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Residents, visitors combine to recreate Medieval times

Technological advance is tending to divide society into "the initiated" and "techno-peasants" (i.e. the rest of us), while fear of nuclear annihilation parallels the fear of *Dies Irae* (Day of Wrath) so typical of the Middle Ages. For these and similar reasons there has been a revival of interest in those times, from trashy rock-videos featuring pubescent maidens-in-distress up to serious exhibitions such as the one now on display at the Victoria Art Gallery.

"One of the greatest mediaeval church-ales" (i.e. festivals) was Pentecost, or Whitsuntide, "when many curious ceremonies were performed." So it was that on Saturday we performed a few ourselves, under the auspices of the Galiano Historical and Cultural Society, and assisted by the Society for Creative Anachronism, of Vancouver. The Activity Centre Gymnasium became, for a time, a Baronial hall.

The "three estates" of mediaeval society were knights, peasants and clergy. The castle was represented here by creatively anachronistic men-at-arms, attended by their damsels; the cottage, by the Galiano Scottish Country Dancers; and the Church by the Galiano Strolling Players' morality play.

"The Barony of Lions Gate" (formerly known as Vancouver) is the fiefdom to which the knights and ladies owed allegiance. The warriors saluted their ladies, and each other, before engaging in several kinds of combat — Florentine, Sword and Shield, Pole Arms, Mace and Shield, Great Sword, and Grand Melee. Although the weapons were safe imitations, the fighting was not "rigged," but won and lost according to rules developed by the society. The ladies then performed stately dances — a Branle (a round dance with much interweaving movement) and a slow, dignified Villanella.

A more boisterous mood was created by the Scottish Country Dancers, featuring the reels, jigs and strathspeys for which they have become famous. The dances were all superbly executed, and it was instructive to compare the different styles of the two companies.

"May God defend you," was the pious note which closed the

ceremonies, being the last line in the morality play *Death in the Tree*, by Hans Sachs. All the characters — three outlaws and a hermit — are betrayed by their own failings, engineering each others' deaths "for the sake of gold." Its grim view of morality and damnation are as much a part of the mediaeval spirit as gorgeous spectacles of chivalry.

The problem there is more severe than we have been told, and Beatrix reports contaminated soil, orders to keep windows closed and children forbidden to play outside. Local milk and produce are condemned, and these staples must be imported from countries like Portugal. There is much concern that this year's grain harvest may be contaminated beyond use, leading to a disturbing dependence on food imports.

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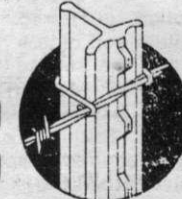
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Saturna student to tour New Zealand, Australia

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Remedial action needed

Plant diseases flourishing

With the Victoria Day weekend under our belts, and in our rear-view mirrors, we should be sailing into warmer temperatures, wading through the weeds in the garden and flying into frenzied spring planting of veggies and annuals.

The unusual weather that we've experienced this spring has also given us some unusual problems with plants in the garden. The first abnormal condition became evident during the past few weeks on the leaves and blossoms of tulips. Spotting or circular sunken regions appeared on the leaves, that became a tan to mid-brown or grayish colour and spread rapidly, to the point where the infection covered more than 50 per cent of the leaf surface.

The disease that causes this unsightly mess is often called tulip fire, and is actually a botrytis fungus or mold (*botrytis tulipae*), a beast that spreads quickly during the cold, wet weather, something that we've had a lot of lately. Since this fungus spreads so fast, and can penetrate and do damage to the bulb, it should be taken seriously.

First and foremost is sanitation, which consists of cutting out any infected leaves and flowers, then burning or disposing of this material (not in the compost). This next precaution is a point for debate, because some authorities advise that you remove and destroy the entire plant, bulb and all, theorizing that the infection is complete and terminal by this point. Other opinions have it that sanitation and spraying are sufficient remedial actions.

Recommended sprays include fixed copper, or benomyl (benlate). The copper should be sprayed on as the flower bud emerges from the foliage, and again after blooming is over. The benomyl should be employed as a preventative spray, one-third teaspoonful per gallon, applied at 10-day intervals starting as soon as

the foliage emerges.

I realize that it's a bit late for this advice now, but remember it for next year.

Next year will not likely present us with the same bad weather, and thus the botrytis won't be as severe, but there is one useful piece of advice for replanting or new planting this fall. The damage and even risk of infection by tulip fire can be greatly reduced if you plant your tulip bulbs considerably deeper next year, setting the bases of the bulbs at a depth of six inches or more, and using a good quantity of bonemeal or bulb food at the time of planting.

