Bas Cobanli's new baking bell originated with the early Turks

If the quantity and quality of home-baked bread entries at the Salt Spring Fall Fair are any indication, islanders are both avid bread bakers and consumers.

With that in mind, local potter Bas Cobanli has come up with a new creation, the baking bell. Originating with the early Turks and later adopted by the Greeks and Romans as a portable oven, the baking bell has been re-designed to be used in a modern oven with the baking ingredients used today.

And how does the bread rate? "It's excellent," exclaimed *Driftwood* photographer Alice Richards, who last week sampled a loaf made by Gill Cobanli in her husband's invention. "It has a beautiful, hard crust that's hard to achieve when baking bread," said Richards.

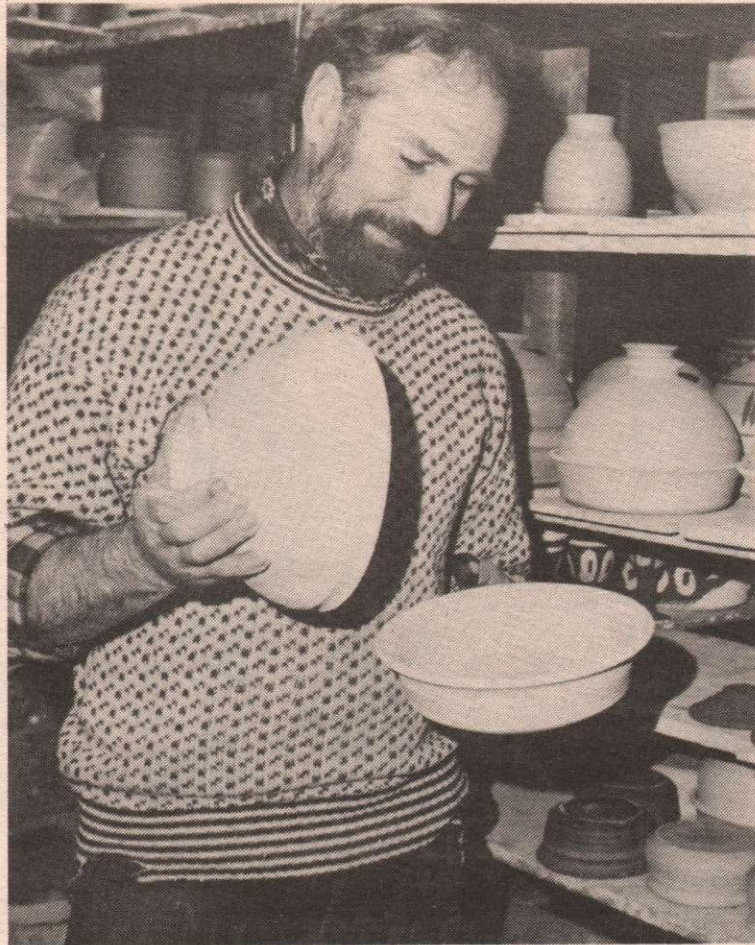
A civil engineer, Bas Cobanli arrived in Canada from England in 1958. A year later he and Gill were married in Lillooet where he was employed in dam construction.

By the early 70's they were settled in West Vancouver with two sons and a daughter. It was after his wife had enrolled in a pottery class that he became tempted to try it himself.

In 1973 they moved to Salt Spring Island and later the same year, after becoming sufficiently confident in his work, Bas Cobanli offered it for sale at Artcraft.

Since then his pottery has become sought after by both residents and visitors alike.

In developing the baking bell, Gill Cobanli's role has been to test her husband's creation by baking loaf after loaf of bread until she had

perfected a recipe for it. That recipe is included with the purchase of a baking bell.

The bells will be on display Saturday at the Loom Room in

Mouat's Mall and samples of bread baked in it will be available between 10 am and noon. The Cobanlis will be on hand to answer questions about using the baking bell.

