Trustee sworn in

The new school trustee for Pender Island, Joy Ridley, was sworn in as a member of the Gulf Islands School Board by school superintendent Mike Marshall at a recent meeting

on Mayne Island. Ridley won a by-election to fill the vacancy on the school board when former Pender school trustee John Zacharias resigned.

Board wants input

Peace came to the Gulf Islands school board last week but the trustees want to know how the public feels about it before acting.

Gordon Sloan brought a request to the trustees to have peace education included in the curriculum of Gulf Islands schools from kindergarten to Grade 12.

A group of parents were at the meeting to express opposition to the idea.

Sloan explained that a group of people had met six times. The group had been composed of about 30 people including 10 teachers. They saw a need for peace education to answer questions which students had about how to resolve international as well as personal conflicts.

The parents opposed to the proposal called it brainwashing and labelled the name peace education as a smoke screen for the ban-the-bomb movement to get their views across.

Sloan told the trustees that peace is not merely the absence of conflict. The idea was to teach children how to deal with strife. They see it in the school yard when fights start between two children and they see it in the community as well as between

societies.

Peace education would not stress how to limit conflict but how the children could deal with it.

The group wanted a solid body of resource material available in the resource centre so the ideals could be integrated into current courses such as history.

One of the parents opposed to the idea said that the peace education group had originally stemmed from the Salt Spring Elementary School parents' advisory committee (PAC). When they had begun research into peace education, a promise had been made that the group would bring their findings back to the PAC for further discussion.

But, said the parent, the matter had got to the school board before anyone else had a chance to comment on it.

Charles Hingston, Salt Spring trustee and chairman of the school board, said the proposal to teach the children problem solving, life skills and games to stretch the imagination should be part of teaching now.

He thought that peace education at a senior level might be okay if both sides of each issue were part of the discussion.

Salt Spring trustee David Eyles noted that peace is a charged word. As a school board, he said, the trustees could not be involved in teaching political persuasions.

He suggested that the curriculum

Hingston suggested that the trustees deal with the issue by throwing "it back to the public and get more input."

New sewer committee is named by Capital Region

New Ganges sewer committee was appointed on Wednesday by the Capital Regional Board.

Directors heard a plea from the chairman of the now-defunct Citizens' Committee, Arvid Chalmers, to retain his committee until the original terms of reference have been completed.

The board also heard pleas from the chairman, Shirley Wilde, to reserve judgment while the recommendation be examined by committee.

The debate continued for nearly two hours as the long history of the Ganges sewer was reviewed by members of the board.

Chalmers summed up the recent actions of the board when he recalled that four weeks ago the board had resolved to confirm the citizens' committee and two weeks ago had decided to disband it. He asked for a further reconsideration and "an end to misinformation and acrimony".

Two directors questioned the former committee's action in calling a public meeting on Tuesday last week in the name of a committee already disbanded.

SUMMARY

Doug Watts summarized the regional position.

It had been hoped that the citizens' committee could work together to completion, he said. The committee was seeking an alternative system, but there is no alternative.

Few of the remaining committee members were from the sewer area. Dye tests are a waste of money,

said the mayor of Oak Bay. All it needs is to determine that the line is not plugged.

The decision is abrupt, he agreed.

He expressed the hope that the members of the committee seeking alternatives are "man enough and woman enough to realize that the dreams are gone."

Martin Levin called the proposed new committee "self-appointed people".

The vote resulted in five directors opposing the appointment of the new committee. They were John Mika, Rick Kasper, Patricia Massey, Martin Levin and Shirley Wilde.

Committee will be appointed in accordance with a letter received by the board from Ivan Mouat, chairman of the Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital Board.

DISCUSSED SITUATION

The hospital board had discussed the situation with representatives of the Ganges core area and other concerned organizations, wrote Mouat, and decided to ask the regional board that immediate steps be taken to implement a sewer program for Ganges. The board endorsed the decision to disband the citizens' committee and urged that the vacuum created by that action be corrected.

Until the sewer problem is solved the hospital board is unable to bring about an expansion to the premises, said the letter.

Nature of the committee was recommended to include two members of the Ganges Centre

Association, two from the Property Owners and Tenants' Association, and one each from the hospital, Greenwoods, Gulf Islands School District, Senior Citizens' Housing-Pioneer Village, Royal Canadian Legion, S.S.I. Sea Foods, Harbour House Hotel, Valcourt Centre and the regional director.

The churches would also be invited to offer recommendations if they should wish to do so.

