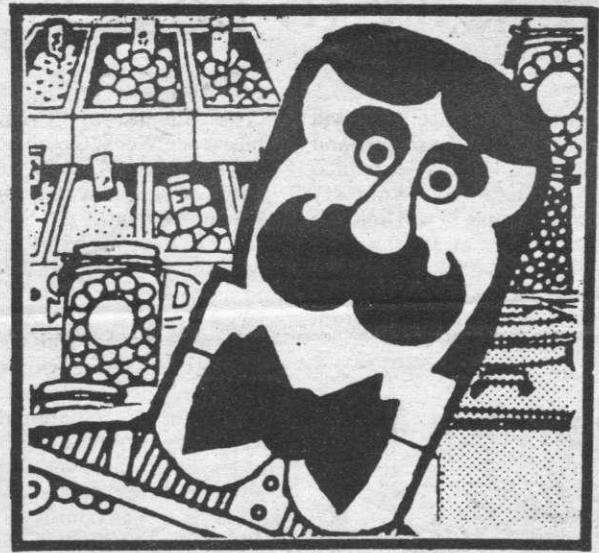

# Amnesty to hold vigil Saturday at Ganges

Prisoner of Conscience Week will be launched at Salt Spring Island Saturday with a vigil in Centennial Park. Members of Amnesty International Group 72 will hold the vigil, which begins at 10:30 am, to help publicize the plight of women throughout the world who are victims of arbitrary detention, torture or execution.

## Chamber to stage banquet

Directors of the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce agreed last Wednesday to stage a fall banquet for its membership on Wednesday, Nov. 21.

The meeting had been discussing the annual volunteers' banquet, held for those who volunteer their time in the tourist information centre, when it was proposed that a dinner be held for the entire membership complete with a guest speaker.

The affair will take place at the Harbour House Hotel and tickets will be sold for \$10. In charge of the banquet are Stan Lam, Amy McLeod and Tony Richards.

The directors also set Wednesday, Nov. 28 as the date for the chamber's annual general meeting. The meeting named a nominating committee consisting of Arvid Chalmers, Dennis O'Hara and Tony Richards.

The theme of Prisoner of Conscience Week, October 15-21, is *Women Silenced*.

Next Wednesday the group will host an evening at the Salt Spring Elementary School library, beginning at 7.30 pm, with a film and guest speaker Vilma Mejia.

According to Amnesty spokesman Murray Reiss, she is one of many thousands of women whose lives have been affected by the repression in Guatemala. She escaped the country and after living in Mexico for three years, moved to Canada with her two daughters. She now lives in Ladysmith.

The evening's film, made by the National Film Board, is *Dream of a Free Country: A Message from Nicaraguan Women*. It studies the role played by women in Nicaragua's revolution, and their efforts to participate as equals with men in the future.

Prisoner of Conscience Week is devoted to "women silenced" this year because governments throughout the world are punishing women who speak out or women who are perceived as potential opposition, says Reiss. Most are on

the forefront of social and political change and many are leaders.

Other women find themselves victims simply because they are wives, mothers, daughters or friends of those considered dangerous, he says.

Local Amnesty members will be asking the public to sign and mail appeals on behalf of 11 cases chosen to represent all women who are victims of intimidation, illegal arrest and detention, torture and executions.

One case involves Thich nu Tri Hai, a Buddhist nun in Vietnam who has been held incommunicado in police custody since her arrest in May. Adelaide Foppa is a Guatemalan feminist who has been missing since 1980 when she was abducted from her home, apparently by security agents. Airut Desta of the former Ethiopian royal family has been held without charge or trial since the country's current government came to power.

Appeal letters will be available at Amnesty's booth at the Farmer's Market Saturday, before and after the vigil, and at next Wednesday's meeting.

# Gail Bryn-Jones friend and mother to Katimavik

Residents of Salt Spring Island no longer ask questions about Katimavik, which proves to group leader Gail Bryn-Jones that the youth program has been accepted as part of life on the island.

She took over as group leader for the Salt Spring contingent in the spring and one of her earlier tasks was to assess the community to see if Katimavik had become "burned out" on the island.

She found that Katimavik has a niche on the island and is accepted by residents for the work being done by the participants.

"It's not a novelty anymore," she reported.

