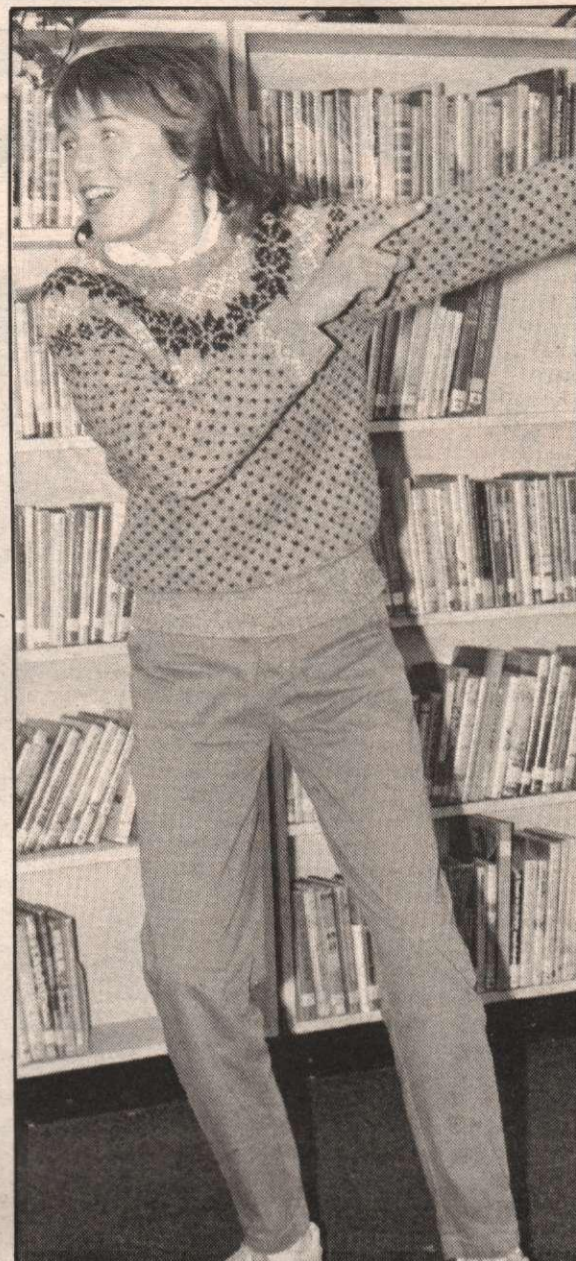

Pender firemen attend 11 fires

Annual meeting of the North Pender Island Fire Protection Society was held recently.

In elections to the board of directors, Al MacGregor and Doug Stevenson, whose term had expired, agreed to run for a further three-year term. Elmer Bowerman agreed to stand for a two-year term to fill the vacancy created when Tom Matty decided to retire. Matty had been on the board since 1973.

The board now consists of the following: Al MacGregor, president; Doug Stevenson, secretary-treasurer; A. (Tim) Appleby, Don Grimmer, Don Keating, Elmer Bowerman, Dave Williams and Max Allan, CRD appointee.

Fire Chief Dave Auchterlonie

reported that there were 22 volunteers on strength and that they had attended seven chimney fires, three bush fires and one yacht fire in 1984. Fire practices are held weekly.

Al MacGregor reported on administrative changes, purchases of new equipment and repairs and improvements to the present facilities.

Negotiations have been taking place with the CRD and the society regarding legal arrangements for the administration of the society and department.

In September of 1984 a new bylaw was passed by the Capital Region, "to provide fire protection and control in the North Pender Island fire protection specified area." The bylaw outlines the duties and

authority of the fire chief. Infractions of the bylaw now carry fines of up to \$300. Residents are urged to read the bylaw which is available at Pender Island Lumber. Lighting fires without a permit in fire season or during a local closure can result in an expensive visit to court.

To add to the authority of the fire chief, Dave Auchterlonie has been appointed a Local Assistant Fire Commissioner by B. C. Fire Commissioner Gordon Anderson. This authority carries the full backing of the attorney-general of B.C.

