

Healthy asparagus patch will produce for 25 years

There are two good reasons for growing asparagus. One is that it is the earliest vegetable to mature in the garden, usually in the latter half of May. The other is that it's a gourmet's delight, and rightly so.

And while we are at it, we might as well add a third reason: it will fetch a pretty price at the Farmers' Market, again rightly so.

It is a bit tricky to grow in our wet winter climate, as all the water comes at the wrong time for asparagus. Our sodden winter soils will rot its roots, but this can be fixed. And it is well worth it to go to a bit of trouble to give it the best possible growing conditions, for a healthy asparagus patch will keep on producing for at least 25 years.

So any effort made in the beginning will pay off handsomely year after year after year.

If you have really well drained soil on a slope, you have no problems at all. Rich organic soil over a deep sand or gravel base is what is required.

20-FOOT BED

A bed 20 feet long should do for a family of four, and this may be doubled for devoted asparagus lovers.

On really well drained soil, dig a trench about 18 to 20 inches deep. Add 20 pounds of dolomite lime plus 20 pounds of rock phosphate to the soil as you dig it out, to mix it well with the soil. This is best done by sprinkling it on the ground and in

the trench repeatedly as you go along to assure a good mix.

The trench should be about 18 inches wide, and the soil should be piled up neatly beside the trench. Two-year-old roots from your favourite garden centre are you best bet.

Roots are spaced 12 inches apart in the trench, crown up, and covered with 1½ inches of soil. As the young shoots grow, keep covering these with soil to within one inch of the top of the shoot, thus slowly filling the trench.

LOVES SALT

If you have spare topsoil you can mound the bed to a food high in the centre for longer shoots. Mulch with seaweed during the season - asparagus loves salt - to conserve moisture. Asparagus needs abundant moisture and food to do well.

Manure heavily in fall and cut off all tops when these turn brown. Do not harvest in the first year after planting but continue to feed abundant nitrogen and provide constant moisture. Harvest lightly in the second year after planting and fully in the third year, and from then on.

Every two years add 10 pounds of lime and 10 pounds of rock phosphate. Feed heavily after each harvest for maximum growth and root and shoot development.

That is all there is to it, unless you have heavy muck or clay soil. In that case we have to provide rapid drainage.

It would also be best to orient the bed with the slope, instead of across it, to provide maximum run-off. And we need a gravel base, at least six inches deep and three feet wide. It all depends on the depth of topsoil above the clay.

CURTAIN DRAIN WILL HELP

Do not dig into the clay unless you can provide a rapidly draining exit for the water at the bottom end of the gravel bed. A little "curtain drain" across the top of the bed will help a lot to divert run-off water. The increased width of the bed is required to provide a base for a mounded raised bed.

With very shallow topsoil this may even mean one-foot-high rigid sides (blocks, bricks, no red cedar please, but yellow is OK) with a 1½-foot mound above that. In other words we are simply raising the whole thing above ground, with a well-drained side margin.

A three-foot-wide base will allow us a 2½-foot-high mound in the centre. This has the added advantage of allowing us to cut asparagus shoots six inches below soil level for the

cherished white shoots.

Altogether there should be 18 inches of well-drained topsoil below the roots and 18 inches above the roots for green shoots, and more than that for white shoots. This amounts to a total of three feet of topsoil and this may be either partly in the ground or above the ground, depending on your conditions.

START SMALL

If you need to go this route, I would suggest you start with a small patch and see how it goes and enlarge it if it is successful. Otherwise, planting, feeding and

liming are the same as described, only watering would need closer attention as a raised bed has greater surface area to evaporate moisture.

Trickle irrigation would provide maximum benefit with a limited water supply. Watering with manure teas is an excellent way of providing moisture and nutrients at the same time.

Seems a bit much to go to all this trouble but considering that a well-made bed will produce this delicious delicacy for 25 years, it makes it all worthwhile, at least to a devoted asparagus lover such as myself.

GALIANO NEWS

Regional plan bylaw major concern of meeting

The Galiano Chamber of Commerce combined its annual general meeting with a public meeting on Saturday in the Community Hall and despite the weather, there was a turn-out of 50 people.

Following routine business, president Oswald (Sparky) New reminded the meeting that the chamber began its life on Galiano over 50 years ago as a development association and still retains many of its aims of that era. Twenty-five years ago the group changed its name to the Galiano Chamber of Commerce and became affiliated with the national organization.

Its constitution lists the chamber's objectives as fostering trade, commerce, economic and social welfare on Galiano, with membership open to any who support these objectives.

