# Minister says no to request

The minister of education took 18 days to say no to a request for a meeting with representatives of the Gulf Islands School Board.

The trustees sent a letter to Jack Heinrich, the minister of education, on September 9 asking for a meeting with him and local MLA Hugh Curtis, who is also the provincial finance minister.

The reply, a polite no, was dated September 27 and received by the school board on October 3.

The school trustees wanted to discuss the provincial government's

restraint program with the two ministers. They also wanted to talk about the hovermarine service as a means of transporting school students between islands.

"I find myself totally committed lately to attendance in the legislature," wrote Heinrich. The only meetings he has been able to find time for have been with such groups as the British Columbia School Trustees Association (BCSTA) executive.

The local school board should direct its concerns through the

BCSTA "which is organized to articulate such concerns to me," he suggested.

He also suggested that "any proposals on the hovermarine service should be directed first to Mr. Jim Doyle, executive director, school facilities, in this ministry."

When the letter from the education minister was read to the recent meeting of the school trustees, it was noted that no reply had come from Curtis.

# Former teachers, students travel to Mayne

They came from Islington, Ont., Calgary and Fairview, Alta., and from Ladysmith, Nanaimo, Victoria, Powell River and Blind Bay, B.C. The occasion was the Mayne Island school centennial celebration on October 15.

More than 100 guests attended a coffee party hosted by the Mayne Island firemen in the island's second school, built in 1894, which was followed by a luncheon at the new school complex.

Among the guests were teachers representing every decade from 1920 to the present and students from as far back as 1904. Two of the

teachers were Isabel (Milne) Johnston, who taught from 1921 to 1923, and Jesse (Steves) Hall, who taught in 1923 and 1924. The oldest pupil in attendance was Muriel (Brethour) Rourke, aged 88.

At the open house ceremony in the afternoon, islands MP Jim Manly, who had flown from Ottawa with his wife for the occasion, presented a flag to the school. District superintendent Mike Marshall presented a commemorative plaque and special addresses were made by Gulf Islands School Board chairman Charles Hingston and Robert Aitken, who spoke on behalf of former students.

Many former Japanese students attended. In 1942 one-third of Mayne Island's population was Japanese. But in April of that year the school lost 17 Japanese pupils who, with their families, were relocated because of Japan's involvement in the second world war. As a result, the school closed for two years because there weren't enough students to warrant engaging a teacher.

A plaque listing those 17 Japanese children was presented from the centennial committee to the school. Two of the 17, Mrs. T. Kitagawa (Tomiko Kadonaga) and Mrs. S. Hikada (Sumiko Saga), accepted it on behalf of their fellow pupils from John Nagata and Marie Elliott.

Several contests for current students at the Mayne school were held in conjunction with the centennial.

Winners of the poster contest, sponsored by the Paint and Sketch Club, were Mykella Hekkannen (kindergarten), Adina McAlonan (Grade 1), Wayne Fitzgerald (Grades 2-3), Danny Bjornfelt (Grades 4-5), Jimmy Aitken (Grade 6-7) and Dan Worrall (Grade 8).

Winners of the essay contest, sponsored by the Gulf Islands branch of the B.C. Historical Federation, were Becky Fleetwood (Grade 1), Vania Williams (Grades 2-3), Christy Niemi (Grades 4-5), David Forest (Grades 6-7), Dan Worrall (Grade 8) and Michelle Laughlin and Robert Hammer (Grade 9).

## Purification system to be installed

Visitors to the Mayne Island School are asked not to drink the water.

A check of the water has revealed unacceptably high counts of coliform and the school district is planning to add a purification system to get around the problem.

Frank Sutherland, supervisor of works for the school district, told the trustees last week that prices for a system are being sought. The money has been allotted and when the bids are in, a system will be installed to clean up the water.

The source of the contamination is not known. The well goes down through 150 feet of shale.

Wells in the Miners Bay area of Mayne Island have been contaminated by high coliform counts for some time.

