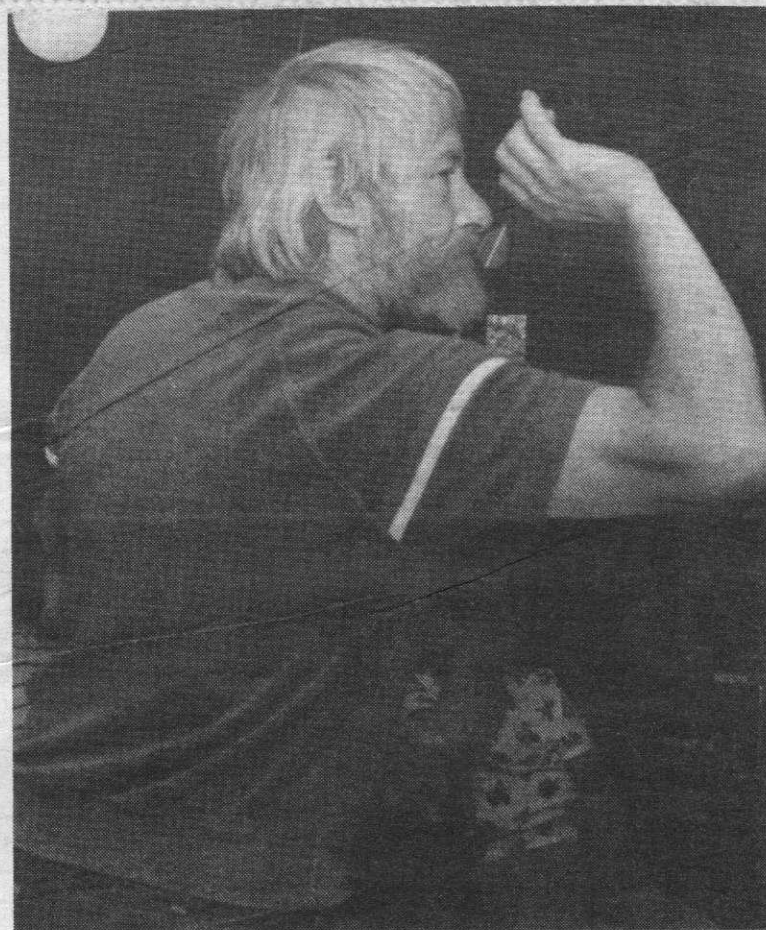

Trustees go for bus ride

The school bus will wend its way down Isabella Point Road on Salt Spring beginning October 1 but the school trustees want improvements made to the road.

They travelled the route on a school bus last week to see what the ride would be like.

The board will ask the department of highways to cut the brush at roadside so the driver of the bus can see just where the ditch is.

Jeannine Dodds, of the school board's conveyance committee, expressed concern about the condition of the road past Mountain Road. At that point the pavement runs out and the

remainder of the route is gravel.

A check will be made to determine exactly how many children are involved as well as exactly where they live on the road.

Depending upon the results of that check, the turn-around point will be determined.

The bus route came about as a result of requests from parents of children living along Isabella Point Road to have the children picked up by the school bus. In the past, children had to be driven to the Fulford-Ganges Road intersection to catch the bus.

Caravan leaves September 29

The Peace Petition Caravan begins the trip to Ottawa from both Victoria on this coast and St. John's, Newfoundland, on the east coast on September 29.

The petitions from the Gulf Islands leave Fulford on the 11 am ferry bound for Swartz Bay.

Organizers are planning to have a flotilla of small boats accompany the ferry as far as possible.

Those residents interested in joining the flotilla should contact either John Grey or Bob Burbidge.

The petitions had been distributed to each of the 282 federal constituencies "to give Canadians

the opportunity to make a strong political statement on Canada's role in the nuclear arms race," said organizers of the event.

In the five ridings on Vancouver Island, including the Gulf Islands, more than 50,000 names were signed to the lists.

