

Trudeau to join Slug organization

In a startling and generally unexpected development in Ottawa yesterday, it was revealed that Pierre Elliott Trudeau, former commissioner of the Trans Canada Humility League and part-time leader of the Liberal Party of Canada, will leave the federal political scene to become coach, general manager and spiritual advisor to the notorious Salt Spring Slugs Old Boys Club.

System facing overhaul

Plans for a modernized radio communications system were outlined last week by the Salt Spring Island Fire Protection District.

Speaking at the district's annual meeting in Ganges, trustee Ace Mainwaring described the radio survey recently undertaken on behalf of the district.

There had been difficulty in reaching firemen and fire trucks when radio transmissions did not carry to all parts of the island, he explained. A number of proposals have been made in the past to overcome the problems, but no test, area-by-area, had been undertaken.

The transmitter at Ganges Fire Hall was tested from all parts of Salt Spring and the proposed location of a remote radio transmitter on the water tower at Sky Valley Road was tried.

The transmitter at the water tower proved capable of reaching almost every part of Salt Spring Island, including a number of locations out of reach of the Ganges Fire Hall system, reported Mainwaring.

CLEARLY IN REACH

Transmissions from the Sky Valley location could be heard clearly from Beaver Point and Isabella Point, locations which have been sometimes out of reach in the past.

One of the problems facing the firemen has been the inability to communicate with emergency vehicles in the more distant parts of the island. If a second vehicle was on its way to a fire, it was often impossible to report that the emergency was over and the second truck no longer needed. For lack of radio communication, the second truck would reach the scene of the

fire before learning the report.

The tests were directed to two results. The signal was required to set off the pagers carried by firemen and it was required to be completely audible from all parts of the island.

Only one area failed the test, said Mainwaring. A pager on McGill Road was not energized, although radio communication was satisfactory. There are no residents of that road serving as volunteer firemen, so that failure of a monitor to go off was not considered a serious matter. The fire trustee expressed delight with the results of the survey and outlined some of the changes planned.

BACK-UP SYSTEM

The radio communications service will be duplicated. The main system will transmit from the tip of the water tower and a B.C. Telephone Company line will link the Ganges Fire Hall with the tower transmitter. In the event of a storm taking out the telephone lines, the Ganges hall transmitter will continue to serve as it has in the past. It will be maintained as a permanent back-up system.

The General Electric transmitter at present in Fulford Fire Hall will be replaced by a Motorola unit. This recommendation is not from preference for one make against another, said Mainwaring. The equipment throughout the district is Motorola and the change will keep the main operating system on the same equipment. The GE unit will then be installed at Ganges to form the back-up equipment.

MINIMAL INTERFERENCE

The entire system will also minimize interference from other, more distant transmissions which often come in on the fire department's frequencies.



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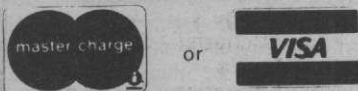
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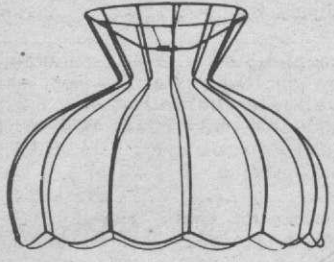

Financial statement showed little change from 1982, with current assets at \$198,210, against the previous year of \$187,744.

third income enjoyed in 1982 and missing from last year's books was the \$4,577 representing the provincial share of fighting a forest fire.

The statement was presented to the meeting by secretary-treasurer Spencer Marr.

Meeting also heard the annual reports from the chairman, Fire Chief Bob Leask and from Erling Jorgensen on behalf of the volunteer firemen.

About 30 people attended the meeting, held in Ganges Fire Hall on Tuesday evening.

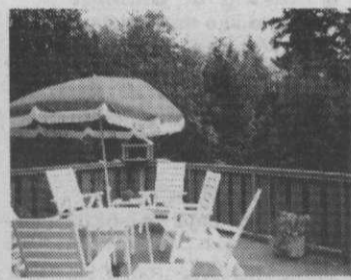

Commission allocates grant money

Grants totalling \$1,750 will benefit seven Salt Spring Island groups.

The Parks and Recreation Commission discussed grants at a recent meeting. The requests for financial aid came to \$8,250 but the commission was frugal because the grants account held only \$2,400.

