Ronaldo Norden

Market for etchings limited but consistent

If Ronaldo Norden says, "want to see my etchings?" he's not kidding; he actually has some — and he's made each one himself.

One of a number of people continuing this 500-year-old art form, Norden earns his living creating tiny land and seascapes using small metal tools, copper plates and nitric acid.

A former art director and draftsman who has lived in Chicago, Phoenix, California and Victoria, Norden moved to Galiano 12 years ago.

Today, in a small wooden house at the base of one of the island's cliffs, Norden speaks thoughtfully of the spiritual aspect of art, but he's also aware of commercial necessity.

Almost all of his work is about half the size of a dollar bill (an example of highly-commercial etching right there), since larger etchings are out of reach of most people's budgets. Norden's market is limited, but consistent enough to allow him to continue.

"My words speak slower than my art," he apologizes, bringing out a number of his prints. They are miniature scenes: of cormorants on a rock, a starfish alone, a loon on the shore.

"I'm attracted to beauty," Norden says.

Not all of his works are rooted in nature, however. Norden

shows a large, composite print of native children standing on a decaying wharf, with a woman's face in the mountainside behind them and an ornate Anglican cathedral in the background. He did that one for himself.

Norden starts all his designs with drawings. He likes to spend a lot of time absorbing the atmosphere of a place, by doing a complete illustration on paper before going home and transforming it onto metal. That way, he says, he's still caught up in the memory of the place while doing the etching itself.

The process involved in capturing those memories is a fascinating one that draws on acid, metal, high-pressure rollers and ink.

To begin, the artist coats the metal plate — be it zinc, copper or steel — with an acid-resistant emulsion, then draws the design with anything that will penetrate and expose the metal underneath. Even a pin will work.

When the illustration is finished, the plate is put in an acid bath; the acid eats into the metal wherever there is no emulsion, so the lines and shapes of the image are indented. The lines are so small you have to use your fingernail to feel them.

The next stage is to print the image on paper. An oil-based ink is dabbed into the engraved area

Pender fire referendum

Vote method becomes issue

In two weeks, residents of South Pender Island will decide whether taxpayers will pay up to \$100,000 to establish a volunteer fire department.

The decision to be made, however, is taking a back seat to discussion of the way residents will endorse or turn down the question.

According to a petition circulated by Deryck Christy, chairman of the South Pender property owners association, at least 97 people from 87 of the possible 140 households on the island want the fire department funding question to be decided by petition, not by referendum.

But Kelly Scott, Outer Islands director for the Capital Regional District (CRD) — and the person with final say in this case — feels a referendum is the simplest and most direct way to decide the question.

Christy says there are too many people who could not conveniently come to the polls, while Scott says that since the funding question is so important, he hopes "each and every property owner will make the utmost effort to come out and vote."

At an annual meeting of the property owners association, 31 of the 43 people present voted in favour of a referendum. Christy,

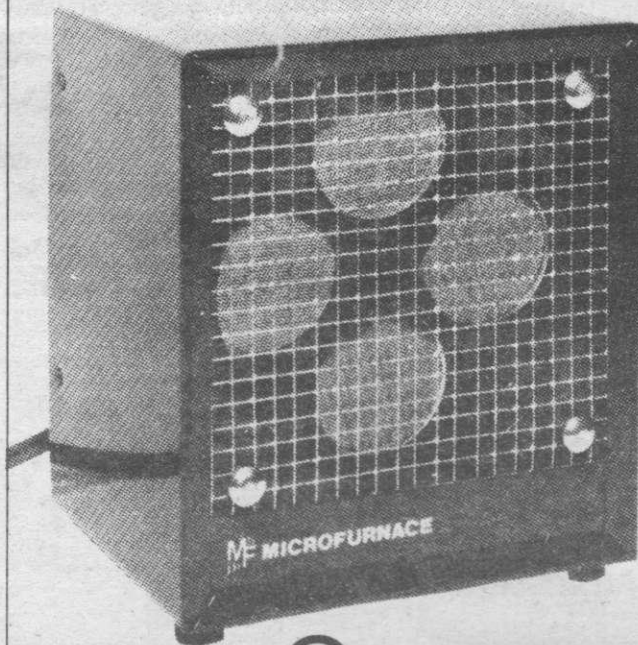
however, says the vote was not adequately advertised.

