

Fertilizers of no value until root system is established

I find my mind somewhat indispensable. Ever since I became aware of its temporary absences, I have been paying closer attention, out of sheer curiosity, if not necessity. But it is still a mystery where it goes and what it does on its so-called coffee breaks. It does not help one bit, though, to try and keep track of it, for when it is gone, it is gone, and I am none the wiser until it returns.

It seems to have a mind of its own to boot. Perhaps being a Gemini has something to do with it, but I doubt that. I rather like to believe that everyone else is in the same predicament, going purely on telltale evidence of being of two minds about something, or anything.

Given the frequency of this phenomenon, I consider it unlikely that only Gemini suffer from this ambiguity, or, if so, that there are far more Gemini around than I thought there were.

Before my mind goes off on this errand, we'd best return to the proper planting of trees and other growing things, while there is yet time. Last week we had left trees planted in unimproved soil, to avoid moisture barriers, with just a bit of bone meal to provide phosphorus for root development and for blooming and fruiting. Any fertilizers at this point will not do any good, as any freshly transplanted tree, or shrub, simply cannot use them until its root system is established in the soil.

YEAR AFTER

One year after planting is soon enough for trees, half a year for shrubs, and a month or two for perennials. For the first two to three years, a young tree or shrub will benefit greatly from lack of competition of weeds and grasses over its root zone. Instead, a thick mulch of leaves or clippings will help to retain soil moisture, and with the help of earthworms, will add organic content and other essentials to the root zone.

Unless the trees are planted in rich topsoil, there remains the task of improving the soil over the ever-

expanding root zone, especially for very poor soils, and for good harvests from fruit trees. Any deep-rooted clover, preferably the perennial kind, mowed like a lawn once established, only higher, will effectively improve the soil over the years, attract pollinating bees at the same time, add nitrogen and other essential nutrients, and discourage the growth of weeds.

Top dressing with compost, twice a year, early in spring, and again in mid-summer, will add its cargo of beneficial bacteria, organics and nutrients.

A light top dressing of seaweed will add its complement of 65 trace elements, organics and hormones, and is best applied in early summer.

BARK EASILY DAMAGED

After a few years, the green ground cover should be allowed to grow within 30 centimetres of the trunk, but no closer. It is too easy to damage the bark with a mower, and especially with weed-eaters, as the bark is all too easily girdled with the whipping cord, a rather common occurrence. A deep layer of gravel adjacent to the trunk effectively discourages weeds and also acts as a moisture conserving cover. Nature, left to herself, will improve the soil in her usual, slow and haphazard manner; but what she accomplishes in 1,000 years, we can do in ten in this manner.

If, however, the soil is extremely poor, a mixture of clover and buckwheat, with its deep, subsoil-

penetrating roots, tilled, dug or plowed under in the fall, will rapidly and substantially improve the poorest soils. The only difference between barren and rich soil is its organic content, nothing else. Organic content stores moisture and nutrients and provides the living

conditions for vital microbiotic life. Without it we have the equivalent of a large outdoor hydroponic system which requires a constant supply, or flow, of moisture and fertilizers, an expensive and rather unhealthy

situation, now well documented with our chemical growing methods. On the other hand, the organic method has a long (hundreds of millions of years) record of success.

Nine candidates are in running for Islands Trust

When island voters go to the polls Saturday, they will elect representatives to the Islands Trust at three islands, Salt Spring, Galiano and South Pender.

Following are outlines of the Trust candidates.

Galiano

Don Macdonald

Don Macdonald seeks a position with the Islands Trust to ensure that islanders have a say about what happens on the island.

He expressed concern about recent pronouncements by the minister of municipal affairs and decided to become involved to ensure that the Islands Trust remains an entity in the islands.

"Why should we be treated as second-class citizens," he asks, "and have our decisions made by the department of municipal affairs?"

Macdonald is a native of Vancouver and earned bachelor of arts and bachelor of commerce degrees from University of British Columbia. He served with the Canadian air force for 25 years.

He came to the Gulf Islands six years ago and lived on Salt Spring for three years before moving to Galiano Island.