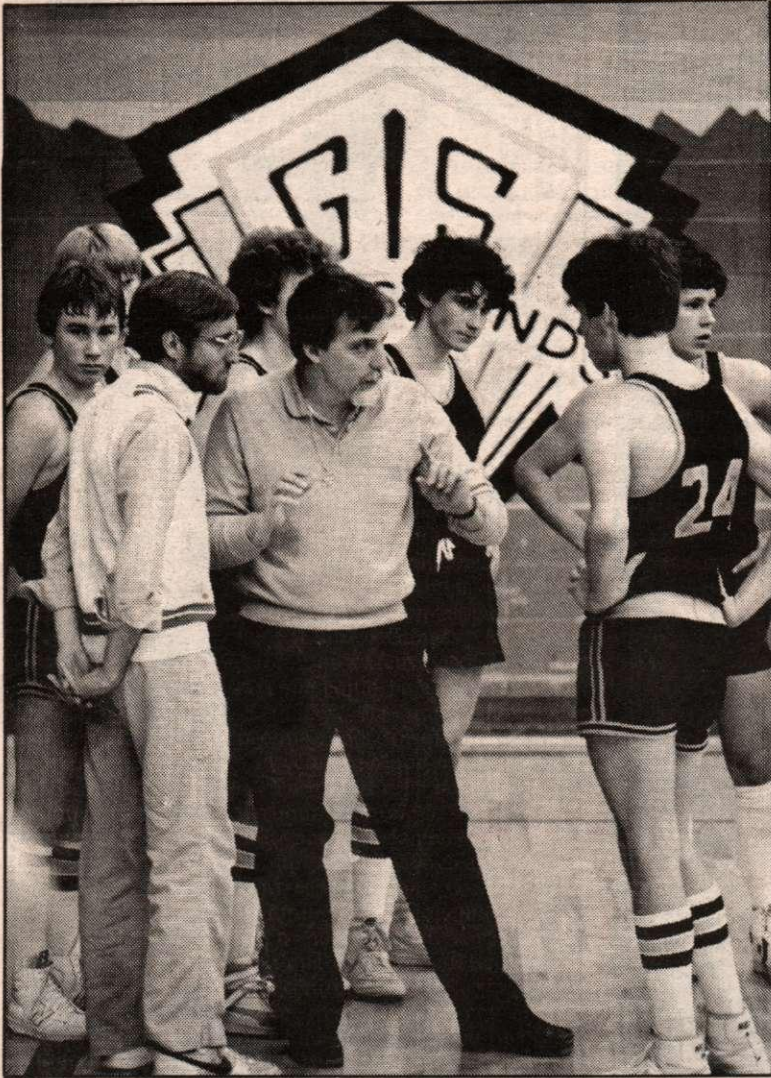
Mt. Prevost beat George Bonner to take third place in the tournament.

