Commuter tickets are available on main runs

The B.C. Ferry Corporation has instituted no-time-limit commuter tickets but the Gulf Islands are not involved in the scheme.

The ferry company will sell a book of 12 tickets good on either the Tsawwassen-Swartz Bay or Horseshoe Bay-Departure Bay runs.

The tickets, for car and driver, cost \$168. There will also be booklets of 12 tickets for over-height vehicles, seven feet or over, and driver for \$198.

The book tickets represent a savings of \$24 on the current price for 12 single fares for car and driver of \$16 each. The over-height vehicles plus driver currently cost \$18.50.

The new fares are to go into effect September 1.

But the savings may not last too long as the board of directors of the company is considering raising the single trip fares as well as charging bicyclists. Other measures bandied about include the ending of the free ride between the Gulf Islands.

The ferry corporation lost almost 21% of its traffic following the recent shutdown forced by

striking government employees. Before the strike action the number of people and vehicles using the ferry boats had been down almost three per cent compared to the same period last year.

Letters now available here

Residents of the Gulf Islands can now apply for resident letters at the Swartz Bay and Long Harbour ferry terminals rather than the B.C. Ferry headquarters in downtown Victoria.

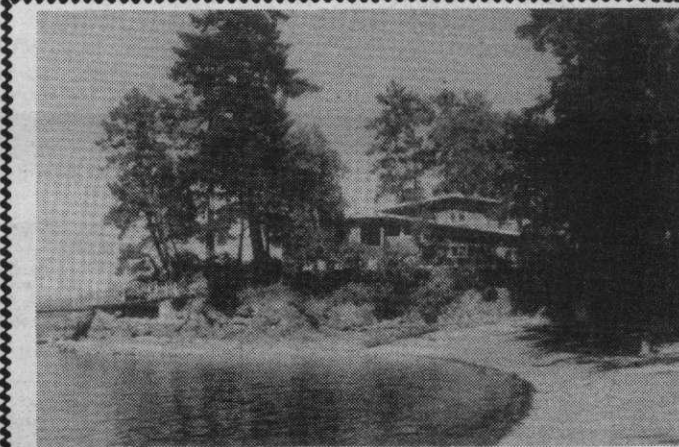

The identification letters, which entitle the holder to reduced fares, will be issued by the general office at both Swartz Bay and Long Harbour.

User fee to rise to \$2.50 an hour

Community groups in the Gulf Islands using school board facilities are being asked to help with the costs of heat and light but so far few groups have responded.

John Zacharias, chairman of the building and grounds committee of the board, said he has met with representatives of several groups and they agreed to help.

But, he told a recent board meeting, at least 13 community groups on Salt Spring Island did not attend the meeting and of the groups represented only two have responded by letter with a cheque attached.

The community groups are being asked to pay \$1 per hour of use of the facilities for 1982. The

Pender Island Recreation and Agricultural Hall Association had earlier given the school board a cheque for \$1,500 to cover the costs for the groups on that island.

He indicated that the board should get tough with those groups who have not yet agreed to the scheme.

"It's called mandatory, voluntary contributions," quipped school board chairman Strick Aust.

The board approved a resolution calling for a \$2.50 per hour charge for those groups who have not paid by September 30. The cost would cover use of facilities from September 1 to December 31.

Community groups who pay before the September 30 deadline will be charged only the \$1 fee.

Zacharias did not want the board to make the user fee a policy of the school district because he said the charge would remain forever. The intent of the scheme is to have the community groups help cover the energy costs for the facilities during the restraint period. When tight money times are over, said Zacharias, the charge will be dropped.

The user pay scheme does not apply to school or youth groups nor does it apply to the continuing education program.

While all of the groups contacted by Zacharias had agreed to the scheme, several representatives had apparently questioned the exemption for continuing education.