Bryn-Jones, a native of Toronto, lived in Vancouver for eight years during which time she obtained a Bachelor of Recreation degree from the University of British Columbia.

Following graduation she took a year and a half off to travel through the South Pacific.

One particular experience during that trip aided her in finding a spot with Katimavik, she said. When she applied for a position with the youth program upon her return to Canada, she was asked if she could handle pressure.

Yes, she could, was her reply.

She had been on a sailboat travelling between islands during her South Pacific cruise. It went aground on a reef and wasn't freed for 28 hours.

The ship eventually got off the reef with the help of natives who had come out to help.

### Began at Smithers last year

The administrators of Katimavik

agreed that she could handle unusual situations and she began as the group leader for the Smithers, B.C., group in April of 1983.

That group was located 89 kilometres back in the bush at a place known as Nadina Lake. They were working for the ministry of forests and Bryn-Jones noted that the isolation meant that community involvement was non-existent for the group.

Their main task, once they had constructed a tent-camp from plywood, was to build picnic tables from burned logs left from a forest fire.

When that rotation ended, Bryn-Jones was offered the spot as group leader for Salt Spring. She came to replace Tim Collins, who was moving on to other employment.

As the group leader, it is her responsibility to organize and plan a program to allow the participants to meet and fulfil their goals.

"As group leader," she said, "I'm a friend and a mother but never a boss."

She also acts as community liaison for the group and must keep in touch with the pulse of the community in order to permit the participants to take part in community events.

Bryn-Jones is the financial record keeper and must budget \$61,000 per year to fit the needs of the group.

To date, the current group has been involved in the painting of the exterior of Greenwood's and has provided traffic control personnel for the island's Fall Fair. They also helped lay the new sod for the soccer pitch at Portlock park.

The Sunday after the fair, they returned to the Rainbow Road grounds of the Farmers' Institute to help clean up.

involved in the program to learn English.

"They grew up with the awareness that French is a minority language," she said. "And they enjoy the challenge of learning English."

A similar attitude is held by the English-speaking contingent.

For Bryn-Jones, the experience as a group leader has taught her things about herself. She has become aware of, and surprised by, the extent of her leadership abilities, she said.

She intends to stay with Katimavik "for quite a while", and plans eventually to move on to the administration side of the program.

But for now, she is happy to be on Salt Spring. She is not a city person, she said, and she enjoys being with people who are tuned into the land as islanders are.

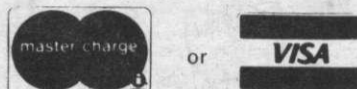

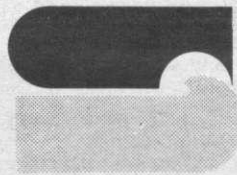

# APC can claim expenses

Members of the Advisory Planning Commission on Salt Spring can claim expenses in relation to their work with that group.

Allowable expenses include a gasoline allowance of 24¢ per kilometre for travel to and from meetings as well as money to cover the cost of ferry fares if the member is off-island and takes a ferry to get to the meeting.

Meals on meeting days are also covered. The commission members can claim \$5 for breakfasts, \$6 for lunches and \$11 for dinners.

Islands Trust planner David Morris explained in a memorandum that no other expenses should be incurred. If some other expenses do arise, the members should check with chairman Dave Williams or with Morris to see if the expenses will be allowed.

Williams, a Salt Spring school trustee, represents the Gulf Islands School Board on the APC.

The local representatives to the Islands Trust, Nick Gilbert and Bev Unger, cannot authorize any expense accounts for the members.

Morris reminded the APC members that any claims should be kept to a minimum because the Islands Trust budget contains only a small amount for that purpose.

Members of the APC represent various groups on the island and offer advice to the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee.

