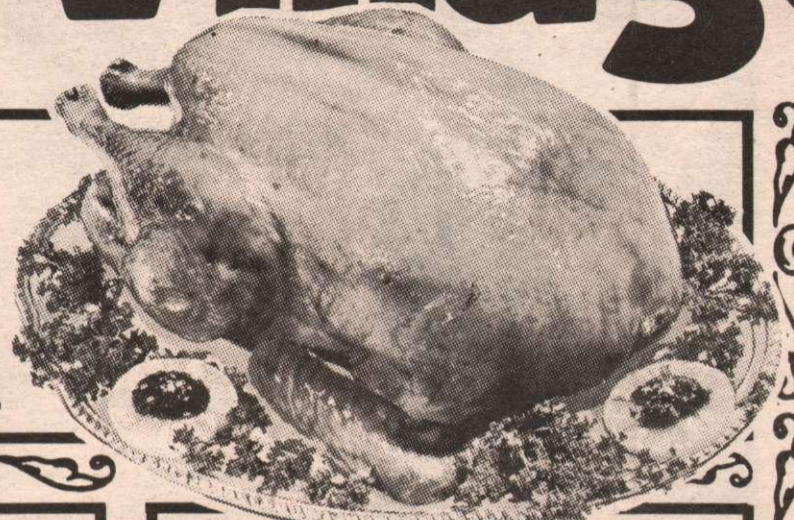

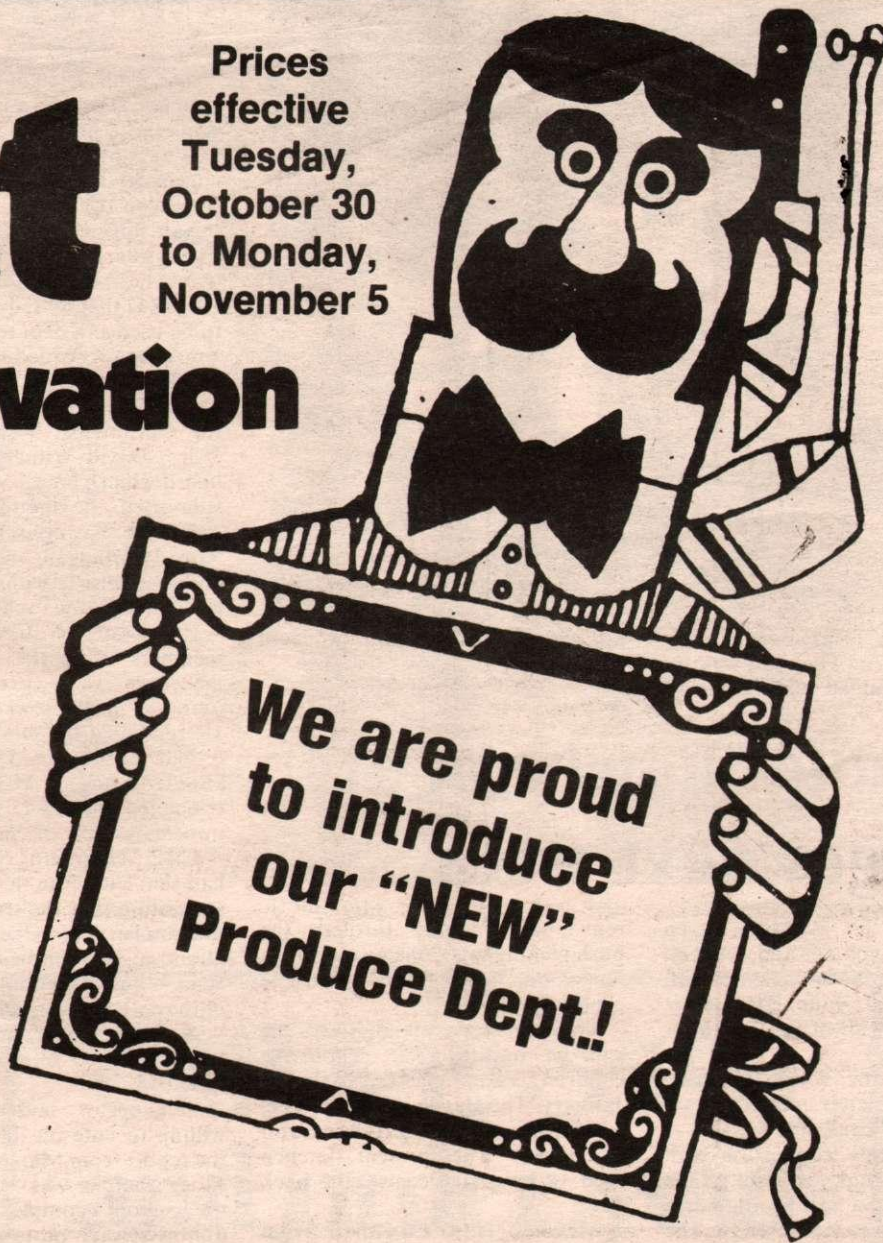

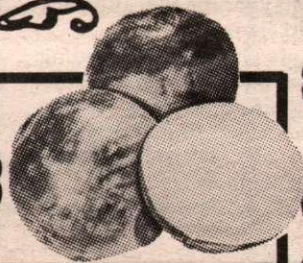

## Mendies luncheon at Ganges next week

"We from the Mendies Haven want to thank you one and all for all you have done for us, your interest, your love and your gifts. It is appreciated by all of us. God bless you one and all."