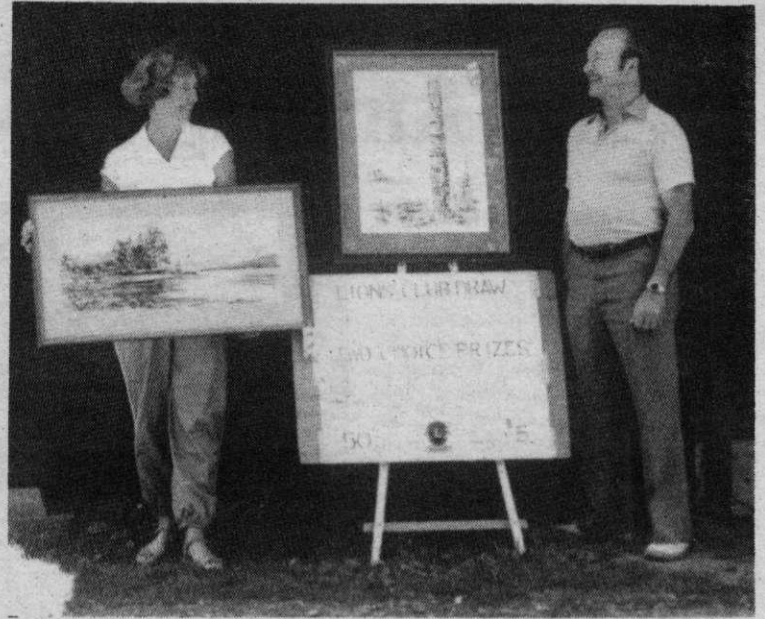
Zacharias asked the board to approve a resolution calling for an increase in fees for continuing education classes to cover the energy costs. There is, he suggested, a fine line between education and recreation.

He asked for the increase, he said, in order to be fair to everyone using school facilities.

Virginia Newman, director of continuing education for the Gulf Islands, told the trustees that the line between education and recreation had been set by the ministry. If a class has a paid instructor, regardless of the subject taught, it is considered education, otherwise it is recreation.

The board did not approve Zacharias' request for a continuing education fee increase. Aust said he considers the adult classes as a function of the board similar to the regular school classes.

"I don't see continuing education as a community organization," he said, "and I don't think it should pay on that basis."

Thomas Crosby greeted by 50

The *Thomas Crosby V* is heading to Ground Zero and the new moderator of the United Church of Canada, the Right Reverend Clark MacDonald, will be aboard.

The ship, which is the B.C. Conference of the United Church of Canada's coastal mission boat, was in Ganges last week. The visit to Salt Spring Island was part of a 17-port tour which began August 19 and ends September 4 when the *Crosby* returns from Bangor, Washington.

The focus of the exercise is a protest against the arming of the Trident submarine, *Ohio*, with missiles containing nuclear warheads.

At the wharf to greet the *Crosby* were Jim Manly, MP for Cowichan, Malahat and the Islands, as well as representatives of the Salt Spring parishes, Olive Mout, United Church, David Stacey, Anglican, and Don Erickson of the Salt Spring Nuclear Disarmament Committee.

Manly told the approximately 50 people who greeted the boat that the nuclear weapons issue did not come down to one of good guys or bad guys. The people who wanted the *Ohio* armed were similar to the people who were against it, he said.

The main difference, said Manly, was that their politics were wrong and "stupid."

He called for a voice of the people in the issue. "Let's not leave this question up to a few frightened politicians," he said, "let the people speak."

Captain Oliver Howard of the *Crosby* thanked the people who attended the gathering. He said the *Crosby* would be in Bangor waters to sail past the base and "show our banner there."

The efforts of the *Crosby*, "represent the official view of the United Church of Canada," he said, "that Canada should be nuclear free and the world should get on with building peace."

'Arts funding should be accepted expenditure'

Order of Canada recipient and member of the Canada Council, Dr. Elizabeth Lane is visiting Salt Spring Island this summer with her family.

Dr. Lane has been coming to Salt Spring since she was a child when she would come with her parents to their summer home at the north end. This year, Dr. Lane comes with her two children and husband, Bill, to visit her mother, Mrs. T.H. Greer.

