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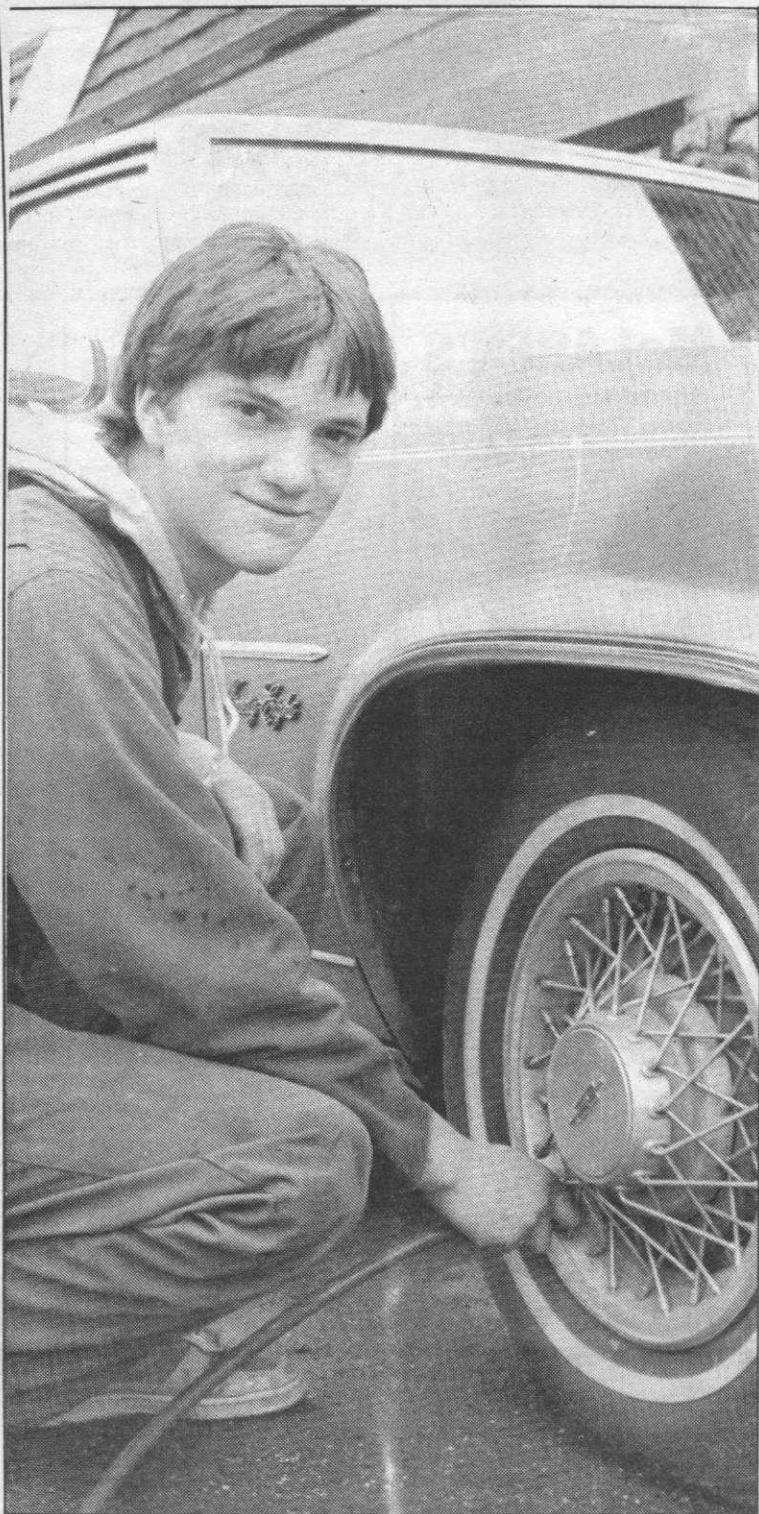

Over 50 students took part in program created by teacher Scott Bergstrom of Gulf Islands Secondary School.

Work experience program provides valuable lessons

Some students lined up summer jobs, some got an edge on their career goals, others discovered what jobs they *didn't* want, and some were just plain glad to get back to school.

Fifty-one high school students tasted the real world this past month as they skipped a week of classes and went to work for local employers. A further 10 students will participate in the work experience program set up by teacher Scott Bergstrom and now in its sixth successful year of operation.

"It gives them a little bit of an edge," says Bergstrom. "It's something to put on a resume."

Bergstrom originally created the program for his consumer education class, opening it up to all senior students — grades 10 through 12 — this year. At an earlier date Bergstrom posted a list of 33 placements available for the first three weeks in April, giving his consumer education students priority in signing up for their area of interest.

Some employers, such as Mouat's Salty Shop, took a student each week, and some students found their own work.

According to Bergstrom, the students plunged right into the jobs: "Their duties were more or less the same as the people who work there," he says. Pay came in the form of experience rather than dollars.

A number of employers have applied for the student employment grant and six of the students, so far, have been offered summer work.

Work opportunities ranged from jobs at Sylvia's Scissors, the Video Ranch and the Heritage Boutique to the Bank of Montreal and the Coast Guard.

Ian Margot, who has worked in mechanics, spent his week with

Don's Collision.

"Instead of disassembling," Bergstrom said, "he decided to see what it was like to put it back together."

