

## Three new faces join two incumbents on commission

The Parks and Recreation Commission on Salt Spring Island has three new faces to join two incumbents who were re-elected at the annual meeting Monday.

The three, Irene Fewings, Linda Hoover and Phil Hume, were elected, as were Hugh Borsman and Glenn Woodley, from among eight candidates for the five seats open.

The vacancies were created when Bev Unger, Roma Sturdy and John Crofton did not seek re-election. Hugh Borsman had resigned from the commission earlier this fall over the Saturday market situation. Woodley had to seek re-election

following the end of his two-year term.

Unger did not seek re-election to devote time to her new position as Salt Spring trustee on the Islands Trust. Sturdy could not run again because of ill health and Crofton had decided to step down to allow others to try their hand.

The unsuccessful candidates were Art Botham, Bill Hitchcock and Macie Pring.

Those elected at the annual meeting join Jim Ballantyne, Bob Wanless, Bob Brownsword, Edith Sacker and Colleen Roy to sit on the commission.

## Regional directors are invited to pay Valcourt costs out of own pockets

Two proposals were made last week to have the Capital Regional District pay a director's legal fees. The board was told that an appeal

to the Supreme Court has brought back a direction that the court will not act to decide whether the municipal act would permit such

payment out of public funds unless all participating components of the region are given the opportunity to be legally represented at the hearing.

During the ensuing debate Central Saanich director David Allen asked whether directors would not contribute \$500 each out of their indemnities to meet director Valcourt's costs and avoid the use of public funds.

The debate arose from an earlier decision to pay the legal costs incurred by the Salt Spring Island director when she was defendant in a libel action brought by executive director Dennis Young. The action was withdrawn during the spring.

### AGREEMENT

The board had received three separate legal interpretations of the Municipal Act. All agreed, though not for the same reasons, that the board could not legally make the payment of some \$7,000.

The directors then agreed to appeal to the Supreme Court for interpretation of the act. It was generally agreed that the only way of proving the act was to have court rule on it.

Last week the acting city solicitor for Victoria, G.A. Durand, informed the board that the court required the service of the petition on each municipality and electoral area within the regional district. The attorney-general's department asked for this provision.

The solicitor explained that he is unable to act because he is on leave of absence from the city and the city will now be a respondent in the court proceedings.

"If the board is adamant in paying director Valcourt's fees, I suggest each of us pays \$500 out of our own fees towards her expenses," proposed David Hill. "This is making a mockery of the Capital Regional District. If I get into trouble, I'm not asking the board to pay my legal expenses."

He was supported by Shirley Wilde. It was an aspect of the case that was worrying her, she told the board.

"What you do for one you must do for another."

The motion to pay the Valcourt costs should be rescinded, she added.

Doug Watts, chairman of the meeting, told directors that he had information that executive director Dennis Young had refunded the costs of his expenses to the district.

Pollen was "appalled". A director had been victimized, he charged, and the man who brought the action has his costs paid. He saw it as an impediment to the orderly process of government.

The region will name a lawyer to continue the action on its behalf.

## Trustees, teachers meet to settle differences over parking proposals

Improvements to the parking situation at the Ganges school complex came closer following a meeting between school trustees and teachers.

The group met to discuss the plans for changes in the parking set-up at the complex as proposed by architect Hank Schubart. The teachers had been critical of several points in the proposal and the meeting brought about a consensus on at least seven issues.

When Schubart's proposals are in place, the entire parking structure within the complex will be changed but the school trustees are attempting to put interim proposals into effect. They are concerned about the safety of students at the two schools.

Agreement was reached at the meeting on restriction of parking to designated areas with a sign, posted at the entrance from Rainbow Road, noting the restrictions.

Parking in the unused play area between the tennis court and Rainbow Road should be developed. Spaces for parking for handicapped persons should be created. The traffic loop at the top of the hill at the secondary school should be improved with parking regulated in designated areas for staff and visitors as well as a marked loading zone.

