Salvador government portrayed as stable against all evidence *Kicks down Prospect Lake*

When Henry Kissinger was asked why the United States intervened in Chile to help overthrow the democratically elected government of Allende, he answered:

"I don't see why we need to stand by and permit a country to go communist due to the irresponsibility of its own people."

The exclamation point is mine! Prompted no doubt by the same kind of "altruism," President Reagan's government is urging Canada to support the U.S. stance on El Salvador - suppress the Left, no matter who gets hurt and regardless of who or how many comprise the Left. Against all evidence to the contrary, the Salvadorean government is being portrayed as stable, moderate and middle-of-the-road, sorely tried by extreme factions on both sides.

Church leaders and human rights groups know better. Even the Canadian Conservative Party knows better! So it must be pretty obvious!

NO MIDDLE PARTY

There is no middle party in El Salvador. The government represents the extreme right - the violent, implacable National Army, paramilitary "security" forces, and death squads, which together have been largely responsible for 10,000 killings in 1980 alone.

The Left, the "irresponsible" majority, certainly includes the poor and landless peasants, but also the teachers, doctors, clergy, labour organizers and social workers.

This revolution, like that of Nicaragua, is based far less on Marxism than on the teachings of Pope Paul VI and John Paul II, both of whom have spoken forcefully on the rights of Latin-American poor people.

Canada gave an undertaking to the United Nations, in response to representations from Mexico and the Central American states, that we would not intervene or support military interventions in the internal affairs of those countries.

TOLD TO SHAPE UP

However, we have been told to "shape up" by the new regime in Washington. The regime which has cut \$85 million from the budget of the arts and humanities. The regime which proposes to dispense with the department of energy and education, and which has already removed the controls from the nation's thermostats.

The U.S. has told Canada in no uncertain terms that we must relax our quota system and remove restrictions on foreign investments.

The U.S. has told Margaret Thatcher exactly how and where

she has gone wrong in her handling of the British economy. Who's next?

It is quite apparent that the U.S. intends to "put down" the long overdue uprising in El Salvador, and although Reagan has undertaken to avoid another Vietnam, there are already hundreds of "military advisors" on Salvadorean soil, and that's how the whole sorry mess began in Vietnam.

It is to be hoped that our government will honour its undertaking to the U.N., and not be coerced by the U.S. into another shameful participation. And please don't tell me "we only sent material, not troops." Like all the other dealers in death, we turned a profit and a blind eye. Let's not repeat our perfidy.

I hear, from all sides, anxiety about data banks. Information about you and me, gleaned from our financial dealings, our employers, our tax returns: all this is stored in data banks in the United States!

Why? Well, we don't have the facilities. It's cheaper to have them all in one system. Our technology is not sufficiently advanced....and so it goes!

If our markets, our allegiance, our confidential statistics are all south of the border, where do we keep our brains?

The Reckoning was the title of a grim movie we watched at the Reids' home last Tuesday. It explores in detail the relationship between unemployment and mortality - a direct and ominous ratio, described by one doctor as "the plague" of this century.

"Paul Samuelson, the economist, once wrote: 'If we made an income pyramid out of a child's blocks, with each layer portraying \$1,000 of income, the peak would be higher than the Eiffel Tower, but almost all of us would be within a yard of the ground.' The

average man lives within a yard of the ground. *Fortune* magazine, in 1968, observed 'Something thoroughly satisfying happens to people when they cross an income threshold of around \$25,000 a year.' The average man has not had that thoroughly satisfying experience."

Fined for false report

A 17-year-old Salt Spring Island man was given a \$50 fine by Judge Frederick Giles in provincial court last Wednesday after he pleaded guilty to filing a false accident report.

The court was told that Richard Smith had fabricated a story that he had driven a vehicle which was involved in an accident February 9, in which a passenger suffered back and pelvic injuries.

The accident occurred on Fulford-Ganges Road.

Smith had filed a statement with police officers following the accident in which he claimed he had been driving the vehicle, but he later admitted that another person had been driving the vehicle when the accident occurred.

The court learned that Smith had filed the false report in order to shield the real driver's identity.

