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Ritchie threatens abolition

Trust to meet with two ministers

Islands Trust will meet with two cabinet ministers in the near future in order to discuss planning developments in the islands.

On Monday Bill Ritchie, minister of municipal affairs, announced that he and the MLA for Saanich and the Islands, Finance Minister Hugh Curtis, will meet with the Trust as soon as the meeting can be arranged.

The Islands Trust has expressed some concern over changes in planning procedures. When the

Trust council met on North Pender Island earlier in the fall Trust members expressed puzzlement over ministerial rejection of planning proposals without explanation.

CONFORM OR GO!

On Friday Ritchie stated that the Islands Trust would be abolished if it did not co-operate in an easing of development controls in the islands.

Humphries promptly asked what the minister wanted of the Trust. He stated that trustees were not clear as

to what co-operation was being asked of them.

The chairman of the Islands Trust was not confident that the elimination of the Trust would resolve the question of loosening up procedures.

Community plans and bylaws are the expression of community wishes, said Humphries. These expressions are being made through the Islands Trust, but the same concerns would be expressed through any other planning agency.

SEEK MEETING

In September the Trust council heard of the minister's rejection of the Lasqueti Island community plan revision. Trustees agreed to ask for a meeting with the two ministers.

For several years the Islands Trust has been under attack by the provincial government. It is the only regional form of administration solely concerned with land use control. It is also the only provincial function charged primarily with the preservation of the environment.

Bylaw too restrictive, Trust committee told

The bylaw to limit tourist accommodation development on Salt Spring will be looked at again before more action is taken.

The Salt Spring Island Trust Committee held a public hearing on the bylaw last week and heard from two concerns that the proposal was too restrictive.

Maracaibo Estates on Long Harbour sent a submission telling the committee that limiting the maximum floor area for units to 93 square metres (1,000 square feet) would interfere with their plans.

The people who would stay at the planned accommodation at Maracaibo would expect units of a minimum of 1,200 square feet.

On the other hand the owners of the Last Resort on North Beach Road said that restricting the size of units as well as the number of units per acre causes problems for resort owners from both sides of the bylaw.

The Trust staff had used a 1978 report from the ministry of tourism to determine the ideal size of the accommodation but a more recent report is available which suggests

larger units for tourist accommodation.

The staff was instructed to obtain a copy of that report to determine if it could be adopted for Salt Spring.

Another suggestion to limit the minimum size to 400 sq. ft. met with opposition from Trust vice-chairman John Rich of Bowen Island. He said that to adopt that figure for a minimum floor area would render the Harbour House Hotel as non-conforming.

The figures had been drawn up by staff to ensure that no tourist facility on the island became non-conforming under the bylaw.

Gordon Wallace, also of the General Trust and representative from North Pender Island, said the provisions of the bylaw were much more liberal than the bylaw on the Penders or the one proposed for Mayne Island.

Following the public hearing, the Trust committee gave the bylaw second reading and sent it back to staff for a check against the more recent standards of the tourist ministry.

African children to perform

A choir of 31 East African children will perform at Ganges United Church on Monday at 7.30 pm.

The children, aged 6 to 12 years, are on a tour sponsored by Ambassadors of Aid, a Vancouver-based group of ministers working to help people in disaster areas.

The children are from Uganda and the purpose of their tour is to focus attention on their homeland.

Keep wharf public—Trust

The wharf and bay at Musgrave Landing should be maintained for the use of the public, said the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee last week.

The response came out of talks about a letter to the committee from W. Parkinson, regional manager of the small craft harbours branch.

Parkinson wrote, "The subdivision developer has indicated an interest in either joint use of the public structure (the wharf) or taking it over for use by the subdivision, with some safeguards for public use."

The Trust committee decided to voice its opposition to both suggestions, by writing to Parkinson with a copy being sent to MP Jim Manly.

