
There also will be a follow-up program where senior officials will assess junior officials periodically to ensure conformity of laws and their application.

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Former Pender resident discovers another island paradise Down Under

The Gulf Islands isn't the only paradise that was visited by Captain Cook, says former Pender Island resident Gillian May.

She came back to visit Pender from another paradise which the famed explorer had visited. It, too, is an island.

Magnetic Island sits about five miles off the coast of North Queensland in Australia and is considered to be part of the Great Barrier Reef.

The nearest mainland city to the 20-square-mile island is Townsville which is 40 minutes away by ferry.

Magnetic Island is home to 2,200 people and is idyllic, says May. She had gone Down Under "to search for the sun." She visited Townsville, population 120,000 and heard about Magnetic Island by accident. One visit to the island convinced her she had found what she wanted and she has been there for three years.

The winter months, June to August, feature an average low temperature of 17 degrees Celsius with an average high of 25.5 degrees. Summer, which would be our winter, has temperatures which range from lows of 21 degrees to highs of 31. Yearly rainfall measures slightly more than 105 centimetres (42 inches).

She describes the lifestyle on Magnetic Island as easy. Children don't bother with shoes and socks when they go to school and dress for adults is just as casual with females sporting sarongs.

When May came back to Pender to visit her parents, Dick and Betty Poole, she had to borrow heavier clothing to cope with our temperate winter weather. She had no winter

clothes.

Captain Cook visited Magnetic Island in 1770. His compass began to act up and he suspected a magnetic source on the island as the cause of his trouble. He named the place Magnetic Island.

It was inhabited by aborigines but whites began to settle there in the 1870's. Nelly Bay, one of the villages, was named for the first white baby born on the island.

Mount Cook is the highest point on the island at 488 metres (1,628 feet).

Most of the island, about 75%, is a national park sanctuary. The park contains koala bears, wallabies and numerous species of birds. There is also one big red kangaroo on Magnetic Island but no one is sure how it got there from the mainland.

The wallabies are similar to the Gulf Islands deer in that they visit gardens for breakfast, lunch or supper. But most of the animals stay within the sanctuary.

The park is also inhabited by poisonous snakes.

"If people stay away from them," says May, "they'll stay away from people."

The ferry terminal on the island is at Picnic Bay. The place got its name because people from Townsville would go there for picnics.

Cost of the ferry, for foot

passengers only, is \$5.50 return. A vehicle ferry visits twice each day but the cost for an automobile is \$36 return.

Magnetic Island has one highway which stretches about 10 kilometres from Picnic Bay on the south to Horseshoe Bay on the north.

Transportation about the island is by a vehicle known as a mini-moke, an open-sided version of a small car with a canvas top. In addition to the main road, the island features about 40 km of other negotiable roads.

Leisure activities cover golf, tennis and various water sports among other things.

The island boasts a drive-in theatre, says May, but with a difference.

The people arrive at the open-air theatre in their mini-mokes but take something to sit on while watching the movie. The screen is three large pieces of plywood and the sound comes from stereo speakers which sit on oil drums on each side of the screen.

The main source of employment on the island is the tourist industry, she says, although it has room for improvement. Close to three-quarters of the foreign visitors come from Canada for a day-trip out of Townsville but they end up spending a week or more on the island.

Council wants changes in operation

Mahon Hall is used primarily by groups affiliated with the Community Arts Council (CAC) and they want changes in the way the hall is run.

Gerry Layard, president of the CAC, explained the wanted changes to the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission last week.

The hall, she explained, is owned by the Gulf Islands School Board. It is rented at \$1 per year, to the Capital Region and nominal responsibility rests with the Parks and Recreation Commission.

It is operated and monitored by a committee composed of three members of the commission and two members of the CAC.

Recent renovations to the building cost \$20,000, of which the

CRD kicked in \$250 to help build a sidewalk.

Layard said the CAC is requesting that the Mahon Hall committee be separate from any other committee of the commission. The CAC, she said, wants specific rules for the use of the hall by various community groups.

The rental charges should be spelled out and the procedure for booking the hall should be refined, Layard said.

She reminded the commission that the furnishings of the hall, such as the chairs and folding tables, are the property of the CAC.