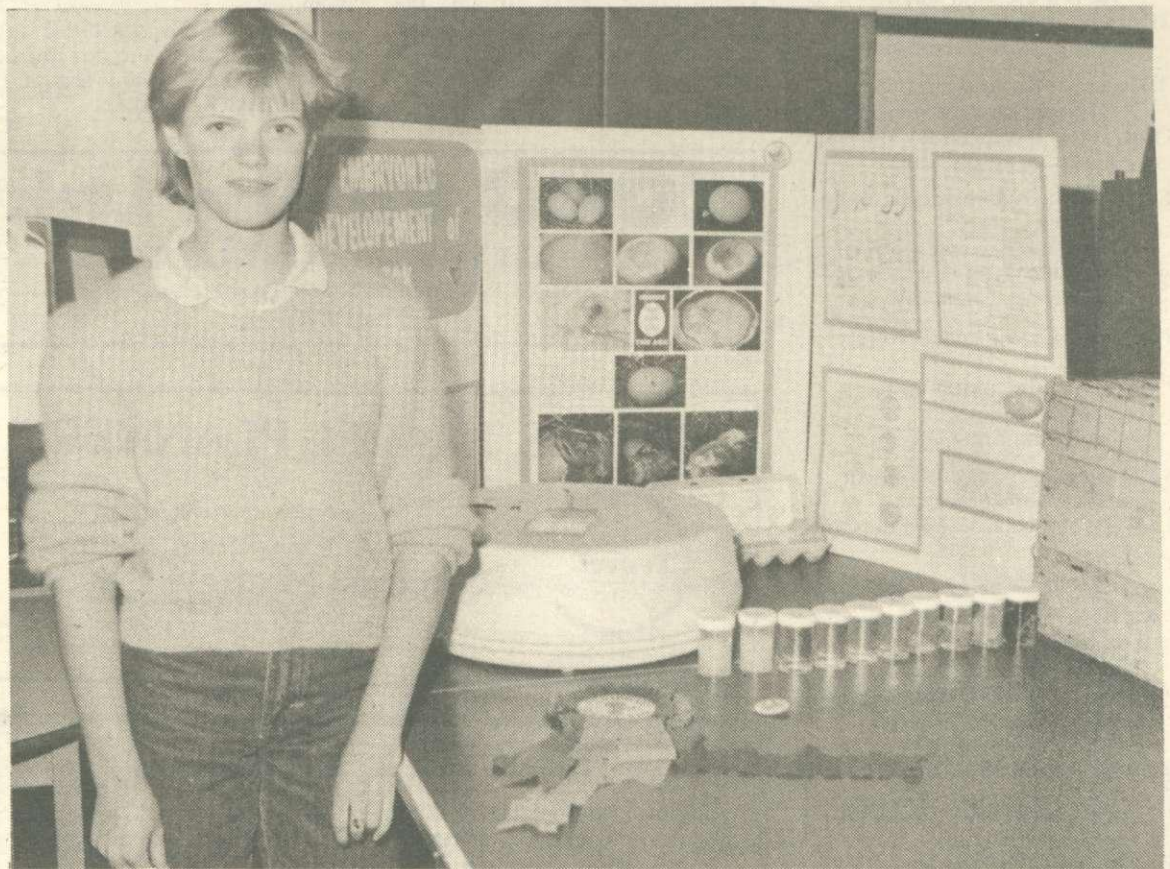
The proposed committee would number 14 members.

When the motion to appoint a new committee was presented to directors it was specifically stated that the hospital board's recommendation would be adopted.

PROPOSED NAME

Mouat proposed that the committee be named the Ganges Sewer Implementation Committee and that it assist the regional board in the testing of the Ganges Harbour outfall, identifying the specified area, arranging and conducting an intensive information process for the whole of Salt Spring Island and taking whatever preliminary action is necessary for the construction of the collecting system and treatment plant.

"We (the group of Ganges people) also believe," wrote the board chairman, "that since this settlement is of common concern and interest to us all and since we represent a broad population base from all parts of Salt Spring we will be in a good position to help seal the rift that has divided our community for too many years."

New graduation requirements proposed

The Class of '87 will need a different set of criteria for high school graduation than is now in place and the changes begin for those students in September.

The minister of education has issued a discussion paper which calls for changes in graduation requirements as well as the structure of secondary education in the province.

Students entering Grade 10 in September will be required to make course selections to qualify for the revised curriculum. By 1987, those students will be the first graduating class to have met the new requirements.

The number of courses required for graduation will be increased. Students will need to enroll in a minimum of 14 courses and must pass 13 of them.

Currently, students require success in 12 courses with no limit on the number attempted.

The new structure creates three streams of study. The arts and science stream should be taken by those students intending to go on to university.

The applied arts and science program would attract those students looking at community colleges. The third stream is labelled Career Preparation and is geared to those who would seek employment after graduation.

While students are expected to choose the preferred stream in Grade 10, the discussion paper notes that careful choices of courses could allow the student to switch streams at a higher grade.

The basic education for all students will consist of two English courses, Social Studies as well as consumer education if it were not taken in Grades 9 and 10. Those courses are currently required of high school grads and will remain as part of the basic curriculum.

Added to the base requirements will be mathematics and science.

Physical education, which is now a requirement for graduation, will be dropped to an elective.

In addition, students will be required to choose three electives from a range of various courses and one program for a major area of study. The student will also require four Grade 12 courses which include prerequisites from Grade 11.

The trustees of the Gulf Islands School Board sent a letter to the minister of education outlining some concerns about the changes.

"The Gulf Islands School Board support the ministry's objective of improving the quality of education in the secondary school system," the letter began.

And then the objections were listed.