Six lakes on Salt Spring without zoning safeguard

There is no protective zoning for six small lakes on Salt Spring Island.

Planner Richard McKellar recently reported to the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee that an investigation of the island's lakes was carried out by the ministry of the environment in 1981. The ministry looked into the domestic water potential of Blackburn, Bullock, Ford and Stowe Lakes.

A report from the planner explained that another two lakes were not considered. They are the small lake upstream from Bullock Lake and a lake adjacent to Musgrave Road, south of Fulford Valley.

The Musgrave lake is slightly smaller than Ford Lake, or about 3.5 hectares, reported McKellar.

"It is clogged with logs and stumps but its watershed is essentially undeveloped."

The lake upstream from Bullock Lake is set in forest and "most likely very similar to Bullock Lake," he noted.

Blackburn and Roberts Lakes are within the Cusheon Lake watershed, trustees were told, and these lakes are subject to the same zoning and subdivision regulations as are applied to the Maxwell,

Weston and St. Mary Lake watersheds.

The 1981 survey reported that Blackburn, Bullock and Ford Lakes are marginal sources of domestic drinking water because of their present eutrophic status.

The same report warned that domestic water supplies from all the lakes should be chlorinated and filtered.

Stowe has the best water, followed by Blackburn and Ford Lakes. Bullock Lake showed the poorest quality water.

The planner also drew the attention of trustees to the results of the study which showed Stowe Lake superior to Bullock in more than 30 of 42 parameters studies. Stowe Lake was up on Ford Lake in more than 33 of those areas.

Sockeyes' game one of their finest

With only 15 minutes to go a Becky Legg clearance put Brenda Akerman in on a break-away and she easily converted the chance to clinch the win.

Purification system overcomes problem

The kettles won't be in use as often now that a solution to polluted drinking water has been found.

Residents at Cedarview Mobile Home Park on Salt Spring had been warned by the Capital Region health office in the spring to boil water before using it. The water, from Blackburn Lake, contained a high fecal coliform count.

Since that time, a water purification system of filters, ultra-violet light and chlorine has been installed and health officials have approved it.

Norm Hays, owner of the mobile home court, received confirmation of the health office approval in a letter dated October 21. A copy of the letter also went to each residence in the court.

The recent installation of an automatic disinfection system had eliminated the coliform as bacteriological sampling had shown, wrote health inspector P.J. Jemmeson in the letter.

"We feel that it is no longer necessary to boil or otherwise treat the water for domestic use," he said.

The water from the lake is pumped to a holding tank and treated with slightly less than 12 kilograms of salt and three-quarters of a cup of chlorine every two days.

The water flows through an ultra-violet light system and several filters before entering the storage tank ready for use.

Scottie Innes is the maintenance

man at the mobile home park and he checks the system each day.

"This system has more pipes and valves than Carter has pills," he said, "but it really works."

The system had been purchased and put in place when the original CRD order came to the residents of the park last spring. During the summer both Innes and Hays worked to eliminate the bugs from the system.

That portion of coliform not treated by the chlorine is done in by the ultra-violet light, said Innes. The filters ensure that the water tastes good. The entire system to each trailer and from the lake had been treated in the spring with a massive dose of chlorine to clean it out.

The swimming area of Blackburn Lake showed a coliform count of five parts per million consistently during the checks made in the summer.

The intake for the Cedarview water is located near the centre of the lake at a depth of six feet. The health inspection officer said that if the potable water showed a coliform count in that location, it is probable that the lake is polluted.

To prove the extent of pollution would require extensive testing. The source of pollution could be human, bird or animal, noted the inspector.

Meanwhile, the residents of the mobile home park can ease the load on their kettles and enjoy a glass of water.

"It's About Time"

N.B. This is the third of a series of articles dealing with key issues in the forthcoming election for Regional Director.