Included among the association's original duties was the representation of islanders in negotiating ferry schedules with Canadian Pacific, Coast Ferries and later, B.C. Ferries. The chamber has resumed this responsibility, taking over from the Islands Trust.

HODGSON PRAISED

New was able to report that preparation of the summer schedule was well under way, and he had nothing but praise for the co-operation they were receiving from Stuart Hodgson, chairman of B.C. Ferries, and his senior officials. In a time of undoubtedly severe restraint they were doing the best they could to devise a satisfactory service to the islands.

New's report on Clanton Road was also optimistic. He thanked individuals who had donated money, time, materials and labour to the task of re-opening the road. The Galiano Lions Club and the Garden Club were also thanked for their donations and MLA Hugh Curtis for his interest.

Although New could make no public announcement, he had every hope that the department of highways would again take over responsibility for maintenance of the road which they had abandoned 12 years ago in favour of the longer eight kilometre route from North Galiano to the Montague ferry.

Another major concern of the chamber's continues to be the parking problem at the Sturdies Bay wharf and the intentions of the department of highways in this area. The designation of Sturdies Bay Road as a controlled access highway, and the imposition of a freeze on the area within 800 kilometres that includes a large number of properties, has many people worried and frustrated. The chamber will pursue the matter and

exert pressure on the department to resolve the problem as rapidly as possible.

QUESTIONS SUBMITTED

Ron Thompson reported that the Trust Committee had submitted a series of questions on the effect of the highway designation to the district approving officer of the ministry of transportation and highways. The latter has indicated that he would let the Galiano Trust Committee know of the plans and intentions of his department as soon as possible.

The major item of concern on Saturday was Islands Trust Bylaw 6, Schedule A, which provides the legislative framework for the regional plan. This has been submitted to the minister of municipal affairs for approval, but word has been received that this will be withheld until there has been further input from residents of the Trust area. New fears that the wording of the bylaw will prevent changes being made to the Galiano community plan if they do not conform to the regional plan bylaw.

Although a brochure explaining the regional plan was mailed to every household last May, the proposed bylaw has received little public scrutiny, as only the copy in the Post Office has been available for study.

The chamber decided to seek clarification of the intent and application of the bylaw and to continue to give the matter what publicity it can.

Ken Gaylor moved that the chamber take the initiative in convening a meeting of owners of commercially or industrially zoned property. Island Trustees and chamber representatives, to consider the whole question of rezoning. He was concerned that the granting of unrestricted zoning in these categories might have a deleterious effect on development on Galiano. That this is a widespread feeling was evidenced by the unanimous approval his motion received.

The meeting concluded with the election of officers. Re-elected by acclamation were Oswald New, president; Ollie Garner, vice-president; Shirley Coulter, secretary; and Edrie Holloway, treasurer. The only new faces on the 12-person executive are George Harris and Bill Calloway.

Garden Club

Almost 40 members of the Galiano Garden Club assembled on a wet Wednesday afternoon for their first meeting of 1983. Many had brought "winter arrangements" for the show table, which demonstrated that spring is really here, with splashes of yellow forsythia and pink wild currant.

The members heard from secretary-treasurer Tom Liddell that the club had given \$200 to the Chamber of Commerce towards the upkeep of Clanton Road and \$50 to the Activity Centre Society.

Details were given of a horticultural tour of Britain available to the Garden Club through their group membership in the Royal Horticultural Society. This tour includes visits to more than 30 beautiful gardens and the world-famous Chelsea Flower Show.

President Aini Haksi presented a speaker who is no stranger to Galiano, Fred Maybee from Salt Spring, who introduced his audience to the variety of bulbs and flowering shrubs throughout the year.

Next month the club will have as its feature speaker Jackson Barker of Salt Spring, to share his expertise on roses, particularly their pruning.

Drama Club

Dramatic productions have taken place on Galiano from time to time, but now a Galiano Drama Club has been formed under the presidency of George Harris with Johanna Newmoon as secretary and Frank Greenhalgh as treasurer.

The group hopes to present the popular British comedy, *See How They Run*, under the direction of Ken Gaylor this spring. The executive would welcome any offers of help for back-stage crew.

Darts

Last Friday saw the final of a six-week darts tournament at the Galiano Golf and Country Club. Bill Burton emerged as champion in the singles section with Jean Tulley and Jim Ripley as winning doubles pair. Jean Mozley achieved the highest score in the competition.

