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Health Care Society meets

The Pender Islands Health Care Society meeting was held on February 12 at the School-Community Centre, with president Stew Corbett in the chair.

In the past 18 months a very efficient long-term care program has been established under the direction of Eric Forbes, assisted by Susan Powell, part-time coordinator. As a result, it has been suggested that Pender take over the operation of those on the other three Outer Islands.

John Howell, who replaced Forbes on his retirement in January, said he would advise against it. The time involved, especially to Saturna, would make it prohibitive.

Rental spaces for the first operating year will be on a monthly basis, the meeting decided. A quarterly financial summary will be presented to the society.

Some discussion took place over the suggestion that the Farmers' Institute and Garden Club take

over the landscaping on a long-term basis.

The president brought up the serious situation that has developed with the trained ambulance drivers, some of whom have moved off the islands, gone on holiday or taken jobs that make attending to the ambulance impossible. A new course will be given by Mrs. B. Lane, as soon as volunteers come forward for training.

The tenants have moved into the new building and the official opening is planned for March.

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Recreation commission grant to Fulford Hall

Fulford Hall faces an uphill struggle in order to survive as the 45-year-old structure is deteriorating and is unable to meet fire regulations. But the Fulford Hall Committee received a shot in the arm Monday night with the recreation commission's decision to provide the group with a \$2,600 grant.

The society had said that it cannot bear the costs alone and that the hall's future was dependent upon receiving the grant from the commission.

The grant will go towards installation of fire doors, which are expected to cost about \$2,600, but the society is still waiting for an estimate for installation of emergency lighting, a canopy over a kitchen range and for rewiring the entire building.

HALL INSPECTED

The Fulford Hall Committee decided to complete these repairs following a recent inspection by the fire marshal's office. The committee was warned that the building may not qualify for fire insurance unless extensive safety-related alterations were undertaken, according to committee spokesman Carol Walde.

The hall's fire insurance has just come up for renewal and it will cost the society approximately \$1,400 to insure the hall for the next 12 months.

Walde said that the committee can just meet the cost of insuring the building, but that doing so will completely exhaust the committee's resources and leave nothing to carry out the other renovations.

Sentiment among recreation commission members seemed to run against approving the grant when it was first brought up during the meeting.

WANTED TO TAKE OVER

The commission had wanted to take over management of the hall but the hall committee had flatly ruled out that idea.

But after examining what other facilities were available for recreational activities and learning that the hall committee would make the hall available to the commission upon request, the recreation commission gave its approval to the grant.

The Fulford Hall Committee had also assured the commission

that it was unlikely that they would appeal to the commission for more money in the future.

The defeat of the referendum on the recreation complex threw the commission's plans into a state of disarray, according to commission chairman Glenn Woodley, and it is still deciding on a course of action regarding future recreational facilities on Salt Spring Island.

SEEKING AID

Since residents turned down the proposed complex, the commission has been approached for financial assistance by several community halls here, Woodley said.

He says that most of the halls need extensive renovations and that costs would be well into the six-figure bracket.

"If you're going to put any money into them, you're talking big money."

He says that the recreation commission has already been asked for specific grants totalling about \$14,000 and that only about \$6,000 has been set aside in the commission's budget.

The commission has several different options it can pursue in providing future recreational facilities and these include initiating another referendum for a different recreation centre, pouring money into existing community halls for renovations and for updating their facilities, or a combination of both.

RECREATION DIRECTOR

The commission discussed hiring a recreation director but the proposal met with opposition.

Several members felt that the best course of action was to immediately hire a director for the dual purposes of co-ordinating recreational activities on Salt Spring Island and to help pave the way for another referendum on a

scaled down recreation centre.

"I think that all of our planning for the coming year is dependent on whether we have a recreation director," said one member.

Others suggested that there was little point in hiring a director without having a recreation centre.

Carol Walde says the Fulford Hall Committee will be hard-

pressed to keep the hall open for much longer without some sort of assistance.

"Today we have a situation where, with inflation, the existing committee can no longer carry the burden of maintaining the hall and is certainly unable to finance the very necessary repairs," she said.

LOTTERY GRANT

The committee has also applied for a lottery grant and has approached several service clubs to help finance some of the repairs. Walde said.

