To make matters worse Bryan Caspar was out of the game just prior to half-time due to an altercation with another player and the Kicks' strength was depleted even further.

The constant shuffling of the line-up caused by these incidents disrupted the Kicks' team play and they failed to mount much pressure

in the opening half, which ended 0-0.

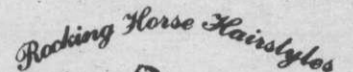

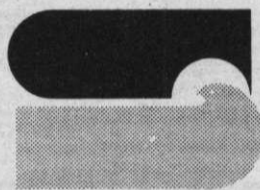

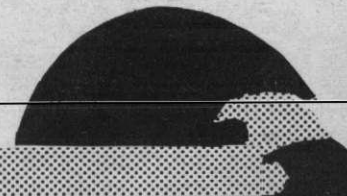

**GALIANO NEWS**

# Department responded to 13 fire calls last year

The annual general meeting of the Galiano Volunteer Fire Department on Saturday broke all records for brevity.

Scheduled to begin at two o'clock, by 2:28 pm the meeting had concluded with the motion to adjourn. Despite the rapidity with which president Dr. S. Parlee moved through the agenda, nothing was skimmed.

Helen Sonthoff, secretary, read the minutes of the 1982 meeting from which arose the information that co-operation with the North Galiano volunteer fire department is being pursued but that insurance regulations and the contract with the Capital Regional District prevent dispatch of essential vehicles outside the fire protection district. The board has decided not to set up a vehicle replacement fund and instead will transfer any surplus to the budget of the following year.

**TWO MAJOR FIRES**

Fire Chief Chester Williams reported that 50 emergency calls were received in 1982. Two of these were for major fires which unfortunately resulted in the total destruction of two homes. Eleven were calls of a minor nature which were soon under control.

Thirty-seven calls were false alarms, requests for the ambulance or for burning permits which should have been phoned in on the chief's home number, 2461. Twenty-four practices were held during the year with an average turn-out of eight volunteers. He commended the Galiano Club for installing a water storage tank in Bluff Park. This will greatly assist the department to fight fire in that area.

The chief announced that the new vehicle having both a water conveyance and a pumping function is under fabrication and is expected to be delivered in six weeks.

Phyllis Linton, reporting for the Women's Auxiliary, noted that its members had committed \$10,000 towards the purchase of the new vehicle, and that this sum had been raised over the seven years of the

auxiliary's existence. During this period the women had also funded the purchase of a communications system and contributed to the purchase of other equipment and items of uniform for the volunteers.

**BUDGET CUT**

During 1982 the auxiliary had just kept its financial head afloat by means of its popular monthly book sales. The 10% cut in the department's budget ordered by the Capital Regional District for 1983 will make the role of the auxiliary even more important as public funding of the department is restricted.

The president confessed that his first year of office had been one of learning and it was therefore important that some members of the board had had actual experience of fire-fighting as volunteers. He was gratified by the nearly 250% increase in members of the society, which had been achieved by selling memberships at the Fiesta and at the monthly book sales.

He lauded the work and generosity of the Women's Auxiliary and noted that their donation would save the department drawing all of the \$30,000 that had been approved by referendum. As a result he anticipated only a small increase in the fire protection component of the mill rate in 1983.

**DINNER WAS A HIGHLIGHT**

A highlight of the year was the dinner at the Rod and Gun Club sponsored by the society to provide community recognition of the work of the volunteers. The Galiano delegates were not impressed with the value of the proposal, in view of its cost and the difficulty of disengaging from the scheme should it prove unsatisfactory. Dr. Parlee thanked the directors for their contribution to the work of the department and concluded by conducting the election of officers.

The new board will consist of Dr. S. Parlee, Ken Hardy, Helen Sonthoff, Marion Williams, Phyllis Linton and Dora Darling of the W.A., Mike Hoebel, Victor Zala and Dr. John Hales. The directors will include three active firemen, a past fire captain and one new member, Dr. Hales.

**Weavers to move**

The Galiano Weavers and Spinners Guild will be holding its annual meeting on Thursday. After 10 years of occupation of a room devoted exclusively to their use at the Community Hall, the weavers are moving to a new location at 'C Vu Gatehouse', Highland Road, at the invitation of Fern Stewart. ## DIRECTOR'S REPORT

# Vote postponement disappointing

As your representative to the Capital Regional District, I am disappointed because the referendum which was to be held on February 5 has been postponed till November, at the time of the municipal elections! I did not make the motion, and did not support it!

