

KATIMAVIK

They are seeing the problem of two languages

Second of three parts

Part of the Katimavik experience is billeting with families to allow the young participants a chance to learn how other people live.

The 14 Salt Spring Katimavik participants are looking forward to the opportunity, not only for experience but to leave the confines of the communal living at Cedar Beach Resort.

To date, those participants who have talked with *Driftwood* about the program have been unanimous in their enthusiasm for it. They are learning and growing as individuals; they are youth reaching for maturity.

A message coming clearly is that they are beginning to understand the Canadian problem of two languages. They live with it in the group and are reaching to overcome it.

Language difficulties notwithstanding, they learn in other ways as well. They learn to do without; they learn to make do with what is available.

Shaun Smith, 19, of Toronto, said, "It's up to ourselves."

He is taking a year out of school to join Katimavik to do things as well as to see western Canada. He hopes the experience will help when he returns to the education system in an art college. The school he has an eye on is in Nova Scotia.

HELPING AT FERNWOOD

While here on Salt Spring Island, he works in the gymnasium at Fernwood School helping the teachers supervise activities.

While he was in high school in North York, he learned about the program from former participants who came to the school to discuss it.

As an English-speaking Canadian from the largest city, he has come face to face with the language problem. He expressed the opinion that Katimavik could be a vehicle around that barrier if the project were to be split on a 50-50 basis between French and English Canadian youth.

Jean Boulanger, on the other hand, grew up with the problem. He is 18 and hails from Quebec City. Boulanger never spoke English in the Quebec capital. Katimavik has given him the opportunity to learn Canada's

other language.

"English is not the most favoured language in Quebec," he said with a gesture suggesting the firing of a handgun.

Boulanger read about the project in a French language magazine. He had been working in a restaurant as well as performing stunts as a disc jockey on radio and in a disco.

CHANCE TO GAIN EXPERIENCE

Jobs, he said, are scarce and he sees Katimavik as an opportunity to gain experience. As with most of the other young participants, he too is searching for greater understanding of himself.

Louise Charbonneau, 19, lives in the St. Alexander section of Montreal. She too did not speak very much English until Katimavik. As she talks, attempting to explain her feeling for the experience, she depends upon the translator to give her the proper word in English.

She graduated from high school and read about Katimavik in the French version of *TV Guide*.

"I like to travel," she said, although the trip to the west coast is her first long journey.

"I like to meet new people," she also said, but admitted difficulty in expressing herself confidently in English. Her work project at Greenwoods fits neatly into her wish to meet new people and she said she enjoys helping the residents.

The greatest enjoyment she has found so far in Katimavik, other than the companionship of the other participants, has been the airplane ride from Montreal.

Joanna Sevcik did not have to travel quite so far. The 19-year-old comes from Winnipeg.

She joined Katimavik because it offers her something to do while she makes a decision about adding to her high school education. Katimavik also allows her to learn to cope with other people.

LEARNING TO GIVE

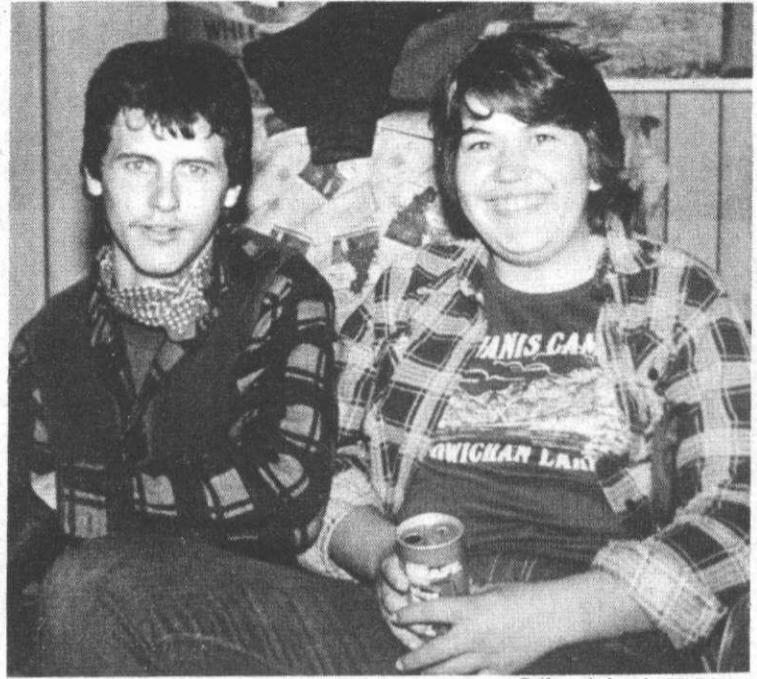
"It's different than at home," she said. "We have to cope with the difficulties and learn to give a little."

