

Island entering phase of rapid growth, says Schubart

A problem which must be addressed in the Salt Spring community plan is lack of affordable commercial space, Hank Schubart told a meeting of island resident last week.

The Salt Spring Planning Association called the meeting to determine opinion on the community plan. The group, said president Ray Hill, intends to submit a community plan brief to the Islands Trust but wanted to know how people feel.

Schubart explained the origin of the plan. He said that in the late 1960's a committee had been set up

with representation from all parts of the island. They prepared and circulated a questionnaire.

It was answered by 1,013 people, an estimated 41% of the population. The resulting plan had been based on the answers obtained.

He told the meeting that he wanted to stress that the plan, as it stands, is a good one. He urged that it be kept in force until something better could be created.

The island is entering another phase of rapid growth, he said, and that growth challenges the community plan to ensure that something of what the island

currently is remains after the growth peaks.

The plan, as good as it is, is lacking in certain areas, he noted, and pointed to water resource management as a shortcoming. The plan is also silent on how islanders can make a living on the island, he said.

The plan does deal with density, and the population of the island has been estimated to grow to 15,000.

But, said Schubart, the population has increased at a greater rate than anticipated. He said that seasonal cottages and basement apartments are being

rented which has added to the growth figures.

With the growth, traffic in Ganges will become unmanageable. But he said that the community could handle the increase in traffic and lack of parking space in the village.

"Just let it get all plugged up, and people won't come anymore."

A way around congestion in Ganges is to create two or three other "satellite towns", he said. But the solution will cause more debate.

The controversy will come, he said, because "this is one of the feistiest communities I've ever been in."

But, he added, that's a healthy sign.

With other centres for commercial activities, the limitations of space would also be solved, he suggested. Currently, the major share of commercial space on the island is located in Ganges. And the rents are expensive, he noted.

"We have to deal with reconsidering the whole nature of planning on the island," he said.

The choice as he sees it is to deal with planning or "let history take its course."

In the same view, Schubart said that the Ganges plan has to be dealt with at the same time as the island plan. The Ganges plan is going to be controversial but it has to be looked at.

"You can't consider the body without the heart," he said.

The concept of cluster development should be looked at, he said.

But the North Salt Spring Water District urges a retention of the existing pattern of growth. The board of directors has based expansion plans on that pattern and if changes are too radical, growth on the island could become expensive when the water lines have to be rerouted.

Cluster development would

include a twist in the current development plans. To ensure that the clusters were of sufficient density so as not to spill over, the sale of development rights would be introduced.

Under such a scheme, if a developer asked for more development than was allowable on a property, the sale of rights would enter the picture.

The developer would deal with another resident who owned a larger piece of property. The second person might not want to subdivide the property and would sell the possible density to the first person.

A covenant or restriction would be placed on the second property and the first property would be allowed to be developed to the combined density.

Schubart explained that the scheme needed a determination of what the eventual density of the island should be. It would then become a case of moving the density from one section of the island to another.

The Planning Association will use the comments from the meeting as a basis for its brief to the Islands Trust on possible changes to the community plan.