Smith was told by Judge Giles that filing a false accident report was a serious offence and that by doing so he had wasted police time in pursuing their investigation.

Opening postponed

The official opening of the Bishop Coleman Health Care Centre on Pender Island has been postponed until later this spring. Because of the B.C. Tel strike the doctors have not been able to move in.

All the other tenants have moved into the building.

While we were talking in his office a series of beautiful young ladies flowed in and out of his office looking for information. And they went away happy.

The days are filled with information seekers and eager voters and proofs. What else is there?

There's home. And there's still a wife and two children and a dog.

What does a man do for a hobby when he is the source of information? Obviously, he sets it all down in writing. That's what Jack does.

KEEN HISTORIAN
He is a keen historian and spends hundreds of hours studying the history of the British Columbia coast. And he spends a lot of those hours writing of his discoveries. One day his summary will be published. In the meantime history is his hobby.

He vegetable gardens and enjoys it. And he bought an old house 21 years ago and is constantly keeping it up. And that's a demand on his time that never gives up. Although it sounds like a hobby most people have until they move into an apartment.

And when the vegetables are thriving and the paint job is gleaming, then in goes Fry to examine the lake from the bottom side up.

Public information and public relations: what's the difference?

Jack Fry has a prompt answer. Public information involves the presentation of facts in such a manner that they can be readily understood. It is up to the individual, says Fry, to assess the significance of the facts.

Public relations is more sophisticated. It can range from a friendly and courteous service to the other extreme, when a conscious effort is sometimes made to bend public opinion by the careful selection and emphasis of certain facts.

He sees his role as information officer gradually expanding into the preparation of information leaflets by which the public may readily learn of the wide range of functions of the regional district.

Such a program could offer information on transit services, health, planning and a variety of functions of the region.

and some will always break the law.

"I'm not saying it's right. I'm just saying I can recognize the factors."

She felt more facilities are needed "or we might find more serious problems than breaking and entry."

She closed with a challenge. "We should get together and I, for one, am willing!"

TO RECREATION VOTE

Second to speak on the island's significant social problem, Maya Hoffman, also looked sharply at the failure of the recreation referendum in November.

Why is there a sharp incidence of burglaries here? Boredom had been offered as an excuse.

It is boring at times, she admitted.

The proposed recreation centre had been rejected by the voters.

And if lack of facilities is the cause, then why had school activities been curtailed?

She suggested that it was not boredom at all, but a lack of interest. Those who participate in activities are not bored.

Fridays and Saturdays are the nights for break-ins, she told the club.

"Maybe the school could be open for those pupils instead of gathering outside the Trading Company."

The participants in these incidents must know what is right or illegal, she urged.

Maya felt that she has a right to be heard and to expect others to listen.

"If they are going to take away my freedom they should listen to what I have to say."

The disaffected are going to offer ridicule in reply to a caution. They are without discipline. They have no respect for other people's property.

But there is a recipe for ensuring that youngsters don't take that path.

It requires time, care and lots of love, she concluded.

THE DISABLED

It is not only the person suffering a physical or a mental handicap who must be considered in this international Year of the Disabled, stated Alex Hele.

It is important that we realize that they are different because of their hardship, but that difference is not great.

It is, maybe, those with healthy bodies who have the key, understanding, she urged.

The handicapped person feels alone and unable to perform a task once so easy. The disability makes that person different and he has a fear of not being accepted. And they have to learn to live with it.

"Maybe we need the education," suggested the speaker, "to learn to see life as they see it!"

She cited a number of notable international figures, all of whom surmounted serious handicaps: Helen Keller, who learned to overcome her own disabilities and spent a lifetime helping others; Winston Churchill, who started life with a speech impediment; Franklin Roosevelt who was a victim of polio at the age of 39; Beethoven, who was deaf before he wrote some of his most famous works, and Terry Fox, who undertook his marathon of hope after having been stricken with cancer.

They had the strength to overcome their disabilities.

In conclusion, Alex referred to the inspiration of one of her teachers. Caroline Hamilton teaches her art and French, said the speaker, and for 10 years she has been a victim of multiple sclerosis. The student speaker told her audience that she has learned a message from Caroline Hamilton: "Enjoy it and make the most of it right now because we only live once."

