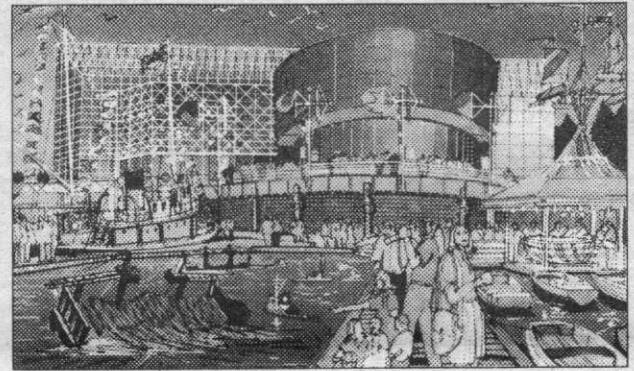

Herbal gardens functional—and 'things of beauty'

This coming weekend marks the middle of June, a point in gardening time where most of the vegetable garden is already planted and what remains is the need for tending, thinning, watering, fertilizing, pinching and that never-ending task, weeding. For the next few weeks, there is a slight lull in laborious effort in the veggie patch, and perhaps you should be thinking about the perfect complement to the vegetable garden, the herb garden.

Herbs and herb gardens have played a vital role in our civilization; the herb and spice trade even provided the major impetus for the exploration and discovery of the world outside Europe. The discovery of North and South America was partly a result of the search for a new, safer and shorter passage to the spice and herb ports of the Far East.

Why, if it hadn't been for the pursuit of those noble cargoes, Salt Spring and the Gulf Islands might still be a lazy backwater archipelago, rather than the bustling centre of commerce that it is today (surely I jest).

Herbs also provided the base ingredients for pharmacists of centuries past. The herb garden yielded plant concoctions and decoctions for the herbalist and physician to use in treating almost all diseases and ailments; from heart problems to insomnia and sore throats.

Many of our modern-day medicines were originally derived from or are still produced from herbs — the heart drug digitalis being the most notable, and I'm certain many more are yet to be uncovered as herbs (and their chemical derivatives) that will serve to improve and maintain the health of people around the world.

One project currently underway in some Third World countries is the cataloguing and identification of locally available herbs that would be useful in improving the level of health on a self-providing, independent basis. These would give a free source of vitamins (some herbs are rich in Vitamin C and others), proteins, and helpful

plant materials that would aid in combatting diseases, ailments or other problems with health. (This is beyond my understanding and experience with herbs, so see it as a newsy note.)

For millenia, herbs have also been taste makers, with various cultures using their own mix of spices and herbs to give them their unique cuisine — after all, where would Colonel Saunders be today without his "secret blend of seven different herbs and spices." Herbs have been in use as far back as recorded history takes us, with biblical references and long descriptions for their usage being given by Pliny early in the First Century.

One of the most common uses for herbs was to disguise the slightly "off" flavour of fish and meat that was past its prime due to a lack of refrigeration, proper storage and handling; a heavy application of thyme, marjoram or pepper masked the problem.

In other countries or regions, available spices and herbs give unique character to menuing and diets, such as Mexican, East Indian, Vietnamese and the classic French cuisine.

There are, of course, several other uses for herbs — including cosmetics and skin care products, natural fabric dyes, fragrant pot-pourri ingredients, insecticides, fertilizers, compost helpers (accelerators), air-fresheners, herb wines and herb vinegars (especially if your herb wine attempt goes off).

Herbs have a long history of being associated with myth, fantasy and mystery, since some plants truly do have the ability to heal or remedy an ailment, and only a knowledgeable herbalist

could work the magic and give these plants ability and proportion that was larger than life. A bit of hocus-pocus (definition of hocus-pocus as an arbitrary magic formula attributed to medieval travelling scholars) gave the user a revered or protected position in the community and a larger fee for services (purely coincidental, I assure you).

Some herbs even had the good fortune to resemble the human form, and thus were deemed to possess special powers, the two most notable being ginseng and mandrake (both considered aphrodisiacs but the latter is also poisonous and hallucinogenic).

With all of this preamble it is easy to see that herbs are intertwined and woven into the fabric of our history, culture, diet, health and well-being — and yet, for the home gardener, a reference to herbs relates, for the most part, to their usage in cooking. And why shouldn't they, for this is where they are most fun and provide the greatest enjoyment. Whether we realize it or not, almost all of us use herbs every day and we would enjoy them much more if we grew our own and appreciate them

more, especially since they taste much better when fresh.

