It was a great start for the season with a steady performance from the whole team. To single out any individuals would be really unfair - although a juicy kiss and big hug should go to Boom Boom and Terry for organizing the whole

We certainly could use a few more high school girls to balance out the seniors' league. Can't let the guys have it all their way, gals. They need some stiff competition to keep 'em in line.

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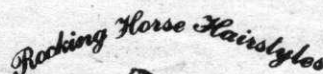

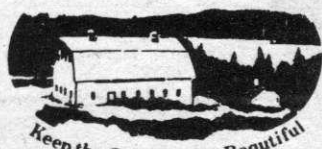

Salt Spring's soccer teams completed their third weekend and again came up with mostly wins as they continue to be impressive in the early going.

For the Kicks and the Strikers the wins gave them three in a row and top honours in divisional standings to date.

The Wranglers have two wins and look strong for contention in Division 4. The Sting's win was their first after one tie and a loss and puts them back in their race. The Sockeyes' loss was their first in three games and only came due to a late goal from Saanich.

At the intra-island level it is too early to pick contenders as the teams still have to settle down. Some teams can still use players so

Due to the growth of the sport and the whole program on Salt Spring the financial burden the executive faces has grown tremendously in recent years. This year we budgeted \$14,000 to cover all aspects of our program from balls, uniforms and referees' fees to clinics, tournaments and our banquet at year's end.

With the economic recession upon us it becomes more difficult for an association such as ours to raise the funding necessary to cover costs. In order to help ourselves meet our full commitment we are trying to cut back on some of our costs but with the growing number of

participants this becomes difficult to achieve.

Our association has always raised about 75% of its funds through its members. This amount comes from registration fees, the Kick-A-Thon program and any other fund-raisers our teams hold. The Kick-A-Thon program is our major fund-raiser.

The Kick-A-Thon is a program whereby our players collect sponsors based on their ability to kick a ball for distance. What they raise is based on the distance they can kick a ball and 25% is applied as a credit to each player to be used to purchase soccer equipment they may require.

The other 75% goes directly to the club.

This year our first prize goes to the team that raises the most money and it will be tickets for all players and coach to a Whitecaps game.

The club has to try to raise the remaining funding from the community through sponsorships, grants and donations. This year it

means we must raise \$3,500, not an easy chore.

To date we have received some sponsorships but we drastically need more, hopefully one for each of the 18 teams.

Our association has several levels of sponsorship and to get full details please call Becky Legg.

It becomes very obvious that the success of our program is determined to some degree on the support we can receive from the community.

Why not come out to Portlock Park on a Saturday morning and see the rewards our program brings to the youth on Salt Spring and then help as a sponsor or through a donation or just support the kids through the Kick-A-Thon.

Every little bit will ensure our 200-plus players get a solid program for the coming year.

it away for the goal.

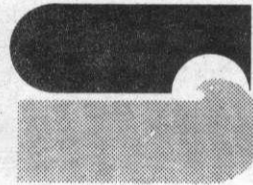

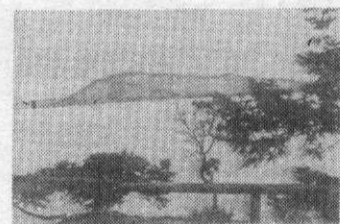

GALIANO NEWS

New schedule causing widespread dissatisfaction

The recent publication of the winter schedule of the B.C. Ferry Corporation has led to widespread dissatisfaction on Galiano Island. This has produced letters and phone calls of complaint to Frank Ramsay of the ferry corporation, to Oswald New as chairman of the Galiano Island Chamber of Commerce and to Island Trustees.

The officials of B.C. Ferries want all representation from Gulf Islanders routed through the Islands Trust. Negotiating with B.C. Ferries on behalf of residents of the Gulf Islands was not originally considered part of the Islands Trust mandate, and to mediate between a crown corporation trying to impose a restraint program and irate islanders is an unenviable and thankless task of which the Trust would be happy to rid itself.

On Galiano the Chamber of Commerce has been historically the body to represent island views on the ferry system to the government or the corporation. It appears that it is still willing to do this, and to that end called a general meeting.

Added to the head table of the chamber executive committee were Christa Weiss, Galiano Island Trustee, and Art Woods, benign Lion that he is, representing Clanton Road Highways Department, as a tribute to the Lions Club contribution to the opening up of that valuable short-cut to and from North Galiano.

