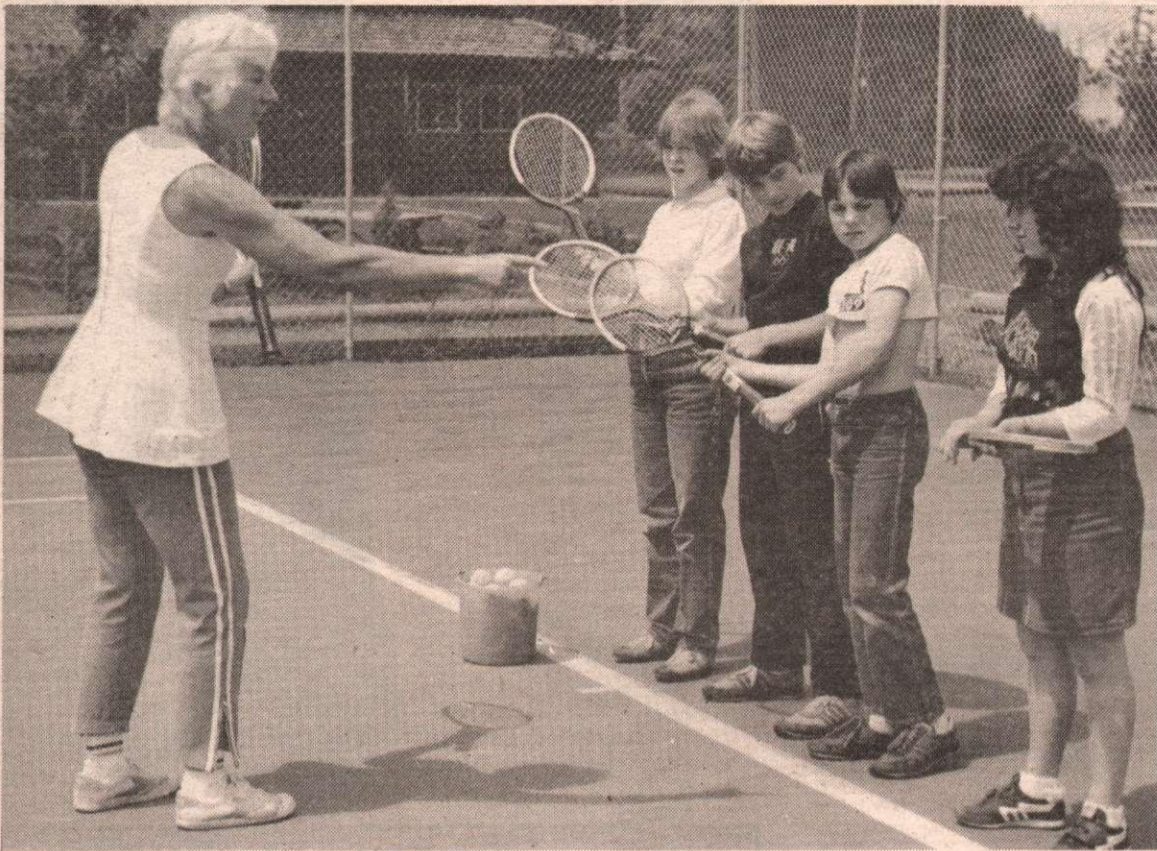

Committee 'pointless', says former trustee

To sit or not to sit; that is the question facing the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee.

David Lott, a former trustee, sent a letter to the committee urging that no representative be sent to the new 15-member sewer implementation committee.

He termed the new committee as "pointless" and said the Trust Committee should make it plain that the proposed committee does not represent the island in the sewer matter.

Bev Unger had represented the Islands Trust on the now-defunct Ganges Citizens' Committee.

Mike Humphries, Islands Trust chairman, said he has not yet

received notification of the new committee "so there is no point in talking about it," he added.

Hugh Borsman, Capital Region director for Salt Spring, told *Driftwood* last week that Bernard Doughton, CRD executive director, would be sending a letter to the Islands Trust inviting representation on the committee.

Trustee Nick Gilbert suggested that the Trust should send a representative but only as an observer. Sewage disposal is a problem of the CRD but the Islands Trust representative should attend the meetings to remind members of the limits of the official community plan.

New zone will permit Ganges library expansion

The way was cleared for expansion of the Salt Spring library last week when the Islands Trust Committee changed the zoning of the McPhillips Avenue property.