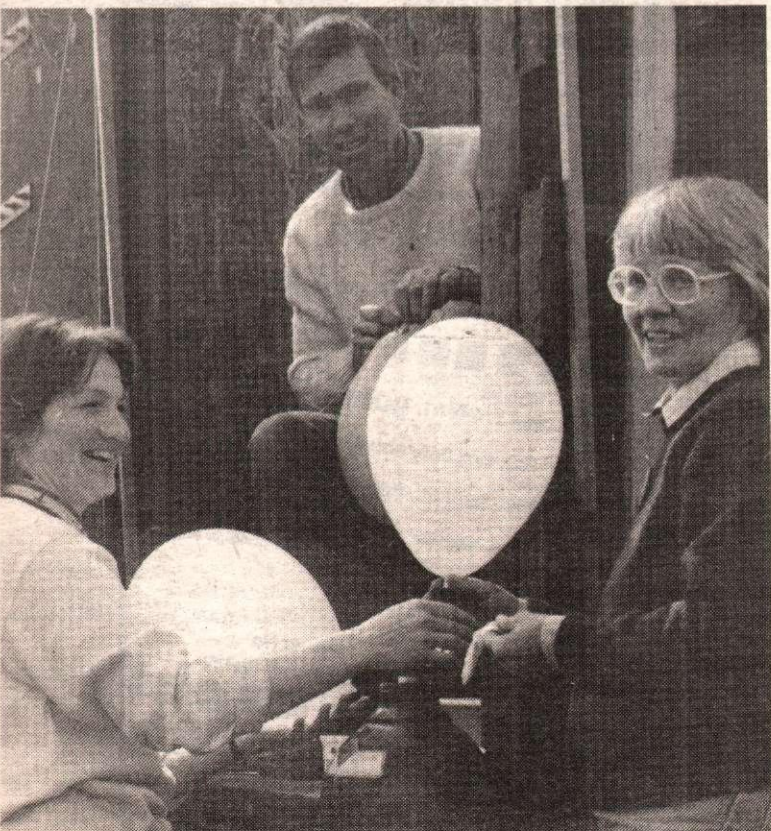

Soil heat first consideration in cultivation of cukes

After all these years it suddenly feels funny to be writing this in the ancient art of longhand.

Even after a hiatus of one week in the city, and away from the little typewriter, we can now produce at least a couple of lines of intelligible prose, before its preference for ancient Kurdistan reasserts itself. And it seems that I need to go into training, or at least my left pinky does for it has become apparent that it suffers from weak x's.

So if you see me drumming my left pinky on any hard surface, you will know that I am not suffering from a curious nervous problem. If anyone has any suggestions for other pinky aerobics, I will trade for these suggestions on the care and cultivation of cucumbers.

Cucumbers originated in Africa, where they thrive along the edges of streams, in loose, sandy soil warmed by the sun and with a steady supply of moisture. These are its native conditions and if we can approximate these as best we can, we shall be blessed with a bountiful harvest.

SOIL HEAT IMPORTANT

Sufficient soil heat is therefore our first consideration. Cucumber seed will only germinate well in soil temperatures around 70° F (about 17° C.). Although they may be sown outdoors in the early half of June, germination is often spotty at best, and the emerging young seedlings often languish and fall prey to hardships until the soil warms up considerably.

To get a head start on our cool summer growing season, we may start seeds now indoors or in the greenhouse. My insulated, soil-heated germination box in our unheated greenhouse works just fine in every respect, and especially for cucumbers. Incidentally, it is one of the many useful gardening accessories which were selected and collected for publication by *Organic Gardening* in their soon-to-be-

published book.

Since all the squash family members, including cucumbers, resent root disturbance, cucumbers are best started in individual small containers, which I set in the heated soil. Sow three seeds and retain the most vigorous seedling after emergence, when the first true leaves have formed.

FEED THEM WELL

From then on feed well, best with manure teas, which I alternate or combine with seaweed tea for minerals and health. These may then be transplanted in the latter half of June, after the soil has warmed up well.

Another good method is to set the transplants into a raised bed created with an old tire. The black tire holds heat well and provides improved drainage. Fill the tire with rich goodies containing lots of organics for holding moisture and nutrients while still providing good drainage.

The rampant growth of cucumbers requires adequate resources to generate and maintain it, and to be able to produce abundant fruit.

For this high levels of phosphorus are necessary, from bonemeal, and/or a goodly amount of seaweed. Plentiful nutrients and minerals and adequate soil heat, will result in healthy, vigorous plants and lots of cucumbers.

Farming and Gardening

Again, since the purpose of every living thing is to perpetuate itself, cucumbers will keep on trying to produce seed, and more cucumbers, as long as the maturing fruit are being picked.

Pick cucumbers when they show the first trace of lighter or yellowish green on their skins. Near the end of the season, newly emerging blossoms may also be pinched off to direct all growing energy into existing young fruit.

OVER SHEARED WEEDS

My personal, favourite way of growing cucumbers is to let them sprawl over sheared weeds, or over sheared white clover.

The latter especially provides nitrogen-rich organic matter for soil improvement, the shearings provide a moisture retaining mulch, and also a nice bed for the cucumbers to lie on. It also provides a haven for thousands of those little black hunting spiders which keep our

garden free of undesired insects.