The zoning bylaws, he notes, were drawn up by the people of Galiano and he wants to see that those bylaws are carried out. His concern is that the assessment of property in the Outer Islands is larger than some cities and towns but, unlike those urban areas, islanders are losing their say in land use.

Although Macdonald is retired, he is engaged as a renovations contractor on Galiano.

Diane Cragg

Diane Cragg seeks to be a representative on the Islands Trust for Galiano Island to fulfil a commitment to put something back into the community.

She holds various jobs on Galiano while working towards a master's degree in geography from the University of British Columbia. She has a bachelor's degree in the same subject.

In addition to her tasks as mother and housebuilder on Galiano, Cragg has held the position of secretary to the Advisory Planning Commission.

She was involved in the group which brought pressure to bear as a means of stopping the proposal of the Nanaimo group which wanted to lease 160 acres at Pebble Beach for a private concern.

Her experience with that project, she said, confirmed her belief that public land should be retained for public use.

Cragg also advocates that land use planning should involve local residents.

She feels the Islands Trust should inform people about what is going on to allow the community an opportunity to comment on various issues.

Cragg was born in Toronto but raised in Vancouver. She moved to the island with her son four years ago.

One of her jobs is co-ordinating the Continuing Education programs on Galiano Island.

Christa Weiss

Christa Weiss seeks a third term as representative for Galiano Island on the Islands Trust.

She won her first election in 1981 to serve out the final year of the term

of Jim Robertson. In the 1982 civic elections, Weiss was returned by acclamation.

Weiss has lived on the island since 1972 and has studied part-time at the University of Victoria in recent years while working as a print maker on Galiano.

She has been actively involved in the Montague Harbour conservation group in efforts to preserve Sutil Lodge and the area around it as a heritage site.

In addition to that project, Weiss claims interest in many aspects of the community. When she first sought office, she said that for community planning the opinion of the majority was most important.

For this election, she said: "In my past three years as Galiano Island trustee, I have tried to keep bureaucracy on a human scale.

"I would like to see more people get involved in the planning process so our bylaws can reflect the wishes of the majority."

She has stated that if her opinion on a particular issue differs from that of the majority, she would support that majority opinion.

Salt Spring

Luke Harrison

Luke Harrison seeks a position on the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee because he feels he can contribute a fresh approach to local government.

Harrison was born in Victoria but has lived on Salt Spring since 1933. His family owned a hog farm at the southern end of St. Mary Lake. Apart from farming, Harrison has undertaken many activities to enable him to remain on Salt Spring Island.

As well as being recognized as a capable businessman, Harrison is perhaps best known by many islanders as a raconteur.

He has remained active on the island, working at various tasks for more than 50 years. In that time, he said, he has witnessed changes on the island and feels he has been favoured to be part of the change and the community.

Harrison said he is qualified to contribute to the Islands Trust because he is a native islander who has worked in and helped build the community for many years.

Nick Gilbert

Nick Gilbert seeks a second term as Islands Trust representative for Salt Spring Island.

In 1982 he was elected by acclamation and this will be his first term at the polls for the position.

Gilbert brought background experience on the Advisory Design Panel, the Advisory Planning Commission and the planning association to his task as Trust representative for the past two years.

For the future, he sees an immediate task being to ensure the survival of the Islands Trust. An approach must be made to the provincial government to determine its concerns, he said, and to see if the Trust can meet those concerns.

The community plan of Salt Spring will also take efforts of the Islands Trust, he noted. The Fulford plan is being readied for the public

to discuss and the island plan, which has undergone revisions, will contain new statements about the environment, watersheds and forests, he said.

Gilbert came to Salt Spring 10 years ago. He had been engaged in social work in many communities in B. C. and the Yukon. He was the community worker for the school district here.

Another problem facing the Trust, he said, was to help clarify some of the issues facing Ganges. There is a need to continue refining the design concepts of the village, he said.

John Crofton

John Crofton seeks a position with the Islands Trust for Salt Spring in an attempt to bring "close, harmonious co-operation" with other government agencies to allow the Trust to perform its role.

Crofton, who was born in Ganges, has served the community in many capacities since his return to the island in 1980.