ANIMOSITY EVIDENT

There is, unfortunately, perceptible animosity towards the Islands Trust from some members of the chamber executive. Both Island Trustees and the president of the Chamber of Commerce had draft copies of the winter schedule at least a month before it was published, and either could have taken steps to consult the public.

That neither did so until the schedule was already in print is a disservice to the people of Galiano, which may have been one reason why the ferry schedule provided to the residents of Galiano is obviously inferior to that provided to Mayne with its considerably lesser population.

As the meeting progressed complaints began to take the form of resolutions asking the ferry corporation to make changes in the current winter schedule. Most requests were based on personal inconvenience already experienced from changes brought into effect.

Weekend sailings were the source of most beefs. In fact, the more than 50 residents present

voted unanimously in favour of continuing the Monday to Thursday sailings through Friday and Saturday. The Friday evening ferry now leaves Tsawwassen for Galiano at 6:45 pm. Many working people are unable to arrive at the Tsawwassen terminal in time to claim their reservations, as the journey from town involves bucking heavy rush-hour traffic and they are unable to leave their work by mid-afternoon.

In addition, there is an inconvenient and ridiculous ticket purchase system in operation.

NO MORNING FERRY

Should weekenders miss the Friday evening ferry they are unable to take the Saturday morning ferry since it no longer calls at Sturdies Bay. Their next opportunity to arrive on Galiano is at 1:15 pm on Saturday afternoon. Returning, unless they are prepared to wait for the late ferry, they must leave Sturdies Bay before noon Sunday, reducing their weekend to less than 24 hours.

This scheduling also has a detrimental effect on the real estate business as clients coming to the island to view property usually did so on these cancelled weekend sailings.

For travellers to Victoria the removal of the 8 am sailing on Saturday deprives Galiano children of the opportunity to attend cultural activities in Victoria such as music lessons at the Conservatory. Working adults are prevented from conducting business with financial institutions which usually close at noon.

The Swartz Bay schedule limits the possibility of weekend visits from family or friends living in the Victoria area. The revised Sunday schedule will prevent the priest in charge of Mayne and Galiano Anglican parishes from conducting Sunday services in both churches.

RAYS OF REALITY

Occasional rays of reality illuminated the gloom of complaints and demands. Linda Laughlin conceded that if the 8 am sailing to Swartz Bay was restored islanders should offer to give up the 10 am sailing. Others acknowledged that this was a period of austerity, and ferry passengers must expect and be willing to suffer some inconvenience to help the corporation save money.

It is obvious that, at least on Galiano, the mechanism for communication between the ferry corporation and the island population is not working well. The revival of the Outer Island Transport Committee might help,

and the Islands Trust might well consider getting out of the role of apologist for ferry schedules.

Meanwhile, it might be helpful if the Chamber of Commerce tried to develop more amicable co-operation with the Trust, including fairer treatment of its representative at meetings, so that both bodies could exert pressure to improve the schedule for Galiano.

Good Show

We are happy to announce that a second Good Show Pin has been awarded to a Galiano Islander, Linda Simpson, who has been part of the local B.C. Ferries staff for two years as well as being a volunteer ambulance driver.

Linda was pleased to receive the pin and a letter of congratulation from the premier. The kindness and courtesy shown by our Galiano ferry people and the crews of the ships on which we sail help to mitigate the inconveniences caused by schedules and the sometimes insensitive actions of administration.

Driftwoods Adrift

Many residents of Galiano did not receive their copies of *Driftwood* until Saturday or, at the north end, Monday of this week. Efforts by *Driftwood* staff, the crew of the *Queen of Sidney* and Galiano columnists ensured that Galiano outlets got their papers by Friday evening or at the latest, early Saturday morning, but this was too late for the favourite shopping day, Friday.

Postmaster Jim Ripley was able to ascertain by Saturday that most copies of *Driftwood* destined for Galiano subscribers had gone first to Pender Island.

Big Band Delights Audience

The Dance Component of the Whalley Legion Junior Band provided music for a successful dance sponsored by the Galiano Chamber of Commerce on Saturday. This band of young musicians plays in the big band style popular from the 20's to 50's.

Six saxophones produced that nostalgic mellow sound and a variety of brass instruments added exciting tonal colour to the ensemble. Many of the older folk present were content to listen to music which evoked memories of their youth.

The younger crowd enjoyed the dancing both to modern rhythms and the old-time swing. Mary Knowles won the door prize, and Ron Minette was the fortunate raffle winner of the much coveted Ian Hooley sculpture.