Karen Horel, who is taking the foods programs and plans a related career, had the chance to practice her skills in the kitchen at Lady Minto Hospital, and three business education students went into the banks. The Coast Guard gave Steven Vine a taste of patrols and pursuits.

Getting right into the mood of things, Marguerite Lee at The Travel Shop set up mock bookings for Donna Gosnell to work on.

According to Bergstrom, a number of students who took jobs in the service industry learned to

handle cash, and acquired self-confidence in dealing with the public.

Bergstrom created the program based on his experience working in an alternative school in the Okanagan. His students, who were "on the verge of dropping out," took academic studies in the morning, and worked during the afternoons.

Bergstrom describes the Salt Spring program as successful, noting the employer response has been excellent.

And the experience gained by the students was valuable, he adds: "A lot of the students were glad to get back to school. It made them realize how important it is to hang in there and finish school."

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The other side of life

Raw, bitter feel given to Laidlaw paintings

Sombre moments are as much a part of life as joyous ones, and art must reflect them both if it is to have any integrity. Art which deals with the more solemn aspects is termed *sublime* as opposed to *beautiful*.

Last winter, Sally Laidlaw worked on a series of sublime landscape paintings, and on Thursday these were on view at La Berengerie, commencing an exhibition which will last about a month.

The raw, biting feel of winter is in these paintings. Leafless tree-trunks reach upward into the darkness, skeleton sentinels glaring down at us. Vast boulders press down their weight upon the beach, to the background accompaniment of the dense, dark forest. Grey waves break on desolate shores; hulking mountains glower through banks of fog.

Two pictures stand apart from the landscape theme, although continuing the general mood. One, called *Focusing*, might best be described as a *Mindscape*, since it seems at one moment to portray the seashore, at another great thunderclouds. Despite its constant motion it has a very contemplative effect.

The other (titled *The Others*) is the only one to show figures — are they human? Portrayed in dull red and with only rough shapes, they immediately bring to mind *L'enfer, C'est Les Autres*.

Sally is vivacious and witty, and possibly the best hostess on the island. It is interesting how totally different the mood of these pictures is from anything we have seen in her personally. She explains: "I just paint and let the paintbrush express what it will." This is an example of how art does not "express one's personality," but conjures up something deeper and more universal.

Sally is originally from Vancouver, but lived in England for several years, where she studied at Dartington Art School in Devon. Since moving to Galiano she has been a beacon of the arts in the dark forests of mid-island, especially since the life drawing class began holding its weekly sessions at her home.

Salt Spring trap shooters edged their counterparts from Galiano in a meet held two weeks ago.

The pilings which guide the ferry into Sturdies Bay were almost rotten, so they are being taken out and replaced with new ones. The work is being done by Miller Contracting of Langley, and will probably be going on for a while yet.

The work is especially necessary because some of the big ferries presently on the Vancouver-Victoria run will be calling here during July and August.

Mother's Day Tea

On Saturday afternoon, the Lionettes held a Mother's Day tea at the hall. This was most enjoyable, with tea and buns served up by eager volunteers.

Poems by the schoolchildren were read, on the theme *My Mummy*. This led up to picking the Mother of the Year, Chris Gaylor.

Most notable was a performance by the school ukelele ensemble, which has improved enormously. Yarah Hooley, Megan Gaylor, Kirstie Hales, Alex Wilson and Jennifer Dunn played music from the flapper era of the 1920s, and Kate Hennessy played extended solo passages. They were dressed in period costume, and when playing *The Entertainer* performed a lusty interpretation of the *Charleston*.

Afterwards, the film *May's Miracle*, originally from CBC's *Man Alive*, was shown. The documentary concerns the remarkable story of a retarded boy with cerebral palsy, and with his eyes surgically removed, who inexplicably teaches himself to play the piano, and even to sing along (although he had been unable to talk). The patience and perseverance of his step-mother is a strong element of the film.

Thanks are due to all the Lionettes who helped make the event a success, and especially to Ena Hooley and Margaret Robson for co-ordinating it.

Lighthouses Unmanned

At the brunch were lighthouse keepers Geoff and Rene Howard, with a petition. It appears that five lighthouses on this coast (Galiano, East Point-Saturna, Chrome Island, Sherringham and Pt. Atkinson) are to be automated and "unmanned" and six others are to operate with severely reduced staff. In view of the part played by lighthouse staff in reporting disasters and helping in rescues, the petition is asking that the lighthouses continue to have human occupants.

O Solo Cello

The violin is familiar as a solo instrument, but the cello? Somehow the larger instrument is associated with accompaniment, despite the sensuous depth of its tones.

On Sunday, Terry Sturge of the Victoria Conservatory gave a cello recital at La Berengerie. The Bach Cello Suites he played were among the first ever written for this instrument, which replaced the less powerful Viola da Gamba. The three suites (*No. 1 in G major, No. 5 in C minor, and No. 3 in C major*) were written from 1717 to 1723, when Bach was Kapellmeister in Kothen, and writing some of his greatest organ music.

Indeed, the cello sounded very much like the organ as Bach used it, its rich sonorities and rolling transition from low to high notes giving the effect of jolliness and contemplation all at once.

The six movements of each suite were all based on popular dances of the time. The *Courante 2nd movement* seemed exceptionally tuneful in each case, although the dazzling *Bourree* from the *No. 3* overshadowed everything.

The meal (duck with cherries) which preceded the recital was one of the best La Berengerie has

produced, and contributed to the success of the evening.

