- Proposed Saturna Island Trust Committee By-law No. 14 being "Saturna Island Zoning By-law, 1981, Amendment By-law No. 1, 1984", is a By-law to amend Saturna Island Trust Committee By-law No. 8 "Saturna Island Zoning By-law, 1981". In general terms, the intent of the proposed By-law is:
 - to add a new zoning classification being Rural Comprehensive Development Zone (R3) which would permit uses such as single family dwellings, home occupations, agriculture, horticulture, harvesting of trees and portable sawmills and portable log chippers, in addition to the uses permitted in all zones.

In addition the By-law also regulates building height and setbacks from property lines.

The By-law provides that for each 2.02 hectares of parcel area a single family dwelling is permitted.
 - to change the zoning classification of Fractional NW¼ and Fractional E½, of Section 16, and Fractional NE¼, Section 17, Saturna Island from the Rural (R) to the Rural Comprehensive (R3) Zone.

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GALIANO NEWS

Daily water taxi service is reassuring news

A handful of parents and the teaching staff attended a meeting with school board member Mike Hoebel and superintendent Mike Marshall last week to hear some reassuring news.

There will be daily water taxi service for all Outer Island secondary students, including Pender and Saturna, for the next school year, beginning in September. In spite of earlier fears the restraint program will cost Galiano only about .4 of a teacher leaving about 3.5 teachers for the school next year.

This is the equivalent of three full-time teachers and one half-time teacher and will enable the learning assistance program to continue. This will, of course, depend upon enrolment, but a large kindergarten entry of 10 or more is expected so the figure is probably accurate.

After the superintendent left to catch the evening ferry discussion turned to the Annual Spring Fair to be held on May 19. For many years the proceeds from the fair have helped to send Grade 6 students to an outdoor camp at Strathcona. Michael Hoebel was able to assure the parents that the board is not opposed to field trips but feels that local field trips for all students have better educational value than expensive, extended trips for small numbers of students.

This year the Spring Fair will be combined with a reunion of former staff and students which will include a luncheon and possibly a dance.

Chamber of Commerce

Last Thursday over 30 people attended the annual general meeting of the Galiano Chamber of Commerce to hear the active program pursued last year and planned for this year. The major accomplishment for the year was the completion of the Clanton Road cut-off after negotiations which had extended over 20 years.

The chamber also played an important role in diagnosing defects to be rectified at the new activity centre.

Areas of concern for the coming year include continuing dialogue with B.C. Hydro to upgrade the line to Galiano—most pertinent in view of the following day's lengthy power outage. Edrie Holloway will be glad to give callers details of the savings to be made in telephone bills by joining the Residential Optional Calling Plan, preliminary particulars of which are given on page 5 of the new telephone directory. Efforts are continuing to obtain a parking lot to accommodate over 30 vehicles at Sturdies Bay, as well as increased facilities at Montague Harbour.

The chamber is attempting to secure an emergency landing helicopter pad on the trap range of the Rod and Gun Club and, in conjunction with Galiano's Dr. Hales, to research the possibility of obtaining an X-ray machine for the island. For well over a year the chamber has been approaching banks and credit unions in order to obtain banking facilities on the

island. Currently negotiations are in progress with the Bank of Montreal at Ganges to provide a one or two-day-a-week service on Galiano.

Correspondence will continue with the provincial department of highways to improve snow clearing and sanding on wintry roads. Transport representative Shirley Coulter hopes to bring back B.C. Ferries' proposed summer schedule for discussion at a public meeting within the next few weeks. It might be advantageous to promote chamber memberships at that meeting, as funds are required to promote all these causes which benefit all islanders.

The chamber plans to erect a small stone cairn with plaque in memory of their late president, Oswald H. New, near the bottom end of Clanton Road, the project for which Sparky worked so hard the last three years of his life.

Ralph Brine Busy

Ralph Brine of Retreat Cove has the largest flock of sheep on the island and is especially busy at this time of the year as his ewes are lambing. Last week he still found time to share another of his interests with islanders.

On Monday he addressed the Gulf Islands Branch of the B.C. Historical Association on the topic of the first trans-continental route from Montreal to the Pacific coast developed by the fur traders of the North West Company. Growing up in south Vancouver and then living in New Westminster, he has a particular interest in the explorations of Simon Fraser and his journey down the river that bears his name.