She cites the hall's long history of providing facilities for all of Salt Spring Island and she says that the hall has not outlived its usefulness.

Walde says that defeat of the recreation complex and a shortage of other recreational facilities make it more imperative that funding be obtained in order to guarantee the hall's continued existence.

The Fulford Hall Committee has appealed to residents for donations and to support activities at the hall.

A recent work bee, a successful Valentine's Day dance and several upcoming events are hoped to get the ball rolling in safeguarding the hall's future.

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THE PUBLIC HEARING

Such public hearing will commence at 10:00 a.m. local time on Wednesday, March 18, 1981 in the Commission Hearing Room located on the Twenty-first floor, Board of Trade Tower, 1177 West Hastings Street, Vancouver, B.C.

The Application and supporting material filed with the Commission by B.C. Hydro pursuant to Section 67(4) of the Act pertaining to an increase in its rates applicable to Distribution customers are available for inspection at the head office of British Columbia Hydro and Power Authority, 970 Burrard Street, Vancouver, B.C., V6Z 1Y3. Copies are also available for inspection at the office of the British Columbia Utilities Commission, Twenty-first floor, 1177 West Hastings Street, Vancouver, B.C., V6E 2L7. The Applicant has been ordered to file copies of all contracts between B.C. Hydro and its Transmission customers, together with any prepared testimony and any additional supplemental material upon which it proposes to rely, by Monday, February 23, 1981.

INTERVENTIONS

Any person intending to give evidence or cross-examine witnesses at the hearing should give written notice by Friday, February 27, 1981, to the Secretary of the Commission and to the Applicant.

SUBMISSIONS BY INTERESTED PARTIES

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Supplements to zoning regulations

Planner introduces trustees to variance and development

Islands trustees went to school on Friday when the Islands Trust Council, meeting in Victoria, heard a summary of the functions of the development permit and the board of variance.

Chief planner Dave Morris explained the two aspects of planning and their application to everyday matters of zoning and subdivision.

The development permit provides the issuing authority with considerable discretion and powers in the control of development, he explained. It is a technique which allows the council or Trust Committee to vary and supplement some of the provisions of a zoning or subdivision bylaw.

The development permit can regulate the dimensions and siting of buildings; siting and design of parking accommodation; landscaping and screening of certain uses; paving of roads and parking areas and the development of land and installation of sewerage facilities.

The permit can regulate the construction of buildings; prevent development in specified areas; regulate the provisions of recreation areas; regulate the use of signs and exert control on the exterior finish of buildings, apartments, row housing, commercial structures and industrial buildings.

The zoning bylaw must first be amended to provide for the issuance of development permits.

The planner linked the two functions, development permit and board of variance, because, he explained, their functions may overlap.

EITHER WAY

If a property owner seeks a relaxation of the bylaw to permit a siting of the planned structure in contravention of the regulations, then it may be accomplished by one or other of these measures. The board of variance can approve that relaxation; or the Trust committee may issue a development permit. In the case of an appeal to the board, the applicant must show evidence of hardship. This is not necessary to get a development permit.

But, warned the planner, a development permit should never be issued in order to avoid an application to the board of variance. For a simple relaxation, the board of variance is the arbiter.

The original form of zoning variation was the land-use contract, in which the owner and the local authority entered into a contract to control a development. Two years ago the act was amended to replace that contract with the development permit.

It is a supplement to the zoning bylaw.

NO HEARING

There is no occasion for a public hearing and the owners of adjacent property are not notified. The development permit may not permit a change in land use or density.

Two islands have already used development permits as a means of reaching a uniform pattern of development of commercial properties, it was noted, North Pender and Salt Spring.

A development permit is issued by resolution of the Trust committee of the island concerned. Prior to its issuance, there is usually a period of negotiation during which the applicant and the Trust, and frequently the ministry of highways, make adjustments to various aspects of the proposal, noted the planner.

There are two forms of development permit, compulsory and voluntary.

The Trust committee may designate an area as a development permit area, thereby requiring a permit before the owner can get a building permit.

Salt Spring Island Trust Committee has already designated all commercial properties development permit areas. On Bowen Island, all of Snug Cove is a development permit area. These exert a control on the design and landscaping of commercial buildings.

