

Trust agrees with design panel on removal of trees in Ganges

When construction of the new credit union office begins at Ganges, the seven fir trees on the property will come down.

The Salt Spring Island Trust Committee last week agreed with the recommendation of the advisory design panel to permit construction of the building on the lot at the corner of Lower Ganges Road and Hereford Avenue.

The seven fir trees have been subject of some debate, with several island residents speaking in opposition to their removal.

The firs must come down, the committee agreed, because building the foundation on one side of the trees and lowering the sidewalk on the other will damage the roots.

The firs would die and become a hazard to pedestrians, traffic and the new building.

Walter Davis of Salt Spring had objected to removal of the trees and contacted the department of highways to see if they could be saved. He was told that the trees could be saved but had to be trimmed and topped.

Tom Toynbee, who is carrying out the development project, had also contacted highways officials.

One of the trees is on the property, three others straddle the property line and two are on the highway right-of-way.

Toynbee related what the highways official meant by topping. The initial topping of the trees would take off 10 feet. If the tree is adversely affected, each subsequent topping would mean cutting off another 10 feet.

The fir at the corner of Hereford and Lower Ganges Road blocked visibility for traffic, he had been told, and it would have to be trimmed back to increase visibility. The trimming and topping would leave four feet of tree.

Plans call for a 4,300-square-foot building to accommodate the credit union. Parking would be at the rear with sufficient room for 23 standard parking spaces.

The septic field would be located near Hereford Avenue.

Trustee Bev Unger suggested that the recommendations of the advisory design panel be accepted but the committee should write to the highways officials to see if the trees could be saved.

She also expressed concern about the sewage disposal system. The recommendation should also include a provision that septic disposal be subject to health department approval, she noted.

Toynbee produced a septic disposal permit which had been issued by the Capital Region health department in January. The health officials were satisfied that the proposed septic system could handle the flow from the office.

The design panel did ask for certain assurances from the developers. The panel wants to look at a detailed landscaping plan for the lot and wants a sidewalk to be put in along Hereford Avenue.

The panel asked for a detailed plan of the area to be used for septic disposal to see if a public area could be created there.

The adjacent properties should be screened by hedges or a fence, the panel said.

John Rich, vice-chairman of the Islands Trust and representative for Bowen Island, told the meeting that the Salt Spring community plan called for the concentration of commercial activities in Ganges.

He said that such concentration meant a modification of the rural atmosphere of the village. The trees, he said, would have to go.

Toynbee indicated that the firs would be replaced by deciduous trees.

Rich and Nick Gilbert approved the proposal, while Unger voted against it.

Ministry rejects bylaw

Another attempt by the Islands Trust to increase lot sizes in watershed zones on Salt Spring has been rejected by the ministry of municipal affairs.

The Trust committee had sent an amended version of the minimum parcel area bylaw for the Watershed 2 zone to the ministry for approval last October. The negative answer came back in January.

The intent of the amendment was to raise the minimum lot size to four from two hectares (10 from five acres). The Watershed 2 zone covers the area around Stowe Lake.

The committee had earlier attempted to gain approval to have the parcel sizes in Watershed 1 zones increased to 12 ha (30 acres) from four ha (10 acres). The ministry had turned down that request too.

A covering letter from deputy minister John Taylor came back to

the Islands Trust with the rejected bylaw.

Taylor noted: "Salt Spring Island Trust Committee bylaw no. 92 (Watershed 2 parcel size amendment) is obviously a component of the overall water supply issue and is returned pending a thorough review of the particular problems and appropriate responses."

The Trust committee had written to the minister of municipal affairs, Bill Ritchie, seeking a meeting to talk about watershed protection.

Taylor went on to suggest that a meeting with the minister would not "be appropriate without preliminary discussions at the staff level."

The committee decided to keep trying to gain approval for the two bylaw amendments.

