Elementary school students try hand at quilts under gaze of Christina Estable

Quilt-making project aims to cover Soviets with warmth from Canada

To Shirley Reid's afternoon kindergarten class peace means sunsets, trees, flowers and lots of colour.

The 14 Salt Spring Elementary students created those images in individual quilt squares at Off Centre Stage last Thursday, drawing their handprints and visions of "what peace means to me" for the Canada-wide Friendship Quilt project.

The students surrounded hand-

prints and names with brightly-coloured drawings of pastoral scenes in a Friday session tied to the project. One child suggested a drawing of his hand meant *stop fighting*.

Organized by Laurie Steffler, the quilt project aims to "cover the Soviet Union with some warmth from Canada." It already includes 15 quilts made by Canadians from Labrador to B.C.

Several of the quilts were

displayed at Off Centre Stage, where project helper Christina Estable was quick to point out the significance of the intricate detail and obvious amount of work involved: "You work for war (armies, weaponry) and get a salary; you work for peace ..."

Two other Salt Spring school classes created quilt squares, and the local textile guild will be sewing and quilting them together.

Women's festival set for June 7

The fourth annual Gulf Islands Women's Festival will be held June 7 at the Community Centre in Ganges. The one-day conference will feature a diversity of workshops and presentations, starting with a panel on women and the media, continuing through to a workshop on "the Goddess emerging," and concluding with evening music and readings.

An effort has been made to include a variety of panelists and topics of interest and concern to Gulf Islands women.

A panel on political action will include Adrian Clark (provincial leader of the Green Party), Eva Manly and Sunshine Goldstream, who will discuss methods of political action.

Moderated by Maggie Ziegler, the panel will include discussion of the Nanoose nuclear submarine base, and topics like getting heard by politicians in Victoria and Ottawa. The panel will emphasize the role of the individual and of

groups in the direction of government policies.

A morning panel will feature Sara Diamond (video artist, critic and teacher), Jill Ridington (B.C. Periodicals Review Board) and Jana Taylor (Media Watch).

Their discussion will cover

censorship and pornography, as well as control of the images of women presented in today's world. Moderated by Gillian Smith, it will be followed by an open discussion.

The afternoon will see a video presentation of *Still Sane*, which depicts a series of 27 sculptures and includes narratives by Per-

simon Blackridge and Sheila Gilhooley. The film has been called "a work of remarkable courage and imagination ... the show is a powerful indictment of a mental illness system that treats lesbianism as a disease to be cured by drugs, shock treatment and incarceration."

Also scheduled are a workshop, *Goddess Emerging*, featuring Honor Griffiths, and one on healing through natural and gentle body work, entitled *Polarity* and directed by Ann Jacob.

The program also includes information on midwifery, the 1985 Nairobi Conference on Women, and an open stage in the afternoon. Child care, food and libation will be available.

The evening will conclude with a specially-prepared program of humour, poetry and music with the Capella Sisters, Mary Williamson and Judith Boel.

All women are welcome and ideas for future programs and services would be appreciated.

A feast of plenty

'Silent' zucchini brunt of many garden jokes

The next few weeks will see a real transformation in the garden, as the warmer weather stimulates plants and gardeners to lay out the floral shows that we all will appreciate in the coming months.

The cold spell seems to be broken, and the planting of started flowers and vegetables can now go full speed ahead. Bedding plants should go out into borders, rockeries, planters, beds and hanging baskets, and don't forget to pinch out the growing tips of the shoots to stimulate more branching and subsequent blooms.

From now on all of your planters and hanging baskets should be getting weekly feedings of a water-soluble, balanced fertilizer such as 20-20-20, miracle-gro or a mix of fish emulsion and mor-bloom.

Things are really booming in the vegetable garden. The peas grew six inches this week and the weeds grew eight, which should serve as a reminder to do your weeding before your weeds do you. It's time to plant out your squash, cucumbers, melons, peppers, pumpkins and zucchinis.

Ah, the illustrious zucchini, "the only garden vegetable with its own postal code." That prolific, productive vegetable is capable of filling up entire freezers on its own. "This freezer is for our vegetables and this one's for the zucchini."

Nightmares of being stuck with giant piles of the stuff strike fear into every gardener's heart as they then commence with the disbursement of the "crop". One goes over the back fence to the neighbour, two to the guy across the street, and a whole box to the family who just moved in next door (poor unsuspecting souls). As each successive zucchini gets bigger and bigger, everyone tries to come up with creative ways to decorate, disguise or hide them or, perish the thought, even cook with them.

Two Hundred Ways to Use a Zucchini, a potential best seller, would no doubt include such uses as temporary lamp bases, candleholders, bowls, lawn ornaments, bird feeders, foot rests, lawn rollers, and on and on, *ad nauseam*. As the season progresses, the mood becomes more competitive, as everyone enters the "biggest single zucchini" contest, trying to pick up a bit of prestige as the vegetable becomes less palatable and more grotesque.

Sorry, folk, but the silent zucchini certainly is the brunt of a lot of garden jokes, be they good or bad. Actually, the smaller, tender ones are the most flavourful, and

remember, if you eat 'em while they're small, you can probably stay ahead of the plant's production and thus avert a crisis in the zuke patch.

Zucchini is a humus-rich, well-drained soil with lots of manure, a sunny position and plenty of water (applied directly onto the soil, not the leaves or vines). Enough fun with zucchini—but watch out for a

sequel, *Zuke Two*.

All of your other vegetables can now be direct-seeded into the garden, and main crop potatoes can be planted up until mid-June.