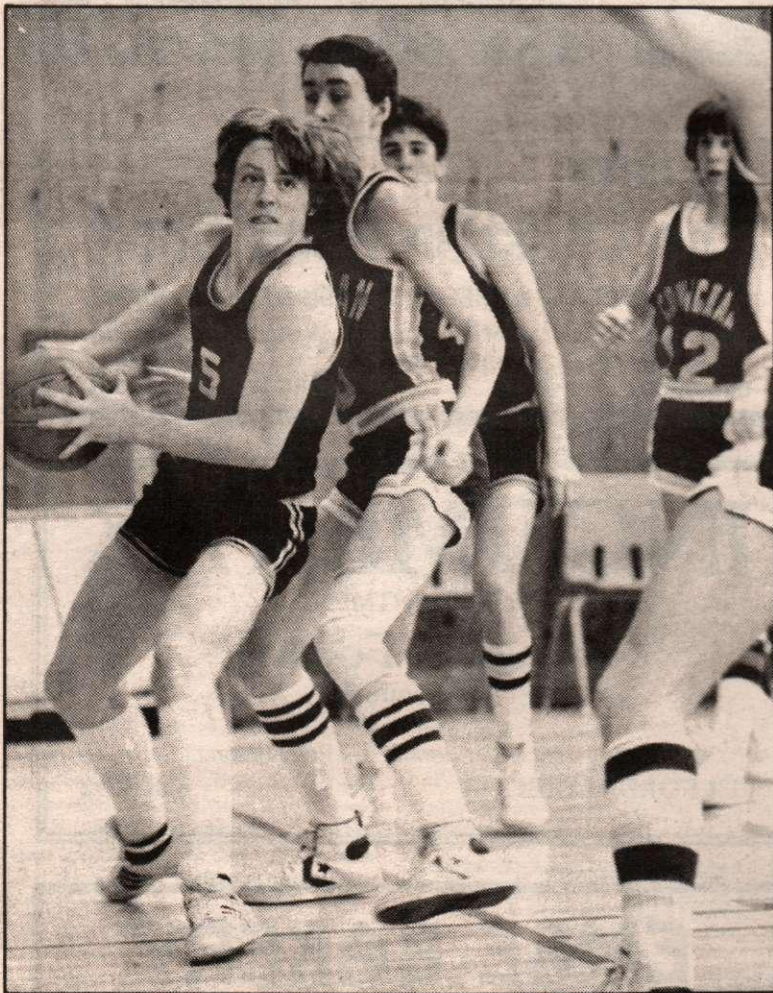

PROVINCIAL COURT

Refusing to supply a breath sample resulted in a conviction against Jesse Byron of Salt Spring when he appeared in court two weeks ago.

Judge R. E. Hudson imposed a \$600 fine and Byron lost his driver's licence for six months.

Byron was acquitted of a charge of impaired driving when the judge ruled that the evidence given showed a reasonable doubt.

On September 22, 1984 police noticed a vehicle leaving the hotel parking lot in Ganges and being driven in an erratic manner along Lower Ganges Road. The vehicle was stopped and Byron was the driver, court was told.

The police demanded that Byron submit a breath sample for analysis and he initially agreed. But when the investigating officer could not produce a certificate that he was qualified to conduct the test, Byron refused to co-operate.

Judge Hudson agreed with the submission from the crown counsel that there was no excuse to refuse the test. If the officer was not qualified, the evidence could not be used in court.

Harvey Bartz of Kamloops entered a guilty plea to a charge of assault resulting from an incident at Hallowe'en celebrations at the Harbour House Hotel on Salt Spring.

Judge R. E. Hudson was told that when a person put a chocolate bar wrapper in the ashtray on the table at which Bartz was sitting, Bartz stood up and hit the person in the mouth.

The court was told that Bartz had been on Salt Spring for three weeks in conjunction with his job as a

Pender youth not guilty

A Pender Island youth was found not guilty of second degree murder in a Victoria court this week.

Lee Cokes, who was 17 at the time of the incident last April 3, had been charged in the death of his brother, Martin James Cokes, 19. The two had been in a fight at the time.

The jury agreed with the defense attorney who contended that Cokes had not been responsible for his actions because of several blows to the head coupled with heavy consumption of alcohol.

The elder Cokes died of stab wounds to the chest after an altercation at a Pender Island farm.

The younger Cokes had lived and worked on Pender for about a year prior to the incident.

Burgham admitted to being drunk while in possession of the shotgun but he told Judge Hudson that he didn't realize that the shotgun was loaded and it had discharged accidentally.

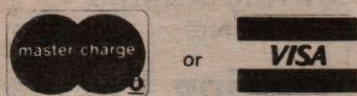

Firm makes artistic contribution to high tech

Growth in the use of computers has allowed two Salt Spring women to plug into the high-tech game in an artistic way.

Partners Gillian Kidd and Sheri Hickman operate the Soft Wear Company to market cloth covers for computers. They create the covers in

a studio on High Hill Road.

The covers, made of canvas or quilted cloth, are sewn together to fit most models of computers as well as video cassette recorders, electric typewriters and computer components such as printers and disc drives.

They were both involved in textiles and had been casting around for a business which they could operate close to home. They began to produce children's clothing but found the operation too labour-intensive.

So when a friend asked them to

put together a cloth cover for his computer, Soft Wear was born.

Computers, although reasonably expensive, don't come with protective covers.

Kidd said they looked at the computer business and noticed that it is a male-oriented business.

"And they don't sew," she said.

The pair put together some computer covers and took them to a computer show in Victoria where they received "positive response." Orders began coming in and now the partners are looking at expanding the wholesale end of the business.

Kidd, who was born in Liverpool, England, but came to Canada at six months of age, studied fabrics at the University of Victoria. She picked up a fascination with fabrics during a trip she and husband Philip Grange took around the Pacific rim.

During a six-month period she worked with a textile designer in Asia and liked the work.

Upon her return to Salt Spring she was instrumental in setting up Salt Spring Fibres in the small studio now occupied by the Waterfront Gallery in Ganges. It was during that period that she met Hickman.

