In general terms:

- The intent of proposed Salt Spring Island Trust Committee By-law No. 66, being Amendment By-law No. 8, 1981, is to amend By-law No. 14 cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978", as follows:
By changing the zoning classification of the West half, Section 14, Range 1 South, lying 33' South and West of the centre line of North End Road, except Plan 31856, North Salt Spring Island, Cowichan District, from the Commercial 4-L (C4-L) Zone to the Watershed 1 (W1) Zone.
The property is located at the junction of North End Road and Lang's Road at the North East corner of St. Mary Lake.
- The intent of proposed Salt Spring Island Trust Committee By-law No. 91, being Amendment By-law No. 6, 1983, is to amend By-law No. 14 cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978", as follows:
By creating the "Ecological Reserve (ER) Zone" in which scientific research and educational activities are permitted, and to change the zoning classification of the fractional North East quarter of Section 32, Section 39 except the East half of the East half thereof, and the North East quarter of Section 81 as shown on reference Plan 38231, South Salt Spring Island, Cowichan District from the Public and Recreation (PR) Zone to the Ecological Reserve (ER) Zone.
- The intent of proposed Salt Spring Island Trust Committee By-law No. 93, being Amendment By-law No. 7, 1983, is to amend By-law No. 14 cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978", as follows:
By increasing the permitted combined floor area of accessory buildings not used for "farm use" from 46.5 square metres (500 square feet) to 54 square metres (580 square feet), this combined floor area not to include up to two (2) accessory buildings each having a floor area less than 20 square metres (215 square feet).

Advertisement for Energy Data Weatherstripping and Caulking. Text: 'One of the simplest ways to cut energy losses is by reducing the amount of cold air entering the building. A certain amount of air exchange is required for ventilation, odour control, and eliminating the pollutants generated within the house. Most homes, however, have a far higher rate of air exchange than necessary. Weatherstripping and caulking are an easy way to reduce air leaks. They provide maximum benefit at minimum cost. Basically, weatherstripping and caulking are used at joints between dissimilar materials. Weatherstripping is used where freedom of movement is required; caulking where it isn't. Weatherstripping should be applied where doors meet door frames, where movable windows meet the window frame, and where two sliding window frames meet. Around the edges of the attic hatch, foam weatherstripping will ensure a snug fit, and will compensate for any slight warping of the wood. Weatherstripping materials vary from closed cell foam (the sticky backing can be readily applied to a surface) to springy bronze metal (frequently used on doors where weatherstripping is subjected to frequent sliding and rubbing). Check the seal on your weatherstripping at the start of each heating season as it does require periodic maintenance. Weatherstripping around doors, particularly the threshold strip, may require adjustment to keep it fitting snugly. Some pieces may need to be replaced. Caulking should be used on the inside where a non-opening window meets its frame and (again on the inside) where door and window frames meet the structure of the house. It should not be applied on the outside, where these frames meet the siding, since moisture which has penetrated to this point needs an escape to the outside. Caulk outside only if rain penetration is a problem. The sole plate, where the base plate of the building's wood frame sits on the concrete foundation wall, needs special attention when you caulk. If the foundation wall is very irregular, and there are gaps or spaces between the sole plate and the foundation wall, be sure to fill the gaps with caulking rope, oakum or fibreglass insulation before you caulk. Caulking should be applied with a caulking gun and appropriate caulking material. A variety of materials is available. Silicone sealants and acrylic caulking material probably have the longest life, but they are expensive. Choose the appropriate material to suit your application, based on recommendations from the manufacturer. Other sources of air leakage in the home need special treatment. Leakage through electrical outlets in exterior walls can be reduced by applying a draft-ender gasket. Samples of these can be obtained from B.C. Hydro offices; supplies are readily available from hardware stores. If you are contemplating adding insulation to your attic, be sure to seal and caulk gaps penetrating into the attic (such as holes for plumbing stacks and electrical wiring) first. This will reduce the leakage of warm, moisture-laden air into the attic, which causes condensation problems—including a possible frost build-up—in the attic during winter. Large quantities of warm air can be lost up the chimney when the fireplace is not in use, especially if the flue damper has warped. The best way to ensure a tight seal is to make a plug which fits snugly into the fireplace opening. The plug can be made of plywood or wallboard backed by some insulation. As a result, organizers are expecting the season to be a busy one.