The property had been zoned as residential but the Trust, at the request of the library, created a new zone to be called Public Institutional Zone.

Under the residential zoning, the library could have expanded to one-third site coverage. The board of directors of the library, taking into consideration the growth patterns of both the island and the library, came to the conclusion that the site coverage would not allow for the required expansion.

Under the new zoning, the library can expand to fill three-quarters of the lot.

Ron McQuiggan, representing the library board at Wednesday's public hearing, explained the problem.

He said the library has grown 14% in the past five years. Circulation of books has increased 75% and the library has 32% more books than five years ago.

The island, he pointed out, grows at a yearly rate of three to four percent which means that the projected population of 15,000 will be reached in about 20 years.

The new Public Institutional Zone permits, in addition to libraries, schools, hospitals, community halls and churches.

The parking requirement will be one parking space for every 37 square metres (400 square feet) plus one space for every 10 seating places.

The bylaw creating the new zone was given third reading by the committee and now goes to the minister of municipal affairs for approval before going into effect.

Trust will issue permit

The building was painted and the signs put up before the development permit was applied for and the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee doesn't like it.

Trustee John Rich suggested that the owner be informed that the committee will permit two signs and allow them to be larger in area than the 39.8 square feet permitted under the bylaw.

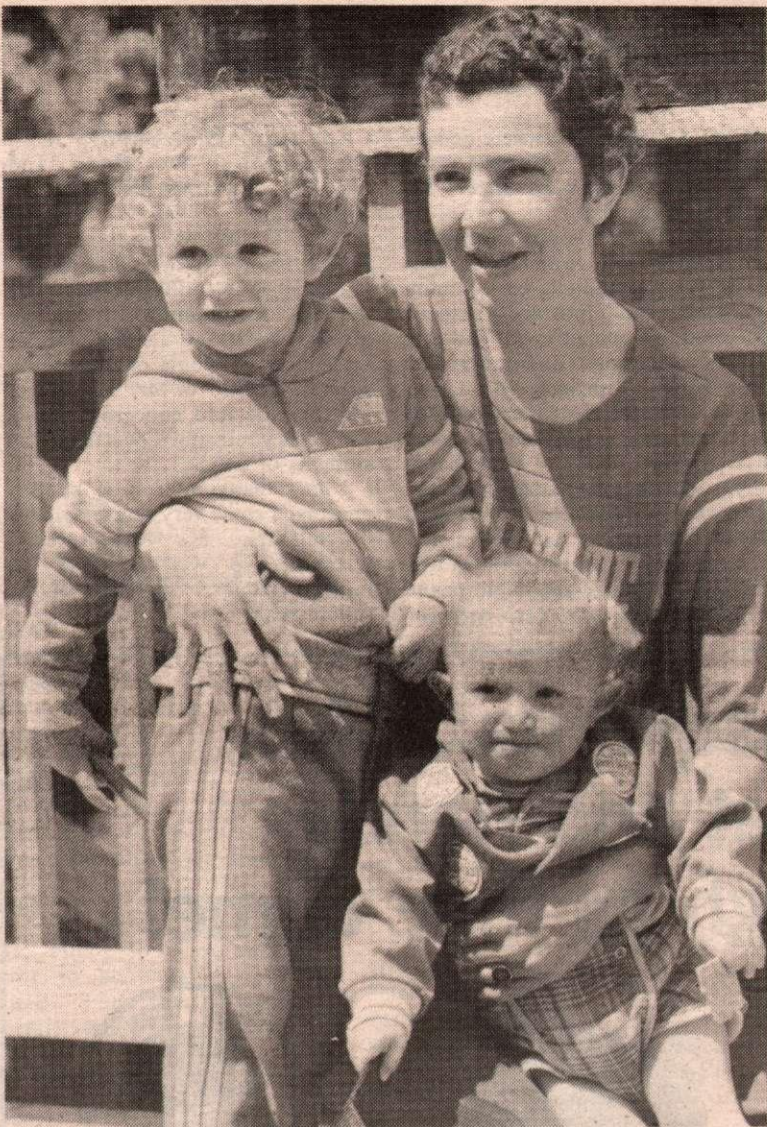

Family reunited after mom's fight with cancer

The Pawlowski family at Salt Spring Island gathered recently to celebrate the birthday of Jules and Noah who were born on the same day. Three-year-old Noah and his one-year-old brother Jules were both born on May 26.