To date, the commission has given away \$6,650 to 14 island groups. The account remains with

\$650 but will be replenished when the budget figures are sorted out and the surplus for the year is known.

The Salt Spring Players and the Community Society were each given \$500.

The Players had requested \$3,000 to purchase a reel-to-reel tape recorder with speakers and a videotape system. The request was cut back to \$500 to purchase the tape recorder.

The Community Society was seeking \$2,500 to replace the children's playground and to put a new door into the building for a washroom for the youngsters.

The grant was given to prepare the playground site and to put in the door.

Next in line were the Salt Spring Singers who were given \$200 to purchase sheet music.

The Trail and Nature Club was awarded \$150 for travel and research expenses. The group enjoys membership of approximately 170 island residents.

The Salt Spring library was granted \$150 to buy books for children aged six to 12 years old. The grant matches a similar one given two years ago for books for the younger set.

A stipulation is that the library board consider keeping the facility open later than the 3 pm closing time so that children can go to the library after school.

The men's and women's softball leagues were each given \$125 to cover costs of umpire clinics and to pay the umpires during the season. The commission agreed to purchase bases which are secured by pegs in the ground. The men's league had asked for extra money for the purchase. The commission will buy a set of bases for use at Portlock Park and another for use at the little league field in Ganges.

Commission is concerned about fate of property

Although plans for the Cusheon Lake park have been dropped, the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission remains concerned about the fate of the 45 acres.

MacMillan Bloedel had given the land to the province on the condition that it be used as a community park. Plans for creation of a park prepared by the commission were shot down several years ago by various water districts on the island.

The land, in the Cusheon Lake watershed, would require an environmental study, noted provincial officials last fall when the commission again attempted to get the plans off the ground.

Potential opposition to the planned park caused the commission to abandon the project. They did not want to spend money on the studies only to find stiff

opposition to the creation of the park.

Commission chairman Glenn Woodley said last week the Capital Region had been asked to purchase the land from the province for fee simple. In that way the property could be preserved as a forested area. If a purchase could not be arranged, said Woodley, the CRD was asked to find a way to keep the land as it currently is.

Bernard Doughton, executive director of the CRD, had told Woodley that several provincial statutes could be invoked to preserve the land.

Woodley also related that Mike Larmour, secretary of the North Salt Spring Water District, had contacted MacMillan Bloedel to see if the designation of the land could be changed from community park to watershed reserve.

A Watershed Protection Zone is a new zoning classification created by the Island Trust. The only permitted use in the new watershed zone would be "potable water generation."

Woodley told the meeting that he would like to see a wider range of public opinion on the matter. The issue has created two factions, he noted, those against anything being done on the property and those who would like a park there.

Officers elected

Annual meeting of the Salt Spring Auxiliary to the Victoria branch of the SPCA was held at Central Hall February 25.

Following officers were elected: Dr. Claus Andress, president; Joyce Hartwig, vice-president; Mary Stepaniuk, treasurer; and Joan Nicholson, secretary. Directors at large are Mardie Banks, Paula Blomly, Ann McPhee, Colin Nicholson, Pam Vallee and Dr. David Wooldridge.

The meeting was attended by about 30 people, including officers of the Victoria branch, B.C. SPCA president Michael Mirans-Harrison and executive director Al Hickey, who gave a talk on the work of the society.

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Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

A proposed subdivision on Old Scott Road brought protests at a meeting of the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce. Residents objected to the 12-lot subdivision on a waterfront farm in the area. The lots would be 75 feet wide at the water line and were located on a steep slope. The subdivision met the required one-third acre minimum size, the meeting was told.

Black ink replaced the red ink on the books of the North Salt Spring Waterworks District. The annual meeting of the facility heard that all due bonds, defaulted bonds and other costs had been met. The finances were kept straight for the year despite extensive improvements to the system of delivering water to homes.

Bad news swept through Salt Spring. The popular Beaver Point Bean Supper had to be postponed indefinitely. Illness had struck many of the Beaver Point ladies who had, for 10 years, fed many islanders in the annual bean feed.

Dry and warm described the weather for February, said Howard Carlin, the Ganges weather watcher. There were 2.44 inches of precipitation for the month, the exact total of the previous year. The one difference between the two months was the .85 inches of snow during the other February. Temperatures for the month varied from a low of 31 degrees to a high of 54. Highest recent precipitation for the month had been recorded in 1961 at 9.09 inches.