Ralph has studied Fraser's journal and from his intimate knowledge of the Fraser delta, developed a theory of the turn-around point of the expedition which differs from that suggested by other historians. Dr. Lamb postulates that Fraser travelled down the north arm of the Fraser and that his first sight of open water was the Strait of Georgia looking across to the mountains of Vancouver Island.

Reading the original entries in Fraser's diary Brine notes that the bay or gulf Fraser mentions lay in a northeast, southwest direction, while the strait runs at a 90° angle to this. It is most unlikely that voyageurs who had made a 4,000-mile journey across a continent could make such a gross error in direction.

Furthermore the snow-capped mountains of Vancouver Island 40 miles away are usually shrouded in cloud and mist in summer. If Fraser had come down the north arm of the Fraser as has been previously assumed his view of the strait would have been blocked by Iona Island.

On maps of the 1860's the north arm was almost dry at low tide, whereas the middle arm was navigable at all tides. Ralph Brine therefore postulates that Fraser came down the middle arm of the river and that he saw Howe Sound, which runs magnetically NNE. The snow-capped peaks would be the North Shore mountains 20 miles away and therefore more likely to be visible.

After passing two Musqueam villages with a less than friendly reception from each, Fraser decided to turn around and retrace his steps at approximately Point-No-Point near the present location of UBC.

On Saturday in the North Community Hall Ralph proved that he is no armchair historian by showing to a full house a videotape of an expedition undertaken by himself and three companions retracing the fur traders' route from west to east.

This 4,200-mile canoe voyage was performed in 1967 to coincide with Expo, and after a 3½-month voyage from New Westminster the 20th century voyageurs landed at the Expo site in Montreal as the culmination of their adventure. Although they had some assistance from a land party the four shared most of the hardships and dangers of the intrepid professional canoeists of nearly 200 years ago.

The videotape had been reconstructed from the original 16 mm film taken on the trip; music, maps and commentary by Ralph had been added to produce a very professional finished effort.

Galiano Club

It has come to the attention of the executive of the Galiano Club that the provincial government is reviewing the status of certain crown lands dubbed UREP—for use as recreation and enjoyment by the public. The club is interested in one such parcel on Galiano which adjoins Bluff Park and touches on Sturdies Bay Road.

There are already trails through this parcel so that a hiker may walk through from Georgeson Bay Road almost to Sturdies Bay on woodland trails. At last Saturday's annual general meeting the executive was instructed to write to the minister concerned informing him that the club was interested in obtaining the parcel and requesting that no private sale of the property be made until such time as the club might be in a position to purchase it.

Incidentally, the annual general meeting of the Galiano Club will resume on the 24th of March with the election of officers. Residents are urged to attend at 8 pm in the South Community Hall and to show an interest in the affairs of the club

which does so much for residents' welfare.

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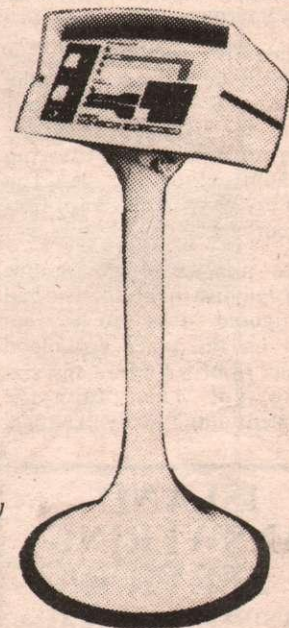
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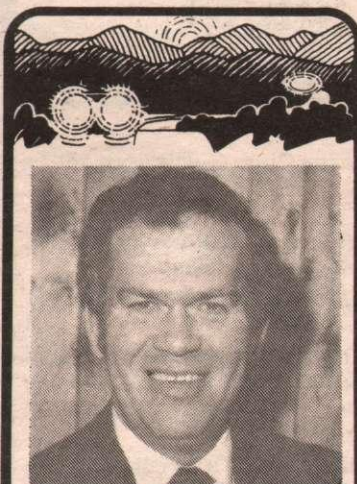
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Scout banquet held at Pender

 - (c) Pursuant to Section 9(2) of the Islands Trust Act this By-law is repealed three years from the date of its adoption and the zoning classification of the area of foreshore identified on Plan No. 1 is changed from the Water C (WC) Zone to the Water A (WA) Zone.