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Jensen retrospective shows prolific painter

The recent exhibition of works by LeRoy Jensen, at Off Centre Stage, was in a sense, a retrospective grouping, and the artist's first painting (a portrait of his father) from 1947 was shown. I will chronologically scan my faves.

Two of my favourite pieces are from 1949, some colour studies of the south of France landscape. Rather than mixing the colours, Jensen has studied them and overlapped brushstrokes of delicate blues, oranges and browns, using an almost cross-hatching effect, usually reserved for drawings.

In the 1960s, when acrylic first came out, Jensen explored the medium in Matisse-like amorphous forms with shiny surface qualities. He explored the female-male relationship in a large series of two-figure pieces called *Oneness*, but mainly prefers to depict the female form, through which, by varying treatments, colour and gesture, the mood is created and expressive statements are made: "It's not enough that it is harmonious...it has to express something."

His *Nude Figure* (1975) does just that. There is a strong stained-glass influence here in the luminosity of colour; the black outline of form and shape. He paints over and scrapes out; the effect created brings the form out of the canvas, rather than developing the colour inside the form.

The expressive use of orange in the buttocks, back and cheeks, the strong black brush-strokes in the treatment of the figure makes this a stunning piece.

Jensen uses a Modigliani-like treatment of twin forms in *Twin Figures* (1979). The grey-yellow forms appear like alter-egos of the same person against a bright blue background. His *Pregnant Woman* (1979) shows a pregnant form contained inside a domestic scenario, the whole arrangement

enclosed as if in a gestational womb; a fluid use of thick brown and beige brushstrokes create a happy, peaceful contentment. A delightful erotic scenario (1983) shows a fleshy pink flesh-toned painting as opposed to more colourful treatments of the figures in other paintings, a happy and light love-making statement.

Included in this exhibition were a series of outside on-the-spot recent sketches in watercolour, washes and charcoal that appear like stills from an animation sequence: fluid forms, poignant gestures and a well-displayed composition.

I have a strong preference to Jensen's prints and drawings, as does he: "If I had to rush into a burning house, I would not bother with the paintings, I would get the drawings." They contain the seed for further creation, and keep the artist fresh.

A *Family Scene* spoke to my single parenting household poignantly, showing a mother and two children in a pyramidal arrangement. Within the well-proportioned bodies and expressive gestural qualities — love is there — tangible, maternal.

A piece of a man and a woman, his hand on her pubis and hers on his hand, speaks eloquently of

marital bliss with its fluid lines and subtle eroticism.

My only curatorial criticisms have to do with the cluttered feeling created by the hanging of this artist's prolific paintings and the fact that the prints were laid out on tables and not immediately visible, but LeRoy Jensen and his wife Lynda like to "live with art, lots of it," and pointed out to me that the standard gallery hangings do not necessarily escape innovative changes, and I must admit, if I was to live with such wonderful work, I could change my perspective.

Council offers grants, bursaries

Every year, the Community Arts Council gives out grants to member groups to assist them in carrying out their work in the community. These grants are available throughout the year. Application forms can be obtained from CAC, Box 682, Ganges. In the previous year, grants totalling \$3,200 were given to member groups.

The third function of the grants and awards committee is awarding grants to individuals. The purpose of these grants is to assist individuals with study programs or projects. These application forms are also available from the above address.

During the year, seven grants were awarded totalling \$1,700. These helped two high school students attend the Courtenay School of Music; other grants assisted individuals in their study of dance, piano, art and the

painting of sets.

Last year, the grants and awards committee didn't use its entire budget. Students, artists, member groups—don't forget to apply.

The Community Arts Council (CAC) awards two bursaries of \$500 each to two Gulf Island students of art every spring. The deadline for application this year is May 15; applications may be obtained from the Gulf Islands Secondary School office, and the Continuing Education office in Mouat's Mall.

One bursary is awarded to a graduate of Gulf Islands Secondary School; the other to a post-secondary student in continuing studies, or to an individual re-entering a field of the performing arts, visual arts, or creative arts.

In 1985, Max Burton was awarded the secondary school

Manchester Polytechnical School in England to study design. Nicholas Apivor from Pender Island received the post-secondary bursary. He is studying fourth-year music at the University of Victoria.

Woodworking session scheduled by local guild

The Salt Spring Island Woodworkers' Guild has invited Katherine Woods to offer a one-day workshop in bowl-turning technique.

Katherine, a resident of Victoria, has many years' experience in carving and wood-turning. She specializes in thin-turned (under one-eighth of an inch thick) and natural edge bowls. Her work has been shown in various exhibitions and galleries, including *Celebration of Wood* in Vancouver, and *Explorations in Wood*, at the Out of Hand Gallery

in Victoria. She also teaches regular courses in carving and wood turning at Tools'n' Space in Victoria.

The workshop will be held in the high school woodworking shop on Saturday, May 17, from 10:30 am to 4:30 pm. Turning blanks will be provided, and the cost of the workshop is \$10 plus a charge for materials.

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police report

Pender Island RCMP are looking for a slim six-foot-tall Caucasian with reddish hair and a thin beard in relation to five break-and-enters on Mayne Island.

The suspect — believed to be about 25 years old and carrying a large blue packsack — could be on the Lower Mainland, says RCMP Cpl. Ray Thorogood.