Community Health and Hospital Services

The Capital Regional District is involved with health services on Salt Spring Island by providing public health nursing, health inspection, home care nursing services, and long term care assessment at the Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital. In addition a relatively small amount of money is allocated to the hospital for some equipment and minor building changes. The responsibility for providing these services is invested in the Hospital and Health Planning Commission, which in turn is the workhorse for the Capital Regional Hospital Board, identical to the CRD board itself.

All improvements in our Salt Spring Island hospital facilities, and particularly the provision of new facilities, has to be considered by the Hospital and Health Planning Commission. Recommendations go from them to the CRD board and then where necessary to the Provincial Government. The major importance of the CRD from our standpoint is the planning function, and while our input is important, it is especially important to assure the support of other members of the Commission and the Board.

I believe all of us would agree that apart from our schools, the hospital is our most valuable institutional resource. There is an excellent hospital board to protect and enhance that facility. Since I have served with the Board as Chief of Staff for five years, I have had an excellent opportunity to assess the medical needs of the community. It would appear obvious that if the Salt Spring Island Regional Director were Chief of Staff of the hospital, attended meetings of the Board, and were also a practising physician on the island, there would be a tremendous opportunity for presenting our case

to the Region when we wanted additional facilities.

I have the permission of the Board to mention some of our plans that would need approval. We are looking at, and advertising for, "Family Care Homes" within the community. When these are available they will be a valuable additional asset. Details will be available in the *Driftwood*. We next would hope that some combined long term care, convalescent care, nursing home facility could be provided to supplement our present hospital beds. Preliminary informal discussions have already taken place. I am personally very anxious to see a Hospice (care of the terminally ill) programme started on the Island, and this would be located within such a unit. Finally the long range study prepared last year for the hospital calls for additional extended care beds in the relatively near future.

Finally it would be very desirable if some suitable space could be located to operate a day care programme for the elderly. This programme is designed not only to provide a social centre for the elderly, or perhaps a place for a noon meal, but to provide some medical services such as nursing care, nutritional advice, and some medical services. Its purpose of course is to keep the elderly persons active, healthy, happy, and to keep them in their own homes for as long as possible, as most of them would prefer.

In summary, I feel that I have a good deal to offer the community in this regard. But to be able to more effectively work for these objectives I first need your support: your vote on November 19th.

Island-based chocolate factory has growing clientele

Sweet things are coming from Mayne Island these days and people of the islands have developed an appreciation for them.

Robert Attwell hustles about trying to meet that appreciation, supplying Robert's Chocolates to a growing clientele.

Attwell manufactures and sells chocolates under the trade name Robert's Chocolates, an operation conducted from his home on Fernhill Road on Mayne.

The attractions bear such names as Choc-a-toes, Brandy Cream Truffles or Almond Bark. He sells the products at various stores on the Gulf Islands, in Victoria and by mail order to places as far away as New York City.

Mayne Islanders have known the sweet products for about three years, and this year Attwell is seeking a wider market. A storekeeper from Rimbey, Alberta, was visiting friends on Salt Spring and tried a sample of the chocolates.

He liked what he tasted and Attwell had an outlet in Alberta when the man decided to carry the chocolates in his new store.

Which is the way Attwell operates. He and his wife, Sylvia Savels, make the chocolates with the help of part-time workers. Attwell tries to keep things flexible enough to take advantage of any opening such as the man from Rimbey.

"In order to be successful as a manufacturer, especially in this area," he said, "you have to go a step beyond ordinary marketing."

No stranger to marketing

Attwell knows a thing or two about marketing. He hails from Calgary where he spent 14 years with Simpson-Sears. He has a degree in business administration from Mount Royal College in Calgary.

He became a buyer for the department store and took over supervision of the catalogue sales operation and eventually became store manager.

Savels, meanwhile, became a salesman for a patio furniture company and when the focus of sales shifted to the west coast, she was transferred to Vancouver.

They loaded their furniture from

a large apartment in Calgary and drove across the mountains to a smaller apartment in Vancouver. With furniture to spare, Attwell decided to sell what was not needed.