Those are the words of Betty Mendies in a letter received from Kathmandu, Nepal, this week.

Betty Mendies' connection with Salt Spring Island goes back to the early 70's when a Salt Spring nurse took a bus trip to Kathmandu. The nurse was the late Doris Anderson, who had just retired. A friend in England had asked her to look up the Mendies Haven as she was helping to pay for the education of a Tibetan girl there.

Anderson ended up spending Christmas at the Haven and was so impressed with the work of the Mendies on behalf of any destitute child that she opened a bank account for them at Ganges.

Many of Anderson's friends

remember trudging through the bush picking salal, one way in which Anderson raised money for the orphanage in Nepal.

This year Betty Mendies says she will be outfitting 55 school-age children when classes begin in January. The Haven is also building a dining room, kitchen and storeroom. The present kitchen used to be a stable near the back door.

Mendies is a Canadian from Hamilton, Ont., and has been in Nepal since 1953. Her husband and her son and his wife are all workers in the Haven, which has housed more than 200 children over the years.

Next week at Salt Spring Island a group of volunteers, many of them old friends of Doris Anderson, will hold a benefit luncheon for the Mendies Haven. It will be held at St. George's Hall Friday, Nov. 9 from 11:30 to 1:30, and the public is invited to attend.

## Sewer grant request awaiting report

The Gulf Islands School Board won't be acting on a Capital Region request for money for the Ganges sewer proposal until the superintendent of schools submits a report on the matter.

Salt Spring school trustee David Eyles introduced a motion which would have the school board inform the CRD that no request for money to be used as a debt retirement fund would be forwarded to the ministry of education.

When the matter went to a vote, the motion lost by a 5-3 margin. Eyles, David Williams and school board chairman Charles Hingston supported the motion. The other two Salt Spring school trustees, Ron McQuiggan and Bert Beitel, voted against it with support from the Outer Islands school trustees.

Beitel said he objected to board members using the school board meetings to express personal opinions on the sewer controversy. He reminded the school board that it had earlier voted to wait until superintendent Mike Marshall contacted the CRD to gain more information on the proposal.

CRD chairman Shirley Wilde had sent a letter to the school board suggesting that the trustees contact the ministry of education to talk about a grant-in-lieu-of-taxes for \$245,322 as the school board's share of the cost of constructing the sewer.

A similar request had gone to the board of Lady Minto Hospital for \$549,054.

McQuiggan said he was not willing to vote on the matter until the report from Marshall was in. He stated that he was "appalled" that the school complex in Ganges dumps sewage on to the beach but he urged the other trustees to keep all options open.

Williams replied that the CRD request was "inappropriate" and

that support for the motion would not close any options. He represents the school board on the Ganges Sewer Implementation Task Force.

Hingston said that the school board would go along with any system which was fair and equitable

but he did not think either the school board or the hospital should have to pay for the sewer through grants.

The report from Marshall is expected to be available for the November 15 school board meeting.

## Students were sick but it wasn't the cooking

Students and teachers in the home economics class at Gulf Islands Secondary School became ill but a check showed it wasn't the cooking.

The problem, which has been recurring for some time, resulted when fumes from the vocational wing seeped up the stairwell to the kitchen.

A barrier with a door has been put in place in the stairwell and health

officials have been called in to take readings of the air to assess the problem.

Supervisor of works for the school district, Frank Sutherland, reported to the school board last week that once the readings are available, he will know for sure if the problem has been corrected.

Costs of the barrier will be covered in the 1985 capital budget, he said.

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# Salt Spring Lions mark passage of 25 years

For a quarter of a century the Salt Spring Island Lions Club has played a significant part in the life and the development of the island.

On Friday evening the service club played host to about 110 people in Fulford Hall to mark the passage of 25 years of community participation.

Under the chairmanship of the club president, Santy Fuoco, the present members of the club, with former Lions, visitors and friends spent an evening recalling the events of a quarter-century.

Dinner was followed by an address from Gordon Smith, executive secretary of Lions District I-19.

Dancing followed to the music of Ray Newman and his musicians.

Charter president Hart Bradley, who headed the club during its first year of operation, was among the present members taking part in the ceremonies. Bill Trelford, first second vice-president, was present. He also is a member of the service club.

Director from the first year of the group and convener of the charter night program, Rod Pringle, was present. He is no longer a member of the club. Colin Mouat was a member of the club at the time of its charter and a director. He was not present at Friday's gathering for the fact that he was a patient in a Victoria hospital. Johnny Stepaniuk, a guest on Friday, was also a charter member.

In charge of the program on Friday were Ted and Daisy Gear, who made all the preparations for the anniversary dinner.

### SUMMARY OF 25 YEARS

Visitors were offered a summary of the activities of the club during its 25 years of operation.

The most ambitious project was the establishment of Pioneer Village in Ganges, providing accommodation for elderly citizens. Funding was through the senior governments, but the service club spent many months raising enough funds to meet the required level of participation by the community.

The provision of Pioneer Village and its administration and

maintenance programs have been so successful that the club members warmly supported the new housing project on Salt Spring. The Lions, in company with the Salt Spring Island Rotary Club and Royal Canadian Legion, are in the throes of building a second such provision for the elderly.

Notable among the service club's projects was the ambulance service which offered a prompt and efficient ambulance service for islanders at a cost of \$5 per year. This service was in operation until the provincial government introduced ambulance service on a province-wide scale.

### PORTLOCK PARK

In the realm of recreation, the Lions Club launched Portlock Park. The property at Central was acquired and cleared and levelled. It was subsequently completed by the community and named in honour of the late Tom Portlock, the club president who was the active sponsor of the recreation park.