Herbs can be grown in pots, on window-sills, in deck planters or half barrels, amongst the flowers in an annual border, in rockeries, along with other perennials in a bed, as a row crop or companion planting in the vegetable garden or, best of all, in an herb garden, all together, where they can be appreciated for their usefulness.

An herb garden right outside the kitchen door is an integral part of truly great cuisine and cooking and a real pleasure to use. It's a functional garden that is also a thing of beauty. There are also

some herbs that can be grown in a bog garden or wet site, to complement a pool or water lilies.

I suppose it goes without saying that this is the first of a group of articles that will be interspersed with other articles in the coming weeks and will cover the broad topic of herbs and herb gardening.

I apologize to those readers who usually look for more substance and helpful advice, but with such a large topic, this introduction was needed. But watch out for next week when we'll get down to the meat and potatoes (and herbs) of the matter.

Chamber to investigate

Incorporation eyed for Ganges

Salt Spring Island may see another incorporation study if the Chamber of Commerce acts on a suggestion made last week.

Chamber president Tony Richards told last Wednesday's directors' meeting that the organization should consider undertaking an incorporation study similar to that done for the island as a whole. There would be one difference: the study would examine the incorporation of Ganges as a village.

Richards said that village status would enable Ganges to make many improvements that cannot be made under present conditions. He pointed to the need for sidewalk construction as a prime example.

The response to a letter from the chamber to Highways Minister Alex Fraser was a factor that prompted him to propose a study, Richards explained. Last month the chamber wrote Fraser about three concerns it had regarding highways matters. The principal one was the Ganges bypass issue, and the chamber's letter pressed for early action on construction of an alternative route — one which

would link Fulford-Ganges Road to Rainbow Road near Dean and Atkins Roads, respectively.

The other two concerns raised were the dual parking requirements — one set being the highways ministry's and the other the Islands Trust's — and input by islanders into the ministry's planning.

With regard to the bypass Fraser wrote that it "remains as a very long-range option," for which he could not see funding being available in the near future.

The matter of parking, the minister said, was one in which the Islands Trust has less experience. "...It is my ministry, not the Islands Trust, which has the responsibility for road operations on Salt Spring Island."

Salt Spring Island may get a head start on the 1987 tourist season. Directors of the Chamber of Commerce last week agreed to a proposal to assess an advertising levy against any members wishing to have their businesses listed in the chamber's tourist brochure.

Wednesday's meeting agreed

that a committee should develop an advertising plan and that it would be empowered to charge members to a maximum of \$150 for advertising purposes.

There was a need for some haste in making the decision. The meeting learned that only about 5,000 brochures remain from last year's printing, leaving a shortfall of about 20,000 for the remainder of this year. A committee consisting of Shirley Jewell, Rick Rockliffe and Tony Richards will decide on a levy that will pay for reprinting the present brochure and printing next year's as well.

The executive hopes to have the money collected within the next two to three months and the 1987 brochures printed by November.

In other chamber business, two new directors were named to the executive by acclamation. They are Ann Foerster and Arvid Chalmers. Other new directors named within the past three months are Pearl Graham, Shirley Jewell and Rosemary Boehringer. All five have been named to the executive to replace directors who have dropped out since last year's annual meeting.

Sentence handed out for arson conviction

A Ganges man was handed a suspended sentence and three years probation last Tuesday after pleading guilty to charges of arson.

A county court judge in Victoria ordered 33-year-old Rhett Michael Faire to seek psychiatric and psychological counselling, under the direction of a probation officer, after he was convicted of setting fire to his house last year.

According to Crown counsel Nick Lang, Faire returned to Salt Spring after an extended stay in California to be served with

divorce papers from his wife. He was also given an order preventing him from entering the family residence.

After making sure his wife and children were out of the house, Lang said, Faire sprinkled gasoline throughout the bedroom and set it ablaze.

"Realizing what he'd done was stupid, he unsuccessfully tried to put it out."

Lang said that when the police arrived, Faire immediately admitted to what he had done.

