As a result of their contact with Queen Elizabeth II last week, thousands of British Columbians will be singing *God Save The Queen* with new-found strength and emotion.

I, like many other Salt Spring Islanders, journeyed to Victoria last Tuesday to take part in the Royal visit and as a photographer, follow the Queen during her tour of the city.

In appearance, I found the Queen very imposing. Her Royal Highness is only 5' 4", about 114 lbs. and a little motherly. But close up she has a radiant aura about her and the most beautiful smile and when she bestowed it upon me, I completely lost my heart to her. She looks much younger than her 56 years, her smiling eyes and relaxed face glowing youthfully.

footsteps, I found myself gaining immense respect for the gracious manner which she maintained while greeting the enormous crowds she met everywhere.

The Queen has a special affinity with children and the elderly and she was never in too much of a hurry to stop and greet as many people as possible.

The Queen and Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, were enjoying the warmest welcome they had yet received on their North American tour and they didn't even seem to notice the cloudy, wet weather.

The highlight of my day, of course, was being one of the 100 media representatives invited aboard the Royal Yacht *Britannia* for a reception. During our wait on the maindeck as everyone checked their coats and cameras, which were not allowed inside, I spoke with the Royal Navy crew who seemed especially anxious to put us at our ease as they spoke about their duties and their ship.

The 412-ft. diesel-powered *Britannia* is 30 years old and carries a permanent crew of 250 with about 30 more when members of the Royal Family are on board. For the fellows I talked with, their favourite tour of duty was during the honeymoon of Prince Charles and Lady Diana.

When I asked an officer if one ever got over their nervousness when working for the Royal Family, he said after the first six months he was able to relax and become part of the family. That is how everyone I spoke with aboard the *Britannia*

described it — as being part of a family.

We entered a luxurious foyer full of shining brass fixtures and highly polished wooden doors and railings. There was a drawing room to our left, through gleaming french doors, decorated in light blues and golds with a fireplace at the far end of the room. The floors were covered in thick oriental carpets also of blue.

After being officially introduced to the Queen and Prince Philip, I found myself offered cocktails and hors d'ouvres in what was the dining room of the ship. It was decorated with mementoes which had been collected during official visits throughout the world, all detailed on brass plaques and mounted on walls or shelves.

All the members of the Queen's household seemed to be at the reception solely to answer our questions and make us feel comfortable. They were all very charming and I chatted easily with the Duchess of Grafton, officially entitled Mistress of the Robes, who has been serving the Queen since her coronation in 1953.

I spoke briefly with Lieutenant-Commander Andrew Wynn, equerry-in-waiting to the Duke of Edinburgh and a member of the Royal Navy, who told us sadly that his position consisted of a two-year duty which was nearly at an end.

And as Superintendent James Beaton, the Queen's Police Officer, was explaining his duties, a Royal Navy officer approached me and two of my colleagues and said he would like to steer us toward the Duke of Edinburgh. And there I was, standing not two feet from



Queen Elizabeth II, who was sipping sherry and conversing with several members of the international news media, and Prince Philip, in discussion with several others.

Whereas the Queen seemed content with brief greetings, Prince Philip was a conversationalist. And

that was when I had my brief moment of glory as the Prince asked me which newspaper I was associated with.

Shortly afterward I left the *Britannia* and as I knew nothing could possibly happen during the rest of the day to top this, I left for home.

Among the delicacies served to Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh last week was smoked salmon from Salt Spring Island.