Dr. Lane has been involved in civic arts since she was married in Vancouver 25 years ago.

She studied chemistry at UBC and went to work on the atomic energy project at Chalk River, Ontario, following her graduation. After a brief stint in England, Dr. Lane returned to Canada.

Dr. Lane has been president of the Community Arts Council in Vancouver as well as being B.C. member on the national Canada Council. Dr. Lane was chairman of the Vancouver Museum Association and was also on the board of the Vancouver Playhouse. She was member of the board of the Vancouver Art Gallery and was chairman of the Leon Thea Koerner Foundation, a private Vancouver foundation.

FIRST CHAIRMAN

When the NDP government set up an advisory board for the British Columbia Arts Board, Dr. Elizabeth Lane was the first chairman of the board. The advisory board is still functioning

well, Dr. Lane explained, and its work is to advise the provincial secretary about the allocation of grants to applicants in the province.

At present, Dr. Lane is working on the Federal Cultural Policy Review Committee which is in its third year studying the federal policy on culture. Otherwise known as the Applebomb committee, the board is in the midst of preparing a report for the government, planned to be completed this fall on cultural funding in Canada.

The arts in Canada are currently funded by private donors, corporations, box-office support and government money.

While elsewhere the arts receive a high rate of government support, Canadian culture lives on a slim diet. Across Europe, theatre, music, dance and visual arts all

enjoy government support. In Canada, such funding as the uncertain B.C. Lottery money permits survival of the civic arts.

"At present," Dr. Lane explained, "arts in B.C. are more or less being supported by lottery funds. I would like to see the arts as being an accepted expenditure in this province...."

FUNDING DOWN

And because of the present recession, lottery funds are down. As a result art activities in the province are therefore inconsistent.

While theatre survives on roughly 50% box office support and 50% subsidy, 25% of the 50% subsidy is government money

"TV now is neither enlightening nor entertaining and I'd certainly like to see the quality of TV improved. But we're moving into a highly technical age. With television, satellite, video and the opening up of the technological field, we will be relying on products made by creative people presented on screens by creative people," Dr. Lane stated. "The arts and communications industry is going to have a larger role to play and Canadians have to be given the chance to play those parts either in the area of software or programming, and hardware, or the actual 'stuff' which is put on to screen.

"The purpose of the CRTC is to give Canadians the opportunity to develop the skills and competence to work competitively with international artists. If they're

never given the opportunity to work and to be noticed and supported by Canadians, Canada will continue to be a culturally illiterate nation."

Such rock and roll groups as Doug and the Slugs have succeeded because of regulations set by the CRTC on Canadian programming in Canada.

AWARDED TO 15%

Grants given by the Canada Council are probably awarded to only 15% of the applicants, Dr. Lane continued. There are more applicants from the visual arts world and decisions to allocate grants are made by juries who are professionals in the particular field from which the applicant comes.

"The juries on the Canada Council have a wide perspective and they recommend applicants to the arts advisory council. The system generally works well," Dr. Lane explained. "The system of giving out grants should be controversial. Art is a controversial subject.

"I think that there is a much bigger resource of people interested in the arts in Canada than people realize," she said. "The arts receive a lot more support than we commonly accept. Even the production of regional crafts has added to a resourcefulness in culture we didn't formerly have."

But fine arts dwell in more urban locations, Lane said. Art, in general, requires a fusion of support that rural areas can't give.

WILL ALWAYS BE NEEDED

"I think that there will always be needed government patronage in the arts," Dr. Lane concluded. "Although more and more people are buying paintings by Canadians either for investment purposes or for personal enjoyment, artists cannot be financially supported by the sale of a painting or the presentation of a play."

At present, Dr. Lane's concerns lie with the culture policy review report and seeing that it is completed this fall.

She is also concerned with the importance of art in education. With the newly founded Arts in Education Council, Dr. Lane hopes to see fine arts at senior levels in high school included as credit courses.

