

# Leaf lettuce easier to grow, twice as nutritious

This is a bit of an anniversary. I just checked our calendar and came across a little note entered by the love of my life. This is the beginning of my sixth year of writing these messages from the green life and I am still writing in long hand, which seems almost archaic in this age of the word-processor.

It has crossed my mind that had I invested in a typewriter six years ago I should have at least learned to type by now, if not how to write. However, nothing is ever too late to learn and we may yet learn either, or both, if favoured with a typewriter by providence, and with inspiration through the fickle favour of the muses.

Undaunted then, we shall continue to wend our way through the dire straits of personal and general restraint in boundless confidence in providence, much faith in the muses, and a great love for the green life, which includes all manner of lettuces.

## LEAF TYPES PREFERRED

I must say that leaf lettuces are my favourites, mostly because they are easier to grow, and also because they are twice as nutritious as the head types.

Another advantage is that the leafy types may be harvested over an extended period of time, leaf by leaf. Actually, if corn salad is included in planning for fresh greens, then we can, between the two, be independently wealthy, which is not that far off the mark considering the cost and condition of winter lettuce.

This requires a bit of judicious planning and a few repeated sowings. Leaf lettuces do quite well in average soils, and better on rich, fertile soils, which head lettuces depend on. All lettuces are about 95% water and therefore need a continuous supply of moisture.

Head lettuces prefer cool growing temperatures of 50 to 60° (F.) or 10 to 16° (C). Therefore they are best grown in late spring and early

summer, whereas the leafy types, especially the even more nutritious and delicious cos lettuces, withstand both the heat of summer and the cooler temperatures of early spring and late fall.

### MATURE IN HALF THE TIME

The leafy types grow to maturity in about half the time (41 to 60 days) as compared to the heading types (80 to 100 days), which is rather nice and fits in well with a continuous supply scheme.

Let us plan as follows: start all three types, leaf, head and cos, in the greenhouse or under cover as soon as it can be managed, and repeat at one-month intervals for leaf and cos types, and at two-week intervals for the heady kind.

Seedlings of leafy types may be transplanted outdoors on or about the middle of April and heading types after the first of May. Outdoor sowings may also be made on those dates, to be repeated at the same intervals.

In other words, leaf types may be sown indoors from now on, outdoors from the middle of April until July 15, at one-month intervals. Heading types may be sown indoors from now on, outdoors from the beginning of May until the end of June at two-week intervals.

On or about the first of September, a single corn salad sowing completes this scheme for a year-round supply of fresh greens. Cos lettuce, from a July 15 sowing, should begin to yield greens around October 1. Corn salad, from a September sowing, should yield its first greens around October 15 and from then on until May of next year, or, if a few plants are left, until the

new first greens are harvestable.

Good early leafy candidates are "Black Seeded Simpson" at 41 days, and "Grand Rapids Forcing" at 45 days. "Ruby", a deep red-tinted leafy type comes in in 47 days and looks lovely in fresh salads.

From then on the later leafy types take over, such as "Buttercrunch" and "Butterking" at 60 and 64 days respectively, to be followed by the cos types, such as "Valmaine" and "Parris Island", both at 75 days. The headed kinds are next, anywhere from 80 to 98 days according to variety.

Headed types must be harvested

when ready as they go to seed rapidly. In contrast "Buttercrunch" remains sweet after the plant goes to seed. It is far better therefore to grow only about a dozen head lettuces for any two-week period to provide you with about a head per day, if they all head, which is not all that certain.

Another important key to success is early and generous spacing. Loose-leaf lettuce should stand a minimum of 10 inches or 23 cm. apart and the heady kind should have at least 12 inches or 31 cm of room for proper growth and a fully expanded head.