There are, she added, certain improvements which should be

taken care of. The exterior paint job was never completed, the furnace needs repair, the electrical panel is not marked to show the various circuits and the sidewalk at the back of the hall is littered with rubble which should be removed, Layard explained.

1984 is the 80th anniversary of the construction of Mahon Hall, she told the commission, and some appropriate celebration of the event should be staged.

Later in the meeting, when the three representatives of the commission for the Mahon Hall committee were announced, she gave the commission \$1,500 to cover CAC use of the hall for the year.

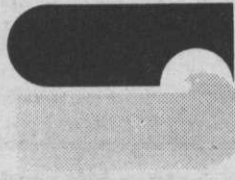
Help wanted for logo

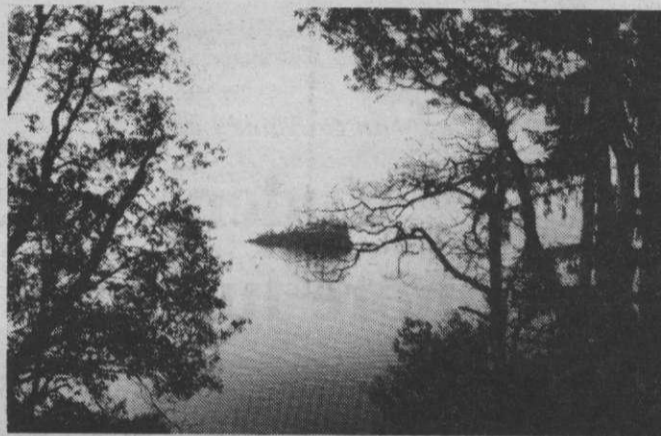

Japanese student finds school more fun here

A Rotary exchange student has been enjoying the freedoms of Gulf Islands Secondary School after taking leave of her all-girls convent school in Japan.

The Rotary exchange program sponsors a high school student each year. Last summer Paul Betts left for Japan while Akiko Ogata, who hails from Fukuoka on the South Island, came to Canada.

Sixteen-year-old Akiko is enjoying her stay on Salt Spring Island. She has been spending periods of three months in the homes of Rotarians on the island and has just recently moved from the home of the Langston family to stay with Ben and Carole Martens.

Akiko is attending Grades 11 and 12 at Gulf Islands Secondary but will have 1½ more years of school

left to complete her schooling in Japan.

In Japan the school year begins in April, and ends after numerous holidays the following March. School in Canada is certainly more fun, Akiko says.

But the Catholic convent school where Akiko Ogata has received her education is not an ordinary Japanese school. A number of rules are enforced.

"There's no hair perming, no ear-piercing, no make-up and no nail polish allowed. Skirts must be worn over the knee. All girls wear a uniform and you have to wear black shoes and bobby socks."

Since she came to Canada, Akiko admits that she has broken many of those rules, and proudly displays her pierced ears, permed hair and mini-skirt.

A friend of Akiko's at the school in Ganges, Corrinne Langston, explains that Akiko is a math whiz. Akiko is modest about her achievements and adds that everyone in Japan has to be a whiz at mathematics.

Akiko will be leaving for Japan in August where she will complete her final year and a half before studying dress design.

In eight years

Library has tripled in size

Growth is one of the activities at the Mary Hawkins Memorial Library on Salt Spring.

In the past eight years, the library has tripled in size and members of the board of directors of the facility anticipate the need to expand within a couple of years.

The library is one of the few in B.C. which is operated entirely by volunteers under the direction of the board. Each year, at the annual meeting of library members, the board is selected to run the facility for the next year.

The annual meeting for 1984 is slated for February 15 at 3:15 pm in St. George's Hall.

The volunteers, 50 strong, donate time and effort to maintain the facility. They man the circulation desk, carry out office work, repair books in the workshop and tidy the shelves to keep the books in order.

But that's the way it's been since the library began.

In 1958, Mary Hawkins and some friends began to put the library together. They gathered books from various sources and set up shop in one room at the rear of Mouat's store.

The library was an immediate success and soon expanded to two rooms.