Plans for a major subdivision above Ganges Harbour were unveiled. The 175-lot proposal would be known as Hundred Hills. The lots would vary in size from one to three acres and access to Fulford-Ganges Road would be kept to a minimum. Restrictions would be placed on the subdivision to prevent splintering once development was complete.

The fund-raising drive by the Red Cross began. The Victoria district, of which the Gulf Islands formed a part, was shooting for \$80,500. Canvassers would knock on doors to accept donations.

Fifteen Years Ago

Lady Minto Hospital received approval to expand. The health care facility would be adding 15 beds in a new extended care wing. The approval came from the ministry of health and would be subject to approval by the Capital Region Hospital Board.

Roller hockey action featured Ganges winning its first game of the season. The team defeated Fulford Barons 7-5 despite scoring a goal on their own goalie. Fulford had earlier defeated the Central team 15-3 behind the excellent goal-keeping of Dave Roland.

The helicopters flew up the slopes of Mount Erskine on Salt Spring. The aircraft were flying cement for the foundations of the hydro transmission towers on the

mountain. Access to the rough terrain by normal means proved impossible so the helicopters were put to use.

World Day of Prayer would be celebrated on Mayne Island in St. Mary Magdalene Church in early March. Following the service, refreshments would be served at a reception to be held in the home of Mrs. C. Murrell.

The banquet allowed fathers and sons an opportunity to enjoy themselves. The First Fulford Sea Scouts feted their fathers at Nan's Restaurant. Highlight of the evening came when the Scouts turned the daddies to mummies—by wrapping them in toilet paper.

Ten Years Ago

The Salt Spring Lions Club negotiated the purchase of 10 acres of land at Central to be used as a community recreation facility. The cost of the land was \$40,000. Plans call for creating playing fields in the area with the eventual inclusion of an ice rink and swimming pool. Lions president Aage Villadsen emphasized that the project would involve the entire island community.

Problems plagued the Vesuvius-Crofton ferry. The regular boat, the Vesuvius Queen, went to drydock for refit and was replaced by the Salt Spring Queen. The ferry hit a deadhead and suffered a damaged propeller. The results were slower speeds on the crossings. Next, the Salt Spring Queen rammed the wharf on the Crofton side causing damage to the wing wall and the dock. When things were straightened out over there, the jinxed boat ran into more problems. On an approach to Vesuvius wharf, the steering was damaged and the boat sailed in circles for two hours. By Tuesday, everything was back to normal.

An island landowner complained about the designation as farmland of a 20-acre property. The Salt Spring Islander explained that part of the land was marsh and the remainder was rock outcrop. Nothing could grow there but the provincial Land Commission would not change the designation because it had ruled that the land was indeed farmland.

The Galiano Club held its annual meeting. They discussed the possibilities of both Bluff and Centennial Parks. The club hall would soon need a new roof, the meeting learned. Basil Bengier was chosen president and would take over from Jim Ripley.

A fish packer sank in Active Pass. The two men on board the vessel were rescued by a passing tanker. The Active Pass light station put out the call for help. When a rescue crew from Mayne Island reached the scene, they stood by until the crewmen were safely aboard the tanker.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that a pig barbecue would be held in the hall in the middle of March. The

soda bicarb, he noted, would be free. Proceeds from the last dinner bought an extension ladder for the fire truck.

Five Years Ago

A moorage lease in Bennett Bay on Mayne Island had been issued by the land management branch in Nanaimo. The Islands Trust had earlier stated that it did not favour the proposed development. The moorage would be used by patrons of the Mayne Inn which was owned by Pinchin Holdings.

A public meeting in Ganges heard from engineers of the Capital Region that up to 75% of the village land was unsuitable for disposal of septic waste. The proposed level of treatment would be more than adequate, said an engineer from the firm of H.A. Simon Ltd., which had studied the harbour in the vicinity of the outfall. An application to proceed with the work would be made to the Pollution Control Board.

The Galiano Service Club heard about plans for Greenwoods, the seniors' home on Salt Spring. Jonna Mattiesing, who would be in charge of Greenwoods, explained the details to the ladies. Kathlyn Bengier, president of the group, presented her with a cheque for \$1,000. It was the third such cheque the Galiano Service Club had donated to the seniors' home.