The roses in the garden should be fed with either a granular fertilizer, such as 6-8-6 or 4-10-10, or with liquid seaweed.

It's interesting to compare the various "rose foods" available on the market today, for they all differ in fertilizer levels and nitrogen-phosphorus-potassium ratios. Amusing in one way, and confusing in another—but one basic truth is that they need a feeding in early June and after each blooming cycle is finished.

After the flower heads of the lilacs have finished blooming, remove them to prevent the needless formation of seeds. Also carry out any pruning required to reshape or reduce the size of the shrub. Take care to leave most of the terminal buds uncut and undamaged, as these will be the sites where next year's flowers are formed. If you want to reduce the height of the shrub, cut out one-

quarter to one-third of the tall stems each successive year, and then you won't lose a year's bloom.

Once the spring-flowering brooms, e.g. *Cytisus praecox* and *Burkwoodii*, have finished blooming, prune them back hard to stimulate more branching, more flowers for next year and to keep the plant's compact form. You should be cutting off at least a half—and preferably two-thirds—of the shoot wood generated in 1985 (that will be the wood that has just finished flowering). They need a heavy shearing to keep them from getting leggy and open.

Many gardens now have a beautiful showing of peonies in white, pink, red and shades in between. Remember to keep the plants well watered should any dry spells ever materialize, and above all pick off any blossoms as they fade, so that any risk of fungal attacks—such as *botrytis*—will be minimized.

Any annuals that have started to bloom should be kept continually free of faded, finished flowers, because once they set and develop seeds, blooming will either be reduced or even completely stopped.

Annuals that are to be direct-seeded into their place in the garden should be sown by early June. These would include zinnias, stocks, annual baby's breath, *salvia*, *candytuft*, *marigolds*, *ageratum*, and *Shirley and California poppies*.

If you had a problem with rust on your hollyhocks last year, and didn't treat them during the dormant season, then watch out for the appearance of the rusty orange spots on the leaves. Even newly-planted hollyhocks may get this rust, and persistent good sanitation will help to control any outbreaks.

Pick off any infected leaves, pick up any plant materials on the ground, and destroy them. A spraying with garden sulphur or, if you must, zineb, at recommended label rates and timings, will effect good control.

This fall, don't forget to rake up and burn any dead plant material, and then spray the ground with a

lime sulphur solution when you're also spraying your roses.

If you encounter any problems with powdery mildew, you might try an organic approach, using one ounce of epsom salts (magnesium sulphate) dissolved in a gallon of water and sprayed all over the leaf surfaces, as often as infection

severity and weather require that you spray.

Well, it appears that space has run out, without us being able to discuss that spectacular bloomer, the wisteria. Ah, well, there's the topic for next week. Until then, if any of you know any good zucchini jokes...

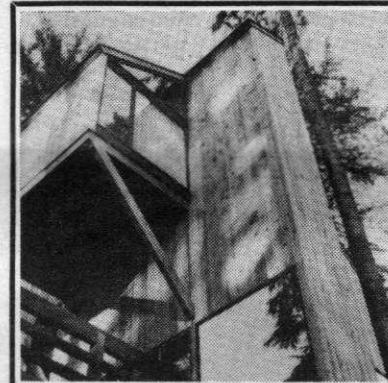

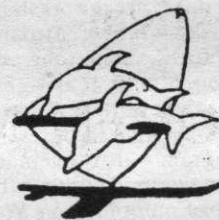

The remaining alder was cleared for firewood and in preparation for setting out new trees.

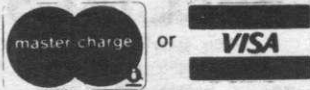

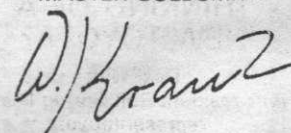

Pender school highlights outdoors

An emphasis on field trips and outdoor education highlights upcoming activities at Pender Island School, including an exchange between grade seven and eight students from Pender and their peers at Wood Lake Elementary in Kelowna.

Pender students returned from Kelowna May 23, and will host their new friends here in mid-June.

Teacher Val Laing will lead her grade five and six students, along with a group from Saanich, on an overnight campout to Beaumont Marine Park in early June. A visit to the Pender Canal archaeological dig is on the agenda for that field trip, and Dr. Carlson will be talking to the students about archaeology.

Principal Terry Corcoran promotes outdoor education with enthusiasm, and has been working with Laing to plan a sequential curriculum from kindergarten to grade eight that develops wilderness survival skills.

Corcoran explained that the program starts with kindergarten children spending a night away from home with an organized event in the school gymnasium. This initial experience is followed in successive years with more outdoor excursions.

Skills such as canoeing are taught, and by grade seven and eight, students have enough expertise in canoeing to make a series of lake portages.

The program is popular. Corcoran said the school will be putting a slide presentation together for the local school board.

When asked about the emphasis on Pender Island students sharing outdoors experiences with other school children, the principal said he wants to give them off-island exposure and contact.

"It's healthy for them to meet kids from different backgrounds and from different communities," he said.

• Traditionally, schools are busy places, and Pender Island School is no exception. In addition to the various events planned in and out of the classroom, teachers and students have organized successful fund-raising campaigns.

Corcoran explained that small schools such as his rely heavily on community support. Last fall a major fund-raiser raised over \$3,000 in magazine subscription sales. This coming fall, it is hoped that another \$1,500 will be raised through renewal subscriptions.