VOLUNTARY PERMIT

The owner of a parcel of land may apply for a voluntary development permit in order to have certain aspects of the zoning bylaw varied or supplemented. If, however, an owner wishes to undertake a project permitted under the zoning bylaw and outside a development permit area there is no occasion to seek a permit.

Zoning bylaws, explained Morris, contain regulations of general application. They apply to all lands, irrespective of variations in size, shape and topography.

Regulations which may be happily applied to the vast majority of properties could well prove a grave hardship in the case of an oddly-shaped or un-level property.

In order to avoid the need for a special zoning bylaw amendment to permit siting or other changes, the Municipal Act requires the appointment of a board of variance to relax regulations in cases of hardship.

The board covers a wide range of possible relaxations, notably with respect to building setbacks,

site coverage and minor requirements.

WHAT IS MINOR?

The definition of "minor" is not clear, admitted the planner.

"It is left pretty much up to the board, itself, to determine."

The Islands Trust has no authority to encroach on the powers of the board of variance.

This board of variance also serves another function.

If a property owner is dissatisfied with the interpretation of regulations by an official of the Trust he may appeal that interpretation to the board.

This arrangement is in keeping with the constitutional principle of the separation of the three functions of government, suggested Morris.

He saw the one group legislating, the Trust Committee; a

second group administering, the Trust staff; and a third judging, the board of variance.

The board also has authority to grant permission to extend or alter non-conforming buildings. Any person who is aggrieved has the right to appeal to the board and the board must hear him. And the board is free to make its own decision.

TIME FOR MEETING

The rest of the business period of the meeting was devoted to plans for the basement sale, which is to be held in the basement of the Ganges United Church this Saturday, Feb. 21, from 10 o'clock in the morning until noon.

Tea was served at the end of the meeting by Mrs. Marie Torrington and the writer.

A word to the wise: if you plan to come to the basement sale, come on time, but not too early. There will be all kinds of bargains and these bargains will soon be snapped up, so be there on time. But, the door will not be opened until 10.

Improvements to library to cost \$5,600 this year

The Salt Spring Island Public Library Association will spend about \$5,600 during 1981 for building improvements, reported building committee chairman Ron McQuiggan at last Thursday's annual meeting.

The meeting was held at St. George's Church in Ganges.

Plans call for the association to spend \$1,200 for weatherproofing improvements which are expected to substantially reduce the library's annual heating bill.

Other proposed capital expenditures as outlined by McQuiggan are \$1,800 for track lighting fix-

tures, \$600 for carpeting in the basement workroom, \$500 for an exterior retaining wall and drainage ditch, \$300 for dressing for the parking lot and \$200 for car stops in the parking lot.

Included in the \$5,600 improvement plan is \$1,000 which the library association has allocated towards connecting the library to the new Ganges sewer system, when completed.

The library's heating bill last year was \$1,314 but with the recent expansion of the library building, that amount is expected to climb to about \$2,500 for 1981, according to McQuiggan.

Tenders called

Tenders have been called, and will be opened on February 25, for a contract to supply and deliver 21,200 tonnes of crushed gravel and 4,100 tonnes of asphalt patchmix to the Gulf Islands for road maintenance programs.

The materials are to be distributed as follows: Salt Spring Island yard site, 1,000 tonnes of gravel and 500 tonnes of asphalt patchmix; Mayne Island yard site, 2,500 tonnes of gravel and 800 tonnes of patchmix; Pender Island yard site, 8,600 tonnes of gravel and 1,300 tonnes of patchmix; Galiano Island yard site, 4,100 tonnes of gravel and 1,000 tonnes of patchmix; Saturna Island yard site, 6,000 tonnes of gravel and 500 tonnes of patchmix.

The road maintenance program on the Gulf Islands is a continuing process which requires material delivery by barge following preparation elsewhere.

He said that weatherproofing improvements, expected to cost about \$1,200, would help to reduce that amount. Plans call for the association to spend \$200 for insulation underneath the library building, \$350 for installing inside storm windows and \$650 for replacing six front windows with thermopane.

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Advisory design panel is to be set up on Salt Spring Island as part of the planning process.

The panel will advise the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee on the design merits of plans submitted for rezoning, development permits and other proposals except for single and two-family dwellings.