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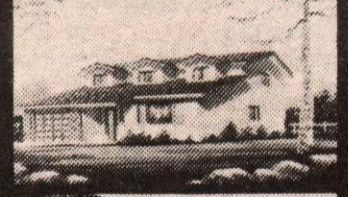
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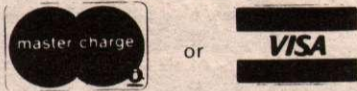

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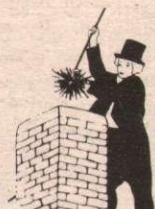

# Annual meeting of council March 27

Curiosity may have killed the cat, but to be curious about the work of your Community Arts Council will be much more rewarding. The main aim of the Arts Council is to enrich the life of the community through increased opportunities for participation in cultural pursuits.

To quote from a recent article in *Recreation Reporter* by Linette Wright Smith, she concludes her article with this paragraph which we feel is a thoughtful definition of art in all its various forms, and stresses its importance in our community.

"Art is a unique stimulus for thought, discussion and reflection. These very qualities are so often threatened in our culture; a culture which holds amusement and entertainment in high regard. It is the processes of art which teach us about reality, thought, ideas, fantasy, joy, fear and celebration.

"It is through the unique aesthetic experience with art that we develop our thoughts, our feelings and our senses. Art has enriched our culture in a way no other discipline can."

It is gaining a national reputation across the country, and attracts many tourists to the island, who spend money in restaurants and other Ganges businesses, spreading the goodwill around.

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## Farmers meeting at Duncan

Farmers' Institute members will meet at Duncan next week for the annual general meeting of District A of the B.C. Farmers' Institute.

Keynote speaker will be Harvey Schroeder, provincial minister of agriculture and food. District chairman Ray Stewart points out that government policy will have a significant impact on agriculture in the 1980's and that Schroeder's remarks will be of concern to all farmers.

District A includes Vancouver Island, the Gulf Islands and Powell River. Any member of a local institute is a member of District A and is eligible to take part in the business meetings and election of officers.

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# Down Through the Years with Driftwood

## Twenty Years Ago

Students at the Ganges school competed in an oratorical contest. There were 23 entrants in four divisions. Cindy Reynolds was the primary winner and Sharon McManus took the junior division. Intermediate winner was Bruce Hildred while Gail Slingsby topped the seniors.

Election of officers occurred at a meeting of the Salt Spring Recreation Commission. There had been \$200 set aside for a director of summer activities. The Fulford Athletic Association was successful in a request to petition the government to set up a recreation commission for the south end of the island.

Growth had been the key to activities of the Salt Spring Credit Union throughout the year. Dividends of four percent and six percent would be paid on patronage refunds. The credit union was also considering expansion plans. The island branch was part of the Nanaimo chapter of credit unions. The Lions Club of Salt Spring had donated \$2,000 to replace the floor in Fulford Hall for roller skating. The club had also purchased \$1,000 worth of roller skates. The Fulford Hall committee was in a position, after only two years, of repaying the club for its generosity.

The Legion would be holding another of the popular Klondike Nights. Music and entertainment for the evening funfest would be supplied by the Bed Bugs, the Salt Spring version of the Beatles.

## Fifteen Years Ago

Fire destroyed a Moutat Point house on Salt Spring, leaving an elderly man dead. Fire chief Fred Donaghy laid the blame for the blaze on faulty electrical circuits in the house. Clyde Brewsaugh was found dead near a window of the house and cause of death was blamed on smoke inhalation.

February was cold and dry, said Ganges weatherman Howard Carlin. Precipitation measured only 3.36 inches for the month, down from the 5.34 inches which had fallen a year earlier. High temperatures reached 50 degrees and the low was registered at 28 degrees.

The money collected by the Auxiliary to Lady Minto Hospital was put to good use during the previous year. The annual meeting of the group heard that \$525 went to buy x-ray equipment, \$448 for a spectrophotometer and \$348 for new chairs and tables for the staff room. The auxiliary also purchased other items needed by the hospital. They ended the year with \$1,245 in the bank and a \$500 bond.

Papajohn reported bad luck from Saturna. He fell out of bed and injured his nose. He fell and hurt his knee again. His car wasn't running right and he couldn't trim his sideburns properly because he couldn't wear his glasses while shaving.