Bearded or German iris have also been attacked by a botrytis fungus this spring, a different species or strain of botrytis but the treatment is the same. Weak, unhealthy, overcrowded or recently transplanted irises are the hardest hit, and this indicates that good plant health provides good disease tolerance and resistance. The visible symptom of this fungus is the appearance of elliptical, sunken brown lesions or dead tissues, about one eighth of an inch in size, scattered up and down the outer, older leaves of the plant. This splattered appearance has resulted in this disease often being called iris ink-spot.

The fungus is less evident on the blossoms but will cause premature browning and shrivelling of the bloom. This fungus forms spores and spreads rapidly, so sanitation is vital. As soon as the flower fades, cut it off and destroy it, and also cut off any infected, sick-looking

leaves as soon as they appear.

This fungus is capable of disfiguring the leaves and blooms if the infection is severe, and if this is seen, then that plant should be sprayed and covered, or even destroyed. Minor or partial infections are not terminal, but sanitation and spraying with fixed copper or benomyl are recommended practices. The problem won't be as severe next year and the multi-hued, intricate beautiful blooms are well worth the effect.

Pear trees and basswood, lime and linden trees (the last three mentioned are all members of the *Tilia* genus), may be seen to be developing curious growths on their leaves. The upper or lower surfaces of the leaves may be reddening and forming bumps, galls or swollen regions. This is response tissue created by the plant itself because it has been irritated by the entry of mites, notably pear leaf blister mites, and gall mites on the *Tilia* species.

These mites live inside these protective swellings and suck plant juices from their hosts. This situation makes it almost impossible to treat, as the only thing that would kill the mites is a systematic insecticide, and you can't use that on pear trees. The problem rarely becomes serious, at the very worst disfiguring and curling some leaves, and taking very little energy from the plants, but if it really bugs you, hand picking is your only spring and summer response.

What you should have done was a dormant spraying with a lime sulphur-dormant oil mix during the fall-winter period, so as to get rid of the problem mite, spray the trees this coming fall.

It's too bad that this entire article had to be given to disease and pestilence, but with these problems out of the way, we can once again devote ourselves to the pursuit of joy and pleasure.

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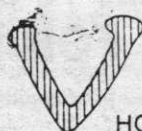

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Regulations reviewed

Pender committee examines sign bylaw provisions

North Pender Island's Advisory Planning Committee (APC) has been making careful note of signs on their island in consideration of a possible amendment to the current sign bylaw.

Islands Trust representative Peter Campbell, in a brief presented May 13 to APC members, has recommended changes to the current bylaw to increase the square footage allowance for commercial signs. Also discussed were regulations applying to home occupation signs, third-party signs and identification signs.

In noting several commercial and third party signs on the island currently in contravention of North Pender's signage bylaw, Campbell suggested APC members study the regulations.

"So many people on Pender are retired, and we should be conscious that there are others who are dependent on signs for their livelihood," said Campbell. "We must ensure that the people who depend on tourism have an adequate chance of reaching the public."

Signs in contravention of the current bylaw include those posted on the Hope Bay and Port Washington stores, the Pender lumber store sign, directional signs to Browning Harbour pub, bed and breakfast signs to Cliffside resort, the sign directing people to the Legion and the Pender Lodge directional sign. A Nuclear Weapons Free Zone sign is also illegal.

The commercial sign at the P.J. Store in the Magic Lake area exceeds bylaw specifications six times, and a motion was passed to

inform the bylaws enforcement officer of the infringement. APC members agreed that, even if an amendment to the current bylaw is passed, the three-foot by 24-foot sign would still be too large.

However, local resident Will McGaghey objected to the APC motion. Eight months ago, he was asked to remove a sign advertising his home operation on Southridge Farm. The six-foot sign advertising Borden and Mercantile feed, and home videos, contravened regulations limiting home occupation signs to two square feet.

Now McGaghey feels bitter. He has lost eight months of advertising because he chose to obey the law despite advice from friends who said he was foolish to take his sign down.

In a telephone interview, McGaghey said the APC is going to change the bylaw now because members don't want to create hard feelings, and because it makes their job easier. He noted that Campbell told him he could put his sign back, but McGaghey says it is still illegal.

"The law is the law, and everybody has to be treated equally," he said.

An amendment to change the allowable size for home occupation signs from two to three square feet is currently waiting for fourth reading by the municipal affairs ministry, according to McGaghey. Peter Campbell and Ben Manning, the new APC chairman, both indicated at the May 13 meeting that they believe the new section is already in effect.