Heating System Operation and Maintenance

It is now midwinter and your heating system has been running for some months. This is a good time to look at your furnace or baseboard heaters to see if they are operating as efficiently as they should. Dirt or blockage can hinder the proper distribution of heat, keeping heat from some rooms and causing hot spots in others.

Any furnace, whether gas, electric or oil, has certain areas that should be examined at least twice per heating season. Before doing any work on the furnace, whether maintenance or lubrication, be sure to switch off the power either at the switch on the furnace or at the circuit breaker. Clear the area around the furnace of boxes and rubbish, especially if the material is flammable. Always keep this area clear.

One of the first things to check is whether the motor driving the fan needs lubrication. Normally motors have two oil holes, one at each end of the motor housing. Two or three drops of a good quality standard 30 oil put into these openings will provide good lubrication for months. Don't over-oil, otherwise dirt will collect around the shaft near the bearing. The next item to examine is the fan belt. Is it still resilient? Are there cracks or breaks in it? Is it properly aligned between the pulleys on the shaft of the fan and the shaft of the motor? If there are any checks or breaks on the inside of the fan belt, it should be replaced.

The filter should now be removed and, if it is a replaceable type, replaced with a clean filter. If it is a cleanable filter, then it should be vacuumed or washed as appropriate. If you do not know what type of filter is installed, phone your local contractor or a supplier of the furnace you have and ask for recommendations on the proper maintenance of the filter material.

The furnace can now be closed up and switched on for operation. The next thing to look at is the air distribution for the furnace. Are all the registers clear of carpets, draperies, children's toys, etc.? A blocked register will impede the flow of warm air to that particular space and there will be a problem with a chill. If this happens in the room where the thermostat is located, it will cause the thermostat to call for more and more heat—overheating other areas and wasting energy. If drapery material is not kept clear of registers, warm air will be trapped between the drapes and the wall or window area, increasing the heat loss through that part of the structure. Some people have put deflectors over their registers where the drapes have been blown around by the air coming out of the register. This is not necessarily the best thing to do. It may stop the problem of the draperies being blown around, but it tends to cause drafts across the floor, upsetting the air circulation that the system was designed to provide and possibly increasing the heating costs in the home. The best thing to do, if at all possible, is to re-align the draperies or relocate the register.

The return air system should also be checked. Although there may be only one or two openings, they should be kept clean, vacuumed and clear of any material which may block them.

With baseboard heating, both electric and hot water, it can be extremely important to maintain adequate clearance between draperies and the baseboard heaters. The synthetic fabrics used in drapery materials today are often easily discoloured by relatively low temperatures. If the draperies extend from floor to ceiling, the baseboard will have to be located at least 50 mm (2 in.) in front of the baseboard face or kept about 50 mm (2 in.) above the top of the baseboard. A baseboard located behind draperies will only heat the space between the draperies and the window, resulting in increased heating costs and discomfort in the room.

Wall heaters have to be kept clean. The face of the wall heater can be vacuumed when you vacuum the surrounding area.

The high efficiency furnaces now coming on the market are a little more complicated than older models and may require more maintenance. One of the things that should be carefully watched is that the condensate is draining properly and not causing any corrosion in the unit. At the first sign of corrosion, a contractor should be called in to evaluate the situation.

Problems with pilot lights or spark ignition should be referred either to the gas utility or to the heating contractor who normally services your equipment.

Routine maintenance on your heating system, preferably at the beginning and middle of the heating season, can provide good returns in safe, efficient and reliable operation.

Schools to close for conference

Gulf Islands schools will close Friday, Mar. 2 to allow teachers to attend a professional development conference at Ganges.

The conference, entitled *Focusing on Excellence*, will feature seven visiting speakers. Parents and the

general public are welcome to attend the workshops, which will be held at Gulf Islands Secondary School.

The program begins at 9 am when individual district teachers report on conferences they have attended during the year.

At 10 am the keynote address, *Giftedness Programs*, will be given by Dr. Don Knowles of the University of Victoria. A number of presentations will follow between 10:30 and noon.