The annual meeting of the Pender Island Farmers' Institute heard reports on activities of the previous year. The group would continue to investigate the possibility of creating a permanent establishment to sell island produce.

The Bazaar held at Gulf Islands Secondary School featured fun and games as well as money-raising. Popular event was the pie-in-the-face booth. Students had the opportunity to schmuck teachers. Driftwood missed an opportunity to photograph principal Bob McWhirter as a willing victim.

The septic fields at Lady Minto Hospital were not functioning properly. Costs of fixing the problem would be high. Pumping out a holding tank would carry a price tag of close to \$57,000.

Junior bowlers from Salt Spring were successful in competition in Duncan. Gordon Hitchcock won the junior singles and the team won their event. The group would travel to Prince George for a shot at the provincial title.

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Energy Data

Lighting

Although lighting is not a large energy user in the average home, it is very visible and easily controlled. Switching off lights in unoccupied areas will achieve considerable savings in your lighting energy requirements.

The proper choice of light source can provide additional savings. Incandescent lamps, with their warm, comfortable atmosphere, are the popular choice in most homes. They are not, however, the most efficient choice: fluorescent lamps give three to four times more light for the same amount of energy used and last about twenty times longer. A fluorescent lamp is more expensive than an incandescent lamp with the same light output, but it will pay for itself many times over its lifetime.

The most commonly used fluorescent lamps are standard cool white, standard warm white, deluxe cool white and deluxe warm white. Each has advantages, so choose the right fluorescent lamp for the situation.

Standard cool white is high in light output but only fair in colour quality. It is a good choice for the work bench or garage area. Standard warm white is equally high in light output but produces a warmer colour. It is best suited for hallways and recreation areas.

Deluxe lamps have been designed to produce a more balanced colour rendition. While some efficiency is lost, the energy saving is still several times that of an incandescent lamp. Deluxe lamps are preferable for use in the living areas of the home. For kitchen, utility area and sewing room, or where the colour scheme is in cool colours (blue or blue-green tones), deluxe cool white is the best choice. Where rooms are decorated in warm colours (orange, red, beige, brown) and for vanity mirror lighting, a deluxe warm white lamp is preferable. Deluxe warm white is considered the best choice to blend with incandescent lighting.

Individual decor sometimes makes it difficult to incorporate fluorescent lighting into the home. New, compact fluorescent units (complete with ballast) are now available which can be screwed into a conventional light socket. This an ordinary table lamp can be fitted with a more energy efficient light source.

The efficiency of your lighting system is also affected by your choice of room colour scheme. Rooms with dark colours or dark panelling absorb light, so higher wattage lighting is required to provide a comfortable seeing condition. Conversely, light colours such as a white ceiling and pastel-coloured walls contribute to efficient lighting.

Every room surface reflects some portion of the light it receives. The percentage of light reflected from a surface, in proportion to the amount of light falling on it, is its reflectance. The more light reflected, the more efficient the lighting system. The following guidelines are recommended for paint reflection values in the home. You can obtain paint reflection charts to show the values obtainable from a particular paint mix.

Ceilings: minimum of 60% to 90% reflectance (e.g., an off-white or soft pastel).

Walls: minimum of 35% to 60% reflectance. Since even the lightest wood panelling will rarely have more than 30% reflectance, panelling on one wall should be offset by using a higher-reflectance lighter colour elsewhere.

Desks and counter tops: minimum 30% to 70% reflectance. This should be similar to walls for eye comfort. A matte finish is best.

Floors: minimum 15% to 35% reflectance.

The right level of lighting for seeing tasks must be provided for visual comfort, safety and general well-being. Energy can be conserved, however, by using light controls where applicable.

Dimmers or high-low switches can vary dining room light levels for dining or more critical seeing. They can also be used to reduce hall lights to night light levels and to give more flexibility in other areas.

Timers, or timers in conjunction with a photo-electric cell, can turn lights on or off automatically. They give the house a lived-in look while you're away. This provides for security without the energy waste of leaving lights on day and night.

Planned three-way switching can enable you to turn lamps off easily and conveniently when going from room to room.

Where possible, use energy-saving lamps (i.e. a three-way 50-100-150 watt or a low wattage fluorescent lamp) for the lighting application.