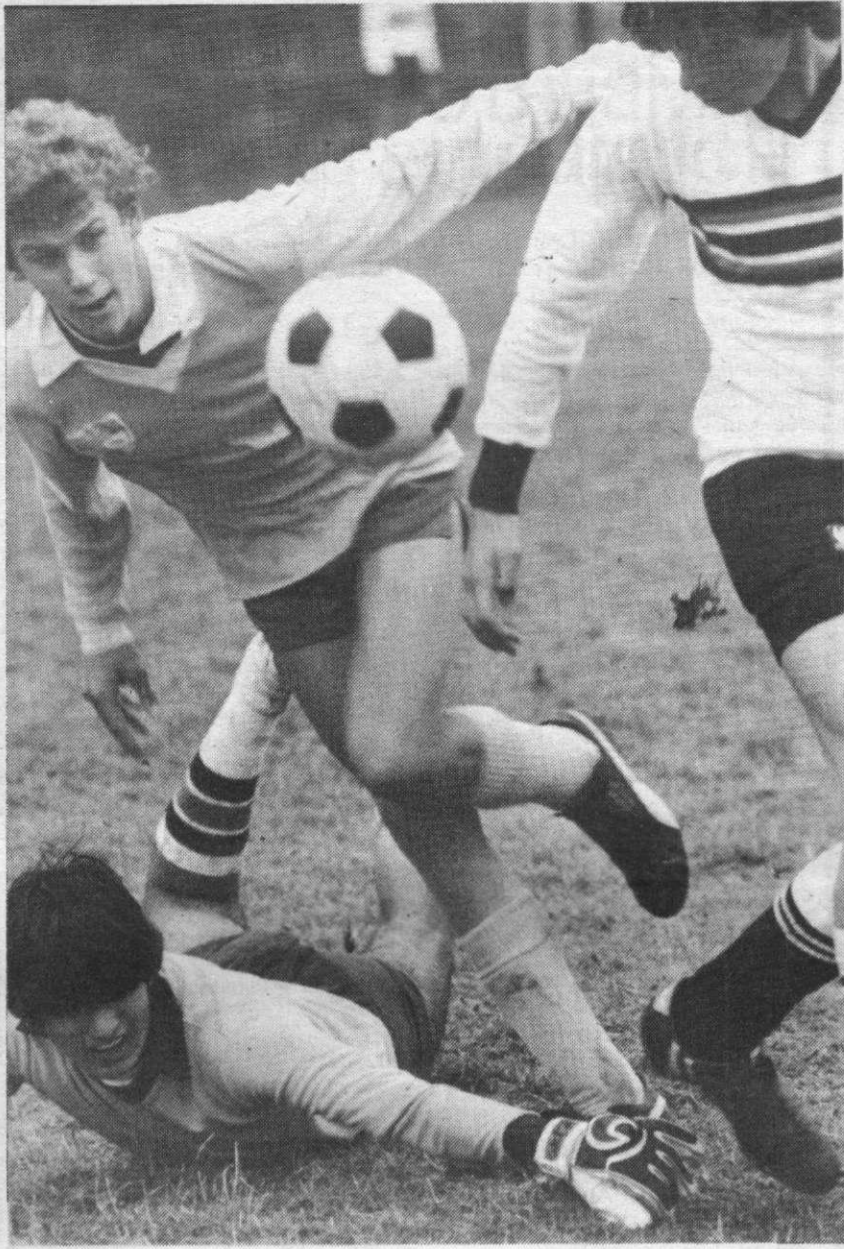
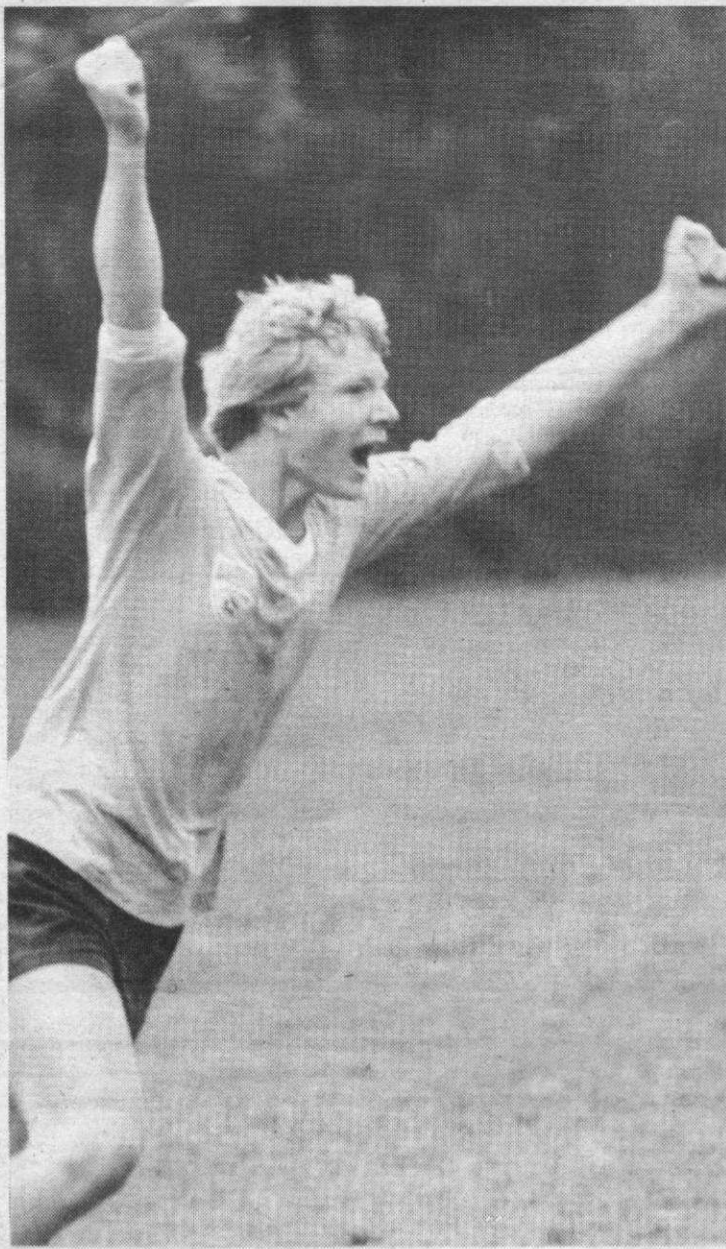