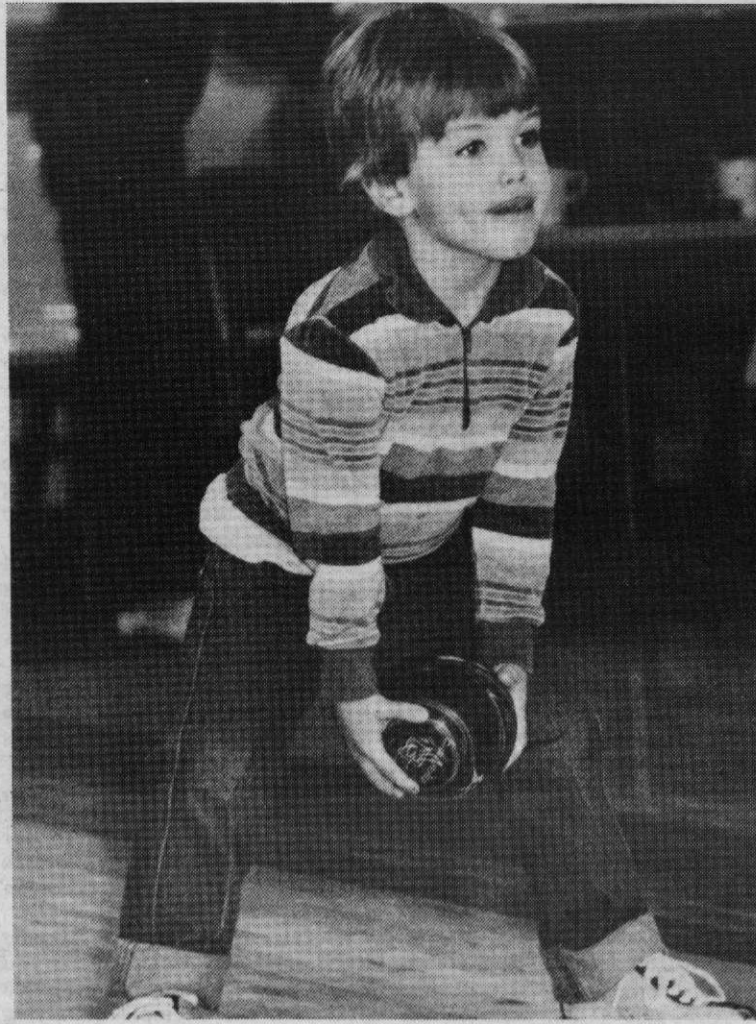

CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT

Pursuant to Section 769 of the Municipal Act, the following text of By-law No. 1194, cited as "Firearms By-law, 1983", is hereby published as at third reading and prior to submission to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs.

A BY-LAW TO REGULATE THE DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS WITHIN THE OUTER GULF ISLANDS ELECTORAL AREA

WHEREAS pursuant to Letters Patent dated the 1st day of February, 1966 and amended by Supplementary Letters Patent dated the 25th day of October, 1979, the Capital Regional District (hereinafter referred to as the "Regional District") was empowered to undertake the function of Division IV—Regulating Powers for that part of the regional district not within a city, district, town or village;

AND WHEREAS Division IV—Regulating Powers includes the regulating of the discharge of firearms pursuant to Section 933(1)(a) of the *Municipal Act*, R.S.B.C. 1979, C.290;

AND WHEREAS the by-law may be applicable throughout the Regional District or in any defined area of it;