The petition covers four points: "that Canada refuse further cruise and other nuclear weapons testing; "that Canada become a nuclear weapons free zone; "that wasteful military spending be diverted to fund human needs; and "that there be a free vote in Parliament on these issues."

The petitions from across Canada will be picked up and delivered to Ottawa by the cars and trucks participating in the Peace Caravan.

Meanwhile the cyclists who began the trek for peace to Ottawa on August 29 are on the road somewhere near Regina, Saskatchewan.

From Salt Spring, Mary Gilbert is riding her bicycle, while Marg Simons is in the support vehicle.

The cyclists hope to make it to Ottawa by October 12. They are averaging close to 80 km each day.

To support the cyclists, a sale of tickets for a draw is underway. A Bickerton portable bicycle is being raffled and tickets can be obtained through the Peace Centre in Ganges or from the Community Centre on Ganges Hill. The tickets are being sold each Saturday morning in the Farmers' Market in Centennial Park in Ganges.

Power line accidents of concern to Hydro

In an attempt to reduce the number of industrial accidents involving power lines, B.C. Hydro is reminding everyone concerned of the dangers.

There have been several incidents this year when cranes and pumper trucks contacted overhead lines. As a result operators were injured and Hydro customers have been left without power.

Machinery striking lines is not the only problem. In one case, workmen installing a gutter on a building allowed it to touch an energized conductor. One of the men fell, injuring his back as well as suffering severe burns to his hand.

"Incidents like this happen when people neglect accepted safety

procedures and Workers' Compensation Board regulations," says Tony Lyttle, Hydro's safety engineering supervisor.

Whenever there is a possibility of equipment coming within 10 feet of an overhead conductor, the regulations specify that the contractor find out the voltage and the minimum clearance required and then maintain that safety margin.

If the clearance cannot be maintained because of work circumstances, Hydro must be notified before work starts. Hydro crews can then de-energize the line, re-route it or take steps to guard against contact.

"In the event of machinery contacting a power line, the operator should stay in or on the vehicle, warn others to keep away and have someone call Hydro immediately," says Lyttle.

Visitor is victim

A visitor to Salt Spring from California has reported that his motor vehicle was entered and several items stolen.

Rolf Theuerkorn of Orange, California, had parked his vehicle at Ruckle Park and had gone for a walk on a recent Saturday afternoon. When he returned he found that the front door had been forced open.

A jacket, a gold ring, lottery tickets and a key chain with keys were missing. Value of the items came to about \$300.

Police are investigating the incident.

Blackburn Rd. farm is base for followers of Baba Hari Dass

The farm nestles in the valley near Blackburn Lake and is the tranquil setting of the Salt Spring Centre.

At various places on the property people work or sit in the sunshine engaged in quiet conversation. Children play and laugh at games.

The Salt Spring Centre serves as a base for the followers of Baba Hari Dass, a teacher of Ashtanga Yoga.

But, says Sid Filkow, the coordinator of the centre, the people there are working hard to avoid the label "cult group."

"We like to be diverse in our endeavours," he said.

The diversity is reflected in the programs sponsored by the centre in the past year. In addition to offering meditation exercises, the centre has been the scene for seminars which looked at the meaning of the Jewish Passover as well as a weekend of theatrical training, among other topics.

The main event of the centre each year is a yoga retreat attended by Baba Hari Dass. This year was the

10th retreat for the group.

Filkow noted that the theory of Ashtanga Yoga (ashta—eight, anga—limb) is "not a religion in the sense that it's an organized system."

Ashtanga Yoga is described as "an integrated and comprehensive system of psychology, philosophy combined with physical and meditation techniques designed to increase vitality, facilitate mental well-being and open doors to creative potential".

The eight limbs of the system are yama, restraints; niyama, observances; asana, posture; pranayama, control of breath; pratyahara, withdrawing the mind from sense perception; dharana, concentration; dhyana, meditation, and samadhi, super-consciousness.

