## Bringing back the salmon

If a group of Salt Spring residents are successful in their attempt to obtain funding, a salmon enhancement program involving five creeks could get under way here.

The Island Stream and Salmon Enhancement Association, yet to be officially incorporated, is seeking a Canada Works grant to employ four people for eight weeks to clean up local streams.

In an interview last week spokesman Jonathan Oldroyd outlined some of the group's plans and objectives.

The immediate goal is to clean up streams so that existing brood stock will enter and spawn. The association's long-term objective is to work with other Gulf Island groups to restore salmon stocks in local streams. Plans call for incubation and release of chum and coho where indigenous stock have been eliminated.

The Ganges lawyer pointed out that chum will spawn almost anywhere. "You don't need big rivers" for salmon to spawn, he said. Creeks slated for cleaning include Cranberry (or Maxwell), Duck, Cusheon, Ganges and Fulford.

While some people may question the potential of Ganges Creek for spawning salmon, Oldroyd says that at least one marine biologist has indicated there would be no

problem. Oldroyd said coliform levels—as long as they're not too high—are not really critical. In addition, a lot of fresh water is flowing in the creek during the spawning period. He pointed out that garbage had been dumped in the creek and that it would have to be removed.

Chum salmon have spawned in Ganges Creek in the past, Oldroyd said. All they need is some fresh water in the fall, the eggs will hatch and the fry will leave the creek the following spring. On the other hand, coho, for example, require a year-round flow of water in the stream.

A habitat protection technician with the provincial government confirmed that coliform levels are not too critical. Marlene Caskey of Nanaimo said that while coliform levels are not a problem, nutrient content could be because it will reduce the amount of oxygen in the water.

If the Canada Works grant comes through, the work at Ganges Creek, which Oldroyd described as "a forgotten asset to the community," will include the removal of snags and occasional blockages. Cusheon Creek is expected to require the most work with three weeks allocated. Clearing would be undertaken between the mouth and Stewart Rd., a distance of about 1.8 miles.

Two and a half weeks are set aside for Cranberry Creek where the portion to be cleared is about a quarter of a mile long. The creek bed is completely blocked with fallen logs and debris. The association also plans to build a trail adjacent to the creek. The two remaining creeks,

Duck and Fulford, require little work and half a week has been allocated to each.

The association's work has been assisted to a large degree by a creek mapping study undertaken during the past couple of months. A group of young people who were engaged at various tasks with the help of an Outdoor Recreation Council grant have completed a fairly detailed report of the five creeks. The project looked for obstructions to fish such as culverts, waterfalls, irrigation ponds, beaver dams and fallen trees.

The amount of water in pools and creeks was estimated, the condition of creek beds, types of insect life and access points noted.

Duck Creek has also been charted by local resident Kathy Reimer, who has a degree in marine biology. She too is playing an active part in the new association.

Earlier this month the group was surprised with the news that two chum salmon were seen in Booth Canal. Fish haven't been seen in Booth Canal for years but, as Oldroyd observed, no one's really been looking.

Fisheries officer Bob Tupniak said in a telephone interview from Duncan that he would expect the fish to be brood stock. However, it's been a good year for chum salmon, he said, and the two fish could have been "overflow" from the Cowichan River. But pinks rather than chum tend to wander around a lot more and often spawn in a different river from that in which they were hatched, he said.

Tupniak expressed support for the concept of community involvement in salmon enhancement. He said the federal fisheries department didn't have the resources to look after all the smaller streams in the area.

As Jonathan Oldroyd noted, "If salmon enhancement is going to work, it needs to be done locally. They (fisheries) haven't got the money."

An enhancement program, particularly at Ganges, could have other benefits as well, Oldroyd said. He wondered about clearing out an area near the creek for gravel spawning beds with access available to the public.

"It would be good for tourists and great for students."

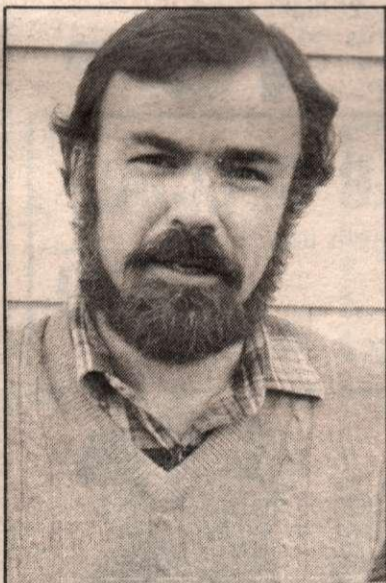
As far as native, or brood, stock is concerned, Oldroyd said it was doubtful there was any at Cusheon or Maxwell but he is hopeful for Duck Creek.