The parking area at Church Road to the west of the secondary school will be improved.

Another suggestion was to install concrete barriers to direct traffic through the loop at the elementary school. Pedestrian lanes should be marked.

Charles Hingston, Salt Spring Island school trustee, was chairman of the meeting and Will Peck attended as superintendent of facilities for the school board.

Representing the school staff were principals Tom Watson, of the

elementary school, and Bob McWhirter, of the secondary school. The Gulf Islands Teachers' Association was represented by Hugh Archer, Wayne Taylor and Janet Fisher.

A concern expressed by the teachers was the reduction in size of the play field between Rainbow Road and the elementary school by plans to put a parking lot near the road.

Trustee Charles Baltzer told the school board that the concept of the parking plan was a good one. "I'm opposed to doing anything with the play fields until Kanaka Road is closed," he said.

John Zacharias, Pender Island trustee and chairman of the school board's buildings and grounds committee, said the matter of the closing of Kanaka Road rests with the Islands Trust.

Ivor Cawker went to the top on Sunday.

A tight team of Rotarians was on the stage to call out names of the Rotary draw players and knock them out of the game.

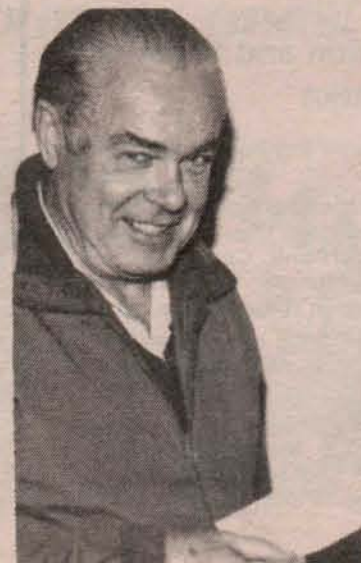
Other games were in operation throughout the hall and at one point there were some 25 breakfasters watching the game while more than 100 others were engaged in the games of chance.

Although Juan de Fuca is one of the weaker teams in their league, the Strikers evened the odds by only

fielding 10 players, including an injured keeper, Mike Cue, who had trouble hobbling from one side of the net to the other. Regardless of these facts, they registered one of their finest team efforts this season.

Although Jeff Tatum is always highly visible in the Strikers' mid-field, he added a new dimension to his ability on Sunday, that of a goal scorer.

# Soccer's future bright as phenomenal growth seen

It was an excellent weekend for Salt Spring soccer teams on the score sheet as they all came up winners. The only disappointment was that the intra-island games had to be cancelled due to the wet weather and poor field conditions.

I thought this week I would look at soccer in North America and its future on this continent. In looking at the sport one has to look at two levels, professional and amateur, because they differ greatly.

Over the last 15 years professional soccer has attempted to make inroads into the North American spectator market and with the exception of the New York Cosmos and Vancouver Whitecaps, has failed.

Poor crowds, bankrupt teams and poor organization have seriously damaged the possibility of success.

Soccer being a creative sport with a slow build-up and a lot of finesse, it does not appeal to North

American spectators who prefer the faster, more physical sports on our continent.

The other problem is the sports fan wants quality in his sports, something evident from the large audience that watched the World Cup from Spain. Unfortunately, quality is sorely lacking at the professional level, both on and off the field.

At the amateur level the picture is very bright as the growth in North America has been phenomenal. The growth in the U.S. has been larger than in Canada but even here we continuously grow.

The success at this level is due to the low cost involved with playing. It is an easy game to learn and play and is very healthy and has a low injury rate.

Also, it is a true team sport and avoids the hero image promoted by American sports.

I believe as the sport grows and more youth participate in soccer they will become the fans of the

future, the fans who will fill those half-empty stadiums. They will also become the players of the future, which is gradually happening already in the NASL and the ASL.