Anti-nuclear Group Meets

The local peace group has met twice this past week to expedite the holding of a referendum in conjunction with the November municipal election. They feel that people on the Gulf Islands should have the same opportunity, that many other Canadians will have in major centres across the country, to encourage the government to make every effort to halt the spread of nuclear weapons and develop procedures for the reduction of nuclear arms.

Last Monday the members of the peace group were able to discuss with Fu-zen Sun from China the Chinese attitude to nuclear weapons and also to ask him about life in modern China.

Fu-zen teaches English in the

foreign language department of Shandong University and has been studying at Simon Fraser University for the past two years.

Ducks Unlimited was initiated during the depression years when the destruction and neglect of large breeding and nesting areas resulted in a decline of migratory bird populations.

The project called for raising funds by donation within the United States to help with the restoration of waterfowl habitats in Canada. More than 70% of the wildfowl in North America originate in Canada. The procedure adopted was to invite land easements from government agencies and private owners in order that funds were devoted to improvements and not to land

purchase.

In 45 years Ducks Unlimited has constructed over 1,800 waterfowl habitat projects including 600 in

Alberta.

OVER \$100 MILLION

The organization has raised over \$100 million in the United States for improvements in Canada. Today there are 6,000 Canadians listed as supporters of the scheme. There are also 13 fund-raising committees in the country.

On Salt Spring Island there is a small fund-raising committee, headed by Gerry Bourdin, Les Ramsey, Bruce Fiander, Don Harrison and Jack Reynolds.

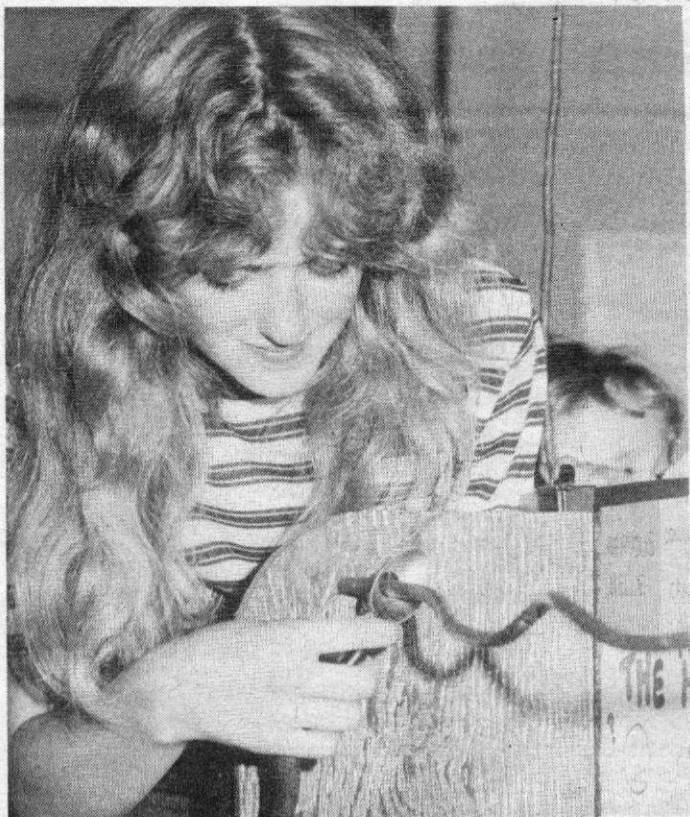

Pender meeting hears ferry report

At the Pender Trust Committee meeting last Friday, Bill Norton, trustee for South Pender Island, gave a detailed report on the latest ferry schedule for Pender Islands.

Norton and Ed Williams of Mayne Island are co-chairmen of the Outer Islands Trust Ferry Committee.

The B.C. Ferry Corporation earlier in the year asked for input from the public regarding the service and the Islands Trust was asked by the organization to convey the input.

"The early-morning boat, the *Vesuvius*, was arriving too late to get the students for Parkland to school on time. This has now been corrected and it will arrive earlier which will allow it to dock and get away before the *Sidney* arrives. Previously the two boats arrived at the same time and the *Vesuvius* had to wait for the *Sidney*," said Norton.

The Parkland students from Pender can now come home every afternoon at 3:30 pm via the *Mayne Queen* from Swartz Bay, but some afternoons they will have to make a longer trip via two other islands. They will still be home

earlier than some days on previous years when they had to wait for the 6:15 pm sailing, arriving at Pender at 7 pm or later.