The proposed structure would not be flexible in meeting the requirements of individual students. Small school districts, such as the Gulf Islands, would suffer through "an inability to mount sufficient courses."

While the changes mark a thrust towards excellence for students

taking the arts and science stream, the changes could affect "the number and breadth of course offerings in other areas."

Another concern of Gulf Islands trustees focuses on "less academically inclined and special needs students," who may find a successful school experience more difficult.

The trustees also point out that the proposals do not seem to be founded "on any broad base of educational research or philosophical overview."

The minister had called for comments from those involved in the education system and a series of meetings had been held in various locations around the province to hear those comments.

But, noted the Gulf Islands trustees, the "proposed changes are virtually a fait accompli."

The minister's discussion paper stated that the process of change will begin in September.

The Gulf Islands school trustees repeated a call made by the B.C.

School Trustees Association that the minister establish a royal commission "to investigate education in B.C. and recommend changes in the areas of philosophy, goals, curriculum, graduation requirements and teacher training."

The education system was reviewed by the Chant Commission on Education in the 1960's. Changes were made at that time and further changes based on that commission were implemented in 1972. Since then the system has remained the same.

The staff at the Gulf Islands Secondary School looked at the proposed changes and came up with concerns of their own. They submitted a staff response to the ministry outlining those concerns.

Many of the concerns were similar to those held by the school trustees.

The brief to the ministry ended with the comments: "the staff feels that these proposed changes do not create positive changes, do not reflect the interest of all the students, and will do little to solve the problems that the ministry perceives with the current system of graduation."

The position paper from the high school also included a summary of

the results of the 1984 graduates from GISS. In the academic courses, 28 students graduated after completing, on average 14.3 courses each with a grade point average of 3.46.

Of the 28 non-academic graduates, these students completed an average of 13 courses and managed a grade point average of 2.29.

Umpires' clinic June 7

An umpires' clinic open to all interested umpires, softball players and coaches will be held at Ganges Wednesday, June 7.

The clinic will begin with a field session at the Little League diamond followed by a chalk talk session.

Due to the tremendous growth in slowpitch in the past few years, the clinic will take a close look at the differences in the rules as well as the

different techniques used to umpire. An official from district 1 of Softball B.C. will conduct the clinic. A certification test will be available for those interested.

There are currently two certified officials at Salt Spring, Pat Lockert and Jim Walsh. Last year Lockert umpired at the provincial minor championships as well as in the Victoria men's league and in the Salt Spring men's and women's leagues.

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Squadron to offer marine radio course

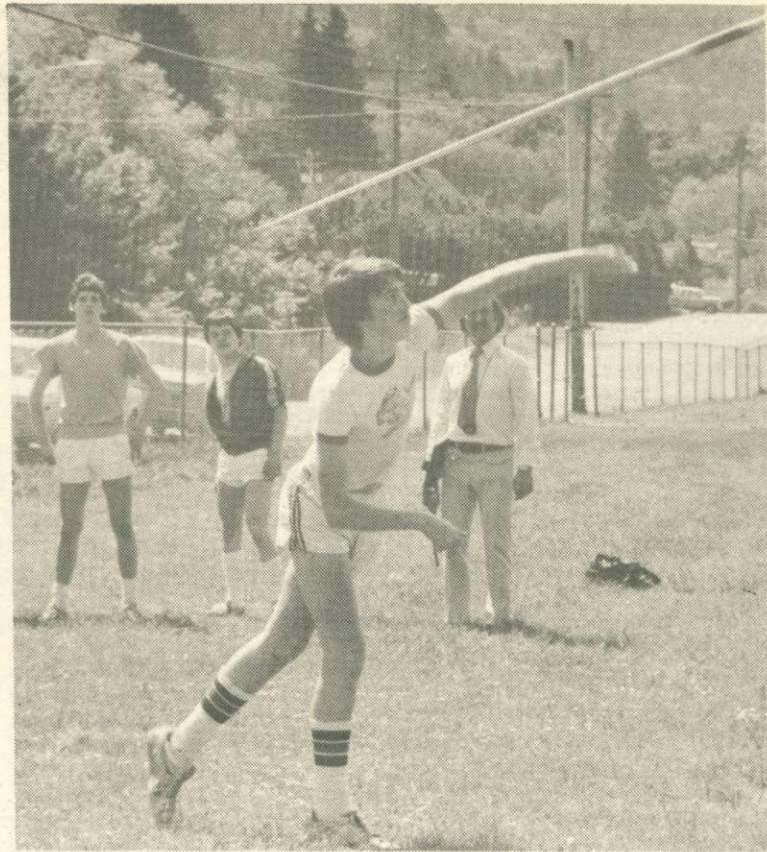
A course in marine radio operation, sponsored by the Salt Spring Island Power Squadron, will be conducted at the Ganges high school under the continuing education program.

The course will consist of two two-hour sessions on June 5 and 12. The instructor will be Don Clarkson, recently retired commander of the Salt Spring Power Squadron. The course is open to the general public as well as members of the power squadron and will be limited to 25 applicants.