Delta police recently recovered three nylon tents by the Tsawwassen causeway. The goods found were identified as property stolen from Mayne and, possibly, Galiano.

The break-and-enters were reported between March 30 and April 8, and RCMP are requesting information which may help them locate the suspect.

Cpl. Thorogood feels more than one person was involved in the break-and-enters. He notes that, judging from the items taken, the intruder(s) had been squatting in summer homes—dry goods were gone, washrooms and bedrooms were used, food was cooked and liquor was consumed. Apart from a pair of binoculars and portable walkie-talkies (both since recovered), no valuable items were stolen.

"They could have taken a heck of a lot more than they did, and they could have done a lot more damage than they did," said Crp. Thorogood.

He asked that people call their local RCMP whenever they have suspicions about someone's behaviour, especially on the islands where RCMP aren't able to monitor activities on a daily basis.

"It's happened a number of times that people saw the suspicious person, but no one thought to call," said Cpl. Thorogood.

The RCMP received a report from Pender Island School asking that motorists be reminded of traffic laws relating to the school bus. Motorists are obliged to stop when the red lights are flashing — and this applies to traffic coming from both directions. It appears to be an increasing problem on Pender, particularly at afternoon drop-off time.

Pender Island RCMP are requesting information regarding a 16-foot aluminum boat stolen from Shingle Bay on Pender's west coast on April 3. The boat has three seats, a green interior and a 7.5 HP Mercury outboard motor. Anyone who has seen this boat should contact the RCMP at 629-6171.

A red 10-speed bicycle was found on Pender on May 6. The bicycle is in good shape, and has a child's seat on the rear. The owner may claim the bike at the RCMP office.

Cpl. Thorogood said no problems have been caused by Sunday pub openings.

Cpl. Thorogood hopes to have information next week on a charge which may have been laid recently in connection with the killing of Wilhelmina the Canada Goose last November. A report will follow.

Graveside service marks police veteran's passing

Wymond Bruce (Kelly) Irving passed away Wednesday, April 30, in Saanich Peninsula Hospital.

Kelly Irving, as he was known all his life, was a native son of the Penders, the grandson of Arthur Spalding, who arrived on the Penders in 1886.

Irving spent his life in the police force, starting with the B.C. Police and then transferring to the RCMP. He was stationed in areas throughout Alberta, Manitoba and B.C. and finished his 35-year career in Victoria as Chief Superintendent of the RCMP.

Thirteen years ago, he retired to Pender Island where he had spent his early years. He was educated in Pender Island and Victoria schools.

Irving's father was Bruce Irving

of Victoria, a member of the B.C. Police Force; his maternal grandfather was Justice Paulus Aemelius.

His wife, Margo, is a member of the Payne family of Saturna, who arrived on that island at the end of the last century.

A graveside service was held in the Pender Island Cemetery, conducted by Rev. O.L. Foster of Victoria and attended by a large number of family friends and relatives, and members of the police forces with whom he had spent his career.

Besides his wife, Margo, three children survive Mr. Irving: daughter Ruth Wiren of Sidney; sons Rob Irving of Saskatoon, and Kelly Irving Jr., Victoria; and eight grandchildren.

Pender excavation project welcomes summer visitors

Dr. Roy Carlson from Simon Fraser University is conducting the final phase of the archaeological dig at Pender Canal this June and July. The dig is one of the most extensively excavated sites in B.C.'s southern coastal area and, during the last two summers, artifacts dating back 5,000 years have been found.

According to Grant Keddie at the Provincial Museum in Victoria, few of the approximately 20,000 recorded archaeological sites in B.C. have been excavated. He said the dig at Pender Canal will provide archaeologists with information about Indians in the Strait of Georgia area which will help them piece together the

"giant puzzle" (of B.C.). Tours through the site will be conducted again this year, beginning in June. Keddie said the project will go until the end of July.

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Job lists begin to lengthen as garden shows returns

Every time I set out to write an article on timely activities or jobs for the month, I feel as though I am listing the things that I've neglected or forgotten to do myself. The job list just keeps on getting longer, but at least the weather is finally co-operating and the garden is really starting to give some returns, as tulips, columbines, azaleas, rhododendrons, dogwoods and a host of other plants put on their beautiful floral show for us.

The unexpected freeze in November killed back a host of deciduous and evergreen shrubs, most notably the escallonias and the ceanothus family. By now you should be able to see new succulent green sprouts coming out of the crown and on lower branches that were a bit more protected.

Carefully prune out any wood that hasn't shown any sign of life by now, and refrain from giving the plants any fertilizer this spring because the roots will have more than enough energy to fuel the shrub's comeback.

In mid-summer you should apply a very low, or preferably, no-nitrogen fertilizer that contains potassium and some phosphate to help the plant to harden off and develop winter hardiness. Clean up the deadwood on the hydrangeas, as all of the past winter's damage is now evident.

Once your alyssum saxatile (basket of gold), aubretia, arabis and other early spring-flowering perennials have finished blooming, shear them to reshape and control their growth, and to stimulate more shoot and bud production for next year's bloom.

This is a good month for planting lilies, especially the speciosum or show lilies, regal lilies, and the auratum or goldband lily. Potted lilies can be planted out into the garden any time, and if you received a fragrant, potted lily for Mother's Day, you can also plant it out once the blooms have all finished. These lilies, usually the *Stargazer* variety of the Imperial lilies, will flourish in a sunny position and flower for you next summer, wafting their heady fragrance throughout your garden.