There was a complaint from the audience that there was now no early-morning ferry from Tsawwassen on Sunday. It means that visitors from the mainland can no longer come to Pender for the day.

Asked if a major vessel could not stop at Pender some of the time to fill in the gaps, Norton replied it was much too expensive.

Norton hopes that the schedule can be adjusted to provide a 3:15 pm ferry from Swartz Bay on Friday afternoon direct to Pender. It was noted that 17 cars were left

behind at Swartz Bay at 6:15 pm Friday and presumably had to stay overnight.

A charge of assaulting a police officer brought another six-month

sentence and a further charge of resisting arrest resulted in a one-month sentence.

The various sentences will run concurrently which means Hamilton-Horne must serve nine months.

While he was in court last week, Hamilton-Horne also heard more charges read against him. He is also charged with five counts of uttering forged cheques as well as a single count of stealing more than \$200.

The new charges come about following a series of incidents last April.

Driftwood editor Woody Fisher returned to the pages of the paper, if only in print. He produced a front-page explanation of his absence which also thanked those who kept the paper going while he recuperated.

Fifteen years ago

Salt Spring Island residents were asked to choose which source of water was preferred. Despite a price tag of up to \$100,000 for hook-up and equipment, Maxwell Lake, with no chlorination, was the choice over St. Mary Lake which would require the additive. The price for hook-up and equipment for St. Mary Lake was \$23,000. A public meeting heard arguments in favour and against both sources but the consensus seemed to favour Maxwell Lake water for residents of the north end of the island.

The Community Gospel Church on Salt Spring Island would be hosting a group of African missionaries. Any and all were invited to enjoy the pictures and music to be presented.

The Centennial Well on Mayne Island had not been officially opened but residents were making use of it in view of the water shortage elsewhere on that island. The official opening of the well was planned for Thanksgiving week.

The Galiano Club met to discuss

the happenings at the community hall. The group decided to replace the floor in the hall and had a bank account of \$9,000 to begin the project. More money would be needed to finish the floor, as planned, by the year end.

The Saturna Island Centennial project, a picnic park located behind the community hall, was approaching completion and the official opening was being planned to include all due pomp and ceremony.

The Gulf Islands Secondary School was making use of the new portable which had been leased and erected in an effort to cope with overcrowded conditions at the school.

Ten years ago

Signs of winter were seen on Salt Spring Island when snow appeared on the upper reaches of Mount Bruce during the week.

The Centennial Park Committee reported a deficit in the operations of the Ganges park for the summer. Revenues fell behind operating costs and the committee was looking for either donations or additional membership fees to cover the shortfall.

The Galiano Club met to discuss happenings at the community hall. The group decided to paint the hall and issued an invitation to all members to attend the brushing event.

The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce heard from its tourist committee that \$1,600 had been spent to print 2,000 brochures extolling the virtues of the island for visitors. The committee had had a total of \$2,000 to spend and the remainder will be put to use for tourist promotion and signs for the island.

Archdeacon Dr. Ray Horsefield retired from his position as head of the Salt Spring Island Anglican parish. He had arrived on Salt Spring seven years previous after having spent more than 30 years ministering to the Cree in Manitoba. The archdeacon and his wife, Elsie, moved to a house in Sidney.

Mayne Island Lions Club, in operation for only a short time, informed the Gulf Islands School Board that their next project would be an adventure playground for the Mayne school. The Lions members had donated an ambulance to the community and had decided to help the children enjoy the school yard as their new project.

Five years ago

The Gulf Islands School Board approved a motion to permit senior citizens to take continuing education courses free upon presentation of a Pharmacare card. Registration fees for members of the same family, to allow a reduction of 25% for two

registrations and 50% for more than two from the same family, was also approved in order to increase the number of participants in the night school courses.

The Gulf Islands Teachers' Association held its first general meeting on Salt Spring Island.

The Saturna Medical Services Committee held discussions with two doctors from Victoria about practicing at the community hall for two afternoons per month.

Salt Spring Elementary School offered a newly reglazed, refurbished and repainted face to the community.

The Gulf Islands Community Arts Council reported that 106 artisans exhibited their wares at the Artcraft '77. More than 4,200 people paid admission to the 10th version of the summer-long art show at Mahon Hall on Salt Spring Island.

Amendments to the Motor Vehicle Act made the wearing of seatbelts mandatory for most British Columbians as of October 1, 1977. The regulation applied to both driver and front-seat passenger and any violation of the regulations made the offender liable to a fine of up to \$100.