## Fires mark beginning of Fire Prevention Week

The crew, which consists of Tom Liddell as fire chief with Arne Haksi as his assistant, Bill Willander, Bill Stafford, Dawn Christian, Dale Lyon and Gordie Palmberg, have in addition fought three real fires in three successive days—Thursday to Saturday.

Last Thursday evening a cedar log cabin on the property of Dexter and Margaret Howell was burned to the ground. The cabin was rented to Dexter's sister, who lost all her possessions in the fire. Fortunately she was visiting with the Howells at the time the blaze broke out.

By the time the fire was noticed the cabin was engulfed in flames and the North Galiano Fire Department, when they arrived on the scene with vehicles and water, could only prevent the fire from spreading. The Howell family wish to thank fire chief Tom Liddell and the volunteers who came to their assistance.

In all the intervening years he was a frequent visitor to the island.

These last few years through increasing ill health she was unable to continue with her painting, but surrounded by her family she bore her misfortune with a gentle, cheerful manner.

Last Thursday morning she died peacefully in her home. On Monday afternoon her family and friends gathered in the Galiano cemetery, and there in that beautiful setting of golden leaves and calm water, received peace and strength from a series of bible and poetry readings. On behalf of all Galiano people who knew and loved her we would like to convey our deepest sympathy to her daughters Ingunn and Carol and their families, and to her sisters Mabel, Violet and Doris.

### Ironman

Our triathlon man, Ian Hooley Jr., finished the Ironman race in Hawaii last Saturday in good spirits with over 700 competitors behind him in the 1000-entry endurance test. Ian was well up with the leaders after the swimming and cycling sections of the race but blistered feet really slowed him down for the third part of the triathlon. After walking for five miles he decided he might as well get it over with so finished the course running despite his handicap.

### Open Shelf Library

Readers who obtain their library books by mail from the Library Services Branch, formerly the Open Shelf Library, have been calling in vain at the post office for the past three weeks asking for the expected parcel of books. The fault has not been that of Canada Post.

She will travel to Ottawa for the award ceremony next Wednesday, and the previous day be interviewed by Peter Gzowski of CBC's *Morningside*.

### Art show

The mystery of the balloons which appeared on Galiano a week ago was explained on Saturday when they reappeared as part of the publicity for the art show in the South Galiano Community Hall. The hall was transformed into a plain white undistracting space by the use of white paper.

The paintings of Stewart Brands and Jerome Zachary faced each other as in a gallery with the stage occupied by one large canvas from each artist.

Stewart's paintings are mostly done in a post-impressionist style but many of the subjects are familiar to Galiano viewers with scenes of Montague Harbour predominating. The pointillism technique serves to give the subjects an attractive luminosity.

Jerome's canvases are rich in colour and texture but the subjects are abstract and may not appeal to the more conventional viewer. The artists are to be commended for providing islanders with an opportunity to view their work.