It is presently the concern among school teachers and universities that the fine arts are not counted as credit courses but are left as electives in senior high schools.

"You have first-year university students who have never studied any form of art at all," Dr. Lane said. "The attitude that this is just a frill is one that must be broken."

There is a visual literacy program in Vancouver that is concerned with the fact that Canada is often seen as a visually illiterate nation.

Dr. Lane was awarded the Order of Canada due to her contribution to her community and her volunteer work at both provincial and federal levels in the arts world.

Warm welcome given to bishop on Saturday

Last Saturday the sun broke through the clouds in time to provide literal warmth in addition to the welcome given to Bishop Hywel Jones and his wife by the congregation of St. Margaret's Church at an evening supper party at the home of Wendy and Kendall Roberts.

The Bishop and Mrs. Jones, accompanied by Galiano's rector John Dyer and his wife, were able to converse with the parishioners while enjoying a home-cooked meal in the beauty of the Roberts' sea-side setting.

After staying the night in Betty and Hall Tingley's home overlooking Whaler Bay the bishop took the morning service at St. Margaret's, and administered holy communion aided by Rev. Dyer with Richard Bice as altar boy.

Bishop Jones' sermon, based on a prayer from the communion service, was particularly apt at its theme as developed from the literal translation of "communion" as "together as one," towards living harmoniously together, in everyday life on Galiano and in the wider community of the church universal.

Bill Hansom

Later that same day, at 3 pm, the crowded pews of St. Margaret's Church were fitting testimony to the integrity of Bill Hansom, island electrician and former fire captain, who died last Friday in the peace of his home overlooking Whaler Bay.

During the long months of his illness Bill's courage has been matched by that of his wife Dorothy for the Hansoms were blessed by a most happy marriage. In addition Bill enjoyed the love of his children to a degree not always encountered today. This was evident in last Sunday's service planned by the family, when his simple hand-crafted coffin was carried into the church by the young men of his family.

Dr. George Morrison, who had become a family friend when he came from Mayne last December to conduct a family wedding in their home, returned on Sunday to lead a moving service stressing Bill's innate conviction of the importance of family life.

Warren Wilson, friend and fellow fire captain, spoke the words of farewell on his own behalf and for the others present. Many individuals and groups on Galiano can underline Warren's words that Bill was, in the best sense of the word, a true friend.

Dr. J.M. Hales

This week Dr. John Hales formally begins general practice on Galiano. Dr. Hales received his medical training at Sydney University, Australia, and after graduating spent two years in general medicine and surgery,

before specializing in pediatrics with residencies in Australia, Nigeria and as chief resident in Vancouver where he continued his studies in child neurology.

He is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians (Canada). For the past two years he has been living on Galiano and become known to many islanders through sharing in the general practice calls, in addition to acting as consulting pediatrician to the Gulf Islands.

Dr. Hales' office will be in his home, the former Farmhouse Inn, which is reached via Burrill Road, left along Jack Drive and then turning right down Farmhouse Road. On Tuesdays Dr. Hales will be lecturing in pediatrics at the University of British Columbia, and on Thursdays will continue his pediatric consulting work on the Gulf Islands.

For the remainder of the week he will be available on Galiano. John's wife Wendy will provide 24-hour answering service for emergency calls through their telephone number, 539-2735. Office hours are announced elsewhere in *Driftwood* but Dr. Hales would appreciate appointments being made for all non-emergency visits and consultations.

Biological Compasses

Alan Steward has drawn attention to a fascinating article in *The Field* (May 12-18, 1982), a country-life magazine from Britain.

How birds and insects find their way across thousands of miles of featureless ocean or complicated landscapes to a precise destination has puzzled man for centuries. Recent scientific research has revealed that certain creatures may have as many as four "compasses" built into their brain structure. A compass suggests to most people a device utilizing the earth's magnetic field to find direction, and this kind of compass has been detected in the brains of pigeons, robins, butterflies and bees in the form of micro-crystals of the magnetic oxide of iron. In 1981 a weaker magnetic compass was discovered in man which he has apparently lost the ability to use.