Hickman was born in Saskatche-

wan but grew up in Campbell River and later attended the Victoria College of Art. She had been the art aide at Salt Spring Elementary School for eight years before deciding to strike out on her own.

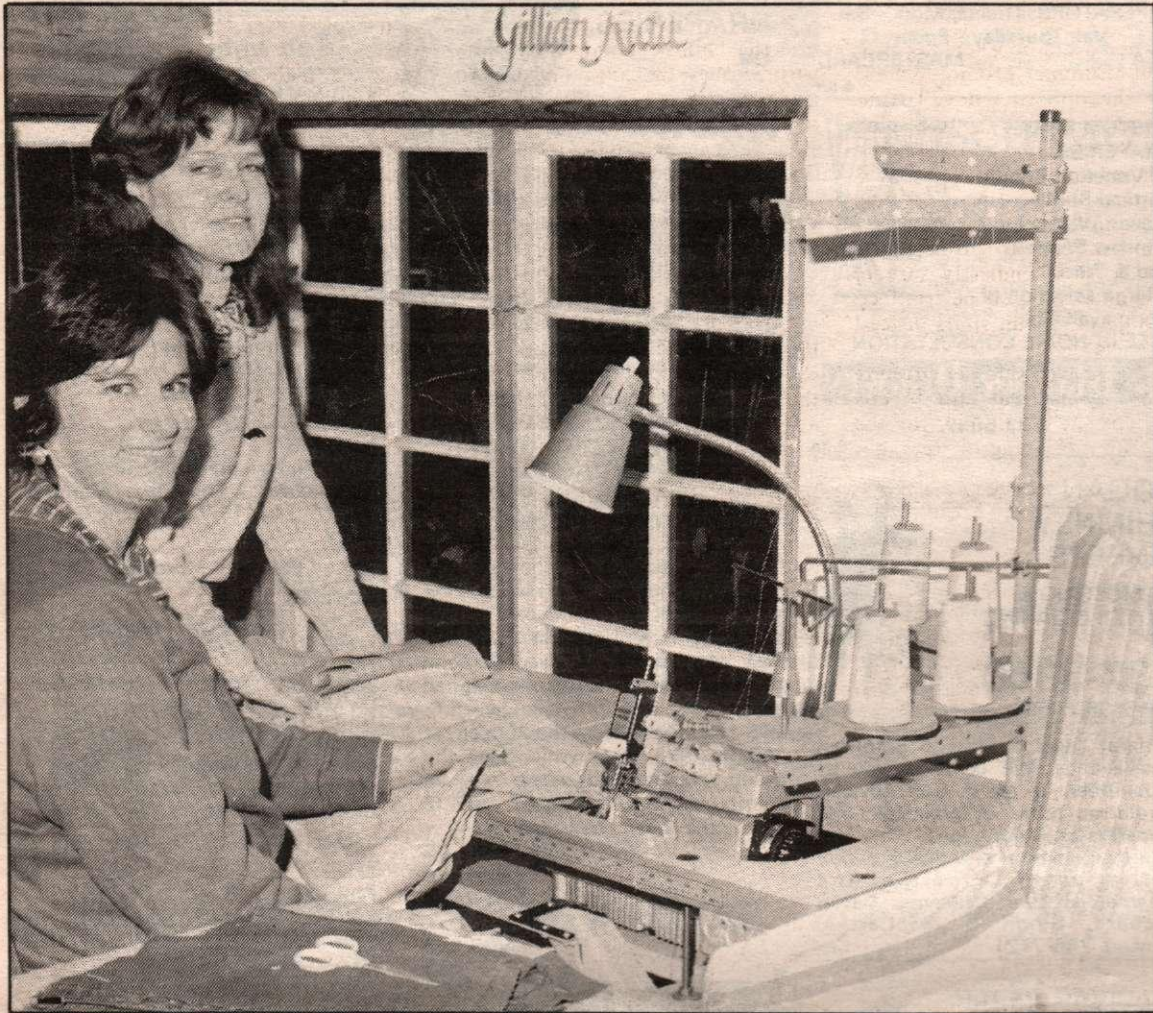
She produced soft sculptures or stuffed figures. A famous creation of hers is known as the Salt Spring Rainbow Cat.

The partners have praise for the response they have received from the computer industry. They say that tremendous support and help has come their way.