A steady supply of moisture and twice-monthly dousings with manure and seaweed teas assure continuing health and growth. The customary hills for cucumbers and squash serve the same purpose as the tire, although the tire is more efficient at collecting and holding heat. The new compact varieties of cucumber such as Stokes "Dasher", produce lots of fruit on dense vines rarely exceeding four to five feet (120 to 150 cm) in diameter, which makes these ideal for the smaller garden or for tubs.

We usually grow a variety of slicing and pickling cucumbers among which the compact types are a definite asset. Altogether, the growing of cucumbers, given their basic requirements, and a bit of care

in their tender beginnings, is an outright pleasure, as once they are established, very little further attention is required.

Until then, my current attention will be focused on pinky jogging until I need not be concerned anymore with the avoidance of words like "xerxes".

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Liquor store entered

The government liquor store in Ganges was the target of thieves Saturday night.

RCMP were called when a resident noticed that the glass in the front door had been broken.

First indication of missing stock was that the stack of beer cases had shrunk.

RCMP are investigating the case of the thirsty thieves.

Procedure adopted

The make-up of each Islands Trust Committee on the major islands can cause problems and a change in voting procedure may iron things out.

The Islands Trust Council urged each Trust Committee to adopt a modified voting procedure and the Mayne Island group did just that at a meeting two weeks ago.

Each committee is composed of three general trustees and two local trustees. On occasion, when the three general trustees outvote the local trustees, anger and ill feelings can result.

The new formula for voting will allow, in the event of a three-and-two split, for a cooling-off period. The vote would be deferred until later in the same meeting or to a subsequent meeting of the committee.

"The idea," said general trustee Gordon Wallace, "is to give us the chance to maybe understand the other person's position more clearly."

He noted that the vote, when taken, might remain the same but the anger may be avoided by the breathing space and the second look.

Three firms bid on taxi service

Gulf Islands School Board received three tenders for water taxi service for Outer Islands students when the bids were opened last Friday.

High bid was submitted by Les Abraham of Marine (Centurion) Transportation of Vancouver with a price tag of \$193,916.

Bob George of Gulf Islands Sailing Charters put in a bid containing several options. The two highest bids on the options he put in were \$112,500 and \$118,500.

The third bid, from Jack Hughes of Gulf Island Water Taxi on Salt

Spring, was \$139,200.

The tenders were called to supply daily water taxi service for students in Grades 10, 11 and 12 from the Outer Islands to Salt Spring. Grade 9 students from Pender Island would be included also.

The second portion of the tender called for daily service from Galiano and Saturna Islands to Mayne Island for students in Grades 7, 8 and 9.

In the budget this year the school board has set aside \$261,762 for transportation contracts. Included in that total would be money to pay

for the buses which the school board hired.

In 1983, the school board spent \$151,780 for contracts covering transportation.

The trustees had decided earlier this year to supply daily water taxi service for Outer Islands students who attended secondary school on Salt Spring.

While daily water taxi service has been in effect for several years, the students from Pender and Saturna, for instance, were required to board on Salt Spring during the week.

The proposed daily service would

allow the students, and their parents, an option of using the water taxi each day or boarding in a Salt Spring home.

The daily service to Salt Spring would arrive on the island at 7:45 am and return to the Outer Islands at 2:15 pm.

The Outer Islands service to the Mayne school is to be scheduled to arrive on Mayne at 8:45 am and return to the other islands at 3:35 pm.

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
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Wranglers show great form