The club has taken part in many community projects and its members have sponsored the visit of students from other lands. The mini-bus for the handicapped has been a big project on the island.

Lions of Salt Spring Island have sponsored Lions Clubs on Mayne Island and the Penders as well as co-sponsoring a club at Parksville.

At the charter night ceremonies in Mahon Hall on September 26, 1959, the Victoria Lions Club sponsored the new unit.

Island magistrate H. C. Noakes welcomed guests and Desmond Crofton reviewed the history of Salt Spring Island over the previous 100 years.

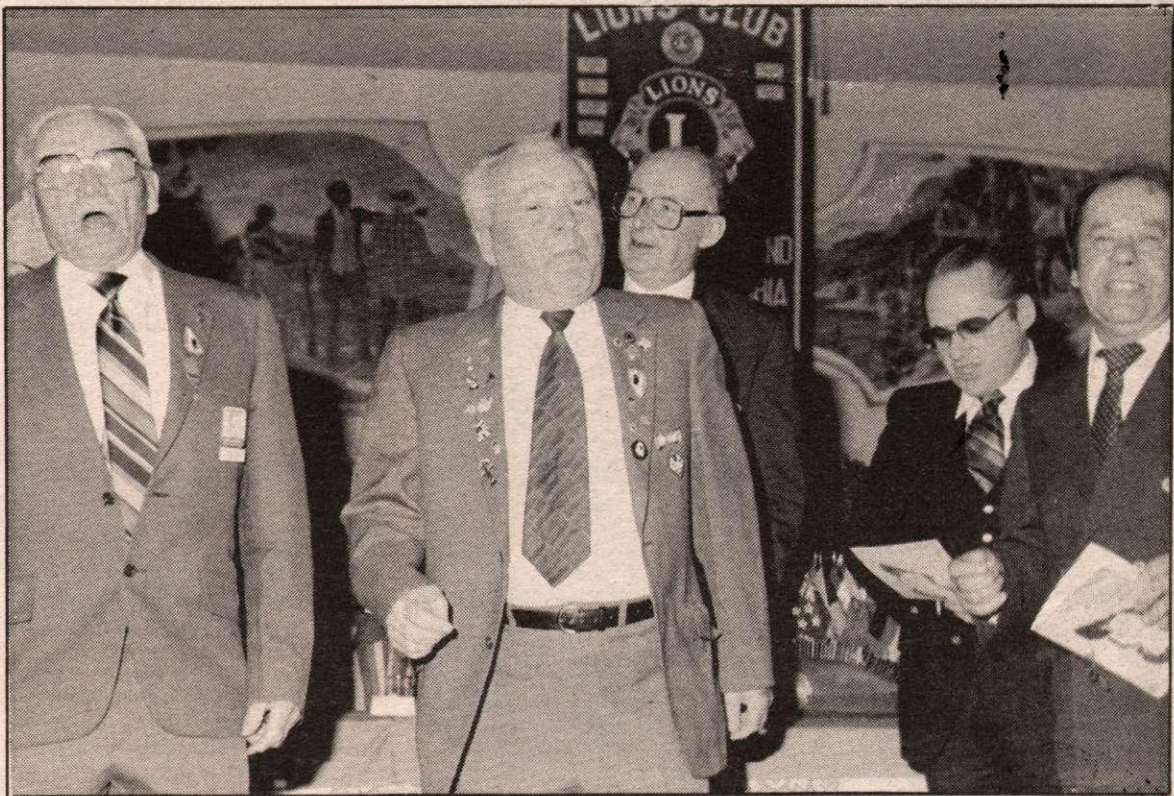
Entertainment was homemade.

## What was happening a quarter-century ago?

Twenty-five years ago the Salt Spring Island Lions Club came into being.

It is a quarter-century since the small group of Salt Spring Island men gathered in Mahon Hall to launch the successful new service club.

A glance at the headlines and catchlines of the period reveals something of the times they were living when the club was formed.

The most significant headline, to club members at that time, appeared in the *Sidney Review*, announcing: "Lions come in large numbers to Salt Spring as new club is established".

Beyond the islands, Egypt's President Nasser was feuding with the Israelis in the mid-East and John Diefenbaker was at peace in Sussex Drive. Defence minister was George Pearkes and Canada was still faithful to NATO, despite recent rumours.

The most significant feature of life in the province 25 years ago was the soaring price of commodities and property.

### NEW 5 1/4% BONDS

New offer of Canada Trust bonds yielded the impressive interest rate of 5 1/4%.

A three-bedroom home was offered for \$18,900. A Victoria

bungalow, two bedrooms, at \$6,975, or \$1,000 down and \$65 a month. To get over there you could pick up a 1956 Chevy or Ford for around \$1,500. If you were happy with an eight-year-old car you were looking at \$500 or \$600.

The handyman who decided to build his own bungalow could purchase plywood in 4 x 8 sheets, 5/16", \$2.15 up to 3/4" sanded for \$8.35 and up. He could keep warm with dry cedar at three cords for \$5; fir was around \$4 a cord. It was mostly mill slabs at that price and not on the islands.

Furnishing that expensive bungalow? You could buy a maple dining suite for \$250 or a chesterfield and chair for \$350. Make it a three-piece and the price went up to about \$500.

### LOOK AT THESE!

Eating cost. Frying chicken, 35 cents a pound. Bacon, 58 cents a pound and sausages, 45 cents the pound. Margarine was 20 to 25 cents a pound.