Parkinson noted that the wharf is maintained as a temporary landing facility for transient boats. The wharf is in disrepair and has been partially closed to limit access to pedestrians only.

He went on to say that he would oppose the developer's request

"unless there was considerable local support" for the idea.

The Trust committee will also urge that the water lease for the public wharf be increased. The small bay could be taken over by the developer which would limit access by the public.

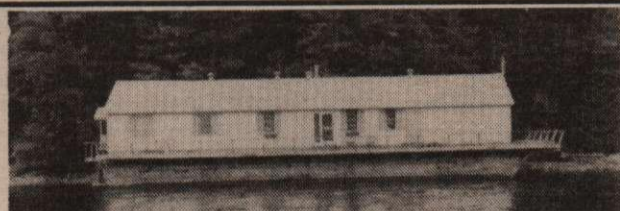
The wharf is only one of two places for boats to tie up on that part of Salt Spring. Other than Burgoyne Bay, there is no public facility between Fulford Harbour and Vesuvius Bay.

Flags return

The four flags, a Canadian, a Remembrance Day and two British Columbian, went missing from Centennial Park in Ganges.

The flags were reported missing Saturday.

But by Tuesday morning, they had returned to their accustomed position at the top of the flag poles. No explanation of the disappearance or return was available.

Man of many talents

His many friends will be saddened by the death of Alfred Howell last Thursday. Alf, as he was affectionately known, was a man of many talents: boatbuilder, sailor, artist, musician, actor, agriculturalist and winemaker.

He was born in 1900 in Aldershot, England of an army family. He attended the Agricultural College in Dublin, Ireland, and emigrated to Canada in 1920 where he farmed in Saskatchewan for six years. He then attended Normal School and taught for one year.

He served in the Canadian Army with the Westminster Regiment and in the Allied Military Government from 1939 until 1945. He saw service in Belgium, Holland and Germany with the rank of captain.

On his return to Canada at the end of the war Alf was employed by the department of veterans' affairs until his retirement in 1965. He and his wife Margaret arrived on Salt Spring Island in 1970, where both became involved in community activities with great enthusiasm. Alf took part seven times in the round-the-island yacht race, sometimes as a crew member, sometimes on his own *Scarlet Runner*, a ferro-cement boat, one of five boats he built.

He was a skilful artist in pen and ink drawings, mainly of ships and

maritime themes.

He had many years experience as a choir leader and up until his death was an active member of St. Mark's Choir on Salt Spring Island.

Alf will be especially remembered for the many roles he portrayed on stage on Salt Spring, particularly Scrooge in Dickens' *Christmas Carol* which became almost an annual event. In 1975 he won best supporting actor award at the B.C. Drama Festival for his part as the king in Joan Raeside's *Princess and the Buton*. He appeared in many other theatrical productions on Salt Spring including *Fiddler on the Roof*, *My Fair Lady* as well as a dual role in Joan Raeside's *Fourth Wise Man*.

Alf won several first prizes at the agricultural fair for his wine, some of which was certainly innovative, being created mainly from vegetables in his garden. The most unusual was a dry white wine made from peapods!

Because of his lifelong association and love of his church his wish was that in lieu of flowers donations might be made to a fund to provide a suitable altar for St. Mark's Church.

Funeral service was held Monday at St. Mark's Church, with interment at the Anglican Memorial Cemetery.

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Duplex no threat—commission

A duplex on agricultural land in the Fulford Valley on Salt Spring is of no concern to the Agricultural Land Commission so the Islands Trust will check its own bylaws to determine if anything can be done.

The Islands Trust had written to the Agricultural Land Commission about the duplex which sits on farm property owned by Texada Logging. The Trust wanted to know, with both units of the duplex being rented and no farming taking

place, if the duplex went against the zoning bylaws.

M. F. Clarke, chairman of the commission, wrote a letter to the Trust explaining the position.

"Our investigation of this infraction reveals no major concern as we feel the location of the duplex poses no major threat on the Agricultural Land Reserve," Clarke wrote.