The youth of our country improve each year through better coaching and training techniques and the under-16 and under-18 programs. And with the formation of the Canadian Soccer League next season, which is primarily made up of Canadian players, our youth will have the development league to push the quality of the sport to world class.

It will come but it will take time, patience and hard work. For now I will watch European soccer on TV, go to the odd Whitecaps game and enjoy Salt Spring's young pros in action. Some of the talent displayed at our local games can match any world class game for enjoyment.

So why not get out and see it now before you have to pay \$20 a seat to see these same kids play 10 years from now.

**REPORT FROM THE COMMONS**

**Tribute paid to Walter Dinsdale**

**BY JIM MANLY, MP**

For a few minutes on Monday, Nov. 22, members from all sides of the House of Commons put aside partisan differences and paid tribute to the Honourable Walter Dinsdale, member from Brandon-Souris.

Until his death on November 20, Mr. Dinsdale had served in the House for a longer continuous period than any other present member. (Stanley Knowles, first elected in 1942, had served for a longer time, but because he had been defeated in 1958, his service was not continuous).

Walter Dinsdale was first elected in a 1951 by-election when his main opponent was Grant MacEwan, who later became lieutenant-governor of Alberta. He subsequently won another 11 general elections and in the 1980 election he won by a margin of over 6,000 votes.

In the early 60's, Mr. Dinsdale served in the Diefenbaker cabinet as minister of northern affairs and national resources. Since the last election, Walter Dinsdale was most active as a member and vice-chairman of the task force on the disabled and the handicapped. His concern for disabled people was also shown by his service on the board of directors for the Canadian Rehabilitation Council for the Disabled.

The task force report entitled

**Trustees hear reports**

Reports from two parent advisory committees were heard by the Gulf Islands School Board last Wednesday.

The group at the Saturna School was seeking a meeting with the transportation committee to iron out problems of water taxis. They also wanted to discuss the situation if a Grade 10 were to be added to the Mayne junior secondary school.

On Mayne Island, the group there was seeking improvements to the playing fields and also wanted to add equipment to the play apparatus already in place.

Any additions to the play apparatus would have to be approved by the school board with permission from the Insurance Corporation of British Columbia.

*Obstacles* quotes Mr. Dinsdale as follows: "I always believed the situation was bad but I didn't realize how bad. When it comes to the multi-disabled they fall between the cracks... There are hundreds of Terry Foxes out there with the same desire and determination and the same emphasis on ability instead of disability. The message we received loud and clear during the hearings was independent living for disabled persons. Get us out of institutions and into the mainstream of life was the cry... Governments sometimes spend money foolishly. But this is an area of real need that should have the highest priority."

Speakers from all three parties spoke of his religious faith, his work with the Salvation Army, and his service on the board of the Canada Council of Christians and Jews.

Walter Dinsdale was born and brought up in Brandon, Manitoba, where his father had been the mayor and later MLA. During the war, Dinsdale earned the Distinguished Flying Cross for operations with the RCAF Mosquito Night Fighter Squadron. As a parliamentarian, he always took a keen interest in veterans' affairs.

I didn't know Walter Dinsdale personally, but always saw him as a courteous and kindly human being. After 12 elections he was something of an elder statesman within the Conservative Party. He wasn't a partisan member as I observed him and I doubt if he was ever particularly inclined to the more rough and tumble kind of party politics.

But obviously he didn't get elected 12 times by being a patsy or a pushover and he couldn't have survived in cabinet or in caucus without getting involved in a few dust-ups with his colleagues.

All members agree that one of Walter Dinsdale's primary motives

was service to his country. Our parliament is based on an adversary system where government and opposition sides are very critical of each other. Sometimes we go beyond constructive criticism and become narrowly partisan.

Occasions such as Monday, when we paid tribute to a deceased member like Walter Dinsdale, remind us of the deeper loyalty that should bind all of us together. Like a family reunited at a funeral, we all had a chance to see ourselves and one another in a slightly different light, as we meditated on the life and service of one of our fellow members.