ALWAYS TO THE DEATH

Bill Gordon invited his listeners

to appreciate the extent of man's accomplishments. And man has always worked to devise a better tool to do his neighbour an injury. He has always sought a better means of eradicating his fellow man.

He looked back over history and listed the weaponry that had once held sway until the advent of the next. The list was topped by nuclear weapons.

This type of weapon has been developed to the degree where there is a nuclear device to apply to almost every situation in war.

And there has been nothing so terrible in history.

The nuclear blast flattens everything. It explodes with a blinding flash that can vapourize metal.

BLAST LEAVES NOTHING

The nuclear blast leaves nothing except a burned shadow, explained the speaker, in referring to the Hiroshima shadow of a woman and child caught in the blast.

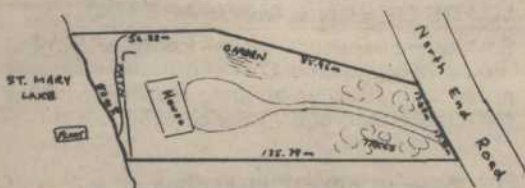

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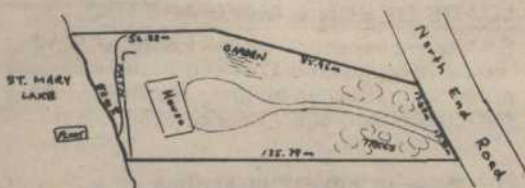
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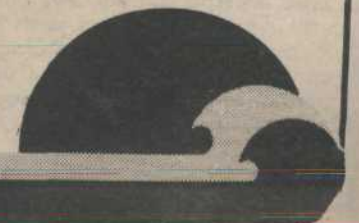

CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT BY-LAW NO. 847

A BY-LAW TO ESTABLISH THAT PORTION OF THE SALT SPRING ISLAND ELECTORAL AREA SERVED BY THE HIGHLAND WATER SYSTEM AS A SPECIFIED AREA OF THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT FOR THE PURPOSE OF ESTABLISHING A WATER SUPPLY AND DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

WHEREAS the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District has been requested to establish a specified area known as Highland Water System on Salt Spring Island, and hereinafter described for the purposes of acquiring and improving, operating and maintaining a water supply and distribution system in the said specified area;

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board is empowered with respect to that part of the Regional District not within a city, district, town or village to undertake any work or service under the provisions of Part XVI of the Municipal Act;

AND WHEREAS to provide for the acquiring, improving, operating and maintaining of a water supply and distribution system it is estimated that an amount of \$358,000.00 will be required, which is the amount of debt intended to be created by this by-law;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the debenture debt of the Regional District incurred pursuant to Section 797 of the Municipal Act is \$62,365,681.56 as at 31 December, 1980 of which \$41,085,249.34 is existing outstanding debenture debt and \$21,280,432.22 is authorized and unissued debenture debt, and none of the principal or interest of the debenture debt of the Regional District is in arrears;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the authorized debenture debt of the Regional District incurred pursuant to Section 798 of the Municipal Act is \$26,475,413.22 as at 31st December, 1980, of which \$26,475,413.22 is existing and outstanding debenture debt and nil is authorized and unissued debenture debt and none of the principal or interest of the debenture debt of the Regional District is in arrears;

AND WHEREAS the approval of the Provincial Health Officer has been obtained;

AND WHEREAS the maximum term for which debentures may be issued to secure the debt created by this by-law is 25 years;