The federal Salmon Enhancement Program has told the local group that \$1,000 will be available to it for building incubation boxes. And eggs have been promised from Goldstream. All they need now is the Canada Works grant to get the creeks cleaned up and salmon enhancement is up and running.

Oldroyd said he'd like to see neighbourhoods getting together and working on enhancement. He also noted that public education on the subject was important.

People who have property bordering on creeks should try to ensure there are no obstacles in the creeks.

And anyone who sees a salmon in a local stream is urged to contact Oldroyd or Reimer.

### Pollution blamed as salmon numbers down

A little more pollution each year is resulting in decreased numbers of salmon spawning in Fulford Creek.

Fisheries officer Bob Tupniak of Duncan told *Driftwood* that each of the dozen or so farms bordering the creek contributes to the pollution.

Fulford Harbour resident Pat Horrocks, whose property is on the creek, said some fish have been going up but their numbers have been getting smaller every year. However, she noted that crayfish are back in the hundreds.

Tupniak said the creek would be helped by an enhancement program. But the first thing to do,

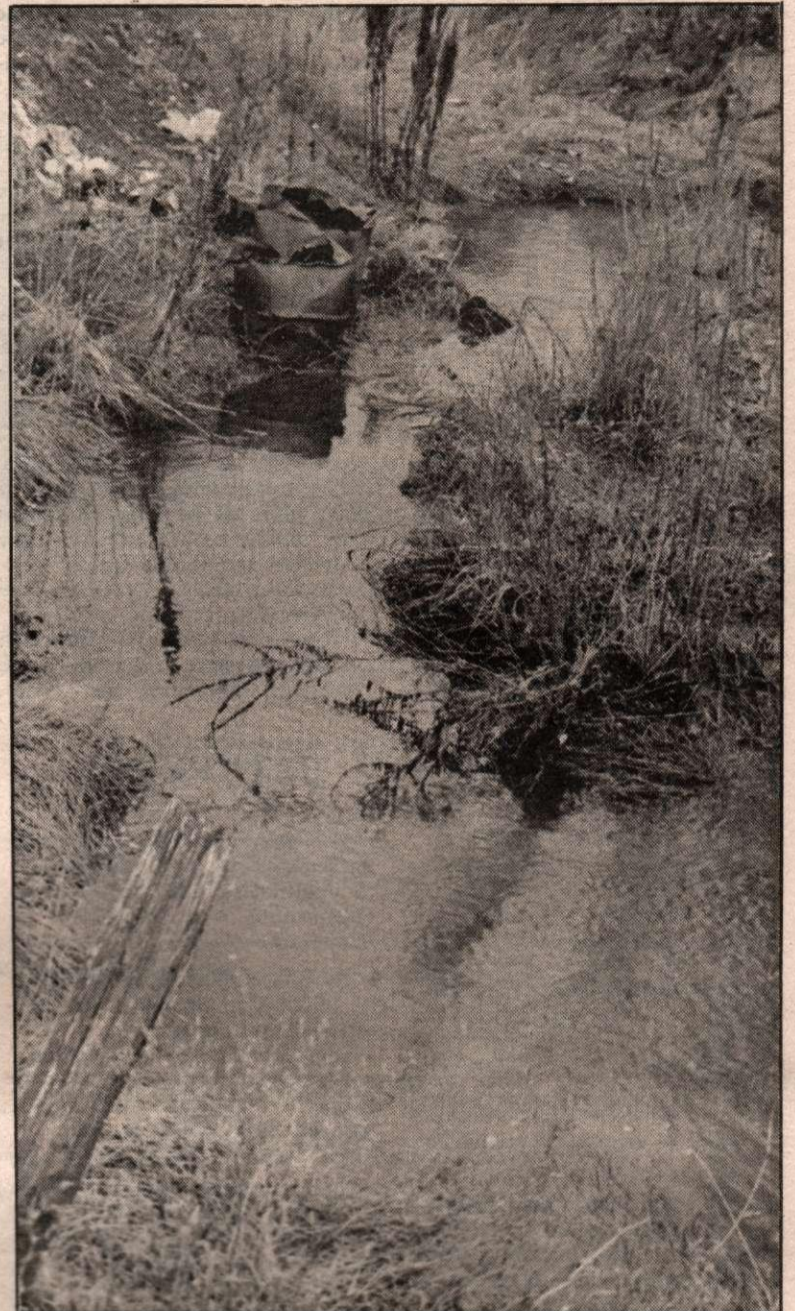
he said, was make sure the farms were looking after their waste products, such as animal manure, to ensure they don't enter the stream.