## Fishing rods missing

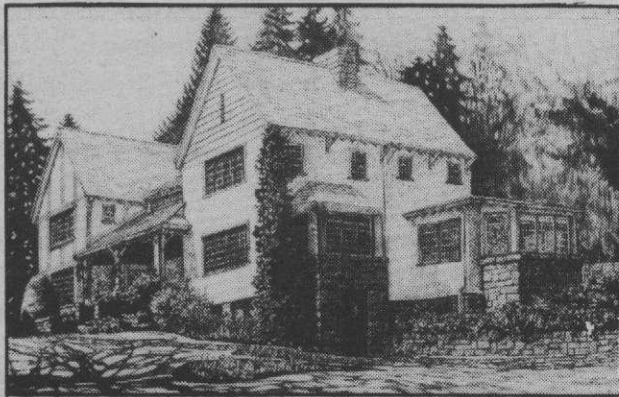
When a boat owner returned to his vessel recently his fishing rods were gone.

# KICK-OFF

## Canada vs. Mexico was weekend's key game

Soccer last weekend started with the appearance of a very wet slate of games and ended in Victoria on a sunny, warm Sunday afternoon with Canada defeating Mexico 1-0 in an Olympic qualifying match.

On Friday night Salt Spring was under a deluge of water that gave all the signs of washing out our whole weekend program.

Naturally, once we had cancelled our intra-island program of games, the weatherman played his usual game of dirty tricks and the weather cleared up.

The key game of the weekend did not involve our teams, although many Salt Spring Islanders were in attendance, but was the Canada-Mexico game at Royal Athletic Park on Sunday afternoon. The game was the first match of an Olympic qualifying series, with the winner advancing to the Los Angeles Olympics in 1984.

The Canadian squad was made up of a combination of professionals from the NASL, semi-pros from the CPSL, and a couple of amateurs from Victoria. The

professionals were led by well known players like Mike Sweeney and David Norman from the Whitecaps, Dale Mitchell and Gerry Gray from the Manic and Bruce Wilson from the Blizzard.

The Mexican team was made up of amateur players, most around 20 years of age. Being a young team it was expected they would be underdogs for this match.

The early going was very even as both teams tested each other out. Slowly the Canadian squad started to carry the play and the chances to score were coming their way. This

pressure eventually paid off as midway through the opening half Canada converted a free kick when a fine cross was volleyed home from the 18-yard line.

From that point on the Canadian squad dominated the match and had it not been for the fine play of the Mexican goalie the score would have been much higher.