Panel will consist of five members appointed by the committee. Each will have some design qualifications, including architecture, landscaping, professional engineering, development or familiarity with community affairs. Some appointees may be found beyond this list.

The new panel will consider all applications for rezoning or development permits and will make recommendations with respect to the design and the manner in which the design blends with the environment, as well as the finishing materials and the colour.

The design panel will also make recommendations regarding landscaping and siting.

When the Salt Spring Island Advisory Planning Commission considered the proposal on Tuesday afternoon last week, members heard a summary of the function of

the equivalent panel in Nanaimo.

NO DELAYS
Alan Aubert, Nanaimo architect, told the commission that he had been a member of the Nanaimo panel for 2½ years. During that time he could recall no instance when the panel had delayed an application.

In terms of signs and compatibility of materials, the panel had always asked the applicant to simplify his plans and had saved him money. Panel had, for example, said the speaker, reduced the variety of finishes or materials used on a project.

In Nanaimo the panel has never required a two-storey building instead of a one-storey and there is never any reference to the interior of the building.

Aubert invited members of the commission to attend a session of the panel at work. He noted that its deliberations are not open to the public, but that any member of the commission would be made welcome.

In Nanaimo there are seven members of the panel, said the planner, and two are architects. It is essential that at least one member be an architect, he urged, and more if feasible.

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Of children born during Year of Child, 12 million are dead

Last year was the Year of the Child. Of the 122 million children born that year, 12 million are already dead. Most were born to the "absolute poor." Three out of every 10 of their children die before the age of five.

Not even one in 10 is ever seen by a health worker or immunized against the common killer-diseases of childhood. Probably only half will ever learn to read and write.

Against this background we participated in the sacrament of baptism at the United Church on Sunday and Rev. Skinner preached on "Marks of Greatness." He asked who we would name as "great" people here on Salt Spring Island...the wealthy? The powerful? The prestigious?

My personal choices would be Nick Gilbert and my husband, and as Al Skinner defined the childlike qualities Jesus required for the Kingdom of God, I understood what had guided my choice.

DEPENDENT, TRUSTING

Children are dependent and trusting (until betrayed by an adult); simple and spontaneous (until imbued with our prejudices); they are honest and full of wonder; expectant and hopeful; adventurous; innocent and eager to learn; resilient, forgiving and forgetting, and capable of unconditional love.

So we let 12 million of them die last year in the first year of their lives - in that International Year of the Child!

This is the Year of the Disabled. How will we do by them?

Out of the present world population of 4.3 billion, an estimated 450 million are disabled: 40 million by mental illnesses, 56 million by communicable diseases, 40 million by alcoholism and drug abuse, 75 million by accidents - on the roads (30 million!) at work and at home.

IN THIRD WORLD
Almost one-third of these disabled are children in the Third World, 98% of whom receive no trained help whatever. A recent survey in two villages in the Philippines revealed 568 children under the age of six; 119 of these were disabled.

A UNICEF program, *Reaching the Unreached*, was launched and only a few months later, without taking them out of the community, employing expensive technology, almost half these children have shown significant improvement.

How was this miracle achieved? "The key...lies in releasing the care

and support which is latent in the family and the community." Two young people, one an occupational therapist and one a pre-school teacher, rented a small hut in the village and began to train volunteers. The link between malnutrition and disability was quickly exposed. Eighty percent of the children with multiple impairments were also found to be malnourished.

PART OF MIRACLE

Vitamin A was administered to combat blindness and the stimulation of playing, so often denied to disabled children, was explored. These were part of the miracle. "And this small beginning of a 'miracle for the many' holds out more hope for the 140 million disabled children in the developing world than all the technology under the sun." (*New Internationalist Magazine*, January 1981).

What kind of miracle would reach Mr. Joe McLaughlin, vice-president of Genstar Ltd., one of B.C.'s largest development companies? He wants to take more land out of the agricultural land reserve and put it into housing. With great acumen he says: "You can always get your food somewhere else but you sure cannot get your housing somewhere else!"

They said that about oil, didn't they? "We don't need to develop our oil reserves, we can buy it more cheaply somewhere else!" We're already getting much of our food from somewhere else, and look how much it costs! I suppose a man who talks about making \$10,000 to \$15,000 a year on one acre of land can't complain about the cost of food!