The Canadian government was looking for a chemist or physicist at \$7,500 to \$8,500 a year and an airport traffic supervisor at \$6,500 to \$7,200. A veterinarian? \$5,400 to \$6,200. That's what the first island Lions were thinking about, 25 years ago.

potatoes in his garden this year and delivered them to the Driftwood office believing they were worth a photograph. They were.

## Commission faces reduced funds

Lower assessments for Salt Spring properties could pose problems for the Parks and Recreation Commission budget for next year.

The commission's budget is based on a one-mill levy on Salt Spring Island plus a one-mill levy in the Salt Spring electoral area.

The CRD finance people told commission chairman Glenn Woodley that one mill in the electoral area will generate \$36,690 next year compared to \$38,230 for this year.

For the island specified area the mill will generate \$31,920 while for this year it produced \$39,980.

### Seatbelt safety

Seat belts make a lifesaving difference. ICBC estimates that the use of seat belts helps reduce the chances of serious or fatal injuries up to 60% in really serious accidents.

The difference is \$9,600 less for next year. The combined mills would give the commission \$68,610. For this year the budget was based on the two mills producing \$78,210.

The commission will be meeting November 12 to talk about the budget for next year. The preliminary budget must be submitted to the Capital Region by November 16.

Commission treasurer Edith Sacker said, "If the budget is cut that drastically, we really can't function."

The commission decided that such areas as community grants and completion of the Fulford tennis court could not be touched. The members will look at other areas to see where cuts can be made.

The two-mill levy is set by letters patent of the commission and cannot be changed except with the approval of the residents of the island through referendum.

## Board preparing bus policy

The Gulf Islands School Board is developing a bus policy and a draft copy of the proposal was given to the trustees at the board meeting last week.

Ron McQuiggan, school trustee for Salt Spring, had compiled the policy from several sources and told the meeting that the paper was only a starting point. He will check with the bus staff and others to develop a concise policy for consideration by the school trustees at the board meeting in December, he said.

The policy states: "School bus routes may be established by the board where there are an adequate number of students to use this service...."

The policy is subject to provisions of the School Act and its regulations as well as the availability of money, McQuiggan noted.

The routes will be established where certain conditions can be met. The roads must be judged safe by the ministry of highways and the supervisor of works for the school district. The roads must be at least 18 feet between ditches to allow buses to pass other large vehicles.

In addition the roads must be paved or have good gravel surfaces and visibility, particularly at stops and turn-arounds, must be good.

The bus runs will be started or extended for not less than 15 children.

Walk limits, as set by the province of four kilometres for children in Grades 1 to 3 and 4.8 km for those children in Grades 4 to 12, will govern the situation.

If the buses become overcrowded, the children living closest to the school shall be bumped.

If parents of children living beyond the walk limits want to transport the pupils to and from school on their own, transportation assistance could be available.

The principal of the school that the child attends will supply a form for the parents to fill out and the school board office will apply for approval from the ministry of education for the assistance to be paid.

The bus policy procedure also outlines daily safety checks which the bus drivers should carry out.

The final section contains

procedures for disciplinary action.

The driver cannot tell a child not to use the bus. The authority for refusing permission for use of the bus because of misbehaviour or where the safety and well-being of other occupants of the bus are involved is vested in the principal of the school in conjunction with the supervisor of works or the secretary-

treasurer of the school district.

Copies of the policy and procedures can be seen at the school board office.

McQuiggan said he would welcome any comment on the matter to allow the school board to formulate a policy and set of procedures for the operation of school buses in the Gulf Islands.



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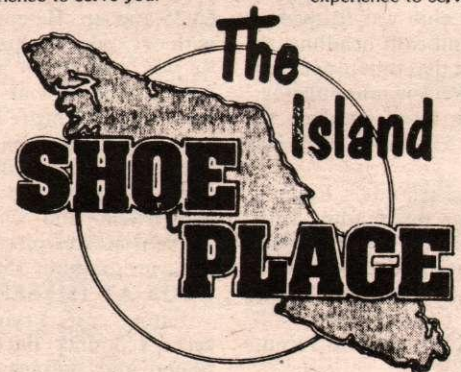
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# For the first time, something starting to make sense

To return briefly to our example of the astronomical proliferation of the lacto bacillus in the making of yogurt, as an indication of the dynamics of life, one important point slipped my mind. Faced with the fact that one lacto bacillus can have 64 billion offspring in four hours, my mind must have simply capitulated unconditionally to the evidence of such overwhelming fecundity.

Think as I may, I cannot fathom any other reason for its lapse, or for its subsequent two-week recovery period. Even now I am not too sure that 1 trillion, 920 billion divided by 30 billion comes to 64 billion, and I am not going to pursue it any further either.

The lacto bacillus is by no means the only example of the dynamics of life. The Canadian thistle can easily produce three million seeds in one year, and after two years this would result, if I am correct, in nine trillion thistles, as our thistle-weary farmers well know. And an item in last week's *Driftwood* informed us that one pair of rats can produce 3,500,000 offspring in three years. This is the potential of life, and the underlying fact of von Bertalanffy's recognition that all life is dynamic, rather than homeostatic, a belief that has clouded our perception of our circumstances until recently.

### IMPERFECT CONDITIONS

That one thistle does not produce nine trillion thistles in two seasons is entirely due to the lack of perfect conditions. But, as in the making of yogurt, we can provide perfect conditions for the growing of our crops, if not for rats. And although beans for instance are not nearly as prolific as rats or bacilli, they nevertheless depend upon nitrogen-fixing bacterial colleagues of our bacilli, with the same rate of proliferation.