The Canadian team put on a fine show for the 4,000-plus fans and if

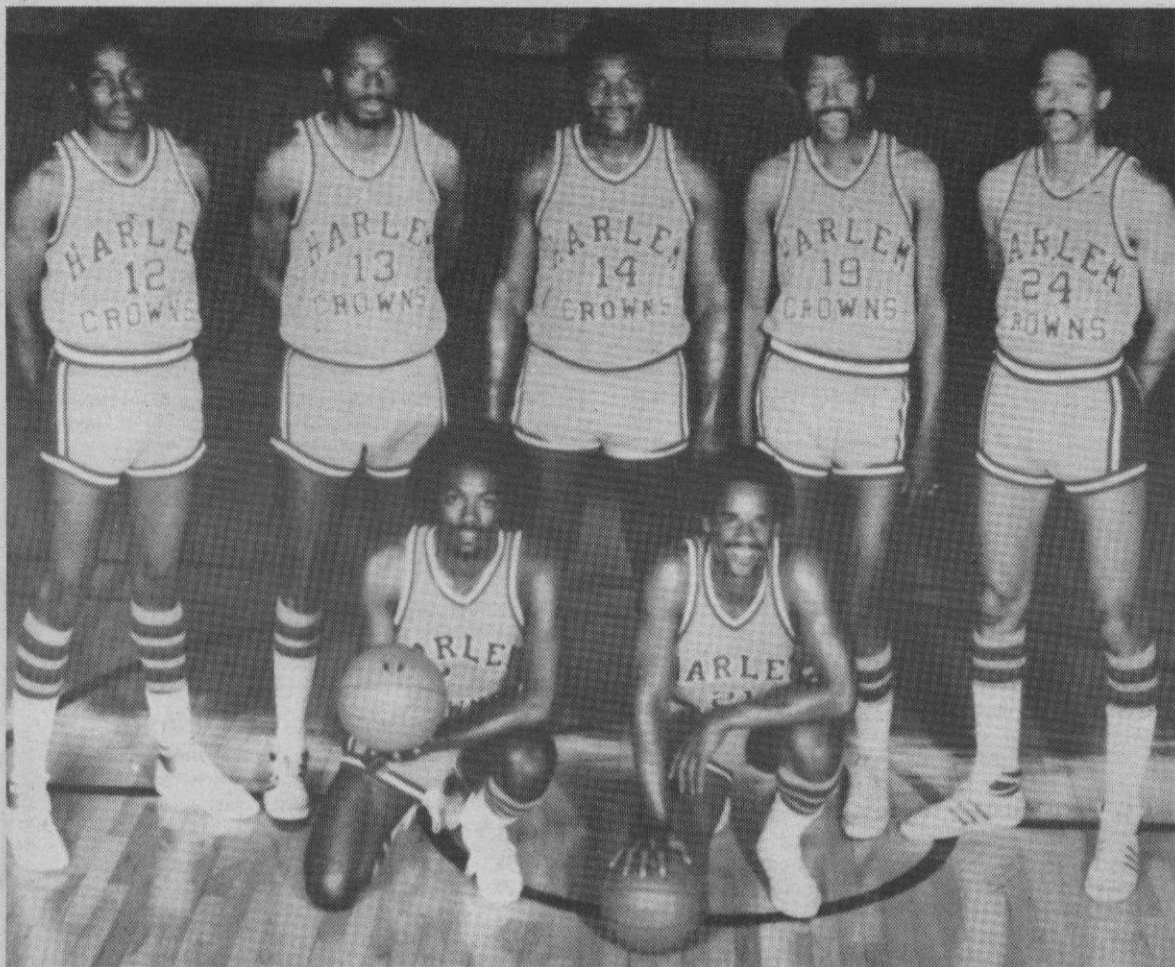

# Growing food organically has many rewards

I'll bet you got the drift and realized that there has been method to my madness. Not without good and valid reasons have I written about chloroplasts and mitochondria.

Around these two direct descendants of the beginning of life revolves all life. They are present in every living cell of all and any oxygen-breathing life, from seaweed to man and everything in between. These two actually run this place, for between them they make the oxygen and arrange for its use. And with them we are deeply and completely woven in to the web of life, we are actually utterly immersed in it, and with our chemicals, poisons and ignorance

we are busy unravelling our thread of life.

That is why I, for one, prefer to grow our food "organically", in harmony with our web of life. And the rewards are many: healthy, wholesome fruit and produce, which has only been touched by the sun, the rain and human hands; a healthy garden without any problems other than the odd aphid or cabbage worm.

## NO CABBAGE WORMS

I never did see a single cabbage worm. Just a few holes in the outer leaves. Somebody, probably my wasps, took care of them. And in this banner year for aphids we had only a few umbels of dill which were infested with them. We did not

bother with these either as only less than one out of 10 were affected.

All this on only half-decent soil, with what amounted to nothing more than a sprinkling of compost, with a bit of lime and rock phosphate. The total cost of our lime was 10 dollars, and this will last for about five years. For rock phosphate we spent \$30 and this will last for 10 years. Cost per year for phosphate would be \$3, for dolomite lime it would be \$2 per year.

Our soil conditioning cost for this year then amounts to \$5. Our chicken manure is free, so is our compost. We did not even turn the compost, due to my preoccupation with building our house, and neither did we get around to collecting more than three little plastic bags of seaweed this year.

Instead of spending our money and time on poisons and equipment for its application we do encourage our spiders, beneficial predatory wasps and flies and our common wasps, our birds and bats, to patrol our garden.

## DO A BETTER JOB

These do a far better job than I ever could for this is their purpose in the web of life.

Our nitrogen comes from nitrogen-fixing bacteria on the roots of our legumes and clover, phosphate from mycorrhizal fungi and potash we do not know yet from whence it comes. Until we find out we apply a little wood ash now and then.

Altogether, the deepest and most profound reward comes with our knowledge that our garden is in harmony with our web of life, and that the health and fertility of our soil will increase with every passing year, courtesy of this web of life. This, and the knowledge that our produce is as wholesome as can be, and the priceless sense of peace and harmony with the life which sustains us, is our ultimate reward.

And there are other rewards as well. Earlier this year one of our market farms contacted me about their problem with clubroot disease and root maggot infestation in their cabbage patch. Eighty cauliflower plants were affected, some severely, and another scheduled planting of the same magnitude would be a waste of time and money in view of this situation.

## LIME AND SEAWEED

I recommended liming the soil as this had not been done and an application of seaweed mulch or foliar spray of seaweed liquid. At our fall fair I was told that two applications of seaweed spray completely corrected this problem and that even the most severely affected plants recovered and made satisfactory six-inch diameter curds.