Encouraging giftedness in children will be Dr. Knowles' topic in the band room. He will present contemporary views and research on giftedness and discuss the development of programs in schools. Parental involvement will also be explored.

In the library Don Hamilton, also of UVic, will give a workshop entitled *The Teacher and the School Librarian*, designed to assist librarians and teachers to meet curriculum goals.

Classroom Discipline-Adolescent Behaviour in Room 1 will examine adolescent conflicts and their effect on behaviour. Speaker is Dr. C.B. Harvey of UVic. Maxine Boag of the B.C. Teachers' Federation will speak on *Stress Management* in Room 2 while *Intermediate Social Studies Program* will be the topic in Room 4. Ray Bowers, supervisor of instruction in the Victoria school district, will look at planning for intermediate social studies until the new curriculum is established.

Last workshop before lunch will be on word processors, to be given

by Salt Spring teacher Tom McKeachie in the business education room.

After-lunch workshops will run from 1:30-3. Dr. Don Knowles will repeat his workshop on giftedness in the band room while Dr. Harvey will continue on the subject of adolescent behaviour in Room 1. In Room 2 Maxine Boag will speak on time management and Ray Bowers will repeat his workshop on social studies in Room 4.

A discussion on Grade 12 government exams will be given by Allan Taylor of the ministry of education in Room 6 and *Volleyball Skills and Drills* will be examined by Kent Andrews of UVic in the gymnasium.

Jim Bruce of the B.C. Teachers' Federation will examine various assessment methods in *Evaluation Alternatives* in Room 12.

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

The Gulf Islands School Board voted in favour of asking the residents of Galiano Island if they would foot the bill for a new school. The school on that island was overcrowded and space was not adequate to meet the needs of basic education. The proposed school would be five classrooms with space for such activities as art and home economics. It would also include a gymnasium.

Side roads on Salt Spring Island were a disgrace, the island's Chamber of Commerce agreed. One resident said that the road past his property had not been attended to since 1958. The fault lay with the provincial government for not allocating sufficient money. The local road crews were doing the best they could without enough money, the chamber meeting was told.

The boat basin in Ganges was close to completion and in use. The Chamber of Commerce issued a call for designs for the area of land fill adjacent to the docks. A park was proposed for the area but plans had to be submitted when a lease for the land was applied for. The Rod and Gun Club urged the inclusion of a boat-launching ramp in the area.

Dogs at the north end of Salt Spring were chasing and killing sheep. The Sheep Protection Act called for all dogs to be licensed and under control. Farmers could shoot any dog molesting sheep. The Farmers' Institute had a \$10 bounty on such dogs.

Tenders for the proposed new water line in the Fernwood Water District had been submitted and inspected. The lowest bid for the task had been submitted by the trustees of the district and they will carry out the work themselves.

HMS Ganges Chapter IODE members met and heard a report of the previous year's activities. There were 40 members in the organization and they contributed 300 hours of volunteer time to the library, hospital and other community activities. They also donated \$450 to various causes.

Fifteen Years Ago

The cost of postal lock boxes had gone up and the Galiano Chamber of Commerce planned to protest the increase. The group pointed out that rural delivery of mail carried no extra charge. The rate increase for a postal box had been put in place without justification even though the boxes represented the easiest form of service.

Development of Roberts Bank was expected to have a major impact on the islands, a meeting of the Gulf Islands Joint Council was told. Industrial development at Roberts Bank would bring an influx of workers to the mainland area. The workers were expected to live on the islands and commute to the mainland. The meeting learned of one forecast which called for some 20,000 workers living in the Gulf

Islands.

A meeting was held at Pender Island to discuss the poor condition of roads in the Gulf Islands. Residents were upset about potholes and seas of mud. One driver had to use chains to get his vehicle through the mud on Rainbow Road at Salt Spring Island.