The task will be made easier with the use of a computer data base program two grade seven students created. Craig Person and Matthew Braun organized all pertinent information from last year's magazine sales, and everything is ready to go for the next round in the fall.

Corcoran is proud of the boys' enterprising abilities, and will be encouraging further exploration of computer knowledge in the classroom next year.

This year, students from grades three to eight learned how to operate the keyboard, and wrote compositions on the computer using a word processing program. Four new computers were purchased with money from the sale of old models and other used equipment, and like children everywhere, the fascination with the screen prevails. However, a restriction had to be made on time spent playing video games.

"This isn't a video arcade," said Corcoran.

• Another innovation Corcoran has brought to Pender Island School is "extended Wednesdays." The system sees students begin classes each day at 8:40 am instead of 9 am. The extra time permits an early 11 a.m. dismissal on alternate Fridays.

Corcoran said that when he first came to Pender (this is his second year as principal), he noticed many children were absent on Mondays or Fridays. He concluded that parents were withdrawing their children from school on those days in order to leave the island to shop or conduct other business.

The early dismissal system has been in effect since September, and Corcoran said people seem pleased with it. In addition to giving parents an extra day for off-island duties, it gives teachers

a better opportunity to attend professional conferences in Victoria or Vancouver. Some teachers have also used the extra time to visit classrooms in Salt Spring and Saanich.

Corcoran said he will be sending a report on extended Wednesdays to the local school board in June.

• Staffing at Pender Island School will remain the same next year. The proposed enrolment is about 73 students. Corcoran said he should know by mid-June who his 5.4 teachers will be.

• Anyone interested in attending any of the school functions should check dates and times with the office. *Driftwood* hopes to provide a report on the children's field trip and nature excursions. Other events to watch for include the Outer Islands Track and Field Meet on Mayne (May 28), the family picnic (June 23), and awards day (June 25).

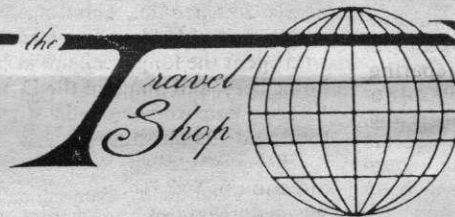

Campground debate highlights Saturna Trust meeting

Nearly 70 residents attended the recent Saturna meeting of the Islands Trust and heard John Gaines, one of Saturna's members on the Trust, outline his plans to apply for a permit to develop a campsite.

The site would be 21 to 24 acres in size, bordering the Winter Cove Marine Park on two sides, Gaines' property on a third, and with the Russell Beach area being the only privately owned property on the fourth border.

Public input of residents is sought for the August 23 Trust meeting on Saturna.

The campsite, planned along the lines of a provincial park, will be set back 100 feet from East Point Road on heavily treed property owned by Gaines. The location is 1.2 kilometres from the Winter Cove Marine Park parking area and a half mile from Winter Cove.

Gaines plans to have a two-acre open play area which won't be seen from East Point Road.

There will be three campsites per acre, which is a lower density than in provincial parks.

Gaines said: "It is not my intention to get around anything or to use a back door approach to these plans."

When Lorraine Campbell asked whether the permit would be for one or two years, Gaines indicated his plan is to work one year on permit and then make a long-term commitment and go for rezoning, especially due to the length of time it takes for rezoning. He will ask for a permit at the August 23 meeting so he can start preparing the site this fall for use in 1987. In a long-term look at the project, it is possible that a restaurant will be included.

Many residents spoke. Some stated their concerns about noise, while several members of the David Elford group (known to locals as the group of 30), whose property borders Russell beach, were concerned about motorcycle use and the noise. Gaines said no motorcycles will be allowed to be used in the campsite but that bikers can ride on public roads.

In answer to park supervision questions, Gaines said an attendant would be there "pretty well full time."

Morris Carroll stated his concerns by quoting Moses from Exodus, about the disposal of garbage and his personal worry about the supply of fresh water. Carroll felt the issue was putting him in conflict with good friends as he protested further development on "this very beautiful and precious island."

Jim Money said he was "in favour of having a campsite on the island to stop them from camping on my land."

In answer to a question about possible paths to the beach, Gaines said his intention is to ask the Parks Branch for permission and access to the foreshore by paths to join the Marine Park path. "It is not my intention to log or deface this property," he said. "In fact, there will be much less destruction than in a subdivision."

Ann Bavis, a long-time permanent resident, added: "I agree we should share the beauty of our island."

Dick Silverberg, owner and operator of the Saturna Point store, pub and marina, said "A number of campers arrive every year and camp on private property. Mr. Gaines will solve this problem. It's not a sin to make

a dollar. I'm in favour of the plan on a trial basis. Not to do so is to be quite selfish."

Alf Reynolds asked if temporary permit areas would be allowed. He also wanted to know if a public hearing will be required for every amendment.

Declaring that he was in favour

of allowing the bylaw to be changed, Reynolds also expressed concern about members of the Trust who engage in land dealing. He felt they should keep an arms-length relationship in Trust matters.

Chairman Humphries replied that when a trustee is involved, he

or she is not able to participate in the decision-making process.

Karen Muntean, chairperson of the Saturna Recycling and Waste Management Committee, inquired about the disposal of garbage from the campsite. Gaines indicated he would deal with it privately, possibly by using some part of his own land.

Muntean said that if the Hartland Road facility were used, her committee might lose its present rebate of \$500 given because Saturna does not use the Saanich facility.

Nancy Harrover expressed concerns about the temporary permit and further plans Gaines might have.