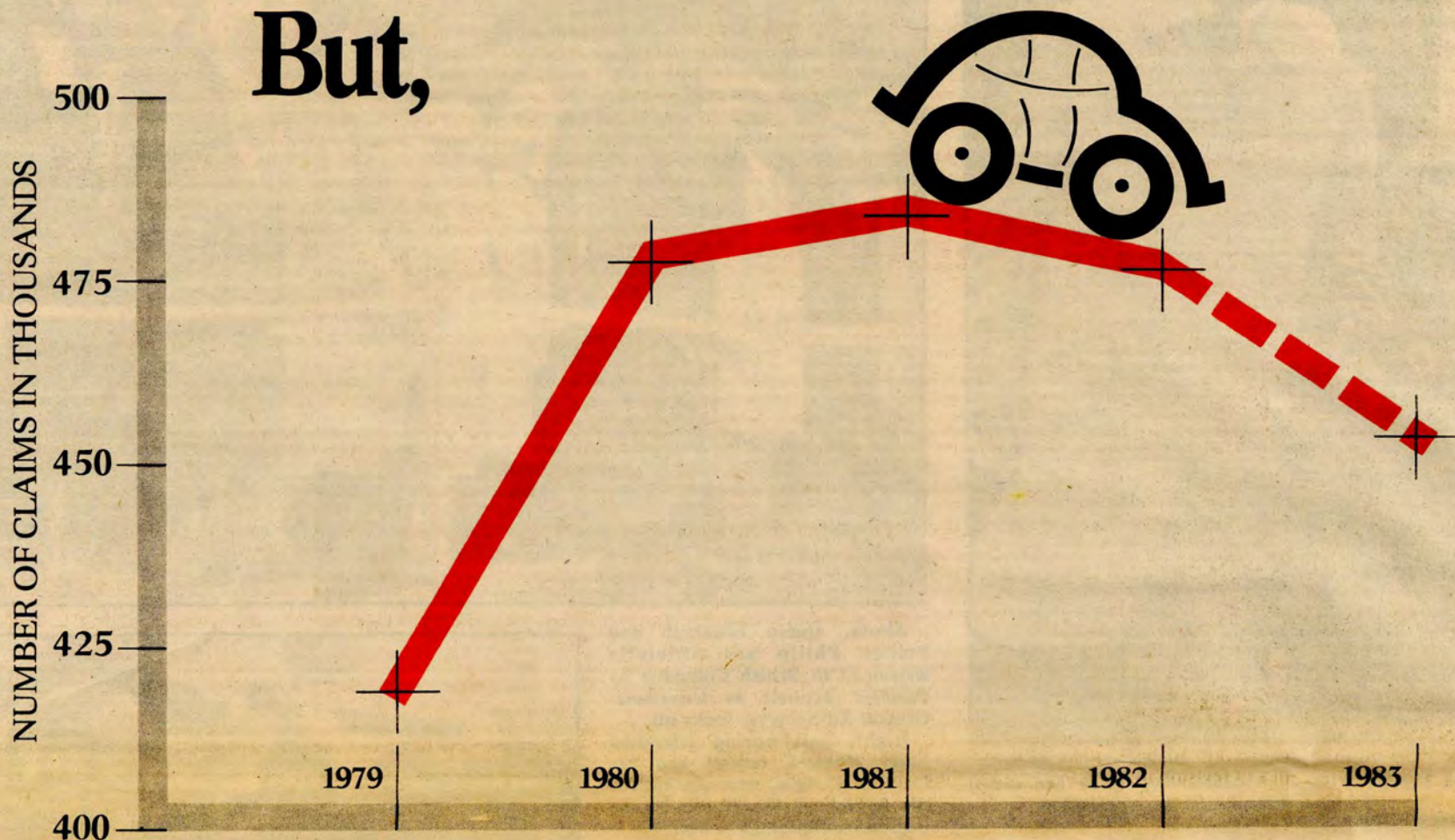

Auction raises \$7,000 for new activity centre

There is an old tradition in Canada that an auction should be a social occasion, an entertainment as well as a commercial activity.

The Activity Centre Society's auction on Saturday in the new gymnasium fulfilled all three functions. The society's officers were delighted with the financial result of over \$7,000 realized.

More than 200 members of the community turned up to inspect the new facility, and many of them to bid on a great variety of wares and services, from delicate Royal Albert china to a 26-foot cabin cruiser.

In charge of the entertainment was Jim Ripley, postmaster, one-time school trustee and former licenced auctioneer in his native province of Ontario. He was introduced by present trustee Mike Hoebel, wearing his Activity Centre Society hat, who noted that Jim had been our school board representative during the period when the centre had been planned and construction started.