But the Pawlowski family has something else to celebrate as well. The two youngsters had been separated for six months and this was a reunion. The story is of their mother Jan who has been battling cancer for four years. After contracting the disease in 1980, Jan and her husband Nick were told they were unlikely to have any children. It was a big disappointment for the family.

After treatment for breast cancer, Jan recovered and later that year she discovered that she was pregnant with their first son Noah, who was born on May 26, 1981. Then, just over a year later, Jan became pregnant for the second time. This time, however, the doctor discovered that Jan's cancer had recurred and spread to the ribs and he advised her not to continue the

pregnancy because she needed immediate treatment.

Jan and Nick decided to hold off with the treatment until Jules was born on May 26, 1983. By this time she was quite ill and had to undergo chemotherapy and cobalt treatment. Nick, who works for Via Rail, was away due to shift work and it was family and friends who helped out when he could not be home.

Finally, Jan and Nick had to send baby Jules to Ohio to stay with his grandparents while Jan finished treatment and began to recover from the effects.

Now, after a six-month separation, Jules is home, her family is complete and there is a lot for her to celebrate. This fall Jan will be giving a course through the continuing education department, entitled *Living With Cancer* and she hopes to establish a breast examination clinic.

She is sure her successful battle is due to early detection of the disease and wants all women to understand the necessity and the procedure for regular self-examinations.

Needs of senior citizens should not be held to ransom

This shop is manned by volunteers and sells recycled objects. The money is used to help the hospital. The people who run the shop feel, quite rightly, that the provincial government is already being hard enough on hospitals and this only adds insult to injury.

As always, I was impressed by the strong community spirit and political awareness on Salt Spring

Island and the determination to tackle problems with vigor.

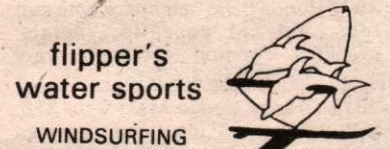

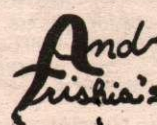

George Pearkes devoted life to public service

A great British Columbian has died.

Soldier in two wars, winner of the Victoria Cross, member of parliament for 15 years, minister of national defence and for two terms, lieutenant-governor of British Columbia, George Randolph Pearkes died two weeks ago in Victoria.

He had devoted most of his 96 years to public service from the trenches to the benches.

For 15 years Major-General Pearkes was the member for Nanaimo and for Esquimalt-Saanich. He was a byword in politics. For as long as he wanted the seat it was his.

Pearkes came to Canada from his native Watford, in England, and homesteaded in Alberta 78 years ago. From Rocky Mountain House he joined the Northwest Mounted Police and was stationed in the north as a constable. He was there in that rank when war broke out in 1914. Denied a transfer to the armed forces, he quit the police and enlisted with the cavalry.

In 1917, near Passendale, in Belgium, an enemy machine gun post was tearing into the Allied units. The young officer was

wounded but determined. He led his troop across the open ground and took the post in face of heavy odds and every kind of enemy fire. He was awarded the Victoria Cross for his action.

Wounded five times during the war, he remained with the regular army after 1918, undertaking a wide range of duties before 1939.

He commanded the First Division of the Western Canada Infantry Brigade in Europe at the outbreak of war and then Pacific Command.

In 1945 he resigned from the forces and was elected to the House of Commons from Nanaimo. He held the seat for eight years and then successfully contested the Esquimalt-Saanich seat. While sitting as the Esquimalt-Saanich member he was named minister of national defence in the Diefenbaker government.

Pearkes left the political scene in 1960 when he was named lieutenant-governor of British Columbia, an office he held for two terms.

Gen. Pearkes and Mrs. Pearkes brought a happy informality to Government House in those areas where the informality could be accommodated. He opened up the official residence and enjoyed the

crowds of British Columbians, and others, who visited his official home.

While future years will bring more and more reminiscences of the Pearkes term at Government House one anecdote is typical.

Evening strollers stood at Government House gardens and watched the gardener trimming his roses. He looked up and fell into conversation. The apples looked attractive, said one of the visitors. He was invited to help himself.

The tourist was embarrassed. Was the gardener sure he wouldn't get into trouble.

"Oh, no!" said General Pearkes. "I live here!"