I do not know if they won any prizes for their cauliflower. But there it is, a market gardener's means of income rescued from the effects of two severely stunting diseases, one of which is considered incurable even with our best poisons.

To have contributed in some measure to the success of this venture against severe odds by

relying on life-positive means instead of life-negative measures, is reward beyond price, and knowledge beyond price.

And here we have come full circle again. That this simple and fundamental lesson learned from the humble occupation of gardening applies as fundamentally to our politics as to all our affairs is indeed humbling.

It is as simple as this: is what we do politically, economically, religiously, socially and personally life-positive or life-negative? This is all we need to ask of ourselves, and of those to whom we have given any kind of control over our affairs.

I do not know how I do it. To find this political, social and agricultural dynamite in my garden just blows me away.

# Down Through the Years with Driftwood

## Twenty Years Ago

The recent provincial election in the riding which included the Gulf Islands had been too close to call. The officials waited for the results of the absentee ballot count. The difference between first and second shrunk to 12 votes when those ballots were counted. David Stupich of the NDP had 4,286 votes and Earle Westwood of Social Credit had 4,274 votes. A recount was scheduled.

**Open house** at the site of the newly-acquired property for the Salt Spring library drew up to 100 people. On display were plans for turning the former boatbuilding shop into a well-equipped library. The directors of the library had begun a fund-raising campaign to finance the needs of the construction program.

**A one-shot tag day** to raise money for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind on Salt Spring raised an island record of \$415.47. The old record had stood for one year as fund-raisers had collected \$269.69 for the blind the previous year.

**Poetry Corner in Driftwood** marked the changing hours. Without apparent rhyme or reason Men change their clocks twice every season; Meanwhile the sunrise and the rooster Keep the same schedule that they uster.

The Pennsylvania Angler was blamed for that one.

**The man** lived at Walker Hook on Salt Spring. He travelled to the Cranberry to pick cherries and the product of the excursion made a delicious pie. The cherry tree was in one of the earlier orchards on the island and the fruit was to be picked in early September. But the man had picked them in late October.

## Fifteen Years Ago

**Greasy Pig Stuff** contest netted the Centennial Park maintenance committee \$800. The children chased the greased pigs and the money went to help keep the park in order. The committee had 11 pigs which were sold to various businesses on the island for the chase.

**Galiano Island** residents were up in arms against apple pickers. The pickers came when no one was around and took without asking. One orchard, dating back to 1880, was the target of vandalism. Several of the old trees were uprooted and the apples strewn on the ground. Visitors should be aware, said one resident, that all the orchards on the island are privately owned and should be respected.

**Work on the highways** of the Penders continued. Another mile of blacktop had been put down on the road between Bedwell Harbour and Boat Hook. With the completion of that portion, 15 of the 60 miles of roads on North and South Pender Islands were paved.

**Toilets in the park** were the subject of discussion at a meeting of the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce. Centennial Park in Ganges attracted people but there were no facilities for them. The provincial government would not approve any more septic tank installations in Ganges and the park went toiletless.

## Ten Years Ago

**Reconstruction** of the school in Ganges would cost a further \$250,000 to finish. The Gulf Islands School Board authorized borrowing of that amount to complete the job. The loan would bear 8.5% interest per year.

**Election time** in the Gulf Islands approached. There were three candidates for the two positions as directors to the Capital Region. Two men, George Heinekey and Jim Wilkinson, were seeking the position for Salt Spring. Incumbent Marc Holmes had decided to take a rest from politics and would not be running. Jim Campbell of Saturna was seeking re-election as director for the Outer Islands.

**Openings on the board** of school trustees for Salt Spring had attracted three candidates while the two positions for other islands, Mayne and Saturna, seemed open. Charles Baltzer and Ione Guthrie would seek re-election against a third candidate, Dr. John Bumstead. Neither Tom Davidson, Saturna trustee, nor Gordon Ducklow of Mayne, had announced their intentions.

**The Queen of the Islands** served the islands royally, 10 years before. Now, however, the little boat could not meet the demand for service between the mainland and the Gulf Islands. Talks between B. C. Ferries and the transportation committee of the Salt Spring Chamber of

Commerce were to be held to discuss the matter.

