriculture following discovery of a plant disease known as golden nematode. A special permit is required to transport plants from one area to another. The woman had purchased the plants in Victoria and was eventually given a refund by the store at which they were bought. "If you want to bring any home, you'd better wear them on your hat," she said later.

Members of the Salt Spring Island Credit Union have been urged to attend next week's annual meeting where they will be asked to approve amalgamation of the

island Credit Union with the Saanich Peninsula Credit Union. The directors of the Credit Union believe that approval of the proposed amalgamation will result in increased services and returns for the membership.

A Fulford man was recently appointed as the civil defence co-ordinator for the Gulf Islands by the provincial secretary's office. Doug Kane's new duties are to organize and co-ordinate assistance in case of civil disaster.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

A Fulford man and his son continue their search for a stray cougar after the recent discovery of three dead lambs and sets of cougar tracks on Mt. Bruce. Verification that the tracks were made by a cougar came from the provincial government following their discovery last week by Bob Akerman and his son Ted. The Akermans are being assisted in their search by Jimmy Dewar, the provincial cougar hunter, whose dogs have occasionally picked up the animal's scent. Two lambs were found dead inside an abandoned cabin and another was found dead on the building's porch.

Two resolutions dealing with ferry schedules were approved at a joint meeting of the transportation committee representing chambers of commerce from all the Gulf Islands. It was agreed that the committee would request that the government establish a schedule similar to that used last summer and that the summer schedule go into effect when the change is made to daylight saving time.

A Galiano Island resident using the nom-de-plume of "Possibly in Trust" had his Irish Sweepstake ticket drawn for the horse Arles in the Grand National Race on Saturday.

A proposal by the Salt Spring Singers for a show featuring music and dance of different cultures and nationalities is now well into the planning stage.

Singers spokesman Ruth Barker told Driftwood that the Salt Spring Song and Dance Fest will take place at the Ganges activity centre in May.

Originally the Singers had considered holding the event in conjunction with the annual Sea Capers but a group from Victoria was unable to come on that date.

That particular group is a Hungarian choral and dance group which will perform with a number of other singers and dancers.

Barker said that German, Polish and possibly Greek styles will be represented. Some modern jazz is also on the program, as are the Salt Spring Singers.

The event is scheduled for Sunday afternoon, May 24.

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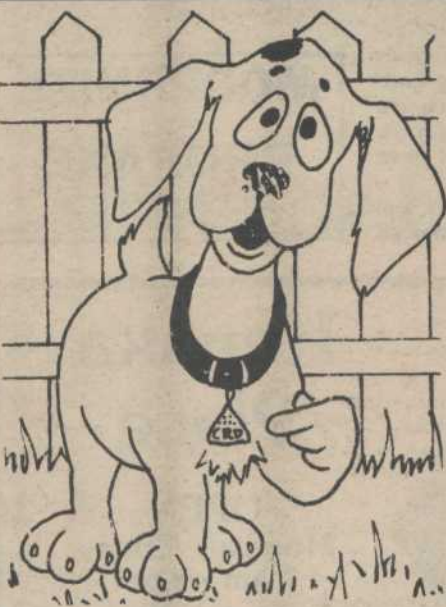

decays. It is this layer which determines the fertility of the water above. If there is an adequate oxygen content in this layer it will combine with the phosphates in the decaying vegetation and lock some of those chemicals into an indissoluble compound. If, however, there is insufficient oxygen the phosphates form a readily soluble compound which freely releases those phosphates back to the upper areas of the water to feed further growth above.

LIMITING FACTOR

This phosphate content in the water is the limiting factor in the growth of algae.

When air is pumped into the lake and permitted to bubble up from the bottom it introduces additional oxygen into that layer and slows down the release of phosphates. This slows the algae growth.

The aeration system works, said Larmour, but it brings additional problems in its wake. It may be the recommendation of the water investigations branch that some aeration be carried out. But this process is governed by many other factors, including the depth of the water and its condition.