Examinations following the completion of the course will be conducted by examiners from the

federal department of communications, from Victoria, and successful candidates will qualify for a marine radio operator's licence issued by the department. The examination will be at 7:30, June 14, at the school.

Applications for the course should be made through the continuing education office in Mouat's Mall. There is a fee of \$5 per applicant.

Inspecting officer was Major-General G. Edwards.

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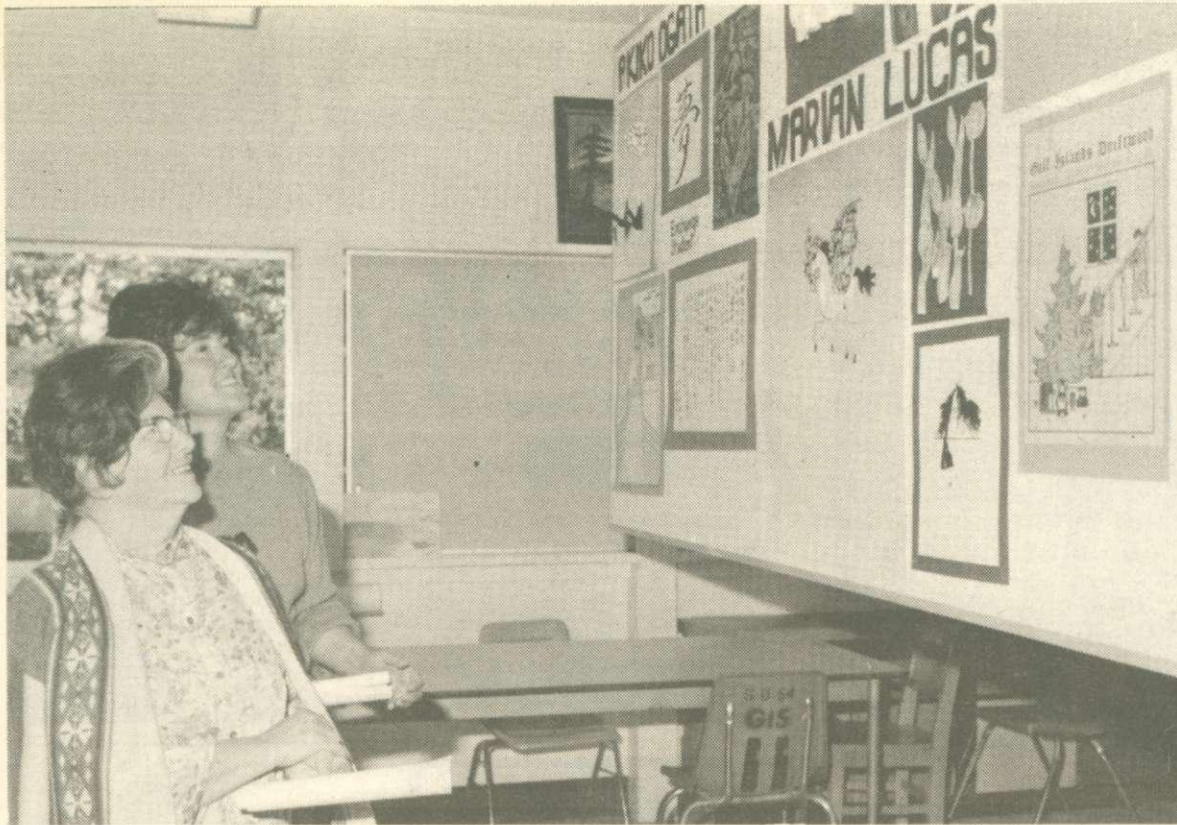


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Open house at high school

In general terms the intent of the following proposed By-laws is to amend By-law No. 14, cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978", as described below:

1. Proposed By-law No. 102, cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978, Amendment By-law No. 7, 1984."
 - (a) adds "professional and business offices including medical clinics" as permitted uses in the Commercial 3 Zone (C3);
 - (b) changes the zoning classification of part of Lot 1, D.L. 318, and Section 1, R4E, North Salt Spring Island, Plan 39259 from the Industrial 1 Zone (I1), to the Commercial 3 Zone (C3) as shown on a plan attached to the By-law. The affected land is in Ganges near the junction of Fulford-Ganges Road and Lower Ganges Road.
2. Proposed By-law No. 105, cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978, Amendment By-law No. 10, 1984"
 - (a) adds a new zoning classification "Public Institutional Zone (PI)" which allows for land uses such as schools, hospitals, community halls, libraries, churches;
 - (b) establishes regulations for site coverage, building height, building setbacks and parking requirements;
 - (c) changes the zoning classification of (DD H36292) Section 1, Range 3 East, North Salt Spring Island, Plan 16327, from the Residential 1 Zone (R1) to the Public Institutional Zone (PI). The affected land is in Ganges on McPhillips Avenue.
3. Proposed By-law No. 106, cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978, Amendment By-law No. 11, 1984"
 - (a) changes the zoning classification of Lot 3 of Block 'B', Plan 1371, Section 1, R3E and R4E, North Salt Spring Island from the Residential 1 Zone (R1) to the Commercial 1 Zone (C1). The affected land is in Ganges on Hereford Avenue.
4. Proposed By-law No. 107 cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978, Amendment By-law No. 12, 1984"
 - (a) changes the zoning classification of part of Lot 1, Plan 40786, Section 3, Range 3 East, North Salt Spring Island from the Agriculture 1 Zone (A1) to the Residential 1 Zone (R1) and from the Multiple Family Zone (MF) to the Residential 1 Zone (R1) as shown on a plan attached to the By-law. The affected land is in the Ganges area and adjoins the proposed Senior Citizen housing development at the end of Corbett Road.