# Survey seeks approval for neighbourhood pub

Galiano residents are being asked to weigh up the merits and demerits of a neighbourhood pub and to complete and mail a ballot indicating their approval or disapproval of the proposal.

The proponents of the scheme to build the pub on an acre of land at the junction of Porlier Pass and Sturdies Bay Roads, are George and Vera Harris and Bill and Jill Penny.

Details of the proposal are being mailed to all Galiano residents. The pub would be based on the British model with hot and cold food available, a games room and possibly facilities for showing movies. The ballot is to be returned to the Islands Trust, which would have the responsibility of approving a change of zoning to commercial.

The Liquor Control Board, which would issue the licence, requires that a survey be conducted of all persons living within a radius of half a mile of the proposed site. The survey must be completed by an independent and approved agency and must show that at least 60% of these neighbours approve the proposal.

The Pennys are well known on Galiano where they have built up a very successful resort business called Penny's Cottages. They and the Harris family are old acquaintances, having met in the West Indies when both were running charter cruise enterprises. Jill and George are members of that team of dedicated volunteer ambulance attendants.

Vera has experience in catering and Jill, who was secretary of the Galiano Club, has worked in business and commercial institutions. There must be many parallels between successfully operating a charter cruise business and running a neighbourhood pub.

All four will miss the cruising, but with two young children to raise Vera is looking for more stability than can be provided by a boat.

Galiano residents, after they have read the proposal, will have a chance to discuss the matter with the principals at public information meetings to be held in the North Community Hall next Monday, and in the South Community Hall on Tuesday. Both meetings begin at 7:30 pm.

## Winter Song

Bird song is traditionally associated with spring and summer, when the cocks are establishing territories and enticing hens. Many

birds also sing in winter although the sounds they make are not so conspicuously musical as at other times.

At this time of the year many species form flocks which constitute an avian chorus. Several species of small bird flit from tree-top to tree-top, and against a gray sky are hard to identify even with binoculars.

Pine siskins with the mellifluous name of spinus pinus utter a light tit-tit and a buzzy shree. Starlings, appropriately named sturnus vulgaris, have a large vocabulary of whistles, clicks, chuckles and the mimicked sounds of other birds. Their flocks seem to become larger each year.

Bush-tits move in small straggling flocks whispering to each other in light gentle notes. Chickadees in small scattered groups hang inverted, as they feed on seeds and sing their own name over and over again. On the water some of the ducks have an almost musical call, particularly the harlequins, while scoters and golden-eyes in flight have "musical wings".

Other avian musicians perform

singly or in pairs. A favourite is the tiny winter wren whose song is a versatile mixture of high trills and tinkling warbles. The orange-marked varied thrush has an attractive quavering whistle. Robins still warble throughout the winter, sometimes singly but often in flocks when feeding or preparing to roost. Rufous-sided towhees rustle in the dried leaves and complain plaintively.

Many of our best performers, such as the warblers, skylark and song sparrow, are resting or on tour in the south, but there is plenty to interest the bird listener until the star vocalists return in the spring.

## Betty Fairbank

Galiano's best known photographer has been to the forefront in island affairs this week. Last Wednesday Betty transmitted her enthusiasm for and knowledge of totem poles in the Skeena River area to an appreciative audience in Page Drive Lounge.

This weekend saw the launching of a special project of Betty's - a

series of cards, prints from the works of Galiano artists. At the Sunday evening party at Holloway House to celebrate this event most of the original eight works were on display.

As well as one of Betty's own photographs were paintings by Elisabeth Hopkins, Elizabeth Steward, Jean Beattie, Dorothy Lupton, Ken Hardy, Keith Holmes and an etching by Ronald Norden. A second series of Artists of Galiano Island is already being planned.