**The ambulance** had answered 182 calls for service for the year ending August 31. A meeting of the Lions Activity Society heard a report on ambulance service for the Gulf Islands. The service had a membership of 760 including 20 residents of the Outer Islands.

**The pilot** for the Victoria Flying Club was facing a charge of flying too low. The charge, however, was withdrawn when it was proved that he was on the ground on the day in question.

## Five Years Ago

**The Ganges plan** was presented at a public meeting and met with opposition. The Islands Trust was discriminating against businesses which were not in the harbourside area of Ganges, claimed one objector. Ribbon development along the highway between the two commercial areas of Ganges should be encouraged to tie the areas together, was one suggestion.

**The Pender School** would have a library. Gulf Island school trustees decided to renovate the portable classroom on the school grounds for use as a library. The construction of the school had gone over budget and the portable would cost less to convert to a library than to a classroom, the trustees were told.

## Energy Data

### Ceiling and Wall Insulation

When people start considering adding insulation to their homes, upgrading the ceiling is usually what they think of first.

To assess the insulation you currently have in your attic, someone fairly agile should go up to look around. The existing insulation is probably mineral wool (if not, ask the B.C. Hydro representative or a reputable insulation contractor for information on how to proceed). Check the insulation for dampness, which can seriously impair its insulating ability. If it is damp, the source of the moisture must be found and eliminated. Roof leaks must be repaired; ceiling gaps through which warm moisture-laden air has leaked upward and condensed must be sealed and caulked. (Caulking procedures were covered in a previous article.) If there have been condensation problems, attic ventilation may have to be increased. If the dampness is a long-standing problem, make sure there is no lasting damage to the structure, such as wood rot. Then the insulation should be dried out.

Measure the depth of the existing insulation to determine how much should be added. Hydro's Attic Insulation Ruler translates inches or centimetres of mineral or glass wool batts into the corresponding "R" or "RSI" values. Our current recommendation for ceiling insulation in new homes is at least RSI 7.0 (R40) and for existing homes, at least RSI 6.0 (R34).

While your agile assistant is up in the attic, he or she should make sure that the air vents are clear of obstruction. This will ensure proper venting of the attic space. Openings that penetrate into the attic for wiring and plumbing, recessed light fixtures, etc., should also be checked—all gaps must be sealed and caulked before insulation is added. Recessed light fixtures present an additional problem. Insulation cannot be added over them, since the heat build-up could lead to a fire hazard. Depending on the type of fixture, it must either be removed or covered with a special box (which can be fabricated from 13 mm (1/2") gypsum board) before insulation is added. Further details on the box and other information can be obtained from B.C. Hydro data sheet H210, *Typical Insulation Practice and Recommendations*.

If you wish to add your attic insulation in the form of batts or loose fill, you or a work party can do the job. If you choose blown cellulose fibre or blown mineral wool insulation, you had better have it installed by a qualified contractor.

The next area to look at is your exterior walls. Homes built before 1945 are unlikely to have any insulation in the walls unless some has been added since construction. One way to ascertain how much insulation, if any, exists in walls is to drill a small hole on the inside of the wall from some unobtrusive spot, such as a cupboard. Then probe inside the wall with a thin wire or straightened coat hanger. If there is no insulation, cellulose or mineral wool fibre can be blown into the wall cavity—again, a job best done by a contractor.

When examining the exterior walls, be on the lookout for gaps through which moisture can penetrate. If left unremedied, this situation could result in damp insulation, fungus growth, or dry rot. Joints where the wall meets the floor should be carefully sealed and caulked. Air leaks where electrical outlets enter the walls can be sealed with a foam gasket.

To ensure that walls are as vapour tight as possible, they should be painted with a couple of coats of varnish or enamel or one of the vapour seal coatings now on the market.

If basement walls are accessible, the insulation should be increased to at least RSI 2.1 (R12).

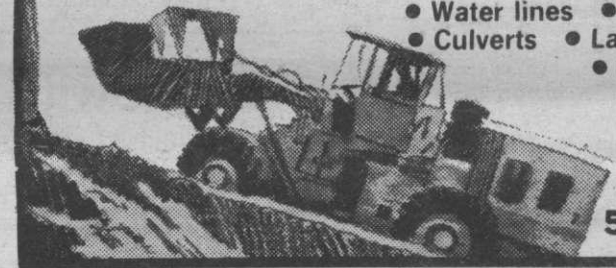