Furthermore, this nitrogen is freely available from our air, free of charge nitrogen which cannot be exhausted, as it is only temporarily contained in living structures. Most of the nitrogen we eat is returned to the soil within a few days at best, if

we choose to do so, instead of dumping it in the ocean where it is lost to us.

The portion which is retained in our bodies, is also returned whence it came, with our bodies, to enter the cycle of life anew. The same holds true for all the elements, trace elements, and nutrients, as well as for water, oxygen and carbon dioxide.

### CLOSED SYSTEM

We have our existence in an essentially closed system, other than the matter we eject into space, with a constant influx of energy from the sun. Most of the energy we receive from the sun is retained and stored in living structures, the oceans and the land masses of the Earth, only free living blue-green algae in oceans or in soils, and the related chloroplasts in plant life, can convert the sun's energy into life energy. All of life is therefore totally dependent upon plant and algae life, either directly or indirectly. This is the basic outline of the source and the mechanism of the dynamics of life, and the comparison to a pot of milk filled with life and sitting on a heat source differs only, as far as we are concerned, in the scales of size and time. The principles are exactly the same.

The steady push of energy is, incidentally, also the source of the increasing complexity of life forms, and hence, of our very existence. Thus our planetary environment is not only dynamic, but moreover, constructively dynamic. This has several quite profound implications for us. The first one is that with our intelligent co-operation with the constructive dynamics of our biosphere, we can have health and abundance beyond our wildest imagination.

### DESTRUCTIVE DYNAMICS

The second one is that we can, and have, introduced destructive dynamics into our biosphere which,

driven by the same energy from our sun, can lead to rapidly spiralling deterioration of our base of life. Unfortunately, we are rapidly accumulating more and more evidence of this our folly all over the place. That we can introduce destructive dynamics into our biosphere has several profound implications as well. The first one is that we, individually and collectively, are the active agents of the dynamics of our situation, and hence, that we determine, however unwittingly, the condition of our planetary environment. We are even

more actively creative agents of our social environments, and thus, the authors of our social realities. As with all things on this beautiful Earth of ours, everything is interrelated, and as agriculture has its effect on our well being and on our economics—our economics influence our well being and our politics—our politics, in turn, influence our well being and our agriculture.

I believe that we have all become sufficiently aware of this, especially most recently, on all three levels, those of agriculture, economics, and politics. The remaining point to emerge out of this brief consideration of the nature of

dynamics, and of our active complicity in these matters, is the fact that as individuals we determine our collective reality, and hence, that we can change it. To be quite honest, I am rather excited about all this.

For the first time in the history of mankind, something is starting to make sense, and we can thank none other than good old Ludwig von Bertalanffy for this. Ludwig, by the way, is a beautiful example that one individual can make all the difference in the world. His proof of the dynamic nature of all biological systems is changing our concepts of literally everything, as may be apparent in all of the above.

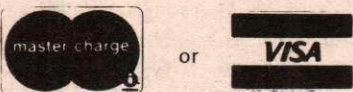

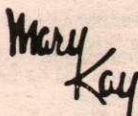

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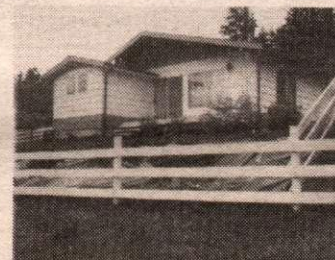

grandparents, the Henry (Scotty) Georgesons, at Active Pass Lighthouse on Mayne Island. From there he attended school and did some logging around the coast.

He earned the title of "Tuffie" when he was quite young, and it stuck with him for the rest of his life.

In 1915 he went to Victoria to join the Canadian Expeditionary Forces, 103rd Battalion, and then transferred to the "Fighting 29'ers" Tobans Tigers in England.

He lost a leg in fierce battle in France, and was left for some time before being taken to hospital. He was awarded the Military Medal for his exemplary service. Even though he suffered many more operations on that leg, he always kept his cheerful countenance, and overcame his disability with quiet determination.

After coming home to Canada, he worked as a boatbuilder with Turner Boat Works in Vancouver. He loved music, and was soon in demand for his authoritative voice as floor manager for dances, and to call square dances. When he married in about 1926, he and his wife lived in Vancouver, and then brought son George to Galiano as a small baby in 1930. They moved in 1968 to Langford, then settled at Sidney for about 14 years.

After George became too ill to stay alone, he was moved to Greenwoods. His wife Janet predeceased him in 1983. He is survived by his only son, George, and wife Rosemary, at Galiano; three grandsons, Gordon, John and

Stuart; one granddaughter, Rosemary; three great-grandchildren; his sister-in-law, Annis, and John Georgeson in Surrey, two step-children, many cousins and other relatives.

George was a member of the Salt Spring, Gulf Islands and Sidney branches of the Royal Canadian Legion.

There was no funeral service by request of the family. Flowers are declined, but donations may be made to Galiano School Memorial Fund, c/o Mrs. F. Robson, Galiano. A memorial reception will be held on Galiano at Galiano Lodge on Saturday from 2 to 4 pm.