It is, however, important to realize that should this referendum be held, that the inspector of municipalities would not approve such a referendum bylaw, and he so states in his letter.

To hold such a referendum and to have it declared illegal as was proposed, would only add costs and more confusion. We want a referendum that will not be tainted or remotely questionable and that we can have in November!

What is most encouraging, however, is the fact that the inspector of municipalities is advocating that we use the time between now and November to take a serious look at the alternatives available, that is sewage disposal alternatives and for this he has offered the guidance of the ministry and is requesting the board to do the same.

The inspector states "having determined the critical area the examination of alternative methods

of resolving sewage problems, and lastly, the development of a balanced and affordable rate structure which recognizes both need and benefit. It is these issues which must be examined by the community and a new direction mapped out upon which the Ganges people can express their opinion with perhaps less emotion than is now the case."

The motion I made at the January 26 board meeting was for chairman H. Sturrock, director Pollen, myself and my alternate Mrs. Humes to meet with the minister, and discuss this new turn of events.

A quote from my letter to the inspector dated January 27: "I am very pleased of the views expressed by you in your last two paragraphs

of your letter dated January 24, and I certainly thank you for this turn of events. I hope for your support in the near future to assist us in any way possible to resolve the serious issues which are festering in our community. The opportunity to seriously consider alternative measures of resolving sewage problems and in doing so, I believe that the tragic split which now exists in our community will be resolved!

"Looking forward to working with you on these most important issues rather than against. It must be understood that this must be dealt with with the utmost sincerity, and that the people of Salt Spring Island must play the major role in the decisions and in the implementations of such undertakings."

## No driving for nine months

A Salt Spring Island man was in court last week to answer charges of not wearing a helmet while driving a motorcycle, driving without a licence and insurance as well as not having a licence plate on the vehicle.

James Hamilton was prohibited from driving a motor vehicle for nine months by Judge F.S. Green. The mandatory fine of \$300 for driving without insurance was also imposed upon him.

Judge Green heard that the young man had been stopped twice by RCMP while he had been riding his motorcycle last December.

Judge Green heard a report on the young man from the court probation officer and the social worker from the Gulf Islands Program Serving Youth (GIPSY) in which Hamilton is a participant.

In addition to the prohibition against driving, Hamilton must keep the peace during the nine months. Any breach of the conditions would result in an automatic \$50 fine being imposed.

Hamilton was given one year in which to pay the fine for not having insurance on the motorcycle.

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# Down Through the Years with Driftwood

## Twenty Years Ago

The St. Mary Lake beaver could well be a muskrat, a sea otter or a large field mouse, said some people who had viewed the gnawed trees near the lake. Considered opinion on the validity of the existence of the creature had come from tall, short, northern and southern beaver experts as well as ex-trappers and a lady who had collected beaver chips from locations as far east as Ontario. No one had yet seen the alleged beaver.

Cut-throat trout were being stocked in lakes on Salt Spring Island but were dying in the streams and creeks when the fish moved to spawn. Two specimens of the trout were found dead in a debris-strewn creek leading to Weston Lake. The fish had moved to the gravel beds to spawn but were unable to return to the lake. The island lakes were stocked by the game department, aided by the local Rod and Gun Club.

The box, located outside a Salt Spring Island store, normally held Driftwood for sale. Someone had filled the box — with driftwood.

Driftwood noted the lifting of a ban by the BBC in England of jokes concerning among other topics the Royal Family, sex, religion and lavatories. The ban, Code of Good Manners, had applied to light entertainment in a peak viewing hours for 15 years. A BBC official said, "We are now relying on the discretion and good taste of program directors". Monty Python's Flying Circus had not been available at the time.

A resident of Pender Island had won a competition, open to all Canadians, staged by the CBC. The islander's choice of a name for a gorilla was the best offering submitted. The name suggested was Mumba.

Students at the high school held a barn dance, sponsored jointly by Grades 9 and 11. The hall where the dance was held had been decorated with wagon wheels and bales of hay to create the atmosphere of a traditional barn dance.