## Flu vaccine available

Flu vaccine is now available at Salt Spring Island for those who are eligible, and clinics will be held at Ganges October 17, 24 and 31.

The vaccine is provided free to eligible persons through their physician or at the Community Health Service office on Rainbow Rd.

Eligible persons are anyone over 64 or persons of any age who have conditions such as:

- impaired respiratory function associated with chronic disease of the lungs;
- congestion of the lungs associated with heart disease;
- impaired kidney function associated with chronic kidney disease;

• certain chronic conditions such as diabetes mellitus, severe anaemia or conditions associated with impaired immunological function.

Those who wish to receive the flu vaccine but do not qualify to receive it at no charge, may purchase it at a drugstore and arrange for its administration at the health service office or by their doctor.

Most adults require one shot only, while young adults and children may need two shots a month apart. The vaccine takes a week or two to build up a person's immunity.

Further information can be obtained from the Community Health Service office on Rainbow Rd.

# Down Through the Years with Driftwood

## Twenty Years Ago

The Lions Club on Salt Spring celebrated its fifth birthday with a banquet and party in Fulford Hall. President Walter Mailey greeted guests from other Lions Clubs. Jack Tomlinson was named Lion of the Year while Harold Hoffman and H. Bradley were recognized for their contributions to the club.

The Ganges weather-watcher, Howard Carlin, reported the wettest September, with 2.15 inches of precipitation, since 1959 when 4.05 inches of rain fell. The temperature reached a high of 78 degrees and dipped to 43. For the same month in the previous year the high and low were 85 and 47 degrees while the rainfall was measured at .52 inches.

The cake was cut by Mrs. T. F. Speed as Ganges Chapter IODE marked 50 years of service on Salt Spring. Regent Mrs. F. K. Parker greeted guests from other chapters across the province. Mrs. Speed had been the first treasurer of the group. Proceeds from the party, held in the Salt Spring Golf and Country Club, would provide a memorial bench at the Ganges Harbour waterfront.

Teachers of the Gulf Islands gathered for an annual meeting to elect officers for their local of the B. C. Teachers' Federation. Mrs. A. Hepburn was chosen president while C. Huxtable and R. Woodley were selected to sit on the salary negotiation committee.

A pod of killer whales paused at Vesuvius Bay on Salt Spring to frolic. Mrs. L. Hyde reported sighting a white whale in the group. The curator of the provincial museum, Dr. Carle, said the white whale had been sighted at Tofino and Gabriola Island earlier in the month.

The senior citizens of Salt Spring went on a bus tour to Port Alberni. Chester Reynolds of Bill's Taxi drove the group there and back. The event was organized by Mrs. E. J. Monk and the seniors were entertained on the bus by Elsie Robb who played a harmonica.

## Fifteen Years Ago

The contestants were signing up for the greasy pig stuff at Ganges on Salt Spring. The catch-the-slippery-porker contest was being staged for the second year as a way of raising money for the upkeep of Centennial Park. John Stepaniuk of the Ganges Legion had suggested the idea.

The Sechart Queen would be visiting the Gulf Islands for the long weekend to handle the expected heavy traffic to and from the mainland.

The Recreation Committee on Mayne Island sponsored a potluck supper to introduce the calendar of events for the fall and winter. Margaret Bennett explained the lineup of events such as badminton, bridge, chess and drama. Joyce Mitchell said the arts and craft group would be making another quilt.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that the department of highways began to pave a stretch of East Point Road. Residents got together and convinced the work crew to use some of the asphalt to patch holes in the road to Lyall Harbour.

Doug Cavaye, Capital Region director for Salt Spring, said he would not seek re-election. Joan Purchase of Pender Island, who was the director for the Outer Islands at the CRD, was to seek voter approval for another term.

Ganges weather-watcher Howard Carlin measured 4.58 inches of rain during September. The temperature

reached 80 degrees and dropped to 45. For the same month the previous year, the rain was measured at 2.15 inches and the temperature ranged from 43 to 68 degrees.

The deadly hill on Fulford-Ganges Road on Salt Spring was being removed by the highways crew. The road humped at that point and a vehicle in a hollow in the road could not be seen. The crew was lowering the hump by four feet. Accidents at the location had killed three drivers.