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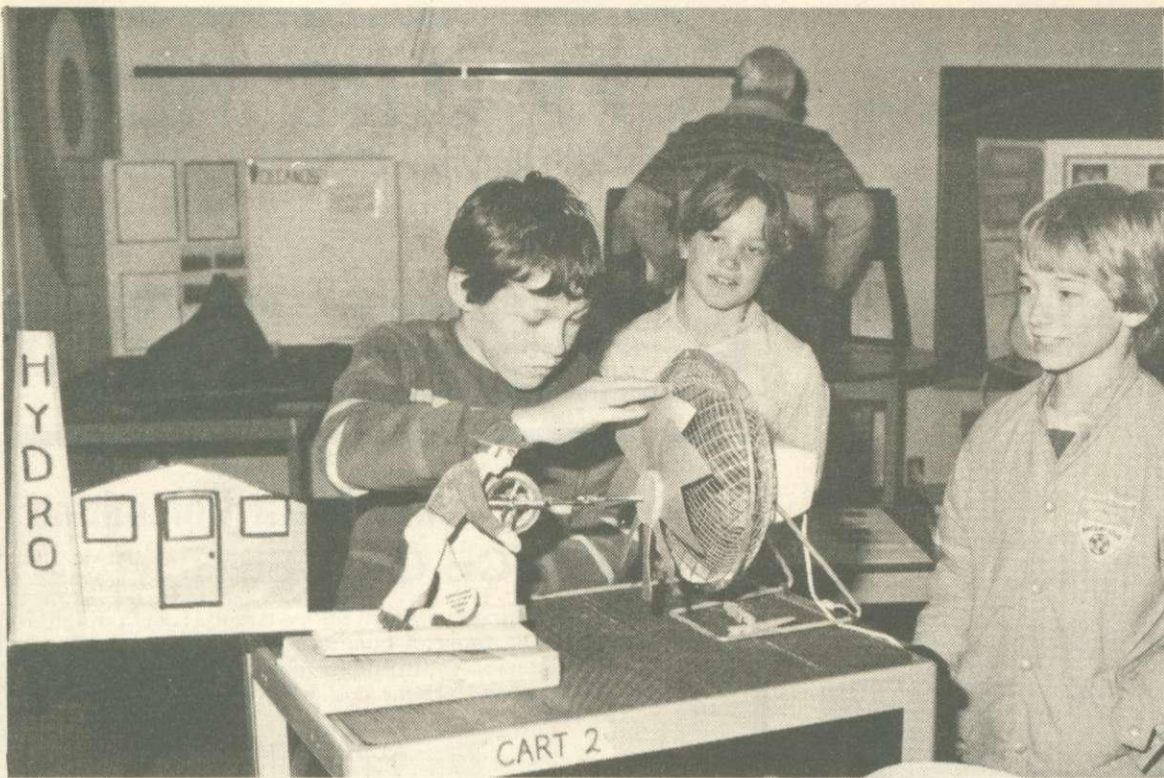

House nearly full for coffee house Friday

Broom and fern decorated the tables and the kitchen staff dispensed coffee and home baked gateaux to a nearly full house at the South Community Hall on Friday evening. The coffee house provided a fascinating sociogram of Galiano society and an interesting facet of island history.

The crowd was predominantly "middle-age"; the hippy generation squared-off, property owning and family oriented. A few old codgers such as the M&B protection officer and a *Driftwood* columnist could smile indulgently as they looked around at the representatives of the counter-culture of the late 60's and early 70's.

For these, the survivors of the beatnik era, the evening was a nostalgic trip, the mood conjured up by the atmosphere of casual conviviality and an opening set by a local group, the South Galiano Elastic Band, who resurrected the Mommas and Poppas.

Keith Holmes and Vaughan Cowley on guitar joined in the vocals with the trio of Johanna Newmoon, Akasha Forest and Susan Friend. The effect was admirable, with the original mockery of coffee-house style reproduced with skill and verve. The highlight was Johanna's performance of *I Call Your Name*, delivered with her usual comic flair.

David Petersen of Bamboo Cottage, Porlier Pass Road, followed with a biting satirical monologue of his own composition, full of mordant humour. The analogy of clowns in a burning big-top with the catastrophe currently threatening mankind was all too obvious. One could have wished to hear more from this talented actor.

The entertainment concluded with the duo of Louise Escallier and Caroline Rine of Salt Spring. Louise and Caroline compose their own music, write the lyrics, sing the vocals and accompany themselves on guitar. Their voices and playing blend well with commendable balance, but their lyrics contrast in an interesting way.