He rented a store on Vancouver's Broadway from which to sell the excess furniture. The operation was a success and Vancouver shoppers bought used furniture from Crazy Harry and Lazy Mary Emporium for eight months.

At about that time the couple were invited to a party on Pender Island. They did not know where or what the Gulf Islands were. They came, they saw and they were enchanted.

Attwell decided to buy property on Mayne Island for a weekend retreat. They commuted from Vancouver for the two-day rest but eventually found that the process had reversed itself. They were spending more time on Mayne and commuting to Vancouver.

Worked at a bakery

He had a job as sales manager for a bakery in the city and his boss wanted to make chocolates to sell through the store. Attwell became involved in learning about chocolates and enjoyed it.

The couple decided to make chocolates on Mayne and they also opened the Treasure Chest as an outlet for Savels' creative works. Their efforts became aimed at living and working on Mayne.

She designs and makes jewellery and the Treasure Chest provides an outlet for her products.

Attwell discovered a good market on Salt Spring for chocolates.

"Salt Spring has a lot of chocolate freaks," he says in describing the success of his product on the largest Gulf Island.

The sales on Salt Spring are better than in the several stores in Victoria which carry the chocolates.

To meet the growing demand for his chocolate products, Attwell has built himself a chocolate factory. He recently visited Paris, France, to buy machinery and whatnot to help in the operation.

The Fernhill property also will have a studio for Savels to create jewellery and a patio where customers seeking chocolates can relax.

"It won't be just a tearoom patio," said Attwell, "but a place for sharing a rural atmosphere."

Robert's Chocolates features 10 variations on Truffles, eight kinds of cream chocolates and a dozen standard varieties as well as six types of chocolate bars.

The chocolate used in the process, only pure Swiss chocolate, comes in semi-sweet, butter, dark and milk chocolate.

The amount of cocoa butter in the chocolate affects the quality, he

said. Some companies introduce such ingredients as vegetable shortening or oil as well as paraffin wax to make the chocolate go further.

"Taste it," said Attwell. If after one minute of finishing a bite a taste of chocolate remains you can be sure there was an additive. Good chocolate tastes good while you're eating it, he said. But when the

chocolate is gone, the taste should also go.

Attwell has staged his campaign to introduce the world to Robert's Chocolates very carefully and he is calling on his years in business to ensure success.

Both he and Savels want to remain on Mayne.

"There's a lot more in life than chasing a buck," he said.

Passive parks are approved by committee

There are passive parks on Salt Spring Island.

Two weeks ago trustees of the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee heard a report from planner Richard McKellar explaining the meaning of the term, now being used in connection with appropriate lands in that category.

The committee adopted a resolution defining the term.

Passive park refers to any area used for recreation without motors and requiring no extensive environmental modification to let them go on.

For example, trustees were told, walking, nature studies, swimming and picnicking would be logical uses for such land.

Facilities permitted in such an area could be trails, with maintenance; minimal clearing with measures to hold the soil, such as grassing; pit privies and garbage receptacles, with parking provision at the perimeter.

Highest temperature at Salt Spring

September in the Gulf Islands began wet and ended cool. The first day of the month brought an average of slightly less than 20 millimetres of rain and by day 30 the temperature had dipped to one degree Celsius on Salt Spring. The rain fell for 11 days of the month on Salt Spring for a total of 76.4 mm. Saturna, on the other hand, experienced only 39.4 mm of rain spread over nine days. There was measurable precipitation on Pender on eight days to a depth of 67.3 mm. Galiano got away with only five wet days but it rained

hard when it did and 61.5 mm was measured. That island was warmed to a high of 22 degrees on September 21 and chilled to 5.5 degrees on September 29. The average temperature was 13.9 degrees and the average of the low temperatures stood at 9.8 degrees. Saturna had an average temperature of 13.3 degrees with a high of 20 coming on the first day of the month. The lowest temperature hit 6.5 degrees on September 28. Pender followed a similar temperature pattern with an average for the month at 12.8 degrees. The

high struck 21.5 degrees on September 4 and the lowest thermometer reading occurred on the 29th at two degrees. Salt Spring recorded the highest Gulf Island temperature at 22.5 degrees on September 21 and 22. The low came on September 19 and 28 with a reading of 0. The average temperature for Salt Spring was 11.5 degrees. The weather statistics are gathered on each island by volunteer weather observers. No information is available for Mayne Island.