He has been with the Parks and Recreation Commission, the Mahon Hall restoration committee, the transportation committee as well as secretary for the Ganges Sewer Implementation Task Force. For the past year, Crofton has acted in the capacity of alternate regional director.

In addition he has been treasurer for both the Salt Spring Island Water Preservation Society and the Anglican Parish.

Crofton served in the air force from 1950 until 1976. At that time he became the chief of planning and control for the Pacific Region of the federal department of supply and services in Vancouver until 1980.

Crofton expresses support for the mandate of the Trust and says "that in order for the Islands Trust to perform its role, it must work in close, harmonious co-operation with other government agencies at all levels of authority."

Crofton graduated from the University of British Columbia with a bachelor of arts in economics. He served in the Canadian air force in the second world war and is a member of Royal Canadian Legion Branch 92 in Ganges.

South Pender

Steve Wright

Steve Wright seeks a second term as Islands Trust representative for South Pender Island.

He was elected in 1982 on his first attempt at office.

Wright works on the Penders as a carpenter and came to South Pender from Victoria with his family almost four years ago.

He was born in Port Alberni and has lived on the coast for most of his life. He is a graduate of Malaspina College. Wright has stated that he sees the Trust as encouraging the public to participate in the determination of the future of the island.

South Pender residents, he stated, are concerned about maintaining the rural atmosphere of that island and a way to do that is to find an equitable way of controlling growth and development.

He is working towards creation of a water resources board as a means of conserving the watershed of Greenburn Lake.

Wendy Munroe

Wendy Munroe seeks office with

the South Pender Trust Committee to participate in land planning as a way of giving something back to the community.

This election is her first attempt at public office. She and her family have lived full-time on South Pender for a short time, but Munroe said the island has had such an affect on them since the move that she feels obligated to put effort into the community.

Currently she manages the law office of her husband, Don Munroe. He was chairman of the B. C. Labour Relations Board before the move to South Pender.

Munroe studied fine arts at the University of Victoria but has put aside her drawing pencils and paint brushes to work in the law office although she wants to get back to painting soon.

She is involved in several community organizations which has led her to the decision to run for the Islands Trust.

Planning decisions, she said, should be made at the local level and not by the cabinet in Victoria or in a developer's office.

Ken Clarke

Ken Clarke seeks a position with the South Pender Island Trust Committee because he is alarmed at some of the changes which are occurring on that island.

He has lived on South Pender since 1971 and his concern is to keep the rural atmosphere of the island the way the majority of people seem to want it.

The logging near the canal is one of the changes he cites as being against the wishes of the community.

Clarke is employed as a carpenter. He has a bachelor of arts in science and has taught at the Pender Island school.

The role of the trustee is to adhere to the community plan, he said.

To that end he states that it is important for the community to have its own plan for development which should not be interfered with by the minister of municipal affairs as the case has been recently.

Clarke expressed knowledge of the South Pender community through attendance at many public meetings on the island.

Music school opens at Ganges

A group of musicians on Salt Spring will be sharing their expertise with the public when the Gulf Islands Music School opens its doors.

Peter Taschuk explained last week that island musicians such as Chris Kodaly, Dwaine Prosk, Lynne Quinn, Lillian Slanina and Madge Kimball will be tutoring

anyone interested in music.

Courses at the school include study of various instruments, voice, music theory and other aspects of music, Taschuk said.

The repertoire will not be limited to a study of classical music but will "just be really flexible," he added.

The group had talked with teachers on the islands and decided

the school would be the ideal way of stimulating interest in music. They were concerned that someone might start a private music school and charge high rates.

The cost of the courses will be set by the teachers involved and the school itself gets a 10% commission on those course.

The studio space is located in a cabin on Fulford-Ganges Road across from Seaview Avenue in Ganges. The space is limited, Taschuk admits, but it gives the group somewhere to start from.

They are in the process of writing a constitution and registered themselves as a society. And they are seeking financial support as well. Anyone interested, whether as a student or a backer, can contact Taschuk or the other people involved.

If the school works out as planned, he said, an offshoot would be a regular series of concerts and recitals. There are at least eight musicians involved in the venture.