Since we are safely past any spring frosts, dahlias can now be planted out in a rich, well-drained soil, that will get lots of sunshine. When you're placing them in the bed, set them so that the base of the eye or sprout is three inches below the soil surface, and before you fill

in the hole, position and drive in a support stake three or four inches from the tuber.

The strawberries need some attention this month. First fertilize using either a low nitrogen berry food (4-15-15) or a couple of ounces of superphosphate as a side dressing. Take off all unwanted runners to concentrate the plant's energy on berry production. Strawberries also benefit from the application of a mulch, either a couple of inches of sawdust or weed-free straw. The mulch preserves moisture, keeps down weeds, and raises the developing fruit out of the dirt, thus reducing the incidence of botrytis or fruit rot, disfigured and dirty or gritty berries. In the next few weeks you will also have to put over the netting to prevent berry pillaging by birds.

Don't forget to thin out your rows of overcrowded seedlings of spinach, lettuce, radishes, beets and chard, to promote rapid growth.

May is the month for rhododendrons, with the great majority in full bloom during this period. It is also the time to fertilize, deadhead, pinch and prune. Most texts agree that rhodos, azaleas and camellias should be fertilized with an acid-generating plant food such as rhodo-azalea food or Miracid, as soon as flowering is finished, to stimulate the plant to make bounteous blooms for next year.

If you prefer the organic approach, you can topdress with an inch of 50/50 peat moss and compost mix, then apply four ounces of gypsum and four ounces of sulphur flour to each square yard of bed area. A couple of ounces of bonemeal will provide the extra phosphorus for flower development. Avoid raking in or deep cultivation, because rhododendrons are shallow-rooted and these fine surface roots are the main feeder roots, necessary for healthy growth.

Once the blooms or trusses of blooms are finished, they should be deadheaded, which involves the

removal of the seed head and the stem top down to the point where the uppermost green bud (either already flushing out or else dormant) is visible. Using pruners is too difficult, so it is recommended that you hold the stem between thumb and forefinger and snap the head off with a bending motion.

Likewise, if you want to stimulate branching and more bushiness, pinch off a portion of the new expanding growth, while it is still quite succulent. Pinching now is preferable to pruning later on, because the plant will not waste energy or time. If you do it now, the plant will still bloom well next year. If radical, hard pruning is needed to correct legginess, bad form or a break incurred during last winter's snows, there will be few or no blooms on that stem next year, but regrowth will be rapid. regrowth will be rapid.

This is also the month to shear or candle any pines that you want to shape, most notably the mugo pines. By breaking off part of the new extending shoot, you will stimulate branching and reduce the amount of growth, and thus develop a more bushy plant. Do not remove all of the candle, nor prune back onto last year's growth or some damage will occur and regrowth will be more difficult.

Next week we'll cover a few problems and diseases that are occurring on dogwoods, irises, tulips and wisterias. In the meantime, enjoy your garden.



Spending approved

The provincial government has approved \$585,420 worth of "minor capital expenditures" for the Gulf Islands School District.

Approved expenditures include:
 • \$35,000 to replace flooring at Salt Spring Elementary School;
 • \$33,000 to install sewer hookups at the school complex in Ganges;
 • \$374,150 to construct an addition at Galiano Elementary School;

• \$72,770 to replace an 84-passenger bus; and
 • \$37,000 to install an intruder alarm system at Gulf Islands Secondary School. The remaining funds—about \$33,000—will be used for "security measures and minor renovations," the province says.

Approval of the expenditures was announced last week by MLA Hugh Curtis, on behalf of Education Minister Jim Hewitt.

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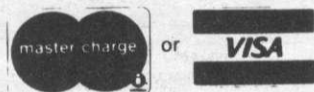

Rule number one for a soccer referee is that if you *think* you know all the rules of soccer, you don't ... because rule number two is there *are* no rules of soccer. Football has rules, baseball has rules, rulers have rules, but soccer has laws.

Lin Beattie, referee-in-chief for juvenile soccer on Salt Spring since 1981, holds an annual clinic for people interested in becoming soccer referees. Right from the start, he is quick to make the distinction between rules and laws.

The clinic involves three sessions to cover the 17 laws of the game, and one session to write an exam for accreditation.

The lectures allow students to discuss and interpret the laws, leading to *what if?* and *what now?* exchanges between them and Beattie. Students try to conjure up every imaginable — and a few unimaginable — soccer scenario.

Beattie always has an answer, thanks to experience gained in his 13 years of soccer refereeing. He has probably seen every possible soccer play — but if a new one comes up, he says it should be easy to categorize.

"There's nothing that you can't group into the laws of the game," he says. "You can live to be a 100 and still you wouldn't see every possible play in a game. Somebody is always trying to pull a new trick, a new shenanigan, on you. You just have to let them know that *no, it won't work.*"

Player safety should be the critical concern for referees, even before the game begins, he says. The referee must check the condition of the pitch, the goal posts and players' equipment before and after the opening kick-off.

Control is another concern. "You must establish that you are the boss," he says. "Consistent refereeing is the most important. They (the players) won't try the stunts if they know you call a consistent game."