He suggested the spawning beds should be cleaned up though he warned that brush around the creek should not be removed.

The community should get involved, he added.

Fulford Creek was cleaned out 11 years ago, under the guidance of Gavin Reynolds, with the help of a Local Initiatives Program grant.

A year later 100 salmon per day were reported making their way up the creek.

## Relief Day collects \$3,000 at Ganges

Volunteers at Salt Spring collected \$3,000 last Friday, Ethiopian Relief Day.

The Capital Region decreed that the day should be set aside to collect money to aid in famine relief in the African nation. The island volunteers were at various locations collecting money for OXFAM.

The organizers of the fund-raiser were Hugh and Ruth Borsman. He is the CRD director for Salt Spring.

The federal government will match the donations on a three-to-one basis which means that at least \$12,000 towards famine relief was generated on Salt Spring.

And there could be more. The Salt Spring World Development Fund could be in a position to add up to \$10,000 to the famine relief fund.

The island group each year holds fund-raising events to help developing nations. Their most recent endeavour has been aimed at

funding a boys' town in Sri Lanka. They have donated \$18,000 towards that project and have at least \$10,000 left in their account.

The organizers have been in touch with Sri Lanka officials to determine if any money will be needed between now and the fund-raising events next year.

The Sri Lanka organizers, said Anglican minister John Bailey, appear to be willing to allow some money to be diverted to famine relief in Ethiopia.

The World Development Fund is a combined effort of the four island churches.

Salt Spring residents have been offering donations for Ethiopia to the fund. The total is not yet known.

The B.C. and Yukon division of the Canadian Red Cross, at 1046 Fort St. Victoria, V8V 3K4, will also accept donations for the famine relief efforts.

# Alcohol, drug problems on increase at secondary school

Concern at Gulf Islands Secondary School among parents, teachers and students centres on a growing problem of alcohol and drug use.

Principal Bob McWhirter agrees that the problem appears to be growing. He said the problem recurs every few years and publicity about it won't make it go away but would bring it into the open so that it can be addressed.

Recently, the Parents' Advisory Committee of GISS devoted a meeting to discussion of the problem. About 35 parents showed up for the meeting and they spoke about various aspects of dealing with it.

Ragnhild Hildred, a community social worker at the Community Centre on Ganges Hill, explained that alcohol use has been a constant problem with teenagers but when combined with the use of drugs, the problem worsens.

And Ganges detachment RCMP agree with that appraisal. The police make, on average, three liquor seizures from minors each weekend and that total could double during the summer.

Hildred recently gathered a group of young people together to discuss the issue.

The youths indicated that although there is a problem with

drug and alcohol use, there is also a solution. What is required, they told Hildred, is parental awareness as well as introduction of programs in the island community to allow for more socially acceptable activities for the young.

She said the Community Society was considering the establishment of a teen drop-in centre. The drawback to that idea was lack of funding. If the community were to contribute towards the centre for teens, she said, then government funding would follow.

But the community must show interest.

Marg Sitton, guidance counsellor at GISS, pointed out that public attitudes were part of the problem. Youth are continually exposed to adults disregarding liquor laws, she said. When youth see, at Sea Capers or a slowpitch ball game, adults drinking in public, the activity gains acceptability, she said.

McWhirter explained that the youthful user of drugs and alcohol is not the only one to suffer. Friends and family also suffer, he said.

Indications that a youth is taking drugs come from an increase in truancy, he explained.

Lately there has been an increase in theft at the high school.

"One thing about smoking dope," he said, "it's expensive."

Hildred explained that use of alcohol by a youth is easily recognizable. Drug use is a different matter, she said.

Parents should be aware of social changes in the youth, she explained. For example, if a young person suddenly quits such activities as basketball or other sports without explanation, use of drugs could be suspected.

Adults should be educated in the symptoms of drug use, she said. Efforts should also be aimed at disrupting the supply of drugs.

But that isn't quite so easy, she stated. The youths are not only using illegal drugs, such as marijuana, they also utilize prescription drugs.

Barbituates such as Nembutal, Seconal or Luminal belong to the general class of depressant drugs.

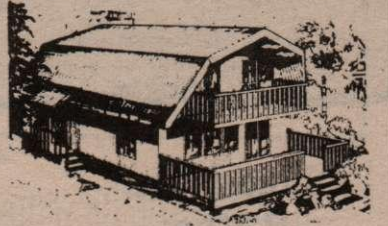
When combined with alcohol or other depressant drugs, even in relatively small amounts, a severe overdose could be the result.