Other items that were dis-

cussed included how to minimize directional signs, and whether products such as Coca-Cola or Labatts Blue need to be advertised on Pender Island.

APC member Bob George said people don't need directional signs because they can ask local residents for instructions, but other members suggested signs could be minimized or made smaller and more attractive.

After some discussion, it was agreed that while advertising products such as Coca-Cola may be objectionable, the examples on Pender are not illegal because they are third party signs, and the product is sold on the premises.

A discussion regarding signs on highways property indicated that the authority for provincial park signs, fire prevention signs, and other miscellaneous signs is with the highways ministry.

APC members also agreed to delineate more carefully those who would be affected by size restrictions on "identification signs." At present, institutions such as the Health Care Centre

are in the same category as homeowners.

APC members also discussed the possibility that development permits could be applied in cases where the size restriction for commercial signs was disproportionate to the size of the site. The new Driftwood Centre was issued such a permit to allow them to exceed the 12 square-foot regulation because of the scope of development.

Just before the meeting ended, Campbell asked APC members to think about a drafted proposal to replace a deleted section in the community plan. The new proposal suggests that commercial and residential development be segregated, and avoid building a village with hospitals and schools in the midst of a commercial centre.

Campbell read the proposal and said the plan suggests that in 25 years a "Ganges on Pender" could be avoided.

The next APC meeting will be held on Tuesday, June 10, at Pender Island School.

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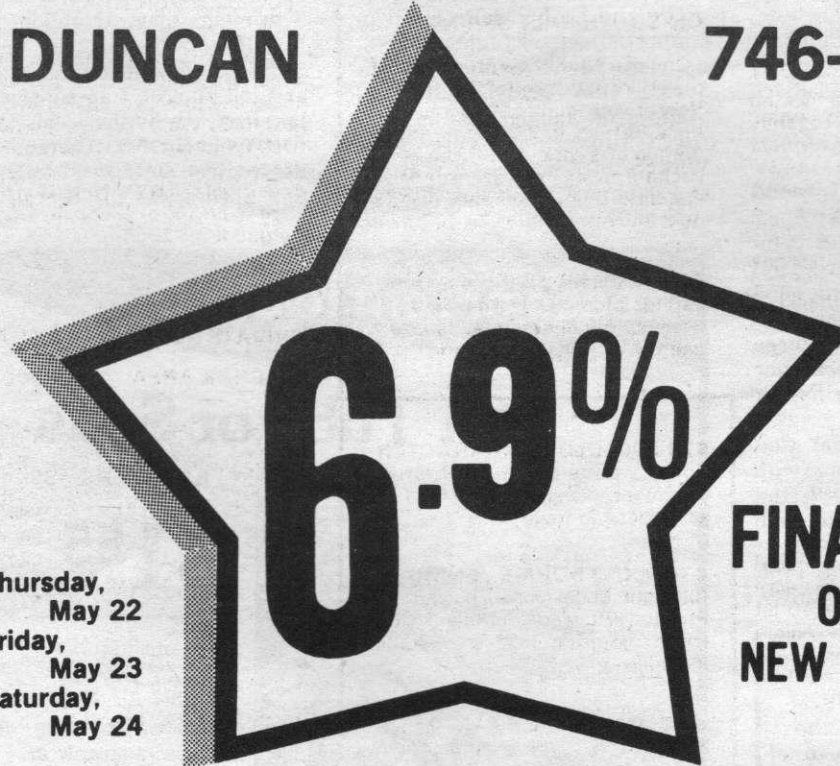
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Pool society schedules information meetings

New trends in swimming pool design and management of public facilities in large and small communities will be discussed this Thursday night at a meeting called by a Salt Spring group hoping to bring a swimming pool to the island.

The meeting agenda will feature two speakers: Kevin Pike, the president-elect of the Parks and Recreation Commissions of B.C., and Lex Tierney, past-president of the organization's aquatics division.

Wayne Taylor, a member of the Salt Spring group studying pool possibilities on the island, said Tierney is an acknowledged expert in the latest trends in swimming pool design and management.

"He'll be here to help answer the question, *What does a swimming pool offer to a community?*," Taylor said.

Tierney, currently managing the Maple Ridge leisure centre, will also discuss public swimming pool expenses and revenues.

Pike, a Vancouver Parks Board employee, is expected to discuss the operation of community centre pools.

Taylor said the Thursday meeting — set for 7:30 pm in the elementary school library — will be the first of a series of sessions designed to present information to the public. Future meetings will be called to examine cost, taxation and location questions associated with a public swimming pool.