After the meeting he sent a letter and a petition, asking people how they wanted to vote, to 87 of the 140 households on the island. The petition came back with 97 names and was circulated to CRD executive director Will Jordan, Municipal Affairs Minister Rita Johnston and CRD Director Kelly Scott.

Christy says a referendum gives the vote to multiple owners of one property and to non-property owners who wouldn't be paying the extra taxes.

General Store management recognized

Russ and Shirley Searle, owners of the General Store on Pender Island, have been recognized as one of five finalists for a business management award from the Federal Business Development Bank (FDBD).

The award is given to the business which has grown and benefited the most from the FBDB's CASE counselling service. The Searles used the service twice in the last year; their sales went up 45 per cent, and they opened a new store in the Driftwood Centre.

CASE offers the services and expertise of retired business people to small and medium-sized businesses for advice in book-keeping, marketing, management and personnel. The winner is determined by examining financial statements for the past year.

Compact Car Centre in Victoria won the award after reaching the \$1 million level in sales last year. CASE spokesperson Lavana Bardell says sheer volume of sales does not determine the winner, but the degree of improvement after using the counselling service.

Shirley Searle said the advice of the CASE counsellors was extremely helpful, and added that using the service also helped the couple in dealings with their bank. "They take you more seriously when they know you've gone for help."

The four other finalists were: Peetz Manufacturing in Victoria, Sydney Answering Service, Rod Evans Guitars and Ashley James Shoes.

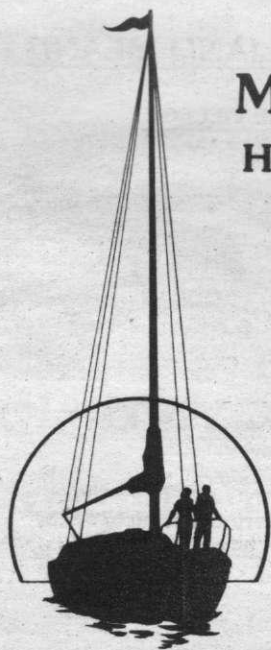

A petition sent by registered mail would permit only one vote per property and would only go to owners. Christy said that method would cost more but would be more equitable.

Scott says the issue is getting clouded. "All the CRD is doing is holding a forum so people can express their wishes," he said.

"We're just providing the mechanics. I can only do what I feel is the best."

Scott says a petition opens the door to government by minority. To have a *yes* vote, the rules regulating vote by petition require that 66 percent of the people who own at least 50 percent of the land vote *yes*. If a small number of people who owned more than half of the land

on the island voted *no*, the final result would be *no*. Also, petition rules say any unreturned letters — which Christy says would be sent by registered mail — would be counted as *no* votes.

The petition would apply only to taxpayers. The chairman of the property owners' fire committee, Charlie Isley, points out that renters have possessions (and lives) to protect as well. All

taxpayers and anyone who has lived on the island for more than six months could vote in the referendum.

Isley says a report studying the feasibility of a fire department on South Pender is being mailed to all property owners on the current tax rolls, and to tenant residents.

Scott says that if island residents vote for the fire department, they can then decide how

best to achieve it for the cheapest tax dollars. South Pender Island is the only Gulf Island without a fire department.

Christy says fire losses have not been significant so far, and that \$100,000 represents a large increase in individual taxes in a place with a small tax base. He would rather see a gradual build-up of fire protection without incurring an immediate expense.

Memory the calling card of Ronaldo Norden's art

and the excess rubbed off. When it comes in contact with paper between two high pressure rollers, the ink is drawn out of the grooves, and *voila*, you have an etching.

Norden practices many different forms of the process. Dry point etching is a technique that doesn't use acid at all. The artist takes fine-pointed hard tools and chisels the shapes and lines he wants in the metal.

"It's like a being a dentist," said Norden. "Only dentists have to be even more meticulous." This is hard to believe; when you look closely at the miniature scenes, it's obvious some of the work had to have been done with a microscope.

Before he discovered etching, Norden tried his hand at painting but found he wasn't interested in "splashing colour around." He explains: "I like to invoke a feeling with something else."