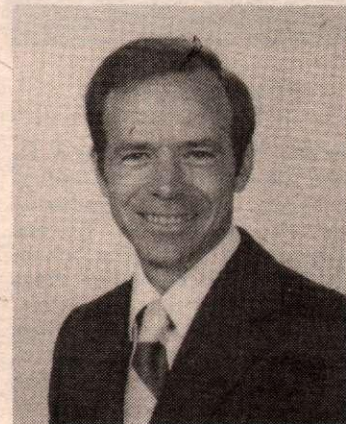

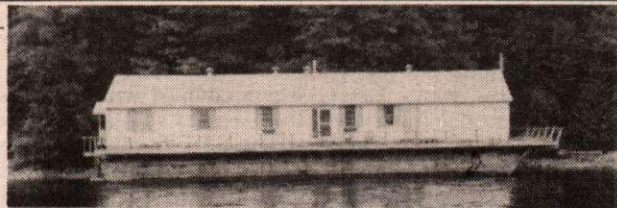

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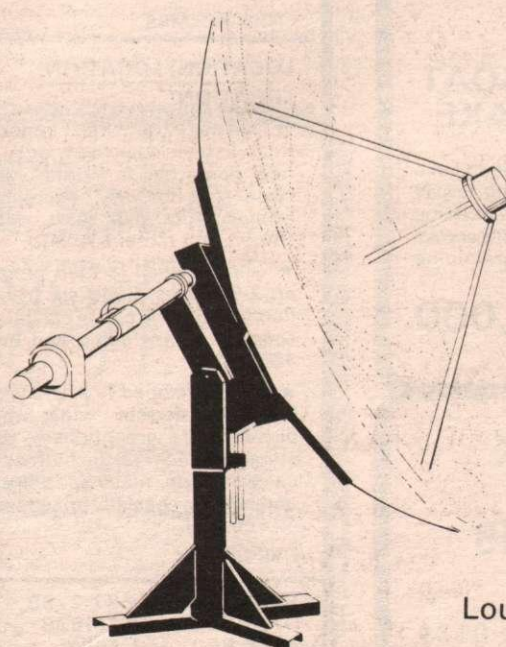
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# Wranglers down Lakers 7-1

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## GALIANO NEWS

# School board chairman given the run-around

The Gulf Islands School Board met in the gym of Galiano School at 12:30 pm last Thursday. The trustees, augmented by staff and representatives, outnumbered the audience by more than two to one, even if one includes in the latter two teachers and five pupils. The presence of a reporter from Ganges allowed the attending columnist's spouse the opportunity to pick out the high and low lights for comment.

Board chairman Charles Hingston had literally been given the run-around on Galiano. The previous evening he had been taken on a vigorous road run by teacher John Edwards, and at Thursday noon he had accompanied the Galiano pupils and staff on their weekly run through Whaler Bay Heights, Gardner Road and back to the school along Sturdies Bay Road. He arrived at the meeting in his track suit, short of breath and nourishment. A very refreshing chairman.

Items of particular interest to Galiano residents were the putting on the market of the Galiano teacherage for a price of \$49,000. The sale will be handled by Salt Spring Lands. There is little chance of the septic field for the activity centre being installed in the near future for, although the expenditure had been approved, the ministry of education will not advance the necessary funds. Instead some of the budgeted money will be used to finance the completion of the Fulford School, although some will be retained in the Galiano account in case permission is given to proceed.

Although the health inspector has condemned the Galiano School septic field, the ministry will probably only install on an emergency basis a small new field rated for 50 users, the present enrolment of the school. This would not allow the activity centre to install toilets for public use and tie in to the new field.

No board meeting would be complete without some discussion of the Ganges sewer. Apparently the odorous matter can even be detected in Edmonton as a letter was read from a resident of that city telling the board not to contribute money to its construction. Should the board decide to commit capital funds to the project, the Outer Islands can at last become financially involved in this exciting endeavour. Of course the Outer Islands have been physically involved for years as the handful of secondary students sent daily to Ganges doubtless contribute their few drops to the buckets that enrich the waters of Ganges Harbour.

After representation from the Galiano Parents Association the board agreed to provide a plaque acknowledging the donation of 15.9 acres for the Galiano School site by Fred and Margaret Robson. As this event took place nearly 35 years ago the action might be described as a trifle tardy, but better late than never. Incidentally every school site on Galiano, and there were at least four, was donated and not purchased.

The involvement of Fred and Margaret Robson with community affairs on Galiano would fill a book which we hope Margaret will one day write. The incident referred to above occurred in 1951 when the school was located where Galiano Trading and Small World now are. Despite improvements the school building at that site was becoming

more and more unsatisfactory.

The school board at that time offered to build a new school if the islanders would provide a site. Fred and Margaret decided to donate the 15.9 acres that make up the present school site including the former Centennial Park. A school was constructed and completed in 1952, although the legal transfer had not been completed. However, the Robsons decided they had no use for a school on their property so the title deed was duly registered in the board's name.

Fred remarks that at that time it was the custom for islanders to do as much as possible for themselves and not wait for permits and other legal trifles. As the Robsons recall no acknowledgement of this valuable donation was made at the time, so the board is now acting to remedy this omission.

### Activity Centre Society

Residents of Galiano evidently believe, now that the Activity Centre is complete and in use, that the Activity Centre Society no longer needs their support. This is far from being the case. There are many improvements still needed, the major one being toilet facilities for public use. The meeting room, kitchen and a store-room are community property and the society is responsible for their cleaning and maintenance.

Equipment and kitchen supplies must be provided, replaced or repaired as required. The executive of the society have accepted these responsibilities on behalf of the community.

At the annual meeting of the society held in the gym on Saturday, only 14 people turned up to lend their support to the society and thank the directors for all the work they have done in the past year.