Baba Hari Dass was born in the Himalayas in India and joined a yoga sect when he was eight. He is a monk who practises continued silence and has not spoken for more than 30 years.

He communicates with people by

writing on a small chalkboard.

Filkow is from Winnipeg and graduated from the University of Manitoba and the Manitoba Law School before coming to the west coast.

He met Baba Hari Dass in California shortly after the monk came to the United States from India in 1971.

Over the years, Filkow became more involved in the group. As they became organized efforts were aimed at finding land for a home for the group.

They discovered the 69-acre site on Salt Spring and decided to buy it.

Baba Hari Dass was asked what the group should be doing at the farm.

He replied, "It should be a place where people can come to find a peaceful environment."

And that, said Filkow, has been the thrust of the activity at the centre.

"We try to make it accessible to as many people as possible," he said.

School board to obtain legal opinion

The sale of the school property on Isabella Point Road on Salt Spring is being held up until the Gulf Islands School Board obtains a legal opinion on the transaction.

The lot, .6 acre, is too small to be used as a school site and the Gulf Islands School Board would use the money from sale of the property as part of the purchase price for a larger lot.

They are seeking at least 10 acres near Ganges in anticipation of the growth of the school-age population on the island.

Also up for sale is a five-acre lot at the corner of Beaver Point and Stewart Roads on Salt Spring. That property, situated in the Stowe Lake watershed, cannot be used for school purposes.

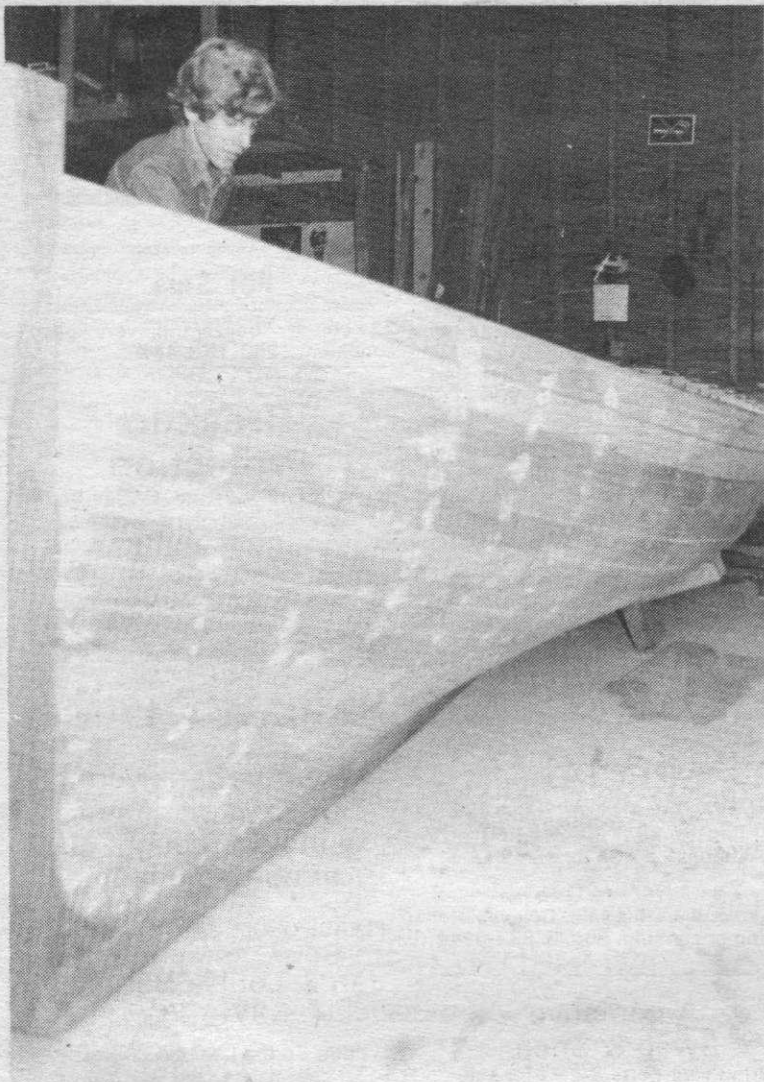

For 11 months now, Bob Dougherty, a Pender Island furniture maker, has been working on an ambitious project. He is building a Mackinaw sailboat, a scaled-down version of a Great Lakes fishboat as they were built in the early 1800's.