AND WHEREAS the defined area (hereinafter called the "defined area") for the purpose of this by-law is the whole of the Electoral Area of Outer Gulf Islands;

AND WHEREAS by Supplementary Letters Patent dated the 25th day of October, 1979 no by-law shall be adopted by the Regional Board under the authority of Division IV unless the by-law has received the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs:

NOW THEREFORE the Board of the Capital Regional District in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

- In this by-law, unless the context otherwise requires, "firearm" includes air guns, air rifles, air pistols and spring guns.
- No person shall discharge a firearm within a defined area comprising the whole of the Electoral Area of the Outer Gulf Islands within
 - 150 metres of any school building, school yard, public park, playground, church, workshop, place of business, dwelling house, farm building or any other place where persons may be assembled or engaged in work of any kind, without the permission of the owner or occupier of the premises, or
 - 25 metres of the travelled portion of a highway as provided in the *Highway Act* (1979)."
- Every person who, without lawful cause, contravenes this by-law by doing any act which it forbids, or omitting to do any act which it requires to be done, is guilty of an offence and is liable, on summary conviction, to a fine of not less than \$100.00 and not more than \$500.00 for a first offence; and for each subsequent offence, to a fine of not less than \$250.00 and not more than \$1,000.00.

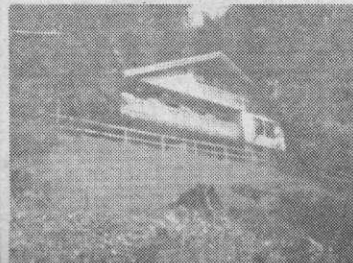

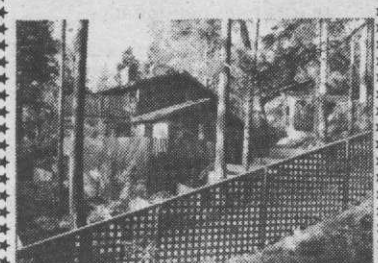

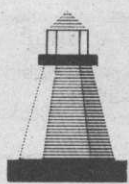

Professional development closes schools

Gulf Islands schools will be closed several days between now and year's end to allow teachers to pursue professional development.

November 7 will be the day all teachers of the district gather for a conference featuring discussion workshops and reports on educational matters.

Galiano School closed October 7 to allow teachers to assess the needs of the school library. Pender trustee John Zacharias wondered last week why a full day was needed for a look at the books.

Mike Hoebel of Galiano answered that since the school library is not run by a librarian, the teachers must familiarize

themselves with what books are there. He doubted that one day would provide sufficient time to do the job.

Galiano School also closes November 23 for parent-teacher interviews. That's the day report cards for pupils come out as well.

On the same day on Mayne Island, the school closes for a half day for parent-teacher interviews with the subject being report cards. Mayne School has closed for two days in September.

At Pender School the doors close to pupils on October 26 for teachers and parents to gather for talks.

Saturna Elementary School shuts down on October 31 to create time for computer familiarization.

Gulf Islands Secondary School closes November 18 for a

professional development day. The program will be announced later.

At Salt Spring Elementary, the parent-teacher talks will be in shifts. The primary grades get November 18 off while parents and teachers discuss matters. The intermediate grades are freed from classes on October 14 for the same reason.

In addition, October 21 features interviews plus a conference in Abbotsford. The school closes for the day.

Fernwood School shuts its doors to pupils October 19 when parents are invited to talk to the teachers. The school closes November 25 for a professional development day.

Each school can close five days during the school year for that purpose.

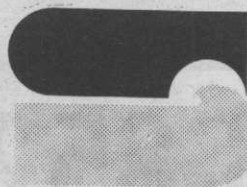

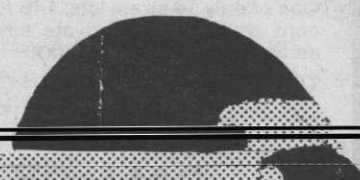

Members raised about \$320,000 last year to be used to operate their

services and purchase equipment and patient comforts for hospitals.