COULD EAT HIS WORDS

What happens when our food suppliers decide not to sell us any more? Or they make unreasonable demands? Like wanting us to send them nuclear reactors without safeguards... or poison gas formulae... or napalm to drop on their neighbours? Then perhaps even Mr. Joe McLaughlin would go hungry. Of course, he could always eat his words!

During 1980 (the year that 12 million children died in the first year of their life) we, the adult citi-

zens of this advanced technological civilization, spent \$1 million every minute...on armaments!

I hope the theologians are right - that nothing can separate us from the love of God!

Application is tabled pending court hearing

Application for rezoning of property on Lakeview Crescent in Ganges was tabled by the Salt Spring Island Advisory Planning Commission last week.

The land is three lots on Lakeview, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Bill Windsor.

One lot is already in use industrially, but all three are zoned residential and the property in industrial use is non-conforming. It was already being used for that purpose when zoning was introduced.

Regional director Yvette Valcourt told the commission that the application was a family matter, as the applicants were her son-in-law and daughter.

"Are you absenting yourself?" asked chairman Nick Gilbert.

"No," replied the director, "I will stay with the discussion, but I will not vote."

UNABLE TO SPEAK

Bud Kreissl explained that because he will be a witness in a court action involving the property, planner Dean Strongtharm could not speak to the application.

Kreissl recalled that the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee had received complaints that all three lots were being used for auto work and auto wrecking.

The owners had failed to reply to any communication for two years, he reported.

The committee didn't push it,

but members kept getting complaints.

After failure to gain any response, the committee had discussed it with the Trust solicitor and it had been passed on to the ministry of the attorney-general. The charges of contravening the zoning bylaw will be heard in court in April.

Who were the complainants and were the complaints in writing, asked Valcourt.

The information was redundant as long as the commission has the facts, she was told.

"Because of litigation you are making it impossible for this applicant to be considered freely," stated Valcourt. "You are placing the applicant in a precarious position."

The application was made by the owners, explained planner Strongtharm, and it was automatically placed on the agenda. It should be tabled, suggested Kreissl.

"For the record," said the regional director, "I'm not voting on this."

The application was tabled.

With healthy soil all you need are chicken manure, cover crop

Of all the manures, chicken manure is about the best all-round source of fertilizers. It contains approximately two percent nitrogen, 1.88% phosphorus and 1.85% potash, a near perfect balance.

Chicken feathers, when composted, yield about 12% nitrogen. Another good fertilizer is seaweed. It averages usually to 1.68% nitrogen, .75% phosphorus and a high five percent potash. Wood ashes contain about 1.5% phosphorus and up to seven percent potash.

Another excellent fertilizer are fish scraps. These average 7.76% nitrogen, 13% phosphorus and 3.80% potash.

Bonemeal contains about four percent nitrogen and 21% phosphorus.

If we have good healthy soil, enriched by a legume cover crop, not much more than chicken manure is required for intensive growing conditions. Imbalances can be corrected with fish meal or wood ashes.

COW MANURE

As for cow manure, this averages to .29% nitrogen, .17% phosphorus and .35% potash. One ton of cow manure will supply approximately 10 lbs. nitrogen, 2.7 lbs. phosphate and 7.5 lbs. potash. The recommended rate of application is about 10 tons per acre.

Last week I mentioned the book *The One Straw Revolution*. For those who will not have the opportunity to obtain this book in the near future, I will here briefly outline the author's growing method.

For the last 30 years Mr. Fukuoka, a former microbiologist, has grown two successive grain crops per year through a permanent ground cover of clover and weeds. He uses no fertilizers other than "a little" chicken manure and the previous harvest's straw mulch. Nor does he use any pesticides.

His yields compare very favour-

ably with the best areas in the country and average 22 bushels per quarter acre or 88 bushels per acre for each crop. And the depth of his topsoil increases at the rate of four inches in 10 years. With his method, he has eliminated tilling, pesticides, fertilizers (except as noted above) and erosion. Instead his topsoil is increasing and so is the organic content. It is worth trying.

START NOW

For early crops of cabbage, broccoli, brussel sprouts, celery, lettuce, peppers and tomatoes, seeds may now be started in the germination box, heated greenhouse or on the window sill. Also, the slow growing dwarf marigolds and other slow annuals may be started.

