She then stressed the importance of assessing the site through consideration of wind, sun, shade, wetness or dryness. She continued by suggesting where to obtain plants, to consider their height and width, colour contrasts, form and leaf shape.

Directions were given on how and when to plant. She concluded with a useful list of plants suitable for the dry, sunny climate of the Gulf Islands and left a permanent reminder of her visit in packets of seeds from the Van Dusen Gardens.

The Gulf Islands School Board will be meeting twice more before election day with the next trustee get-together being held on Galiano Island October 25.

The school board then meets on November 15 at the school district office at Ganges.

For the last month of the year, the board meeting will be held December 5.

The trustees have committee meetings during the morning of those days with the public portion of the meetings taking place in the afternoon.

Parents concerned over safety

Board reverses bus route decision

The Gulf Islands School Board has reversed an earlier decision and won't be sending a school bus down Isabella Point Road on Salt Spring Island.

The school trustees had decided to put a bus on the route to pick up 11 children who live down the road. The bus was to have started the run October 1 with the turn-around point being the intersection at Mountain Road.

But parents of children living in Fulford valley objected to the plan on the grounds that it would not be safe for the bus to use the road.

Dan Akerman, who drives a fuel oil truck, told a meeting of the school board last week that the road is narrow and in some places a bus and another large vehicle could not pass.

He read a letter supporting his position and signed by other truck drivers.

A parent of a child living on the road told the meeting that a school bus had used the road but the service was stopped in the mid-1960's because there were no children there.

There has not been an accident on Isabella Point Road in the past 25 years, she told the meeting.

Art Chesters presented the trustees with a petition signed by Fulford parents who expressed concern about the safety of the road. Those parents did not want to deny bus service for Isabella Point Road, he said, but were worried about the safety of their children.

School board chairman Charles Hingston said, "One thing that both sides, valley parents and those who live down the road, agree on: Make the damn thing as safe as possible."

A parent suggested that the bus be re-scheduled to pick up the Isabella Point children first.

That idea met with disfavour from school trustee David Eyles. "If it's not safe for some kids," he said, "then it's not safe for all kids."

Hingston told the parents on both sides of the issue to contact the highways department and urge them to fix the road. He noted that the school board has made requests

for highway safety without success but the department of highways "reacts to angry parents."

The school board will also request that the road be improved. If the highways department does make the road safer, a school bus will be put on the route.

Until then, the parents will have to continue to drive their children to the intersection at Fulford-Ganges Road to catch the school bus.

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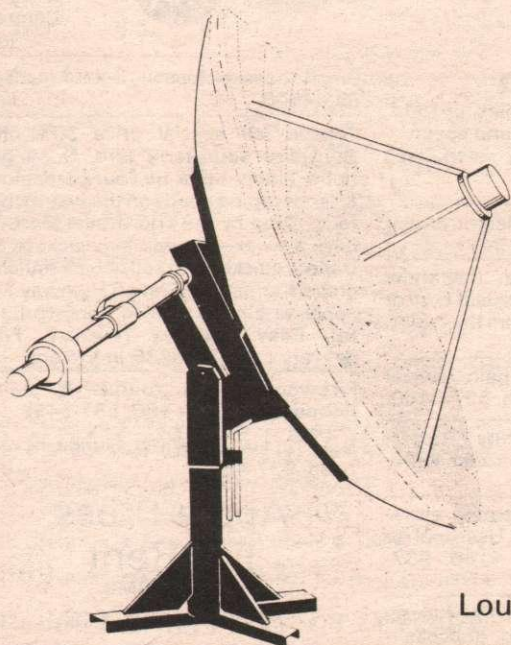
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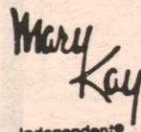

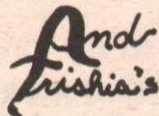

Same principles in growing crops as in yogurt

A little miscalculation crept into my example of the dynamics of life last week, when I had 30 billion lacto bacilli multiply into 960 billion bacilli in a quart of milk within four hours, to make one quart of yogurt.

In my excitement over such stunning evidence of profligate reproduction I had completely forgotten that we usually make one half-gallon of yogurt, and hence that the last number should be doubled, and as far as I can figure it out, it should come out to one trillion, nine hundred and twenty billion bacilli. I am somewhat in awe of such astronomical numbers, and even by assigning the value of one billion to my fingers and toes, comprehension still eludes me, and I am left swimming in a sea of numbers.