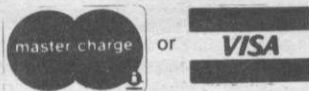

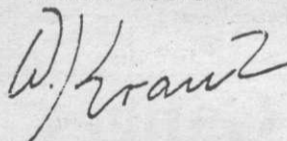

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Disposal systems summary

Trust hears responsibilities outline

Approval of a sewage disposal system on Saturna Island takes up to four months, the Islands Trust council was told on Friday by John Gaines.

The council was listening to a summary of disposal facilities by Public Health Inspector Bob Smith.

Gaines said he would welcome any proposal for approval of a system without the visit to the site of the health inspector.

Smith, in outlining the requirements of a septic tank system, said that any system discharging 5,000 gallons per day or less into the ground is the responsibility of the health ministry or, in the case of the Capital Regional District, the regional health service.

If the effluent is discharged elsewhere than in the ground, the responsibility lies with the ministry of the environment's waste management branch. The same switch applies if the ground system exceeds a daily discharge of 5,000 gallons.

The environment ministry is also responsible when the system serves an industrial operation.

A shared system is acceptable to the ministry of health provided that the appropriate authority will accept responsibility for the maintenance of the system.

Smith explained that if the disposal system serves two homes, it must be approved by the regional district or local improvement district, and that authority must acknowledge responsibility.

A simple example of the need for this lies with the shared system in which one unit is occupied by two people and the second by six people. When a repair bill is received, the two-person factor may well argue over a 50:50 division of costs on the grounds that the six people are using the facilities to a greater degree than the others. At this point, the local authority would take over and undertake the necessary works to

ensure that such a dispute does not threaten the satisfactory operation of the service they share.

The system, after installation, may not be used until it has been certified and authorized in writing. In remote areas the contractor may be permitted to certify the plant and the inspector who pays a visit to the site at a later date would check out various aspects for himself. This procedure was acclaimed by the Saturna Island trustee.

The health regulations outline minimal requirements in terms of the depth of soil and percolation characteristics of the receiving ground of the system. The inspector may require more stringent provisions if the ground is less than normally receptive.

In the approval of a subdivision where the ground is fractured shale on a hillside with wells below the site, could the trust committee call

the health ministry for guidance, should there be fears of contamination of those wells, asked Pender Island's Gordon Wallace. The ministry would be co-operative, he was assured.

'Most of us never have enough information.'

He and his associates could have used that information during the past 12 years, exclaimed the Pender trustee. "Most of us never have enough information," he added.

The health inspector may require repairs or alterations to a malfunctioning septic system, but he may only investigate the efficiency of a system after

receiving a complaint. He may not initiate enquiries into its efficiency.

Holding tanks are permitted only where the regular system will not work and the local authority undertakes to correct the shortcoming.

It was agreed that winter season percolation testing would be a clearer indication of the quality of the receiving ground for a system, but that the delay involved would not permit it to be required.

It has long been contended that a summertime test gives false reading because the waterlogged ground in winter will be considerably less receptive.

The basic requirements are good for the entire province. In those communities served by a local health authority, such as the islands within the Capital Regional District, the interpretation of the regulation lies with the local authority.

Calculations underestimate building activity

A mixup in figures recently caused *Driftwood* to underestimate the boom in building activity underway on the Gulf Islands.

Rather than being slightly behind the pace set in 1985, building activity is running as much as 72 per cent ahead of last year's level.

That surge in activity has caused the Capital Regional District (CRD) to advertise for a part-time building inspector for the Outer Islands. Inspectors in Ganges are so busy trying to keep ahead of the growing number of permit applications being made on Salt Spring that extra help is needed.

The mixup in figures came when *Driftwood* compared the wrong set of tables.

A proper comparison shows that in April, 1986, all of the Gulf Islands recorded 80 building permit requests, up from 41 in April, 1985. The permits issued this April covered work worth a total of \$1.05 million — it was \$630,990 in April, 1985 — and gave the CRD revenues of \$13,413 as

compared to \$6,648 in 1985.

In year-to-date figures, a total of 253 building permits have been issued on the Gulf Islands for construction projects worth a total of \$3.36 million and giving the CRD revenues of \$38,042. To the same point in 1985, the CRD issued 106 building permits for projects worth \$1.97 million and collected revenues of \$20,483.

The bulk of the increase in building activity is taking place on Salt Spring. The CRD's *Development Review*, a quarterly publication outlining major development projects, shows that the number of building permits issued on Salt Spring between January and March, 1986, was 72 per cent higher than in the same period of 1985, and the value of work underway was 36 per cent higher than a year before.