Her job is at Fernwood where she helps teachers in all grades. They are also teaching her how to operate an Apple computer so she can assist the students in learning about the machine.

Several of Sevcik's friends had been in Katimavik and she knew something about it but so far her experiences have proved to be far above her expectations.

When the group begins billeting October 24, they will be in a different learning experience.

The family which accepts a participant will share their home with the youth. Expenses such as food will be covered up to \$6 per day and the participant will also share work experience with the family.

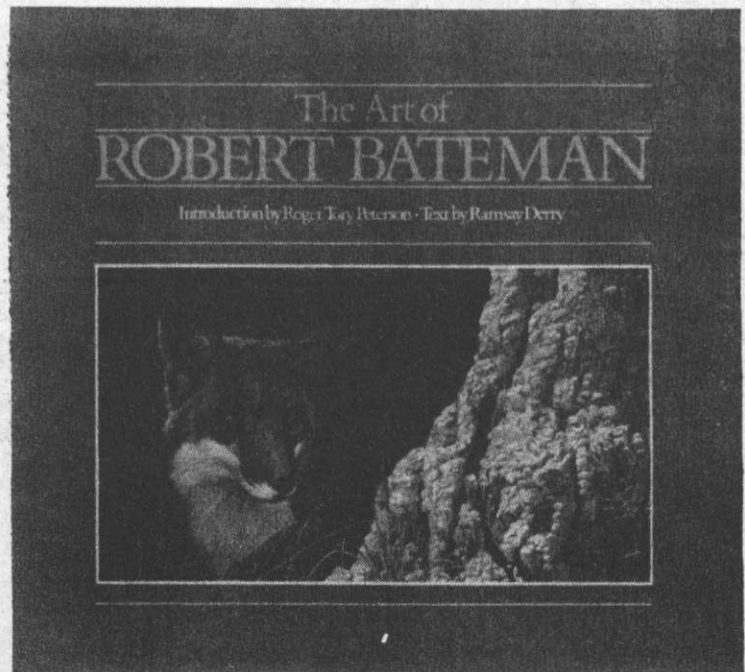

The Salt Spring Wranglers soccer team hit the road and went to Victoria last week and came home with an impressive 9-1 win over Gordon Head.

The first Wrangler goal came at the 4:52 mark when Michael Brown passed to Bradley Davies who promptly put the ball in the net. Five minutes later Mike again got on the ball, this time with a header. Again, it was Brad who put it in the net.

The Wranglers were feeling strong and were spurred on by good ball control, keeping it pretty well in the Gordon Head end throughout most of the first half. Halfback striker Renard Graham did a good job feeding the ball to open forwards, taking advantage of almost every opening in the Gordon Head defence.

Newcomer Max Martini picked up an assist with a well executed pass to Michael Brown who put it away for goal number 3 at the 21:16 mark of the first half. Gordon Head jumped into the game, but only momentarily, with their only goal at the 23:15 mark of the half.

The Wranglers bounced back with two more goals when Michael Brown sent one to Alfie Shepphard who had moved up to the forward line and promptly got his first goal of the season. Alfie returned the favour by giving the ball back to Michael a few minutes later and Mike stuffed it in for goal number 5 to end the first half.

In the second half Bradley Davies picked up the hat-trick with a solo effort that netted him his third goal of the game at three minutes into the half. At this point we moved striker Renard Graham to the left forward wing and sweeper Todd Tamboline up to

halfback striker.

It didn't take the boys long to adjust to the new positions. Renard recorded his first goal of the season with a pass from Michael Brown. Todd Tamboline rounded out the scoring action with two goals late in the second half to give the Wranglers their biggest win of the season thus far.

This weekend's soccer will see the Wranglers take on the Sooke Ravens at Portlock Park at 1 pm. Sunday the Wranglers will be meeting last year's District Cup champs, the Lansdowne Spitfires, in another home game at Portlock, time to be announced.