## Ten Years Ago

Elections for positions with the Islands Trust would take place for the first time. On Salt Spring, Charles Longueay and Jim Wilkinson had announced their intentions to seek office. The only announced candidate for the Outer Islands was Gordon Wallace of Pender Island. Voters on each of the major Gulf Islands would choose two representatives to the Islands Trust.

The International Joint Commission said the proposed international park which would have included the Gulf Islands in Canada, the San Juan Islands in the United States as well as Point Roberts on the mainland was shelved for good. When the plan had been announced, islands residents raised a storm of protest.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that the Women's Club had an annual meeting to elect a new executive. Louisa Money would be president, Myrtle Maskow would be secretary, Melanie Gaines would be treasurer and Anne Bavis would be social convener.

The Women's Institute on Pender Island was presented with a new charter to replace the original which had been lost. The charter showed that 37 ladies of Pender had been in the group when it began. Marie Craddock, Florence Bridge, Helen and Dorothy Grimmer as well as Vivienne Menzies, who were original members, presented the new charter to the institute president, Mrs. Russell.

The man stood on the road in front of the RCMP office on Ganges Hill and threw a rock through the window. Officers arrested him when they showed up to answer the alarm which went off as the glass broke. He spent the night in the cell and would face charges for the incident.

Mike Byron was named Salt Spring Citizen of the Year. He was recognized for his contributions to the community by the Chamber of Commerce.

The Catholic Women's League of the Vancouver Island diocese met on Salt Spring. President of the diocese, Yvette Valcourt of Salt Spring, and local president, Mrs. L. J. Kreissl, greeted more than 50 guests to the event.

## Five Years Ago

Eggs from chickens on Salt Spring Island were contaminated with traces of polychlorinated biphenyls (PCB). The source of contamination was a feed-producing plant in Montana where the PCB had been dumped from a broken transformer. Officials of Agriculture Canada said that some of the eggs tested contained traces of the chemical but all the eggs were cleared for human consumption.

The Queen of Sidney was in collision with a pleasure boat in Active Pass. Fog restricted vision when the accident occurred. One person was injured. The Sidney stood by while assistance was

rendered by the RCMP cruiser Athabasca. The pleasure craft was towed to Montague Harbour on Galiano Island.

The strike by terminal workers at Tsawwassen and Swartz Bay had closed down ferry service in the Gulf Islands. The only ferry which was running was the Vesuvius-Crofton boat. Jim Hedgecock, union official for the Gulf Island ferry workers, said the company had locked out the workers. The union had decided, he said, not to disrupt service to the Gulf Islands.

## Nine clinics in Victoria

Gulf Island residents will have the opportunity to give blood at donor clinics in Victoria during October.

On October 11, the clinic will be held at Dunsmuir Secondary School at 3341 Painter Road and will be open from 2 pm until 8 pm.

October 12 is the day that the clinic moves to the Camosun-Glendale Interurban Campus with times from 9:30 am until 3 pm. The campus is located at 4461 Interurban Road.

The Macaulay Point Gym is the location of the next clinic. It is at the Work Point Barracks and is open from 2:30 pm until 8 pm on October 22.

The clinic moves on to Royal Jubilee Hospital on October 23 with

times from 11 am until 5 pm. The hospital is at 2101 Richmond Avenue.

For the next three days, the clinic will be conducted in the Hillside Shopping Mall at 1644 Hillside Avenue. For October 24 and 25, the times are 2 pm until 8 pm. On October 26, the times are set for 10 am until 3 pm.

These clinics will be the only opportunity for Gulf Islanders to give the gift of blood for the month. There will be no clinics in the Gulf Islands.

# Two days to Tofino and back

It was just like married life. Last week there were six of us marking the long years since we were married after the second war. To mark the long journey through the years we took a short trip around the west coast of Vancouver Island.

It was well remembered. Some of the journey was grey and some was under sunny skies. Part of the trip was smooth sailing and part was on stormy seas. We were buffeted by the waves and baffled by the mist. At times some of us were wondering why we ever started. It was, in fact, a very fitting manner to mark a wedding anniversary.

There were Ivan and Susan Mouat and Mike and Josie Clement and Women's Lib and me.