Conveners of next week's meeting are local auxiliary members Julie Tessman and Nancy Shaw. Program arrangements are being handled by Laverne Miller, Vancouver Island area representative to the B. C. Association.

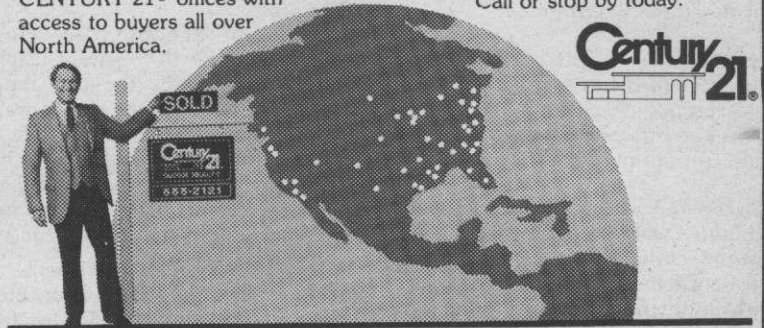

Opposition prompts changes in policy

Opposition from various groups has prompted the school board to take another look at the policy of charging for use of school facilities.

Trustees had circulated the policy to find out what people think about it. The answers which came back indicated that the charges would stop some groups from using the schools for meetings.

On Mayne Island, for instance, the school gymnasium is the only place on that island suitable for the senior citizens to play carpet bowling. J. Mundie, president of the carpet bowlers' group, wrote to the board to protest the rates.

The seniors were paying \$1 per hour for use of the gym. The rental came to \$3 per week.

Under the proposed fee schedule, the group would have had to pay \$9 per hour or \$27 per week. Mundie said the seniors could not afford to cover the rental if it were to be that high.

The Mayne Island Little Theatre also wrote to the school board to protest the higher fees. Protest also came from groups on Salt Spring.

At last week's school board meeting changes to the policy were introduced. The rental for service clubs and similar groups as well as those which charge admission was lowered to \$4 for use of classrooms, libraries or the school board room

from the proposed fee of \$5.

Rental on a small gymnasium, such as the Mayne Island gym, drops to \$6 from \$9 and the rent for a large gym goes down to \$9 from \$15.

The building and grounds committee of the school board also suggests having the principal of each

school as the person to contact for rentals.

The board sent the policy back to the building and grounds committee for further study. Until a policy is decided upon, the principals will be responsible for schedules of events and there will be no charge for use of school facilities.

Two-car collision Thursday

Three people were injured in a two-car pile-up on Salt Spring last Thursday.

The accident occurred when a 1973 Ford driven by Ellen Burgess of Vancouver ran head on into a 1983 Toyota driven by Dennis Hart, also of Vancouver. Passenger in the Hart vehicle, Josie Ronell, was also hurt in the crash.

All three were taken to Lady Minto Hospital for treatment of bruises and later released.

Burgess had pulled out of the Valcourt Centre and was driving north on Lower Ganges Road. Hart was at the entrance to the Upper Ganges Shopping Centre and was making a left turn to drive south on the same road.

Burgess unexpectedly changed lanes and ran head-on into Hart. Damage estimates to both vehicles totalled \$2,000.

Burgess was issued with a traffic violation notice for driving without due care and attention.

No permits required

The danger of fire on Salt Spring has eased and permits will not be required for open fires until spring.

The easing of the situation was noted by the fire department and slash fires, incinerators and such will not require permits.

No licence

The driver of the motorbike was too young and didn't have a driver's licence.

Police stopped the youngster on Arbutus Drive on Mayne Island in March. Michael Mitchell of Salt Spring was charged with allowing the youngster to drive the vehicle.

He entered a guilty plea to the charge when he appeared in Ganges court last week. Judge G.S. Denroche fined him \$35.