The parents of Pender Island school children gathered to discuss the dormitory situation on Salt Spring with school board chairman George Heinekey and new Pender school trustee June Allan.

## Ten Years Ago

When the four young Salt Spring residents attempted to cross Stuart Channel in a storm, tragedy struck. The body of a 21-year-old woman was found floating near the overturned canoe. The bodies of the other three victims were not found. They had left Musgrave Landing, where they lived in a commune, and were headed for a shopping trip in Duncan.

The provincial government changed the rules on school construction. School boards no longer had to seek voter approval through referendum in order to build new facilities. School construction would be subject to approval by the ministry of education on request from the school trustees.

The Red Cross money drive on Galiano reached its target quickly. The seven canvassers spread out across the island to gather \$500.

The Heart Fund campaign in the Gulf Islands closed with donations totalling \$1,925. The previous year, the campaign had raised a total of \$915.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that Salt Spring shouldn't complain about the new ferry causing a high wake in Fulford Harbour. He pointed out that a sister ship had churned through Navy Channel for several years and Pender and Mayne Islands were still there.

A public hearing was held by the Pollution Control Board to hear both sides in the controversy over the Ganges sewer. Proponents included staff from the Capital Region while opposition came from member of SPEC in Vancouver and Salt Spring. Only 24 people attended the hearings and judgment on the matter was reserved.

The community plan for Salt Spring had gained approval at the Capital Region. It was the third such document for the Gulf Islands to be approved. Earlier the Galiano and South Pender plans had been okayed by the board.

Tommy Douglas, local MP, would come to Ganges to express his views on the proposed international park which would include portions of the Gulf Islands.

## Five Years Ago

The Islands Trust threatened court action if Pinchin Holdings took action on its foreshore lease at Bennett Bay on Mayne Island. The

lease for extensive moorage facilities in the bay had been granted by the provincial government despite opposition to the plans by the Trust. John Rich, Trust chairman, said a compromise could be arranged to allow the docking facilities but under control of the Trust.

The recreation plan for Salt Spring Island had been prepared and was presented to a meeting of nine islanders. The plan called for improvements to facilities at Portlock Park and other inexpensive recreational projects. The firm which prepared the plan said a swimming pool and skating rink would be too expensive but the Parks and Recreation Commission should consider building a community recreation centre.

Changes to the community plan for South Pender Island to allow a 12-lot subdivision at the canal between the north and south islands were discussed at a meeting. The property in question was 26 acres in size and the proposed building lots would be slightly larger than two acres each. Opponents questioned the removal of trees and expressed concern about the wildlife area.

Hugh Curtis, local MLA and provincial secretary, came to Salt Spring to present a cheque for \$30,000 to the Farmers' Institute. The money was from the provincial lottery fund and was intended to help the institute purchase land on Rainbow Road for a permanent home for the organization.

While both the Bowen Queen and the Mayne Queen were in drydock being stretched, service on the Swartz Bay-Fulford run to and from Salt Spring was being handled by the Motor Princess and the highways department ferry Tacheke. The two vessels maintained a schedule of hourly service between the two ferry terminals.

## Bad luck courted in break-in

Someone is courting at least 21 years of bad luck following the breaking into and entry of a Burgoyne Bay summer cottage on Salt Spring.

The cottage is accessible only from the water and a caretaker checked the premises March 2 and

found the damage.

Sometime since February 17 someone forced entry to the cottage and broke several windows as well as three mirrors. A propane refrigerator was also missing.

Ganges detachment RCMP are investigating the incident.

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## Energy Data

### Appliances and Hot Water

The automatic clothes washer and the dishwasher are two home appliances that can get us into a lot of hot water.

Water is the main ingredient in washing, and heating that water takes a considerable amount of energy. It will pay you to use (and choose) your appliance with an eye to energy efficiency.

Modern automatic washers have been designed to be more energy efficient than washers of perhaps a decade ago. But both new and older models require wise use to maximize energy savings.