Many of his etchings are reproduced in one colour of ink. An historic scene of an old town in brown ink looks like an old photograph, and a blue duck, perfectly still in a blue pond, radiates calm. The work he does do in full colour requires two or three different plates and several runs through the press to produce, so it's not surprising to learn that colour is not his main interest.

Some of Norden's work is embossed, meaning he punches out the shape he wants to emphasize in the metal plate, so that each piece of paper pressed onto it between the rollers is bubbled out where the plate extends up, and a fish, a shell, or a duck can come out of the page at you.

Another technique is called aquatinting: the artist sprays the plate with an enamel that forms little drops on the surface. When the plate is inked, the drops dispel the liquid, giving the final print a range of tone unlike the harder lines of an etching.

Norden sells most of his work himself. Although he doesn't enjoy that aspect of etching, he knows it is a reality he can't avoid: as a former art director with Playboy Enterprises in Chicago and *Earth* magazine in California, he understands the importance of communicating with his audience.

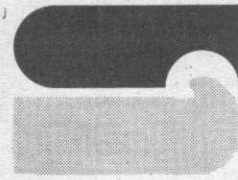
While Norden says "art was never meant to be an occupation," he has made it his, and knows how to make a living from it.

Norden used an agent at one time but found he missed receiving feedback from his customers. One of his buyers is the Handloom in Victoria, which takes his multi-coloured and embossed sea scenes, island scenes, cranes and loons.

"I think something from the island appeals to people living in the city," he says. "They may have grown up on a farm, in the country; when they look at a scene it helps them remember."

Memory seems to be the calling card of Norden's art, perhaps because he is working in a traditional art form. Etching is an offspring of the wood-block printing process begun by the Chinese around 1157 AD. Today, the production of all books and magazines — and most art itself — is by way of computers, laser printers and photo technology.

Norden, then, practices a tradition from another time, and he says he will keep with it for the rest of his life. Anachronism isn't totally out of date.

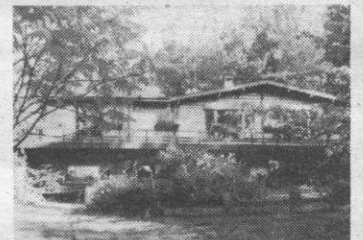

Fire Hazards

South Galiano volunteer firemen responded to an emergency on Friday evening when a chimney fire caught in a Gulf Drive home. Occupants extinguished the potentially devastating fire before the fire crew arrived.

The event prompted the department's liaison officer, Michael Sharp, to remind people to keep chimneys clean. The procedure is easy, as many Galiano Island residents know: simply call Danny Johnson of Peninsula Chimney Service in Sidney.

Sharp stressed that another point of equal importance, and of little consideration to most people, is a driveway clearance. Obstructions which hinder access to fire trucks and any emergency vehicle are common. For the unlikely chance that you or your property be in need of emergency attention, do keep clear access.

Fire Control

Speaking of fires, the standard waste-burning season began October 15, which only means that unless otherwise stated, controlled outdoor fires are permitted — e.g., slash piles.

These fires are permitted annually between October 15 and April 15; during the summer, fires are only permitted in barrels covered with 3/8-inch mesh, unless special restrictions are imposed. For the last two summers, extremely dry conditions have prompted forestry closures; not only have forests been "closed" (no entry), but fires in barrels and anywhere else were prohibited.

Despite this past week's nightly monsoons, the ground is deceptively dry, and the water table, especially in the south end, is low. Many wells have gone dry.

Mothers and fathers took precious time from their work week's end to help.

Government red tape is being dealt with to get the school underway. Two licencing applications have been submitted to the Community Care Facilities Board, Ministry of Human Resources. The first is for "child minding" so the facility can open sooner, and the second is for a "nursery school" status which gives the facility official school status.

The Galiano Preschool will then be able to join forces with the B.C. Parent Participation Preschool Co-operative, whose members exchange updated information and provide special equipment rentals.

A licenced teacher has been hired for the year. Kari Friele will commute from Salt Spring Island three days a week. To date, there are 19 (and up to a possible 21) registrations of children 32 months to school age.