Puppy Power

Spectators lining the parade routes on Fiesta and Jamboree Days may remember a miniature float entitled Puppy Power in which Nancy Quist's small daughter Sarah rode, pulled by a large black dog. Nine weeks ago Nancy's purebred

Newfoundland bitch had a record litter of 13 puppies. The feat is all the more remarkable because the 11 males and two females making the baker's dozen all survived, mainly due to the attention they received from their surrogate mother, who stayed home from her work at the garage to ensure the puppies received maximum care.

Of this litter, four will be staying on Galiano, one is going to Mayne, and six have yet to find homes. Maggie Lyons, Galiano's dog obedience teacher, is planning a fall training class specially designed for Newfoundland dogs.

Service Club AGM

Eighteen members of the Galiano Ladies Service Club met February 13 and heard of the disposal of club funds during December 1982 to Timmy's Telethon, the Salvation Army, the Central City Mission and the *Times-Colonist* 1000 Fund. Christmas plants and chocolates were sent to Galiano shut-ins, and to Greenwoods and Lady Minto Hospital. A food-voucher and Christmas hamper were given to islanders in need.

The date of the rummage sale has been tentatively set for April 16 and the Christmas Bazaar for November 26.

The club's stable officers are Lucy Miley as president, Josephine Newton as secretary, Mary Gustin as treasurer, with Devina Baines as sunshine convener. The one new face is that of Marian Michaelson as vice-president.

Three oppose zoning change

Proposal to restrict the number of units permitted in Salt Spring Island resorts met with three opponents at a public hearing in Ganges last week.

Under consideration was the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee bylaw to limit the number of units to 10 per acre on property listed as Commercial 4.

Jim Loiselle and Joan Ingram both expressed regret that they had not been served with a notice through the mail warning them of the hearing. Mrs. Loiselle asked chairman Mike Humphries to adjourn the hearing in order to ensure that others affected were fully aware of the proposal. The chairman explained that he was not permitted to continue the hearing to another day.

Loiselle said he was from Duncan and received warning of the hearing from his island family. Ingram stated she happened to read the announcement in *Driftwood*.

"I resent my property being discussed without my being here to take part," she told the hearing.

Planner Richard McKellar read the relevant section from the Municipal Act and explained that personal notice through the mails is only called for where the hearing is considering a change in zoning to a specified property.

The hearing was informed that the zoning restriction applies to a property as a parcel. By this means, the five-acre resort property is zoned for 50 units, which may be located in a cluster on one part of that parcel.

Loiselle reported that he owns 30 acres of which six are zoned C4. The fact that a property is not fully developed is no indication that the owner is not planning to develop it, he urged.

Development is also controlled by water supply and sewage disposal, he reminded the hearing. He would sooner see controls applied through those utility services.

Norman Mouat agreed. He had been associated with the purchase of a commercial property when its potential density had been a factor in the purchase.

He was no longer sure what would now be done with the property. He recalled that the Advisory Planning Commission,

last November, had indicated that they would be content to leave the zone as it was and use other factors to control density.

Mouat was unhappy with the maximum density of 10 units per acre and thought 20 would not be out of line. He was referring to a 35-acre property on Bullock Lake.

The present change will render two island properties non-conforming, reported the planner.

Rita's Inn in Ganges will not conform to the new bylaw, neither will Sea Breeze Cottages.

Following the hearing the committee considered the arguments presented and approved the change in density.

The planner noted that the zoning bylaw is to be revised in the near future and that this bylaw is an interim measure.

Trust to enquire into plan for rental homes near lake

Maxwell Lake is the last source of potable water on Salt Spring Island, the Islands Trust was reminded last week.

Explaining the concern among islanders for possible development in the Maxwell Lake watershed, Nick Gilbert introduced Tom Gossett.

Gossett told the trustees that he is concerned over the policy of establishing rental mobile homes in the watershed area.

The zoning plans are not being broken, said Gossett. The bylaws call for one residence per lot. Are the new mobile homes to be single-family or duplex, he asked trustees.

Is any special zoning required for the construction of rental units, asked the speaker. He also spoke of the dangerous road linking Shepherd Hills and Maxwell Lake. More residences add to the

problem, he suggested.

DESERVES TO KNOW

"The community deserves to know what the plans are," said the spokesman for the Salt Spring Island Water Preservation Society.

The challenge was addressed to the Texada Logging Company's plans to erect two modular homes on property adjacent to the lake.

Gossett asked the Trust Committee to take any action it might see fit to keep urbanization away from Maxwell Lake.