After a lifetime of military, Pearkes never neglected a veteran. When he was campaigning he could

address hundreds of his fellow veterans by name and an ex-serviceman with any kind of problem was assured of a sympathetic hearing and active help.

Regulations governing signs may be changed in bylaw

Signs signal services but too many is too much, and while the Islands Trust is taking steps to limit one type, they are also taking steps to introduce a second type of sign.

Concerns of the members of Salt Spring Island Trust Committee centre on the provisions of the zoning bylaw involving signs. Under the current provisions, two signs are permitted per use on any particular property.

The change anticipated is to reword the bylaw to read two signs per property.

The current rules for signs also limit the total size for directly illuminated signs to 1.8 square metres (19.4 sq. ft.). For non-illuminated signs, the combined total cannot exceed 3.7 sq. m (39.8 sq. ft.).

Those sizes affect signs in all commercial, industrial, water and comprehensive development zones.

For all other zones, the limit is one sign per use with a total area

limit of 1 sq. m (10.7 sq. ft.).

The bylaw also adds another restriction: "No animated or flashing sign shall be permitted in any zone."

If a business closes, any signs informing people about that concern must be removed within 30 days of close of business.

The bylaw, however, does not apply to signs required for public safety or tourist information signs put up by the department of highways.

The new type of sign being considered by the Trust Committee involves information signs for development projects or rezoning applications.

Other areas of the Capital Region are required to post such signs after a bylaw amendment has been authorized and at least two weeks before any public hearing on the matter.

The sign should give information,

about what is involved in the rezoning or what would be built on the particular piece of land.

A staff report on the subject indicated that such information signs are not required by law but are a policy of the CRD. If introduced for Salt Spring, the information signs would only be needed for major developments or rezoning changes.

Staff was instructed to prepare a policy statement for consideration at a future meeting of the committee.

'Recreational playground' turned down by Trust

An application for use of agricultural land at Fernwood as a "recreational playground" was turned down by the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee last week.

Harold Sampson of Victoria had applied for permission to use the land for the recreational playground. The idea was to stage survival or war games on weekends.

"It's interesting that they call it a recreational playground," commented Trust chairman Mike

Humphries.

The 50 acres is zoned agricultural and recreation is not a permitted use.

The land would have to be rezoned to allow the weekend survival games. But the Salt Spring Advisory Planning Commission had written to Sampson to tell him that his application had been turned down. He was also notified that the APC "would not support an application to change zoning regulations to permit your proposal to proceed."

The survival games, noted Sampson on his application, were to be "financed by the ministry of labour to encourage student employment and tourism on Salt Spring Island."

Humphries wondered if a psychological study of participants in war games would show an increase or decrease in anxieties and aggression.

"It depends on whether you won," replied John Rich, Trust vice-chairman.

Well must be drilled to serve locally funded Boys' Town

As most readers know, this year's World Development Tea raised about \$2,800 of which \$2,500 was passed to the Save the Children Fund to be used to help people, mostly children, who have contracted tuberculosis. Last year, the money that was taken in was devoted to preventing and curing blindness in a district in India.

This is a brief report of the use to which 1982's proceeds from the tea were put. The entire sum that was raised, together with money collected by the Anglican parish, a large amount donated by Rotarians, and a grant from CIDA went to start a new Boys' Town in Sri Lanka.

This Boys' Town, which is near the village of Matali in Sri Lanka, is supervised and helped by the Rotarians there. They have procured a long lease on a piece of property suitable for farming; repaired the buildings that were on the property; chosen a director; and accepted the first of the students.

Only boys in desperate need are considered, and only ones who seem to be willing to work hard and appear to be capable of being trained. They learn farming, carpentry and other occupations which are suitable to the area and which will enable them to earn a living in their own neighbourhood without requiring expensive equipment or encouraging a way of life that is not suitable to their environment.

To a considerable extent, this project is succeeding. Boys have been chosen and taken in to the school, a few at a time, with an expected maximum at the end of this June of 25. This is not the

enrolment that was expected nor that was hoped for.

There have been problems that have delayed the carrying out of plans. The most serious of these problems has been drought. At present, water for drinking and cooking comes from a shallow community well and must be transported about two miles. This water is not used for bathing or for washing clothes.