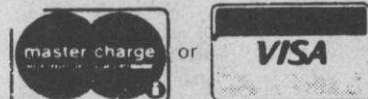

GALIANO NEWS

Activity centre project gets boost from Lions

First the good news. Progress is being made on the activity centre. The project was given a great boost last week when the Galiano Lions Club decided to make a donation of \$5,000 to the fund.

The Lions have already done more than their share by their fund-raising activities and this most recent generous donation does much to close the gap between money already received and the final target of \$85,000. The full amount has already been paid in to the school board, but the Activity Centre Society has certain loans to pay off and still requires several thousand dollars.

The Galiano School Memorial Fund has been re-activated. Since 1965 this fund has given excellent support to the school. Musical equipment, library books and encyclopedias were some of the many contributions to the school made from the Memorial Fund.

The names of the deceased, in whose memory the donations are made, will be recorded in a special book and placed on display. The trust committee will consist of Mrs. Margaret Robson (chairman), Mrs. Bea Thompson and school principal Ken Gaylor. Donations addressed to the Galiano School Memorial Fund may be sent to any of the trustees or to the school.

GALIANO ON TOP

Last Friday the school soccer team visited Mayne to take part in a competition. Be defeating the host school 5-0, and Saturna by a score of 2-0, Galiano came out on top of the the three-team tournament. Scorers for Galiano were Rodney Crocker with three, Robert Graham with two, and Peter Hoebel and Gordon Crocker with one goal each. Former soccer international player, Bet Mozley, coached the team.

The bad news last. The annual walkathon has had to be postponed or cancelled because Gulf Island teachers have decided to work to rule as a protest against the government's education spending cuts. Extra-curricular activities will probably be the main victims of this action.

Classroom instruction of pupils should not be affected. Gaylor has said that activities directed by volunteers from the community, such as Bert Mozley's soccer coaching, will continue.

New Firehall

One of the more admirable and satisfying characteristics of small communities is their reliance on their own members for many of the services that in a municipality are provided by paid employees.

North Galiano is a particularly shining example of self-help, and on Saturday well over a hundred people assembled in front of the new firehall on Porlier Pass Drive to celebrate the completion of the project to lock-up stage. Alistair Ross as master of ceremonies paid tribute to the many people who had contributed materials, money or services.

A history of fire prevention and protection at North Galiano was recounted by archivist Woody Coward, dressed for Hallowe'en and disguised by a newly grown facial fungus.

Organized response to fires, he noted, dates back to the 50's when Jack Kolosoff was provided with fire fighting equipment by

Macmillan-Bloedel Ltd. to protect their property, and Harry Baines Sr. was appointed fire protection officer by the provincial department of forests. Harry's memories go back even further, and when asked how long he had been fighting fires, he could recall incidents from the period when North Galiano was the property of the Powell River Company.

SHEDS ACQUIRED

After the cannery closed down two of their sheds were acquired and placed opposite Spanish Hills Store to house the vehicle and equipment. In the early 70's the North End Community Association became involved in fire protection, obtaining a Wajax pump and instructing residents in its use.

A vehicle with tank and pump was loaned by MB Ltd., which the fire department still uses although it is now in need of replacement, for although it is a good starter, its ability to stop leaves something to be desired, as a police cruiser can testify.

During the 30-year period of organized fire fighting only three houses had been lost and three forest fires fought, although many bush and chimney fires had been suppressed. Fires on the boats of Angus Crocker and Harry Baines had been put out in time for the boats to be salvaged, repaired and put back in use.

Tom Liddell, the new fire chief of the North Galiano Fire Department, expressed the appreciation of the department for all the help it had received from the community in the construction of the new hall.

The list, unfortunately, is far too long to include and seems to include almost every resident of North Galiano and quite a few from south of the line. Special mention must go, however, to Hart Scarrow who acting as administrator and negotiator spent innumerable hours obtaining the lease for the site from MB Ltd. and on other important tasks; and to Arne Haksi who acted as clerk of works and foreman of construction.

Many Galiano organizations donated money which together with private gifts totalled \$7,185.50. The services given by many Galiano businesses were essential to the success of the project. Volunteer help ranged from work on the site and building to providing refreshment for workers to a total of 886 man-hours.

Wild Goose Chase

The North Galiano Fire Department badly needs another fire fighting vehicle as well as other equipment. Assistant fire chief Arne Haksi returned from a trip to Saskatchewan just in time to be present at the celebration for the completion of the firehall.