On the Outer Islands, the number of permits issued in the first three months of 1986 was 32 per cent higher than a year before, and the value of buildings under construction had jumped by 140 per cent.

Island knitter expands her sweater-making craft

One of the most famous traditional handicrafts of our coast is the Cowichan sweater. The learning and legends involving the manufacture of this handsome garment have been passed down through the generations of Cowichans, so that only those made by Native peoples are considered genuine. However, the craft has evolved: originally dog hair was used, but after Scottish settlers introduced sheep to the Cowichan Valley in the last century, coarse wool has generally been used and certain Orkney-Island techniques have been blended into the tradition.

Ellen Crocker, a full-blooded Indian living on the Porlier Pass Reserve, has begun a business making genuine Cowichan sweaters. (Of course she has been making them all her life, but now she has begun to advertise.) She learned the art from her mother, Cecilia Mitchell of the Shell Beach Band (near Ladysmith). Ellen has lived on Galiano some 21 years as the wife of Henry Crocker, and has thus married into one of the island's most eminent families.

Even though she is quite young, she is fluent in the Coast Salish language (Cowichan dialect, Penelakut division). She is a quiet and straightforward person who always seems to be smiling or laughing, and there are usually lots of children playing on the beach in front of the house.

As to the sweaters, she says her favorite patterns for use are eagle, deer, whale — but especially octopus! (The octopus in these waters reach prodigious size — I have seen a 50 pounder.) The sweaters, made in the classical style, from unrefined wool, are essentially waterproof by virtue of the lanolin. Ellen has had to obtain wool commercially in Victoria, but has just discovered a local source.

Galiano is distinguished among our five islands by having many people with Indian blood in their veins (I estimate five or 10 per cent of us have at least a little) which contributes enormously to the talent and diversity here. Ellen is by no means the only gifted one; for example, her brother-in-law Andy Crocker is a master of constructing dugout canoes of the most elegant lines and classic proportions. He built a beautiful one two years ago, and has now found a cedar log big enough to build another one, when he has time. The construction itself is a fascinating process, and when it is underway, *Driftwood* will be there.

Fishy Business

Quite a few little businesses have just opened up. Another one is the Red Door Fish Store, operated by Peter and Diane Klaui out of their home at 12, Devina Drive. Peter has lived on the island for 12 years and has been fishing for 10, so it seemed logical to him to provide a regular local outlet for the catch.

Locally-caught sole, snapper, cod, ling cod and salmon (including salmon steaks) are sold, as well as smoked salmon (both regular and "Indian-style") and smoked cod. All products are quick-frozen, and special styrofoam packs are available for those wishing to take their purchase any distance. The store is usually open, although it is as well to phone (539-5751) ahead if you plan to drop by outside standard business hours.

Besides the local catch, the store sells an amazing variety of brought-in lobster and "crab-stix" — and even squid and eel.

As well as running this store, Peter has a fish-exporting business, and his brand-name, *Galiano Gold*, is making the island famous even as far afield as Holland, Germany and Japan.

Market Garden

When Linda Roy and Glen Bellhouse bought a cottage on the island about a year ago, the level, deep and extremely fertile land in front immediately suggested itself as a market garden (vegetable farm). This year, they have made their dream into reality and after much exhausting tillage their efforts are beginning to bear fruit. The damp spring nearly flooded the field, but since the weather turned hot and dry, everything has balanced out nicely and crops are shooting up. Although it will take several years to fully establish the business, production is already good, and there are contracts with the Corner Store and the pub.

Products are blueberries, strawberries, green peppers, broccoli, cauliflowers, onions, lettuce (four kinds), potatoes,

corn, Brussels sprouts, squash, cucumbers, tomatoes, radishes and spinach. In a year or two, apples, pears and filberts will be available.

Although Linda and Glen are using commercial outlets, they are also happy to sell direct. The new farm is on Porlier Pass Dr., opposite the junction with Galiano Way.

Winning Streak

Fresh from her triumphant debut as a star of the stage, Win Stephen has "staged" another magnificent display. This is the new showing of her paintings at the Dandelion Gallery, displaying an adaptable talent in an amazing variety of techniques — oil, watercolour and pastel. Along with these was an exhibition of weaving by Chris Gaylor, and an opening party was held on Thursday evening.