Each model of computer requires a different pattern for the cover and they have to stay on top of the changes in computer design and technology. They keep up a regular dialogue with dealers in order to anticipate what is needed.

While the pair had the talent to create the covers, they have had to learn the techniques of marketing, among other things, in order to remain in business.

They currently wholesale the covers to various stores as well as retail them through a mail order set-up. The covers, in addition to protecting the computers at Gulf Islands schools, adorn computers in New York, California and places in between.

Goats at mercy of environment, but we are not

We had some goats at one time and I always had the feeling that they were trying to tell me something, something of crucial importance. They would look at me with those inscrutable eyes, as if to say, "Don't you know?"

For the longest time, until recently actually, I did not know what they were talking about. But even then, it always seemed to concern more important things than just plain and ordinary goaty stuff. Mind you, I found out where the goatee comes from and the scapegoat was a revelation. And why we ever outfitted the evil one with the hair, horns and hooves of the innocent goat is still a bit of a poser to me.

But now it seems that they have taught me something, something about ourselves, after all. Just suppose that 25 goats, of both sexes, had been shipwrecked on a small, lush, green and otherwise uninhabited island, a small goat paradise, so to speak. They would do what comes naturally to goats, munch away on everything to their heart's content and, in time, have kids. And the kids would have kids, and so forth, until there would be thousands and thousands of goats, and not much to munch on anymore.

There would then be hard times, and the goats would look around, out of those inscrutable eyes, and watch their skinny numbers dwindle on a barren island. And now I know why they have been asking me so intently, "Don't you know?" You see, we are not like goats although we may behave like them at times, but we have the power, the ability and the knowledge to improve our environment.

While the goats are helplessly at the mercy of their environment, we are not. We can increase the productivity of our environment to match, even exceed, our needs. I mean, we do it all the time. We improve our soils for greater quality and fertility, we irrigate and we cultivate; we breed plants and animals for greater yield and productivity, including goats of course, and just look at what we have made out of the lowly crabapple.

And yet we act as if we were goats, in Ethiopia, in India and Africa, in our economy, in our politics, and, alas, in our religions. And it is not a matter of having too many kids either; it is simply a matter of not using the dynamics of life, green and otherwise, to their full potential.

We have demonstrated our power to shape our environment, both to our benefit, and to our detriment, and only one thing amazes me now: how did the goats know, before I did? Goats do not prune trees, for instance, they just munch them, and now it seems that they knew this all

along. But we prune trees, to shape them, to keep them healthy, for optimum exposure to sun energy, and for increased production, and trees are very definitely part of our environment.

In our mild winter climate, which allows fungi to survive and to infect fresh cuts, we are far better off to prune in early spring, right about now, when buds begin to swell. The rising sap will seal and heal any cuts far more efficiently, naturally and effectively from the inside, than anything we can put on from the outside. Spring pruning will generate vigorous new growth, the closer to the cut, the more vigorous it will be, and is best used to shape and generate well spaced and open structures on young trees.

It may also be used to regenerate old and neglected trees. As much new growth is the result of spring pruning, including lots of water shoots which may give the impression of a tree with its hair standing on end, this must be kept in

mind when deciding when and how to prune. Summer pruning will do exactly the opposite: it will stunt growth and generate fruiting spurs instead. So if you have a reasonably well shaped and healthy tree, and it just requires some cosmetic pruning of overly enthusiastic growth, wait until mid-summer to prune it. At that time, those endlessly vertical water shoots can also be trimmed back to develop fruit spurs instead of more leaf.

We shall cover summer pruning methods when that time rolls around. In the meantime, for the shaping or re-shaping of trees, cut

out first of all any dead, weak and diseased branches. Also cut out any crowded and crossing branches, and those that want to grow into the centre of the tree. Next cut out shaded branches, those which grow underneath a lateral branch, as these will be always in the shade and consequently will never amount to much, never mind bearing fruit.

As horizontal and upward-angled branches will bear more fruit than vertical ones, we can do one of two things here. We can either weigh or tie these, and weighing with a suitable rock in a nylon stocking is the best, into a horizontal, or a slightly upward-angled position, or we can prune the tip to generate new side shoots.

For this, cut just above an outward-facing bud, with a slanting cut, starting even with the base of the bud, on the opposite side, and cut upwards just missing the top of the bud. When cutting branches off at the base, cut just above the somewhat thickened, or rumpled

collar of bark at the base. Leaving the bark collar has now been found to heal and cover the cut faster and better than any other way.