Cabbage plants grow more vigorously when transplanted when young, about five or six weeks old. Also, lettuces may be planted out at that time.

Cabbage plants will germinate in about five days with bottom heat and are best transplanted to six-packs when the first two true leaves have appeared. After transplanting they are best grown at 50-60°F. in the cool greenhouse or similar light, frost-sheltered places. Transplant into the garden in the latter half of March.

Last year I had excellent success with transplanting my peppers and tomatoes into individual four inch pots from the germination box. They were also grown in the cool greenhouse. Tomatoes may be transplanted deeply, both into

their containers in the greenhouse or outside.

MASSIVE ROOT SYSTEM

You can bury two-thirds of the tomato plant and it will make what I can only describe as a "massive" root system. The tomatoes transplanted individually and in this manner out-grew and out-produced all the others.

Tuberous begonias may now be started in the cool greenhouse. Set tubers in pots allowing at least two inches all around, about half an inch deep peat moss or a peat moss and vermiculite combination works well. Keep moist.

Among the plants which may be sown outside now are peas and sweet peas, rhubarb, onions, broad beans, leeks, radishes and parsley. It helps to have a sheltered, well drained spot for this.

Generally speaking, germination and subsequent growth is slow at this time of year due to temperature and short daylight hours. Later seedlings will often catch up with the earlier ones, but it is worth a try, and if we have mild weather from now on it will be worth it.

There is still time to spread fresh manure if you do not plan to seed or plant anything until a month from now to allow time for curing. Surface application or shallow tilling is best as the nutrients are of most benefit near the surface.

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Down Through the Years With Driftwood

FIVE YEARS AGO

Everything is going up in price, including membership fees for the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce. Memberships this year will cost \$10 for a private member, \$20 for a commercial enterprise or organization employing five persons or less and \$25 if the staff numbers more than six. Directors approved the increases at a meeting Monday night.

The total 1981 budget for the Gulf Islands School District has been set at \$1,985,651. The provincial government announces the mill rate and that will be announced at the end of March.

Legality of the procedures followed by the Islands Trust has been challenged by Capital Regional Board chairman Jim Campbell. Last week, the Capital Regional Board refused to give final reading to a rezoning by-law on the grounds that the Trust had failed to follow the correct procedure in approving its change. Caught in the middle of the dispute between the two island administrative bodies is Irene Girardi, who is waiting for permission to change the zoning of her Mayne Island store and to construct a restaurant.

Jim Campbell, chairman of the Capital Regional District, will attend an Islands Trust meeting later this week to allow Mayne Island residents an opportunity to convince him that they want a community plan there. The purpose of the plan is to establish guidelines for conserving the amenities of Mayne Island and to provide for orderly development of land, according to the wishes of residents there.

The Capital Regional Board, last week, gave its final consent to the Salt Spring Island subdivision bylaw, in accordance with the island's community plan, which will permit the splitting up of 10-acre lots. Approval of the bylaw culminates a two-year effort by the board to initiate this piece of legislation. Island regional director George Heinekey moved the resolution to adopt the bylaw. Since the meeting fell on Heinekey's birthday, chairman Jim Campbell told the board that this was Heinekey's birthday present.

TEN YEARS AGO

Reconstruction of the wharf at Fulford Harbour got under way this week as engineers arrived on Salt Spring Island. The major alteration will be to provide a parking area where passengers can leave their cars. Rumours of provision for a larger ferry have not been confirmed by the provincial government.

The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce decided last week to raise its membership fees, signal-

ling the first increase that has been passed on to members since the chamber was established 23 years ago. Members agreed that costs had risen since 1948 and authorized a 50% increase for dues.

A large grease ball found at a beach on Scott Road last week has been analyzed as nothing more than vegetable shortening. The analysis was made by the science teacher at the secondary school. The ball, which weighed about 10 pounds, was originally thought to have been discharged from a passing ship.

Lloyds of London have decided that the risks are too high and will no longer insure school buildings in British Columbia. Gulf Islands school trustees were told last week. George Lampier, chairman of the buildings and grounds committee, told trustees that school insurance is going to cost the board an additional \$270 this year. He explained that insurance coverage on schools should be sharply increased to cover rising costs of replacement.