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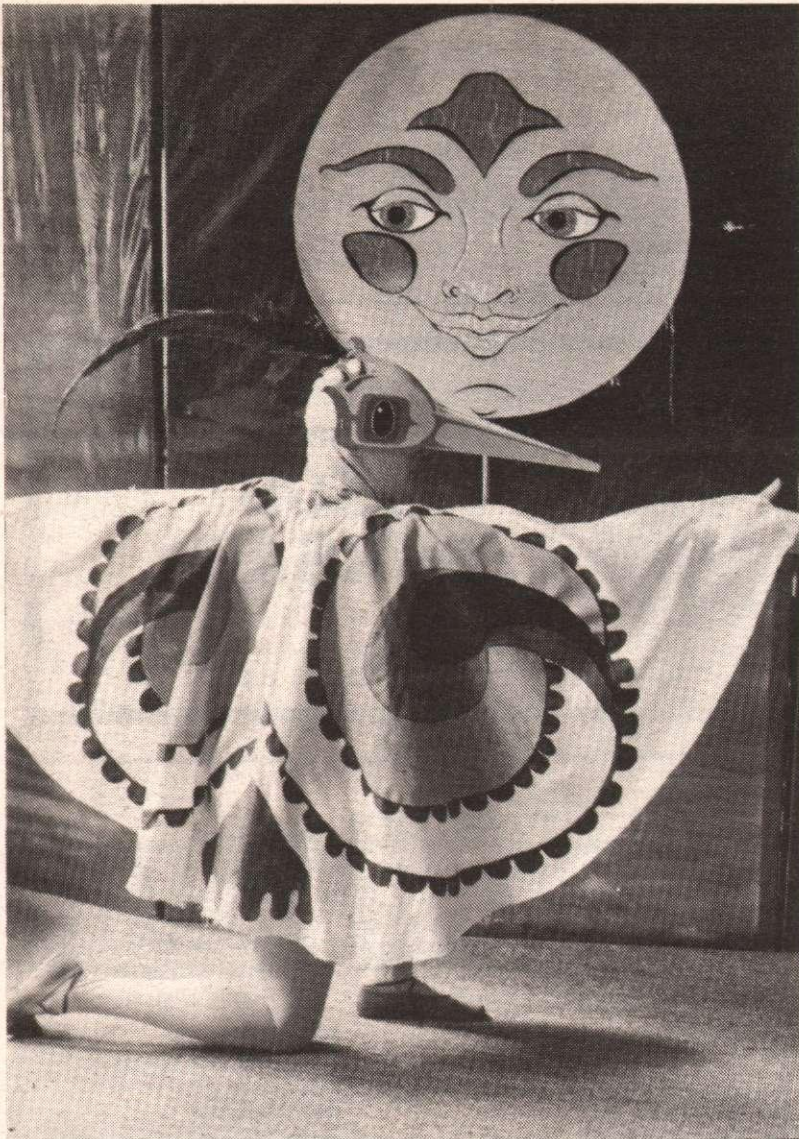

New special education program to go into effect in September

The proposed school-based emphasis for special education in the Gulf Islands will be guided by a committee composed of school principals and the superintendent of schools.

The Gulf Islands School Board has accepted a report on special education changes suggested by the ministry of education. The report looked at the needs of children and outlined the structure of the program which goes into effect in September.

Under the new system, each of the Gulf Islands schools will have on staff teachers who can cope with the needs of exceptional children. Processing of the needs will be carried out by the committee of principals.

A pool of paraprofessionals and non-teaching professionals will be available as the need arises. This group is essentially classroom aides or tutors as well as such professionals as a speech therapist and psychologist among others.

The report noted the strengths of the current system as being "the ability to service children in small groups or on a one-to-one basis." That strength should continue when the system moves to school-based efforts.

Funding for the program is in place and the various individuals who would act as tutors or contract workers are available.

The potential weakness of the new system stems from lack of district co-ordination.

A move to hire a part-time district co-ordinator was not acceptable to the majority of school trustees. Such a position, noted superintendent Mike Marshall, would require a salary of up to \$25,000. The money, he suggested, would be better spent

on the programs.

Ron McQuiggan, Salt Spring school trustee, suggested that the system of a principal's committee be tried for at least a year.

"If the potential weakness becomes a real weakness," he said, "then we can act."

Under the principals' committee approach, each principal will be allowed time to administer the special education program in each school. The report notes: "Funding for this release time is provided through the new fiscal framework...."

The needs of the four Outer Islands schools will be looked at

closely. Currently those schools are served by an "Outer Islands Itinerant Special Needs Teacher."

The report noted: "Because of the size of the Outer Islands schools and their diverse needs, some additional time may be required to co-ordinate services to these four island school communities."

Efforts will be directed at testing the children for their particular special needs. The school board intends to have a testing program in place to evaluate all children entering kindergarten.

The newly arrived children in higher grades will also go through a testing process.

Sutherland tells institute of his experiences in Somalia

The International Red Cross is establishing a new program to teach mothers in underdeveloped countries how to provide better care for their babies and thus reduce infant mortality.