If any or all of the necessary pruning would result in removing one-third of the total structure of the tree, stop then, and wait until next season to continue. Thus old and neglected trees are commonly rejuvenated over a period of four years. Aim for an open, vase-shaped structure to allow sunlight energy to reach well into the tree for a healthy and productive tree.

Now I know why those goats always watched me so inscrutably when pruning trees, not because they would want to learn, they are far too smart for that, but to say, "Look, look and know what you are doing." There is then this difference between goats and us, which the goats seem to understand far better than I, although my wife seems to think that there are some remarkable similarities as well, at least in me.

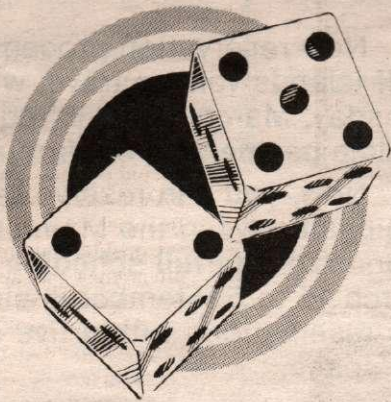

Publicity convener Dorothy Dodds expressed thanks to the Pender Island Women's Institute, the Fulford Old-Age Pensioners and the Fulford Hall Committee and others for their help last week. The institute invites women of all ages to join them in keeping their projects going and to enjoy each other's companionship while doing so.

Pender bylaw goes to minister second time

"Please sign" says the Pender Island Trust Committee. Regulation once rejected by Municipal Affairs Minister Bill Ritchie has been sent back to Victoria after amendment. On Friday afternoon the Trust committee gave initial readings to the bylaw which provides for a maximum building height of 25 feet for hotels. The committee agreed that there is nothing in the measure to be illegal or non-conforming and the Advisory Planning Commission had recommended that it be sent back to the minister. Preamble to the amended bylaw states that, whereas the Advisory

Planning Commission for North Pender Island has recommended this bylaw and whereas the public hearing heard no objection to the bylaw and whereas no property is made legal non-conforming and whereas the density in the area of 10 units per acre is not in any way changed by the regulation, the North Pender Island Trust Committee recommends, for the second time, that the will of the people of Pender Island be carried out and that "the minister please sign the bylaw."

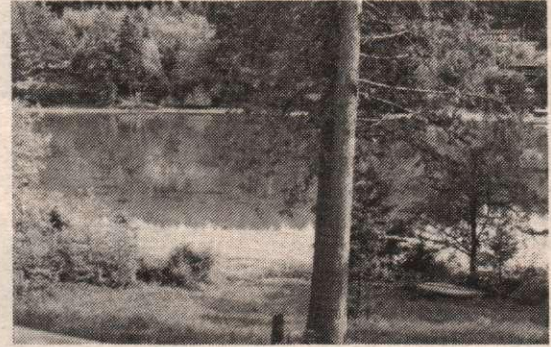
Two at hearing

Two members of the public attended the public hearing on North Pender Island on Friday afternoon, when no objection was expressed to the rezoning of a gravel pit to light industrial use. The North Pender Island Trust Committee had recommended in the community plan that light industry be encouraged in the former gravel quarry. The proposal was sanctioned by the owner, Driftwood learned. Approval was given on Friday subject to the retention of a 25-foot screen of trees or the planting of such a screen if no trees were already growing there. A development permit is required in respect of the property. Light industry embraces such uses as warehouse, car dismantling and an electrical workshop. Additional use will be a woodworking and cabinetry shop.

Down Through the Years with Driftwood

Twenty Years Ago

Plans for a centennial project for Salt Spring were stalled. The committee headed by Col. M. F. Peiler had requested a letter of clarification on its status from the provincial centennial committee but had not received a reply. The uncertainty came about when a second centennial committee had been formed in Fulford. Concerns centred on a possible reduction in grant money because of funding two projects instead of one.

The school board had approved a budget for the year of just under \$350,000. The amount was slightly more than the previous year and the increase was needed because of increased enrolment as well as higher teachers' salaries. The budget was being forwarded to the ministry of education for final approval.

The Women's Institute held a meeting at the home of Mrs. W.H.R. Low with 14 members present. The W.I. presented a provincial life membership to Mrs. Carrie Gyves who had served the group for 45 years. She had been one of the original members when the island group formed in 1920.