One of the oldest buildings on Salt Spring Island went up in flames. The North Beach Road home of Col. and Mrs. C.E. Bailey was almost completely destroyed by fire.

Salt Spring Queen was back on the Fulford-Swartz Bay run following her annual refit. Pender Queen was on the run for several weeks to fill in.

One adult had begun taking certain courses at Gulf Islands Secondary School. The year before, the school board approved the admittance of adults into the school.

Ten Years Ago

Farmland controls implemented by the provincial government were affecting land values in the islands. Assessments had begun rising steadily since controls were brought in to protect the islands.

Ferry service between Fulford and Swartz Bay carried 104,227 vehicles in 1973, according to figures furnished by MLA Hugh Curtis. The year before the ferry carried 94,178 vehicles.

Gulf Islands School Board approved a budget of \$984,413.

A new fire truck was to be purchased for Galiano Island. Cost of the vehicle was \$28,948.

Herring season was under way in Gulf Islands waters and fishboats were swarming to Ganges Harbour from all over the coast.

Platform decks were being added to the Sechart Queen to increase its capacity to about 90 vehicles.

School bus that had taken students to Fuller Lake one afternoon missed the ferry on its return to Salt Spring. But school trustees were unable to say much about it. The bus couldn't get on the ferry because it was loaded with cement trucks. The trucks were hauling concrete for the new school construction at Ganges.

New Harbour House Hotel was slated to open at Ganges. Nineteen rooms, a large dining room and a banquet room were among the new facilities. Manager of the hotel was Nick Konstantinides.

Roller hockey game of the week was between the Canadians and the Blazers. Goalies were Danny Reynolds for the Canadians and Bruce Aleksich for the Blazers.

Five Years Ago

A progress report on sewers was to be presented to the public by regional district personnel. Results of two studies of Ganges Harbour were to be revealed. Meanwhile, Municipal Affairs Minister Bill Vander Zalm was visited by a delegation of seven people opposed

to the sewer project.

Salt Spring Island had more than its share of small, malcontent groups, according to Outer Islands regional director Jim Campbell. He made the statement in an attack on islanders who were opposed to the three-cent-a-gallon gas tax for Victoria transit.

Regional director for Salt Spring Island, Mike Clement, told the annual meeting of the island's planning association that if people thought transportation was a difficult problem, they should spend some time on dog control. He hadn't known anything about sheep some months before, and hoped to forget about them before long.

Plans to raise \$75,000 for expanding the library facilities at Ganges were revealed at the library association's annual meeting. Purchase of the lot adjacent to the library had already been arranged.

Local fishermen banded together to form a new organization. The Ganges Fishermen's Association was formed to represent the interests of local commercial fishermen.

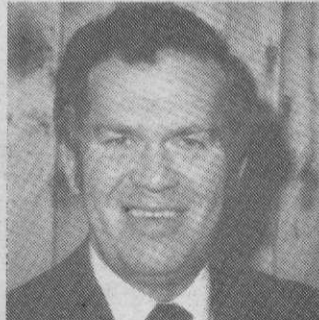
Twice-daily seaplane runs were being considered between the Gulf Islands and Vancouver and Victoria. West Coast Air Services Ltd. believed the service had a good future. The airline carried 3,188 passengers between the islands and Vancouver the year before.

needed. The Ganges vicinity showed small pockets of suitable soil but not continuous areas which could accept the discharge.

The committee also agreed with McMinn's conclusion that a "long-term solution for residential properties will be made on a largely economic base." They amended the conclusion to read that any decision for the residences should be made on a long-term environmentally sound and economic basis.

The island economy is non-productive, he said. The chief employers are the hospital, the ferries and the school board which makes the economy service-oriented.

The group was asked if efforts should be aimed at making the community self-sufficient through creation of small businesses or developing talents to boost the tourist industry.

The answer was both.

When the group of islanders is selected by the steering committee, another meeting will be called.

During the workshops, various islanders explained different avenues for the creation of businesses. They talked about mariculture, home nursery business, what to do with apples, and other endeavours which fit into the island way of life.