Activities include archery, badminton, carpet bowling, dance, drawing, floor hockey, and keep-fit; the meeting room is used by the Chamber of Commerce, the APC and the Historical Society, and other small groups.

Treasurer Linda Simpson reported that the society had a balance of \$3,092.

With some difficulty a slate of officers was obtained and elected by acclamation. President is Jim Macdonald, Elizabeth Ocsko vice-president, Linda Simpson treasurer, Basil Benger secretary, with Jackie Besler, Cathie Buttery, Mike Hoebel, Patti Rudolph, Bill Scoones and Les Woodbridge as directors.

### Art Auction

The magnificent total of \$2,363 was realized by the auction of over 60 objets d'art precious, semi-precious and humorous last Thursday in aid of a Heart Machine for Galiano. Auctioneers Finnis and Hooley presided on behalf of entrepreneur Anny Bobak for a three-hour session over an amazing variety of lots ranging from a delicate Elisabeth Hopkins watercolour to an hour's service

from a large green punk Iroquois.

Anny wishes to thank all who contributed either goods or money and especially Betty Steward who kept the score, the auctioneers, and the artist-donors.

### Weavers and Spinners

On October 18, members of the Galiano Weavers Guild were given a day-long workshop on the art of making felt by Isabel Tipton of Victoria. Most people who have owned wool sweaters have inadvertently created this fabric at one time or another through careless handling of the garment while washing, so that it was rather surprising to find that it requires considerable hard work and perseverance to deliberately create a piece of felt.

Starting with carded batts of raw wool, which were layered three deep, colour accents of homespun wool were randomly placed on the top layer, and the wool was quilted between squares of muslin. Then for

several hours the quilted pads were alternately dunked in hot water, rolled in bamboo beach mats, and "danced" on until cold; then back to the hot water again. As all this activity was taking place on the lawn at Fern Stewart's home on Active Pass, there may have been reports of some strange sightings by the passengers of passing ferries.

When the batts were finally judged to be ready, and the muslin coverings were removed, it was intriguing to see how the coloured trimmings had become embedded in the felted wool.

The rector of the Salt Spring parish, Rev. S. J. Leech, would be moving to Alberni in mid-November to take charge of the parish of All Saints there.

The two juveniles who had broken into several homes on Pender and Mayne Islands appeared before Magistrate Ashby in Ganges court and were sentenced to a term at Brannon Lake School. The stolen goods had been partially recovered and the boys were ordered to make restitution.

The training ketch H.M.C.S. Oriole visited Ganges. The 90-foot sailboat was used by the navy to teach seamanship and carried a crew of 14 men plus the captain. The vessel had 14,000 square feet of sail.

## Fifteen Years Ago

The cabbage weighed 23 pounds and fed the patients at Lady Minto Hospital. Mr. Kennet had grown the large vegetable in his Salt Spring garden. He explained that only about a half dozen of his cabbages weighed more than 20 lbs. with the average being around 10 lbs.

The proposed new school on Salt Spring would be built at Central. George Heinekey explained that a study of the population trend on the island showed the greater growth at the north end. The 10-room school would ease crowded conditions at the Ganges school.

Elections were approaching. P. A. Frattinger would not seek re-election to the school board for north Salt Spring. George Heinekey would be running again. R. M. Patterson was stepping aside as school trustee for south Salt Spring.

Jim Campbell of Saturna would seek re-election but Elizabeth Ross of Mayne was undecided.

At the Capital Region level, Doug Cavaye of Salt Spring would not seek another term but Joan Purchase of Mayne, representing the Outer Islands, would be asking for voter approval again.

Papajohn did not report from Saturna because he was visiting Vancouver. Granmarie filled in for him and reported that the fund for the volunteer fire department was growing and they expected to fill the fund by the end of the year. Even the cottagers were chipping in to help, she reported.

A committee was chosen at Galiano Island to plan for the centennial celebration on that island. Basil Bengier was selected as chairman with Mrs. F. Robson as vice-chairman. Jean Lockwood would be secretary and Bud Day would be treasurer.

## Ten Years Ago

Elections in the Gulf Islands would feature 30 candidates for 15 seats on the school board and the Islands Trust. School board elections would take place on Pender and Salt Spring Islands. Claire McAllister of Galiano won acclamation to the school board. Each of the six larger islands would elect two representatives to the Islands Trust.

Hugh Curtis, MLA for Saanich and the Islands, announced that he would be sitting as a Social Credit. He had been elected as a Progressive Conservative. He had been mayor of Saanich and chairman of the Capital Region before being elected as MLA.

The Gulf Islands School Board trustees would receive a 666.6% raise in pay. They had been receiving \$300 per year but would be getting \$2,000.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that the fire department would be putting on the annual pig barbecue in the Community Hall. Refreshments would be served at 5 pm with the dinner beginning at 6 pm. The pig, he reported, was being fed carefully to ensure that it was succulent when the feast began.

The Bowen Queen was being taken off the Fulford-Swartz Bay run and put in service at Bowen Island. The Pender Queen and the Salt Spring Queen would combine to take care of traffic to and from Salt Spring.

Motocross was becoming a popular sport on Salt Spring. Norman Twa finished fifth in the B.

C. championships. Don Irwin was second in the old-timers' race at Mission while Ron Spencer was first in the United Appeal race.

Two artists from Galiano were holding a show in Victoria. Richard Hawbolt was displaying his pottery while Shari Street was showing photographs.