It is not known if Arne's mission included a search for a reasonably priced fire engine for the one on display at the hall last Saturday was, unfortunately, too small to be of much practical use. However, Arne did not return empty-handed. Six plump Lesser Canadas are now stored in Aini's freezer, so perhaps A.F.C. Haksi's trip was deliberately planned as a wild goose chase.

Bush Fires

The South Galiano V.F.D. was

along a long-dead root system. The second, on Twiss Road, was caused by the fall of a snag across a power line. The volunteers were able to extinguish both fires without trouble.

Despite the fact that the fire season has officially ended conditions in the forest are extremely dry. The danger of fire spreading underground through rotted logs and roots lasts far into the winter until the ground is thoroughly soaked.

At present rain has only penetrated a few inches, and a fire that appears to be safely out may re-surface days later, yards away from the original burn. Extreme caution should still be exercised when burning.

Disarmament Referendum

Ganges Core

Area needs drainage plan

Drainage in the Ganges core area is a serious problem and some measures must be taken to have it cleaned up. Salt Spring Island Advisory Planning Commission was told on Tuesday afternoon.

Don Storr, a member of the commission, told his colleagues that the slough running past the Ganges United Church on Hereford Avenue prohibits the use of the church property for parking.

The ministry of highways has put a four-foot culvert under Jackson Ave. The water will run into the three-foot culvert downstream and flooding will be inevitable in the event of a heavy storm, he forecast.

Highways only transfer water from one side of the road to the other. They have no concern with what happens to the water after it has been so moved, he protested.

He recalled that the SPAR report called for a deep ditch in Ganges. That ditch is still needed, he said.

Bud Kreissl agreed. For eight months in the year that water mixes with effluent from septic tanks, he told the commission. The Trust had pressed for a local improvement district to establish a drainage area.

Responsibility for drainage rests with the developer, said director Yvette Valcourt, but the ministry of highways never enforced it.

AND IF NONE?
"Suppose nobody's develop-

ing?" asked David Lott.

When she was developing the Valcourt Centre she had to pay for drainage, recalled the director. She had to pay for culverts far down the street.

Lott was still unconvinced.

"We have a problem here. Do we have to wait until a developer

wants to do something here?"

The United Church is threatened by the new culvert on Jackson. But the church didn't create the problem, recalled Kreissl.

It is a problem for the Capital Regional District, said planner Richard McKellar.

Students invited to meetings

The deliberations of the Gulf Island School Board were watched closely by two secondary school students recently.

Terry Pedersen of Salt Spring Island and chairman of the student council at the Gulf Islands Secondary School, as well as Barry Bolog of Mayne Island, watched the trustees in action at the meeting of the board held on Mayne Island.

Pedersen is a Grade 12 student while Bolog is in Grade 10.

The board had decided to re-introduce the practice of inviting representatives of the student council to board meetings. Several years ago the idea had some success but was discontinued when the students seemed to lose interest.

No strike threat here

A strike may close the credit union offices on Vancouver Island but it will not affect operations at the Islands Savings Credit Union branch on Salt Spring.

The employees of the Salt Spring branch do not belong to a union and therefore will not be part of the strike action if it occurs. The workers in dispute with management on Vancouver Island are part of the Office and Technical Employees Union.

The disagreement between workers and management revolves around money as well as job

security. The union is asking for a three-phase wage increase which would give them a seven percent increase, effective July 1, 1982. A second increase of three percent would be added on January 1, 1983 and a further three percent hike on March 1, 1983.

The credit unions are offering a six percent increase on January 1, 1983 which would, if accepted, not be retroactive. The management also is seeking an increase in productivity to go along with the wage increase.

Help offered to women in distress

 Whether mentally broken, financially in trouble or the victims of physical beatings, women who are threatened with abuse by a spouse or ex-partner may feel that they have nowhere to turn for help.

Failure to seek assistance can be due to a number of reasons: shame for the broken marriage; fear of reprisal for reporting mistreatment; lack of confidence in one's ability to support oneself or children; or revenge which may be taken on one's family.

Revenge, in a marriage or after a marriage is ended, is a more widespread practice than is often realized. A fact sheet researched by the Battered Women's Support Services reports that 19.2% of Family Services clients on the lower mainland had experienced wife battering. In the whole of Canada, wife battering is responsible for one-fifth of all homicides.