Tentative approval given to ship replica project

The Museum of Man in Ottawa has given verbal approval to the Galiano Historical and Cultural Society for a replica of the Spanish ship *Sutil* to be built for a new museum exhibit to open in July, 1988.

Museum Director Dr. George MacDonald and Roberto Rodriguez, chief of design and technical services, met with the society's directors last week.

Edrie Holloway, president of the Galiano Historical Society, said the *Sutil* was the museum's

choice because it "represents a certain period, it is the correct size (for the exhibition) and, because of research already conducted, we are able to go ahead on a fairly economic basis."

The 46-foot goleta, or schooner, will be a full-size replica of the ship Captain Dionisio Alcala Galiano commanded in 1792 in search of the Northwest Passage for Spain.

Holloway explained that the basic premise of the exhibit in the Museum of Man is to show a

representation of west coast Native cultures which came into initial European contact. In addition to the *Sutil*, the exhibit will include totem poles, a Haida war canoe and other small watercraft used by Natives of that era.

Holloway anticipates construction of the schooner to begin before 1987. Preliminary planning to have the ship built in Montague Harbour is in place, but nothing has been finalized, and Holloway could not say who will construct the vessel.

"The master shipbuilder has not been announced yet," she said.

The Historical and Cultural Society hopes to attract a corporate sponsor for construction of a second replica of the *Sutil*, to remain on Galiano. Past response from potential sponsors was negative because the project would reach a limited market.

"With the Museum of Man having embraced the *Sutil*, we are not looking at just 10 per cent of the market," said Holloway. "We

are more hopeful of getting funding as a result."

Holloway said the board of directors is delighted about the project. About half the research is done, which she said was to their credit in filling the museum's time and budget criteria. The initiative to conduct the research was entirely their own, she said.

W.C. Shaw, zone manager for the provincial ministry of lands, parks and housing on Galiano, met with Rodriguez on Friday to discuss details of the plan.

Built by Ted Turner

Models recall Canada's flight history

Ted Turner likely reached the apex of his harpsichord-making career on a trip to China last May.

The Pender Island resident, invited by China's ministry of culture to teach the art of harpsichord making, has seen his versatility as a craftsman take on new dimensions since that visit.

On his return from China, Turner turned to crafting a full-size replica of a floatplane — the *Queen of the Yukon* — in the backyard of his Pender home. The plane, the first commercial craft to fly in the Yukon, now hangs suspended outside that territory's pavilion at Expo.

(After Expo, the model will be sent to the Whitehorse Aviation Museum.)

Queen of the Yukon appeared in Canada's north at the same time as Lindberg made his historic, 1927 crossing of the Atlantic in the *Spirit of St. Louis*. Both were Ryan B-1 models powered by Wright Whirlwind engines.

Although Andrew Cruickshank is remembered as the pilot who flew the *Queen* for Yukon Airways and Exploration Co., Turner found records of only two mail flights made by Cruickshank.

The life of the plane was short. Rough landing conditions, coupled with primitive gear, caused her to suffer three crashes in two years. On April 5, 1929, pilot T.G. Stephens tried to refuel the plane in Mayo, Yukon, and crashed on landing. No one was killed, but the *Queen* was destroyed.

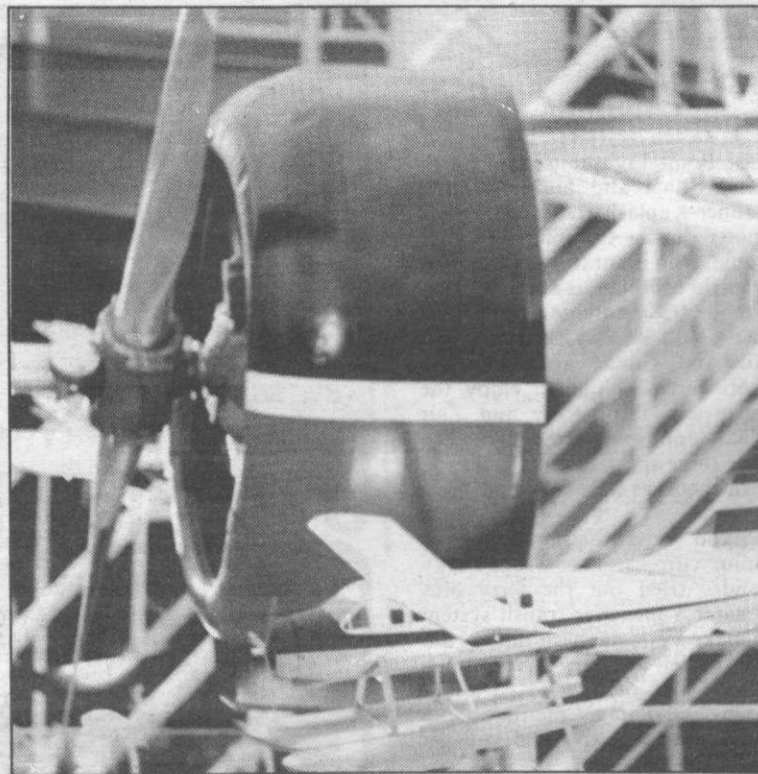
The *Queen* was Turner's first attempt at a full-size aircraft replica (it has a 42-foot wingspan) and his first try at building airplane engines. Of the latter, he built two during the past year — both made almost entirely out of wood and painted to look like metal.