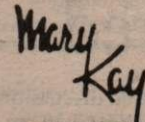

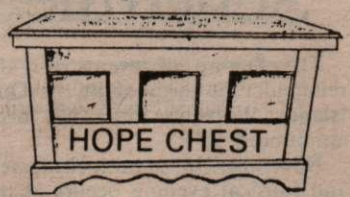

Society will attempt to buy property at Montague Harbour

Efforts to preserve the Sutil Lodge site on Montague Harbour at Galiano Island are meeting with support from many people.

A report from the Montague Harbour Conservation and Enhancement Society outlined some of the recent developments.

The members had checked the possibility of subdividing the 20-acre parcel to allow the owner to keep five acres. But the plan to split the parcel "would be prohibitively expensive," the report noted. The highways department would insist upon upgrading Southwind Road which leads from Montague Harbour Road into the property.

Other government departments, such as the fish and wildlife branch and the heritage conservation branch, would impose restrictive covenants on the parcel.

In light of such information, the society decided to change its original plans and will direct money raised to date towards the purchase of the entire 20-acre lot.

Endorsement and support has come from many sectors. Dr. David Keenlyside, an archaeologist with the National Museum of Canada and Arthur Charleton, the provincial archaeologist, have offered their endorsements of the project.

In addition, such artists as Robert Bateman, Ronaldo Norden, Keith Holmes, Stewart Brands and Toni Onley have donated works to the society.

Don Johannessen, lawyer for the Capital Region, has donated legal advice. Consulting services to prepare a master plan for the site have been donated by Nautilus Communications of Edmonton, Heritage Research Group of Salt Spring, Uri Peepre and Associates as well as Cordillera Environmental Consultants of Vancouver.

The society has presented its proposal to the National Parks Centennial Committee, Wildlife Habitat Canada, B.C. Heritage Trust, the Victoria Foundation and the Biosphere Reserve Program of

UNESCO.

The society seeks to purchase the Sutil Lodge site to preserve a kind of "time capsule of Galiano Island history."

The report noted: "The site is rich in archaeological lore, ecological values and artistic traditions."

The plan would implement a "managed program of conservation and restoration" in an effort to save the site. Part of the plan would be to introduce a centre for the arts and scientific research which would be financially self-sustaining.

"The area certainly has the potential to be an important park, offering both nature study and cultural activities for visitors," the report concluded.

The society meets each Wednesday at the Galiano activity centre and welcomes the participation of interested individuals.

The society is also seeking financial donations which are tax deductible. All money raised is put into a legal trust and will be refundable if the goal of purchasing the site is not reached.

Witnesses attend assembly

Another program highlight was the baptism Saturday of nine new ministers.