A suggestion that the Gulf Islands School District amalgamate with the Saanich district was hurriedly shrugged off by several islands trustees last week. The Saanich School District had proposed that the two districts ask the B.C. School Trustees Association to undertake a study on amalgamation. The only district that would benefit would be Saanich, claimed trustee George Heinekey, and their only benefit would be additional money for Saanich.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

A recent report by the sewage committee of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce indicates that two-thirds of Ganges residents are in favour of the proposed sewer project. It's expected that an improvement district will be established to conduct further studies into the idea.

A \$162,000 contract has been signed by the Lions Pioneer Village Society and J.L. Peterson Construction Co. of Duncan to construct the Pioneer Village on a site below the telephone building on Lower Ganges Road. Work is expected to begin shortly after receipt of an order-in-council from Ottawa.

Gulf Islands residents will be offered tuberculosis tests and X-rays at two mobile Christmas Seal units over a four-day period beginning February 28. The program is run by the Greater Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health. The senior medical health officer says that the purpose of the survey is to

discover any unknown cases of tuberculosis and to identify other chest diseases.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

Three frustrated Vancouver Island youths finally completed their overnight voyage to the mainland, but it took three different boats to get them to Vancouver, where they were greeted with a cool reception by Richmond RCMP. The youths started out in a stolen 15-foot runabout last Sunday but were forced to abandon ship on Moresby Island after striking a rock. They again ran into trouble, after leaving Moresby Island aboard a stolen 30-foot pleasure craft, and were picked up by the Tsawwassen ferry. The crew had spotted their distress signal about 9:30 pm, after the stolen boat's propeller became fouled on a tern line. Local RCMP officers, meanwhile, had spent most of the night conducting a search at sea aboard their own craft.

A Supreme Court ruling has awarded \$10,000 to the owner of a Salt Spring Island home which had to be destroyed because of damage caused by 35 cats and 60 canaries during the six months that it was rented during 1958 by another couple. The cats and birds were never allowed to leave the house and an accumulation of filth, smell and decay forced destruction of the house and its furniture. The New Westminster owners had bought the house for their retirement.

The bodies of four more dead deer have been found at the north end of Salt Spring Island near the area where a deer carcass was found last week. The body of the first deer was shipped to Ottawa for an autopsy. A preliminary examination in Victoria indicated that rabies were not found.



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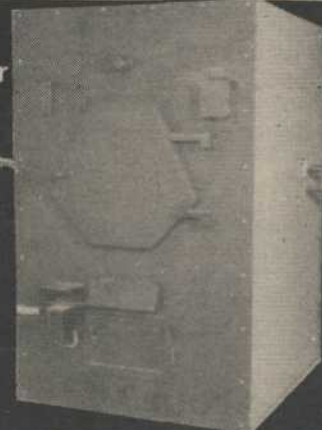
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Islands Trust and ministry at odds over 80-foot road widths

Ministry of highways and the Islands Trust see eye to eye on many matters.

But they do not yet agree on the width of island main roads.

When Mic Elston of the engineering department of the highways ministry spoke to the Islands Trust council on Friday afternoon last week, he defended the call for 80-foot highways as a look into the future, although he accepted the plea for minimizing the clearing. An 80-foot allowance would only be cleared to a width of 40 feet, he suggested.

The highways spokesman recalled the manner in which the ministry became involved with subdivision approval.

In the 1890's the provincial government legislated that all subdivisions must have access to a highway. In order to implement this rule, the ministry of highways was called on to check applications for subdivisions in order to ascertain that there was, in fact, access to a highway from all parcels. The ministry has been approving agent for subdivisions in many parts of the province since that time.

The reason for a dispute between islanders and the highways ministry over the width of roads is one of philosophy, suggested John Gaines of Saturna.

The ministry is geared to expansion and the Islands Trust is committed to the provision of a finite level of development.

IT SCARES THEM

What scares people, suggested David Lott, is a broad highway cleared to 50 feet.

It is not the highways philosophy which dictates needs, said Elston. He cited the change in use. A Ford car once had a 90 hp engine. It now has a 250 hp unit and the highways have to adapt to the change.

Irene Hawksworth, the originator of the current petition to the ministry of highways protesting excessively wide roads, was invited to speak.