The Lions Club on Salt Spring was to hold a special meeting at which members would organize and elect officers for the Gulf Islands Pioneer Village Society. That group would be busy creating a senior citizens' housing project.

A resident of Salt Spring who came from eastern Canada was dispirited with the local winter weather. So she subscribed to a magazine, *Where to Spend Your Winters*, in an effort to seek a more favourable place to while away the winter. The first issue arrived extolling the benefits of the best winter climate in Canada: the Gulf Islands.

The rematch was played in Duncan between the Salt Spring Seals and the Duncan Hoopsters with the Seals winning 37-21. Leading scorer for the Seals was Glenn Woodley with 11 points and Roy Lee with eight.

Fifteen Years Ago

The department of highways had agreed to a request from the Gulf Islands School Board to close Kanaka Road on Salt Spring. The road split the playing fields of the school complex in Ganges and was considered a danger to children. But highways officials would first petition residents of the area to determine public opinion on the issue.

Drummond Park at Fulford Harbour was the choice for a centennial project when a vote was taken at a public meeting. Bob Akerman explained the project and noted that costs of preparing the park area along 450 feet of waterfront would be about \$2,200. Two other possible projects, expansion of the library and renovations to Central Hall, were also discussed.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that the Women's Club would be holding a bake sale at which "there will be oodles of lovely goodies to eat." While the sale was a month away, Papajohn wanted people to know that a draw for a sweater knitted by Hilda Yates would be part of the sale and tickets were available.

The Galiano Club met for its 45th annual general meeting. Election of officers resulted in Tom Carolan being chosen as president with Earl Young as vice-president. The secretary would be Mrs. P. Darling and Bud Day would be the treasurer. The meeting heard a

summary of activities of the year which included renovations to the community hall.

The dead herring floating in Stuart Channel were killed by hydrogen sulphide gas released from sludge at the bottom of the waterway, said an official of the department of fisheries. The sludge had been dumped there from the MacMillan-Bloedel sawmill at Chemainus.

The spring salmon weighed in at 27 pounds. Nels Degnen caught the big fish in Captain Passage. He had taken top spot in the Salt Spring Rod and Gun Club fishing derby the previous year with a 20-pounder.

Ten Years Ago

The new fish processing plant on Rainbow Road in Ganges was being picketed by striking members of the United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union. John Christianson had been catching herring in his own boat, processing the fish at the plant and shipping the herring elsewhere. He was not strike-breaking, he said, because he caught his own fish and didn't buy from others.

Papajohn reported from Saturna that there was not much news which meant he had to make some up. He told of Uncle Ralph missing a chair when he sat down. Uncle Ralph commented that he didn't bounce as well as he used to.

The leader of the opposition, Bill Bennett, would be visiting Salt Spring for a meeting with islanders. He would be accompanied by Hugh Curtis who had recently joined Social Credit after sitting as a Progressive Conservative in the legislature.

The Salt Spring Recreation Commission held an annual meeting and election of officers. Ted Harrison, Bob Akerman, Tom Marcus, Spencer Marr and Glenn Woodley were elected.

When the Galiano Rod and Gun Club held its annual meeting, Charlie Head was chosen as president. Hank Knudson had been president but decided not to run again. Vice-president would be Harold Grill while Marg Basarab would be secretary. The executive would be Lloyd Baines, Peter Denroche, Fred Robson and Pat Weaver.

Motor vehicle licence renewal deadline was the end of the current week but motorists were faced with a closed government office because of a strike by the Canadian Union of Public Employees. RCMP issued a warning that driving with expired plates would draw their attention. Licences and insurance could be obtained only through private agencies.

Five Years Ago

The Capital Region should appeal the Pollution Control Board order for a longer outfall into Ganges Harbour, said Jim Campbell, CRD chairman from Saturna. If the quality of the discharge could be improved, he said, the extended outfall would not be needed. The extension would cost up to \$1 million but improving the discharge quality would not cost as much.

The foreshore lease at Welbury Bay was one of four log dumps on Salt Spring. Holders of the lease had applied for an extension but the ministry of lands turned the application down. Strong opposition to the proposal had been heard at several public meetings on the subject held by the Islands Trust.