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Story of seven-year ocean voyage will be told at Central next week

Highlights of a seven-year sailing voyage will be seen in a two-hour slide presentation at Central Hall on Salt Spring Island next week.

Canadian sailors Winston and Carolynne Bushnell, who spent seven years circumnavigating the earth on their 31-foot ketch, will present the show next Tuesday evening.

Winston Bushnell spent three years building *Dove* in Sudbury, Ont. The boat was launched in 1972 on the Great Lakes at Little Current, Ont., and the family set off on a cruise around the world.

The Bushnells had never travelled beyond North America when Winston traded his miner's job at Inco for an ocean voyage.

Accompanied by their two daughters, Kim and Leslie, then aged 10 and 8, they left the comfort and security of a settled life in Sudbury for adventure on the high seas.

DOWN MISSISSIPPI

Leaving Little Current in August, they sailed through the Great Lakes

and down the Mississippi, arriving in Florida in November. The Bushnells spent some time in the Caribbean before heading through the Panama Canal.

Christmas of 1973 was spent in the Marquesas and the following year saw *Dove* in Tahiti, French Polynesia and the northern Cook Islands. At Pago Pago, Samoa, they stopped and worked for 10 months, and then it was on to Tonga, Fiji and New Zealand in 1975.

The voyagers left New Zealand in April 1976 and made for the New Hebrides.

After crossing the Indian Ocean the Bushnells arrived off the Cape of Good Hope in December where they were caught in a storm that capsized their vessel. *Dove* was flipped stern over bow, an accident known as pitch-poling.

LIMPED INTO CAPE TOWN

The consequences of pitch-poling are often tragic, but the family survived the mishap and limped into Cape Town, South Africa, under jury rig.

The Bushnell family stayed in

Cape Town to work and repair the boat, leaving in February 1978. By this time they were a family of five, son Stephen having been born in December 1977.

They were now on the last leg of their circumnavigation and arrived on the east coast of the United States in 1979. By August of that year they were back in Little Current.

According to the Bushnells, their slide show will take the audience through idyllic Pacific lagoons, into mysterious foreign ports and over sun-warmed Pacific waters.

The show begins Tuesday at 8 pm and admission is \$5.

It's an adventure tale that's better than anything you're going to see on television this week, promise the Canadian sailors.

Public mischief nets fine

She claimed to be the driver but the police disagreed.

Irene Kaye of Salt Spring appeared on a charge of public mischief in Ganges court last week. Judge G.S. Denroche, in fining her \$200, said he took a particularly serious view of the offence.

Kaye had been in a vehicle July 22 when it was involved in an accident near the intersection of Upper and Lower Ganges Roads.

The police arrived to investigate the incident but only one vehicle remained at the scene. The vehicle containing Kaye had left. While the police were checking the situation it returned with Kaye driving.

She claimed to have been the driver when the accident occurred.

Witnesses said a male had been driving and Kaye finally admitted the fact.

The judge questioned why she would be willing to take the blame for the accident and she answered that she had been concerned that the male companion, not named in the court action, would lose his driver's licence.

The accident caused a combined total of \$5,000 to both vehicles.

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Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty years ago

Honours and congratulations flowed to Dr. William Lockhart of Salt Spring. He was granted senior membership in the B.C. Medical Association at a meeting in Victoria. The island doctor had retired to Salt Spring in 1951 at age 80 after a career which began in Manitoba in 1898. Lockhart had practised medicine in Saskatchewan as well before moving to Vancouver.

Aid and comfort to veterans in hospital in Victoria had been sent by the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Salt Spring Legion. The ladies spent \$1,400 on the project during the previous year.

The rector and the warden went fishing and returned home with several large skates. They have been after cod or sole but the skates got in the way. The largest flatfish brought in by the pair weighed in at more than 100 pounds.

A park in Ganges near the boat basin was being discussed by the Chamber of Commerce. No one was sure which level of government controlled the fill area of the proposed park but the chamber urged that it be granted a lease on the area for a nominal sum.