Twiggy, shrubby corokia is intricately graceful

I cannot believe such grace. How can anything be so intricately graceful, so simple, so ordinary? Yet there it is, grace beyond comprehension, beyond reason, beyond belief.

This is one beautiful introduction to almost anything and it is extremely difficult not to follow all of a dozen avenues into grace, some of them cosmic, others very down to earth. But this shall be an earthly one, an introduction to "Corokia".

Corokia hails from New Zealand, a twiggy, shrubby thing, lean and sparse, yet of uncommon grace. She (it is hard not to think of it as female) can grow to 10 feet tall, and almost as wide, with a mass of curiously bent and twisted twigs which are almost black.

TOUCH OF LEAF

This twiggy structure is beautifully enhanced by just a touch of leaf. Tiny, quarter-inch leaves, silvery white below, dark green above, almost round, sparsely dotted here and there just in the right places and in the right amount, provide the perfect counterpoint to the wildly graceful branch pattern.

It is hard to put one's finger on exactly where this exuberant grace comes from. The little twig goes up, goes down, goes up and down again, curves a bit, then goes up and down a few more times and that is it. But what grace.

There is not one single twig which

is not graceful. How does every bit of twig know to turn, to twist in the most perfect way? And each one is different. There is not one twig like any other, yet each one is utterly graceful. And the whole thing is stunning.

As you may imagine, one, two or three branches, large or small, will lend an instant touch of grace to any decor or dried flower arrangement.

YELLOW FLOWERS IN SPRING

Corokia is evergreen too, grows well in light shade or sun, in ordinary soil, is extremely tolerant of coastal conditions and alkaline soils. Tiny yellow, star-shaped flowers in spring will be followed by small orange berries on mature shrubs.

It is also extremely well adapted to container growing if fast-draining soil is provided. The shrub is best propagated from cuttings taken in August or from layered branches in early fall.

The stunning grace of corokia may be accentuated by night lighting from below. I imagine that there is little else one could do to enhance its beauty. Pruning, to my mind anyway, could only be attempted after several hours of meditation with the keenest eye for beauty and the most acute sense of balance. I for one would not know where to begin.

Another shrub with curiously twisting branches is the flowering quince (chaenomeles). Although not nearly as graceful as corokia, having a more angular, masculine type of

grace, it can be quite stunning if the bottom two-thirds of the shrub are severely pruned to reveal the angular trunk structure. The top third should be left as is, or only extremely lightly pruned with a discerning eye and a solid and fundamental understanding of Zen principles.

Failing this, only a renowned Japanese gardener who can answer satisfactorily one or two koans may be entrusted with this task.

EASIER WITH BAMBOO

It is much easier with bamboo. The appearance of any stand of bamboo may be enhanced greatly by stripping the bottom two-thirds of the trunks bare of any branches and leaving the top third as is.

Mugho pines, surprisingly, may be treated or pruned in the same manner. It is best though to select only one specimen for this treatment and leave the others as is. A whole bunch of pruned mugho pines would be too much.

A mugho pine with the bottom two-thirds pruned down to the bare branches with the top third left as is

will sort of give the impression of several large green pincushions held out on dramatically twisted bare branches. It is not something to be overlooked by any means; this thing will stand out anywhere and is at its best as a singular specimen surrounded by gravel and maybe the odd good-sized rock of strong character and integrity. Perhaps a bit of moss here or there may be permitted.