It is possible to build extensive treatment to clean up the water when it is taken from the lake, but the recognized systems are expensive and cannot be relied on to cure the condition. A pilot plant could be installed and even then prove inadequate, said the district manager, if the conditions should change in the lake.

AFTER THE HORSE

He suggested that a process of "coagulation and flocculation" might be applied. But it is locking the stable door after the horse has bolted. This process is expensive to construct and expensive to operate and might work very well. A chemical is introduced into the water and causes the algae to coagulate. The resultant heavy vegetation then sinks to the bottom of the reservoir and is filtered out.

There are various paths open to the trustees of the district. But without a study of the kind undertaken by the investigations branch, they have little guidance as to which direction to take. When the study was launched, it was hoped to have some report back within about two months.

Larmour agreed that it is expected before the summer.

Last year's water problem was brought about by the presence of a new alga in the water, *oscillatoria rubescens*, a blue-green alga that is like a heart attack.

LIKE A HEART ATTACK

When a man suffers a mild heart attack it serves as a warning that he must live more carefully or die more quickly.

When a lake is struck by this particular growth it is a warning that some measures must be taken now or the worst is yet to come, explained the water technician.

Aeration is one possibility, he explained. But so is a tighter land-use control in the watershed. So is a closer attention to surface run-off: a restoration program. Or it could be a combination of these

and other proposals.

Phosphates are the limiting factor in the growth of most algae.

They may be controlled to some degree by oxygen bubbles. But there is a constant leaching of phosphates into the lake. Where land is cleared both phosphates and nitrates find their way into the water more quickly than when the land is in its natural state. Where human wastes are turned into the ground, there is an increased supply of these growth chemicals finding their way into the lake.

NO WAY

An increased degree of treatment for septic tanks would have no effect, said Mike Larmour. There is no known practical method of controlling the flow of nutrients. Both nitrates and phosphates can be controlled to a limited degree in a sewage treatment plant, but neither can be combatted in the case of a disposal field. Volume, or numbers, is the only controlling factor.

The condition of the water is obvious to anyone who looks, suggested Larmour. The bloom is evident right now.

But he uses a Secchi disc, the

accepted measure of turbidity in water. It is a black and white disc less than a foot in diameter. It is lowered into the water until it disappears. The depth at which the disc is no longer visible is the measure of growth or any other suspended material in that water. In a clear mountain lake a 50 foot reading is not unheard of, said Larmour. In the waters of St. Mary Lake last year a reading of 34 inches was taken.

EVER HASTENING

St. Mary Lake is eutrophic. It is hastening towards that glorious day when it will be a sweeping meadow and no lake at all. It is not likely that it has had a 50-foot Secchi disc reading for 15,000 years. But less than three feet is not an inspiring report.

Mike Larmour knows all the problems. He knows some of the answers, but he is waiting for further investigations and advice before jumping at a solution.

All he knows for sure is that something will have to be done and soon if St. Mary Lake is to continue to serve Salt Spring Island down the years with ample, clear, potable water.

Jeremiah Gallagher was pulled from the water by 15-year-old James Duncan Hamilton, a local resident who was fishing from the dock at the time.

The latter said he had gone to investigate after hearing a splash and discovered the youngster in the water. Hamilton estimated that he'd been in the water for about 35 seconds when he reached over the edge of the float to pull him up.

Proposed new K & R Store needs approval of fire wall

Suggestion that the K & R building project on Salt Spring Island could get bogged down was made when the sponsoring company, Newton Developments Ltd., asked the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee last week for a permit to build three feet higher than the maximum permitted in the zoning bylaw.

Speaking for the company, Don Burrows told the committee that the permit could make all the difference between going ahead and abandoning the project.

The company spokesman explained that the fire regulations within the National Building Code require a fire wall to run through a building of the size contemplated. Such a fire wall must stand three feet above the roof.

Burrows suggested that the wall would not be an eyesore, although

the committee considered that it would be clearly visible to traffic from the north.

The question will be considered by the newly established advisory design panel.

The company has already acquired the northerly Valcourt property where Marshall Wells and D & D News and other businesses are located. Proposal calls for a large merchandizing area as well as warehouse space.