Residents of the top end of Salt Spring, calling themselves the North End Neighbours, gathered clothing and bedding for shipment overseas. The group was in the process of sending the fourth shipment of the year to the Unitarian Service Committee. The clothing and bedding would be used by people in under-developed countries.

The man decided to warm the engine of his car while he fed the chickens. The brakes didn't hold and the car followed him down the hill and crashed into the chicken pen.

Fifteen years ago

A different set of maps would be shown to the residents of Salt Spring. The maps showed which land was considered agricultural and which land wasn't. When the maps had originally been shown, many people raised many objections. The maps were taken back and the entire island was looked at again to refine the limits of farmland. Residents would get a second look at the proposal at a public meeting.

Galiano residents would have an opportunity to vote on improvements to the fire district on that island. They would be asked to approve expenditures for a new fire hall, truck and equipment as well as a lease for land for the hall. The vote would coincide with the civic elections.

Voters would choose seven people to fill seven vacancies at the civic election. The two seats as director to the Capital Regional District, for Salt Spring and the Outer Islands, would be up for

grabs. Also at stake would be five seats on the Gulf Islands School Board. Three of the vacancies were for Salt Spring, one for Mayne and another for Saturna.

Meals-on-Wheels was being considered for Salt Spring. The organizers were seeking information about how many people would use the food delivery service as well as how many volunteers would be available to run it.

The roads of Galiano were rippling and the islanders wanted something done about it. The highways department brought in a machine to iron out the problem. It shook homes and raised dust but the ripples stayed.

Soccer teams from Salt Spring played eight games against opposition from the bigger island. The boys won six of the games but lost two other contests. The Legion side led the way with a 5-0 win over a team from Victoria. The Legion had not lost a game all season.

Ten years ago

When rains fell, the water got deep in Ganges. A resident complained of flooding and the department of public works offered to build a ditch around the property. But the ditch would only move the water elsewhere. Rainbow Road and the highland beyond seemed to be the problem source of the runoff. The Chamber of Commerce had requested action on the water problem but nothing had been done.

A breakwater in Ganges Harbour was needed to protect boats from the southeasterly gales during the winter months. The small boat basin was overcrowded and the harbour needed more facilities for boaters. The breakwater was needed to protect the new mooring facilities for the boats.

Tommy Douglas came to Salt Spring. The popular leader of the New Democratic Party was touring the federal riding of Nanaimo-Cowichan—the Islands in preparation for a by-election. He had lost his seat on the mainland in the general election and was seeking a way back to Ottawa through the local riding.

Fires on Salt Spring required 170 hours to fight. Fire chief Fred Donaghy reported on the year's activity to a meeting of the fire district board. There had been 26 fires on the island and the volunteers also put in 1,200 hours of practice.

The pigs had been greased and the contestants readied. School children of Salt Spring would chase the greased pigs as a money-raising event to pay for the maintenance of Centennial Park in the village. Interest in the contest had come not only from the island but also from Vancouver. Businesses purchased piglets for the contest with the money going into the fund.

Five years ago

The Ganges plan was ready and Salt Spring residents would hear it discussed at a public meeting scheduled for the weekend. The plan had been three years in the making. It had started as an effort of the Capital Regional District but had been taken over by the Islands Trust when that group had been formed. When approved by the residents and government authorities, the plan would become part of the island community plan.

Court action to gain an injunction to stop the proposed sewer for Ganges was unsuccessful. Yvette Valcourt, Lionel Wood and Fred Sibley had launched the effort in B.C. Supreme Court. The judge ruled that the sewer project was being undertaken within the provisions of the Pollution Control Act.

Jaws of Life would be part of the equipment for the Salt Spring Fire Department. The tool would hydraulically cut open a damaged, jammed automobile as a means of getting to the occupants to save lives. The machine bore a price tag of \$8,000. The island Rotary Club would use the proceeds of the Grey Cup breakfast to pay for the device.