By the early 1960's, the islanders involved in the operation decided to look around for a permanent home for the Salt Spring Library. They acquired a property on McPhillips Avenue complete with a boat-building shed.

Again the volunteers pitched in and turned the shed into a suitable place for the library and it was officially opened in 1964 by Mrs. W.A.C. Bennett.

Since then the library has not looked back.

Each year, money to purchase books comes in the form of a provincial grant based on the population of the island. The book selection committee of the board of directors makes every effort to provide books of current interest.

They also cater to various groups on the island to supply books covering such topics as crafts and seamanship.

In addition to books, the library offers a weekly story time for preschoolers. Each Monday morning, up to 25 children gather to learn about books.

Audio books for people who have problems seeing are also available. An eligibility form must be completed before the taped books can be ordered through the provincial library service.

Large print books can be borrowed from the library. They are also loaned out to Greenwoods for the residents there.

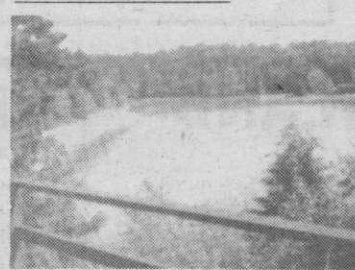

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

Tenders for improvements to the Fernwood Water District line were called for. The water district planned to run a new line from St. Mary Lake to the Fernwood wharf. The water would also be chlorinated. The new line would replace the system which had been in use for 20 years.

Annual election of officers was held at the Royal Canadian Legion, Salt Spring branch. W. Kirkham was chosen as president to succeed Desmond Croton who had served for two years. The Legion was located in a newly renovated building and Croton reported membership at more than 170 people.

The library on Salt Spring had been officially opened. Mrs. W.A.C. Bennett had come to the island from Victoria for the occasion. More than 100 people attended the ceremony which celebrated the opening of a permanent home for the four-year-old library.

Weather for January was interesting, reported Howard Carlin, the Ganges weather-watcher. Eight inches of precipitation fell including one inch of snow. The high temperature was recorded at 52 degrees and the low for the month was 32. Carlin noted that a past January had recorded 70 inches of snow.

Plans and preparations for the seventh annual Pancake Race were being made on Salt Spring. The event was sponsored by the Ladies Auxiliary to the Legion. The Lions Club of the island had issued a challenge to the Victoria Gyros. Prizes would be silver coins for children and boxes of pancake mix for adults.

Driftwood published a 13-page paper. The blank page was discovered late in production and printed with only an explanation of the mistake instead of news items. The pages were numbered one to 12 with an extra page bearing no number.

Fifteen Years Ago

The candidates for the federal by-election were busy talking to voters. Tommy Douglas of the New Democrats led the field of three seeking the seat for Nanaimo, Cowichan and the Islands. Eric Winch was Liberal candidate and Magnus Verbrugge was the Progressive Conservative. Voting would occur on the following Monday.

B.C. Tel announced plans to spend \$164,000 on feeder exchanges and distribution cables for Salt

Spring, Galiano, Pender and Saturna Islands. The automatic switching equipment at the Salt Spring and the Outer Islands exchanges would also be improved at a cost of \$21,000. The work would be part of a \$73 million expansion program for the province.

The morning ferry schedule for the Outer Islands was altered to allow the boat to visit Long Harbour. The change would bring students to high school on Salt Spring but only three took advantage of the ride.

Ten Years Ago

The court of revision for the Gull Islands was set to sit. There were 700 people ready to protest assessments on 1,000 properties. The court would be in session five days per week until the case-load was heard.

The seamless floors at Salt Spring Elementary School had developed cracks. The floors had developed the cracks even before renovations of the building had been completed. Merely repairing the cracks would not solve the problem, the Gull Islands School Board was told; other measures would be needed.

Pender Island parents of high school students did not want the children boarding at homes on Salt Spring to attend classes. They asked the Gull Islands School Board to set up a system of supervised correspondence courses for the Pender youths.

The movements of killer whales in the coastal waters of B.C. were being charted by the Fisheries Research Board of Canada. Residents of the Gull Islands were asked to help by reporting any sighting of the whales.