He suggested that the Islands Trust proceed under its zoning bylaws if the duplex appears to be inappropriate.

However, the staff of the Islands Trust noted that the duplex, if the Land Commission shows no concern, does not contravene the

zoning bylaw. Under Section 13 of the bylaw, which covers agricultural land, permitted uses include one residence as well as additional dwelling units consistent with farm use.

The section is subject to relevant orders governing agricultural land "subject to the approval by the provincial Agricultural Land Commission in every case."

The Islands Trust committee decided to have staff check the bylaw to determine if it is strong enough and to check the legal position of the Trust in the matter.

The property in question sits on the south side of Fulford-Ganges Road near Jones Road.

Accidents follow snowfall

When the snow fell, accidents followed on island roads.

By the time the snow, which began falling in the early hours of November 1, had melted, Ganges RCMP had investigated four accidents with many more of the unreportable kind scattered about.

An RCMP spokesman suggested that the next time the snow falls, drivers not drive unless the vehicle is equipped with either snow tires, all-season radials or studded tires.

Summer tires should be avoided at this time of year, said the spokesman.

Weight alone won't do it. A large dump truck met grief on Ganges Hill during the snowfall. It hit the ditch and skidded down an embankment. There was no tow truck on Salt Spring large enough to pull the big truck out.

It was not damaged and no report was made to RCMP but they kept an eye on it and reported it in its resting position as late as Tuesday morning.

Minister making threatening noises at Islands Trust

Ten years ago the provincial government established the Islands Trust to preserve and protect the Gulf Islands and its unique environment and amenities for the benefit of the residents both of the Trust area and the province generally. Residents were encouraged to formulate orderly development of their particular island by hammering our community plans through committees and democratic approval. Galiano's plan was one of the first to be produced, at the cost of much time and thought.

According to last Friday's Victoria Times-Colonist Municipal Affairs Minister Bill Ritchie is making threatening noises at the Islands Trust, telling it to co-operate or else. He seems to regard the Trust as a group of 26 people bent on frustrating the development of the Gulf Islands. Does it not occur to the minister that the majority of electors in the Trust area agree with the Trust's mandate and might consider planning to be the most reasonable and democratic way to preserve and protect the islands? It might be considered that Ritchie is using his superior power to bully Gulf Islanders into accepting development which they deem harmful to the concept of conservation.

Is it not possible that the best interests of British Columbians, whether resident on or visitor to the Gulf Islands, might be served by improving access and services but not by proliferating subdivisions which inhibit public enjoyment of this most beautiful area? And whose interests is Bill Ritchie serving with his threats?

It is especially important at this time that readers who are concerned at threatened developments make their views known to their elected

representatives at both the municipal and provincial level by means of phone calls or letters. Galiano electors will have an opportunity to question candidates for Islands Trust at all candidates meetings sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce at the South Community Hall on Thursday at 7.30 pm, or at the North Galiano Community Hall on the following Thursday, Nov. 15 at the same time.

Polling is on Saturday, Nov. 17 at Galiano School between 8 am. and 8 pm.

Pools Paradise

It is the usual practice to review a play after the critic has seen a performance. Good reviews generally encourage attendance and ensure a long run. For the next production of Galiano Players, *Pools Paradise*, this procedure is ineffective as with only two performances the play would be over before a *Driftwood* drama critic could praise or condemn the play.

predicting the results of soccer games. Although extremely popular in Britain for more than 50 years, the Canadian equivalent sports pool failed after only a few months.