Speed limit signs in the province are undergoing a change to the metric system and the ministry of highways cautioned that all drivers would be responsible for driving at the new posted speeds.

The Island Conservation Group at Salt Spring Island will meet next Tuesday to hear a report on the recent Inter-Island Alliance meeting.

The alliance is a group of representatives of the islands within the Islands Trust area. It met at Yellow Point on Vancouver Island Saturday and Sunday.

Tuesday's meeting will also hear from the potential candidates for seats on the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee.

Meeting will be held at the Salt Spring Elementary School library at 8 pm.



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Schedule change would allow late sailings on weekends

Late evening ferry service from Swartz Bay to Salt Spring Island on Saturday and Sunday could be a possibility if union and management agree on a shift change.

Pat Tiernan of Salt Spring Island wrote to B.C. Ferry Corporation chairman Stuart Hodgson outlining a proposed schedule to allow a ferry to ply the water at 10:20 pm from Swartz Bay, Saturday and Sunday evening.

Tiernan's proposal would see the elimination of the early morning, 6:40 am sailing from Fulford to Swartz Bay as well as the dropping of the 7:20 am return service.

The dropping of the early ferries would allow ferry workers to report to work about one hour later than usual on the two days. The hour would be tacked on the late evening end of the second shift of those days to allow for the late ferry service. No overtime would result.

A union official had explained to Tiernan that the agreement with the ferry company called for 24 hours between starting times on shifts. Any deviation, said the union official, would mean workers would be paid overtime at double the rate.

Andy McKecknie, of the B.C. Ferry and Marine Workers Union, told *Driftwood* that union officials had preliminary discussions with ferry management on the subject and the matter would require a fair amount of flexibility on both sides.

Tiernan, in discussions with the union officials, had been told that the workers would welcome a later

starting hour on weekends.

Statistics on ferry use by sailings from log excerpt reports and computer printouts listing ticket sales at Swartz Bay indicate that the early sailings on Saturday and Sunday are not used to a great extent.

While the lists did not cover every day, the reports indicated that the greatest use of the early sailings occurred Saturday, April 24, 1982 when 17 passengers in seven vehicles left Fulford for Swartz Bay.

The largest use returning to the island on the 7:20 was the same day when 24 passengers and 15 vehicles were aboard.

On the other hand, the late sailings at 10:20 pm, which were cancelled earlier this year, showed usage of from 17 passengers and seven vehicles on January 22, 1982 up to a high of 94 passengers and 23 vehicles on May 21, 1982.

Hodgson was unavailable for comment on the proposal.

Tiernan said in the letter, "I can appreciate and in fact heartily endorse the need for restraint in all

government operations.

"However, I do not feel it is legitimate to worsen the quality of life for a community through the inflexible application of a policy when there are reasonable alternatives."

Workers in the Ganges outlet of the Vancouver Island food chain are not represented by a union.

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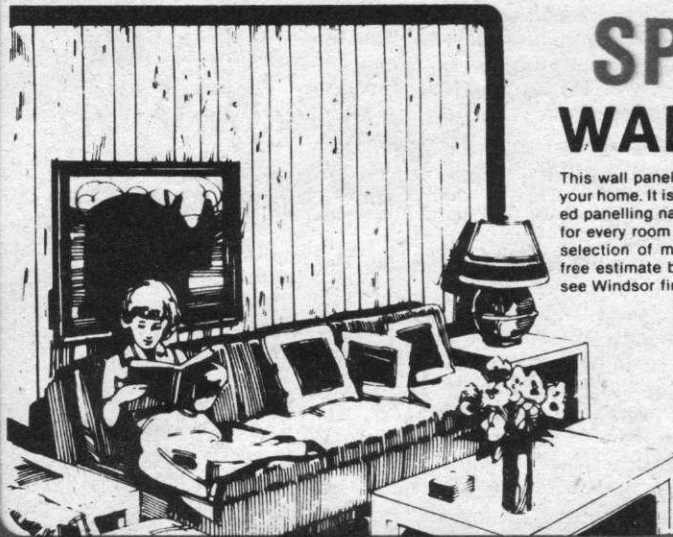


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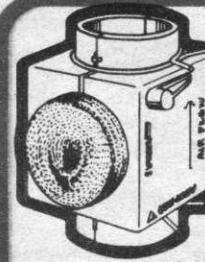
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