Many migrating bird species have a sun or star-compass and become disoriented if the sky is obscured by cloud. Some young birds who migrate separately from their parents have their compass-bearing encoded in their genes. Others, such as geese, may learn how to navigate from older members of the flock.

A remarkable new direction-finder has recently been discovered

in butterflies. With their compound eyes insects are able to detect polarized light, so the whole sky becomes a beacon with maximum intensity where the earth's axis intercepts the celestial sphere.

The article, written by Andrew Allen, concludes that "the animal brain is a marvel of miniaturization and micro-electronic wizardry."

Back Breaks

One of the most dangerous of all fractures is that of the spine. Twice this year there have been examples of this injury on Galiano.

Alfred and Synnove Angelfoss with their children Hilde and Erlung, of Alesund in Norway, were visiting Canada this summer and staying with the Dodwells at Cain Point.

Florence Dodwell, who has Norwegian ancestry, is related to Alfred. The accident occurred to Alfred when he was cruising in Charlie's boat in Active Pass. One of the recently enlarged ferries turned sharply into the pass and its bow wave threw Alfred to the deck of the boat.

The cause of the acute pain that resulted was only discovered two days later at University of British Columbia Hospital, where Alfred was forced to spend most of his vacation flat on his back to allow the cracked vertebra time to knit together. He had to lengthen his holiday until he was fit enough to travel back to Norway. This is no way to extend a vacation!

Islanders may recall that last February Roy Treloar was involved in an automobile accident, and as a result had to undergo spinal fusion of the fifth and sixth cervical vertebrae, a procedure which usually induces overgrowth of scar tissue.

Quite recently an operation to reduce this overgrowth has been devised. The technique is to insert a sliver of crustacean matter into the weld. The operation is being developed by a Vancouver Island neuro-surgeon, Mr. Burnett, and a marine biologist from the University of Victoria.

As Roy himself is a professional diver who is interested in marine life, frequently eats sea food and spends as much time in the water as he can, he thinks it particularly appropriate that he can now dive again — thanks to a crustacean!

Gas to cost 71.7¢ a litre by 1987

Ouch. Gas prices rose Monday and will continue to soar until the price at the pump as of March 1, 1987, will be close to 71.7 cents per litre.

The increases stem from a five-year energy agreement between the federal and British Columbia governments signed last September. The current increase stands at 2.6¢ per litre for gasoline. Future increases will vary and are based on projections of the "best available figures at the time of the agreement," according to a spokesman for the federal ministry of energy, mines and resources.

Home heating oil has also been affected with the price on Salt Spring Island standing at about 32¢ per litre. Residents of Mayne should be paying about 37¢ for each litre of home heating oil. No price was available for the other islands.

At the gas pumps, the price for various gasolines varies with the dealer involved. The Gulf station in Ganges now sells regular gas for 46.6¢ per litre, up from 44.1. Unleaded gasoline at the Gulf station goes for 50.1¢ while the marked gas sells for 43.1¢. Diesel fuel is priced at 45.1¢.

Across the street at the Shell station, the price on the pumps

reads 47.1¢ for regular, 52.4¢ for unleaded and 46.7¢ for a litre of marked gasoline.

The Ganges Esso station sells regular gasoline for 46.6¢, unleaded for 49.9¢, diesel for 47.6¢ and marked gasoline for 44.9¢.

The Esso station at Fernwood has increased the price to 48.5¢ for regular, and 49.9¢ for unleaded.

At Patterson's gas bar in Fulford, which sells Shell products, the price hike was not in effect because the pumps are the outdated gallon pumps and the price only goes to \$1.98. The new price of gasoline puts it above \$2 per gallon. They are awaiting new pumps from Shell before putting up the price.