Amphetamines, on the other hand, are stimulants. Amphetamines such as Benzedrine, Metedrine, Retalin or Preludin, when used frequently and in high doses, tend to produce paranoia in the user.

Overdoses of both drugs can lead to death.

# Enthusiastic audience for concert Sunday

The latest offering of the Salt Spring Concert Society was a recital Sunday afternoon in Ganges United Church by Victor Costanzi, violin, and Rita Costanzi, harp.

The Costanzis are familiar to Vancouver concert circles through their work with the Vancouver Symphony, the Vancouver Opera Orchestra, the CBC Vancouver Orchestra, and through various solo and chamber music recitals.

Sunday's program began with the exquisite *Sonata in A Major* by the re-discovered baroque master Antonio Vivaldi. There followed a *Sonatina* by Francois Naderman, a singular piece in which the traditional roles of the harp and the violin are reversed: the harp takes on the principal melodies while the violin plays the accompaniment.

The *Sonata for Violin and Guitar* by the notorious 19th century virtuoso Niccolo Paganini was executed with just the right blend of gusto and finesse.

Mrs. Costanzi soloed on Mendelssohn's *Venetian Gondola Song* which had been transcribed for harp from the original piano score.

The first half of the program concluded with music on a Scottish folksong, "Thou hast stolen my very heart," by the contemporary Vancouver composer Jean Coulthard.

After intermission the concert resumed with *Playera* by the Spanish master Sarasate. Almost elegiac in character, this noble and haunting piece was one of the most striking selections on the program.

*Vers la Source dans le Bois* by the French harpist-composer Marcel Tournier gave Rita Costanzi the opportunity for a display of optimum technical brilliance on her instrument.

There followed three Celtic songs, *Fairy Song*, *David on the White Rock* and the Scottish *Loch Lomond*. The latter was dedicated to local harp craftsman Lawrie Neish.

The printed portion of the program concluded with the optimistic *Andante con Variazioni* by Rossini. The principal theme of this piece is the aria "Di tanti palpiti" from the composer's opera *Tancredi*.

The enthusiastic capacity audience brought the two musicians back for an encore, the familiar *Feenlied*.

Throughout the concert, Victor and Rita Costanzi heightened their rapport with the audience by offering descriptive comments on the music, as well as some amusing anecdotes.

A collection of 22 drawings, photographs, prints and paintings is coming to two islands next week courtesy of the Vancouver Art Gallery's extension department.