The local Rotarians have been working on the problem of procuring a dependable supply of water and have reluctantly come to the conclusion that drilling a well is the only way. (Cost is about \$16,000.) They have decided on the company to be employed to drill the well, and are hopeful that the Boys' Town will this summer have its own supply of water for drinking, cleanliness and farm use. Once there is a satisfactory water supply, the number of boys can be increased.

Natives of Sri Lanka have a great respect for pure water. If they find that they have any water to spare, the members of Boys' Town will share it with their neighbours.

The boys lead a busy life. Up at 5:30, they are divided into three groups that rotate tasks. One group helps prepare food; the second sweeps and cleans; and the last works in the garden that is nearest to the living quarters. One by one, the boys leave their assigned tasks for "Ablutions."

After a few minutes for individual prayer, three-quarters of an hour for breakfast and dressing for school, the boys set out to walk. Apparently there is a bus that travels in the right direction, but the boys are not permitted to use this, for buses are a luxury that would not fit into the life that they will lead after their training is completed. Also, there is

no money in Boys' Town for luxuries.

After a walk of half or three-quarters of an hour, the pupils arrive at school where students are their own janitors and spend the first 15 minutes cleaning the premises. The next four hours are filled with the normal studies that all boys pursue.

There seems to be no recess and no lunch break. The boys walk back to their town where they spend the next 45 minutes having tea and relaxing. After that there is an hour's work on the farm and then an hour of sport. This time of physical exertion is followed by tea, a short rest, 45 minutes studying English, an hour and a quarter spent doing homework, and then dinner—at 8:15. Lights out comes at 9:30. The time between dinner and lights out allows for games and relaxation.

The work in the garden and on the farm is practical in two ways: the boys learn farming which may provide for their adult livelihood; it also produces all the vegetables for their own use. At present farm products consist only of vegetables for use and coconuts for sale. Bananas have been planted but are

not yet in production. Mushrooms are being studied as a possible future cash crop but no start on growing them has been made to date.

In the near future, under the direction of the Rotarians, a workshop where the boys may develop their skill in carpentry will be built and a fence will be put up to keep produce from being stolen.

Both projects should give the boys practical experience.

Once there is enough water, the sale of coconuts, bananas, vegetables and perhaps mushrooms will help materially with the expenses. In spite of this fact, the Boys' Town will continue for at least a time to need help from friends in Canada.

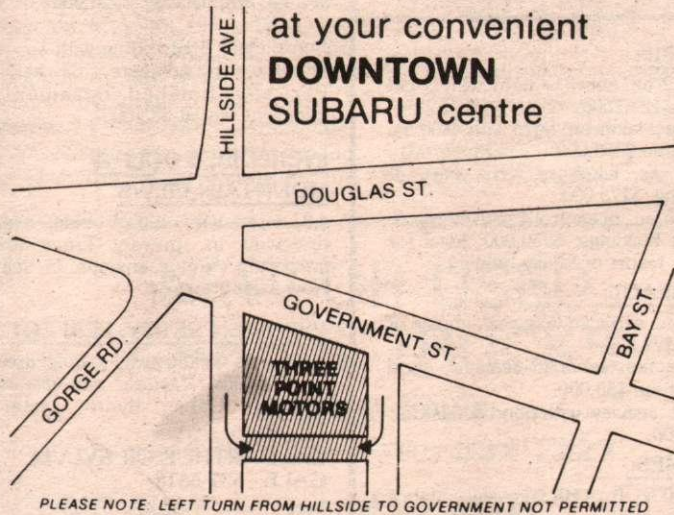

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

Driftwood continued its policy of front-page editorials on the need for new school facilities on Salt Spring. A photograph of the typing class in the commercial department of the high school showed students grouped so close together the carriages of the typewriters almost touched.

Community planning for Salt Spring would not be the first step to incorporation, a public meeting on the island was told by Don South of the ministry of municipal affairs. He was the guest speaker at the meeting called by the Chamber of Commerce.

A committee to organize centennial celebrations on Salt Spring was chosen. Col. M. F. Peiler was selected as chairman. Other members of the committee would be Major Z. Kropinski, W. F. Thorburn, Barney Lukas, Jack Roland, A. W. Wolfe-Milner and M. H. Holmes. A federal grant of \$1 per person on Salt Spring plus another \$1 per person from the provincial government would be available for any project of lasting value. Salt Spring residents were expected to chip in \$1 per person to complete the funding of any project.