I can just imagine it: all those little bacilli swimming around in a warm, nutritious environment, happily propagating to their hearts' content, everything they could ever wish for within easy reach, and life is a blast of joy until they get shoved into a fridge. It is a question of dynamics after all; a perfect environment, lots of nutrients, the temperature just right, a milky paradise of life, until the heat is turned off, and all life comes to a standstill.

SAME PRINCIPLES

The parallel to gardening, and to other matters of vital concern to us, is absolute, for the principles of dynamics are not only planetary but universal. In the making of yogurt we provide the ideal medium, the right temperature, a few seed bacilli, and the bacilli take it from there, and do what comes naturally. We do the very same thing when we raise our crops; we provide an ideal soil environment, a few seeds, and these do what comes naturally; it just takes a little longer than yogurt.

Farming and Gardening

BY PETER WEIS

This is a result of the greater complexity of beans, let's say, as compared to the simplicity of a bacillus. And people are even more complex than beans, and therefore do not reproduce as rapidly, or as abundantly, and we cannot even begin to emulate the bacillus. Nevertheless, the same principles apply.

Our biosphere is our ideal environment and contains everything that we need to thrive to our hearts' content, our garden of Eden as it were, and it is governed by the same dynamics.

Perhaps we should become acquainted with the source and the nature of these dynamics, at least as far as our gardens are concerned. The dynamics of our biosphere are generated by a steady and constant energy influx from our sun, and other than the manufacture of vitamin D in our bodies, we cannot use this energy directly.

This steady influx of energy is akin to the energy we provide to heat our milk to the ideal temperature for the proliferation of lacto bacilli to make our yogurt. If there is not enough, nothing much happens, and if there is too much, the milk boils over. Next to our distance from the sun, the green life of our biosphere is the regulating medium of our accustomed temperature range, and also the interface that converts the sun's energy into a form that we can use to sustain our lives.

DEPENDS ON CHLOROPLASTS

Our oxygen, our food and our water purifying and distribution system are entirely dependent on, and generated by the chloroplasts in plants. Were it not for the plant life of the earth, the earth would be a desert of merciless heat during the day and freezing cold at night. The plant life in turn depends entirely on the microbiotic life in the soil, our bacteria again, along with a whole host of fungi and algae, the latter

being soil inhabiting chloroplasts.

The constant influx of energy from the sun is the driving force of the dynamics of the interdependent web of life, and the constant pressure of energy results in an ever-increasing proliferation of life, an ever-increasing spiral, as life creates more life, as demonstrated by the lacto bacillus. There is virtually no limit to the depth of life that our earth can accommodate, and we shall only approach our limit when

all the waters of the oceans are temporarily contained in living structures, and the ocean basins have become green fields.

A billion times our present population is possible on a planet teeming with life and abundant food, unless, of course, we choose to destroy the green life with many of the methods we have so far discovered, and thus return our planet to a desert state, barren of all life.

The cow was not hurt but the 1984 Volvo suffered dents to a value of \$250.

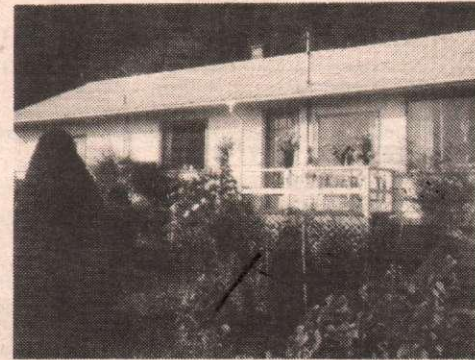

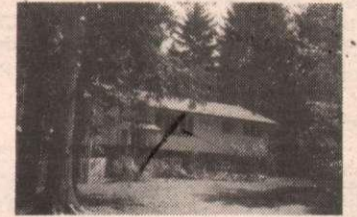

Tribute to Daisy Bavis

Many Saturna Islanders were saddened to learn of Daisy Bavis' death last week. Daisy and Walter lived here for 12 years after visiting for many more. They lived at the head of Narvaez Bay in a house that they built and were surrounded by a garden that Daisy established.