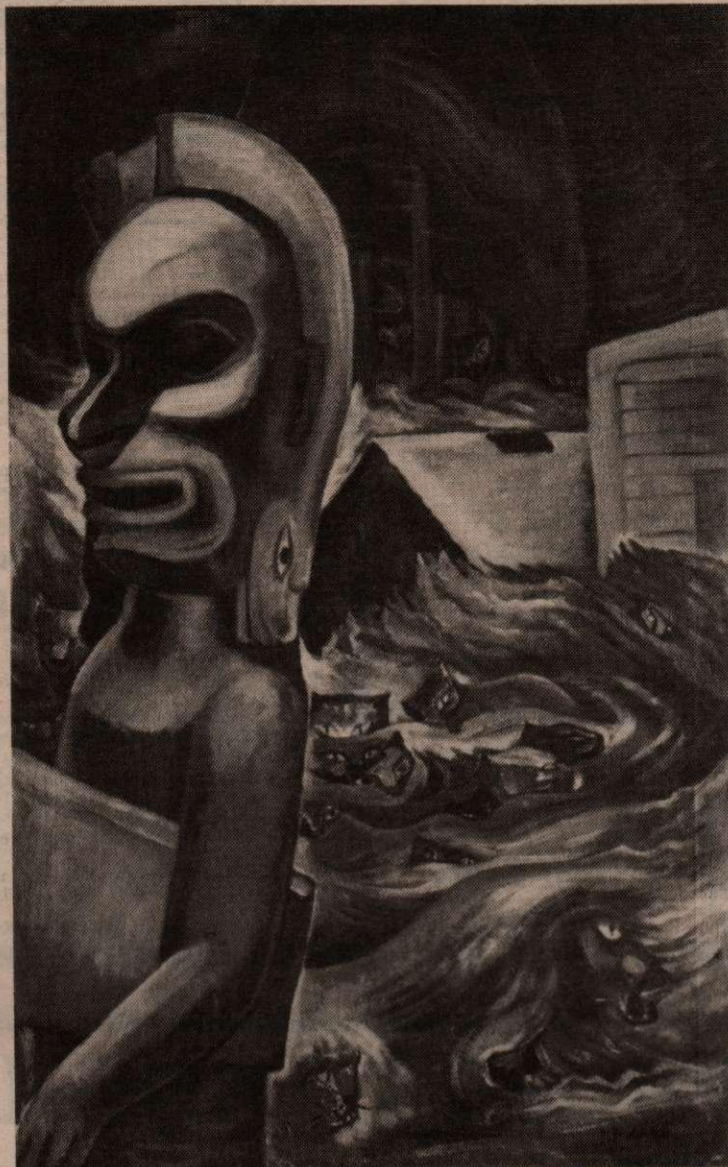

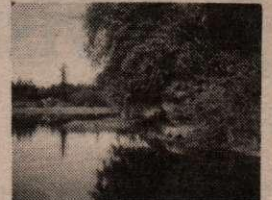

# Television hearings are ended

## As CRTC examines proposal to move to Island

The end of the television enquiry is in sight.

The Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission has conducted an enquiry into the application by Western Approaches Ltd. to switch the CKVU transmitter on Salt Spring Island to Channel 10.

At the hearing in Victoria in June, the evidence indicated that the move will close off Channel 9 to the island. Channel 9 is the odd-man-out on local television. Although an American station, it is supported in considerable degree by Canadian subscribers. To many viewers, KCTS, the Public Broadcasting Service on Channel 9, is a considerable attraction.

During the enquiries into the proposed change, it was revealed that the PBS station's signal goes into some 650,000 households in

British Columbia.

The majority of criticisms expressed at the Victoria hearing were devoted to the loss of Channel 9 within certain areas. These include Salt Spring Island, part of Vancouver Island, part of the Gulf Islands and Sechelt Peninsula.

### ISLAND OBSERVER

One of the intervenors taking part in the hearing was Mrs. Grace Byrne of Ganges.

She observed at the time that the change would represent a threat to island viewers. She also said that the change proposed an increased audience for CKVU and the loss of Channel 9 to island viewers.

The hearing in June left observers with the distinct fear that the new project would seriously jeopardize the receipt of the PBS programs on Salt Spring Island, she warned.

In view of the highly technical nature of the project a technical

hearing was called in October to enable the participants in the earlier hearing to better understand the technical factors of the proposed change.

The later hearing heard evidence stating that not only Channel 9, but Channels 10 and 11 would be in jeopardy in some parts of the island.

The technical hearing learned that the Fulford Harbour cable system has its receiving antennae only two miles from the CKVU transmitter site, in direct line of sight.

### THREE CHANNELS LOST

Channels 9 and 11 will definitely be lost, the hearing learned, and Channel 10 will not be usable.

In all likelihood other channels will be adversely affected because of the proximity to the transmitter site, continues the report on the hearing.

In Ganges, on the cable service,

Channel 9 will be lost. Channel 11 is not distributed from the receiving antenna site, but Channel 10 would not be usable, the hearing was told.

The hearing broke the problems down into dollars and cents. If the necessary funds were available, some of the problems could be corrected.

It was explained that systems in other parts of the province will be dependent on areas outside Salt Spring Island to pick up the signal from PBS. The hearing also heard proposals for the transmission of such signals by microwave and a summary of the costs involved.

### HARDEST HIT

Areas hardest hit are the islands and Sechelt, with other places facing smaller problems.

The technical hearing also indicated that the change will cost the larger cable systems hundreds of thousands of dollars. For many smaller systems a switch to other sources would be prohibitive.

There will be no further hearings into the proposal and the commission will now consider the information gained and then reach a decision.

Even when the decision is reached it could be several years before an affirmative decision could be accommodated by cable companies elsewhere in the province.

## Don't touch carcasses — police

Sea lions in Porlier Pass at the north end of Galiano Island are being shot and RCMP warn residents to be wary of touching the dead bodies.

Reports about California sea lions carrying disease have been circulated. The animals have been sighted coming north.

An official with the federal department of fisheries in Nanaimo said that there have been no recorded cases of diseased sea lions being found in local waters.

But, added the official, people should exercise caution if a carcass has been washed up on a beach. He requests that information be passed on to the fisheries biological station in Nanaimo.

Although there have been no recorded cases of diseased sea lions, he said, that doesn't mean there are none here.

# Intervenor sees cost of change too high as final hearing is closed on application

She has followed the proposal very closely. When CKVU announced its plans to move its program to Channel 10, Grace Byrne was not asleep. She promptly protested the threat to island reception of the Public Broadcasting system on Channel 9.