One, a copy of the Wright Whirlwind engine, was made for the *Queen of the Yukon*. The other, a facsimile of a Pratt and Whitney WASP engine, sits inside an airplane cowling and is flanked by eight model bush planes Turner built for the aviation plaza at Expo's Canada Pavilion.

"It's all fancy art work," he said.

Turner's move into plane building isn't all new. Black and white photos contained in old albums show him as a boy, proudly holding up model planes he had crafted.

Turner, however, took a varied path from small models to large ones. He studied at Arthur Lismer's Montreal Museum of Fine Art before moving to Vancouver in 1962. After working as a scenic artist for Channel Eight television, and before he came to Pender in 1974, Turner worked for six years as an architectural draftsman.



Engine, planes hang at Expo

Producing the *Queen of the Yukon* brought together his love of aircraft with that varied background, and with skills honed as a consultant for *Design Group International* in Vancouver.

While working for the design company on boat models for an Expo promotion, he heard of their interest in the historic bush plane. But others said it couldn't be done (some estimated it would cost up to \$500,000; Turner did it for \$50,000), and the lack of data added to the improbability of success. Lindbergh's *Spirit of St. Louis* is the only surviving Ryan

B-1 today. "I had to do quite a bit of work just to convince them it was possible," said Turner.

Before he knew what the outcome of his research would be, Turner hunted down old newspaper reports, got specifications on the *Spirit of St. Louis* from the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, and information from Yukon family photo albums. From those gleanings, and with assistance from Pender resident Karl Hamson, he produced the designs for the replica. His research

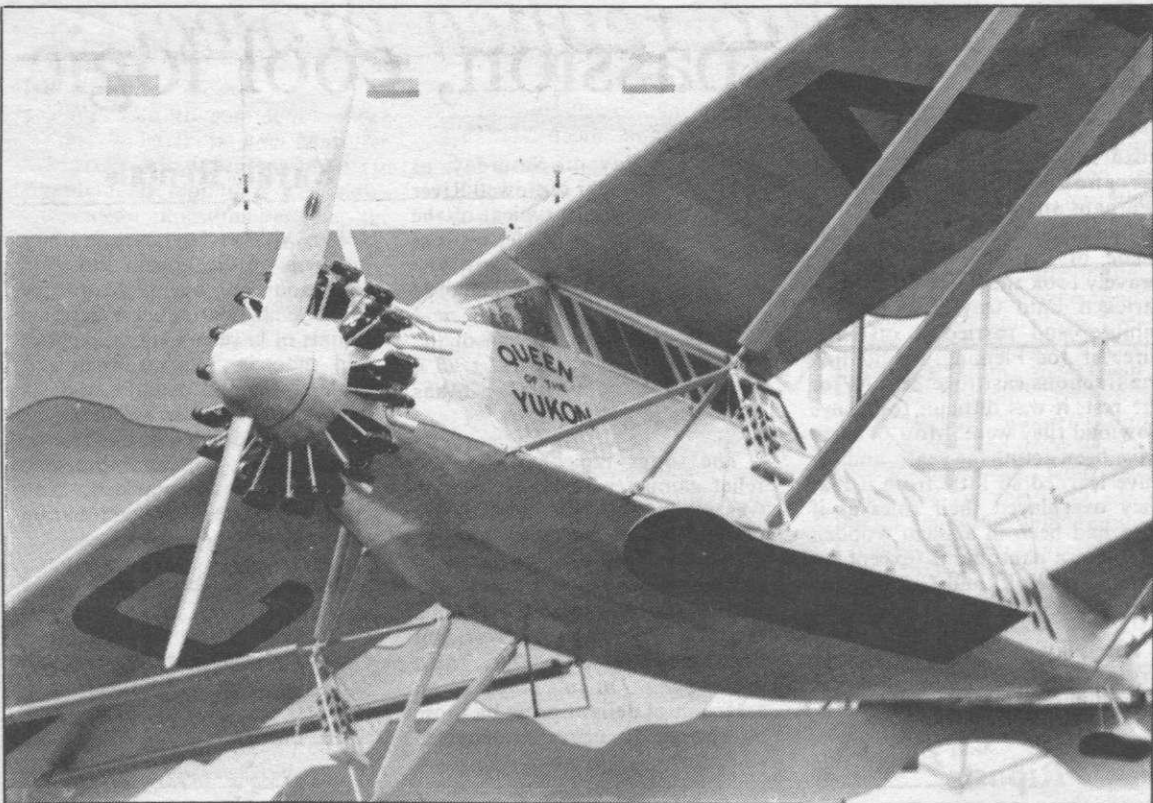

persuaded *Design Group International* the project was feasible.

Months passed before Turner had the contract in his hands, and construction didn't begin until August, 1985. Then he started working on the two Expo projects, "seven days a week, sometimes 15 hours a day" to meet the deadline.

Visitors to the world's fair should see Turner's work at the Canada Pavilion — once their curiosity for *Queen of the Yukon* has been satisfied. His contribution to the aviation plaza in the Exhibition Hall of the pavilion is located in the north-west corner.

At the centre of the display is the wooden replica of the Pratt and Whitney Wasp engine inside a full-size aircraft cowling. Suspended around this centerpiece are the small-scale models of bush planes chosen by Turner for the distinction they earned in Canadian aviation history. (Six of the eight models were originally designed and built in Canada.)

"I chose them mainly for the role they played in opening up different parts of Canada in the days when planes hardly existed anywhere," he said.