## Five Years Ago

Election for school trustee would take place on Saturna Island where Tom Davidson was being challenged by Carol-Lynn Fisker and Jonathan Guy. On Salt Spring, incumbent David Stacey and newcomers Strick Aust and Mary Williamson were elected by acclamation.

Other elections in the Gulf Islands included a race for Islands Trust on Mayne, where Isabel Geehan had resigned. Joan Sprague and George Douglas were after the seat for a one-year term. The Capital Region elections featured Mike Clement and Yvette Valcourt on Salt Spring while Jim Campbell faced Vern Roddick and Weldon Pinchin in the Outer Islands.

The director of pollution control had called a two-day public hearing in Ganges to listen to appeals against the sewer permit. The permit had been issued and 12 people had filed protests against it.

The ferry wharf at Village Bay on Mayne Island would be twinned. Frank Ramsay of B. C. Ferries told a meeting on Mayne. He was on the island to explain plans the ferry company had for expanding the facilities at Village Bay to ease the load on the Mayne Queen. The larger wharf would allow such big boats as the Queen of Alberni to stop there on the Tsawwassen-Swartz Bay run, he said.

Foxglove Farm on Salt Spring would urge government officials to check chickens on the island to determine how much polychlorinated biphenyls (PCB's) were in the meat. Traces of the chemical had been found in eggs on the island and concerns that the birds contained the toxic PCB's were high.

Mahon Hall should be a heritage building, said members of the Community Arts Council. Josie Clement, vice-president of the CAC, said the Gulf Islands School Board, which owns the building, had approved the idea. Officials of the heritage conservation branch had inspected the building and had agreed that an application should be made.

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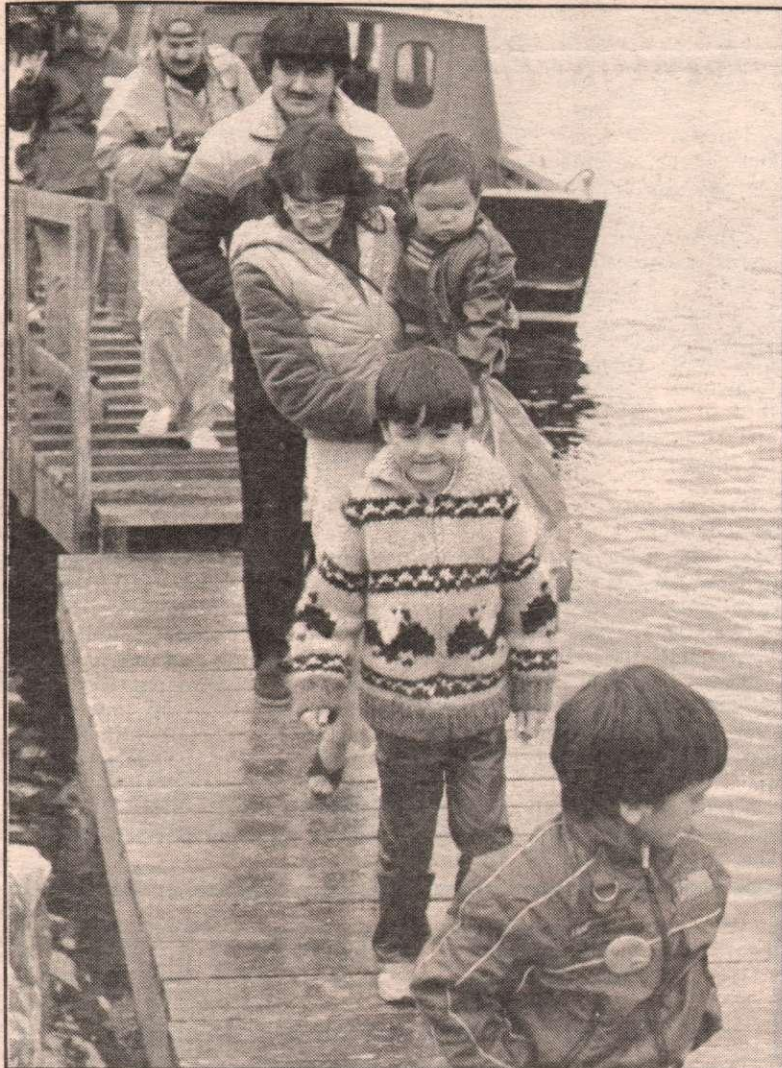

is no provision for election of members. They are appointed by the CRD board on recommendation from the director.

He also noted that there is no other parks and recreation commission in the CRD which holds elections of members.

Each of the four remaining members was elected to the commission for the first time last year.

Fewings operates Eunola Ice Cream and while she has established the business in a permanent location in Ganges, she also operates a truck selling ice cream during the week in the park.

Hall has stated that one of the reasons he was on the commission was because of the Farmers' Market and the mid-week vending issue. He has called for mid-week vending for local farmers and fishermen.

Borsman said that he had no criticism of any member on the commission.

"We just can't take a chance that vending will become the issue of 1985," he said.

Borsman asks that people interested in the recreational aspect of the commission submit their names to the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission, Box 197, Ganges.

He will make the selection of six people by the next meeting of the commission, he said.

day. The voter must have resided in the Gulf Islands for three months, B.C. for six months and in Canada for at least one year before election day.

The other stipulation is that the voter must be a Canadian citizen or a citizen of the British Commonwealth.

If one's name is not on the list, the voter can, upon proof of residence and qualification, register for a vote at the poll on election day.

The preliminary voters' list for Salt Spring shows 4,193 registered voters while the list for the Outer Islands contains 2,161 names.