Members of the Salt Spring Library Association would be asked to vote on a new name for the library. When the members gathered for the annual meeting and elections of officers, they would have the opportunity to approve the name, Mary Hawkins Memorial Library. Hawkins had been a driving force in the creation of the library and had acted as treasurer of the group for many years.

Mayne Island ladies gathered to

set plans for the World Day of Prayer to be celebrated in St. Mary Magdalene Church on March 1.

On Saturna Island, St. Christopher's Church had a new altar. The altar would replace a temporary one which had been put in place for the dedication of the church in 1963. The altar was made of yellow cedar and mahogany by Leslie and Hilda Crosby of East Point.

For 60 years, H.M.S. Ganges Chapter IODE had served Salt Spring and the ladies were looking for ways to celebrate the anniversary. The group had two charters. One had been issued in 1914 and the second came later to affirm that the chapter was named for the British warship.

Five Years Ago

A report on a five-year plan for recreation on Salt Spring had been released. The report suggested creation of a recreation centre and offered support for a curling rink. Costs, the report noted, ruled out a swimming pool and a skating rink. There should be another tennis court at Portlock Park and at least one court for the Fullford area.

A public meeting would be held in Ganges to organize protest against the proposed three-cents-per-gallon urban transit tax on gasoline. Islanders would not benefit from buses and shouldn't pay the tax it was felt. The Islands Trust opposed the tax and so did local MLA Hugh Curtis, but the Capital Region wanted it.

B.C. Ferries would bring in a department of highways ferry, the *Tachek*, as a replacement for the *Bowen Queen* which was being stretched. The *Tachek* would combine with the *Pender Queen* to offer service between Fullford and Swartz Bay.

Activities of the Galiano Weavers and Spinners was reviewed at the group's annual meeting. They had donated \$300 to Greenwoods and \$25 to the Galiano School walkathon. Another \$50 went to the children's Christmas party. The membership of the club stood at 35.

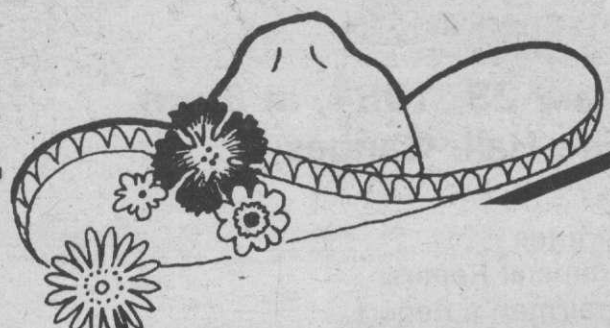

Lamb killed by ravens

Ravens are becoming a problem for sheep farmers, says Salt Spring animal control officer Howard Byron. He brought a dead lamb to Driftwood to illustrate what is happening. He said ravens killed the young animal on a north-island farm. Another farmer has lost at least a dozen lambs to the birds.

Business is slack around the courts of revision this year. The assessment of properties against 1982 valuation has slowed down the rush to protest. Most properties are valued against the value placed on them in last year's assessment notice.

On Salt Spring Island the court will sit for four scheduled days, with the possibility of a fifth.

The Outer Islands court of revision sits at Pender Island and at Sidney and will undertake six days of hearings, according to the schedule.

Property owners who feel that the valuation placed on their properties is excessive may appeal to the court of revision to have an independent group of citizens listen to their complaints and make a judgment.

NORMAL ROUTINE

In normal years the courts in the islands would sit for about three weeks. It is three years since the courts were augmented to meet the unprecedented numbers of appeals following the sharp market fluctuations evident throughout British Columbia.

The commission meets on the last Monday of each month.

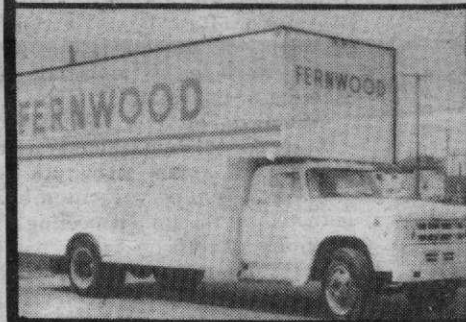
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Letter's existence threatened