On exhibit are two flying-boat bi-planes, a *Curtiss HS-2L* and a *Vickers Vedette*, a *DeHavilland Otter* on floats, a *DeHavilland Beaver* on wheels, a *DeHavilland Fox-Moth* bi-plane, a *Norduyn Norseman*, a *Fokker Super Universal*, and a *Fairchild FC-2*.

well known for its strength or association with famous pilots during the pioneering of aviation in the north.

The *Fokker Super Universal* was known for opening up the Northwest Territories and was piloted by Andrew Cruickshank, Punch Dickins and Wop May for Western Canada Airways. All three became famous for long distance flights and for rescuing people stranded in the arctic.

A host of interesting and mysterious links surface in the

history behind these pilots and the planes they flew. Notable features of the *Super Universal* were its enclosed cockpit and the role it played in piloting prospectors into no-man's land.

Turner said the *Fox-Moth* was chosen because it was Max Ward's (Wardair Ltd.) first plane. The *Norseman*, well-known in northern Ontario, was "a real workhorse," he added.

The \$20,000 project took him about three to four months to complete, and in spite of the difficulties he encountered, Turner would like to do more display work. He is hopeful that some of the contacts he made through Expo will lead to larger display projects.

"I always manage to get esoteric jobs," he said, adding that when he hears about a project through the grapevine, he "fans the flames".

In addition to a strong desire to build his own plane and learn to fly it, Turner is interested in writing a story about the Yukon Airways & Exploration Co. Ltd.

Without the dedication of people like Ted Turner, Canada's aviation history may have been lost. He has reason to be proud of his contributions.

police report

While investigating a report about a 45-gallon drum on a vacant lot on Mayne Island, Pender Island RCMP found 196 potted marijuana plants. Cpl. Ray Thorogood discovered liquid fertilizer in the drum, plastic tubing for irrigation and the small potted plants nearby.

"It was a fairly elaborate set-up," he said, adding that "it's that time of year when these enterprising people will be starting to grow marijuana, and we are going to be watching for it."

No charges have been laid, but an investigation is underway.

"We have some suspicion who it might be, but certainly no evidence at this time," said Thorogood.

The maximum penalty for cultivation of marijuana for the purpose of trafficking is seven years imprisonment.

The service window was broken on Ben Ruff's trailer at Otter Bay ferry terminal on April 19. This is the second time Ruff's coffee

wagon has been broken into this year.

However, Thorogood noted that no entry was gained, and he suggested the culprits may have been stopped by the arrival of morning ferry employees.

Three reports from Mayne Island over the May Day weekend involved people who had not been on the island since Easter. Two were reports of theft from cars parked at Village Bay, and the third was an attempted break-and-enter into a trailer on Bayview Drive.

Thorogood said break-and-enters into seasonal homes is one of the police force's biggest problems because of the time lapse.

"When you find a place that has been broken into a month or more before, where do you start?"

No entry was gained into the trailer, however, and Thorogood said RCMP had received a prowler complaint on the Easter weekend which may assist them in locating the suspect.

New Rule book blends fierce passion, cool logic

We are all human beings and we must learn to love and respect one another, or we will be left with nothing. The habit of projecting our own shortcomings and stupidities onto other people (preferably different, outcasts or foreigners) who can then be blamed and punished degrades our spirit and threatens our survival.

This is the strand which runs through the 47 articles collected in Jane Rule's new book, *A Hot-Eyed Moderate*, just released by Lester and Orpen Dennys. Most of them originally appeared in *The Body Politic* (a Toronto homosexual magazine), and a preliminary edition was brought out by Naiad Press (Florida) last year.

Jane has for many years been a leading figure in the homosexual world, which has given her the enviable distinction of having something to write about. The process of coming to terms with her own inner self and a frequently cruel world have given her a deeper understanding of the workings of the soul than is granted to the unthinking herd.

The *Globe and Mail* (May 3) asks itself which Canadian writers have true international stature, and of the six names mentioned, two (Jane Rule and Audrey Thomas) are islanders. This forms part of a review by Douglas Hill and it is typical that Jane's books would be reviewed nationally before ever being noticed by the local dailies (another *Driftwood* scoop).

The book is divided into four sections — on writing, writing for the gay press, profiles and recollections, and reflections. Naturally, the second section is the longest and most forceful, and best shows the blend of fierce passion and cool logic which have given the book its title. "Hatred of the body and fear of death have inspired most of our culture's morality," she says (p. 135), echoing Norman O. Brown. "Love of the body and love of life seem to me good alternatives for beginning again." Or "Questioning conventional morality can be the beginning of a moral education from which we can begin to make choices based on understanding rather than blind faith or great fear" (p. 137). Such sentences sum up her message to the world.

Of her five novels, the first, *Desert of the Heart* (set in Reno, Nevada), has just been made into a motion picture, and you shall have a review of it as soon as it hits the coast.

Brooklyn Bridge

Bob McCallum of Vancouver has bought Lion Islet — all 1.6 acres of it — and is planning to turn it into a 250 bed resort, designed upon the same principles as Habitat 67 in Montreal. The forest cover (one tree) is to be preserved. Every regulation is against it (according to trustee Diane Cragg), so it will be interesting to see what happens.

Opera Star

Cam Trowsdale, of Shaw's Landing, took part in a major Vancouver production recently.

He was the lead violinist in the Vancouver Opera Association's production of *Carmen*, which by all reports was a succes de scandale (so shocking it became famous) on account of the radical innovations in staging. (It was on TV on Saturday night).