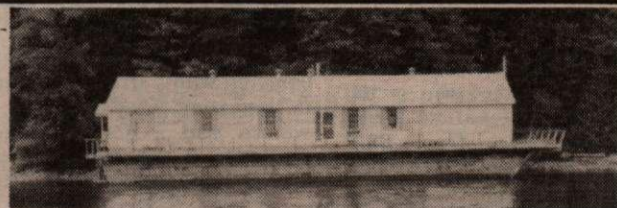

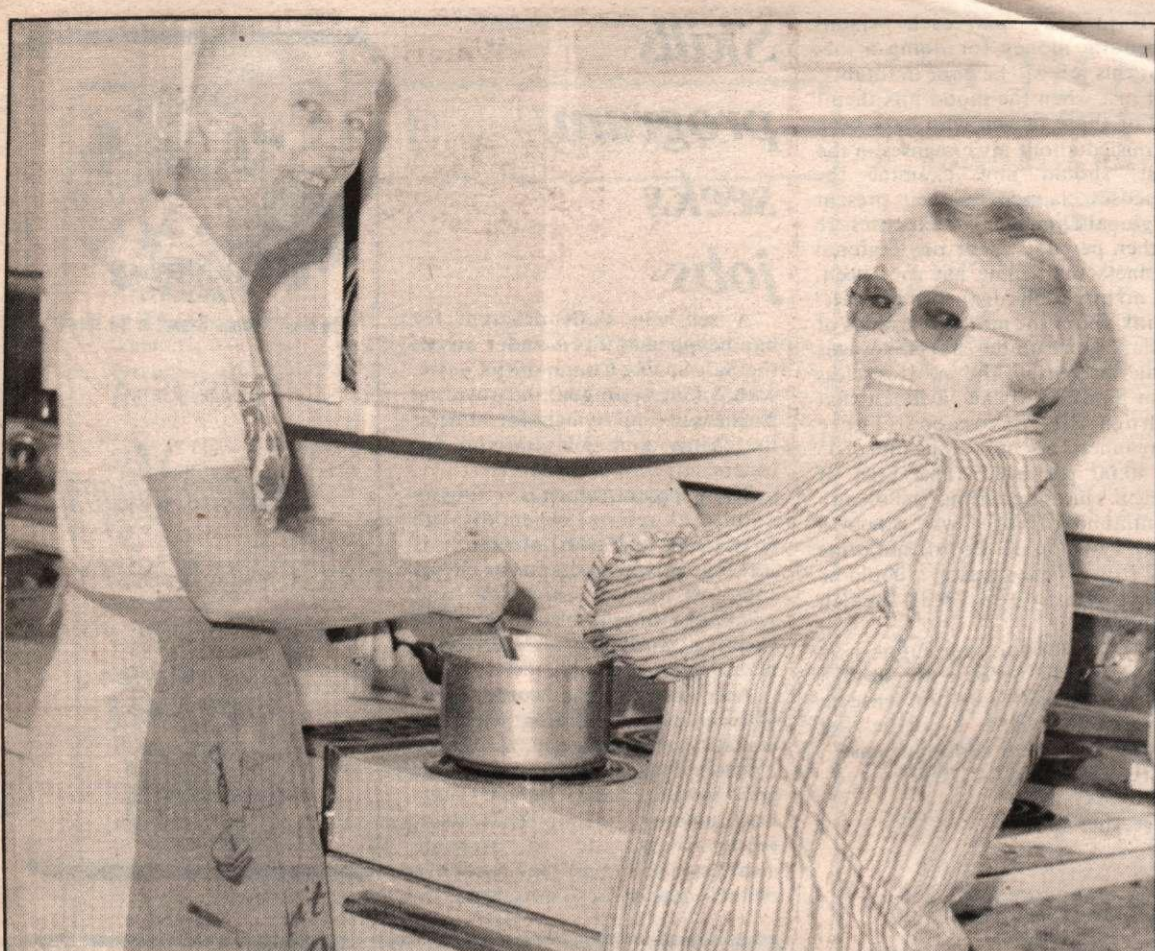

Following a lengthy discussion by members of the commission about the issue, Linda Hoover presented a motion to ask Borsman to reconsider his decision. Although only Irene Fewings voted against the motion, Borsman said no.

Fewings cited the bylaw which set up the parks and recreation commission and maintained that Borsman had no power to appoint members to the commission. The bylaws states that the CRD board appoints the members.

She was told that the practice at the CRD board was to accept those people which the area director named.

The discussion carried on for some time. Borsman told the meeting that his decision was a calculated risk but he felt it had to be made in the best interest of the commission and the community.

Phil Hume told the meeting that the decision was a divisive question which could send the community "into a tailspin."

He told the meeting that "taking shots at each other" served no useful purpose. "This kind of thing is what makes this commission hard to function," he said.

The bylaw was vaguely worded about membership on the commission, Borsman admitted, and he suggested that if people did not think he had the authority to back up his decision they should let the CRD board know of their concerns.

A motion by Fewings to hold a general meeting to elect new members and present the names to the CRD did not pass.

Glenn Woodley, the outgoing chairman of the commission, said that he had been asked many times by officials at the CRD why the commission held elections when they were not necessary.