Dr. Don Sutherland will be leaving the Pender Islands Health Care Clinic June 1 to work with the Red Cross in establishing the program. During the remaining months of 1984 he will work in South America, Africa and in Asian countries. In the past month he spent three weeks in Colombia setting up a project.

On Tuesday evening last week Dr. Sutherland spoke to over 100 people at the Pender Legion at a meeting sponsored by the Farmers' Institute.

Dr. Sutherland spent last year in Somalia, East Africa, in the refugee camps which have been established in the past four years by many nationalities to assist with one of the worst refugee problems in the world.

"I feel the past 3 1/2 years have been the most important in my life and I appreciate the privilege I have had to travel and see the problems other cultures are struggling with," he said. "I feel part of my responsibility is to convey this to the people in my own culture as when I am in a Third World country I try to convey something of our culture to them."

If one knows people personally, one learns that their fears and desires are not that much different

in strange lands from our own, said Sutherland. In Somalia old people deplore the changing ways of the young as they do here on Pender Island.

"There is a lot of tension and fear in the world and the better we know each other the better will be our understanding."

For about an hour Dr. Sutherland showed slides of Somalia, the camps, people, the solar water system and the people who worked with him.

In the spring of 1981 Pender Island residents raised sufficient money to pay for a solar water pumping system to supply clean, chlorinated water from a good source at the Saba'ad camp where Dr. Sutherland was then working.

On his return to this camp in 1983 he found that the pump was continuing to do its job efficiently.

Pender Islanders' money was also used to send young people from the camps to the hospital nursing schools in the urban centres and now they have returned to the camps and are part of the community health team which is an integral part of camp life. The nurses do the diagnoses as there are only 10 doctors for 500,000 people.

The community health workers have been taught to read and write. They run the clinics each day and go into the huts daily to look for sick people. They need to be clear about their jobs and exacting and because

of their knowledge carry a certain amount of authority.

Dr. Sutherland said there is no problem with motivation. They love their jobs and are very keen to do them perfectly and understand the importance of their work.

The Somalians have now taken over in 24 of the 35 camps and the ex-patriate teams have left them on their own.

The community health workers were so enthusiastic with their new knowledge that Dr. Sutherland found on his return to the country in 1983 they had set up their own schools to teach others how to read, write and to share their knowledge.

Today the Somalian refugees are basically running their own programs. In 1981 there were 6,000 cases of measles with 500 deaths. Immunization reduced it in 1982 to 35 cases of measles and no deaths and in 1983 to 17 cases with no deaths.

In the camps 40% of the population is under 25, so conditions such as cancer and heart disease are rare. The whole health budget of the Somalian government would be about equal to that of the Saanich Peninsula Hospital.

When Sutherland leaves Pender he will join a team that is working on establishing the new Red Cross program.

In winding up his address, he noted: "In the hour during which I have been talking to you 600 children in the world have died."

Students to ride free

When Gulf Islands students go on school-related field trips, the ferry rides will be free.

Mike Marshall, superintendent of schools, told the Gulf Islands School Board the news at a meeting last week. He had been talking with officials of B.C. Ferries about the matter for several months.

He said the officials had been "co-operative, sensitive to our needs and sympathetic."

He pointed out to the ferry officials that children from northern Gulf Islands, which are served by department of highways ferries, did not have to pay the fares when going on field trips.

The new scheme allows the children to be covered by exchange orders for the trips. An exchange order must be filled out for each crossing. The no-fare scheme does not apply to vehicles or accompanying adults.

In the past, school groups could apply several months in advance of a trip for group fares. But the matter was complicated and many teachers did not bother with it, preferring to pay the reduced fares through commuter tickets.

Marshall said the new system brings a fairness to field trips by Gulf Island students. "We feel really good about it."

Mrs. J. Van Herwaarden was named delegate to the B.C. provincial triennial convention in Vancouver next June with Gladys Slingsby as alternate.