REVENGE

Other forms of revenge are lack of maintenance, grabbing children, or refusal to share assets. After the shame or sorrow or fear have given way to frustration, the woman still may not seek help because of financial worries, or because she does not know what problems can be remedied or where to take those problems.

In our area, the considerations of transportation costs or of consulting a strange lawyer, may prevent women from getting solutions to legal difficulties.

Mindful of recent legal aid cutbacks, the Salt Spring Community Centre is establishing a clinic to help women with legal questions. The first meeting will be free, and is meant to help with choosing a lawyer, and to advise about proceedings and possible aid with court costs. The clinic will operate on Thursdays from 12:30 - 2:30 pm, and its advisor will be a local woman lawyer who is familiar with family law. Advice will be available to help demystify the proceedings necessary in settling legal situations.

QUESTIONS

Questions regarding divorce, separation and rights in a common law relationship, can be brought to the clinic. Occasionally women are not aware, for example, that keeping their children is not an "automatic" decision; in order to guarantee this right, custody must be granted legally. One of the goals of the clinic will be to set up self-help divorce groups, to provide support for women going through legal proceedings.

Emergency counselling or

housing is also available through the Community Centre, and for someone in fear of danger to self or to children, the use of a restraining order can be explained. More details about the clinic and its service can be obtained from Wendy Case of the Community Centre.

Campaign starts this week

When Christmas Seals appear the big event isn't far behind.

The B.C. Lung Association will be sending the seals to homes in the province beginning October 15. By the time the campaign is in full swing, more than 1.3 million homes and businesses will have received the letters with a target of \$825,000 to meet.

In 1922, the first campaign raised \$1,599.65 which went to help tuberculosis patients. While the association remains committed to aiding victims of TB, the focus has widened to include other diseases of the lungs such as lung cancer, asthma and occupational lung disease.

Diseases of the lungs have increased dramatically in recent years and money raised through the Christmas Seal campaign is used by the association to help educate the public and professionals about the problems.

Programs such as medical research, patient rehabilitation and other preventative programs are aided by the contributions.

The Gulf Islands are included in the campaign in the Duncan region and the target for the region is \$13,200.

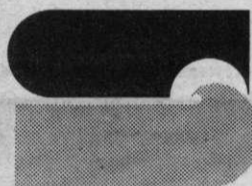
A dinner followed the ceremony, at which time Tom Toynbee proposed the toast to the bride.

Not sure? Don't eat it!

Wild mushrooms are not always good

Mushrooms are a delightful addition to any meal. In order to ensure that the meal is not the last, the Pacific Forest Research Centre, of the environment

ministry, has published some cautions on eating wild mushrooms.

The caution warns that different people react differently to the mushroom and one eater may be unaffected while another is very sick. It depends on the eater's allergic response and is unpredictable.

Here are some warnings from the experts:

Mushrooms may take up toxic materials from the soil and cause poisoning to the unwary eater. Pesticides applied to lawns and gardens often find their way into mushrooms growing there, and even though it is an edible species, will cause unpleasant reactions that may not be distinguishable from mushroom poisoning.

Fatal poisonings have resulted from inadvertently including a single poisonous specimen in a batch of edible ones used as food. Each specimen should be definitely identified before adding it to the pot.

A few good rules to follow:

1. Make positive identifications if in doubt, don't eat it!

2. Eat small amounts at first, to see if there is any reaction.

3. Discard specimens that are wormy or spotted with rot.

4. Cook well - it is best not to eat raw wild mushrooms.

At the Pacific Forest Research Centre we can readily identify the poisonous mushrooms and warn you not to touch them. However, we have no way of telling which of the "edible mushrooms" may cause unpleasant reactions in a particular person. For this reason we decline to recommend any species for food. We are pleased to identify them and to pass on any information we have, but the user does so at his own discretion and risk.

MUSHROOM WORKSHOP

Dr. Al Funk, mycologist at the Pacific Forest Research Centre, will give an introduction to the wild mushrooms of B.C., and the principles of identification at the Agricultural Hall on Mayne Island on October 23 from 1 to 4 pm.

The workshop is free to all and those attending are urged to bring any mushrooms for study material.

When no other permit is specified

When the building inspector issues a building permit without an application for a development permit, where does the applicant stand? A development permit is required for all commercial projects on Salt Spring.

Question was raised on Tuesday afternoon at the Salt Spring Island Advisory Planning Commission.