The elections were held, he said, as a means of letting people know what the commission was doing and

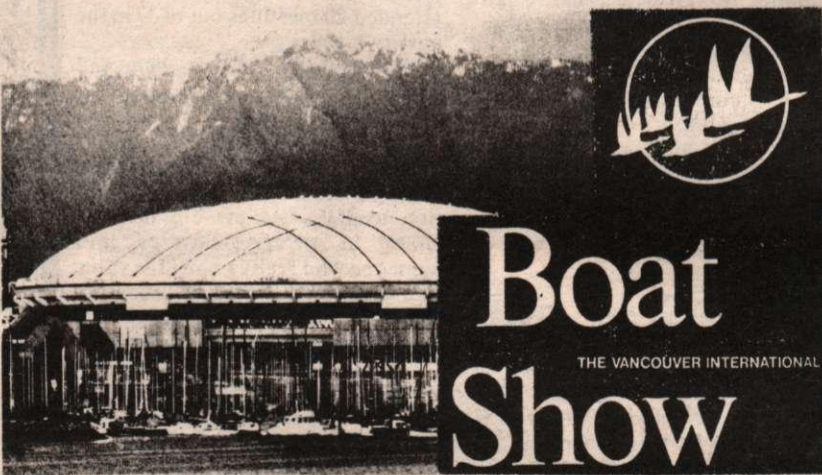

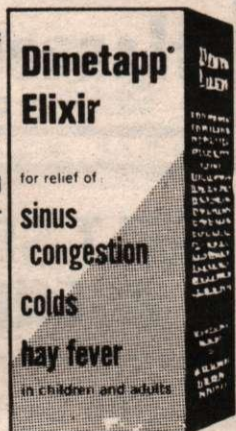

GALIANO NEWS

More than 50 at meeting with Trust candidates

The all candidates' meeting sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce at the South Community Hall on Thursday produced a good turn-out of over 50 voters eager to hear the three nominees for Islands Trust expound their point of view and answer questions.

Well deserved tributes were paid to retiring trustee Ron Thompson who has given 10 years of conscientious and informed service to the Galiano Island Trust Committee. His expertise in municipal matters gained during his many years of service as city clerk to Vancouver tempered by his long acquaintance with conditions on Galiano made his advice and judgment of great value to the community.

Chairman Fred Robson first called on incumbent Christa Weiss who is again a candidate. Christa sees her role as upholding the community plan, but also as "helping people through the system" in a way that is fair both to them and the community, and she cited some instances which had occurred during her term of office. She rejected suggestions that her presidency of the Montague Conservation and Enhancement Society created a conflict of interest situation.

She would oppose abolition of the Islands Trust unless something better were available to put in its place. She hoped that the processing of applications for zoning change, subdivision and the granting of development permits could be speeded up.

Diane Cragg, introduced by Maggie Lyon, felt that her training as a geographer with emphasis on urban planning, her enthusiasm and energy, and her concern for retaining public land for the enjoyment of the public, qualified her for the position she sought. She is in favour of more local input in planning decisions on Galiano and further development only in as far as it would benefit Galiano residents.

The third candidate, Donald Macdonald, was introduced by Ron Thompson who noted his broad experience in administrative affairs and municipal politics as a former head of the TEAM organization which contributed so much to civic life in Vancouver. Mr. Thompson felt that his candidate would maintain the philosophic continuity in planning begun by Hart Scarrow and Steve Riddell, Bill Duncan and himself.

Mr. Macdonald had many pertinent comments on the planning process in B. C., and summarized his objectives as supporting the community plan and the bylaws, working to change them only if this was the wish of the community, speeding up the process and fighting for the community's right to plan.

Questions and comments from the audience provided an excellent indication of community attitudes towards the Trust and other peripheral matters. There was little support for the stated objectives of

the minister of municipal affairs. It was suggested that the minister should visit the Gulf Islands with notebook and pencil in hand, but a realist thought it unlikely that the municipal mountain would come to the mohammeds of the Gulf Islands, so the islanders had better be prepared to go to him with letters, phone calls and submissions.

Most speakers wanted more, not less, local input into the planning process, and would only accept dismantling of the Trust if something more effective were put in its place. Many would like to see the ratio of local to general trustees changed in favour of the former. The idea of a Trust regional district was rejected as impractical, but some kind of zoning of the Trust area might have benefits.

The most popular theme was to give the Advisory Planning Commission more power as it is a locally elected body. Trustees asserted that the wishes of the commission were always considered, but to this there was one dissenting voice.

The meeting was both encouraging and exasperating: encouraging because of the interest of island residents and their enthusiasm for obtaining increased local control of planning development on the island, but exasperating because lack of knowledge of provincial law and the division of powers between the province, the regional district and the Trust left many speakers unaware that their proposals for more local control run counter to existing municipal structure and the centralist philosophy of provincial governments.