Regular movies would be part of Salt Spring night life. Dan Evanishen and Gill Smith would be screening movies at Central Hall on weekends. A community cinema club would also be formed.

School gets accreditation

The school on the hill in Ganges is indeed a high school and will be for the next five years.

Gulf Islands Secondary School received accreditation recently and the definition is good for five years. A group of school officials came to the island to check things out. They talked to school board officials, teachers and residents.

The accreditation means they liked what they saw.

Accreditation is the way the ministry of education has of saying a

school is or isn't doing a good job. Each secondary school in the province must submit to the examination on a regular basis.

District school superintendent Mike Marshall said of the exercise, "That (five-year accreditation) in itself means they feel we have a good school up there."

School trustees decided to send a thankyou letter to the teachers of the school for co-operating in the exercise and participating in the accreditation process.

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Fishboat burns

The fishboat *Lone Rock* caught fire at the Vesuvius wharf on Salt Spring recently.

Fire department officials put the cause of the blaze on a camp stove which flooded and exploded when someone tried to light it. The vessel, owned by J. Campbell, suffered extensive fire damage and later sank.

No estimate of damage was given.

Ontario Rotarian to speak

Guest speaker at the Salt Spring Rotary Club dinner meeting October 25 will be the liaison man between Canadian Rotarians and CIDA, the Canadian International Development Agency.

David Kennedy, a member of the Rotary Club of Guelph, Ont., has just returned from India where he observed the results of efforts by Rotary International to inoculate thousands of children against measles and other diseases.

The meeting begins at 6:30 pm at the Harbour House Hotel. Visitors are welcome to attend but they are urged to contact the hotel beforehand.

Sign is incorrect

Work on the ferry wharf at Vesuvius Bay began Tuesday when workers of Dolphin Piledriving of Sidney arrived at the scene. A tug towed a work barge and crane to the site last Friday. Although the sign says it's a federal project, the work is

being conducted by the ferry corporation. The wharf will be restored to the shape it was in before the ferry rammed it in early August. Work is expected to be completed in late November.

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Small claims court is one option

Some parents paid while others didn't and the school trustees are trying to sort through the confusion.

Students from the Outer Islands attending Gulf Islands Secondary School on Salt Spring have an option of travelling daily by water taxi or spending the week boarding

with a Salt Spring family. Students from Saturna Island face the most difficult task going to and from Salt Spring daily. The way around the problem is for the students to come to Salt Spring Monday morning and spend the

week boarding at a home on the island.

The school board pays \$175 per month to board the students. The parents are expected to chip in with \$56 as their share of the cost. The money from the parents goes into a general account for the school district.

The confusion arose when some parents on Saturna refused to pay their share of the allowance. They thought the money went to subsidize the water taxi service.

The trustees of the Gulf Islands School Board have been attempting to sort things out. A motion sitting in the wings for some time would cut off the boarding allowance if the parents had not paid their \$56 share.

But to put the motion into effect would cause problems for the students.

An option being considered is taking parents who have not paid to small claims court.

Moneymaker's been quiet

Moneymaker Reef in Ganges Harbour was a lonely place this year as boaters ignored the navigational hazard.

The Ganges unit of the Coast Guard did not have to answer any distress calls from boats on that set of rocks.

Up to October 11, the unit had 121 calls for assistance this year. By the same date last year they had answered 145 calls.

The unit went as far north as Sturgeon Bank off the mouth of the Fraser River and as far south as Johnstone Reef off Arbutus Cove in Victoria.

While Moneymaker Reef was ignored, 18 boats found various rocks in various areas of Gulf Island

waters. The Coast Guard unit also answered eight fire calls from boats ablaze.

The majority of assistance calls involved breakdowns. Other calls, such as boats being off course and lost as well as careless boaters who left microphones on, also occupied the unit's time.

The vessel being used by the Ganges unit, the 122, is in refit for a few weeks and is being replaced by the *Moorhen* from Vancouver.

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