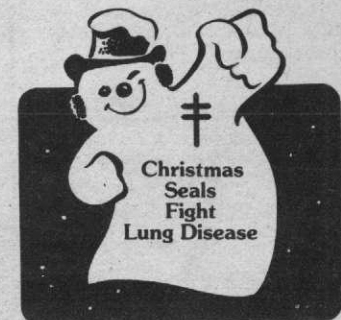
When an automobile body shop was built on Rainbow Road, the permit was issued with the call for a permit. The permit would have specified parking provisions and plans would have been assessed by the Advisory Design Commission.

Question facing the commission now, continued Kreissl, is whether the situation should be ignored, although other area properties adding externally were required to take a permit. Does the issuance of a building permit alone represent a precedent? Does it negate Trust bylaws?

The questions are left unanswered, said the local trustee.

Is it too late to ask for a development permit, in accordance with the zoning bylaw?

The matter was discussed when time was pressing and it was referred to the next meeting of the commission.

Webster made honorary member

Salt Spring Island resident and television broadcaster Jack Webster was made an honorary member of the B.C. Lifeboat Society recently. He was presented with a miniature lifeboat by society spokesman Horst Klein of Pender

Island. The lifeboat was made by members of the Pender branch of the Lifeboat Society.

Meanwhile, 20 members of the Pender Island Coast Watchers have held their first meeting of the fall.

An arm of the Lifeboat Society, the Coast Watchers are volunteers who report any marine incidents they see from their homes. During the summer they assisted with eight incidents at Pender.

The society itself has attended 66 incidents so far this year.

Pender students face difficulties getting to school at Sidney

The school boards can't help, the ferry schedule works against them and 22 high school students from Pender Island spend almost as much time travelling as they do in class.

The students are enrolled in Parkland Senior Secondary School in Sidney. They attend that school rather than the Gulf Islands Secondary School on Salt Spring because, despite the travel difficulties, they can at least spend each evening at home.

If the students were to attend GISS they would have to board on Salt Spring and would then only be at home on weekends.

They cannot be subsidized by the Saanich school board for travel because they reside out of that district. They cannot be subsidized by the Gulf Islands school board

for travel because they attend school outside this district.

The ferry leaves Pender for Swartz Bay at 7:40 am and requires at least an hour to arrive. School at Parklands begins at 8:43 am. The students, if the ferry is on time, have three minutes to get to school.

There is no bus to take them and last year the parents paid for two taxis which ran in relays to take the students to and from Swartz Bay terminal and Parkland. At least six taxis would be required this year to transport the students.

In the afternoon, the students could catch a public bus, if they left class at 2:35 pm. Classes at Parkland end at 3:10 pm and the ferry leaves for the Outer Islands at 3:30 pm.

Mike Marshall, Gulf Islands School District superintendent of schools, told *Driftwood* that he is talking with the Pender parents as well as the Saanich School Board officials.

The Outer Islands have two junior secondary schools, at Mayne and on Pender, but they only cover Grades 8 and 9.

Marshall said, "We would like to have the students in our system and some parents have indicated that they would too."

The Gulf Islands School District runs a daily water taxi for high school students from Galiano and Mayne Island to Salt Spring and Marshall indicated that extending the service to Pender Island may help solve the problem

Down through the years with Driftwood

Twenty years ago

The referendum which sought voter approval to spend money on a gymnasium and science room at the Ganges school was defeated. Voters from the Outer Islands voted against the proposal while Salt Spring voters accepted it. The referendum required a 60% affirmative vote but only 53% of the people supported the idea.

The administrator of Lady Minto Hospital on Salt Spring Island retired after 14 years in the position. Group Captain W.E. Dipple and his wife were planning a trip to England.

The tag day for raising funds for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind gathered \$260. The money, raised in a one-day effort, represented the largest amount picked up for the CNIB on Salt Spring.

B.C. Toll Ferry Authority indicated that a new road would have to be constructed leading to the proposed terminal at Long Harbour. At least 1 1/2 miles of Scott Road would also have to be widened and straightened. The ferry landing, when in operation, would replace the wharf at Ganges as Salt Spring terminal.

The good samaritan plugged the hole in the leaking boat with his fist. The toilet of the vessel had broken off and water gushed in until the fist stopped it. Unfortunately, in the confusion, someone stepped on the man and broke one of his ribs.