Jim then proceeded to sell nearly 100 items while demonstrating his professional training in the art of auctioneering. Humour is an important weapon in the psychological arsenal of the salesman, and Jim used this very effectively.

Occasionally this was turned against him as when son Billy successfully bid on a fearsome African mask with real human teeth and hair, saying that the eyebrows reminded him of his father, the nose of his mother and the chin of his sister, and so it would hang on the wall of his room as a composite family portrait.

As a result of the auction, the kitchen can be equipped and the meeting room furnished much sooner than the society hoped. The gymnasium is completely finished and is very impressive.

It is already being used by the community for gymnastics classes, although the official opening has yet to be arranged.

Galiano Club meets

A second attempt to hold the annual general meeting of the Galiano Club was successful in producing a quorum on Saturday in the Community Hall although the 25 present barely constituted 10% of the membership.

The low attendance was a cause of concern to several speakers, who pointed out the club is the senior one on the island, and an umbrella organization for many of the others. Suggestions were made that membership in the Galiano Club should be a prerequisite for attendance at dances and for use of the dump.

Presiding in the absence of O.J. Garner, still on holiday in Portugal, was Mike Hoebel, who recalled some of the highlights of the year: the hall repainted by volunteers, the floor refinished by professionals and a 5,000-gallon water storage tank installed as a fire-prevention measure in Bluff Park.

Treasurer Jim Scoones reported a favourable financial year, thanks largely to the fact that revenue to operate the dump exceeded expenses. Directory Allan Buttery was instrumental in raising the grants from the Capital Regional District and the parks department, and with generous donations from Galiano residents, the dump turned in a profit for a change.

Dances, at one time the financial life-blood of the club, proved less profitable. Some off-island bands insist on immediate cash payment from door receipts before they will begin to play.

A number of problems and projects were landed in the lap of the incoming executive. Walking trails are to be made in Bluff Park for, as Joe Fleming remarked, much of the area of the park is "unknown Galiano" as far as most residents are concerned.

Centennial Park is to receive a face-lift. The constitution and bylaws are to be studied with the idea of revision to bring them in line with the latest Societies Act and changes in club policy.

Elected by acclamation, the new executive will consist of Allan Buttery, Joe Fleming, Akasha Forest, O.J. Garner, Mary Harding,

Jordan Hartman, Mike Hoebel, Andrew Loveridge, Johanna Newmoon, Jim Scoones, Jean Tully and Christa Weiss.

Dangerous Chimney Fire

At 10:40 pm last Thursday, the fire department was called out to a chimney fire at the Player residence on Jack Drive. A guest was the only person in the house at the time, and she showed presence of mind by throwing water on the wall around the chimney. The prompt arrival of the fire department and the action taken probably prevented the complete destruction of the building as the attic was full of smoke and the timbers charring.

Fire Chief Chester Williams, on investigating the cause of the fire, discovered that the framing lumber was in contact with the chimney—a practice long discontinued and very unsafe, but not uncommon in older homes. The installation of a new wood-burning stove in place of an oil space heater raises the chimney temperature to a point above the ignition point of wood, and is the cause of many house fires.

Alcoholics Anonymous

The excellent work done by Alcoholics Anonymous has built an enviable reputation for this organization. There is an active group on Salt Spring which has received enquiries from a small number of Galiano residents, who have expressed an interest in joining this organization.

The guest speaker for the afternoon, Jackson Barker, arrived with tools of his trade: pruning saw and secateurs, and proceeded to demonstrate precisely how to prune rose-trees on two living examples and by means of blackboard illustrations.

raffle, which was won by Isobel Stevens.

Pheasants lost to dogs

A resident of Southey Point on Salt Spring Island is experiencing problems with dogs attacking the pheasants on his property.

Ted Oldfield lost six pheasants to the wandering dogs last week. The birds had a value of \$90.

He told *Driftwood* that he has had problems with the dogs for some time. He had contacted the owners and asked that the dogs be kept tied up. The dogs are let loose at night and gather in a pack.