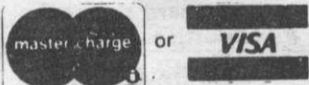

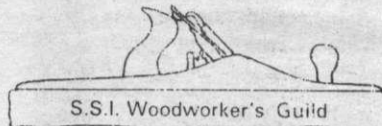

A BY-LAW TO ESTABLISH A SPECIFIED AREA WITHIN THE OUTER GULF ISLANDS ELECTORAL AREA OF THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHING, EQUIPPING AND OPERATING OF A VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT IN THE SAID SPECIFIED AREA

WHEREAS the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District has been requested to establish a specified area within the Outer Gulf Islands Electoral Area for the purpose of establishing, equipping and operating a volunteer fire department;

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board is empowered with respect to that part of the Regional District not within a city, district, town or village to undertake any work or service under the provisions of Part XVI of the Municipal Act;

AND WHEREAS it is necessary to acquire land and equipment including a fire truck and to construct a fire hall, the total estimated cost of which including expenses incidental thereto is the sum of \$100,000.00 which is the amount of debt intended to be created by this by-law;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the authorized debenture debt of the Regional District incurred pursuant to Section 797 of the Municipal Act is \$62,098,231.31 at June 30, 1986 of which \$55,801,230.69 is existing and outstanding debenture debt and \$6,297,000.62 is authorized and unissued debenture debt, and none of the principal or interest of the debenture debt of the Regional District is in arrears;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the authorized debenture debt of the Regional District incurred pursuant to Section 798 of the Municipal Act is \$39,877,752.53 at June 30, 1986 of which \$39,837,546.53 is existing outstanding debenture debt and \$40,206.00 is authorized and unissued debenture debt, and none of the principal or interest of the debenture debt of the Regional District is in arrears;

AND WHEREAS the maximum term for which debentures may be issued to secure the debt created by this by-law is twenty (20) years;

NOW THEREFORE THE BOARD OF THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

- The Regional Board is hereby empowered and authorized:
 - To establish in the Outer Gulf Islands Electoral Area a specified area to be known as the "South Pender Island Fire Protection Specified Area" and such area shall be as shown on Schedule "A" attached herewith and forming part of this by-law.
 - To undertake and carry out, or cause to be carried out the acquisition of a fire hall site, the construction of a fire hall, and the purchase of a fire truck and equipment generally in accordance with the plans filed with the Regional Board and to do all things necessary in connection therewith including the operation and maintenance, and without limiting the generality of the foregoing:
 - to borrow upon the credit of the Regional District a sum not exceeding \$100,000.00;

(b) to acquire all such real property, easements, rights-of-way, licences, rights or authorities as may be requisite or desirable for or in connection with the acquisition of a fire hall site, construction of a fire hall, acquisition of equipment and the operation and maintenance of the said building.

- The entire cost of providing for the establishing, equipping and carrying out of the aforesaid fire protection services, including the repayment of the debt authorized by Clause 1(b)(a) above shall be borne by the owners of land in the said specified area and a sum sufficient but not exceeding Thirty-one Thousand Five Hundred (\$31,500.00) Dollars shall be levied and raised in the manner prescribed in the Municipal Act in each year commencing with the year 1987 for such period of time as is necessary on all lands and improvements on the basis of assessment as fixed for taxation for regional hospital district taxation purposes.
- The said specified area established by this by-law may be merged with any other specified area or areas for the same purpose whether contiguous or not in the manner prescribed in Section 677(3) of the Municipal Act.
- This By-law may be cited as the "South Pender Island Fire Protection Specified Area Establishment and Loan Authorization By-law No. 1, 1986."

Chamber collects art for auction; agenda set for big-band evening

Artwork worth more than \$5,000 will be auctioned at a November 8 dance-and-social to honour Salt Spring Island's citizen of the year and raise funds to pay off Jazz Festival debts.

The artwork, currently on display next to Pegasus Gallery in Mouat's Mall, includes limited edition prints, original paintings and a sculpture donated to the event's sponsor, the Chamber of Commerce.

The auction will feature works by: Jack Avison, Robert Bateman, George Bates, Allan Edwards, Brien Foerster, Robert Genn, Harry Heine, Kiff Holland, Brein Johnson, Kay Ratcliffe, Kirstie Shoolbraid, Marke K. Simmons, Emil Socher, Gary Whitley, Edward Spears, B. Louise Woodward and Jose Trinidad.