Galiano couple travel for CESO

Let's Die Living, by Vivienne Clarke. Simon and Pierre; 157 pp. **BY FRANK RICHARDS**

Where do resort owners go when they retire? They tour the world with Canadian Executive Services Overseas.

What do retired island resort operators do? They travel the world.

And what more proof could you seek than this book. Allen and Vivienne Clarke are well known on Galiano Island, where they operated the Galiano Lodge. But where did they go when they left the island? Well, to Jamaica for one. And to Malaysia for another. And Borneo, Barbados, Iran, Brazil, El Salvador and Costa Rica for others.

Vivienne Clarke wrote a recipe book, *Witchin' in the Kitchen*, shortly after leaving the island and then turned her attention to other people's problems.

She recalls in her book reading a report of the establishment of

CESO (pronounced "Kesso") and applying to serve with the new program of help to businesses and services in other countries as well as "in her own backyard".

The backyard was Bella Bella, where the couple spent a few weeks assessing the value of a hotel on Indian land.

The book consists of a series of experiences, just as the commitment of the island couple to CESO consisted of a series of assignments.

The writer has a happy flair for seeing the experience objectively and for passing on something of the factual and something of her own contribution. She introduces the reader to the people in the various communities they found and she illustrates the function of the "Paunch Corps" in working with third-world countries who have little past experience on which to draw.

Neither is a draftsman, she

explains, but they found themselves planning a lay-out for a hotel on several occasions, calling on practical experience to fill in where the distant owner hadn't any. There is no substitute for experience when trying to change a red ledger into a black one and the Clarks were right there with experience when they tackled it.

To many it will not only show where retired resort operators go or what they do in far-off lands, it will offer an insight to one of the nation's less familiar services: the provision of Canadian experience in a foreign setting. Vivienne Clarke is an able ambassador for CESO.

The Galiano Club annual meeting chose Tom Carolan to be the president for the coming year. The club had purchased various items for the community hall in the previous year. The club also ran classes for island residents and a report on the swimming class revealed that 35 children had learned to swim under instruction from two teachers.

Ten Years Ago

Parents of school children on Galiano endorsed a proposal for an intermediate school on Mayne Island to serve Grades 7 to 9 for the Outer Islands. They also approved daily water taxi service to Salt Spring for students in Grades 10 to 12.

Five Years Ago

The master plan for recreation on Salt Spring would be presented to the public at two meetings in early March. A representative of the consultant group would be at the meetings to explain details.

The girls' basketball team at Gulf Islands Secondary School took first place in the mid-island league with a four-win, one-loss record. They placed fourth in the Vancouver Island Basketball Championship in Campbell River.

The Cubs and Scouts on Salt Spring gathered for a feast. Parents of the boys held a pot-luck supper in Our Lady of Grace Church hall. Special guest was Doug Campbell, the executive director of the Boy Scouts in Canada for the Victoria region.

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Energy Data Humidity Control

The amount of water vapour in the air of your home—humidity—is important to the well-being of both you and your home. Too little and you get throat irritations, dry skin and shocks from static electricity. Too much produces condensation on windows and other surfaces, which can cause rotting of wooden window sills, deterioration of drywall and plaster, and the staining and mildewing of these surfaces.

From cool autumn evenings onward, condensation can be a problem in the home. Why does it happen and what can be done about it? First let us look at the why.

Warm air can hold more moisture than cold air, so when humid indoor air comes into contact with a cold surface, it cools and deposits its excess moisture as condensation. This most frequently occurs on the inside of window glass and aluminum window frames. Both provide little resistance to heat loss, so when outside temperatures are low they are colder than most other surfaces in the home.

What can be done about condensation? You can raise the temperature of the windows and/or lower the level of humidity in the home.

Upgrading your windows, by adding plastic film, storm windows or sealed multiple glazing, will minimize the problem of condensation on window glass. This raises the temperature of the inner window by putting an insulating air space (it should be at least 13 mm (1/2") wide) between your prime window and the storm window, or between the panes of glass in multiple glazing. It will also significantly cut the heat loss through the windows.