NOW THEREFORE the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. The Regional Board is hereby empowered and authorized:
 - (a) To establish in the Salt Spring Island Electoral Area a specified area to be known as the "Salt Spring Island Highland Water System Specified Area" and such area shall be as outlined and described in Schedules "A" and "B" attached hereto and forming part of this by-law.
 - (b) To undertake and carry out or cause to be carried out and provide water supply and distribution facilities for the said specified area and to do all things necessary in connection therewith including the acquisition, design, construction, operation and maintenance of water supply and distribution facilities generally in accordance with plans approved by the Provincial Health Officer and on file in the office of the Regional District and to do all things necessary in connection therewith, including operation and maintenance and without limiting the generality of the foregoing:
 - (i) to borrow upon the credit of the Regional District a sum not exceeding \$358,000.00.
 - (ii) To acquire all such real property, easements, rights-of-way, licences, rights or authorities as may be requisite or desirable for or in connection with the acquisition, design, construction, operation and maintenance of water supply and distribution facilities.
2. The cost of providing for the establishment of the aforesaid water supply and distribution facilities in the said specified area shall be borne by the owners of land in the said specified area and the Regional Board is hereby empowered to recover the said cost by means of the imposition of a user charge and/or frontage tax or parcel charge, as provided in the Municipal Act. Any deficiencies arising from a shortage of revenues generated by the aforesaid user charge and/or frontage tax or parcel charge shall be requisitioned in the manner prescribed in the Municipal Act on all lands and improvements on the basis of assessment as fixed for taxation purposes only by Special Act within the said specified area.
3. The said specified area established by this by-law may be merged with any other specified area or areas for the same purpose, whether contiguous or not, in the manner provided in Section 677 of the Municipal Act.
4. This By-law may be cited as "Salt Spring Island Highland Water System Specified Area Establishment and Loan Authorization By-law, 1981".

Down Through the Years With Driftwood

FIVE YEARS AGO

Chuck Longueay, the alternate Capital Region director, last week proposed that the CRD assume control of the government wharf at the Ganges small boat harbour. Longueay was taking part in a public meeting with fisheries and environment spokesman Rex Thurber, operations officer for the small craft branch, when he made the proposal. The meeting heard from three concerned groups, including commercial fishermen, private boat owners and live-aboards.

Five local trustees of the Islands Trust have been appointed by the Capital Regional Board to membership of the Advisory Planning Commission for the Outer Islands. Serving two-year terms will be Ron Thompson, of Galiano Island; Miss K.F. Miles, of Mayne Island; B.D. Crooks, of Saturna Island; G.L. Henshaw, of South Pender Island; and G.G. Wallace, of North Pender Island.

The Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission gave considerable discussion to the idea of merging into the Capital Regional District at its annual meeting last week. Regional director George Heinekey reminded the commission that last year it had agreed to come under the regional district. Under the CRD there would be eight commission members to serve two-year terms. Tom Marcus, commission chairman, stated that he had been taken aback at an earlier suggestion by Heinekey that he would choose members from a list of nominations.

A 25-year-old Salt Spring Island man has been arrested by Victoria RCMP in connection with charges that he faces in Richmond and in Toronto. There was also a warrant issued for his arrest in 1974 in Newfoundland, where the man is wanted for conspiracy to traffic narcotics. He will be returned to Newfoundland to face charges there. The man has been residing at Burgoyne Bay for the past several months.

Regional director George Heinekey drew a pall of gloom over the forthcoming Lions recreation complex referendum when he told the Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission that there is no guarantee that the new provincial government will meet recreation grants introduced by the NDP government. The referendum is being presented by the CRD.

TEN YEARS AGO

The Salt Spring Island Planning Association heard a report on the cost of transporting water, during Monday night's meeting. Planners were told that the current cost amounts to \$15,000 per mile.

The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce has approved a resolution to the Board of Railway Commissioners which opposes a rate increase by the B.C. Telephone Co. until service on the

island is comparable with service offered in larger communities. Bob Blundell, at the Monday morning meeting, suggested that the telephone company's projected increases are not justified at this time in view of the financial statement it has filed.

The Salt Spring Island Planning Association heard a report at Monday night's meeting that the names of Fulford-Ganges Road, Upper Ganges Road and Lower Ganges Road were confusing. Suggestion was made that the main north-south road might be renamed Admirals Road, in keeping with the original name of the island.

Shipment of oil from Alaska to Washington by means of a fleet of giant tankers has been protested by the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce. The chamber, on Monday, approved a resolution by Henry Schubart that the B.C. Chamber of Commerce be urged to express to the government its concerns about transporting oil to Puget Sound by tanker. The resolution also asks the provincial chamber of commerce to work with groups in the U.S. having similar aims.