Howard Byron, animal control officer for Salt Spring Island, said, "We at animal control are doing our best but dog owners have to accept responsibility for their animals."

Under the bylaw regulating dogs in the Capital Regional District, a

dog running at large, even if the animal causes no trouble, can be expensive for the owner. The owner can face a fine of \$25 for the first offense of allowing the dog to run loose.

A farmer who keeps sheep, goats or poultry can shoot a dog which causes problems with the animals or birds.

Any damage done to livestock or poultry becomes the responsibility of the dog owner. The owner would have to reimburse the farmer for the full value. If damage is done and the owner cannot be identified, the CRD will pay up to 75% of the value as assessed by the department of agriculture.

Gulf Islands Driftwood

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This is what the region does for the people of the islands

It will cost almost \$37 million to operate the Capital Regional District for the coming year. Last week directors approved the bylaw to adopt the 1983 budget.

Of the \$36,871,230, there is a million and a quarter surplus from last year. The taxpayer will be looking for a net \$21 million and a few thousand.

Apart from the islanders' share of general government and other liabilities, the individual islands are listed for the benefits enjoyed from regional services.

There are grants-in-aid, the fund from which monies may be provided for certain local services at the discretion of the director for the area. Salt Spring aid amounts to \$5,400. As the grants were not called on to any degree by director Yvette Valcourt, there is a surplus of \$4,950 from 1982 and no levy will be made against taxes this year. The Outer Islands enjoy a grant of \$3,070, of which \$2,940 will be collected this year.

Totally unrelated, two items lie together with startling results: Pacific Centre for Human Development takes a total allocation of \$83,440. Next item is animal control at a figure of \$124,780.

FIRE PROTECTION

Fire protection is funded by the Capital Regional District for two islands, North Pender and South Galiano. North Pender will cost a gross of \$30,040, with a net charge this year of \$29,800, while South Galiano comes in at a gross cost of \$23,290 with a net collection of \$23,020.

Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation will gross \$113,570 and taxpayers will be called on to find \$80,790 of this. Ganges activity centre, the room in Ganges elementary school built jointly by school and community, weighs in at \$6,530, with a net due of \$6,110. Park acquisition and development was frozen last year by the province.

The thawed surplus in Salt Spring Island's account is \$940. This may be allocated this year, but no additional levy will be made.

Community parks on the Outer Gulf Islands will cost a total of \$3,130, of which property owners will find \$2,340.

ACTIVITY CENTRES

Activity centres have developed among the Outer Islands and at Galiano and Pender schools there is a joint structure paid for by school district and community. Galiano project is under way and so is the levy of \$12,290. This will net out at \$12,130. North Pender will pay \$7,120, with a net of \$6,630, while South Pender must find \$730, with a net of \$640.

Water doesn't come cheap. Saturna water system will represent a total charge of \$123,190, of which the property owners must pay \$60,490. Highland Water System on Salt Spring Island will cost \$132,140 and taxpayers will have to meet \$58,500 of that figure. On Pender, the Magic Lakes water system comes in at \$115,960 and the magic figure for property owners will be \$60,190.

Ganges sewer system will not cost property owners \$479,060, because most of that figure is derived from interest paid on the invested funds not yet expended. Maliview Estates sewer system will cost \$14,930, of which taxpayers will meet \$9,720, and the Magic Lakes sewer system comes to \$407,290, with \$145,820 to be found by property owners.

These are specific costs of island works. Islanders also share the general related costs.

Three accidents

Trustees of the Gulf Islands School Board at their recent meeting heard details of three accidents to pupils at various schools.

A Grade 2 boy at Fernwood was cut on the head when hit by a stick. His parents could not be notified immediately and he was taken to Lady Minto Hospital for treatment of the wound.

At Salt Spring Elementary School, a boy in Grade 1 also suffered a cut on the head when he fell from the adventure playground. He was treated and allowed to go home.

On Galiano, a girl in Grade 6 suffered a blow to the tail bone when she was kicked by a playmate at lunch time.

None of the injuries was serious.

First-class standing achieved

Young Ganges violinist Kirsten Maddison recently received first-class standing in the Royal Conservatory Grade 3 examination.