Except for two works, donated by the Ewart and Pegasus galleries, the 18 pieces to be auctioned off came from the artists themselves.

Chamber of Commerce director Beth McDonald notes that auction organizers will accept advance bids up to Friday, November 7. At the auction itself, bidding on an item will open at the amount stated in an advance bid. If no additional bids are received, the

piece will then go to the person who filed the advance bid.

Advance bids must be accompanied by cheques made payable to the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce. They may be left at either the Travel InfoCentre or at Pegasus Gallery.

McDonald says bidders should mark the hour, date and item number on the back of the cheque. In case of duplicate bids, the earliest bid will receive the item — provided, of course, there is no further bidding at the auction.

The auction is only one aspect of the evening's agenda, however. The dinner-and-dance, dubbed the Harvest Ball, will also feature a meal, dance to the 12-member big-band sounds of the Commodores, a draw for a \$50 door prize and testimonials to Allan Edwards, the citizen of the year.

Tickets to the ball are \$12.50 each and available in advance only. They can be purchased at Ganges Pharmasave, *et cetera* books, Salt Spring Gallery, Ewart Gallery, the TravelInfo Centre or from any Chamber of Commerce director.

The ball is set to begin in the Gulf Islands Secondary School

gymnasium at 8 pm. Its main focus will be honoring Allan Edwards, the local resident and noted Canadian painter who has been working to enhance Salt Spring's reputation as a haven for artists.

Most recently, Edwards played a major role in launching the inaugural Salt Spring Summer Festival of the Arts, and the corresponding drive to construct a year-round centre for performing arts and artistic instruction.

Kiff Holland will present the citizen of the year award to Edwards. Holland is president of the Federation of Canadian Artists, an organization Edwards is credited with resurrecting during a term at the helm.

The chamber hopes the proceeds from the evening will make a substantial dent in the \$4,800 debt it owes for this summer's Jazz Festival, which suffered from a sharp drop in attendance compared to 1985 turnout levels.

Art auction a tremendous success

Boy, oh boy, did you miss a party. You maybe thought the Amnesty Art Auction would be kind of boring. I mean, who buys art, anyway? I gotta tell you, you missed a fine evening of adrenalin rushes and latent greed rushing to the surface and foaming at the mouth, and the best recoveries of bloopers that Mike Hayes (the auctioneer) has made in years. He even showed us that he can dress up, if the occasion calls for it. And it did.

It was a great gathering of artists and art lovers, enjoying the auctioneer's quick wit and gentle prodding while sipping their complimentary refreshment and munching on delicacies from the kitchen of Richard and Joan Goodhue.

Mahon Hall was packed most of the evening while Michael auctioned work donated by Joan Tiernan, Michael Aronoff, Sharada Filkow, Ruth Borsman, Lari Robson and Craig Wright, to name just a few of the 50-plus artists represented.

When the organization of this event was well under way, it appeared that the Salt Spring Gallery would be available. When negotiations for that space dissolved in mid-stream, the venue

was quickly changed to Mahon Hall.

It turned out that the hall was perfectly elegant for the occasion. As work was auctioned off, the portable display apparatus was moved back to allow the throngs more room to demonstrate their enthusiasm. By the evening's end, close to \$7,000 had been raised for Amnesty International.

There will no doubt be some remorseful people who let the deal of a lifetime slip through their grasp because of a momentary lapse in their avarice, but for those who went home with the object of their desire, victory was sweet.

Rodney Polden is not a household name on Salt Spring yet — but it was his determination and belief in this project's success which carried it through to completion. There were many volunteers who helped in many ways and to them and the artists and the public who came in support, the success is their reward.

On Sunday, I happened to drop by Off Centre Stage while Marc Suess was helping artist Gary Siemens to hang a new show of his paintings.

Gary, who is originally from Winnipeg, paints in a style that he describes as "fantasy." His work does bring you to a screeching halt as you try to figure out what it is about.

Gary claims some affection for the surrealists but avoids that category for himself. The predominance of seascape imagery indicates the influence the coastal environment has made on his work.

The opening was on Tuesday, but you will have an opportunity to see this work for yourself in the next week and a half.