In Vancouver they raised two sons, Jim and Donald. Ann, Daisy's sister-in-law and Chuck, Walter's brother, lived on the bay and their children visited their aunt and uncle frequently. Walter loved Saturna and Narvaez Bay, where he lived as a child, and where Chuck was born. It must have been important to return here.

Daisy and Walter were a special

couple. Both added so much to Saturna in their own ways. They complemented each other, neither overshadowed the other. The bond between them was evident, full of the co-operation and love that each presented to the community individually.

People come and go on Saturna and all leave their mark but Daisy and Walter were unique, they remained islanders. Any occasion that brought them back was a little more special. Daisy was active in the community, taking a leading part in the Women's Club, bridge, the church, the Barbecue and whatever else was happening. She was a good organizer and very capable. People who worked with her felt included

rather than organized.


Daisy loved to sing, in fact, Walter heard her singing in church, in Regina, before he and Daisy met. Chuck remembers Walter bringing Daisy home to the family place in Port Renfrew, and how special, how different she was. "She paid attention to us, she went on walks and listened to what we said. All the kids loved her. She never lost that specialness for me."

As a cook Daisy is well remembered. A bake sale specialty was steak and kidney pie that had guaranteed sales from community admirers. Taimi Hindmarch remembers the real Scotch scones coming from Daisy's oven.

Everyone I talked to has a special memory. I remember a special hug and warm words at a crucial time in my life. I remember going to her

garden, a shared interest, and returning home with a box of plants.

We were all incredulous when Daisy and Walter said they were leaving Saturna. They wanted to leave before they were too old to return to another full life, closer to their family.

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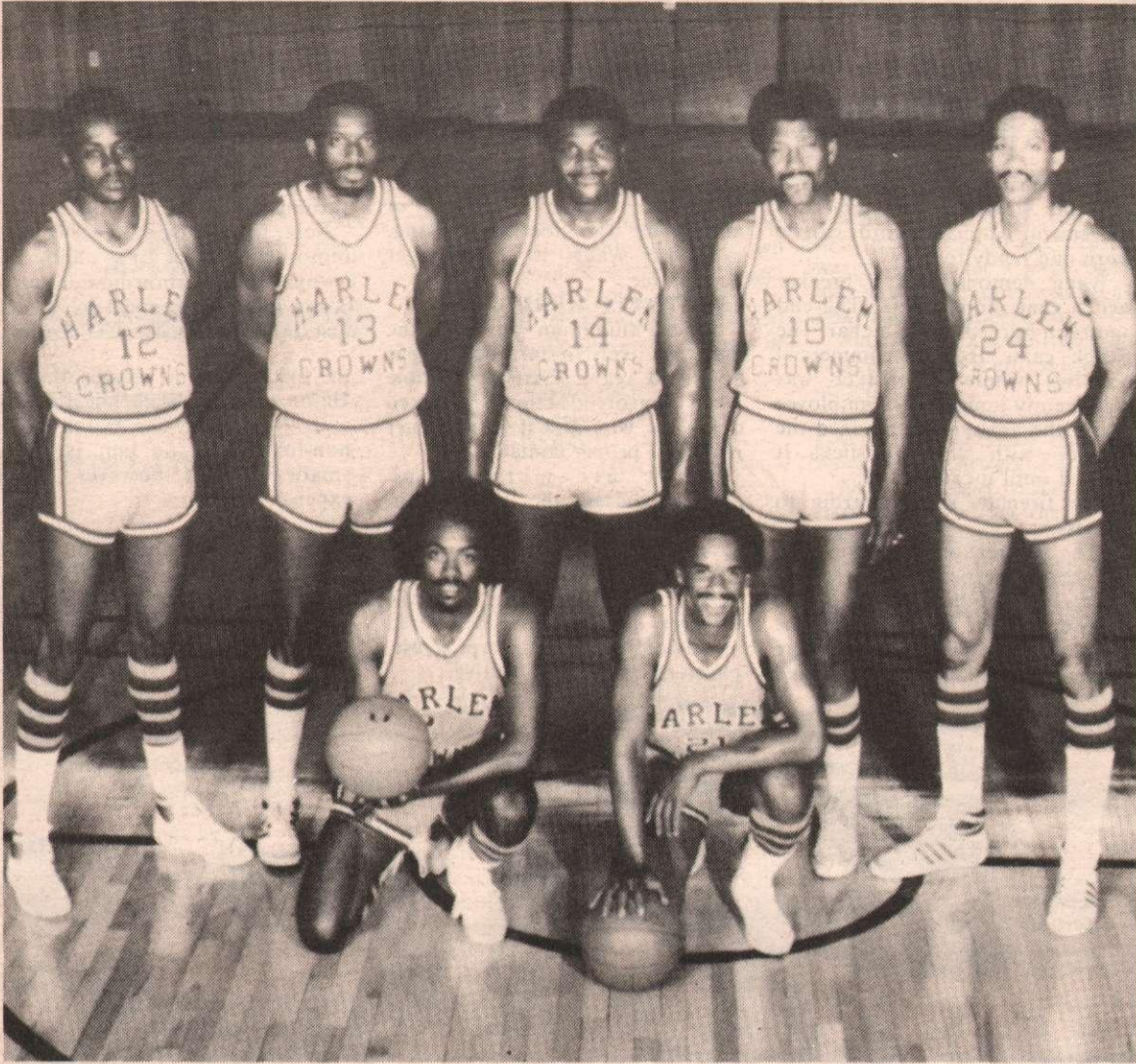
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Crowns are back