Much of Win's painting focuses on the seashore, bringing out many of the marine themes with which we have become familiar. In particular, there is an extraordinarily intimate watercolour of seashells and pebbles in dramatic close-up; some of these have the radiance of Lapis Lazuli. As well, picture of fields, barns and the golf course round out the feel of the island.

Chris Gaylor recently won the Lionettes "Mother of the Year" award, and she surely deserved it if all her household talents are up to the quality of her weaving. She combines silk with cotton and rayon, so her garments have a delicate quality appropriate to our hot summer.

Shooters from Salt Spring, Ladysmith and Ladner (competing as individuals) helped make the celebration a happy one. 
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Races, sailpast highlight Browning Harbour regatta

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Pender, Saanich students visit archaeological site

A hike to Beaumont Marine Park, a visit to the archaeological dig at Pender Canal, and various camp activities were all part of an excursion for Pender Island and Saanich grade five and six students last week.

Teachers and parent volunteers from Pender and Beaver Lake School in Saanich led the 34 students from both schools into Beaumont on June 4. On June 6, students hiked out to return home, giving everyone a chance to enjoy a full three-day camp experience.

On day two of the campout, students visited the archaeology dig at Pender canal. Dr. Roy Carlson and his students took them through the excavations, explaining aspects of the dig and answering questions.

University of Calgary grad student Rick Garvin told the children they were standing on glacial soil 10,000 to 15,000 years old, and explained how the layers of soil in the trenches represented different time periods.

"Basically, you are looking at a bunch of pages that have been put into a book," said Garvin, adding that the first inhabitants were there between five and six thousand years ago.

He told the students about the various artifacts found on the site, including some from a loggers' camp around the turn of the century.

"We get all kinds of bones: deer, elk, large dog bones, wolf. And we get all kinds of sea shells (many that don't exist here anymore)."

Garvin said that jade and obsidian artifacts were found, and explained that the obsidian was from Oregon and the jade probably from the Fraser Canyon. (Obsidian is a glass-like volcanic stone that has an excellent cutting edge.)

The students watched the archaeologists at work and asked questions. Some children were incredulous at the epochs of time in layers of earth before their eyes. Most tried 'screening' for artifacts from soil in buckets ready for sifting.

Student Kyle Fletcher found a basalt flake between two and three thousand years old. (Flakes were used for making knives and projectile points.) Larissa Thorogood found a sandstone

as soil is sifted through screens. Demonstration took place during recent tour students made to Pender Canal excavation site.

abrader, and Garvin explained how it was used to make bone tools such as harpoons for whaling.

Because most of the bone tools have disintegrated, archaeologists learn from the objects that made the tools.

"If you find an abrader, you know they (the Natives) were making tools," he said.

A demonstration of how a sandstone labret (lip ornament) would have been worn was given to the students. In trying to help them understand how such an ornament was a symbol of status or beauty, the archaeologists compared the labret to pierced ears.

After their visit to the dig, the children constructed cedar bark bailers back at the campsite. The cedar had been stripped and prepared before the hike.

Pender Island teacher Val Laing explained the purpose of the exercise.

"We wanted to let them know how hard it is to actually make tools," she said.

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Ferries transportation service

Pender meeting queries system

Problems with ferry capacities, routes, schedules, connecting bus services and docking facilities were discussed at the Pender Island Transportation Committee meeting on June 8. About 90 people came to listen and express opinions regarding problems with the service to and from Pender.

Admiral Andrew Collier of the B.C. Ferry Corporation was unable to attend because of time constraints.

Frank Hudson, ministerial assistant to local MLA Hugh Curtis, attended the first half of the meeting to hear about the problems facing residents and visitors to Pender. A follow-up from Curtis' office is expected after Hudson has examined his copies of complaint forms outlining specific problems.

Ferry Committee representative Eileen Robertson encouraged a moderate stance in suggestions from the audience, emphasizing that major changes would not be possible at this time.

"We hope to improve the areas that are the most troublesome to you all," she said.

Touching on problems with the morning service to Swartz Bay, Robertson said there will be changes when the summer schedule replaces the current timetable.