Kirsten was awarded the B.C. Silver Medal for her work last year in exams.

She is a violin pupil of Jean Knight and has been helped in ear training by Joan Raeside, who also served as her accompanist.

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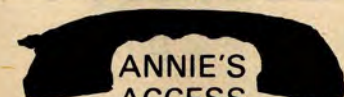

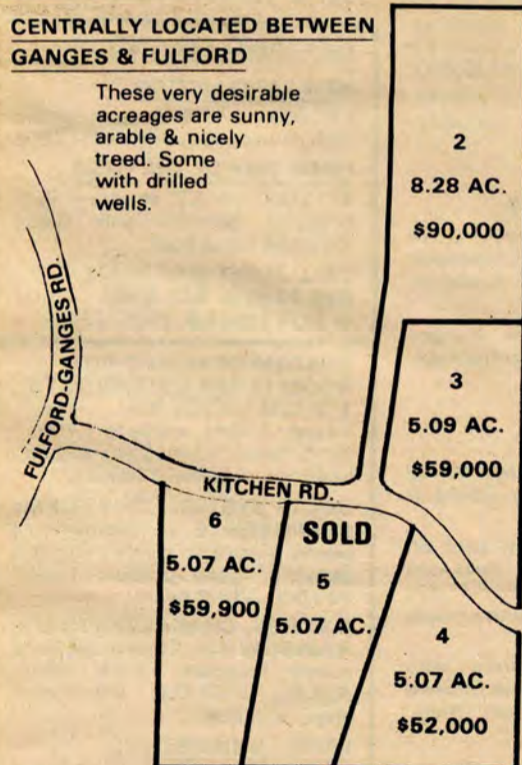

Islands Trust council has taken a strong stand in opposition to the capture of whales. At the recent council meeting in Victoria trustees expressed opposition to the practice of capturing and displaying killer whales.

Trustees based their opposition on various factors, including the effect on the killer whale population and the shortened life span of the giant mammal in captivity. Some trustees could not recognize the educational value of whales "in a tank".

The decision to oppose the federal government licence given to Sealand in Victoria to take two whales followed a presentation by vice-chairman John Rich, who expanded on a package of information distributed to trustees by the Moclips Cetological Society, a group devoted to the protection of killer whales.

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Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty years ago

The one person looked at the other four and wondered why they were there. The four people were in attendance at a meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission. The fifth person thought it was to be a meeting of Social Credit.

The swallows returned to Fulford on March 12. The famous white robin was also sighted.

The Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission annual meeting heard reports on grants to various clubs and organizations on the island. Ping-pong tables were installed in three community halls, judo mats and archery equipment had been purchased and a ceramics kiln provided for community use. The commission had an annual grant from the province of \$600 to spread around for recreational purposes.

A high wind caused damage to the dock at Vesuvius and delayed ferry service to Vancouver Island. The ramp was replaced and service restored. In Ganges, the Pender Queen, back in service following an overhaul, was tied up and out of service because of a temperamental engine.

Students from the Ganges schools took part in an oratorical contest. There were 24 speeches made during the evening and each speech was limited to three minutes. In the primary grades competition, the boys out-numbered the girls five to one. In the senior grades section, the ratio was the reverse.

Before the arrival on Salt Spring of settlers, elk roamed the island. Elk antlers adorned the buildings of early pioneers but the herds of elk died out and no one knows why.

Kayak enthusiasts from Seattle, Washington, arrived on Salt Spring for their annual tour. But the group arrived by ferry and cycled around the island. The kayakers normally toured up the B.C. coast as far as the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Fifteen years ago

February was wetter, warmer and colder than the previous year, said Ganges weatherman Howard Carlin. Precipitation amounted to 5.34 inches compared to the 1.72 inches for the month a year past. High temperature stood at 61 degrees with the low dipping to 29 degrees. The other February had a high and low of 52 and 31 degrees.

The Lions Club of Salt Spring had checked into the matter of a sports complex and found the idea favourable. The combination swimming pool-curling and skating rink would cost \$250,000. If taxpayers paid for it, the levy would be three mills.