No license for testers of soil

Provincial government will not contemplate the licensing of soil percolation testers.

The Capital Regional Board suggested earlier in the year that those carrying out tests of a property's absorptive capacity should be licensed. Such a measure could permit a closer check on such tests, it was felt.

The responsibility to prove that a soil is permeable rests with the owner, replied health minister J. A. Nielsen last week.

The requirement of a licensed percolation tester would place an additional financial burden on the property owner and "possibly an unnecessary one", said Nielsen.

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Service club hears about fire protection

Problems are few with properly installed equipment

Fire Prevention Week culminated on Salt Spring Island in a demonstration of equipment throughout Saturday at Ganges firehall. Firemen were on duty to explain their equipment and to offer a small demonstration of firefighting.

A number of young visitors were permitted to use the fire hose to put out a fire in a small barrel of diesel oil.

When Les Wagg, deputy chief, addressed the Salt Spring Island Lions Club on Thursday evening he opened his subject on wood-burning equipment and the care and maintenance of stoves and chimneys.

The sudden popularity of wood-burners has resulted in most homes having at least one, he told the service club. When the equipment is properly installed there are few problems, said Wagg.

"Follow the instructions," urged the fireman, "check distances, clearances and use a safe floor covering."

The department has a booklet on the safe installation of such burners, said the speaker.

DON'T GET CLOSE

One of the most important aspects is clearance from walls, the Lions were told. There must be an air space using a metal or asbestos board if the equipment is closer to a wall than is normally permitted.

He deviated to recall that heat travels for incredible distances.

He cited an instance where a building was constructed on a log with several feet of concrete between the wood and the fireplace.

The heat couldn't go through that, the builders were convinced.

But it did. The log burned through most of its length, he recalled.

In the installation of a heater, an ordinary chimney may be used within one foot of the ceiling. The original requirements were for a one-inch clearance chimney to run to the outside. The new regulations require a two-inch clearance.

As far as maintenance is concerned the first call is to keep the stove and the chimney clean. A masonry chimney should be cleaned once a year and a metal chimney every three months. If use is heavy, a monthly check is advisable, said Wagg.

GOOD FOR CREOSOTE

Two good ways of building up flammable creosote in the chimney: burn wet wood or pitchy wood with the stove damped down.

To keep a clean chimney burn dry wood and keep the draft going, urged the fireman.

There are other aspects of safety with fire.

The deputy fire chief showed the Lions a section of cement flue liner almost completely clogged with soot. The owner of the house was leery of the chimney and had a contractor dismantle it and reline it with clay, said Wagg. Concrete liner attracts creosote and is not acceptable, he warned his listeners.

Good housekeeping is the fireman's best friend. Don't allow anything near the fireplace or stove if it could catch fire. He also urged that doorways be kept clear so that movement is free during an emergency.

He doesn't like an octopus on the power outlet, said the speaker. The outlet is good for one appliance, not half a dozen.

And he added a warning for good measure. The breaker does not always kick out when it is overloaded. The wires might go first.

An extension cord under a carpet can be broken from constant movement. Appliance cords can be worn and ready to blow.