The hull is cedar on bent oak, glued and finished with copper rivets, while the inside finish will be of Honduras mahogany.

Forester discusses logging with Trust representatives

There must be log dumps in island waters for as long as logging is destined to be part of the islands economy, planners were told on Friday.

When trustees of the Islands Trust were invited to see the controversial subdivision above Pender Canal last week they spent an hour or so with Peter Griffiths, the forester in charge of the logging operation.

Griffiths has spent his life in the woods and he passed on something of what he has learned. Logger, forester, journalist and, briefly, politician, he has been preaching a message of forestry reform for a number of years.

He has been a regular contributor to the magazine *Equity* until he resigned this month and in the last provincial election he ran as an independent against Premier Bennett, he told trustees, in order to call attention to his plea for more efficient administration of the

Pitlamping illegal

It was a quiet week for the Ganges detachment RCMP.

SOUTH PENDER SITE

The forester outlined the pattern of operation at the South Pender site and he warned against uninformed restrictions on logging. The layman who criticizes a logging operation will gain little recognition if he calls for procedures which are mechanically or economically impractical, said Griffiths. The South Pender project is undertaking selective logging, trustees were told, but selective logging is a term with little meaning. It simply means that some trees may not be cut. It provides no indication of the manner of selection.

Griffiths has logged with horses and he has logged with helicopters; he now logs with computers. He explained that the first part of any logging project is scaling the timber to reach an estimate of the value of the end product. To illustrate the new technique, he selected a fir and demonstrated the logger's procedure for that one tree. The scaler stands 66 feet back and uses an instrument to measure the height and diameter. He measures the butt and estimates the logs he will produce from it, their size and their market value. He then carries out this procedure throughout the parcel.

When he has made his calculations and the operation is under way, there is another man with a similarly programmed, hand-held computer making the same calculations on the logs as they pass through.

HE KNOWS WHERE IT'S AT

The advantage of electronic

calculation is that the operator knows exactly where the money is at any time. Not only does he enjoy a more accurate estimate of the quantity of timber to come out, but he knows where he stands in proportion to his original estimates.

With computerized logging you don't find yourself short of funds half-way through the contract and tear everything out in a desperate measure to remain solvent, he explained. Instead, the operator is fully aware of where he is going and if the market falls sharply or any other factor arises to prejudice his completion of the work, he can suspend operations until the market improves or the demand rises. He has all the information at his fingertips right there in the woods.

SELECTIVE LOGGING

The Pender site is being logged selectively. Most cedars are being left and there will be no raw patch of mountain to be seen from below. The site will remain unscarred.

He warned against careless condemnation of logging which takes out every tree and leaves this evidence of clear-cutting.

Clear-cutting prepares the forest land for new growth, he urged. The land doesn't have to be rototilled to grow trees. If the old growth is cut out entirely, the land is ready to grow new trees. It is at that point he feels that greater attention should be paid throughout the province to a revised policy for reforestation.

As far as patches in the woods are concerned, he explained that not only does such an evidence of clear-cutting reveal a new forest starting, but that the cutting might have been

done for a specific reason. There could have been disease or infestation there, said the forester.

MUST BE INFORMED

There is no point in telling a contractor how to go about logging

an area unless the instruction is authoritative and informed.

There must be provision for falling the trees which are selected. There must be adequate working space and the amateur logger rarely

He reads the newspapers and watches TV, and he ought to know." So the father cut down on his meat and bun orders. He took down his signs. He no longer bothered to stand by the highway to sell hot dogs. And his hot dog sales fell off overnight. "You're right, son," he said, "we certainly are in the middle of a terrible depression."

ensures that one tree falls clear of another.