She was duly recognized as an intervenor and she attended two hearings in Victoria.

Like most island addicts of the PBS programs, she had no objection to the move. Her concern was centred on the effect of the switch.

Last week she took her last action in connection with the proposal. She wrote to the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission summarizing her

concerns in view of the technical evidence heard by the technical hearing in October.

### PREVENT RECEPTION

The evidence presented at the June hearing suggested that the shift from Channel 21 to Channel 10 at its Salt Spring Island transmitter would prevent reception of KCTS Channel 9 by off-air receivers on Salt Spring Island and by the Salt Spring Island cablevision. This problem would be shared with other residents within the "cone of silence".

The technical hearings confirmed this suggestion, she wrote, and it offered no viable solution.

She found a disparity between the hardships threatened.

"CKVU is received by the cable systems and presented on Channel 13," she wrote to the commission, "viewers without cable can receive it off-air on Channel 21. An avid viewer of CKVU has a choice of methods to receive this signal."

"If CKVU broadcasts from Channel 10, 25,000 residents of the cone of silence will have no choice of methods to receive Channel 9 PBS. We will have lost a service that brings the best of international programs, including 20% Canadian, to us."

"This would be discrimination against a minority who enjoy the commercial-free, high quality programs on PBS and whose financial support of PBS is a

legitimate Canadian tax deduction."

### QUALITY PROGRAMS

She wrote warmly of the quality of CKVU programs and its news coverage in the evening, followed by the *Vancouver Show*. Both programs are oriented to the Greater Vancouver area, where most of the CKVU audience lives, she noted. The programs are of less interest and value to the 83,000 potential viewers CKVU hopes to reach by the change in dial position.

By contrast, wrote Byrne, Canadian programming on PBS is selected not only for high quality but for general interest.

She asked the commission to consider if the gain of some potential viewers to CKVU can compensate for "the certain loss to us of PBS."

She would certainly support the CKVU application if there were some affordable method to provide PBS services to those 25,000 viewers in the cone of silence, she concluded.

The cone of silence is the affected zone where the change would eliminate reception of Channel 9.

# Singers' concert December 9

As islanders prepare for the Christmas season, they are reminded to include the Salt Spring Singers' Christmas concert in their plans.

The Singers have been spending many weeks practising Christmas music for this annual event. Among the selections they plan to sing are *The Jesus Gift*, selected carols by Alfred Burt, a Spanish carol entitled *Fum, Fum, Fum* and a rendition of *'Twas the Night Before Christmas*.

In addition to other seasonal favourites, the group will perform the *Hallelujah Chorus* by Handel.

The concert will be held at Ganges United Church Sunday, Dec. 9 with performances at 2.30 and 7.30. Admission is \$2 per adult by donation.

# Down Through the Years with Driftwood

## Twenty Years Ago

Another cougar was shot in Burgoyne Valley. The latest big cat brought to three the number which had been sighted and killed in a week. Bob Akerman took his cougar hound Pearl and his two sons on the hunt which ended near the base of Mount Maxwell.

The Lions Club of Salt Spring had decided to proceed with plans to build a low-rental housing project to cater to senior citizens. The first step would be a survey of island residents to find out how much interest there was in such a project. The housing units would be built near Ganges.

Rescue operations sent the Gulf Islands voluntary coast guard unit to look for five men from Vancouver who were reported missing after starting across the Strait of Georgia. The men were found on a beach at Galiano Island and returned to the city by ferry. The boat was being repaired at Galiano.

The awards dinner of the Salt Spring Rod and Gun Club was held. Jack Reynolds handed out the shooting awards to Morry Akerman, Don Reynolds and James Stevens. The fishing trophies went to Joe Rozzano, Mac Mouat and Bud Conery. The junior fishing awards were given to Jimmy Morris, Daphne Mouat and Laurie Mouat. Club president Vic Jackson presided over the event.

The pupils of the elementary school in Ganges put on a hot dog sale to raise money for the junior Red Cross. With various pupils filling various tasks, the group cooked and sold 42 dozen hot dogs in 52 minutes. They took in \$27 for their efforts.

The Salt Spring OAPO, Branch 32, held a meeting to elect officers. Archdeacon Holmes conducted the balloting. Fred Goddard, Archdeacon Holmes, Mrs. Jeanne Proctor and Elsie Thacker were each re-elected to serve another year.