Planner Richard McKellar reported that no building permits have been issued in respect of the mobile homes and that the only applications made so far had been for health permits.

On the recommendation of Gordon Wallace, the Trust will direct the planner to prepare a report on the project.

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty years ago

Voters in the Gulf Islands would have the opportunity, at an unspecified date, to decide whether to spend money on a science room and gymnasium-auditorium for the Salt Spring School as well as a teacherage on Galiano. The trustees had agreed that a referendum would be held but no date had been set.

A resident of Fulford, Doug Dane, was nominated to contest the election for the Social Credit Party. He was to vie for the seat held by NDP incumbent Colin Cameron. Doug Greer, Liberal, and W.F. Matthews, Progressive Conservative, had also been nominated to represent their respective parties.

The small grey whale guided its calf about the waters of Ganges Harbour for several months. It surfaced one day beneath the local water taxi and was cut on the fin by the boat's propeller.

The pozzolan plant was idle. The plant had opened with fanfare a few months earlier with optimistic predictions of running 24 hours per day. Workers had been given notice and no word was forthcoming about when the plant would reopen.

A card social held by the Beaver Point residents in the hall of the south Salt Spring community raised \$20, which was donated to the Fulford Hall floor fund.

Stories which had been printed in *Driftwood* appeared in the daily paper of Palm Springs, California, the *Desert Sun*. A story concerned an island resident who was visiting Arizona when his golf clubs exploded in the heat. The second story was about the visitor from California who complained about the humidity in the Gulf Islands.

Contestants for the annual pancake race were being sought by the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Royal Canadian Legion. The races would take place on Shrove Tuesday.

Fifteen years ago

Ferry service to the Gulf Islands was halted when the crews of B.C. Ferries walked off the job. The workers were protesting the layoffs of 160 crew members, an action taken by the company to economize. The strikers were demanding bargaining rights and unemployment insurance protection for the laid-off staffers. The residents of the islands were coping, although food and other commodities were running short.

The strike by ferry workers affected the Gulf Islands more than Vancouver Island. CPR ferries were bringing passengers and freight to the big island and air service was also available. The Gulf Islands were entirely dependent upon the service offered by the provincial ferry company.

The school bus for Galiano had been a recent purchase but problems were immediately apparent. The windshield of the bus had been broken in transit and replacement glass had been found to be in the same condition. The gas tank had been bent on a rough road and could not hold sufficient gasoline. The

school board decided to withhold payment for the vehicle until the problems were ironed out.

The driver was in court to answer a charge of ignoring speed limit signs. He asked the police officer where the signs were posted along Beddis Road. The magistrate was also interested. He lived on Beddis Road, he noted, but had never seen the signs. The officer proved the signs existed and the driver was fined \$25.

The cows didn't understand the artificial boundary and wandered into a pound area. The owner paid a fine of \$25 in court for allowing the cows to wander. The farm was in free range but the cows visited an area which wasn't.

The soft drinks were to be sold in Ganges but the bottles didn't survive the curve on the main highway at the Cusheon Lake turnoff. The truck had swayed and the cases had shifted. The bottles had broken on the pavement. The driver cleared the debris before proceeding.

Ten years ago

Roads on Salt Spring Island were adequate for 10 times the traffic which was using them, said a department of highways official. The traffic would grow six times as large merely by the normal population increase, he noted. The figures for traffic growth did not include tourists touring the island because, the official said, such traffic was difficult to gauge.

The court of revision sat to hear appeals against increases in assessed value of properties in the Gulf Islands. The provincial government had decreed that the assessments must reflect comparable values in the rest of the province. Some assessment notices had shown a 300% increase.

Driftwood reported the death of Bea Hamilton, 71, in Lady Minto Hospital of a heart ailment. She was a correspondent for the newspaper and author of the book *Salt Spring Island*.

The men had escaped from custody in Langley and were picked up by police on Salt Spring Island. The four walked away from detention, stole a vehicle, drove to Vancouver, stole a cruiser and made their way to the island. They were taken into custody at Isabella Point.

The barge came to the shore and stripped an oyster bed, sailing away with about five tons of the delicacies. Islanders were becoming irate at rules governing the taking of oysters. There was no limit on the amount to be harvested and the oysters remaining were of least value in perpetuating the species, said the protesting island residents.

The *Driftwood* flower box fund reached \$700. The money was being gathered to pay for concrete flower boxes in Centennial Park. The wooden flower boxes had been the target of vandals and had on several occasions been destroyed.