The uninformed critic will recommend the use of the mature tree while leaving younger trees standing. He pointed to two adjacent trees. One was about 18 inches in diameter and the other less than half that. They were the same age, he explained. The one had reached the top of the forest and

grown, but the thinner tree had never had the light for the crown and had been thus stunted. He invited trustees to take a core sample of the two and to compare the age, but when Harlene Holm of Denman Island tried to take a sample they found the stunted tree was too rotten.

The forestry practices in British Columbia urgently need revision,

said Griffiths, but recommendations must be informed, authoritative and contribute to an improved resource in the province, said the crusading forester.

The trustees were at the site before nine in the morning and drove from the road clearance to the nearby Pender school-community centre where the Islands Trust council meeting was held.

The smorgasbord held in Fulford Hall raised about \$190 from the 250 people who crowded the tables. The money would be used by the hall and athletic committees of Fulford to pay for activities and to maintain the hall.

The salmon derby held in Fulford was won by Ruth Sorchensky who caught a 4 lbs. 14 oz. salmon. Vic Jackson took the top men's prize while Elain Patterson took the children's prize for a 6 lb., 6 oz. cod. The event was organized by Les Mollet while Hattie Stewart supervised the weigh-in and Bob Patterson presented the prizes.

A short in the electrical system of a boat moored in Retreat Cove caused an explosion which blew Andrew Gifillan of Vancouver into the water. The boat burned to the water line and sank. Gifillan was uninjured in the mishap.

The Gulf Islands Camera Club would hold its first meeting of the fall season in St. George's parish hall. Club president Edna McLeod was asking members to bring two slides, one scenic and one nature, for judging and comment.

Plans for two trips for members of OAPO Branch 32 were announced. The seniors could go on a shopping tour of Victoria for one trip and later in the month a tour of Alberni was set. More information could be obtained from Mrs. Monk or Bill's Taxi.

Twenty Years Ago

Hunting season began with a Vancouver man being shot on Galiano Island. Mike Maurhsailis was taken to hospital in Vancouver for treatment. He had been hit with SSG pellets while hunting with two companions.

The ferry wharf at Crofton was being braced. The extra support was needed to allow heavy cement trucks to use the ferry to get to Salt Spring Island. Work was being carried out by Harbour Piledriving of Nanaimo.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that Fred and Inez Paulson were visiting from Seattle. While he drove them around to see the sights, a tire on his car blew when it hit "one of our million or so potholes." The spare tire was leaking so Papajohn borrowed a spare from the Padre to continue the tour.

The Galiano Club sponsored an informal gathering at the school to allow parents to meet the new principal, Basil Bengler, and the new teacher, Bonnie Robson. Club president Tom Carolan was helped by Mrs. Hank Knudson to put on the event. There would be 42 children in two classes at the school.

August was cold, reported Ganges weather-watcher Howard Carlin. The temperature ranged between a high of 76 to a low of 45 compared to the high and low of 83 and 48 degrees the previous year. Precipitation was measured at 1.45 inches.

Fred Morris went fishing but didn't catch a thing. Nels Deggen gave him a cod so he wouldn't go home empty-handed. Deggen was trying to catch salmon but only landed cod, including a 42-pounder.

Fire spread from the beach to the trees on the hill at Fiddlers Cove on Saturna Island and volunteers went out to fight the flames. The fire had been started by boaters who had gone ashore to light a campfire and then left it. It was the third such fire on Saturna for the year.

Ten Years Ago

The Islands Trust was ready for business and Marc Holmes of Salt Spring was named as vice-chairman of the agency. Chairman would be

Hilary Brown of Hornby Island while David Brousson of North Vancouver would be the other vice-chairman. Two representatives of each of the 13 major islands would be elected at the municipal elections in November.

A meeting to discuss the proposed sewer in Ganges was held to hear objections from members of the Scientific Pollution and Environmental Control Society (S.P.E.C.). Don Watmough outlined that group's concern about dumping sewage into the harbour and other residents of Salt Spring also spoke against the scheme.