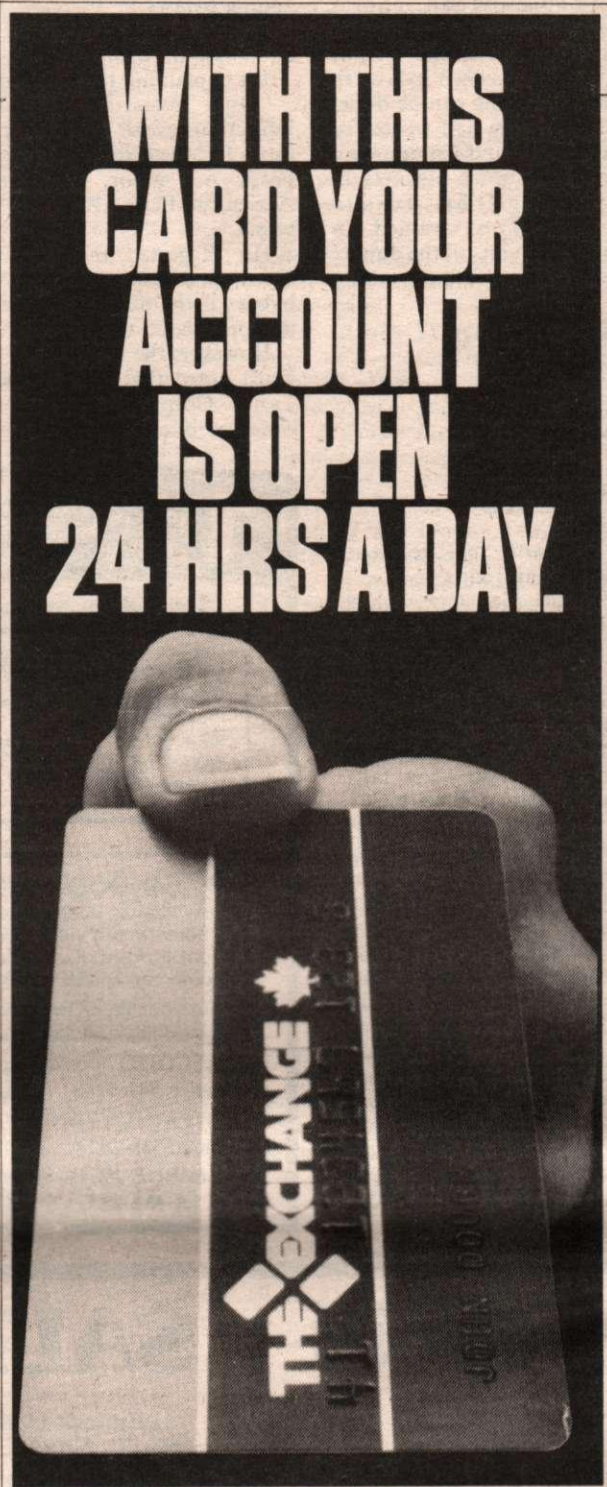

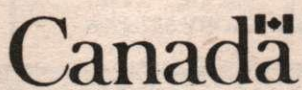

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

The Swartz Bay waiting room would close while renovations to the ferry terminal were being carried out. Gulf Islands travellers had not had access to the waiting room because the terminal for the islands' ferries was located outside the compound. But when the work reached completion the following spring, all the terminals would be within the compound.

The Centennial Committee on Salt Spring Island had recommended that the project to celebrate 100 years of Canada should be a memorial park at the new boat basin fill area in Ganges. Col. M. Peiler made the announcement at a meeting of the committee and the Chamber of Commerce would be asked to take part in the project. Government funding would be available to bring the project to life.

Ganges weather-watcher Howard Carlin reported that only 1.1 inches of rain had fallen on the island in October. He had to search his records back to 1959 to find a comparable low figure. In that year, 2.1 inches had been measured. The previous year, there was 7.4 inches. High temperature was measured at 73 degrees and the low at 34.

The new magistrate on Salt Spring would be Col. Maurice Peiler who was appointed to replace William Anderson. The appointment was announced by the attorney-general of B. C.

Pranksters were out in force on Hallowe'en. They soaped the windows of every business in Ganges and Don Cunningham spent some time washing the windows of Salt Spring Trading where he was employed as butcher.