In the meantime, the pool study

group is proceeding with plans to incorporate as a non-profit society that will direct its energies towards promoting the need for a swimming centre and launching a fund-raising campaign.

The group is also moving ahead with a survey of the recreation wants and needs of Salt Spring residents. A questionnaire, being prepared for mail-out in the first week of June, will be sent to 800 island residents and results compiled as soon as all forms are returned.

Taylor said he hopes most of the questionnaires will be returned by mid-June, with the remainder collected by the end of June. By the end of July, it is hoped that the results will be tabulated and the group's pool study completed.

The pool study group is operating on \$500 in funds granted by the parks and recreation commission. Taylor said the group would need between \$12,000 and \$15,000 for a comprehensive study of swimming pool possibilities.

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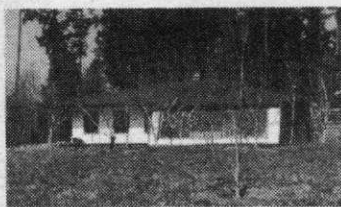

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To Ferry Corporation

Transportation requests presented

A committee representing the transportation interests of Salt Spring residents has asked the B.C. Ferries Corporation for changes in ticket, loading and schedule policies.

Committee member Bev Unger, reporting on a meeting with corporation officials held last week, said B.C. Ferries was asked to remove ticket booths at Vesuvius Bay and Fulford Harbour, give loading priority to vehicles carrying perishable goods, and change the sailing times of ferries connecting Swartz Bay to Fulford Harbour.

Unger says the request for removal of on-island ticket booths is aimed at eliminating traffic tie-ups. Return-trip tickets are already available for the Crofton-to-Vesuvius and Fulford-to-Swartz sailings, she said, meaning fares could be collected only at the off-island booths.

However, Unger said, the corporation rejected the request, arguing that some passengers would travel without paying. "It's a nebulous argument," Unger said, pointing out that similar systems work elsewhere.

The committee also asked the corporation to give loading priori-

ty to vehicles carrying perishable goods, Unger said, but was told the corporation is leery of those customers replacing motorists with paid reservations.

Unger said the committee was disturbed to find the corporation held that policy but had not explained it to island residents. "More communication is necessary," she said.

The committee also asked the corporation to consider changing the sailing times of the Fulford ferry in winter, to eliminate a two-hour wait at Swartz Bay for connecting vessels. B.C. Ferries, she said, is going to consider the request.

Also under consideration by the corporation are committee requests to simplify the schedule, availability of round-trip tickets for travellers from the lower mainland, and removal of employee vehicles parked in the Fulford Harbour ferry compound. Unger said the corporation promised action on the latter request in about one month.

Meanwhile, the committee is trying to arrange a meeting with MLA Hugh Curtis to discuss a

petition collected by Salt Spring David Clegg. The petition asks the ferry corporation and B.C. Transit for better bus connections at the Tsawwassen ferry terminal.

Also under discussion will be transport of Outer Island foot passengers to the Swartz Bay ferry terminal on buses from Victoria. At present, those buses are reserved for foot passengers travelling to Tsawwassen.

Unger said the committee will ask Curtis to discuss both matters with B.C. Transit chairman Stuart Hodgson.

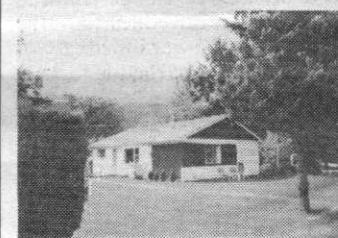

• A spokesman for the department of highways said at a recent dinner that an asphalt mixing plant will be established at Fulford within the next few weeks in preparation for extensive black-topping of Salt Spring roads this summer. • The summer ferry schedule takes effect today, with the *Motor Princess* being switched to the Outer Islands in addition to making runs between Fulford Harbour and Swartz Bay. The *Delta Princess* will also see service on the Swartz Bay-Fulford Harbour run while the *Cy Peck* is given a rest.

• The school board decided at last week's meeting to extend the school day by one hour for secondary grades. Students will now finish classes at about 4 pm. It was also disclosed that the government health department will put \$3,750 towards construction of a new school district office which will include space for a health office. A kindergarten class is also under consideration for next fall.

Twenty years ago

• Approximately 200 delegates from across the province showed up for the B.C. Historical Association's annual conference, held over three days in the Gulf Islands.

With the already inadequate facilities stretched to the limit, the community was called upon to help house and feed the delegates, who were given tours of Mayne Island on Friday and of Saturna on Sunday. On Saturna, the delegates were welcomed by a traditional lamb barbeque.