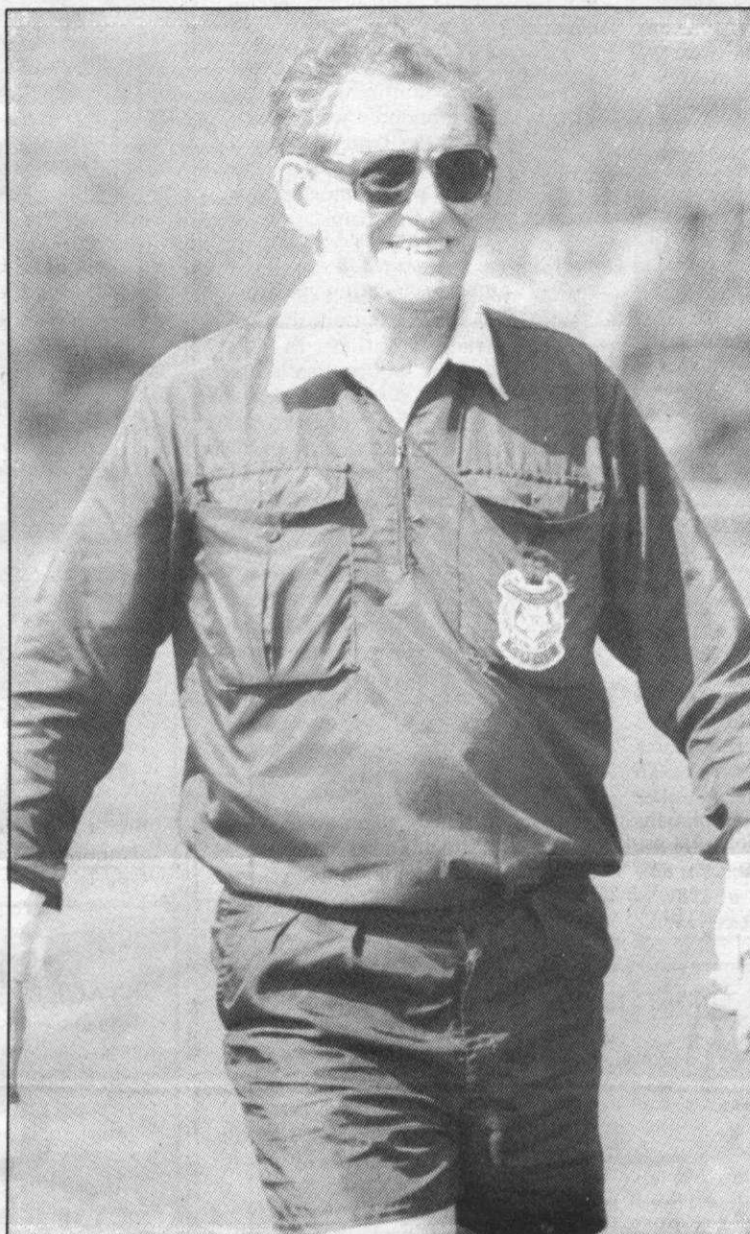
Often, he adds, it is the parents — and not the players — that a referee must control.

"Some parents are very good, very knowledgeable of the sport. But there are others who aren't, and these are the ones that give the referee — especially the young referee — the problems," he says.

You can't become a soccer referee overnight. A score of at least 70 per cent is needed to pass the first exam, which qualifies you only to referee lower level games (divisions six and seven). To move to a higher level, accreditation must be upgraded — by taking the exam again and scoring higher marks.

(The exam is standardized

across the country and can only be administered once a year.)

Referees in the B.C. Youth Soccer Association must be over 14 years of age. Some leagues may use younger referees (Salt Spring Island does) for some matches but not for intra-league games like zone finals and play-offs.

Beattie says it's a definite advantage to start refereeing at an early age: "Unless you have a progression, you don't get good quality referees."

The exam is only one part of the accreditation process, however. Once on the field, referees are graded on their ability to apply the laws of the game.

Assessors can show up at any time, without notification. After a game, the referee will receive an itemized list of his mistakes — where and when he was out of position, when a call was made that shouldn't have been made or when a call wasn't made that should have been.

"If you've had a bad day, you are told about it," Beattie says.

run four or five miles. That means a referee must be in excellent shape.

"There's nothing worse than watching a referee puffing out of breath, chugging along," Beattie says.

Referees are a strange breed. They are constantly under pressure and above reproach. They are respected and hated. They are always right (in their opinion) and always wrong (in the penalized player's opinion). They are constantly heckled, questioned, doubted and disturbed. So why did Lin Beattie want to be a referee?

"I was conned into it," he says. "A good friend of mine asked me if I wanted to referee. My son was playing soccer at that time so I decided to get involved."

This involvement consumes a lot of Beattie's time — and that of his family. His wife, Mavis has been the director of the B.C. Girls Soccer Association and president of the Vancouver Girls Soccer Association. His daughter, Kim, played, referees and coaches girls soccer, and his son Patrick played and referees boys soccer.

On any given night in the Beattie household, someone is scurrying out the door on their way to practices or games. Beattie himself is busy most nights organizing and making last-minute changes to the weekend referees' schedule. On Saturdays and Sundays he is usually at the soccer field by 9 am and home by 4 pm. He spends his Sunday nights filing reports to the B.C. Youth Soccer Association on the weekend's games. And Monday morning he's back to work with his propane and gas service business. It's a busy life.

Beattie, who has refereed more than a few hundred games, says his strangest soccer experience came when he refereed an international juvenile soccer match where the German team couldn't speak English.