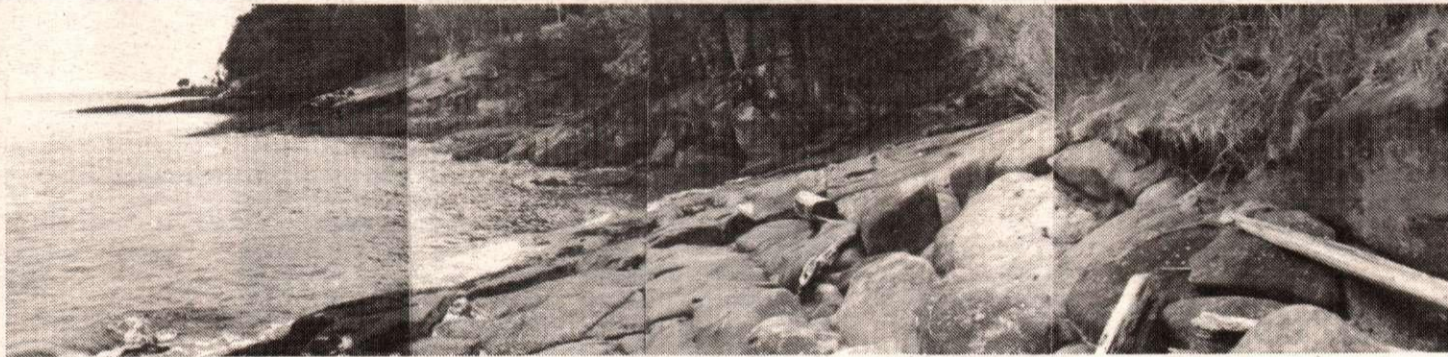

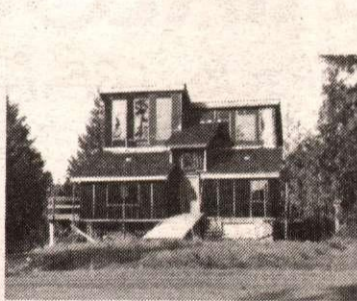

Two federal programs help students find jobs

The federal government is sponsoring two programs to help students find employment for the summer.

Employment and Immigration Canada offers Summer Canada Works and Summer Career Access through Canada Employment Centres for Students. The Victoria office is located at 2653 Douglas Street.

Summer Canada Works is a program allowing community sponsors to create job situations for students.

"The jobs should expose students to a realistic working environment and give them a chance to learn and gain relevant on-the-job experience," notes an information sheet about the program.

The government will contribute towards the wages of students hired under the program as well as allow for job-related costs.

Summer Career Access is geared

to internships for students in jobs relating to their chosen careers.

The employment centres compile lists of possible summer jobs and register the students. The staff then attempt to get the two together.

Students are screened and matched to relevant jobs. They are instructed on how to check out the job market, how to write a positive resume as well as how to approach and carry off an interview with a prospective employer.

Last year the Victoria centre registered 3,300 students, says program supervisor Barbara Grantham, and placed more than half of them in jobs. She was on Salt Spring last week to explain the programs to students at Gulf Islands Secondary School.

The programs are open to all students who plan to continue their education in the fall. They must also be legally entitled to work in Canada.

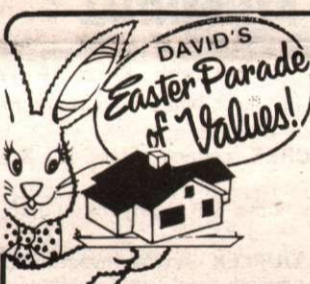
The dump recycling effort is receiving lots of support. A working committee is easily sharing the work which was done by just a few people initially.

Tercel station wagon

Real test is in the driving

BY TONY RICHARDS

Either it's a nice looking car, or it's just plain ugly. Those are about the only two reactions you get from people discussing one of the stranger looking vehicles on the road today, Toyota's Tercel wagon.

The SR5 represents Toyota's entry into the field of four-wheel-drive passenger vehicles, a field that until now has only consisted of American Motors' Eagle, the Subaru and the Russian-built Lada.

The Tercel wagon is indeed an odd-looking vehicle, with its stepped roof and deep rear side-windows, which almost appear to have been tacked on as an afterthought.

But the real test of the SR5 is in the driving, and there's very little to complain about there. It handled extremely well wherever I took it: on the highway, on winding island roads and on a four-wheel-drive track that barely qualifies as a driveway.

And the shift from two (it's front-wheel driven) to four-wheel-drive is accomplished simply with a lever—there is no need to use the clutch and it can be done at any speed. Furthermore, unlike the Subaru, the SR5 can be driven at any speed with all four wheels engaged.