She has never acted in any play before, and yet when the lights went down on opening night (Friday) she became "Lady Miller" with such easy, unforced grace as to seem born with blue blood in her veins. Along with a clutch of decayed aristocrats, whiling away their lives in a boarding house, she gradually starts to relieve the dullness of their lives by turning to naughtiness. (More details? Go and see the play!)

The plot is actually quite feeble, so Win's unsuspected stage talents are the main reason to see the play, although Jackie Besler was

disturbingly convincing as the larcenous ex-convict maid. (Perhaps she worked at the lodge too long.) Special mention must be made of Carmen Braund (who bravely took the place of asthma-stricken Enid Gaylor at the last minute, and carried it off) and director Joe Fleming, for holding the fractious cast together. As for the rest, it was difficult to believe how bad they were. Most of them have been acting for years, and yet have learned so little from it that they overplayed their roles as if they had been in a silent wooden movie or a pantomime (except for detectives Wolff and Gaylor, who were wooden).

The play will also run next Friday and Saturday at the Community Hall.

Peace Camp Day

Back in the thirties and forties, teams of loggers or fishermen must have relaxed on the shoreline after a hard day's work and sung their songs to the sound of fiddle, squeezebox or guitar. The old times returned to the shores of

Georgeson Bay on Saturday, as Martin Rossander of Powell River played camp songs typical of the Depression on his fiddle, assisted by Brad Prevedoros (guitar). The gathering was on the lawn of Dorothy Livesay's house, and Dorothy (herself a veteran of the 1930s economic struggles) read a selection of the poetry that has made her famous.

The songs typical of the '30s relief camps (with which Martin was all too well acquainted) are often quite familiar to us, although we may fail to appreciate the social significance of the words. *The Big Rock Candy Mountains* is a humorous fantasy of a world of plenty and comfort, and *Hallelujah, I'm a Bum* is an assertion of defiant pride by those in the most degraded circumstances.

The poetry echoed, in a serious vein, the themes of these ironic songs.

The gathering took place on account of another piece of shoreline — Nanoose Bay. Here there is a military base where foreign nuclear submarines come and go at pleasure, creating a hazard similar to that seen at Chernobyl, only worse (a veritable "Nanoose around our necks"). The afternoon was in support of the peace camp which has been set up near the base to oppose it, and Lt.-Col. Woody Coward, a veteran of atomic testing, spoke on both this subject and the danger of military reactors in Hanford (Wash.) and South Carolina, which are of the same primitive design as Chernobyl.

The music and poetry were enhanced by the songs of robins, the intrusions of hummingbirds, the tooting of ferries and the wash of the tide. Afterwards, Tony Kingscote took the party onto the beach, to identify the marine life there.

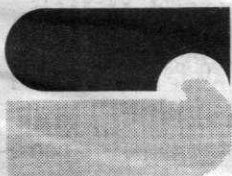

Over 1985 levels

Construction pace slows down

Despite a rush of work underway in downtown Ganges, the pace of building activity on the Gulf Islands is falling behind levels set a year ago.

Capital Regional District (CRD) statistics released last week show Gulf Islanders took out 80 building permits in April, 1986, for work worth \$1.05 million. In

return, the CRD received revenue of \$13,413.

That pace is a far cry from the level set in April, 1985, when islanders took out 215 permits for work worth \$3.4 million. CRD revenue was \$36,362.

For 1986 to date, islanders have taken out 702 permits for work worth about \$10.07 million, giving the CRD revenue of \$113,106.

That pace is just slightly behind the levels set over the first four months of 1985, when 730 permits were taken out for work worth about \$10.2 million. For the year to April, 1985, the CRD received revenues of \$112,675.

In year-to-date breakdowns covering 1985 and 1986, and in statistics for the month of April in each year, building activity is down in all categories except one — work on the Outer Islands.

On Mayne, Saturna, Galiano and Pender islands, building activity in April, 1986, was on a par with that registered in April, 1985—but in year-to-date figures, the islands took out 95 permits in 1986 for work worth \$1.48 million. The year before, 61 permits were taken out for work worth \$816,034.

In comparing April, 1985, to this year, Salt Spring building activity declined from 200 permits — for work worth \$3.05 million — to 46 permits covering \$708,414 worth of work. In year-to-date figures for 1986, Salt Spring registered 607 permits for work worth \$8.29 million while, in 1985, the respective totals were 669 permits and work worth \$9.45 million.

University production profiles Islands Trust form, function

A University of Victoria film crew has produced a promotional video for the Islands Trust.

The film, which explains the history and workings of the Trust, is a seven-minute presentation that can be shown at public meetings or by request.

Filmed on Salt Spring, Mayne and Gabriola islands in March and April, the video was completed and presented to Trust officials about two weeks ago.

Salt Spring Islands Trust representative Nick Gilbert, who has a copy of the cassette, said the film

was first shown at the recent *Islands 86* conference in Victoria and should premiere locally at an information meeting to be held sometime in June.

Gilbert said the video — produced at a cost of \$3,000 — will also be made available for additional screenings. For instance, it could be used in classrooms.

The UVic production team, operating under the direction of Professor Murray Edwards, performed all of the filming while the text for the video was drafted in co-operation with the Islands Trust.