Louise favours songs of protest in which the folk music of North America is so rich. Her themes were conservation, labour solidarity and the nuclear threat. Caroline's songs put more emphasis on interpersonal relationships. These were two of the topics that dominated the California coffee-house culture of 10 to 20 years ago.

Several of the lyrics deserved further study as it is hard to comprehend their message at one hearing, especially when there is a relatively high level of juvenile background noise. The melodies attracted attention by their audacity with some unusual intervals and dissonant chords. A pleasing performance.

Piano recital

A very different musical experience was provided at La Berengerie Restaurant on Sunday evening when Chris Kodaly gave a recital of classical piano music. A student of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, Chris now resides on Mayne Island where, among other activities, he teaches piano.

With his name and Hungarian ancestry Chris was probably born with a talent for music, but this has been carefully honed and heightened.

The audience was treated to a full evening of delightful playing centuries. His program was an attractive blend of the familiar with less well known pieces.

Beginning with three Bach preludes, two-part inventions, and

one of the Goldberg variations, Chris proceeded chronologically through a Schubert impromptu, a Chopin nocturne, to turn-of-the-century French with three Gymnopedies by Eric Satie and two arabesques by Debussy. The one complete work played was Beethoven's *Sonata Pathetique* with a particularly well played third movement, the *Rondo: Allegro*.

The final group of selections included three Knossienne Dances by the French Eric Satie, as well as *Pavane* of Maurice Ravel and *Clair de Lune* by Claude Debussy, his contemporaries in the school of French music.

The atmosphere was conducive to attentive listening with an enthralled audience and good acoustics. If further recitals are contemplated the piano might be a little better tempered, but all in all there was extraordinary value for money in this experimental first recital at this location.

A performance by a flautist from the Vancouver Symphony is planned for June 10, details to be announced later.

Weavers and spinners

On May 20 four members of the Galiano Weavers Guild, Helen Reynolds, Fern Stewart, Ena Hooley and Phyl Stafford, travelled to the University of Victoria to view the 50th anniversary show of the Victoria Weavers Guild.

The juried exhibits, comprised of the best entries, included a wide variety of the weavers' artistry—Satin damask table linen, featherweight woollen stoles, tapestry wall hangings, rya rugs, pineneedle baskets and well-designed clothing.

Among the demonstrations at the commercial exhibit were: Chris Howland weaving woollen suiting fabric on his "flying shuttle", a large four-harness loom designed to allow high-speed weaving with four shuttles; other guild members weaving miniature wicker furniture; making exquisite edgings of bobbin lace; and spinning cotton on the old-fashioned "walking wheel".

While answering many questions from the rapt audience around her, one young weaver worked on a handsome Chilcat ceremonial blanket, similar to those her family must have treasured in past generations.

The Galiano group arrived home with many new ideas for future projects.

Allen Clarke

The death of Allen J. Clarke in Victoria on May 18 was noted with regret by many friends on Galiano Island.

During their residence of approximately 10 years in this

community, Allen and Vivienne Clarke's leadership qualities were evident and appreciated in various aspects of our rural life. The Clarkes purchased the Galiano Lodge in 1962, and made it a focal point of service and entertainment in the village and for island residents generally.

Their dining room featured smorgasbord lunches and dinners, very artistically presented. With the Clarke's considerable background in little theatre, this expertise was evident in the song and dance performances often rendered by the costumed dining room staff, along with dinner.

Their staff was made up almost entirely of local teenagers. The thorough apprenticeship training given these young people by the Clarkes, in the various aspects of serving the public, was an invaluable contribution to their education, and provided considerable local employment. Their ability to spark a direct ambition in these young people deserved much credit.

Of great enjoyment to children and adults alike were the puppet shows frequently put on by the Clarkes. A great deal of time and talent goes into producing such shows, and their generosity in this respect was evidenced by the large crowds they attracted.

After retiring from the Lodge operation, the Clarkes remained on Galiano for several years. During this time they travelled to many parts of the world in their connection with CESO, an organization designed to recruit retired business people to work on assignments from two to six months in developing countries.

CESO objectives are primarily to help Canada maintain a reputation as a good neighbour. Allen Clarke is remembered on Galiano as a "good neighbour".