An explosion rocked the Welbury Bay area of Salt Spring when Holdfast Pozzolan loosened 5,600 yards of shale with four tons of powder. Pozzolan, an ingredient of cement, had been quarried at the site since 1961. The blast broke windows in a number of homes in the area and sent a cloud of debris 100 feet into the air.

The elusive beaver of St. Mary Lake on Salt Spring was sighted by at least four people. Two boys, Johnny Marcotte and Dale Empey, were out fishing and saw the animal. Fred Sutton and Vic McKay were also fishing when they noticed the beaver.

Fifteen Years Ago

The beach at Vesuvius Bay on the Stuart Channel side of Salt Spring was not useable for swimming. Wood chips and sawdust had

covered the area. The source of the pollution was the pulp mill at Crofton.

Washrooms for Centennial Park in Ganges were a priority of the recreation minister of the provincial government, Kenneth Kiernan. He was on the island and looked at various facilities. He promised to help pay one-third of the cost for the washrooms if the federal government matched the amount. Taxpayers on the island would have to cover the other third.

A meeting of residents of Mayne Island offered praise and congratulations for Walter Hunt-Sowrey. Messages of congratulations came from the prime minister of Canada and the premier of B.C. The occasion was staged to allow the community to pay tribute to a man who had contributed so much to that community.

Salt Spring farmers had lost 84 sheep to roving dogs in six months. Dog owners were reminded that dogs bothering sheep could be shot and that they would be financially liable for any damage inflicted on the sheep by the dogs.

Tourists were welcome on Salt Spring Island. But the only public washroom was at the ferry terminal at Long Harbour. The Chamber of Commerce for the island expressed concern about such things as accommodation and washrooms for tourists. The meeting also authorized the printing and distribution of the publicity brochure for the island.

Ten Years Ago

An extension to the fire hall in Ganges required extra work, reported project architect Hank Schubart. Piles were needed to support the structure which was built on fill and the extra cost came to slightly more than \$3,600.

The trio of Salt Spring fishermen went to sea in a boat. Denis Abolit hooked a 20-lb. spring salmon in Active Pass. He wouldn't talk about the fish Nels Degnen and Fred Morris caught.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that four youths from that island had received a summer works grant and would construct an extension to

the community hall. Supervisor for the job would be Jim Money while Bob Hindmarch would lend his bulldozer. Workers Harvey Jansen, Jo Ann House, Peter Wheeler and Ben Henry would be helped by other volunteer labourers.

A federal election was in the offing. Three candidates had been chosen by the various parties to contest the Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands seat. Tommy Douglas would be the NDP man while the Liberals had chosen Ray Kane and the Progressive Conservative pick was Don Taylor. Voting would take place on July 8.

May Day on Salt Spring brought in \$2,198.98, said organizer Jack Althouse. After the bills were paid, there was \$700 available for the new centre being planned.

Five Years Ago

B. C. Ferries announced the new summer schedule. *Driftwood* reported that the schedule would remain as it was for the spring. Passengers wondered. The boat company admitted that the spring schedule would be used until the ferries which were in for repairs returned but otherwise the new summer schedule was in effect. Passengers continued to wonder.

A donation of two acres of land for the proposed Pender Island medical centre was running into problems. The property sat in the agricultural land reserve and permission from the Islands Trust and the Land Commission was needed to free it for the proposed centre. The Farmers' Institute on the island had reservations about supporting the move. The land acquisition committee said no other property was available and to buy a lot would cost a minimum of \$20,000. The matter was before the Islands Trust for consideration.

Sea Capers held the attention of Salt Spring Islanders over the weekend. There were four rowboats entered in a race but only three crossed the finish line. Jeff Rosser's boat sank. Erling Jorgenson walked the water like a winner should. The concert in the park featured Valdy and Shari Ulrich.

Squadron's three survivors reunited

Pender Island resident Frank Jones was invited to England earlier this year to participate in a television program honouring an old air force friend from the second world war.

Here is Jones' story, as told to Pender correspondent Eleanor Harrison.

Imagine my surprise on about March 1 of this year, I received a long distance call from Thames Television, the private television network in England, asking me if I could come to England by April 12 to participate in a television program honouring P.B. "Laddie" Lucas, a former pilot with the Royal Air Force.

My thoughts flashed back to 42 years ago, the spring of 1942, when I flew with Laddie as Spitfire pilots on the island of Malta. During that time Malta was under siege by the Germans. It was a key bastion and a thorn in the side of the German and Italian supply lines to Rommel in the north African war.