When B.C. Ferries dropped the

late sailing for Salt Spring Island, the outcry was furious. But when the chamber of commerce approached the ferry folk, they were told that few letters protesting the move had been received. Island residents were urged to write if the late sailing was wanted.

Traffic signs and other public property in Ganges, including the privies in Mouat Park, were the targets of vandals. The damage in the past had been blamed on visitors to the island but the latest incidents took place during the ferry strike. Few visitors to the island were present at the time.

The Fulford Barons extended their winning streak to 10 games with a 15-3 win over the Central Hawks in roller hockey. Another streak ended when the Ganges No Stars tied Ganges Aces at 7. The tie ended the No Stars' losing streak at eight games.

The Pender Island Women's Institute held a coffee party and the 70 guests left \$100 for the group to use. Members were knitting sweaters which would be distributed through United Services Canada. They also began the planning of a spring flower show and the annual fall fair.

The Red Cross fund drive again resulted in Galiano being the first home with their target. Islanders donated \$380 to the drive. The sum was \$30 more than the target set for the island.

Ten years ago

The mileage allowance paid by the Gulf Islands School Board was boosted to 16¢ per kilometre or 23¢ per mile. The money would be paid to district employees on school district business or parents using their own cars, with approval of the principal, for school affairs. The old rate had been set at five cents per mile.

The Salt Spring resident wondered if the key was B flat or E flat. His query came in reference to a classified ad in Driftwood offering alder wood at \$40 a chord.

The attorney-general's office announced plans to create a permanent RCMP detachment on Pender Island. The population of the island, 800, warranted a police force, said the province's chief lawyer. All of the Gulf Islands had been served and protected by the RCMP officers from the Ganges detachment.

The auxiliary to Lady Minto Hospital gave the medical institution \$7,560 to help purchase equipment for the soon-to-be expanded acute care and extended care wings. The group of volunteers also donated \$1,000 towards construction of a wheelchair ramp at Central Hall.

Salt Spring Orange lost 4-2 to Gordon Head in District Cup play. The loss eliminated the Orange from further play in the Cup series. The two teams scored all the goals in the second half of play. The Orange prepared for a tournament of their own on the island.

Five years ago

The community plans for Salt Spring and Galiano Islands would be considered and a decision reached by spring, said the minister of municipal affairs. He spoke with representatives of the Gulf Islands who had been urging the adoption of the plans.

The flower box fund stood at \$849.89. The money had been collected from Salt Spring residents and businesses as well as from people as far away as California to replace the wooden flower boxes in Centennial Park. The wooden boxes had been the target of vandals and the Centennial Park Society wanted permanent concrete flower boxes.

The sabot sailors of Salt Spring Island took the top three places in a race in Victoria. The event was the Inter-City Regatta held at Cadboro Bay. The next event for the island sabots would be the winter regatta on Elk Lake at Easter.

The Bishop of Victoria would visit the two Catholic churches on Salt Spring Island. Bishop Remi de Roo would hold a mass in Our Lady of Grace Church to confirm candidates from both the Ganges and Fulford parishes.

The band from the Gulf Islands schools took second place in the Cowichan Valley music festival. The ballet group of Salt Spring Elementary School took top spot in two competitions at the same event. The groups, band and dancers would put on a production of Peter Pan later in the spring.

Board meets March 30

The Gulf Islands School Board has set the dates for its next regular meeting as well as for meetings on the Outer Islands.

The board decided to continue the current schedule of meeting every three weeks in public with the Wednesday preceding the regular get-togethers taken up by committee meetings. The third Wednesday would be held free for special meetings of a day of rest.

The next regular meeting of the school board will be on March 30. The trustees go behind closed doors for the morning session and open up to the public at 1 pm.

The various committees of the school board meet on March 23.

The trustees will gather on Galiano Island on April 20 for a regular school board session.

They will travel to Pender Island on June 1 for a regular meeting as well.

The meetings for the other two islands, Mayne and Saturna, will be held in the fall.