Hunting offences

Over the several weeks of the hunting season an increasing number of Galiano residents have become disturbed and angry because of the large number of violations of hunting regulations which this year seem to be more prevalent than ever. Pitlamping has been rife and often hunters come off the ferry in campers or trucks and

drive up and down the highway with loaded guns at the ready, prepared to shoot from their vehicles or from the roadside.

These hunters profess ignorance of current hunting regulations or that they are on private property. Offences are occurring at many locations and it is important that Galiano residents report violations immediately, including the vehicle registration number, to a 24-hour toll-free number, Zenith 2235.

Iola McDonald

Last Tuesday, Nov. 6, Iola McDonald died in hospital in Vancouver. Iola, who had been married for 57 years to her husband Gordon, lived for the last 30 years in their home above Whaler Bay. For many years Gordon was the fire chief for South Galiano and Iola helped him with this work.

Iola had been in indifferent health for many years but bore her infirmities with a cheerful courage, which was matched by that of her husband. To him and their family we extend sympathy on behalf of all islanders.

Remembrance

The Galiano Branch of the Canadian Legion held the annual Remembrance Day service on the lawn in front of the clubhouse at the Golf Club. Grizzled veterans of the second world war were prominent but it was good to see younger people join in the act of remembrance. The service was conducted by Jim Ripley with Art Wood speaking the Legion's vow, "We will remember them."

The address was given by Ron Ree who took as his text words from a war memorial he had seen long ago in an English village, now a suburb of London. "In honour of those who served. In sympathy with those who suffered. And in proud and grateful memory of the men...who fell in the Great Wars." The wreath was laid by representatives of the Galiano Girl Guides, Laura Gerlach, leader, and Kirsty Hales, guide.

Chess Club

It is, perhaps, not widely known that Galiano has a chess club. About 10 regular members meet at La Berengerie on Thursday evenings at seven o'clock. They would welcome fresh competition whether beginner or expert.

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

The Gulf Islands waiting room at Swartz Bay was removed to make way for the expansion of the ferry terminal facilities, said Ferries general manager M. Aldous. Necessary facilities would be provided for the exclusive use of islands travellers, he said. Renovations to the complex were expected to be complete by spring.

The Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce had accepted a lease for the fill area at the boat basin in Ganges. The price had been set at \$10 per year. The Centennial Committee proposed developing the site as a park to commemorate 100 years of Canada.

The speed limit near schools was the subject of debate among islanders. Some claimed that the 20 miles-per-hour limit was illegal. The department of highways indicated plans to do away with the speed limit signs and replace them with signs showing children in blue silhouette. RCMP said the speed limit was indeed 20 mph.

Doris Murphy of Beddis Road on Salt Spring had been driving down her driveway when a cougar walked in front of her vehicle. Cougar hunter Bob Akerman confirmed that the cats were on the island. Killing of sheep had been reported in the Mount Tuam area.

The Rod and Gun Club held the pistol shoot competition and Cpl. Fred Rhodes took top spot. Vick Jackson took grand aggregate for top shooting in all events. The members competed in trap, big bore, .22 rifle and the pistol shoot over a number of weeks.

Save the Children Fund was helped by a donation of \$18.89 which 13 girls of the Grade 7 Red Cross Club collected on Hallowe'en.

Fifteen Years Ago

The department of highways crew were busy removing the hump on Lower Ganges Road near the Anglican church when they struck a water line. The geyser shot high into the air. When not dodging water, the crew had removed the hump and levelled the hollows to create a flat roadbed.

The 10-acre freeze in the Gulf Islands was causing some people problems. Gavin Reynolds, president of the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce, wondered if subdivision plans which had been approved but not implemented would be subject to the freeze. He intended to ask Dan Campbell, minister of municipal affairs, to explain exactly what the freeze meant.

A centennial project for Galiano Island would be a playground. Residents of that island asked the Gulf Islands School Board for permission to use part of the land which F. E. Robson had donated to the school district as a site for the proposed playground.