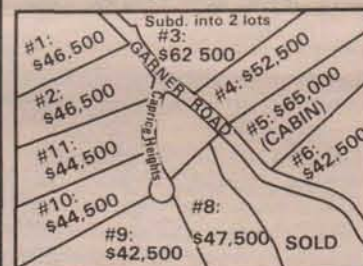

# Flowering trees come in some outstanding varieties

Every spring, when the first flowering trees burst into their cheerful abandon of blossoms, I am often asked as to the kind of tree this might be.

This interest is well justified as a mature tree, 25 to 30 feet tall and wide, is nothing less than spectacular in the full glory of its bloom.

Actually, there are two common varieties. Both are flowering plums, the earliest of the flowering trees to blossom.

One is the *prunus pissardi nigra*, or the "purple-leaf plum" with a profusion of white blossoms followed by copper red leaves which turn dark purple in mid-season and greenish bronze in fall.

The other one is the *prunus blireiana*, with semi-double blossoms which are fragrant and range from pink to rose in colour. Blossoms are not quite as profuse as the *pissardi* and leaves are not quite as dark, starting off with a strong reddish purple hue and changing to green-bronze in mid-season.

### FASTER GROWING

The *pissardi* is the faster growing tree of the two, also somewhat rounder and taller than the *blireiana*.

## Farming and Gardening

The flowering cherries are next to flower and the earliest and most wonderful of these is the one with the impressive handle, "*prunus subhirtella autumnalis*".

This is the most enthusiastic bloomer of all the flowering trees. It often blooms in fall, during mild spells in midwinter and again, in full glory in spring. Blossoms are double, white or lightly tinged pink, slightly fragrant and leaves are a nice reddish bronze.

Its eagerness to blossom at the slightest provocation is rather endearing and it should be more widely planted than it is.

The Japanese flowering cherries follow in the unfolding of the seasons. Beloved and celebrated in dainty Japanese watercolours is "pink perfection"; no more need or can be said about this one.

"Akebono", also known as "daybreak", carries single pink blossoms which are sweetly fragrant on a graceful 25 by 25-foot tree. "Shirotae" or "Mt. Fuji" has a strongly horizontal branching pattern and hence grows wider than its 20-foot mature height. Flowers are semidouble, pink in bud, opening white, eventually turning purplish pink when fading.

### WEeping CHERRY

One of the most spectacular of all the flowering cherries is the "weeping cherry", *prunus serrulata pendula*. This one grows slowly to a height of 12 to 15 feet, and its branches curve very gracefully to touch the ground.

The ideal setting is at the edge of a lawn to display its utter profusion of single pink blossoms cascading from crown to ground.

"Kwanzan" is a stiffly upright tree growing in a narrow "V" shape to 30 feet tall and 20 feet wide at the top. Large, double blossoms which are richly rosy-pink drape the branches in dense clusters.

All the flowering cherries and plums need really well drained soil. In heavy clay soils roots will rot in our wet winters. If root rot is present the tree will flower and produce new leaves but these will then fall off and the tree will die.

Otherwise these trees are hardy, make lovely shade trees, are easy to garden under, have non-aggressive root systems, require only cosmetic pruning, get along on moderate amounts of water and are lovely to live with.

### HARDIEST ARE CRABAPPLES

The toughest and hardiest and last to bloom of all the flowering trees are the flowering crabapples. These even tolerate heavy clay soils, only standing water will do them in.

"*Malus floribunda*" is a Japanese variety growing to 20 feet tall by 30 feet wide. Blossoms are carried in dense profusion, red or deep pink in bud, opening white.

"Profusion" is another aptly named variety with deep pink to red blossoms over reddish purple leaves. An extremely attractive tree with a wider crown than its 25 foot mature height. A beauty.

"Van Esseltine" is one of the few

upright and narrow growing varieties with double pink blossoms. It reaches a height of 20 feet when mature, seldom exceeding a 10-foot spread.