The department of highways has announced plans to rebuild the ferry landing at Fulford Harbour, thereby refuting suggestions that it might favour moving the Salt Spring Island ferry terminal to Isabella Point, as has been proposed in the past. The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce has been among the staunchest supporters of moving the ferry terminal to Isabella Point.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Gulf Islands residents woke up Tuesday morning to find that nearly a foot of snow had fallen overnight and road crews were kept busy most of the day clearing snow from area roads. Rain and snow showers had been forecast for the area but the showers turned into a 12-hour snowfall that knocked out hydro lines here.

Fulford Harbour to Swartz Bay commuters won't be able to benefit from any extra speed that the Pender Queen might have since the ferry has been ordered to remain at each terminal for an extra five minutes and to reduce its speed. Seems the ferry has been making the trip too quickly.

The Beaver Point Community Hall Association plans to offer a regular schedule of Saturday night indoor bowling and any interested bowlers are invited to participate this week.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

Coast Ferries Ltd. has announced that it will discontinue service to Ganges because lack of business prohibits the Island Princess from continuing to call on Salt Spring Island. Service will end March 7. Replacing Ganges as a port of call will be Sidney.

Lieutenant-Governor George Pearkes has accepted an invitation from the Salt Spring Island branch of the Royal Canadian Legion to attend a dinner at Ganges later this month to mark the 30th anniversary of the branch. It will be Pearkes' first visit to the island since his appointment. The dinner is scheduled for March 18.

Pete Frattinger, owner of the Scott Point Marina, has been appointed by B.C. Forest Products as project manager of their newsprint expansion at Crofton. The new mill is scheduled for completion in 1964 and will use pulp from the present Crofton Pulp Mill.

Fined \$150 for two violations

A Salt Spring Island man saved \$135 in provincial court last Wednesday but he still received a \$150 fine and a 30-day suspended sentence as a result of driving without insurance and failure to display current licence plates on his vehicle.

Michael Maynard had told Judge Frederick Giles that his company owns a total of seven vehicles and that he was not aware that the one he was driving was not properly registered.

Judge Giles took Maynard's explanation into account when imposing sentence. Maynard, who pleaded guilty to both charges, could have received a \$250 fine for driving an uninsured vehicle and a \$35 fine for failure to display proper plates.

Maynard was stopped February 9 by Ganges RCMP while driving along Rainbow Road.

He told the court that he had been stopped by police officers while driving back to Salt Spring Island from Fort St. John, just prior to that date, and that they had pronounced his plates to be in order.

Case proceeds as judge accepts version of accused

Provincial court Judge Frederick Giles accepted a 17-year-old Ganges man's version of events Wednesday and went ahead with proceedings against him, despite the fact that information regarding the case was not then available to the court.

The court had thought that Dugan Ingram's appearance was to set a date on which to hear the case against him.

Ingram informed the court that he wished to plead guilty to the charge, however, and he requested

that the court hear his case at that time.

Judge Giles agreed to Ingram's request but said the court had not been prepared to proceed so soon and that information regarding the case was not then available.

Judge Giles told crown counsel that he believed the charge against Ingram was that he had been a minor on licenced premises when Ingram corrected him and stated that he believed the charge was a minor in possession of alcohol.

He was fined \$75.

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Road width battle continues

It's highway robbery—Hawksworth

Owners of property along roads connecting ferry terminals on Salt Spring Island are to be the victims of highway robbery, says Irene Hawksworth in her continuing battle against 80-foot road widths.

To date she has collected the names of 689 other concerned residents who share this opinion.

The department of highways changed its policy in 1974 concerning the right-of-way for roads in the province and regulations now state that roads must be 80 feet in width. Hawksworth has been fighting the department of highways over this issue for the last four years.

She would like to see the Gulf Islands exempted from this policy to prevent the department of highways from constructing roads of four lanes or more in the islands and to preserve the character of the area.

NO NEED

Hawksworth claims that there is no need for 80-foot roadways on Salt Spring Island and she says that the department of highways is trying to force its policy on residents here, whether they like it or not.

"The majority of the people on the island do not want an 80-foot right-of-way," said Hawksworth.

She has a copy of a letter addressed to the Islands Trust from the department of highways which explains that 80-foot rights-of-way are necessary in order to provide for future bikeways, equestrian paths, sidewalks or green buffer zones between road surfaces and property on either side of them.