Fifteen Years Ago

A 10-acre freeze was placed on subdivisions in the Gulf Islands by Municipal Affairs Minister Dan Campbell. There would be no development on land less than 10 acres in size until results of a planning survey undertaken by the Capital Region were known. Many residents had complained about seemingly uncontrolled development and the freeze effectively ended such endeavours.

Fire Chief Bob Sauerberg and the 14 members of the Mayne Island Fire Department would invite residents to the open house in the new fire hall. The facilities, which would house two fire trucks, storage space as well as an office and a common room for the volunteers, had taken five years to build. The board of trustees of the fire department was headed by John Rainsford. When the project had

begun, the driving force was Stan Chatwin who had been the chairman of the board.

Mahon Hall in Ganges was the scene of a costume party held by the Wagon Wheels Square Dance Club. Eleanor Hatch and Andy Stevens won prizes for best costume and Bert Barber called the dances.

The Ladies Guild of the Church of the Good Shepherd on Pender Island decided how to handle the money they had raised during the year. Half the money would go to local church expenses and half would go to charity, the ladies decided. They held the meeting in the home of guild president Mrs. H. A. Spalding.

Ten Years Ago

High property taxes on vacant land were forcing some islanders to subdivide their holdings into 10-acre lots for sale, said George Heinekey, the Salt Spring director to the Capital Region. Taxes on such properties had risen from \$135 per year to up to \$700 per month, he said.

Elections for positions on the Islands Trust would take place on the six largest Gulf Islands. There were 24 people in the race for 12 seats. Voters on Mayne had a choice among six candidates while Salt Springers would elect two from the five running. On North Pender, there were four names on the ballot while South Pender, Saturna and Galiano voters would make selections from three people on each island.

The Galiano Ladies Service Club would be holding their annual bazaar later in the month. Thelma Mathias and Mrs. Marchand had been busy gathering goods for sale and organizing the various booths and stalls.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that the party held in the Community Hall for Hallowe'en was a great success. Prizes went to all the children who showed up in costume. Jim Money got the

children into games. The evening had been organized by Ann Bavis and her helpers.

Money-raising events were being sponsored by the Salt Spring Lions Club to finance the recreational complex at Central. The Lions would sponsor a bingo each month and they planned a Klondyke Night at the end of the month. The plans were announced by Ian Brown.

Five Years Ago

The B. C. Research Council studied growth patterns in the Gulf Islands and came up with a population figure of 10,185 by the year 2001. Bob Huestis, superintendent of schools, explained that the figures were projections and not predictions. The council had said in 1976 that the population at the turn of the century would be 6,415.

There was no candidate for school trustee from Mayne Island when nominations closed. Jeannine Dodds had held the post. She explained that she had mailed her nomination papers on Friday and the letter did not arrive in Ganges until Tuesday, one day late.

The old school on Pender Island was being discussed by the Gulf Islands School Board and the Pender Island Hall Committee. The Pender group wanted assurance of a long-term lease before making repairs to the building.

The children at Galiano arrived at school but there were no teachers about. A sign told the children to ring the bell at 10 to nine. After they trooped into the classrooms the teachers arrived from the basement where they were hiding and a day of school on Hallowe'en began.

The Rotary of Salt Spring announced winners in the Grey Cup poster contest. Susan Roseby was awarded first prize while Leah Wiebe was second and Kelly Mullan came third. Bruce Cobanli received honourable mention.