These are some outstanding varieties of the many beautiful flowering trees, covering the spring season from beginning to end, a

variety of soil conditions, and shapes ranging from broad umbrella to narrow spire.

Lovely alone on a lawn, in pairs to arch over a walk, or in rows along driveway or hedge, they add their riotous beauty to our colourful spring pageant in the most conspicuous way.

# Down Through the Years with Driftwood

## Twenty years ago

**Election meetings** in various school districts on Salt Spring Island resulted in three residents being chosen as trustees. Robert Patterson was selected to represent the Fulford school district while C.W. Harrison was chosen for Ganges and Marshall Sharp would be sitting for north Salt Spring.

**The referendum** asking for expenditures for a science room and a gymnasium-auditorium would be presented to voters again. The decision to re-present the referendum was a unanimous decision of residents attending a district school meeting in Ganges.

**A drawing** showing the design of a new ferry to ply the mainland-Long Harbour route was available for viewing. The artist's conception of the vessel was a front-page feature in *Driftwood*. The ferry was to be built in Burrard Dry Docks and would be 236 feet long, 52 feet wide and displace 1,560 tons. Capacity would be 40 cars and 400 passengers.

**The Guild of Sunshine** met in Melton Hall and heard that the sale held by the group raised \$126. They decided to donate \$10 to the blind and the date of the next meeting, December 11, was announced.

**Scraps of cloth**, either flannelette or wool, were being sought by the Beaver Point community to aid in creating clothes and blankets for the Unitarian Service Commission.

**A tea** sponsored by the United Church in Fulford raised \$100 during the afternoon. Prize was a plum Christmas cake which went to two ladies who guessed its weight. The cake weighed in at exactly 8 lbs.

**Several hunters** from the mainland searched without luck for Salt Spring deer. An islander decided to help. He lauded praise on the uniqueness of Salt Spring deer. Towards the end of the day, with no deer shot, the group had success. Twice. The first deer proved to be both buck and doe while the second had two hearts. The mainlanders were impressed.

## Fifteen years ago

**Civic elections** would be held on only two of the Gulf Islands. A school trustee would have to be elected on Mayne Island and a director for the Capital Regional District would be elected on Salt Spring. The Outer Gulf Island CRD director, Joan Purchase, was chosen without opposition. School trustees, one on Saturna and three on Salt Spring, had been elected by acclamation.

**The magistrate** for the Gulf Islands, M.F. Peiler, expressed approval of the conduct of islanders. He was speaking to a panel discussion on crime held in Ganges. He noted that 84 convictions under the Motor Vehicle Act in 10 months was exceptional for an island with more than 1,000 registered vehicles. One-quarter of one percent of residents were convicted under the liquor act as well. Only 10 juveniles were convicted during the same period, he said.

**The volunteer firefighters** on Mayne Island were practising combatting chimney fires. The fire alarm sounded and the crew put the practice to practical use when they doused a blaze in a chimney at a residence on that island.

**Telephone listings** in the Gulf Islands were up over previous years. A total of 1,502 phones were listed, an increase of almost 10% over the

1,367 from the past year. On Salt Spring, the phone book noted 1,008 numbers up from 944. The Outer Gulf Islands had 494 listings compared to 423 from the last book.

**Signs of the arrival** of winter were noted on vehicles coming from the Cranberry on Salt Spring. The snow dusting the vehicles melted almost as soon as it fell.

**The Galiano Ladies Service Club** held a bazaar and raised \$450. The money would be used for charities supported by the group.

## Ten years ago

**A telephone pole** on Mayne Island was snapped in two and the damage was caused by a boat. The vessel dropped its anchor in Active Pass and when it pulled the anchor up, it pulled up the recently laid underwater telephone cable linking Galiano and Mayne. Guy wires and rock bolts were damaged at each land end of the cable and the underwater section would be inspected for damage.