## Fifteen Years Ago

Sheep farmers from the south end of Salt Spring Island complained about heavy losses of sheep. A herder on Beaver Point had lost approximately 200 sheep. His flock had numbered 400 but only 200 could be found. Farmers speculated that the sheep had been taken from the island by barge to be slaughtered or sold elsewhere. The sheep were valued at \$25 each.

B.C. Telephone Company announced plans to spend \$105,000 to improve telephone service in the islands. The company planned to upgrade facilities on Salt Spring at a cost of \$35,000. A further \$13,000 would go toward cable installations to serve Isabella Point, Vesuvius, Ganges and Trincomali Channel areas. The phone company would also spend \$34,000 on Galiano as well as \$23,000 on Mayne Island to improve cable installations.

The annual report from the Woman's Auxiliary of Lady Minto Hospital revealed a bank account of \$1,502 and bonds worth \$1,500. The bargain sale held in September had yielded a profit for the group of \$1,830. The members had considered and dropped the idea for a thrift shop. The purchase of various items for the hospital had been noted.

The boys' basketball team at Gulf Islands Secondary School lost two games. Mt. Prevost defeated the island team but the score was not available, while Duncan came out

ahead 36-22 in the second game.

The Flag Fund continued to grow with additional contributions being made to replace the stolen flags in Centennial Park in Ganges. The replacement flags were on order as donations came in.

A lighted object passed over RCMP headquarters in Ganges and flew away toward Duncan. The object, either large and distant or small and close, was seen by a couple of residents. No reports of the sighting had been made to police.

## Ten Years Ago

Grants under the Local Initiatives Program from the federal government had been spent on Salt Spring Island. Almost \$58,000 had funded four projects including renovations to Fulford Hall and Drummond Park. The projects would supply employment for at least 38 workers.

The Thrift Shop operated by the Women's Auxiliary of the Lady Minto Hospital grossed more than \$12,000 in six months of selling. The group had donated in excess of \$7,000 to the hospital for medical expenses as well as supplies for the extended care wing.

A Salt Spring Island businessman reported a lady had purchased a bottle of banana oil from his store 45 years ago. She wrote to request a second bottle, the first had recently run out, to enable her to continue baking her favorite cake. The story was part of Leisure Islands Laughter by F.W. Marsh.

Foreign dignitaries arrived at the wharf in the Independent Crown Colony of Salt Spring Island. They had spent several days in an open rowboat and were taken to the laundromat to dry out. The prime minister announced that the treasury was empty and plans had to be made to print the country's equivalent of the dollar, known as clams. A temporary halt had been called to a local works project, creation of a perpetual candle, due to shortage of wax. The work stoppage caused little concern because the candle exceeded 75 feet in length. Invitations to the Formal Ball would go on sale at places and on a date to be announced. The ball would be held sometime, somewhere, in the future.

A shortage of classroom space at the Mayne Island school meant some classes would attend in the mornings while other classes would attend in the afternoon. The trustees of the Gulf Islands School Board hoped to have new classrooms available by the middle of February. The class would be in a portable.

The Salt Spring Leos raised \$400 to help earthquake victims in Nicaragua. The money came from a bingo held by the group as well as donations.

## Five Years Ago

The Fernwood Parents' Group challenged the Gulf Islands School Board to prove the need for a school on the north end of Salt Spring Island. The area residents claimed that additions to the Salt Spring Elementary School would take care of overcrowding but a school trustee repeated the board's stand that no additions to the Ganges school would be made. The board members and the group came to no conclusion and agreed to meet to discuss their disagreement later.

Lady Minto Hospital was to expand and island contractors were concerned about being left out of the bidding for the contract. Under government rules for submitting bids, contractors were required to post bonds. Many island

contractors could handle the work but could not meet the bond requirements. The board of directors suggested that the contractors pool resources to ensure bond money was available for a bid to be submitted.

The bands from the Gulf Islands Secondary School were to tour the west coast of Canada and the United States but lacked sufficient funds. The Vancouver Opera Guild came to the rescue with a performance of The Barber of Seville to help raise money for the trip.

A coroner's jury found the deaths of four Vancouver Island residents, victims of an airplane crash on Salt Spring Island, were accidental. The light plane crashed into Mount Erskine in heavy fog while the group was on a flight to Seattle from Nanaimo.