The weekend conference began with an introductory session in Mahon Hall Friday evening. McMillan was one of the speakers at that portion of the event.

Saturday, the conference moved up the hill to the Community Centre with workshops on island business potential filling the morning.

The afternoon was devoted to ways and means of setting a community economic development corporation in motion.

treatment system with ocean disposal as the only viable long-term solution".

McMinn had included several assumptions used to define the viable options but the committee was unwilling to accept or reject them because some of the assumptions required actions which were beyond their scope of authority.

Peter Pentz urged the committee to include an assumption that the required level of sewage treatment by the treatment plant was yet to be determined.

Wilde quoted an oceanographer who had said that secondary treatment was sufficient for an ocean outfall if the end of the pipe was in the proper position. Tertiary treatment, the oceanographer noted, would require the addition of chemicals which could prove harmful to marine life.

McMinn noted that tertiary treatment did not necessarily mean the addition of chemicals.

He said the closer to pure water the discharge was, the better it would be but such a process would be expensive.

Pentz said, "I'm not suggesting we have to have potable water." He wanted the quality of the discharge to be determined.

An oceanographic study of the area of the end of the outfall would cost from \$20,000 to \$30,000, McMinn said. The study should include a look at the seabed, the tides and the depth of water. The existing outfall should be checked as well, he said, to see how it has stood up.

McMinn had listed four options for disposal but the committee rejected the fourth, which was to do nothing, as unacceptable.

If the first option, to sewer the entire study area with a treatment plant and ocean disposal, is accepted, then McMinn would have to study the financial impact of the proposal and determine ways of funding the project.

Wilde had noted that the funding formula with the province paying 75% of the capital costs was still available. She noted that other ways of paying for the scheme would be looked at when the committee had reached a decision.

The province might be agreeable to a one-time grant to cover costs.

She also suggested that user costs of the various institutions might be covered by all the residents of Salt Spring.

Acceptance of either of the other two options might leave residents out in the cold on the provincial 75% capital cost grant.

The second option would have the core and the institutions hooked to a sewer with a treatment plant and ocean outfall. The residences would be left with on-site systems which would require improvements or rebuilding as problems arose.

The third option would provide for an initial hook-up of the core businesses and institutions to a sewer system with the residential areas coming into the scheme "as affordability permits and as area systems failed."

McMinn noted that if the residences are left out of the system, capital costs could be lowered by the installation of a smaller pipe. But if the smaller pipe were used, the

residences would not be able to come into the system because the pipe could not handle the extra volume.

If, however, the third option were accepted, a sufficiently large pipe would be put into the ground and a system designed to allow for expansion when needed.

An assumption which McMinn had included involved having "optional ocean outfall discharge locations....still to be investigated."

McMinn said the assumption was included because it was not up to him to "close the book on where the outfall is to be."

If a line were to be run from Ganges to Trincomali Channel as had been suggested, the effort would add several million dollars to the costs.

In his original submission, McMinn had suggested a public meeting be held when the second-phase report was available. But, he explained to the committee, the public meeting should be held later because for now there was nothing to report.

"I'm comfortable with our recommendations," said McMinn. "It could be there's more to be done."

But the committee agreed, for the most part, with Wilde that a decision had to be made.

The committee will meet in the nurses' residence behind Lady Minto Hospital at 3:15 pm on Thursday.

Driver takes out pump

A vehicle drove into McColl's Shell Service in Ganges to get gas on Saturday but got the gas pump instead.

The car struck the middle pump, tore it off its mountings and broke the 1 1/2" cast iron delivery pipe at the base of the pump. Station mechanic Dennis Beech said it was almost impossible to hit the middle pump alone and expressed surprise that neither of the other two pumps was damaged.

A new pump was installed Monday.

Driver of the vehicle was issued a traffic violation for driving without due care and attention. The ticket could cost six points against the driver's record.