**The Lions Club** on Galiano held an organizational meeting and elected a full slate of officers. With 29 members present the group set a date, December 16, for a charter night to be held in the Galiano Community Hall.

**Dogs attacked** and killed a thoroughbred ram and four sheep on a Fulford Valley farm. The remainder of the flock was scattered over a wide area by the dogs.

**A bus service** from Fulford to Vesuvius on Salt Spring Island was proposed. The run would pick up passengers for a ferry run to Swartz Bay and Victoria in the morning and return in the afternoon. A final run would take passengers on the last ferry in the evening as far as Sidney. The trial runs, once each week for a month, were to determine if the service would be adequately supported by islanders for it to continue.

**A fund-raising campaign** by the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society managed to generate \$1,021 on Salt Spring Island. The campaign, sponsored by the local Lions Club, gathered more money for use by CARS than had been raised in previous years.

**Fire** destroyed a home of historic significance on Galiano Island. The house was located on Whaler Bay and had been built in 1912. The only casualty was the pet dog.

## Five years ago

**A Cessna crashed** into the side of Mount Erskine on Salt Spring Island and took the lives of four people. The plane had been en route to Seattle and the accident was blamed on poor visibility and fog. The crash was the second on the island that year after a plane had earlier crashed into Mount Tuam, killing the pilot.

**Snow blanketed** the roads of Salt Spring Island, causing a series of automobile accidents in various locations.

**Talent night** at the Harbour House Hotel drew a capacity crowd. Reid Collins was named first-place winner for his abilities on the piano. Second place went to Marvellous Myrtle and the Bluebell Stompers.

**Questions about docking** procedures at Tsawwassen were answered by the manager of B.C. Ferry Corporation with a promise to improve service "in the near future".

**The new school** on Pender Island was opened with ceremony and the event drew about 250 islanders. Charles Baltzer, chairman of the

Gulf Islands School Board, acted as master of ceremonies and the special guest was Nep Grimmer, who went to school on Pender in 1895.

**A Salt Spring man** noted that he ordered a suit from a tailor in Hong Kong the same day he ordered a door latch from a local merchant. The suit had arrived, he said, but the door still couldn't be locked.

**Local planning** and zoning for the Gulf Islands would be taken over by the Islands Trust. The Capital Regional District would lose 31% of its planning budget, \$105,000, and would have to lay off two temporary and two permanent members of its planning staff.