On Mayne Island, the price at the pumps of the Esso station now reads 49.9¢ per litre for regular gasoline.

The price of gas on Saturna Island at the Saturna Point Marina now stands at 51.9¢ per litre while home heating oil from that island's Esso dealer has been set at 38.9¢ per litre.

Chevron at the Galiano garage has not raised the prices at the pumps as yet. They have been

selling gasoline for 45.5¢ for regular and 60¢ for unleaded.

On Pender Island, the Driftwood Centre sells regular for 46.6¢ and unleaded for 47.6¢. The price has not yet gone up there either.

The agreement between the two governments means the price of petroleum products increases every six months, in June and December. The price hike reaches the public 60 days after each scheduled raise.

By March 1, 1983, the pump price will be 43.9¢ per litre at a Vancouver service station. The Gulf Islands prices have traditionally been higher than prices elsewhere.

By September of 1984, the price will be located in the vicinity of 54.8¢ for each litre pumped into a gas tank.

The 1987 price, as projected, could see the cost of gasoline standing at \$3.26 per gallon in Vancouver and even higher in the Gulf Islands.

The B.C. agreement follows the lines of a similar pact between the federal government and Alberta. The entire program is geared to

bringing the price of Canadian oil up to 75% of the world price.

The extra money generated is split proportionately between the federal and provincial governments and the oil producers. The bucks are supposed to be an incentive to promote further exploration for and development of oil reserves as well as to supply the governments with added revenue.

If the world price should stabilize or be reduced, the agreement calls for a reduction in the projected price increases to keep the Canadian price at the 75% level. The Canadian price should not exceed that figure, according to the agreement.

No bus service for south end kindergarten pupils

Parents of kindergarten pupils from Fulford will be offered transportation assistance and urged to form car pools to convey the children to school this fall.

The Gulf Islands School Board approved a motion to that effect at the recent meeting of trustees. Letters have been sent to the parents involved explaining the situation.

The government-imposed restraint program has forced the school board to take a close look at the budget for transportation and the trustees agreed that the assistance payments would be less expensive than having a bus run to the south of the island.

If the run were to be made, the trip would mean using an extra bus and paying the driver for extra hours of work.

"It all boils down to money,"

said Mayne Island trustee Jeannine Dodds.

Parents are being urged to form car pools because of the limited amount of money available in the transportation assistance portion of the budget.

Registration for kindergarten pupils takes place the first week of school beginning September 7 and until the sign-up is complete, the number of pupils for the classes is not known.

Charles Hingston, Salt Spring Island trustee who lives in Fulford, agreed with the need to save money wherever possible but suggested that the secretary-treasurer, Amy MacLeod, keep a close watch on the situation.

If matters changed and a bus run becomes financially feasible, he said, the board should consider the option.

Pharmacy Facts by Les Ramsey, Pharmacist, Ganges Pharmasave.



This article is concerned with the treatment of wasp and bee stings.

The difference between these two stinging insects is that the bee leaves his stinger imbedded in the victim's skin, and afterward dies; whereas the wasp can use its stinger over again. This difference necessitates a difference in treatment.



With a bee sting, the difficult part is removing the stinger. Using a gentle scraping motion over the affected area, with a fingernail or tweezers, carefully dislodge the stinger and slowly pull it out. The reason for this is that the sac containing the venom is found at the tip of the stinger. If the area is squeezed, the venom may be released. Apply a paste of meat tenderizer (papain) in water (e.g., 1/4 tsp. in 1-2 tsp. water) to relieve pain. Leave the paste on as long as necessary, then wash with soap and water. An antihistamine such as ChlorTripolon or Tavist can be taken as well to help ease the swelling.

For wasp stings, where removal of a stinger is not involved, take an antihistamine immediately and apply ice packs to the affected area.



The treatments suggested above apply to people who are not allergic to insect stings. Those who are should not attempt to treat themselves. Instead, they should be rushed to the nearest doctor or emergency ward; similarly those whose stings become uncommonly irritating and swollen.