"When the coach wanted to substitute, he would use sign language. The captain knew English, so we had an interpreter on the field," he says. "It gets interesting sometimes."

Beattie says the best part of refereeing for him is helping young players and referees. He likes to have fun with the game — but if he is tough, it is for the good of the kids. "Some people accuse me of taking the game too seriously — you know, it's just a kid's game. But I have to — to keep on my toes."

Refereeing also gives him satisfaction by allowing him to "put something back into the game."

Beattie says he enjoys lecturing and training referees and will probably continue to run the clinic for a while. As far as refereeing goes, Beattie says he may soon have to call it quits. He's 55 and the retirement age for international referees is 48.

But he knows when he will lay his referee's whistle to rest: "When you start saying, *Hell, I have to go referee a game*, then it's time to quit."

Referees can fail the assessment even before the match begins. Beattie recalls a western final a few years ago where a referee from the Prairies was failed before he got to the field.

"He didn't instruct his linesmen, he was late getting to the pitch (referees should get to the field at least an hour and a half before the game starts), and he had to borrow a pencil," he explains.

What makes a good referee? "A good referee has the ability to close his ears and not hear or let the crowd influence him. If you start letting the crowd influence you, you're dead," Beattie says. "You're only going to be pleasing less than 50 per cent of the people at any time."

A good referee must also "stick to his guns," be alert, and be in good shape. A referee at the senior levels (adult league) may run seven or eight miles in a 90-minute game. The players, because they are usually playing zone defence and can stand around waiting for the ball, will

Computer education receives top priority

School board trustees voted last Thursday to submit to Victoria a *Funds For Excellence in Education* proposal that will see computer technology firmly implanted in the district school curriculum within three years.

The program aims to integrate computer processing into the academic areas of language arts, social studies and science, with particular emphasis on the writing process. By the end of three years, the program's goal is to have 80 IBM (or equivalent) computer systems in each of the four Salt Spring schools, 20 in the Pender, Mayne and Galiano schools, and 10 Apple 2e systems on Saturna. The equipment additions would allow redistribution of district computers already in use.

To purchase the necessary computer hardware, the board is applying to the government's *Fund for Excellence in Education* program for \$99,980 in each of the three years. The board intends to budget the additional funding necessary to provide learning workshops for teachers and to create management positions.

Through the program, students will learn keyboarding, word processing, electronic mail and writing process skills.

By the end of grade three, students should be able to use an alphabetic keyboard at speeds faster or equivalent to their handwriting rate. The same goal is set for students completing

grade seven, using the alphanumeric keys, and grade 12 students who have not been through earlier programs, will aim for the grade seven goal.

Word processing skills such as composing and transcribing material, loading and saving files, plus inserting, deleting and copying, will be familiar to students entering grade four.

By the end of grade seven, students will be advanced word processors, able to exchange information between files, and define and use programming keys.

Grade 10 students will have the abilities to prepare essays on the computer, including title pages, footnotes, headers, tables of content, bibliographies and indices. Students will continue to upgrade their skills until graduation.

Hardware requirements in each of the three years will be 60 computer systems, 16 printers with switching, two modems and four demonstration monitors.

The plan calls for the incorporation of three management positions, including a district coordinator, to oversee and manage the program; a school computer coach, to act as a contact person and to provide staff training; and a lab assistant.

Both the school board and district teaching staff have responded favourably to the proposed program.

Prescription drug prices to increase in bill's wake?

Brian Mulroney and the Conservatives are gearing up for the sales job of their political lives. They are going to have to convince Canadians that we need a new law — a law which everyone admits will make prescription drugs more expensive and increase the profits of foreign-owned multinational drug manufacturers in Canada.

The new legislation, expected to be introduced soon in the House of Commons, will restore a virtual monopoly to multinational drug firms. This monopoly was broken in 1969 when Parliament allowed smaller, generic drug producers the right to make inexpensive copies of patented drugs.

As a result of that legislation, Canadian drug prices dropped from among the most expensive in the world to the bottom third of 19 industrialized nations. In fact, a recent federal inquiry has found that the current system saves you and me at least \$211 million a year, and some estimates are much higher.

The new law is expected to guarantee an eight to 10-year period of exclusive manufacturing rights for all new drugs developed after the bill becomes law. These companies would therefore be granted a full decade to sell their products with a guarantee that there will be no competition to keep prices down. With the new law you can expect all new drugs coming onto the market to be expensive — an eventuality that will particularly hurt families with children, and the elderly.

A typical prescription for a new drug now costs \$100 for 100 tablets. Under the new legislation, this charge can remain unchanged for 10 years. Under our present law, a generic copy will typically cut that drug cost by 50 per cent within five years. Other generics of the same drug will cut the price further through price competition to a fraction of the original \$100 prescription cost.

If the law changes, you'll really feel it in the pocketbook when your daughter or son gets an ear infection or a sore throat.

The drug companies argue that they need this protection to continue research and development of new products. However, the 1985 Eastman Report — the most thorough study ever into the pharmaceutical industry — found that the level of profitability for drug companies "clearly exceeds that for all manufacturing industries, and also for all chemicals and chemical products, except in 1974."

The impact of this law, if passed, will reach further than a typical prescription for your annual winter cold. Costs for drug benefit plans paid for privately or by provincial governments will rise significantly — costs which we as employees and taxpayers will have to pick up in the form of increased user fees, higher deductibles or increased provincial taxation. Canadian generic drug companies will go out of business.