Papajohn reported from Saturna

on two weeks of news. A work crew of Rev. Jack Dangerfield, Steve Maskow and George Whiting had cleaned the grounds of the church with Uncle Art Ralph as sidewalk superintendent.

A new elementary school on Salt Spring had been approved. Cost would come to \$472,200 of which Gulf Islands taxpayers would cover \$236,100. The school board had an option to purchase 10 acres of land at Central.

Kanaka Road continued to be a topic for discussion by the Gulf Islands School Board. The trustee wanted the Salt Spring road closed to consolidate the play areas at the Ganges school complex. Jim Campbell of Saturna urged the board to make an appointment to talk with the minister of highways to get the road closed.

Ten Years Ago

Elections in the Gulf Islands featured 30 people chasing 12 seats on the Islands Trust as well as three seats on the Gulf Islands School Board. There would be ballots cast on each island with Salt Spring and Pender Islands residents voting for both the Trust and the school board.

The boys of the First Ganges Cub Pack would be out collecting bottles. Cubmaster Martin Ogilvie explained that half the money collected would be kept by the cubs for projects and travel while the remainder would go towards the recreation complex planned by the Lions Club.

The Pearson Care Tree on Pender Island was being prepared to light the nights for another Christmas season. Lights would go on December 15 and stay until after the New Year. It was 15 years before that George Pearson decided to light the lights to raise money for CARE of Canada. The first year, 1960, he had collected \$102.50. By 1973, the amount had risen to more than \$3,000.

The Galiano Senior Citizens held an election of officers. Isobel Murphy was returned as president and Dora Jones as vice-president. Devina Baines was chosen as treasurer to replace Archie Georgeson who had retired. Jean Tully was re-elected as corresponding secretary.

Maintenance and repairs for Centennial Park in Ganges on Salt Spring would be taken over by the Recreation Commission. The Centennial Society would retain the lease. Voters would be asked to approve a half-mill levy to pay the costs of keeping the park in good condition.

Insurance agents would not be handling auto insurance as protest against a proposal from the Insurance Corporation of British Columbia to reduce their commissions. Neither side was prepared to talk to the other but insurance could be obtained through government agent's offices.

Five Years Ago

Voters could vote for candidates for school board, Islands Trust and the Capital Region. There would be ballots cast for school trustees on Saturna where Tom Davidson faced challenges from Carol-Lynn Fisker and Jonathon Guy. The Islands Trust seat on Mayne, where Isabel Geehan had resigned, was being sought by George Douglas and Helen Joan Sprague.

The directors of the Capital Region from Salt Spring and the Outer Islands would also be chosen. Jim Campbell, incumbent from Saturna, was up against Vern Roddick of Pender and Weldon Pinchin of Mayne. On Salt Spring Mike Clement was seeking re-election while Yvette Valcourt was also in the race.

Children of all ages gathered at the Community Hall on Saturna Island to celebrate Hallowe'en. There was Saturna pork, hot dogs and other goodies to eat. Notable costumes were worn by Cory Bozer as King Tut, Danny Bouch as the Incredible Hulk and Jimmy Money as Al Capone. Each child in costume was awarded a prize.

The volunteers of the Galiano Fire Department were to burn down a house to try various techniques for putting out flames. They arrived at the building and lit the flames and tried the techniques while the blaze burned. But later they found out that it was the wrong house. Basil Bengier reported the incident but would not say if it was truth or fiction.

the audience before introducing a song.

"Praise the Lord. My name is Karla," said one 12-year-old. "I would like to talk about my family. I have one brother and two sisters and a mother and father. May God bless you while you listen to us sing."

Often when the children would explain a little about their family, it would consist of only siblings.

United Church minister Al Skinner questioned the group about its trip, inviting the children to give their impressions of Canada.

"The people are so friendly."

"There are so many white faces."

"I would like to stay in Canada!"

Many of the children had known starvation or were orphaned before they were accepted by Ambassadors of Aid to join the choir. When they first left Uganda, the children

showed signs of malnutrition.

Following Monday night's performance the children gave another show at Salt Spring Elementary School on Tuesday morning before leaving the island.

The children will return to Uganda next June when funds from their tour will aid in the construction of a children's home in addition to aiding victims of starvation in African countries.