The school board decided to hold the meetings on the various islands on different days as a change from past practice when they would meet on the Outer Islands for consecutive board meetings.

Members of the public can address the trustees at regular board meetings but are requested to submit their questions 48 hours in advance of the meetings. The time gives the staff an opportunity to research the questions so that trustees can answer at the meeting.

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Anti-nuclear meeting draws 120 at Ganges

capacity audience of about 120 at the Salt Spring Elementary library last Thursday to hear Michael Pentz, British nuclear disarmament speaker, conclude his visit to the island with a public address on Salt Spring Island.

Pentz addressed the myths to justify the nuclear arms race of the superpowers, and showed four classes of weapons he is taking us on a final leap to a holocaust.

"The weapons, he told islanders, are of their very nature a dangerous threat to the world cannot afford, in any event, to remove the arms race from the realm of deterrence into the realm of planning for a "winnable" nuclear war. The weapons include the MX missile, the Trident and the MX missile. If they're all on the U.S. side, I said," he commented. These weapons are all either under design or construction, but Prof. Pentz gave little reason for despondence. "As all over the world a massive swell of people, he reported, is demanding an end to this threat to the survival of mankind. Britain's part, a majority of Canadians are now opposed to the presence of U.S. Cruise missiles in Canada," Pentz observed, "a special and crucial unity in this matter: with a history as a peace-making and its status as a close ally of the U.S., a decision to become a nuclear-free zone could well be the one that could break the logjam and force the superpowers to real

negotiation for disarmament. Don Erickson of the Salt Spring Nuclear Disarmament Committee announced plans for a cross-Canada peace caravan this summer, begun simultaneously in the Maritimes and B.C. and ending with a call in Ottawa for Canada to declare itself a nuclear-free zone.

The caravan would be organized on a constituency basis, to bring pressure on each MP to vote on the matter in the House. Erickson reported on meetings he has held already with other disarmament groups, some of them national in scope, and that support for the idea has been enthusiastic.

He said he will be attending a meeting of disarmament groups in the east later in the month, to arrange to centralized co-ordination of the peace caravan. The theme of the caravan is to be Prosper with Peace.

Pentz concluded by reporting that in April the U.K. Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament will hold a rally of over 50,000 people.

"We plan to link two nuclear weapons facilities with a human chain. I will be addressing this rally, and I promise you this. There are already thousands of women there, camped in the mud in a permanent vigil against these arms. I will bring them news which will give them more hope than any other news I could bring from North America. "I will tell them of this magnificent meeting on this tiny little island that nobody's ever heard of before.

"We can step back from the end of the world as we know it."

Candidate re-invents Liberal party in readiness for vote

Mary Jane Lewis came to a Salt Spring Island Liberal gathering on Saturday with an island-flavoured introduction. She was chauffeured by Dennis Heinekey of Victoria, whose brother George is a familiar figure to islanders.

The Liberal candidate was nominated several weeks ago and will contest the Saanich-Islands provincial seat in the next election. She was accompanied to the island by her agent, Paul McKivett. Visiting candidate was entertained at the home of Margaret McDonald on Monteith Drive at a coffee party.

CLOSE TO SCHOOLS

Explaining that her background is closely identified with education,

Lewis assured her audience that the majority of educationalists have cut back on costs. There is a constant complaint in provincial schools that principals are too penny-inching and that there are inadequate funds for many purposes.

She agreed that education and health costs must be investigated.

Mary Jane Lewis has no illusions, she assured the group, and she looked back over the history of the province to examine voting patterns.

The date of the next election has not yet been revealed.

The candidate looked to the "re-invention" of the Liberal Party in B.C. The Liberals are hoping to field a candidate in every constituency, said Lewis. Otherwise "thousands of Liberals are disenfranchised".

In the last election 30% of eligible voters stayed at home, she recalled.

ALL BRITISH COLUMBIANS

The Liberal program in the province will be a British Columbian program, she promised the island Liberals.

"It will be connected with B.C. and only B.C."

She assured island Liberal president Pat Meagher that there is no disharmony between provincial and federal parties, because the personnel are the same.