School opened on Galiano and 42 children were registered in three classes. Principal Ken Maneker would teach 19 senior elementary pupils while Mrs. Sidney Bowden would have 14 in her primary class. The kindergarten would be taught by Kathy Gunn and there were nine children enrolled.

A crew flew into a transformer at the Atkins Road switching station on Salt Spring causing a fire and a blackout of power for residents of the north end of the island. Service was quickly restored and the fire

was extinguished. The crew died.

The sabot sailors sailed in races held at the Maple Bay Yacht Club. Mike Cannon, 16, of Salt Spring took top spot while Robert Neish came in fifth. There were 27 entrants in the races which were held over two days.

Enrolment in the Gulf Islands schools had risen to 855 from 841 the previous year. Salt Spring Elementary registered 384 pupils, a drop of 14. For the Outer Islands schools, the registration showed an increase of 28 students.

Five Years Ago

Visitors to Salt Spring Island were shot at and the nearest police officer on duty was in Colwood. The two visitors were driving along Cusheon Lake Road when the vehicle was hit by a shotgun slug. The police on the island were not on duty Sunday and the visitor vowed never to return to Salt Spring.

An airstrip was planned for Mayne Island and opposition to the idea was forming. Phillip Jarman had applied to the Agricultural Land Commission for approval to use farm land as an airstrip. The Islands Trust would study the matter. Residents of the Village Bay

area on the island had organized a protest against the plan.

The Kiwis on Salt Spring butchered chickens. Jeff Rosser had help from Jeanine Williams, Laurie Roland and Art Howard in the task. The chickens had gained notoriety earlier in the year when they had escaped their pen and attacked a pig.

The provincial scholarship examination results were secret, said school superintendent Bob Huestis. He would not say how many had passed. Pender school trustee John Zacharias had attempted to get the information in a public meeting but Huestis told him to wait until the in-camera session to ask such questions.

Enrolment figures for the Gulf Islands School District showed 1,041 children registered. There were 220 pupils attending the four Outer Islands schools and 482 in elementary classes on Salt Spring. Gulf Islands Secondary School had 339 students enrolled.

Supreme Court petition filed to stop project

Property owners near the proposed Musgrave Landing strata title development on Salt Spring have filed a petition in the Supreme Court of B.C. to stop the project.

The petition was filed by Robert and Payne Kellogg, Sheila Gaines and Thomas Foster who own the property to the north of the proposed subdivision.

Named in the petition are Rico Holdings, the attorney-general of B.C., the ministry of transportation and highways, the Capital Region, the Islands Trust and the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee.

The petitioners are asking the Supreme Court to revoke the

preliminary layout approval granted by the department of highways in September, 1983. The approval should be declared "invalid and contrary to law" and set aside.

The approval is contrary to both the Salt Spring community plan and the bare land strata regulations, claim the petitioners.

Robert Kellogg told *Driftwood* this week that they intend to pursue the matter despite changes in the strata title regulations made by order in council in May of this year.

The minister of consumer and corporate affairs had changed the strata title regulations to delete reference to community or settlement plans when approval is

considered.

The approval referred to in the petition had expired and a new approval of the strata title development was granted in early July.

The petitioners also asked the court to deny the approval because it "creates strip development along the waterfront foreshore" and "creates a residential area and density in a rural area and setting."

The approval also diminishes the petitioners' use and enjoyment of their property as well as the value of the land, they claim.

The petitioners point out that the development proposal as approved by the ministry of highways "creates individual residential lots

considerably smaller than the minimum parcel area required by the applicable zoning bylaw in respect to areas zoned uplands and forest."

The zoning bylaws set the minimum parcel size on land zoned uplands and forest at 1.5 acres with service level for each property set at individual septic tanks and a proven supply of potable water for each lot.

The Musgrave proposal calls for lots from .75 to 1.25 acres in size.