Wagg demonstrated a breaker switch that didn't break. The end had been burned out to a char. The switch came from a commercial premises where a breaker was consistently jumping. An employee found the answer. He jammed the breaker with a broomstick. It worked until it caught fire.

The fireman kept referring to tidiness.

"The poorer the housekeeping, the greater the risk," he warned.

He cited another instance where the firemen were unable to open the door of a home to fight a fire because the junk around it jammed

the door.

Another hazard is the use of aluminum wire for housewiring, cautioned Wagg. It is no longer permissible.

LIGHTS FLICKERING

Where aluminum was used the lights are likely to start flickering in about 10 years. That is the time when electrolytic action has broken down the wire and it is no longer making a proper contact.

There are methods of accommodating the junction of aluminum and copper wire, he agreed, but the best way is to rewire.

Get a smoke detector.

And when you have a smoke detector, keep it going. He offered no advice regarding the type to use, photo-electric or radioactive.

A smoke detector is the early warning system in any home.

Next, get a fire extinguisher. He demonstrated a dry chemical extinguisher, a carbon dioxide and a Halon unit. The chemical unit blows dust on to the fire. The CO₂ drowns

the fire for lack of oxygen and the Halon produces a chemical action with the flames. The Halon gas is non-toxic and the unit is much smaller. It is, however, more expensive.

Keep a hose handy. And if you have an oven fire, close the door, cover the pan or throw baking soda on it.

That was Fire Prevention Week.

Professional soccer saw promising growth in 1980

Wet, cold weather did not hamper another good weekend of soccer action as all our teams had plenty of thrills and spills.

This week I will take a look at the state of soccer in North America, especially in light of what has occurred to the Vancouver Whitecaps in recent weeks.

The past year has seen some very interesting happenings in soccer in North America, happenings that will have a great bearing on the success of the sport in years to come.

On the professional level the North American Soccer League started the year with nine teams, down three from the previous season, and although all nine completed the season, three more definitely closed shop at season's end.

Their attendance dropped drastically, notably in Vancouver and New York, as fans stayed away and the Chicago Sting drew only 6,000 fans for their soccer bowl final.

The future of the league at this stage looks in jeopardy as some franchises have folded, others are uncertain and an organization like the Vancouver Whitecaps, one of the most stable franchises in the league, sells all its players and coaches and tells us they are still in operation.

The gradual deterioration of the professional game has been caused by a series of factors.

One major factor has been that the calibre is not top-notch as the league is watered down with over-the-hill foreign players and poor quality homegrown talent.

Another factor has been the knock that the game is boring. The North American fan likes the instant exciting play, like a home run or a touchdown, rough play as exhibited by hockey and football and the speed of basketball and hockey.

Soccer lacks a major T. V.

contract to help keep the sport afloat, like ABC has done to keep basketball alive.

Soccer has lacked stability of franchises as teams fold regularly and owners quit for fear of losing money. (Although the Whitecaps lost \$2 million last season, the Cincinnati Reds lost over \$4 million but keep going).

A factor that I feel contributes greatly is identity of players and teams. In Vancouver the fans were drawn by their own team, not the visitors (unlike the Vancouver Canucks who draw fans due to the teams that visit—not because the Canucks are a good team).

This problem is a result of poor exposure through press, radio and television who are caught in the rut of reporting only what they deem important (like what kind of beer the quarterback drinks or that some hockey player had three goals and five assists playing for the Spuzzum Spitfires last season).

These factors, plus tough economic times, which make people think more carefully about how they spend their entertainment dollar, have changed soccer from the promising growth that appeared on the horizon in 1980 to the sad collapse this year.

On the amateur side of the sport

we have a totally different picture as was reflected over the past year. On the local level, both youth and senior, the sport grows every year as more and more people participate.

The biggest surprise has come on the international scale. The Canadian national soccer team played some exhibition matches and its Olympic qualifying matches in Victoria and received excellent fan and press support. The rewards of this success are that Victoria will stage the first round of Canada's bid to reach the World Cup finals next April.

Last summer the Olympic soccer finals were held in Los Angeles and soccer was the number one draw in numbers and the semi-finals and final drew 100,000 fans for each game. The success of these games showed that soccer will be

supported in large numbers, even though the teams were unknown to many attending.