Make sure that the inner window is more tightly fitting than the outer. This will prevent warm humid room air from infiltrating around the inner window, coming into contact with the cold outer window and frame, and causing condensation there.

The problem of condensation on metal frames will be improved by properly upgrading windows, but it can be thoroughly eliminated only by using windows with a thermal break in the frames. For metal frames, the inner and outer frames must be separated by a plastic material (which has a lower heat conductivity than metal). Wood frame windows are inherently thermally broken, since wood has a much lower thermal conductivity than glass or metal.

How can you lower the level of humidity in the home? Either by reducing the amount of moisture being produced, increasing the rate at which it is removed (ventilation), or both.

Humidity is produced in the home by household activities such as cooking, bathing, washing floors, and washing and drying clothes indoors. Occupants—people, pets, plants, aquariums—also add to moisture levels.

To cut down on moisture produced, you might want to reduce the number of houseplants or cover your aquarium. Definitely try to avoid hanging wet clothes inside the house; they contribute a substantial amount of moisture. An automatic clothes dryer, vented to the outside, is the best solution.

When water vapour is produced, it should be removed from the house, preferably at the source. Much of the water vapour generated by cooking and dishwashing can be removed before it diffuses throughout the house if a kitchen exhaust fan is used or a kitchen window slightly opened. Bathroom fans or windows should likewise be used when bathing. When clothes are being washed, the laundry area should be kept closed off from the rest of the house and a window opened.

Ventilation removes moist indoor air and replaces it with outdoor air which, when heated to room temperature, is relatively dry. All homes have some natural ventilation—through fireplaces with loose dampers, cracks and openings around doors and windows, etc. Additional air replacement can be provided (as described above) by the use of exhaust fans and by opening windows and doors. For well caulked and weatherstripped homes it may be necessary to increase the air flow through the house at certain times of the year when humidity levels become unacceptably high. Airtight homes with a continuously sealed air/vapour barrier will require the installation of a mechanical ventilation system with air-to-air heat exchanger for energy efficient control of condensation, odours and pollutants.

Although energy is used to operate exhaust fans and to warm the drier air brought in from outside, humidity levels will be lowered and the possibility of damage from condensation reduced.

A source of moisture in the home which is less common today is a crawl space with a dirt floor. To eliminate this problem, the floor should be covered with a 0.15 mm (6 mil) polyethylene sheet lapped 150 mm (6") at the joints. If the area is to be used for storage, the polyethylene should be covered with at least a 25 mm layer of concrete.

If the condensation is a summer-time problem in a cool basement, a dehumidifier is the only effective way to get rid of the dampness. Warm outdoor air cannot be used for ventilation since it will likely have a higher moisture content than the air indoors.

Surface condensation, as previously described, is the result of humid air coming into contact with the cold surfaces of your home. If this air is allowed to make its way past the air/vapour barrier, it may condense in the exterior wall cavities, attic or insulation. The effects of this concealed condensation are insidious. Reduced effectiveness of insulation material, as well as deterioration of the building structure, can result. To avoid concealed condensation, attics and unheated crawl spaces must be well ventilated and all holes in the air/vapour barrier must be sealed. Special attention should be paid to sealing the gaps over interior partitions and around attic hatches, chimneys, plumbing stacks and electrical wiring. A reliable contractor may have to be consulted.

In summary, condensation on window glass is annoying, but damage can result when the moisture comes into contact with surrounding materials. Condensation within the building fabric can cause more serious damage. It is important, therefore, to minimize condensation in the home by improving windows and/or lowering humidity levels.

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District won't see \$1,750 difference

It's not fair, says the ministry of education, but that's the way things go.

Ministry officials came up with one figure for three days pay for teachers, representing the time of the strike in November. The amount was taken from the allotment for the school district in December.

But the Gulf Islands School District figured the amount differently.

The ministry figure was \$40,406. The school district figure was \$38,656.

And the school district won't see the \$1,750 difference.

Glenn Wall, assistant deputy minister, wrote a letter to explain the ministry's position.

"As you are aware, the calculation was done using numbers provided by officials of School

District No. 64 (Gulf Islands). It is appreciated that it is not possible to relate the amount of the grant reduction to actual payroll savings; however, it appears that in most districts the total actual savings accrued equal or exceed the amount of the grant reduction plus legal costs.