The Salt Spring Island Planning Association, however, has received letters from Alec Fraser, minister of highways, which indicate that the department has no intention of providing bicycle paths on Salt Spring Island, according to Sabara Humes, a director of the association.

NOT ENOUGH DEMAND

She told *Driftwood* that these letters indicate that the department of highways feels that there is not sufficient demand to warrant spending money for bicycle paths in the province at this time.

Hawksworth also says that she sent a letter, dated October 6, 1980, and a copy of the petition to Fraser and that he assured her several weeks later that his staff would be informed of the opposition to the roadway issue on Salt Spring Island.

Fraser's response was in the form of a letter, dated October 16, according to Hawksworth.

She said that she spoke to Mic Elston of the engineering department of the highways ministry several weeks ago, and that he told her that he had heard of neither her letter nor the petition.

Hawksworth has since been unable to get in touch with Elston. **'ROBBING PEOPLE'**

She said that by enacting this policy, the department of highways is "robbing people of their property."

She said that the department has applied pressure to land owners on Salt Spring Island in the past to force them to give up property which the department had thought was necessary for road planning on the island.

"They call it negotiating, but I call it blackmail," said Hawksworth.

She also disagrees with the position taken by Salt Spring Island trustee David Lott, who has gone on record as saying he tends to sympathize with the government's new policy.

"It's not necessarily all bad provided they don't clear 80 feet," he said a few weeks ago during a public meeting.

As a trustee, Lott should conform to the position adopted by the Islands Trust, according to Hawksworth.

MAJORITY OPPOSED

"He was elected to serve the people of this island and the majority of people do not want 80-foot rights-of-way," she said.

Lott chose not to comment on this statement.

The Trust has taken the position that by allowing for 80-foot-wide roads, the highways department has left the door open for creation of wider and faster roads somewhere in the future.

Where Lott disagrees with the Trust is that he approves of 80-foot rights-of-way but only on the condition that the highways department not increase road surfaces beyond their present width.

He told *Driftwood* that 80-foot rights-of-way would provide a buffer zone between the actual roadway and adjoining property of either side and still leave room for future provision of sidewalks, bicycle paths, water lines and burial of power and phone lines.

WOULD ALLOW PATHS

He said that it's his understanding that the highways department is prepared to allow the community to install sidewalks or bikeway paths within the 80-foot perimeters of the roadways.

This would be the community's responsibility and not the high-

ways department's, according to Lott.

"They are not in the business of putting in pathways. If you want a sidewalk, you put it in yourself," he said.

Hawksworth said that she's pleased with the co-operation that she has received from the Trust office, but that the Trust wields little influence with the department of highways.

"The Trust doesn't want it either, but it can't get through to the department of highways. They are up against a powerful part of the government, and one that I think is too powerful," said Hawksworth.

She said that she sent the petition in to the Islands Trust office in Victoria several weeks ago and that the Trust will forward it to Fraser's office. While the petition is no longer in circulation, Hawksworth still expects to add several pages of names from the Outer Islands to the list.

"If I can't get any reaction from the minister of highways, I'm prepared to go from house to house," she said.

She estimates that her petition gathered names from more than 10% of the total Salt Spring Island population and that it should have some influence with the department of highways.

You caused it: you help cure it board tells province

Capital Regional Board has approved a resolution calling on the province for help in solving the acute water problems facing the Trincomali Subdivision on North Pender Island, which came about as a result of government sanction of the subdivision in the first place.

It was noted that the subdivision, with its water system, was approved by the provincial agencies. Trincomali was initiated before the formation of the regional districts or the Islands Trust.

Since its approval by the provincial government ministries, the subdivision has run short of water.

Last year the Trincomali Property Owners' Association asked the regional board to investigate the feasibility of taking over the water system. The investigation revealed an acute shortage of water during the summer months, the board was told last week.

The local works and services committee of the region prepared a plan for correction of the drought, but the cost was so high that the ministry of finance has withheld its required approval. The ministry finds the cost excessive.

The only means of supplying an adequate flow of water at a reasonable cost would be with government assistance.