Certainly part of this draw was the novelty, but the calibre was not the world's best and many of the teams were not soccer powers. One thing was certain though: the crowds came and enjoyed what they saw.

Where does this leave the future of soccer in America and is there any hope of a NASL or another Whitecaps team? Tune in next week when I will try to answer these questions.

The By-law also provides that for parcels larger than 0.4 ha (1 acre) an additional accommodation unit for each 0.04 ha (1/10 acre) or parcel-area is permitted. The By-law also establishes a maximum floor area of 93 sq. m. (1,000 sq. ft.) for an accommodation unit with an average floor area of 56 sq. m. (602 sq. ft.) for all accommodation units on a parcel.
2. Proposed By-law No. 114, cited as "Zoning By-law No. 2, Salt Spring Island, 1978, Amendment By-law No. 18, 1984":
 - a) to designate pursuant to Section 717(3) of the Municipal Act the following land to be a Development Permit Area:
 - 1) Lot 1, Plan 31180, SE 1/4, Section 46;
 - 2) Lot A, Plan 30128, Frac. NW 1/4 and NE 1/4, Section 46;
 - 3) Lot 1, Plan 3315, Frac. NW 1/4, Section 46;
 - 4) Lot 1, Plan 18198, Section 47 and 48;
 - 5) Lot A, DD 68167 I, Frac. SE 1/4, Section 47 and SW 1/4 and SE 1/4, Section 48;
 - 6) Lots 1 to 9, Plan 1914, Frac. SE 1/4, Section 66;
 - 7) Lots A and B, Plan 13816, Frac. NE 1/4 and NW 1/4, Section 46;
 - 8) Frac. NW 1/4, NE 1/4, and Frac. SW 1/4, Section 48;
 - 9) Frac. SE 1/4, Section 47 and Frac. NE 1/4;
 all of South Salt Spring Island.

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Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

The Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce heard that a long-term lease was being prepared for the land-fill area near the government boat basin in Ganges. The department of public works was arranging the lease for the chamber at a cost of \$10 per year. If the centennial committee of the island chose the park proposal as a project, the area could be developed with money from both the federal and provincial governments.

St. Mark's Church on Salt Spring would be 75 years old in 1965 and the ladies of the Chancel Guild were to prepare a booklet outlining the history of the church. They requested information about the church from residents of the island.

The M. V. Cy Peck headed for service on the Horseshoe Bay-Bowen Island route as a replacement for the regular ferry. Captain G. Maude with Tom Gurney, W. Laxton and Ken King as crew transferred the old ferry from Fulford Harbour to Horseshoe Bay. The ferry had been renamed the *Queen of the Pacific* but islanders still called her the *Cy Peck*.

Several summer cottages on Pender and Mayne Islands had been broken into and various articles stolen. Police recovered the stolen property and two youths from Saanich were to appear in court in connection with the incidents.

The Ladies Auxiliary to the Royal Canadian Legion in Ganges awarded a \$200 scholarship to Edward Gilman. Gail Slingsby received a \$300 scholarship from the Legion provincial command.

The flower boxes brightened the scene in Ganges during the summer and the members of the Chamber of Commerce thanked Mr. Z. Kropinski and his committee for looking after them. The chamber also thanked Mrs. A. M. Brown for promoting the display of island handicrafts at the Hudson Bay Co. in Victoria.

Fifteen Years Ago

The Gulf Islands School Board approved plans to call for a referendum to construct a 10-room school on Salt Spring. The estimated cost of the structure, with an activity room added on, would come to \$350,000. If the referendum gained the approval of the minister of education, property owners would vote on the matter at civic election time.

The hump in Lower Ganges Road near the intersection with Church Road should be eliminated, said Archdeacon R. B. Horsefield. The intersection was hidden from view to southbound traffic and was a danger to users of that intersection.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that the Saturnalia was a success. The revelers helped raise more than \$500 for the fire department on the island.

The cat ran away from the car at the ferry terminal at Otter Bay on Pender Island. Bitsy, the cat, belonged to Diane, Lorna and Teresa Keennett who were visiting Ruby Hatcher on Pender. Four days later, the cat was found on a ledge on a cliff and was rescued by Mrs. Bill Gill.