Well, here I stand, with my two feet on this green planet of ours, only separated by my socks and the soles of my shoes from the mother of us all and I don't know what to write about. Scratching my head has only yielded a bit of organic material,

dandruff as it were, but not much else.

So if there is anything you would like to know, anything you would like me to write about, please let me know and I will see what I can come up with, given the limitations of my knowledge.

I don't know how others do it. The ability to knock off a column every day, year after year, has my respect and admiration. There is hope that some day I will find out how it is done, until then I need your help.

Next meeting November 9

Recently when the school buses broke down, parents and children became confused about how the youngsters would get home. The trustees intend to talk about the procedures which should be followed if the buses break down again.

Properties owned by the school district as well as ways of controlling inventory are on the agenda.

The ongoing discussion of parking in the Ganges school complex will continue and the trustees will hear news of the proposal to have the department of highways put a sidewalk along the road leading up Ganges Hill.

The Fernwood expansion cost estimates and how to deal with them quickly is to be discussed as is the

gymnasium floor in the Galiano School.

Anyone wishing to address the trustees can do so but the request for time should be given to the school district staff by Monday, Nov. 7.

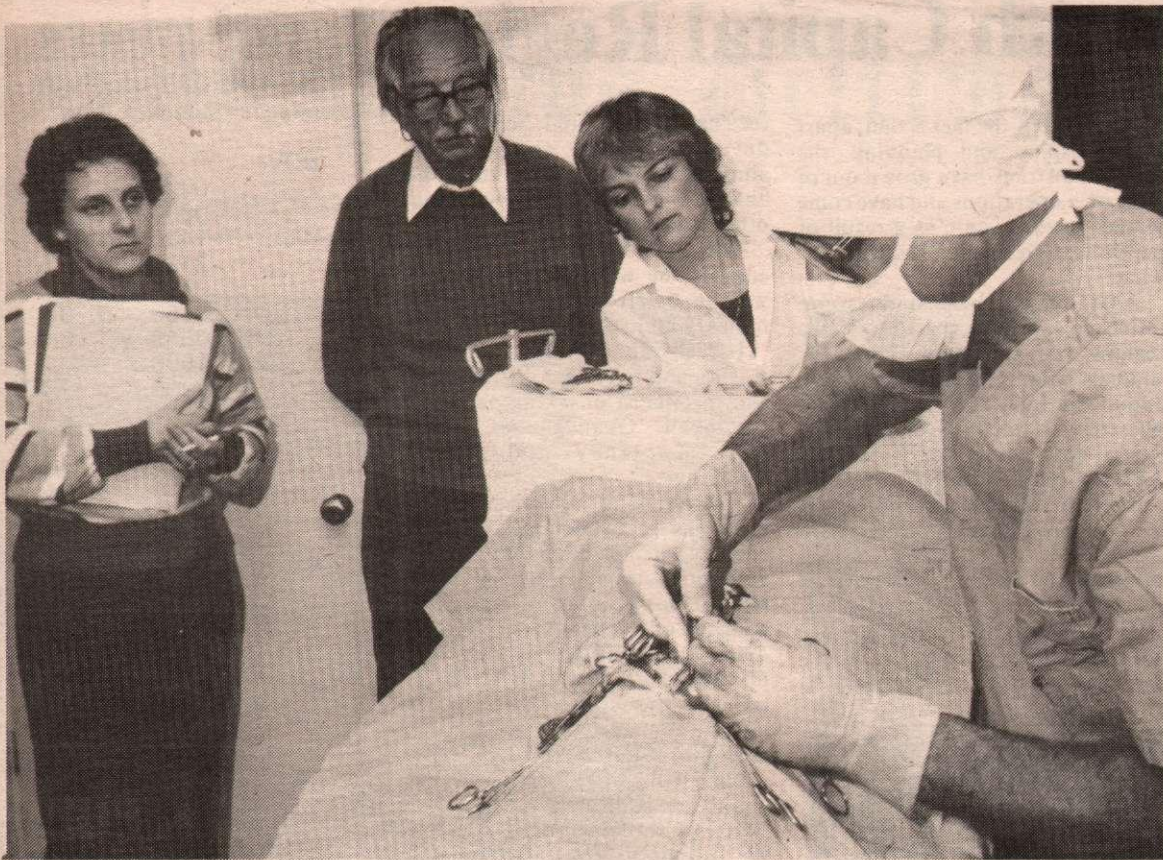

Assistance program is offered to pet owners at Salt Spring

Any animal not to be used for breeding should be altered by spaying or neutering, says the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

And for those cat and dog owners who are on limited incomes, a spay/neuter assistance program is offered at Salt Spring Island.

The program is financed by the Victoria Women's Auxiliary to the SPCA and is open to those such as old age pensioners or people on welfare or disability pensions. Expenses are also shared by the SPCA and Gulf Islands Veterinary Clinic.

Spaying and neutering are the most effective means of preventing unwanted puppies and kittens, says SPCA spokesman Chris Woodridge. The animal becomes a better companion, is less likely to roam and various health problems in later life may be avoided.

Female cats and dogs are best

spayed at about six months, when they are sexually mature but have not yet been in heat. Male cats and dogs should be neutered when they reach nine to 10 months.

Application forms for the assistance program are available in Ganges at Annie's Access. Those who qualify are contacted as soon as an appointment can be made.

Buckle up, says Hanks

Campbell probe starts with Capital Region

The public perception of regional districts is not as precise as it should be, the author of regional districts told the Capital Regional Board last week.