In two-wheel-drive you have five speeds but when you go to four-wheel you have a bull-low, or Extra Low, as Toyota calls it, for "stump-pulling power," should you ever want to engage in such an activity with your passenger vehicle.

The 1.5-litre engine delivers plenty of power while power-assisted steering and brakes contribute to ease of handling. Toyota claims fuel consumption levels of 5.4 litres per 100 km on the highway and 7.8 litres urban.

The SR5 has excellent interior lighting with one light in the standard location between the front and back seats and another in the rear by the back door.

During two weeks of test driving I

came across only two negative factors.

One was the high-pitched, particularly raucous warning buzzer that tells you your seatbelt is undone or that you've left the key in the lock when you open the door.

The other was the shape of the front doors. They are angled back in such a way that when you open them

the top corner comes very close to knocking you in the head. That, however, is a problem soon overcome through continued driving of the car.

And that obnoxious warning buzzer can be eliminated too. All you need do is fasten your seatbelt before you drive off or take the key from the ignition before you get out.

Dye test cost jumps

The pipe is capped at both ends and contains upwards of 65,000 gallons of water. To conduct the proposed dye test, the engineers will need to replace the salt water with fresh water and will need a further 165,000 gallons of fresh water to enable the test to continue for four hours.

A diver would be required to go down and take the caps from the diffusers at the end of the pipe, which is in 60 feet of water.

The diver would have to go down again to replace the caps when the test has been completed.

Chalmers reported that the price tag has grown from \$7,000 to \$17,500.

That amount would be reduced by \$1,500 if a local diver volunteered to uncapped and recapped the pipe.

The engineers propose to dam the creek running between the Gulf

station and Sunshine Farm Foods. The dam would create a miniature lake which the engineers could draw on to rid the pipe of salt water and for use in the dye test.

The test is to determine what happens when the fresh water meets and mingles with the salt water. The engineers will take samples of the water at various depths and locations to find out how it mixes together.

The Ganges Citizens' Committee will take the proposal to the Capital Region on April 25 for approval of the additional spending.

The school board was preparing a referendum to ask residents about constructing a new secondary school. The board had an option on property near the Ganges school on which to build the new high school. It would contain nine classrooms and include a gymnasium.

The 1st Ganges Scout troop went to Sooke for the weekend. Leader Vince Knight planned the activities for the 16 Scouts who took part. The young men were required to show ability in such things as following trail signs and identifying trees and shrubs.

Members of the Golf Club on Salt Spring elected a slate of directors for the year. A. Brown, D. Septe, D. Cavaye, E. Richardson and R. Price would direct activities for the club. A new set of membership fees was introduced. Men would pay \$40, women \$25 and social members \$15.

Dan Scoones of Pender Island won the B.C. Junior Chess championship. The 12-year-old won eight games in a tournament held in New Westminster. He told Driftwood that he planned to enter the competition again the following year.

Hunters were out to catch the cougar which roamed the Cranberry area of Salt Spring. The big cat had killed sheep and deer in the area and was believed to be the same animal which had been killing sheep on Galiano Island over the winter.

Roller Skating in Fulford Hall would be run by the Fulford Athletic Club and the Fulford Community Hall group. The Salt Spring Lions Club officially turned over the program to those groups. J. Roland and Mrs. Gyves accepted gold-plated roller skates as a symbol of the change. Jack Tomlinson of the Lions Club had been the driving force behind the project.

Fifteen Years Ago

The ceiling in the foyer of Fulford Hall had been destroyed by youngsters who played hockey in the space. They hit the ceiling tiles with hockey sticks and caused extensive damage.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that nothing much was happening on that island. He had gone to the Women's Club sale only to find that the buns had been sold out and he didn't get any.

An illustrated lecture at the Mayne Island Agricultural Hall entertained residents of that island. Captain Archie Phelps talked about ships which sailed the waters of B.C. during earlier years. Mayne Island would be the location of the middle school for the Outer Gulf Islands, the Gulf Islands School Board decided. The middle school would serve pupils in grades 7, 8 and 9. The school board would seek approval from the ministry of education for the project.