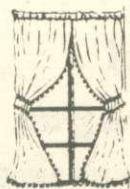

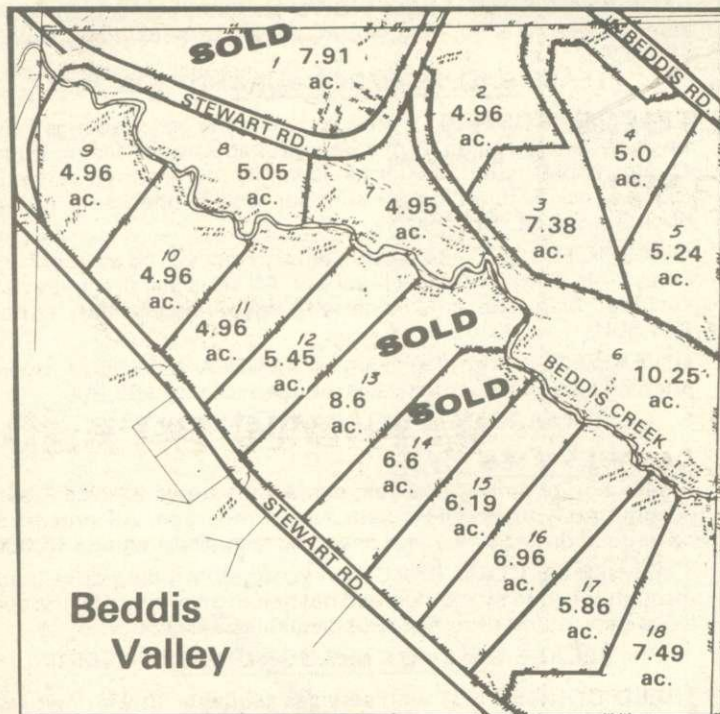

Lack of room on the water taxi may prohibit Grade 8 students from Pender Island from attending high school on Salt Spring in September.

Parents of the current Grade 7 students had asked the Gulf Islands School Board to make arrangements for the children to attend school on Salt Spring if daily water taxi service were available.

Mike Marshall, superintendent of schools, told the trustees last week he would encourage the move if space could be found on the water taxi. The school board had contracted for daily service to and from Salt Spring for Outer Island high school students.

But, pointed out Mayne Island school trustee Jeannine Dodds, arrangements had been made for only 17 places on the water taxi for Pender students. The efforts are aimed at bringing students in Grades 9 10 12, she said, and if there is room then the Grade 8 students could come.

Joy Ridley, school trustee for Pender Island, told the other trustees that maybe wasn't good enough.

"I'd like to go back to the parents with more than just maybe or if," she said.

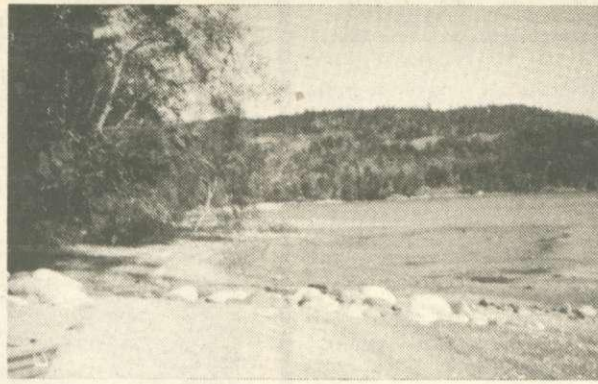
But the trustees decided not to make a decision and will wait until they know the number of students who will be using the daily water taxi before saying yes or no.

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Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

The board of management of Lady Minto Hospital selected officers for the coming year. M. Atkins would be president and D. Cavaye would be vice-president. Mrs. G.A. Scott of Pender Island was the retiring president. Another annual meeting would be held on Pender to fill a vacancy for that island on the board.

Swallows, hundreds of them, were nesting in the eaves of the Salt Spring school. Jack McColl and Charles Archer tried various chemical preparations including dog repellent but were waging a losing battle.

A water line extension to the Hundred Hills subdivision on Ganges Hill had been authorized by the North Salt Spring Water District board of directors. The extension would be paid for by property owners in the subdivision and the revenue potential was approximately \$12,000 per year.

The team of the Salt Spring Rod and Gun Club received the trophy for the inter-island trap shoot from Fred Robson of the Galiano club. Ken Stevens accepted the trophy for his teammates, Gordon Scarff, Capt. W. Cogswell, Joe Poirier and Albert Kaye. The event took place at a dinner-dance held at the Salt Spring club.

The Salties went to Duncan to play a double-header. The Salt Spring team won the first game 5-4 but lost the second 9-7. Their next game would be against Victoria at the Fulford field on the weekend.

HMS Ganges Chapter IODE would be holding a tea in early June to raise money for a scholarship for a graduating high school student. Mrs. F.K. Parker would make the arrangements while Mrs. Laurie Mouat would be tea convener.

A request for a tennis court at the facilities of Salt Spring Recreational Holdings at Central had been made. The board of directors was not sure how to take care of the request. The group concentrated their efforts on Golf Club activities and felt that they had no obligation to supply other facilities. The meeting also heard a report from Mac Mouat that the new clubhouse had a construction budget of \$16,000, of which \$11,000 had been raised by subscription.

Fifteen Years Ago

The no-smoking ban for students at Gulf Islands schools would continue, trustees of the school board decided. The high school students council had requested changes in the ban which prohibited smoking by students from the time they left home in the morning until they arrived home after school. A student could be expelled from school for breaking the rule.

The Mayne Island volunteer fire department selected a new fire chief. Bob Sauerberg would take over from George Douglas who would remain as assistant fire chief. The meeting was held in the garage where equipment was stored. The new fire hall was nearing

completion and the official opening would occur soon.