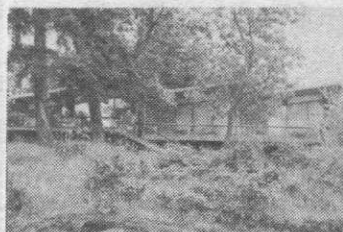

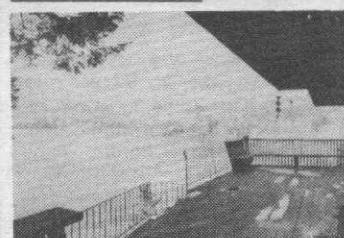

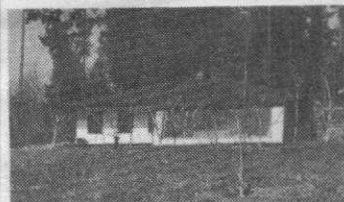

Twenty-five years ago

- The highways department has received permission to move the cenotaph. Plans call for its relocation within the next few weeks to a spot about 40 feet towards the firehouse. The move was prompted by road improvements near Turner's store.
- The Gulf Islands Joint Council plan to continue pressing for government ownership of the Gulf Islands Ferry Company. At a meeting held last week on Galiano Island, it was also agreed to try to bring about daily mail service for the Outer Islands.
- Work on Mouat Park is reported to be progressing well and it's expected that the park will be completed and open to campers for the July 1 weekend.

At present, the roads are being surfaced and the 15 campsites cleared. When completed, each campsite will have a picnic table, benches and fireplace.

While clearing the park, workmen discovered two six-inch trout in a pool of water. It has yet to be discovered how they got there.

- Jack Green is to be the recipient of a Certificate of Recognition from the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce for his outstanding work in the community. Active in numerous community projects, Green has also been the guiding light in the Sea Scout organization.

Twenty years ago

- A committee charged with investigating and promoting a sewer system for Ganges village recommends that the idea would be more feasible and economically sound with the formation of an organized village. The report says doing so would put an end to the provincial government siphoning off tax revenues that could otherwise go towards providing local services like a sewer system.
- Two senior Salt Spring all-star roller hockey teams will stage an exhibition game tonight in Alberni. Both teams are sponsored by the Fulford Athletic Association and the Salt Spring Lions Club, and coached by Bill Delong.
- The annual May 24 tennis tournament drew a large crowd from Victoria and Vancouver last weekend at Harbour House. The men's doubles title was taken by Harry Harwood and Ernie Milgram of the Jericho Tennis Club in Vancouver.

Fifteen years ago

- Ottawa has approved a summer student program proposed by the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce. Chamber president Spencer Marr said the local version of the *Youth 71* program will receive a \$24,000 grant. The program's main aim will be operation of a co-operative market on island farmland.
- Election of officers will be on the agenda when the Salt Spring Island Ratepayers Association holds its annual meeting next week in the Gulf Islands Secondary School gymnasium. Nominated are Wayne Cooper for president and Reg Taylor for vice-president. Cooper has been serving as acting president in place of Bill Sawyer, who was forced to suspend his duties because of illness.
- A spokesman for UBC's department of agriculture told last week's Chamber of Commerce meeting that the B.C. government will likely impose more stringent standards over sewage discharge.

Dr. M. Coulthard said the dumping of sewage — in either a

He said the only acceptable treatment system for Ganges would be one similar to that used in Holland, where sewage is pumped into an open lagoon and constantly exposed to oxygen before being discharged.

- A long delay in gaining ministry approval has forced Lady Minto Hospital to draw up a second set of plans for its new chronic care wing, according to board of management member Paul Layard.

The original plan had already been approved by the board of management but, owing to the government's tardiness, the costs were no longer valid and a new plan reflecting current costs had to be prepared. The revised plans are now before the minister.

- Pender Island children again walked off with the most number of points and the Inter-Islands Sports Day Cup during competition at Galiano Island last week. The Boy's Individual Trophy was won by Christopher Rock of North Pender Island and the Girl's Individual Trophy was taken by Lois Crocker of Galiano island.

Ten years ago

- Nine Salt Spring residents were rescued by hovercraft early last week after being shipwrecked on Castle Island in Ganges Harbour. The nine were on their way home after attending a Lady Minto Hospital annual meeting on Galiano Island.

Dick Toynbee, owner of the cruiser, was able to inch his vessel into a jetty on the island after encountering engine difficulties during the height of a storm. When the party hadn't

shown up by midnight, the Coast Guard hovercraft was dispatched and located the weary sailors around dawn.

- A Salt Spring Island farmer was fined \$2.50 when he appeared in provincial court last Wednesday. The man had been charged under the Pound District Act which prohibits a farmer from allowing cattle to wander at large.

- Lady Minto Hospital reports a 56 per cent increase in the number of newborn babies it attended to last year, with the figure rising to 56 from 34 in 1974. The numbers were included in the hospital's annual report which was released last week.

Other statistics showed that the number of acute care patients decreased from 830 to 592 last year. The number of patients in the extended care wing remained level at 27.

- The luck of the Irish has been bestowed on a Galiano Island man who recently picked an eight-leaf clover outside the fire hall on the island. Scott Laughlin's find is the latest in a series of discoveries that might lead Gulf Islanders to question where it will end. *Driftwood* initially reported that someone had picked a five-leaf clover, a discovery that was followed by a report of a six-leaf cover on Salt Spring Island. Just last week a Mayne Island woman picked a seven-leaf clover and sent it to *Driftwood*.

Five years ago

- New and tighter restrictions have been imposed on resorts on potable lakes on Salt Spring Island. Last Tuesday, the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee gave final approval to Bylaw 57, establishing a new zoning category — commercial 4-L — for such operations.

- A delegation of representatives speaking on behalf of seven Salt Spring water districts approached Monday's recreation commission meeting to oppose a proposed public bathing beach at Cusheon Lake.