The petitioners are checking with their lawyer to determine if the case should go to court in light of the changes in the strata title regulations. No court date has yet been set.

Musgrave developer wants changes

The engineer for the Musgrave strata title development on Salt Spring has asked the highways department for changes in the preliminary approval of the project.

Peter Gericke, of J.E. Anderson and Associates of Victoria, has written to Dave Raven, the approving officer for the highways department, outlining the requested changes.

The developer, Rico Holdings, is willing to make accommodation for reserves to be set aside for the protection of the phantom orchid. The preliminary approval granted in July had stipulated that the area where the rare flowers grow be set aside.

Gericke also noted that the exact

size of the full property will not be known until a survey of the area is completed. He changed the plan for the development to include additional lots.

"These lots would be created only if final survey calculations and the averaging formula show that the parent parcel has sufficient area."

Under the subdivision bylaws of Salt Spring the average minimum parcel size is set at two hectares (4.94 acres) with each lot served by an individual septic tank.

If the minimum lot size averages out to 6,000 square metres (1.5 acres) the lots must have individual septic tanks and be served by an adequate supply of potable water.

The developer is also asking that

the servicing standards as set out in the preliminary approval be changed.

The supply of potable water would come from wells and each well would serve four lots.

As well, the developer wants a community sewage disposal system to service 16 lots with the other lots being served by individual on-site disposal fields.

Gericke said the sewage disposal changes were requested to allow for a technically better system.

The septic tile field would be enlarged and moved farther from the ocean. The new site, he said, was of an ideal gravel composition.

The health department had approved the changes, he said.

Gulf Island Day no more with Ferries' new reservation system

The reservations system on the Gulf Islands-Tsawwassen ferry will be changed when the winter schedule goes into effect.

B. C. Ferry Corporation will drop blanket bookings and will only accept reservations for peak weekend sailings four days before the date. For instance, with Thanksgiving weekend being October 6 to 8, bookings for that weekend will be taken beginning on October 2.

In addition, reservations for 120 vehicle spaces on each sailing will be taken. In the past, the ferry company would only reserve 110 spaces. While the *Queen of Tsawwassen* has capacity for 138 vehicles, the various sizes of vehicles results in a full load at about 120 vehicles.

Bill Bouchard of the ferry corporation explained that long-term or blanket bookings had been the source of problems with the reservation system.

The corporation monitored the system during the summer runs and found that many people who had reservations did not show up to claim them and did not inform B. C. Ferries that the reservation would not be needed.

Company officials contacted the people who did not show up to find out why and over the summer, the number of no-shows was gradually reduced.

From June till August 1,068 reservations were cancelled within four days of the scheduled sailing date, while 394 reservations were cancelled on sailing days.

The majority of reservations have been made on the day that the new schedules come out. Workers in the reservation office call it Gulf Island Day because of the large number of reservations made.

The majority of reservations were for weekend sailings and were made by people from the mainland who own property in the islands and

come for a weekend.

But of those long-term reservations, an average of 40% were not used.

"We were amazed that people would spend hours to make a reservation and then not use it," said Bouchard.

During the study, ferry officials found that no-shows at the mainland terminal for the Gulf Islands run often travelled to the islands by a different route. Such people would take advantage of the reservations held in their name for the return to the mainland.

But in future, if a reservation is not claimed at the Tsawwassen terminal, the return trip reservation will be cancelled.

The ferry corporation will experiment with various methods of handling the reservations. A charge for reservations had been considered but will not be put into effect until all other options have been tried.

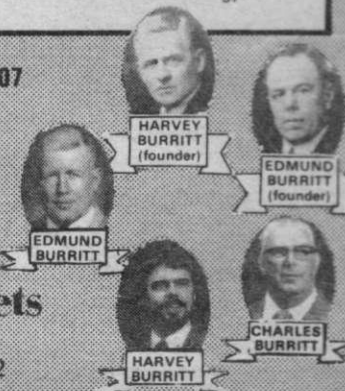