• A small crowd turned out last week to hear details of renovations to the entrance to Fulford Hall. After Jack Roland outlined the need for more spacious facilities due to increased use, plans were unveiled calling for a 32-foot extension to the front of the building in order to enlarge the floor area, plus addition of a skate rental room and a refreshment concession booth. The work, which also includes new and improved washroom facilities, is expected to cost about \$4,800.

Fifteen years ago

• Five persons drowned in two separate accidents in waters off Salt Spring Island last week — including four members of a Duncan family who had spent all of Sunday digging for clams at Booth Bay.

An island woman discovered the bodies of a woman and two children early Monday morning on the beach at Vesuvius Bay. The body of the husband has yet to be found. It's believed the family was lost after encountering severe weather while returning to Duncan by boat Sunday night.

Meanwhile, an unidentified 50-year old man drowned after falling from a gangplank while disembarking from the ferry at Fulford Harbour.

• Outer Island residents have turned down proposals for daily water transportation of students to schools on Salt Spring Island. The plans — which were in the exploratory stage — have been dropped, a spokesman for the Gulf Islands school board said. Trustees have also abandoned the idea of transporting elementary students to one central school.

• Three major building projects in downtown Ganges are well on their way to completion. Work-

men have already finished putting the roof on the new post office building and an extension to the Salt Spring Lands building is half completed. The floor for the new Ben's Lucky Dollar store has also been poured.

• Two Salt Spring Island students and a West Vancouver youth were brutally beaten by a gang of youths last week at the Crofton wharf while waiting for the last ferry to Salt Spring Island. It's reported that the passengers of eight vehicles lined up for the island ferry remained in their cars while the assault took place. The incident was reported to the Chemainus detachment of the RCMP and an investigation has been launched.

Ten years ago

• Minister of Transportation Jack Davis says the government will continue offering commuter tickets to Gulf Islands residents, meaning the recently-announced ferry hikes have been scaled down to just double the old rate. Davis had earlier announced that fares were to increase by about 400 per cent. The only stipulation is that commuter tickets will not be valid on Saturdays and Sundays.

It was also disclosed that Outer Islanders will pay the same fare as Salt Spring residents. In the past it has cost Outer Island residents slightly more. Inter-island travel will, in future, be free of charge.

• The Saturna Island Senior Citizens Club has been given a \$1,500 grant from the federal New Horizons program. The money will enable the group to finish equipping the senior citizens centre in order to expand its social and recreational activities. The seniors also plan to gather and preserve old photographs and artifacts for the start of a museum collection.

• Despite forecasts to the contrary, ICBC rate hikes have not discouraged people from taking out insurance coverage, according to Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis, who addressed a meeting in Ganges Friday night. In addition, claims are appreciably down this year in comparison with last year's figures. If the trend continues, there will be a rebate next year for those whose premiums went up, Curtis said.

• Ganges RCMP report that thieves removed about \$2,600 worth of jewellery when a Ganges business was hit for the second time last week. The proprietor of Mod 'n' Lavender, located in the Valcourt Centre, told police that thieves broke into the store and made off with rings, charm bracelets and lockets, and a quantity of Mexican jewellery.

• The worst earth tremor in about 10 years was recorded in the Gulf Islands early Sunday morning. Measuring 5.5 on the Richter scale, the quake was centred near South Pender Island, about 60 kilometres below

the surface. Residents were awakened at about 1:30 am by violent shaking, which lasted about six seconds. There were no reports of damage.

young man of 14 to 20 years of age; five feet, five inches, to five feet, eight inches in height; with light coloured hair.

• More than six months of negotiations have failed to produce an agreement between the local branch of the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) and the Gulf Islands School District.

The major stumbling block to an agreement continues to be wages. CUPE is demanding parity with other school districts of comparable size and so far has refused to budge from its stand. The board, meanwhile, agrees that the district has some catching up to do in terms of paying its non-teaching employees. The eight trustees, however, would like CUPE to stretch the increase over a few years, rather than asking for parity all at once.

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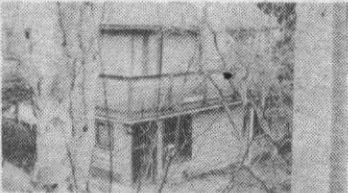

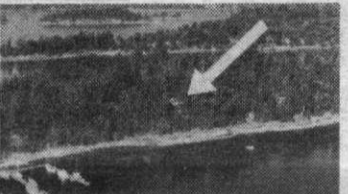