"I appreciate the points you made regarding penalizing a board who has attempted to assist government policy. Unfortunately blanket policies must sometimes be made which are not always fair to all affected."

Mike Marshall, superintendent of schools for the Gulf Islands, explained to the school board last week what he had done to get the difference back.

He termed the ministry amount to be the product of "simplistic and

unfair calculations."

The matter irks school trustees more than just for the loss of the money.

The minister of education had said that any school districts which attempted to have teachers make up the time lost in the three-day strike would get the amount equal to their pay for those days.

The Gulf Islands School Board had ordered the teachers to make up for the lost time through assignments to students.

But then the ministry of education changed the rules of the game and announced that the money would be used province-wide to "enhance" the education system.

Several school districts, including the Gulf Islands, protested the action of the ministry, but to no avail.

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In September

District can afford 74 teachers

The budget has been set and the money stretched with the result that Gulf Islands schools will only be losing 2.6 full-time equivalent (fte) teachers in September.

Mike Marshall, superintendent of schools, reported the news to the school trustees last week.

He explained that the local schools had been staffed by 76.6 fte teachers as of September 1983. The school district can afford only 74 teachers in September.

While the staffing needs are not completely known, Marshall said he will be talking with the principals at each school to determine how many teachers will be needed.

The number can be guessed at, he said, but the actual need "depends upon how many kids walk through the doors in September."

When the restraint program was introduced, the Gulf Islands School District faced the possibility of losing 18 teachers by 1986. Marshall and other school board officials talked with the ministry of education in attempts to get more money for the education system here.

Marshall had indicated earlier this year that the number of teachers who would have to go had been reduced to six. In the process of preparing the 1984 budget a surplus developed. It was the result of the difference between revenue and what the ministry of education said could be spent.

The school board applied some of the surplus to an account to fund early retirement for those teachers who requested it. Marshall noted that the board had several requests for early retirement but that teachers had until the end of May to make a decision.

Early retirement, said board chairman Charles Hingston, would affect older teachers who have been in the system for a number of years. It would leave the district staffed with younger teachers, he noted.

Marshall told the school trustees that the budgetary arrangements have left some room for flexibility but the staffing needs for September were not yet clear.

He outlined several areas where staffing reductions could be made.

The Mayne Island school has not grown as anticipated and the staff could be reduced by one fte teacher.

On Pender and Saturna, the reduction in staff could be .3 fte teachers at each school.

Gulf Islands Secondary School maintains a "favourable staffing

ratio", said Marshall, which aids in offering a diversified program for students. There could be room to reduce staff by .5 fte teachers, he said.

Fernwood School reverses the trend. Marshall noted that if the Grade 7 class is shifted back to Fernwood from Salt Spring Elementary, the school would benefit from the addition of one fte teacher.

The Fulford school is scheduled for opening in September but the staff for that school can be taken

from Salt Spring Elementary.

The district teaching staff, comprised mainly of special education instructors, stands at 3.6 fte teachers. The shift to school-based special education will mean a district staff reduction to .6 fte teachers, Marshall said.

But the entire exercise depends upon how many children enter the school system for the 1984-85 school year.

"We just don't have the money to sustain staff," said Marshall, "if student numbers reduce drastically.

Restraint may be over before settlement reached

Contract negotiations between the Gulf Islands School Board and its support staff are going slowly.

The two sides were to get together February 15 but the negotiator for the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE), Jack Hughesman, cancelled out and the meeting was postponed.

Another meeting for March 5 had to be cancelled because the negotiator for the school board, Al Keylock of Richmond, could not make it that day.

The next meeting is scheduled for March 9.

"Why don't we do away with the

business agents," asked CUPE representative at the school board, Dorothy Kyle, "and work this out ourselves?"

Ron McQuiggan, school trustee for Salt Spring, suggested an arm-wrestling contest to settle the issue.

The two sides are discussing contract issues which would give Gulf Islands support staff parity with the Saanich School District. CUPE has been without a contract since the end of December, 1982.

In reference to the number of meetings cancelled, Kyle said, "Restraint will be over by the time we settle."

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