**Active Pass** would grace the front cover of the telephone book for the Greater Victoria area.

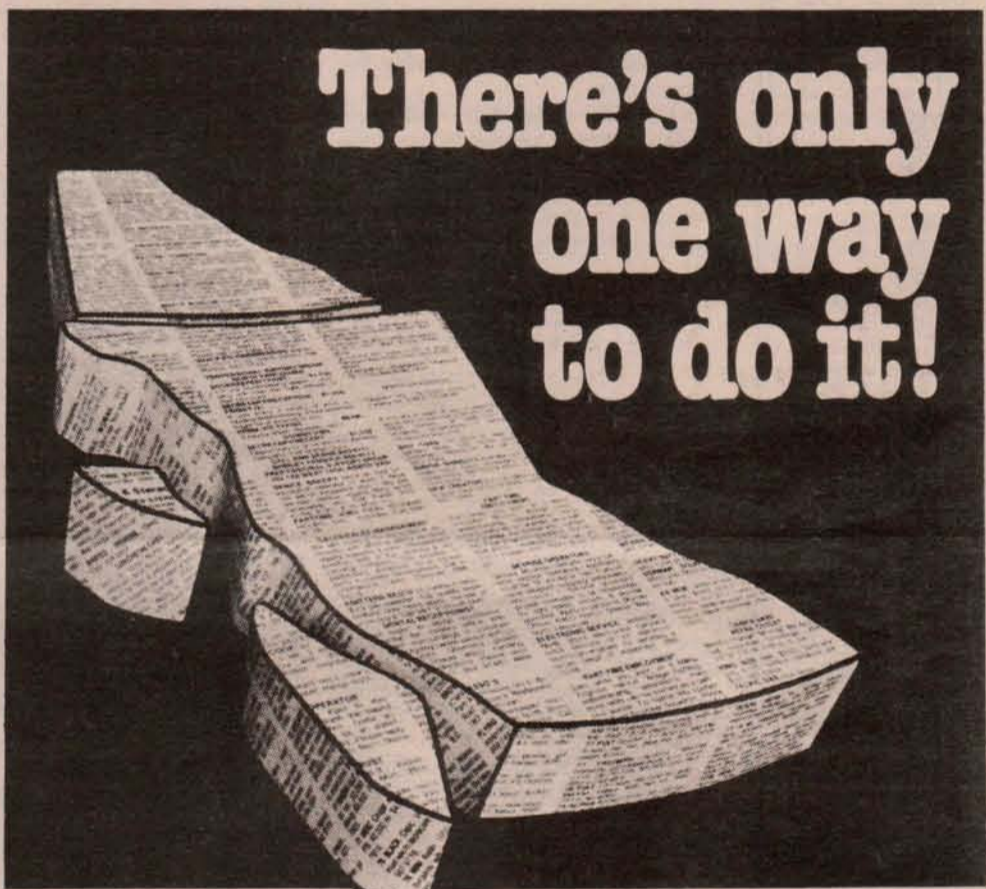

# Capital budget, operating budget two separate entities

The ministry of education continues to define what money school boards can spend as well as where money from various sections of the operating budget can come from.

A recent ruling of the ministry, which resulted from the passage of the School Services (Interim) Act, or Bill 89, states that money from the non-shareable capital section of the budget can be spent on the operating section.

Money from the capital budget, which is a separate budget from the operating budget, cannot be spent

on anything other than the projects which the ministry approved.

The operating budget outlines money, raised in any particular year for use in that year while a capital budget outlines money borrowed by the board and which must be repaid

over a period of time.

By way of illustration, if a homeowner had money for improvements such as painting or a new roof, he could use that money, in a pinch, to buy groceries. The equivalent in the school board budget would be the non-shareable capital account.

On the other hand, money needed to pay the mortgage on a home must be used for that purpose. To the school board, that is the equivalent of the capital budget.

The ministry of education defines a non-shareable capital account as containing money to be used for equipment and facilities for locally developed courses, some playground equipment, additional library supplies and improvements to the appearances of buildings and grounds.

The money in the non-shareable section of the budget comes entirely from the taxpayers at tax time. The Gulf Islands School Board, several years ago, placed a ceiling of one mill on the amount to be used in that section in any particular year.

The money for the capital account, to be used to build new schools or buy property as well as major renovations to existing buildings, is approved by the ministry of education which supplies one-half of the amount. The school district must come up

with the other half, usually by borrowing it.

Repayment of the borrowed money is contained in the yearly operating budget and like a home mortgage, must be repaid plus interest over a certain period of time.

## Fire causes \$10,000 damage

The fire damaged the house and apparently went out by itself.

The house on Beaver Point Road caught fire sometime last Thursday night. T. Kristinsson, who owns the house, found the damage when he returned the next morning and reported it to the Salt Spring fire department.

The fire apparently died from lack of oxygen but not before it did at least \$10,000 worth of damage to the building. Cause of the fire is unknown and fire department officials continue their investigation of it.

## Christmas sewing workshop

Sewing for Christmas will be the topic of a workshop at Mahon Hall Saturday morning.

Jocelyn Holmes will give the one-day workshop beginning at 10 am. She will provide instruction on making Christmas wall hangings and gifts for all members of the family.

There will be fabric for sale at the hall but participants are invited to take material with them, as well as their sewing machines.

Fee is \$6 and more information can be obtained from Virginia Newman, continuing education director.