As of June 20, an overall increased capacity of 34 vehicles can be accommodated when two vessels will replace the *Quinita* and *Mayne Queen* on the Swartz Bay run. *Queen of Tsawwassen* will replace the 7:50 a.m. *Mayne Queen* sailing, almost doubling the vehicle capacity.

However, the *Quinita* is being replaced by the *Queen of the Islands*, and her overall capacity is 46, compared to 80 on the *Quinita*.

Robertson urged commuters to take the *Queen of Tsawwassen* to Swartz Bay to avoid the disappointment of not getting on the *Queen of the Islands*.

A contentious issue in the service to Pender is the problem of having to be at the terminal one hour before sailing for the morning Swartz Bay runs, with no guaranteed loading. Pender residents are served after stops to the other Outer Islands, resulting in some vehicles being rejected at not one but two sailings to Swartz Bay.

Robertson said the committee was going to emphasize the importance of improving this situation.

"That is going to be our main thrust as a committee - to try and solve that problem," she said.

Other instances where Pender-bound commuters are inconvenienced involved problems with the loading system at Swartz Bay. Although the volume of traffic to Pender regularly exceeds the volume to the other Outer Islands, no system exists to accommodate the greater number of cars.

Two examples cited were the absence of an allotment for an extra loading lane, and the lack of planning when overloading is anticipated. Because only one lane is given to Pender, the overload has to wait until the next ferry. Once the other Outer Island traffic is on board, remaining Pender cars are not taken.

Robertson read projected 1986 population estimates from the 1981 census in response to suggestions that the Penders warrant a shuttle service of their own.

Based on census figures, the population projection for 1986 was as follows:

- Pender — 1,300 and
- Saturna, Mayne and Galiano — 1,800.

While the group agreed that a shuttle service was desirable, there appears to be no easy means of obtaining one. Various ideas were suggested, but the problem is one of economics and the logistics of docking facilities.

Transportation committee alternate Shirley Searle feels improved service is feasible through re-structuring of existing schedules. Following the meeting, she suggested that a shuttle service could be implemented from Swartz to Pender to Mayne, and a separate shuttle service could run from Mayne to Saturna and Mayne to Galiano.

In addition, she said Mayne

Island could be a transfer point if some scheduled stops could be built into the Tsawwassen-Swartz Bay run.

"There are different ways of using the same facilities to service the heavier population areas better," said Searle.

Other scheduling problems raised included the deletion of Sunday evening sailing from Swartz Bay to Pender. This run is cut every summer and, with the pre-summer schedule coming out in May this year, many people noticed the difficulty of attending Sunday afternoon activities in Victoria.

Other suggestions were made to streamline certain routes to avoid overloading problems and excessive waits at Swartz Bay.

At the meeting, Searle explained expected changes to the format of the summer schedule. Rather than dividing the schedule

into the Swartz Bay and Tsawwassen routes, the new format won't segregate the two runs. It is hoped this will help simplify reading the connecting services.

General discontent was registered regarding the complexity of the schedule and the frequency of seasonal changes. The need to have varied schedules on different days of the week was also questioned.

Joe Billevald raised the issue of the reliability of the *Vesuvius Queen* on the Swartz Bay-Outer Island run.

"I do think we should make a pretty strong case for something more seaworthy," he said, noting that during winter crossings, the vessel has to tack back and forth across the channel.

Problems with the *Vesuvius Queen* stem from its design, according to Shirley Searle. She said it was built as a river vessel, and the result is lack of strength in strong winds and currents.

Foot passenger problems were discussed, and Robertson explained the main difficulty was a lack of communication between the ferry corporation and B.C. Transit.

A member of the audience suggested the winter bus schedule accommodate Gulf Island passengers along with travellers to and from Victoria and Vancouver, and explained the difficulties of trying to make connections.

Robertson replied that the issue has been taken up with B.C. Transit, which said its jurisdiction does not extend to the Tsawwassen terminal. She said the bus connections pose a tough problem because the ferry corporation and B.C. Transit are unwilling to co-ordinate schedules.

The transportation committee hopes to arrange a meeting with other Outer Islands representatives in late June to discuss its proposals. This will be in preparation for a July meeting with the ferry corporation to arrange the fall-winter schedule.

Robertson said this is the first year the committees have tried to present a unified approach in negotiations with B.C. Ferries.