Former municipal affairs minister Dan Campbell has been appointed by the present minister, Bill Ritchie, to examine the regional boards and to review their procedures, particularly the fiscal patterns.

When he spoke to the board last Wednesday, Campbell was making his first public move in launching the review.

Campbell instituted the regional board system 16 years ago. He has come back to see how it went. His present review will be to see where the regions are at and how they got there, he explained.

He admitted that some might be critical of his appointment on the grounds that he is the father of the program and might well be biased.

"I want to disillusion you of that. Being now a grandfather, I should be older and wiser."

FILLING A VACUUM

The regional districts were formed because there was a vacuum in British Columbia, with the administration of 99½% of the area as unorganized territory. There was an absence of means of doing things with other municipalities, he recalled.

The regional district was designed to be practical and flexible. A simplistic administration, the region was to grow and evolve by itself. The regional district is seen as the creation of the province, said

Campbell, but the fact is that, apart from hospital and planning, the regional districts have grown out of their own operations and have come to their present state as a result of petitions, agreements, requests "or whatever".

Agriculture has had some influence on the growth of the regions, with the responsibility for animals coming on to the regional administration and one district operates a wharf, at the urging of the federal government.

ABOUT 100% WRONG

There is still that perception that the regional district monsters were created for an ulterior motive, admitted the ex-minister, "that an evil influence put them together.

"People with that perception are just about 100% wrong."

The man in the review wants to

see how this initial scheme has developed: how the districts administer their various functions and how they meet and work with other agencies.

The review is not a public enquiry, he warned, but everyone will be involved, the regions, the ministry and the public.

It will start with the Capital Region and five other districts have shown interest in taking part, said Campbell, Okanagan, Cariboo, East Kootenay and Mount Waddington.

His terms of reference are so broad as to be non-existent. The enquiry will include communication with ministries; inter-agency tie-ins; interviewing board members, councils and others in the regional districts. While the enquiry proceeds Campbell will be in the office of the minister of municipal affairs.

SUPERVISING ENQUIRY

He will be supervising the enquiry, explained the speaker; Peat Marwick will be engaged as well as the administrative staff of the ministry.

There will be no leaks. Mel Couvelier expressed concern that he might pick up his morning paper and find matters published which might readily have been corrected had the board been given prior knowledge.

He will not be telling the press what his conclusions might be, Campbell assured him.