## Fifteen Years Ago

The trustees of the Gulf Islands School Board approved the provisional budget for the coming year. The budget, set at \$719,000, had more than doubled in seven years. In 1962, it stood at \$270,000.

Centennial projects for the birthday of British Columbia were being discussed on Salt Spring. Development of Drummond Park and facilities at Vesuvius Bay were two projects being considered. Extension of the library was also being talked about.

The scholarship from the Royal Canadian Legion, Pacific Command, went to Wayne Taylor of Salt Spring. He was awarded

\$300 to help cover costs while he attended the University of Victoria.

The annual bazaar staged by the Pender Island Women's Institute raised \$400. The event was opened by institute president Mrs. H. G. Scott who explained what projects the money would be used to support. When the raffles were drawn, Mrs. Pete Schiott won the quilt, Mrs. John Copley won the Christmas cake and Mrs. Emma Muir won the small cake.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that another Saturnalia would be held in the community hall. This event would be to celebrate the arrival of the newly purchased fire truck. Jim Money had arranged to buy the used vehicle from the Surrey Fire Department. Delivery was expected on December 6.

The Agricultural Society of Mayne Island held its annual meeting and election of officers. Jesse Brown was chosen as president while Fred Bennet would be vice-president. Grace Evans would be secretary and Stan Lowe would be treasurer. Brown also summarized the activities of the society during the past year.

The Galiano Club brought a group from Bastion Theatre to the island to entertain. The group would perform *Pinnocchio* for the children in the afternoon and would also offer a history of musical satire in the evening.

## Ten Years Ago

Local Initiative Program grants valued at close to \$60,000 were approved to fund four projects in the Gulf Islands. The Chamber of Commerce on Galiano would receive \$11,336 to fix the public access to the waterfront at Stones Road. At Salt Spring, the Rod and Gun Club would have \$20,050 to clear streams and the Lions Club received \$18,632 towards the

recreation site at Central. The Recreation Commission had \$9,667 to repair playing fields as well as Fulford Hall.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that the men of the Lions Club would be staging an appreciation night for the ladies. John Silvester would be organizing the evening and the men would be cooking the supper for the event.

Blood donors showed up in fewer numbers at the clinic sponsored by the Salt Spring Legion. But they left behind 94 pints of blood. A spokesman for the Red Cross expressed gratification with the results.

## Five Years Ago

The Agricultural Land Commission approved the aircraft landing strip on Mayne Island. The proposed field had been the subject of debate with residents objecting to the matter. The land commission would permit a five-year licence and renewal was subject to adherence to eight conditions. The landing field would be 1,500 feet long crossing three lots and would be for the use of five people.

The first day of the public hearing being held by the Pollution Control Board listened to opponents of the proposed sewer system. There were six people to speak against the proposal.

The Chamber of Commerce on Salt Spring Island had chosen George Heinekey as Citizen of the Year. He was selected, the chamber's announcement noted, "for his years of service to the community..."

The Garden Club of Salt Spring celebrated its 25th anniversary with a dinner for members. They chose a new executive for the coming year as well. Lionel Wood was selected as president. Outgoing president was Charles Orchard.