**TO TOFINO**

We flew in the Dash 7 by Air BC to the former air force station on Vancouver Island's west coast. And the station shows signs of its military origin after nearly 50 years. The airport buildings are the wartime structures inherited from the Royal Canadian Air Force. Tofino is like many another wartime air station. It still rejoices in a number of former military buildings converted to use as private residences.

From Tofino the journey took us to Ucluelet by bus. We were shown the highlights of the Pacific Rim park, including the look-out which was once manned 24 hours a day to watch for intruders.

Overnight we were accommodated aboard the *Canadian Princess*, once a deep-sea cruiser and now immovable at the shoreline, serving as restaurant and hotel in the fishing village.

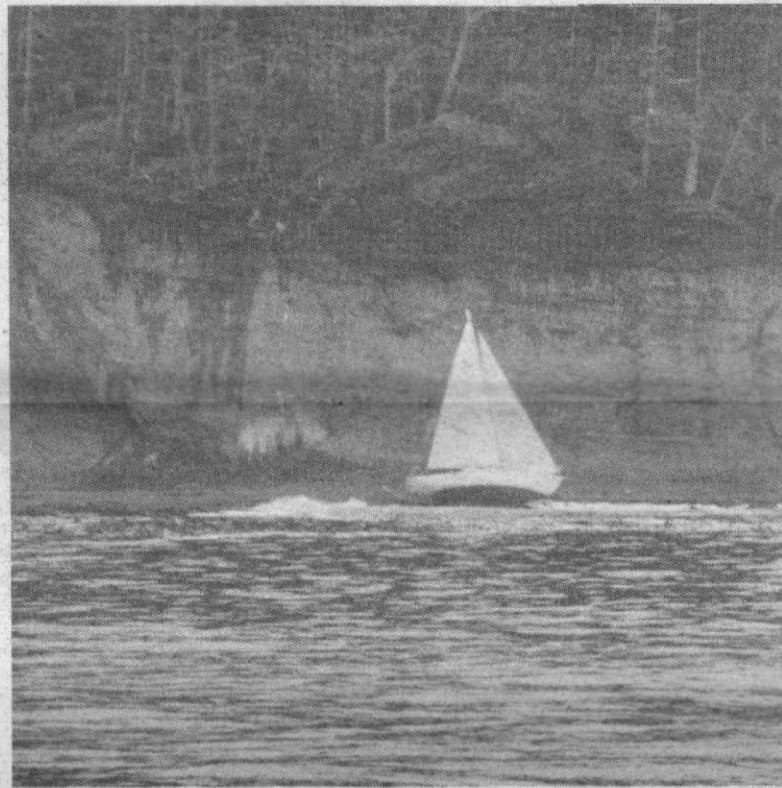
There were three 40-foot vessels tied up at Ucluelet, ready for the trip to Oak Bay. The *Criterion III* was our target.

**FISHING TRIPS**

During the summer months the *Canadian Princess* is headquarters for regular fishing trips in the fish-infested waters of the west coast. Some six of the smaller craft are used to take fishermen fishing. But they don't go out through the winter and once the season comes to an end, the vessels are sent south and the schedules are suspended until the spring.

We were among those who elected to come down the west coast to put away the charter fish boats.

Breakfast was shortly after 6 am and we boarded the *Criterion* at about 7.30. The water was perfectly still in the harbour as the three boats crept out of Ucluelet, shrouded in mist. When they stopped a few miles out to spy on a couple of grey whales, the boats were unsteady in the movement of the sea. When they reached Barkley Sound the water was rough enough to satisfy the less salted sailors. Once south of the sound, they found a steady swell but no weather of note.

The trip is interesting and would have been the more so had the mist not persisted until the afternoon. The three vessels stopped to watch the sea lions and again to enjoy a cold lunch. An unscheduled stop was made to check out a sailboat left high and dry with its sails still aloft and the skipper disconsolately ashore. The crew hailed another power boat and received assurance that the coast guard was aware of the incident.

For the remainder of a sunny and quite warm afternoon we roared down the coastline and on to

Victoria. The trip is a long one and the *Criterion III* was at one time sailing to Lasqueti Island as water taxi-ferry vessel. The journey took some 10 hours, ending at the Oak Bay Marina.

For the crew the trip was even longer. Once they were relieved of the deep-sea cruiser, they returned to Tofino, where they live year-round.

I don't know whether to try Siberia or the tropics for next year's anniversary.