This bill is not being introduced solely because of extensive industry lobbying in Ottawa. These huge companies, which are mostly American-owned, have also successfully lobbied the White House to put pressure on the Conservative government. Experience has shown that Brian Mulroney is none too successful at resisting Ronald Reagan, which is

particularly worrisome when he's trying to negotiate a free trade agreement with the United States.

When this bill is introduced in the House, my New Democrat colleagues and I will be fighting to block the legislation. I have found it very useful in debates to cite personal examples to support a case. I welcome from you any comments or personal stories of how higher priced medication will affect you, your family, and your budget.

Twenty-five years ago

• The hunt for a marauding cougar has finally come to an end on Prevost Island, nearly two months after its tracks were first discovered on Salt Spring Island's Mount Bruce.

Government hunter Skate Hames and a pair of tracking dogs, treed and shot the 130 lb. animal last Sunday after being alerted by the owner of Prevost Island as to its whereabouts.

Discovery of a freshly killed lamb near his house led Hubert DeBurgh to realize the cougar had completed the swim over from Salt Spring Island. When his search failed to turn up any trace of the animal, Hames had begun to suspect that it may have swum back to Vancouver Island.

• About 35 ratepayers from the Fulford area have decided to write a letter to the education minister to determine whether the board has the authority to amalgamate the South Salt Spring voting district with the rest of the island. The meeting was held at Nan's Coffee Bar late last week.

South Island Trustee Doug Dane, who was absent during the meeting in which the board approved amalgamation, said the decision was morally wrong even though the board may have the power to take such action.

Much of the discussion centred around the fear that Ganges voters would dictate future policy because of their greater numerical representation.

• The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce has introduced plans to install roughly 240 feet of flower boxes along the beach side of the causeway as soon as the highways department has completed the causeway widening project. The chamber is dedicated to making the island a more attractive place for both residents and visitors.

Twenty years ago

• A three-year-old Saturna Island girl is in satisfactory condition in a Victoria hospital after being badly lacerated about the head during a single-car accident one afternoon last week. The girl's mother lost control of the vehicle and ran off the road, hitting a log. There were two other children in the back seat at the time but no other reports of injury.

• A spokesman said the Bank of Montreal has announced plans for construction of a modern new bank building which is to replace the structure at its present location. It is scheduled for completion less than a year from now.

The present building is to be demolished once the first stage of the new building is completed. The two-stage construction plan will allow the bank to continue operations while the change is being made.

Fifteen years ago

• The skipper of a small boat in island waters reported a mysterious agency at large. An object arose from the sea, says the boatman, charged and damaged his vessel, then rose into the air, hovered in front of his boat and fired a ray pistol. The boat windshield was shattered and the aggressive object soared into the air and was lost.

• Youth 71 program on Salt Spring Island has been launched by the island chamber of commerce, but will be administered by the students taking part, Spencer

Marr told the annual meeting of the chamber on Friday. Participating students will keep accounts, organize their own functions and be responsible to themselves. The program provides for an entry into truck gardening, arts and crafts and an analysis of water pollution on and around the island.

• The minister of municipal affairs, Hugh Curtis, said that he sympathizes with Gulf Islands residents' opposition to staggering ferry hikes recently announced by the provincial government, and that he intends to ask the cabinet to relax the heavy boost.

Curtis said he has already appealed to cabinet to reconsider the nearly 400 per cent increase for islanders, and would do so again within a few days.

• Federal MP Tommy Douglas condemned Ottawa's policy of encouraging oil exploration as a threat to the environment that Canadians can do without.

Speaking at a dinner hosted by the Chamber of Commerce last Friday night, Douglas said the constant search for oil is not necessary — yet Canadian policy is to permit oil exploration in areas that are jeopardized by the search for "oil we don't really need."

Douglas also warned that U.S.

plans to transfer oil from Alaska to Puget Sound by oil tanker poses a threat to the entire Pacific Coast. He and other NDP members have asked the federal government to implement on the coast oil pollution control measures similar to the ones it introduced last year for the Arctic.

Five years ago

• About 400 questionnaires will be mailed to Salt Spring residents this week to determine what recreational facilities and services are wanted here. In a letter accompanying the questionnaire, commission chairman Glenn Woodley said that, as a result of the defeat of the referendum in November, the commission is anxious to determine what recreation facilities would be favoured by local residents.

The November referendum was for a 19,000-sq-foot recreation centre, including swimming pool, theatre and multi-purpose area. Estimated capital cost was \$2.12 million.

• A campaign to clean up Ganges was to get under way Wednesday as three island schools agreed to participate. A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce discussed methods of cleaning up the village — ideas included a beautification contest and flushing of the roads with water in an attempt to keep down the dust.

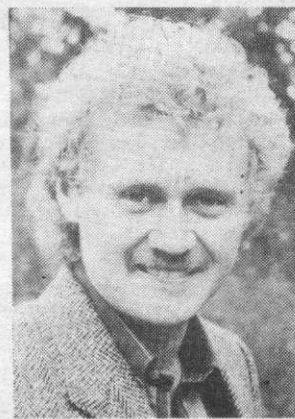

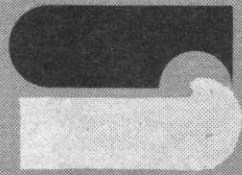