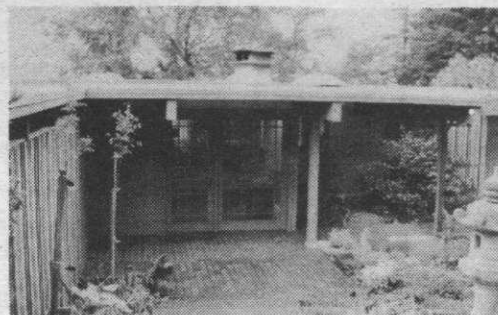
"We are now hoping to present a pre-agreed-upon package to them," she said.

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Activity Centre meeting to examine future uses

Galiano Activity Centre is a joint-use facility of the school and community located on Sturdies Bay Road and attached to the school. It consists of a gymnasium 80 feet by 50 feet with three badminton courts or a full-size basketball court, a kitchen, meeting room and storage space.

The centre belongs to the Gulf Islands School District but is operated under a joint-use agreement between the Capital Regional District and the school board.

To supervise the use of the centre, an allocation committee of four local residents is appointed. The board appoints the local trustee and the school principal while the regional district has appointed the president and the secretary of the Galiano Activity Centre Society. The allocation committee is empowered to set policy and make regulations for the use of the centre subject to the approval of the school board.

The activity centre society was registered in 1981 with the object of persuading the school board to plan and build the centre, to raise \$85,000 from donations and convince property owners to pass a referendum to raise an equal sum as a tax levy.

Although these objectives have been achieved, there is a need for the society to continue to operate. The directors of the society supervise the use of the centre, provide cleaning and other supplies, are responsible for the maintenance and repair of equipment and advise the allocation committee. The society has a modest amount of money left over from the fund used to equip the centre but it has no income. It cannot charge rent for the use of the centre and use the money, as this must be paid to the school district. The society hopes that user groups will make donations to the society.

The allocation committee was able to persuade the school board that the use of the centre by Galiano groups for non-profit activities should be rent free. As part of the campaign to raise the money to build the centre, it was indicated that Galiano groups

wishing to use the centre would be able to do so without paying rent. Since the community contributed \$170,000 there seems no justification to change this policy especially as it is the same as that applied to the similar facility on Pender Island.

On Saturday, June 21, at 10 a.m. the society is hosting a meeting at the centre for representatives of all organizations and groups who might wish to use the centre in the coming 12 months. Over the past year the centre has been used for activities which include badminton, carpet bowling, floor hockey, volleyball, keep-fit and committee meetings on a regular basis. The gymnasium has been used as an auditorium for plays, concerts, demonstrations, dinners and a medieval tournament. Anyone considering sponsoring an activity that could take place in the centre should attend the meeting on June 21, or send a representative.

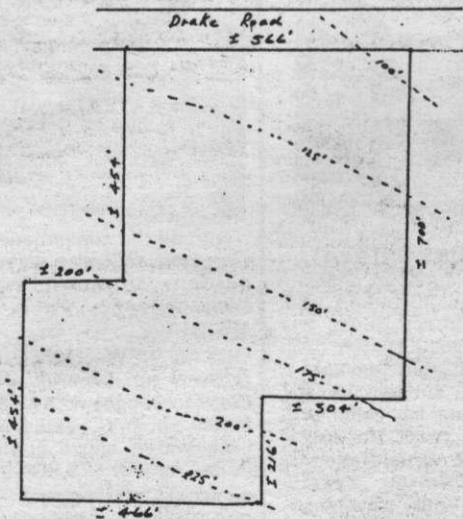

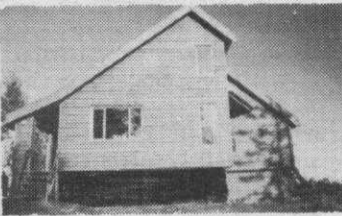

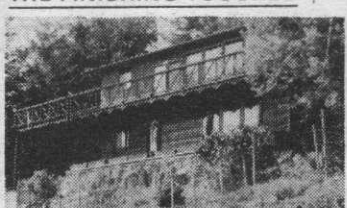

Twenty-five years ago down through the years

• Fulford school trustee Doug Dane submitted his resignation following last week's school board meeting, protesting the board's failure to take further action on the amalgamation of the Salt Spring Island voting district with the rest of the province.

After much consideration, Dane was permitted to read the minutes of a public meeting in Fulford last month which resulted in a letter being sent to the education minister, asking if the board had the authority to amalgamate the two voting districts.