Voters of British Columbia had not voted for the NDP government, noted Hugh Curtis, MLA, Saanich and the Islands, but had voted against the previous Social Credit administration.

Five years ago

Fernwood School would be built as planned. The Gulf Islands School Board reversed a decision to put the project on hold and voted to accept a tender for construction. Overcrowding at the Ganges school was the main reason for building the new school at the north end of the island.

An oil spill near Crofton left a two-foot strip of oil on beaches of Salt Spring between Parminter and Southey Points. Lumps of oil were also reported floating in Stuart Channel.

The sheep were grazing in a field near Burgoyne Bay when the dog pack attacked. The farmer took action and the results were three dead sheep and one dead dog.

The Central Hall building fund grew to more than \$5,000 and the latest effort to gather money for the restoration of the building was a Small Hall Ball. Music would be supplied by the Loyal Central Salt Spring Temperance and Dixieland Jazz Ensemble. They would entertain the adults-only dance and tickets had to be purchased in advance.

The health inspector from the community health service warned the school board to replace the bars of soap in island schools to liquid or powder soap. The bars of soap in another school had been analyzed and were found to be covered with "a heavy growth of bacteria". The school board declined to take action despite the warning having been the second in a year to discontinue use of bar soap.

Driftwood historical note: Plywood dates back to early Egyptian times and was used by pharaoh's artisans as early as 1500 BC for decorative purposes.

The school board office belonged to the school board and the public health service had a lease on a portion of the building. The agreement reached when the building had been built was that the government would share the cost of construction with the school board. The public health service would rent space at \$1 per year, with the lease running until the year 2002.

Trust calls for guarantee

The Islands Trust requires a deposit from applicants for a development permit in order to ensure that the property is cleaned up in the event of construction not being completed.

Chairman Mike Humphries explained the requirement when Salt Spring Island Trust Committee

was discussing the receipt of a banker's letter of credit in respect of a project.

"At Galiano Lodge we were left with Stonehenge and mud," he told the committee.

The meeting agreed that there must be a performance bond or a letter of credit.

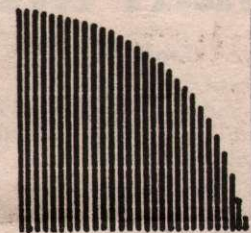

road," he said.

When he acquired his property he covenanted with the ministry of highways to make no development which could demand an improved, all-weather road.

Makaroff had a wide range of concerns.

Clear-cutting of timber on the mountain has resulted in excessive run-off, he told the meeting, threatening the soil envelope and the harbour.

He has some reservations about the planned reservoir, he informed trustees.

"It raises the problem about the integrity of the base for any dam,"

he warned.

He shuddered to mention sewage. "There appears to be a polarization in the community over sewage," he told the meeting, "and sometimes I am glad to live on the other side of the mountain."

Another boat dock and marina could represent excessive encroachment on the space available to the public. The government dock, which is in need of repair, provides berths for two vessels.

The road out to his property and the adjacent land has already been used by surveyors and well-drillers, reported Makaroff.

Concluding his plea to reject the application, Makaroff urged that every property owner along the transmountain road should be alerted.

"Let's not make the same mistake over and over again!"

The other 10 or so objectors permitted the doctor to speak for them.

"I am utterly opposed to what I have seen of it," stated vice-chairman John Rich. He told his colleagues that it is an undesirable development in the wrong place and that he strongly disagrees with the proposal.

"I concur heartily," said Nick Gilbert.

The Trust will convey the committee's opposition to the proposal to the ministry of highways. Ministry is approving officer for subdivisions on the island.

School gets \$500

Fernwood School has won an energy conservation contest and has \$500 for use in the school's library.

When energy costs began to rise rapidly last year, the Gulf Islands School Board decided to encourage each school in the district to conserve energy. The trustees set up a contest for the schools to attempt to slow the increase in energy costs and keep the account within budget.

Lights were to be turned out and thermostats lowered when classes were not in use.

Fernwood School was the most successful at reducing energy use. The trustees offered congratulations to custodian Arnie Wallace, principal Glenn Woodley and the pupils and staff for their efforts.

The school board had budgeted

close to \$83,000 for the energy bill last year including \$44,000 for electricity and \$35,000 for fuel. Expenditures on the energy account totalled slightly more than \$82,000 with \$43,000 for power and less than \$35,000 for fuel.

The energy portion of the 1983 budget has been set at \$103,000. Electricity is expected to cost \$46,500 and fuel expenditures are set at just less than \$41,000.