I had before that time been serving with the Royal Canadian Air Force, actually posted to an RAF station, Biggan Hill, in England. Biggan Hill was the prime fighter station during the Battle of Britain. This station, by 1944, had destroyed 1,000 enemy aircraft.

In fact, one of our chaps, Nick Nickelson in #72 Squadron, had won the Victoria Cross during the battle, the only fighter pilot to have done so in World War II.

Along with 17 other young pilots in the spring of 1942 I was ordered to prepare to go overseas, destination unknown. But tropical kit was issued which indicated some distant, hot climate. After passing through Gibraltar and flying off the aircraft carrier H.M.S. Eagle we flew 700 miles to land on the besieged island of Malta.

The Axis forces were applying tremendous pressure on the defenders of this troublesome base. My friend Laddie Lucas was squadron-commander of #249 squadron and I joined him as flight commander. We spent many hectic hours in the air and countless times saved a ticklish situation from becoming a defeat or worse still, the ultimate end of it all for one or the other.

The famous "Screwball" Burling flew with us from this base on into #249 squadron. Unfortunately, he was killed a little later on flying to Rome.

Our squadron ultimately became the unit in the area with the most enemy aircraft destroyed.

Practically the whole squadron were killed in action and today there are only three of us alive that we know of.

Of course, they gave a resume of Laddie's life from his youth onward. He was a golfing champion of England, university golf champion at Cambridge, led Cambridge to victory over their old rival Oxford. He served as a journalist with Lord Beaverbrook's papers prior to the war, ultimately joining the Air

Force and becoming a fighter pilot.

After the war he was Conservative member of Parliament for Chiswick, a region of London, and a prominent businessman in the city of London.

Laddie, with his background of journalism, became an author and he wrote many books, in fact five books concerning World War II. I am pleased to say that he mentions me in these books and says some very nice words about me. I hope I deserved them.

In the television show, a picture of each of his old buddies was flashed on a screen and a recorded voice, such as mine, was broadcast into the studio and he was asked to identify the person.

As soon as he heard my voice he instantly knew who it was although I hadn't seen him since he came to New York, leading a Walker golf team in 1960. He told Joyce that he would never forget that voice over the intercom in the air saying such things as, "Watch it Laddie, 2109 is coming round at five o'clock."

It was wonderful to be once again amongst my old friends because there were several of our old air force buddies from various parts of England gathered to honour Laddie. All those who stayed in the force seemed to have reached the rank of at least air vice-marshal.

Laddie's wife Jill was the one who organized this program. He was taken completely by surprise. He didn't know the program was to be held and he didn't know who was to appear behind the screen.

It was a format which was used here in Canada and the USA years ago called "This is Your Life" where a prominent personality is shown flashbacks of his earlier years and the audience is brought up to date on what he has been doing and where he is now.

Joyce and I were guests at the

Canadian Embassy when they had a reception honouring the 60th anniversary of the formation of the Royal Canadian Air Force. Our high commissioner, Don Jamieson, was there and all the heads of various air forces from Europe.

I don't like to dwell too much on World War II. I rarely talk about it. They recorded me in the books as an ace flying fighter pilot. I suppose that's well enough done but I am more concerned with preventing, in any way I can, World War III. The ominous propaganda which always leads up to war is afoot at the present time.

All with whom I spoke in England, aces of the Royal Air Force, former chiefs of the Royal Air Force, agreed that World War III will bear no relation to World War II. In fact one air chief marshal, when I asked him about the political situation and especially the ardent anti-Russia speeches that Mrs. Thatcher makes, said there is a vast difference between political rhetoric and military capability.

Another gentleman of equal rank agreed that should an atomic war break out, England would only survive for about 11 minutes and thereafter would be a completely useless piece of the earth.

Mutual assured destruction seems to be the ultimate end of any atomic war and for that reason one other gentleman was of the opinion that the two superpowers have built themselves into a position where they cannot use the atomic weapons in hand, and I somewhat agree.

There is only one flaw in the belief that they will not use them and that is can anyone assure that there is not a madman afoot in the world, or at large.

One lunatic act by a madman such as Begin or Kadafy and the world could be ablaze. I believe the thing that people must be on guard against is propaganda. It's

everywhere to misdirect people's minds to cause them to hate and fear a supposed enemy till such time as some small incident triggers a war.