The Lions Club Walkathon on Salt Spring blistered feet and supplied fun. Arthur Buitenwerf ran from Ganges to Fulford in first place. The winning chariot was entered by the Royal Fulford Harbour Gentlemen's Yacht Club. Vern Christensen walked the distance on stilts.

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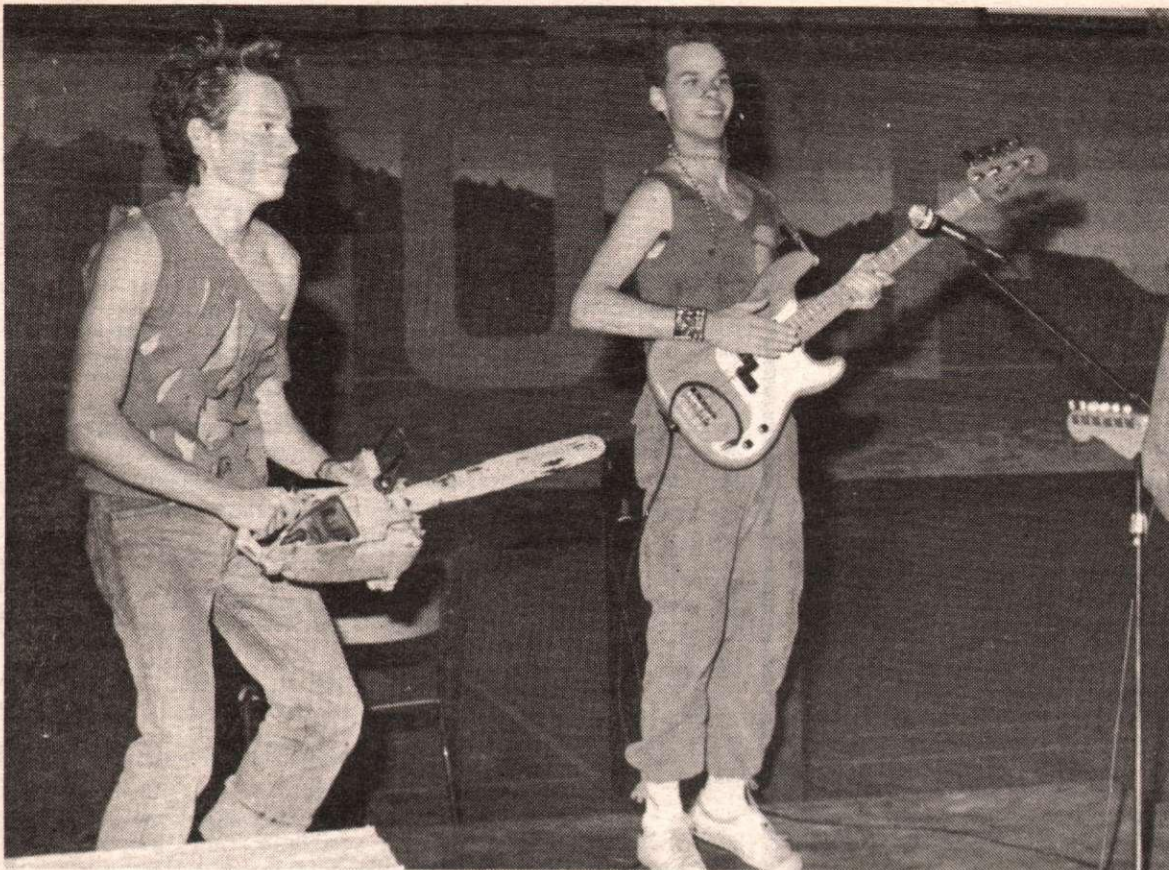

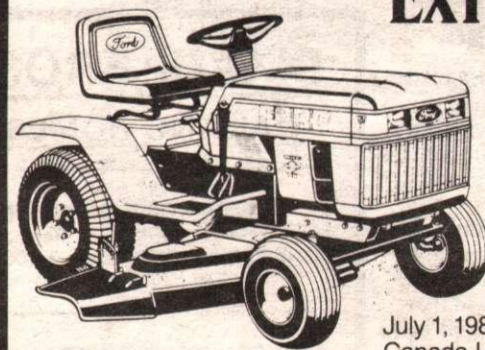
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