The volunteer firefighters had answered 16 calls the previous year, a meeting of the North Pender Island Fire Protection Society

heard. None of the fires was serious although one fire caused several thousand dollars damage. Fire Chief M. Allan had 19 volunteers on staff. New president of the society would be A. MacGregor.

The meeting of the Mayne Island Trust Committee would deal with the proposed zoning bylaw. John Rainsford and Randle Iredale would also address the meeting. It would be held in the Agricultural Hall. The concept of water conservation zones would also be discussed.

The Galiano Island Trust Committee passed a bylaw imposing forest zoning on islands around Galiano. The move was made to include the islands in the Galiano community plan, said Trust vice-chairman Gordon Wallace. The restrictive zoning, which limited lots to a minimum of 20 acres, eliminated the subdivision potential of the islands.

The 80-year-old patient wandered away from Lady Minto Hospital and was missing for 16 hours. When last seen at 6 pm, he was wearing street clothes and one slipper. Volunteers of the Salt Spring fire department were called out to search for him and he was found at 10 am the next morning at Upper Ganges and Churchill Roads by Fire Chief Bob Leask and Grant Marcotte. He was tired but none the worse for the adventure.

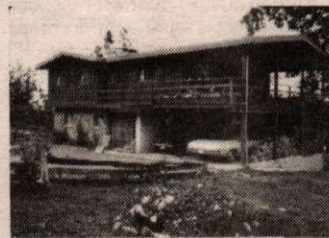

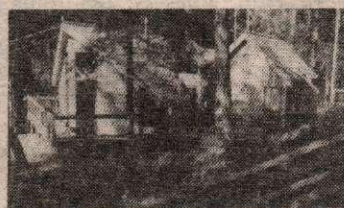

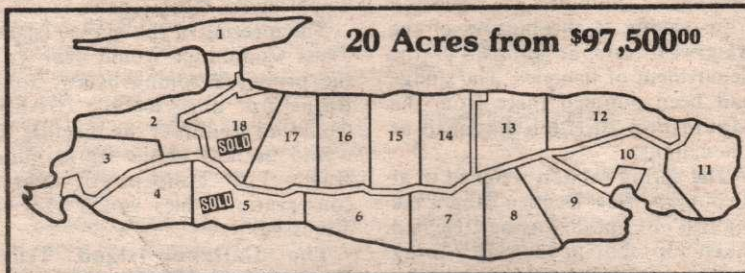

Grade 12's take government Placement tests Feb. 28

These tests are made up by the B.C. government and distributed to every secondary school in the province. Many of the colleges and

universities make these tests a prerequisite for entering additional English courses and sometimes for entering the college or university itself.

The results of the English Placement tests are not publicly known but personally a student can get the results from the university that keeps them. Generally the results are known a month after they are taken.

Blue Cover: Straight Talk about Marijuana and Hashish For Parents.

BOOK REVIEW

Pigeon Feathers is a book of short stories in prose form. John Updike takes a slice from people's lives and opens them up for examination. They and their situations are described and interpreted with much imagination, going great depths into their person. Most of these stories make you feel like you have been taken completely into these people's confidence, having their inner most fears and feelings revealed to you. These can be reminders of our own, many buried

deep within us only to resurface occasionally, creating those moments of anxiety and/or frustration. Updike's style is poetic; he obviously has a good thesaurus either at hand or in his head and he uses it well. Whether his stories are subtle or vivid his keen insight into the nature of human beings and his coherent writing will keep you reading each one until its very end.

These are definitely the kinds of stories that become classics.

Times are tough for those in the education business these days. This is emphasized by the stories of students walking out of the classes because they feel that the cutbacks in education are damaging their chances for an education to get them through the world of today.

For this reason, we did a survey on what percentage of the student body would back a strike, and which students would not back a strike. 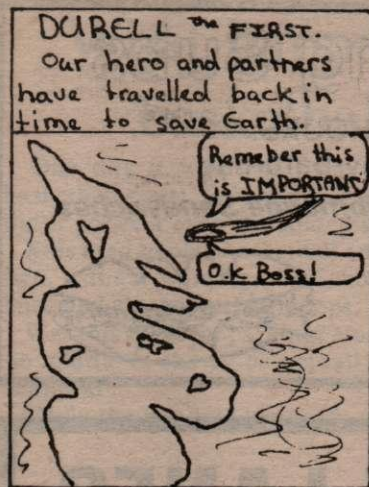