Use the temperature control to select a wash temperature suitable for the fabric and amount of soil. This will help clean the load without using energy unnecessarily, and will avoid needless wear on garments. Using warm water for washing, where appropriate, will save 50% over a comparable hot water wash. Where hot water is the best choice for a clean wash, it really saves energy to use it since you will not be forced to rewash.

If there are not enough items in a particular load to fill the tub, use the water level selector on your machine. Choosing the appropriate level of water for the size of the wash load will give you clean clothes without wasting energy.

Avoid prolonged washes—clothes won't come any cleaner after a ten minute wash. Soil can be redeposited after this time, and extra energy will be needed to rewash. Adjusting the wash time to the degree of soil can save time, energy and wear on fabrics.

Use cold water for rinsing. It is good for all fabrics, but it's a must for synthetics and permanent press items to minimize wrinkling.

The dishwasher is an efficient appliance that not only takes the drudgery out of washing dishes but can also make savings in energy usage. If you load up your dishwasher and run it once a day, you'll use about 72 l (16 gal.) of hot water instead of the 114 l (24 gal.) you would use by washing dishes three times a day by hand. To further save on energy, use the "no heat" drying feature when dishes are washed, or stop the machine and let the dishes air dry.

Note that a dishwasher needs water at 60°C (140°F) to dissolve the detergent properly and clean the dishes satisfactorily.

When the time comes to purchase a new clothes washer or dishwasher, decide what features suit your needs. Then check the Energuide label to compare the energy efficiency of similar models. The Energuide rating indicates the amount of energy used to operate the machine and to heat the water for a specified number of washes per month (34 for clothes washers, 30 for dishwashers). A high rating means the appliance will cost more to operate than an appliance with a lower rating. Over the lifetime of the appliance, the dollar difference in operating costs could be considerable.

Today's laundry appliances and dishwashers are efficient in design. How they are used is the prime factor in saving energy. People are the key to energy savings no matter what equipment is being used.

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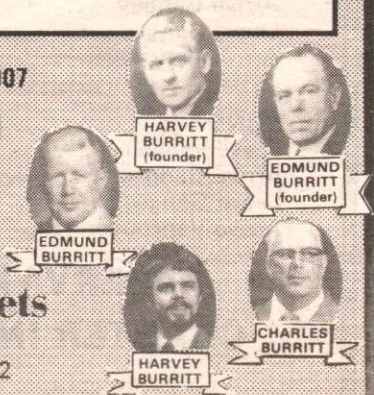

## Road work concerns Trust

The road leading to Musgrave Landing on Salt Spring is being repaired and the work has Islands Trust officials concerned.

The Musgrave Landing subdivision, given a green light by the department of highways approving officer last September, carried a provision that no work would be done on the road to upgrade it from a four-wheel-drive vehicle track.

Joe Jensen, district manager for the highways department, told *Driftwood* that the work was regular maintenance. The heavy rains of last November washed out a section, he said, and created problems for access to the communications towers on the mountains.

The work on the road has consisted of grading the nine-mile length from Isabella Point Road to the government wharf at Musgrave. The road to the department of

transport compound on the southerly slope of Mount Tuam had also been worked upon.

Gravel has been put on the road in several places and culverts are to go in to divert water under the road instead of over it.

Jensen said the road is a public road and his department had a "responsibility to see that it is passable."

Jensen could not put a price tag on the work because, he said, it came out of the regular maintenance budget.

Nick Gilbert, Islands Trust representative for Salt Spring, expressed concern about the work. The controversial subdivision proposal at Musgrave Landing was to be water access only, he noted, and the road was not to be upgraded.

But the work is being carried out. "It's too much of a coincidence," he said.

The approval of the subdivision runs out today (March 14) but Gilbert said extensions of strata title

approvals are common.

While the road, according to the department of highways, is classified as a four-wheel-drive route, a two-wheel-drive pickup truck can make the trip easily.