Papajohn did not report from Saturna. He was away and Louisa Money sent in the report. The Community Club would begin much needed repairs to the hall. A request would be put to the department of highways to restore the "missing link." That was the stretch of blacktop from the ferry wharf to the top of the hill.

Capt. L.D.B. Drummond of Fulford had donated land on the shore of Fulford Harbour for use as a children's park. The Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce announced the gift at a meeting where Capt. Drummond was named citizen of the year.

Donations to the May Queen fund stood at \$593.41, reported the Fulford Hall Committee. Kit Moulton offered thanks to the many individuals and businesses which had made the event successful.

The show of arts and crafts drew people to the Pender Island Golf Club. Professor Glyde had encouraged art club members to allow people to view their work.

Kanaka Road should be closed, said members of the Gulf Islands School Board. P.A. Frattinger urged that a check of the road use be made to gather information to go with the request to the department of highways. Closing the road had been the subject of debate by the school board several years previously.

Ten Years Ago

The Islands Trust Act was explained to a meeting on Salt Spring. Municipal Affairs Minister James Lorimer was booed as he tried to interpret the act for the meeting. He did not know that the island had an official community plan but said that he felt competent to deal with islands he did not know.

The Pollution Control Board approved an application by the Capital Region to discharge treated effluent into Ganges Harbour. The discharge would be closely monitored and approval of the people affected would be required before the plan could proceed.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that he sat in his car and watched members of the Lions Club fix up the school grounds for the Outer Islands schools sports day. They worked hard, he reported, but the sports event had to be called off because of rain.

HMS Ganges Chapter IODE awarded scholarships to students at the Salt Spring school. Brenda Mouat and Sandy Wright won scholarships for music while Linda Lane won the art scholarship. An award for interpretative dancing for girls under 11 years was given to Glenda Woodley. Mrs. K. Parker and Mrs. L. Sayer made the presentations.

The Beaver Point Hall bean supper was coming up. The beans were ready and pies were being baked. The event, to raise money to

support the hall, was slated for Saturday evening.

The North Galiano firefighters would put on a demonstration of their ability. All the firefighting equipment would be put on display at the fire hall.

Maintenance of Centennial Park in Ganges cost \$2,104.93, a meeting of the Salt Spring Centennial Society heard. Government funding totalled \$1,500 and the remainder had been covered by the society. Col. Peter Bingham would be president of the group for the third term.

The B.C. Historical Association presented Donald New of Galiano with a life membership for his many years of active participation in the association. New was a past-president of the group.

Five Years Ago

The recreation centre being planned by the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission could become very large to accommodate all the groups which wanted to take part, said Dr. Hugh Borsman. Space requirements could total 55,000 square feet, he said. The centre was planned for 7,000 square feet with a cost of \$270,000.

Greenwoods, the new intermediate and personal care facility for seniors on Salt Spring, would be opened by Lieutenant-Governor Henry Bell-Irving. Following the public ceremonies, guided tours of the establishment would be carried out.

The marina at Boot Cove on Saturna Island received tentative approval from the Islands Trust. There would be moorage facilities for a dozen boats but no sale of petroleum products. Opposition came from off-islanders who owned property on Saturna while residents of the island generally supported the idea.

The garden club on Mayne Island would be holding a garden party at the home of John and Kathleen Dought. Members were reminded to bring their own chairs and cutlery. Jack and Dorothy James of Salt Spring would be special guests to answer questions about gardening.

Lady Minto Hospital Society granted life membership to three members for their contributions to islands hospital services. Barbara Hastings had been president of the society when the new Lady Minto moved from Ganges Hill to the current location. Douglas Cavaye and Joan Purchase were also honoured for their work with the society.

The building fund for the Salt Spring Island library stood at \$50,300. The Ladies' Auxiliary of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 92 had donated \$500 to the fund, \$37,000 came from the provincial lottery fund and the remainder had been donated by islanders.

Operation Dismantle meets at Pender

Operation Dismantle at Pender Island held a meeting recently, which was attended by about 75 people.

They were welcomed by Victoria Gillespie who told the audience the aim of Operation Dismantle is for a bilateral verifiable nuclear freeze.

She said there are two things individuals can do to help: become informed and inform their neighbours as to the facts and to endorse the peace petition.

Volunteers from the Pender organization will be calling on islanders' homes asking for signatures on a petition to be presented to every member of Parliament via a people's caravan leaving from Vancouver and Halifax, reaching Ottawa in the early fall.

The petition asks that Ottawa stop testing the U.S. cruise missile in Canada, declare Canada a nuclear

weapons-free zone, divert spending on the arms race to fund human needs and that members of Parliament be allowed a "free vote" on the issues.

"We have a long battle to fight," said Gillespie, "and it's time people stood up and said enough is enough."

Frank Jones introduced Bob Bossin, song writer, singer and instrumentalist, who last year played and sang to 26 full houses in the Soviet Union. The meeting also heard from Dr. Cheryl Levitt and her husband Andrew Orkin, who told of their trip to the Soviet Union in July 1983. Dr. Levitt is a member of Physicians for Social Responsibility in Canada.