The minister replied that while the board does have the right, a separate voting district is allowed if amalgamation presents any unforeseen voting difficulties.

• The local school board has so far failed to establish that there is a sufficient number of kindergarten-age children to warrant conducting classes on Salt Spring Island. A minimum of 25 children would be required before a kindergarten could be established.

• At last week's annual meeting of the Chrysanthemum Society, guest speaker P.J. James of Vesuvius presented a number of slides to go with the discussion on growing vegetables.

Twenty years ago

• It is suspected that commencement of the tourist season is partially responsible for a rash of automobile accidents during the last three weeks.

The most serious of the accidents involved a 13-year-old North Galiano boy who fell from the rear of a truck. As a result of the injuries he was rushed to Tsawwassen aboard the Coast Guard cutter *Racer*, then taken to Burnaby General Hospital by ambulance.

• A public meeting dealing with possible incorporation of Ganges will be held later this week at Mahon Hall. The advantages of incorporation were outlined by C.R. Horel, two weeks ago, at which time he pointed out the privileged status that goes with establishment of a village municipality.

Fifteen years ago

• MacMillan-Blodel has dispelled rumours that it intends to dispose of large tracts of land on Galiano Island in order to make room for home sites.

Recently-circulated rumours caused concern among some residents who feared that such plans would create new water and sewage problems in areas with little topsoil.

A spokesman for MacMillan-Blodel said the company considered and rejected a number of proposals to dispose of some of its holdings on the island.

• Now that it's over, the five members of a Salt Spring Island bowling team can sit back and say they topped a field of 70,000 other five-pin bowlers from all over the province.

The Plungers walked away with the B.C. Festival of Sports Championship last week in Nanaimo. The event was the last in a series of tournaments that began at the local level.

The Plungers won their Ganges league title, then knocked off all other league winners on the islands. Most recently, they won the Vancouver Island title.

• A piece of history will fall victim to progress when efforts are completed to dismantle the old Shaw Home on Galiano Island. Built over 100 years ago, just after the Shaw family arrived from Scotland, the house also

served as the first post office on North Galiano while John Shaw was postmaster. It is located at Shaw's landing.

• Salt Spring's future population level was given close consideration when the Planning Association met earlier this week with planning director Anthony Roberts.

Roberts showed a series of maps which indicated that most future development is at the north end of the island. In reply to a question, Roberts said that it has yet to be determined what the optimum population of the island should be, even though a recent questionnaire had called for a figure of 5,000. The population already stands at about 3,000.

• A replica of the *Beaver*, the paddle-wheel steamer that once graced ports throughout the Gulf Islands, will call on Salt Spring Island later this week, one day ahead of schedule.

Meanwhile, a stop at Montague Harbour on Galiano was scrapped at the suggestion of centennial committee chairman Basil Bengier after it was agreed that most of the people who might visit the ship there would have been aboard at Sturdies Bay. The *Beaver* has been calling at various ports over the recent weeks.

Ten years ago

• The largest meeting on Galiano Island in recent memory has resulted in the president of the Chamber of Commerce sending telegrams to Premier Bennett and other provincial officials requesting that island residents be given equal treatment with those on the Sunshine Coast.

Dr. Harvey Armitage was also directed to request a revision on government policies on ferry transportation, and to press for a reduction in weekend ferry rates between Galiano and Tsawwassen for island residents, thereby bringing them back into line with regular weekday rates. The meeting was called by the Galiano Club.

• Removal of the Fulford petroglyph from its site at Fulford Harbour to a private airstrip has sparked a series of moves that have led to the ancient stone being declared an archaeological object.

The regulations on archaeological sites, however, cover defacement only, and not the removal of artifacts. Gordon Cudmore, who was responsible for relocating the

three-ton petroglyph, has assured the provincial archaeologist that he has no intention of defacing the stone.

Meanwhile, Provincial Secretary Grace McCarthy says the attorney-general will be invited to examine the Archaeological Protection Act to determine whether it needs tightening.

• A nearly-bald South American squirrel monkey with a known prejudice against cold weather is reported to be on the loose in the vicinity of the Black Diamond Resort on Salt Spring Island.

Linda Sneddon was transferring Bogart from her car to the animal's cage when the six-year-old female monkey escaped.