The Victoria Branch of the S.P.C.A. recognized an auxiliary of that group on Salt Spring Island. The group would be interested in the welfare of animals but not the control of them. They planned a registry of lost and found animals and would be actively seeking more members.

Several residents of Salt Spring Island were investigating the possibility of creating a curling club and building a rink. They were seeking support from other island residents interested in the project.

region, authorizing the construction of a sewer system at Ganges. He foresaw the courts declaring such a bylaw void and introducing a new series of problems.

The only question which might be presented to the electors would be whether they want the Ganges sewer project to proceed. Such a question could only be presented at the November elections.

## DUPLICATION

Woodward shrugged off the

suggestion of guiding the board, but he emphasized that the referendum bylaw is a duplication of the authority already held by the board.

Then came the phrase which aroused some sharp protests among directors.

"...It is merely a device to conduct a vote outside statutory authority and is nothing more than subterfuge and a means to circumvent normal procedure."

The inspector of municipalities went on to examine the future.

"The crucial issues at this time are

the tragic split in the Salt Spring community and health considerations," he noted. "Both issues must be faced and resolved, not only by the board, but more importantly, by the people of Ganges."

The time before any vote could be presented might be better spent if the people of Ganges were assisted with the guidance of the ministry and the board in arriving at a resolution of these problems.

## RESTRICT AREA

He also suggested that alternatives might be found by drastically restricting the area to be served to that section of the community which clearly needs attention. Having ascertained the area, it might be feasible to find alternative methods of resolving sewage problems as well as the development of a balanced and affordable rate structure,

recognizing both need and benefit.

"It is these issues which must be examined by the community and a new direction mapped out upon which the Ganges people can express their opinion with, perhaps, less emotion than is now the case."

He called for the careful attention of all members of the board.

The board looked at the recommendations and agreed to follow the pattern outlined.

The motion of director Yvette Valcourt that she, in company with her alternate director, Sabara Humes, the chairman of the sewage and solid wastes committee and the chairman of the board, attend upon the minister to pursue the recommendations of the Woodward report was adopted.

The meeting is to map a course of action, commented the chairman, not to reach a solution.

## Directors deny charge of subterfuge over sewer

Capital Regional directors have expressed strong objection to being accused of subterfuge in seeking to present a referendum regarding the Ganges sewer.

Chairman Howard Sturrock told his board that he found offensive the phrase, "nothing more than subterfuge", used by the inspector of municipalities to describe the board's action in presenting a referendum to Ganges property owners.

The intention of the board was to act in a legal manner, he observed, and no attempt was made at subterfuge, or to get around procedure. He lashed out at previous boards when he commented that most of the steps

taken had been taken to circumvent normal procedure.

Subsequent motion by Peter Pollen to communicate the objections of directors was defeated.

## INDICTMENT

Terming the reference to subterfuge as a "terrible indictment on the integrity of the individuals on the board," the mayor of Victoria moved that the board write to the minister of municipal affairs protesting the intemperate language used by the inspector of municipalities.

Don Rittaler did not agree.

"He was only trying to make his point," he suggested.

Directors voted 24 in favour and 29 against.

hazard. "We like it the way it is," he said.

Pat Lawson, of Black Sheep Farms, suggested that the vendors in the market could organize as a way of controlling space in the parking lot.

"We do have the power," she said, "to say to (some), 'butt out'."

Fewings urged the commission not to change the market. She said any attempt to limit the market would change its spirit. Commenting on the traffic congestion in Ganges on Saturday mornings, she said the traffic volume indicates the popularity of the market.

She had collected up to 200 signatures on a petition, she said, which called for the market to be left as it is.

The straw vote, which called for a limiting of items for sale, was only an opinion poll, she said, and was not binding on the commission to create change.

Woodley said that the commission has been seeking a consensus on the market and the straw vote had only been that. The commission would seek a solution, he said, but needed the support of islanders on whatever course of action would be taken.

"We won't come out with rules carved in stone which you won't be able to change."

The Parks and Recreation Commission decided to hold a meeting on February 14 to discuss the market and what can be done with it.

"We want to give the people an opportunity to participate in their own Farmers' Market," said Woodley.