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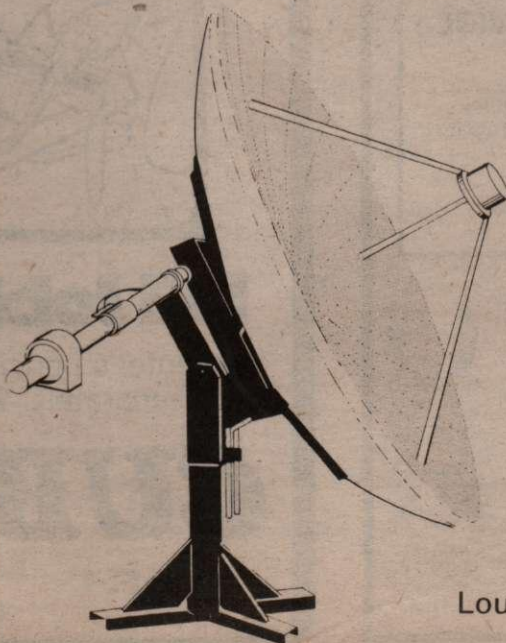
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A monster mash

Six appointed over objections

Appointment of six people to the advisory design panel was made by the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee last week.

The design panel, for the next year, will consist of Jonathan Yardley, Geoff Gay and Pat Morgan who were re-appointed. The new panel members will be Peter Vida, Rice Elkington and Walter Davis.

The design panel has provoked controversy through some of its decisions lately and charges of conflict of interest have been brought against several members.

The panel was created to advise the Islands Trust on the merits of commercial developments at various areas on Salt Spring. The membership was to be made up of people with expertise in such areas as architecture and landscaping.

Raymond Hill of the Salt Spring Planning Association sent a letter to the Islands Trust which asked questions about the design panel.

He asked: "Is it wise that Geoff Gay should both act on this committee and employ Nick Gilbert?"

"Is it wise that Jonathan Yardley should both act on this committee and submit work for approval to the same committee?"

The terms of reference for the panel state in part: "A member of the design panel acting for him or herself or acting for a client on an application before the design panel shall absent him or herself from the consideration of that application and shall not, on behalf of the Advisory Design Panel, present any recommendation of the panel on the application to the local Trust Committee."

Hill noted: "He (Yardley) may step down when his work is being considered but it is hardly likely the rest of the panel would shoot down his ideas."

Hill also offered criticism about some of the actions of the design panel.

"There have been a few questionable calls lately...the removal of the highways trees in

downtown Ganges and the new Credit Union building masquerading as a McDonald's for two," he wrote.

In addition, Hill noted: "The committee has failed to come forward with any design guidelines for community input—Ganges appears to be still just happening."

Under the terms of reference for the design panel, members are urged to consider each application under six principles. Included in those principles is "the character of the proposed development in relation to its surroundings."

The Islands Trust Committee rejected the claim of conflict of interest and appointed the six people to a one-year term.

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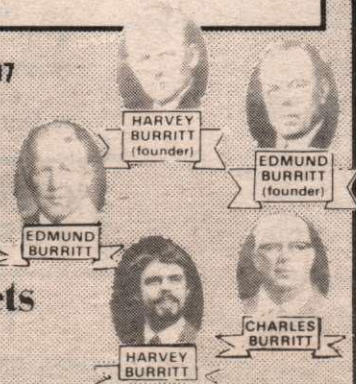
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Brochure published

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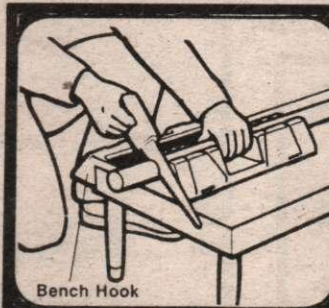
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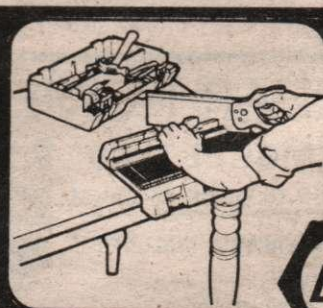
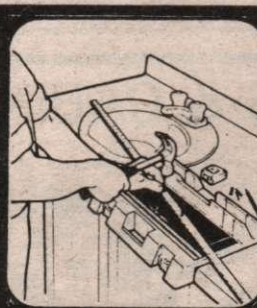
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