She elicited the fact from the highways officer that he was not acquainted with her petition. It would not come to his attention, he explained.

She has collected between 500 and 600 names to her plea for narrow highways on the islands.

Mic Elston defended the ministry's requirements and explained that it only applied to

roads linking the ferries.

Salt Spring Island has a large population and a growing population, he noted.

In conclusion, he settled one

minor point. A private road no longer has to be closed once a year in order to retain title to it. Right of prescription no longer obtains in B.C., he said.

Police are still close to your telephone

The police office is still as close as the telephone, according to Sgt. Mitch Hanks, of the Ganges Detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

But he is adding a new line to the police telephone.

Any resident of Salt Spring Island calling the police must dial 537-5555. If the office staff is around the response is immediate and at Ganges.

If the office is empty the call goes direct to the Nanaimo communications centre. There is a 30-second delay and the communications centre takes the message and immediately radios the officer on duty.

The police telephone has a switching device to put emergency calls through to Nanaimo as the office is vacated.

If a member of the police staff should neglect to turn that switch, all is not lost. The telephone will ring in an empty office and the caller is left without a reply. This would also be the case if there were a breakdown in the telephone service.

Left high and dry without an answer, the caller may ring off and immediately dial Operator and ask for Zenith 50000. The operator will then connect the caller with the communications centre at Nanaimo.

EVERYWHERE

The emergency use of the Zenith number applies to all callers, anywhere. Zenith 50000 is still the emergency number if all else fails.

The resident of Galiano, who wants the police calls the operator and asks for Zenith 50000 at all times, day or night. He is connected with Nanaimo operations and the message is immediately transmitted to Ganges Detachment.

On the Outer Islands, the number to call is 629-6171. If the Pender Island police office is

unmanned, the call is switched over to the same communications centre in Nanaimo.

Callers on Mayne, Pender or Saturna still have the Zenith number to fall back on as an emergency.

Telephone directory distributed

A major project of the Salt Spring Island Lions Club this year, an island telephone directory, has now been distributed to local residents.

The 42-page book contains island telephone listings, a business directory, professional listings, a directory of service clubs and societies, and general information about the island.

Revenue from the project was obtained through selling advertising space in the book, which is entitled *All You Want to Know About Salt Spring Island*.

The directory was compiled by Lions Club members, under the direction of Fred Brookbanks. Typesetting and paste-up were done in Ganges by Driftwood Publishing while the printing was done by Fleming-Review Printing of Victoria.

Additional copies are available for \$1.95 from et cetera books, Volume II bookstore and the Salty Shop at Moutat's.

HELP FIGHT HEART DISEASE

New fire hall at Fulford to be built this year

Two-bay fire hall is to be built at Fulford to replace the present hall on Morningside Drive. The new hall will be located on Fulford-Ganges Road, a half-mile northwest of Fulford Hall, and on the opposite side of the road.

It will be a concrete block structure with a flat roof and provision will be made for a small administrative area as well as the two bays for emergency vehicles.

The new hall has been in the works for several years. With the growing population at the south end of the island the need for an additional fire truck at Fulford has grown.

The Morningside Drive hall in use for the past 25 years is not large enough to accommodate another vehicle and the property is too small to permit expansion.

Property for the new hall was acquired last year from the Gulf Islands School District. It consists of slightly more than four acres. That area which is left when the hall has been built and all services installed is to be devoted to recreation. The Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission will discuss the use of the property when the fire hall project is finished.

IN USE THIS YEAR

Work is expected to commence early this summer on the construction project and it will be in use by the end of the year.

In addition to the hall, there will be two 5,000 gallon water tanks, elevated to permit the filling of tanks without pumping. Water for the fire trucks will be drawn from the Fulford Creek. Water for domestic purposes will be taken from a well.

Damage \$2,000

A Victoria man had an expensive Valentine's Day when the truck he was driving left the road and rolled over, causing approximately \$2,000 damage.

Driver of the vehicle, Norman Jaeger, 22, claimed that a blowout caused him to lose control of his 1977 GMC van. The accident occurred on Fulford-Ganges Road at about 5:30 pm.

The area in front of the hall will be paved and set out in garden.

It is hoped that sketch plans of the new hall will be available for the annual meeting of the fire district on March 10.

The existing fire hall at Fulford will be sold.