Kanaka Road in Ganges would not be closed, the Gulf Islands School Board was told by deputy minister of highways H. T. Miard. He had ruled that closing the road would not be in the public interest but would meet with school board trustees to discuss the matter.

Voters in the Gulf Islands would choose five school trustees at the civic election in November. School board chairman George Heinekey, P. A. Frattinger and Robert Patterson were coming to the end of their terms on Salt Spring. Frattinger had offered his resignation from the school board. Jim Campbell on Saturna and Elizabeth Ross of Mayne Island were also up for re-election.

Ten Years Ago

The rescue of a 14-year-old girl took six hours on Mayne Island. Janet Ebert was walking through the bush with a friend at Campbell Bay when she fell into a crevice in a rock. She had broken her leg and her friend went for help. The rescue party had to find her and they had problems getting her out of the thick brush. They lowered her in a stretcher to the water where Nigel Phillips was standing by with a water taxi for the trip to Salt Spring and Lady Minto Hospital.

The department of highways again refused a request from the Gulf Islands School Board for the closure of Kanaka Road in Ganges. The road bisects the playing fields and the school trustee wanted the road closed as a safety measure for the children.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that Uncle Art Ralph celebrated his 90th birthday. The Women's Club, under the direction of Anne Bavis, held a tea in the community hall to help him mark the day. Taimi Hindmarch and Mike Hayes brought the school children to the party to present a book they had written about him.

A New Horizons grant was received by the senior citizens of Mayne Island. They were given \$3,198 to expand recreational activities to attract new members. Hugh Campkin would be in charge of the project. It was the third such grant given to the Mayne Island seniors.

A seiner sank in Active Pass and when salvagers were dragging for it,

they hooked the telephone line between Galiano and Mayne Islands. The accident left residents of Galiano without off-island phone service for more than a day.

Lieut. Col. Desmond Crofton of Salt Spring Island was named honorary lieutenant colonel in the Canadian Scottish Regiment. He had led the regiment during the invasion of France in World War II.

Five Years Ago

The eggs contained polychlorinated biphenyls (PCB) but when Gail Secor of Salt Spring tried to find out how much of the chemical had been found in the eggs, she was told the information was classified. The health authorities had said that only trace amounts of PCB were found in some eggs.

The Silver Maynes held a potluck supper and dance instead of a regular meeting. The members enjoyed a corn roast with the corn coming from gardens on the island. Music was supplied by Nancy Sutton while Herb Wilson and Frank Cooter led a sing-along.

The Women's Service Club of Saturna got together to choose a new executive. The new president would be Irene Lawson while Lil Cunningham would be vice-president. Other members of the executive included Connie Smith as secretary and Marie McMahon as sunshine convener. John Robertson would remain as treasurer.

The volunteer firefighters on Galiano were called to put out a fire. When the call came in, instructions were not clear and the firefighters had to search for the property. The fire was on the property of Frank Reader.

The Farmers' Institute on Salt Spring planned to build on 10 acres on Rainbow Road to house the fall fair. Al Gear, president of the institute approached the Gulf Islands School Board to find out if funding could be obtained to help cover some construction costs. The school trustees would check with the ministry for permission to move the agricultural program to the proposed site.

Salt Spring Strikers defeated Gordon Head 5-0 with goaltender Dave Cates getting the shutout. Goals came from Stuart Lyon with two, Erin Fewings, Brad Davies and Jeff Moger with one each.

A professional consultant would be hired by the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission to carry out a feasibility study on the proposed recreation centre in Ganges. The consultant would be paid by the Capital Region and the results would be used as the basis for a referendum on the matter.

are 596 children enrolled in elementary schools, the same as last September.

The new school at Fulford has 115 children enrolled with the largest number, 20, attending Grade 3.

The Salt Spring Elementary School in Ganges finds itself less crowded this year with 311 children enrolled. The largest grade is Grade 6 with 51 children. Last September there were 428 children at the Ganges school.

At Fernwood, there are 170 children compared to 168 registered last September. The Grade 1 children number 33 at Fernwood.

On the hill in Ganges, there are 356 students in Gulf Islands Secondary School. Last September there were 351 young people enrolled. The 83 students in Grade 9 are the largest group at the high school.

By the end of school in June, the enrolment at the high school had dropped to 333. The Grad 85 class, Grade 12, has 64 students enrolled.

Police investigate break-ins