Fifteen years ago

Moorage fees at the government wharf in Ganges came under fire at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce. A boat owner had paid for a month of moorage and when he returned from a trip around the harbour, he found that the space had been rented to someone else. Despite having paid, he had no space. Boaters were also upset at the amount of the fee when the wharf lacked facilities such as electrical hook-ups.

A proposal to build a boat-launching ramp at Beddis Beach met with opposition from residents of the area. The ramp was to be a joint effort of the Parks and Recreation Commission and the Salt Spring Island Rod and Gun Club.

The driver of the school bus reported that the road left the bus and not the opposite. The bus was apparently too heavy for the road and the surface sank. The bus was loaded with children at the time but no one was injured.

Ten years ago

A Victoria visitor to Salt Spring questioned the mess of garbage around the litter buckets. He was told that the crows tear the garbage apart looking for food and the Chamber of Commerce did not have sufficient funds to ensure regular pickup of the garbage. The visitor sent \$20 to help cover the cost of collection.

Sabot sailors from Salt Spring Island took the top five finishing positions in races at Shawnigan Lake. There were 35 sabots in the race and the Salt Spring crew were coached by Laurie Neish.

The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce announced plans to hold a community meeting to discuss the installation of a sewer in Ganges.

The court case was a first for Salt Spring Island. A man was in Ganges court charged with pig rustling. He pleaded guilty to the

charge and was fined \$300.

The Lions club of Mayne Island paid a visit to Galiano Island to have dinner and discuss the formation of a club on that island.

Candidates for the local riding were committed to the upcoming

federal election. Tommy Douglas, NDP, would attempt to hold his seat in re-election. Opposing him were Stockwell Day, Social Credit; George McPherson, Progressive Conservative; Bill Matthews, Liberal; and Independent Ken Hasanen. The candidates were invited to speak in Ganges just prior to the October 30 voting day.

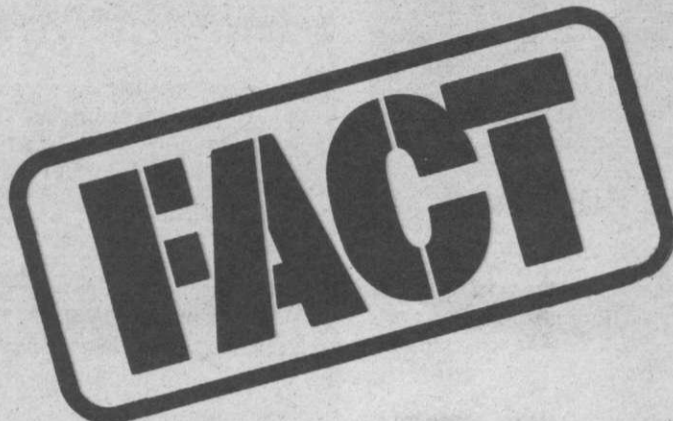
Five years ago

The ferry workers' union carried signs and the ferries sat idle. B.C. Ferry Corporation had been struck by the union and the Gulf Islands were isolated. Residents used water taxis, fishboats, float planes and other means of getting on and off the islands. Food, milk

and other supplies were being brought to the island by boat. Harbour House ran out of beer but the liquor store had not. The B.C. Ferry and Marine Workers' Union was not on strike for money, said a union official. The members were seeking job security as well as regulations covering hours of work.

One more trustee to elect as Aust resigns

Strick Aust announced his resignation from the Gulf Islands School Board this week.

Citing personal reasons, Aust said he is stepping down as trustee for Salt Spring and chairman of the school board when the current term expires on December 1.

He has been a school trustee for three years and chairman of the school board for the past two years. He told *Driftwood* that he wants to devote more time to his family, his work and to the soccer program on the island.

"I think this is a good time to do it," he said of the decision to step aside. He has seen changes in the three years on the board, many of which he had set as personal goals when he first ran for school trustee. The district has a new

administrative structure, greater voice for both teachers and parents in board affairs as well as a strong board itself, he said.

"I think this board is strong," he said, "and it has got to the point where I wanted to let it go."

"I appreciate the co-operation I've had from the other trustees, the teachers and the parents for the past three years. For me the choice was between soccer and the school board.

"I've achieved most of what I wanted with the school board."

He was making his resignation known now, he said, to allow time for the position to be placed on the ballot for the November 20 election. His resignation means that Salt Spring voters will be selecting three trustees to represent them on the school board.