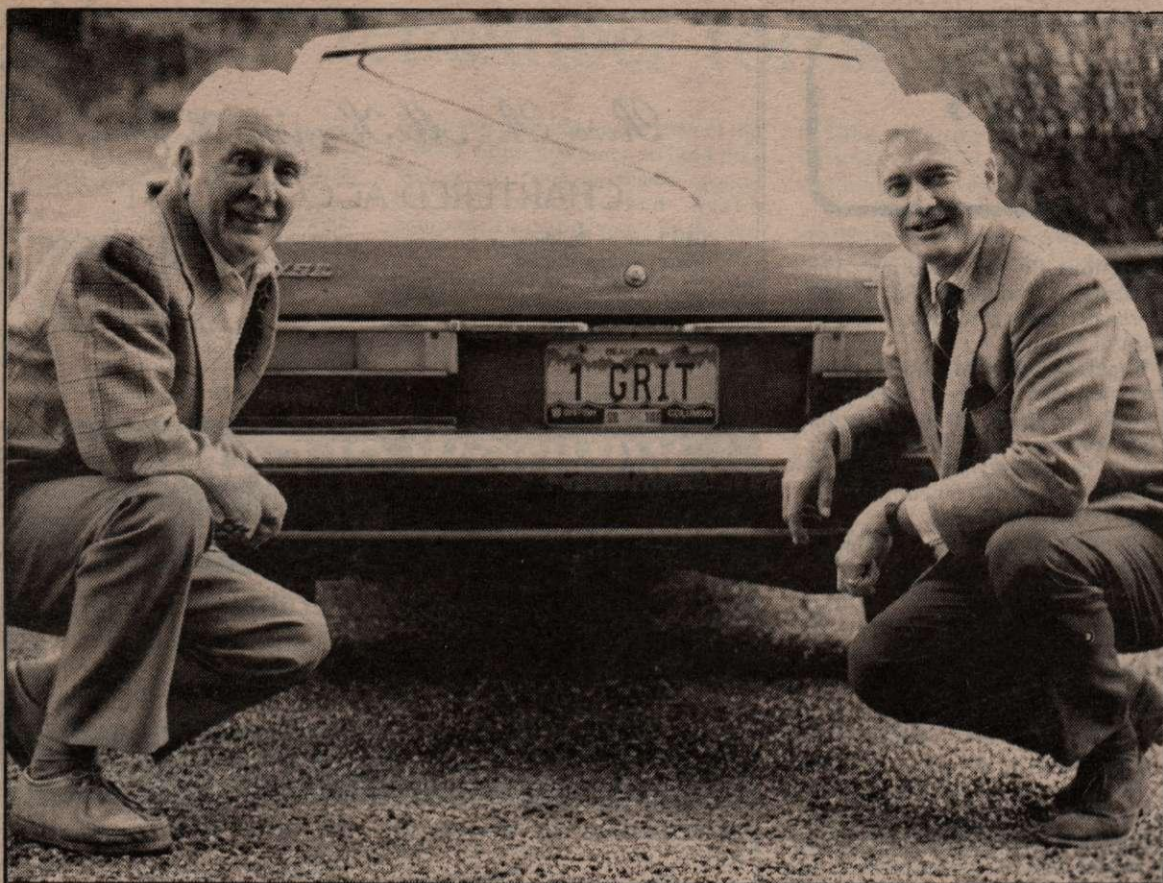

## Ex-resident honoured at university

Lanny Howard was a well-known Salt Spring Island figure a decade ago. Lanny Howard has a habit of being well-known wherever he goes.

When he became a senior student at Simon Fraser University in 1979, he quickly became a well-known senior student.

The Howards came to Salt Spring Island in 1967, when Lanny retired from the army. They quickly fitted into the changing island community and the retired major found friends everywhere. He was a warm and friendly man.

Lanny's main claim to distinction on the island was his participation in the efforts of the Salt Spring Players. His work with the Players' group earned him the best actor award in the B. C. Regional Drama Festival some 15 years ago.

When they weren't acting, they were travelling. The Howards built their home on the island and then travelled through Europe and Latin America.

Later, they left the island and found their way to the mainland, where Lanny again came up to try new experiences in his new environment.

In October, Howard was presented with an achievement plaque by the university in token of his work with the "late-learners".

The ex-islander responded to an advertisement inviting senior citizens to study at Simon Fraser. That was in 1979. When he celebrated his 70th birthday on August 5, Lanny Howard was one of 120 senior citizens enrolled at the university and who are members of the Opsimath Club. It was Lanny's wife who translated Opsimath into late learner. It means, literally, a person who starts to learn late in life and is derived from two Greek words.

The alumni achievement award was made in token of his work with the club, a service to the university and the community. He completed his seniors' certificate in 1982. He is now "slouching" towards his BA, in political science. Similarly honoured at the same ceremony were auditor-general Kenneth Dye and retired chancellor Paul Cote.

Howard recalls that he left high school during the depression years and was unable to continue his education. He was drafted into the army in 1941 and was surprised to enjoy it. He came out 26 years later to retire on the island. It was while he was living on Salt Spring that Lanny Howard wrote a play depicting the aftermath of a nuclear explosion on the islands.

His many island friends will be happy to learn of his success.

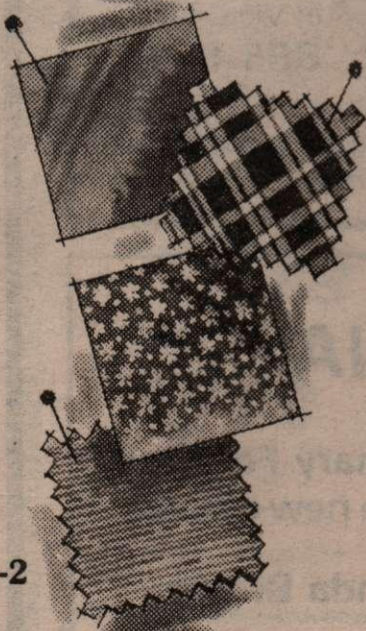