If you listen to CBC radio, you know who Peter Gzowski is. And if you know that, you might have heard an interview he had a year or two ago with Mary O'Hara. She has become almost legendary as a singer and harpist of traditional and modern music. Born in 1935 in the west of Ireland, she had her own radio show before she was 16, and was on BBC TV before she was 21.

She made a major impact on the audiences at the Edinburgh Festivals of 1954 and 1955. Fifteen months into her marriage, her husband died of Hodgkin's disease. Suffering from poor health herself, she cut her career short and entered a monastery. For the next 12 and a half years, she remained in seclusion.

In 1977, she re-emerged, performing at Royal Festival Hall and, since then, throughout the world. She has 19 records to her credit, has written three books, including an autobiography, and a movie based on her life is being planned.

This Friday, she will be performing at Mahon Hall at 8 pm. This promises to be an extraordinary evening, the likes of

which we may not see again.

It is co-sponsored by the Gulf Islands Community Arts Council, the Salt Spring Folk Society and the Salt Spring Concert Society. Tickets are at *et cetera* and at the door, but I'll bet they'll be sold out quickly so don't wait.

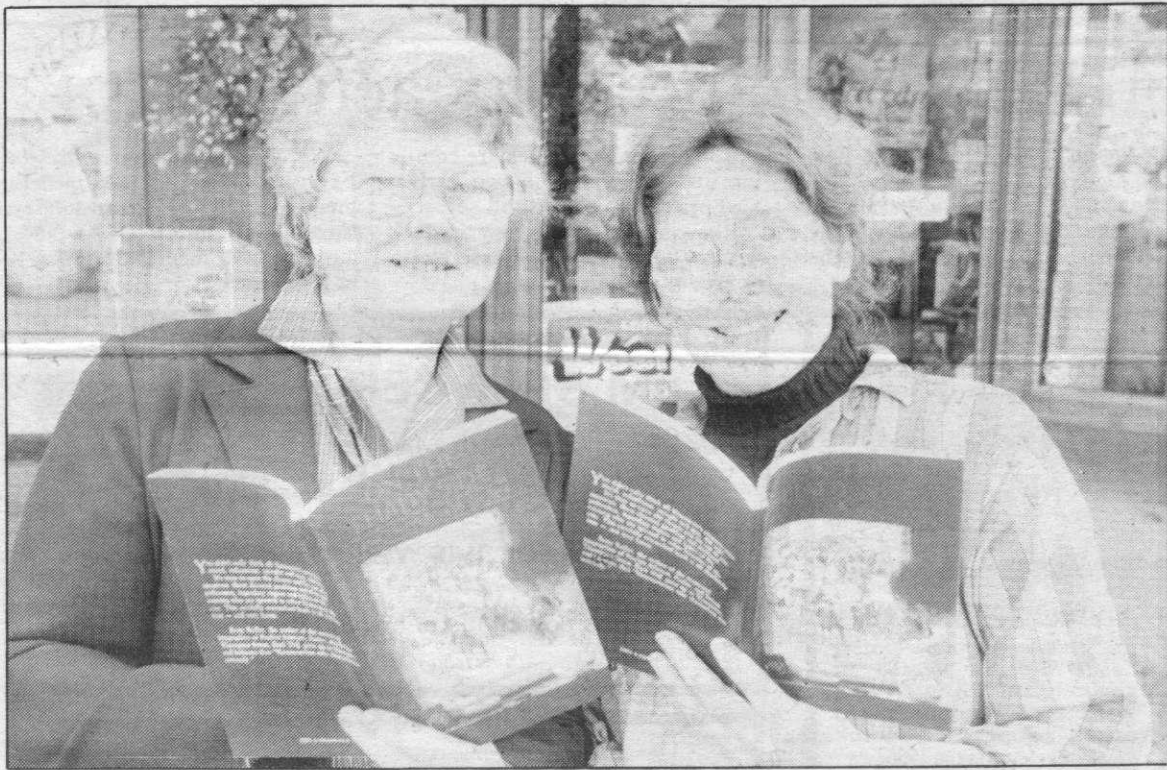

Vancouver history

Book highlights city's sordid past

Most accounts of Vancouver's history being trotted out for the centennial celebrations are fairly tame. They concentrate, after all, on the distinguished ladies and gentlemen who came to the timber town and built an economic centre through industry and ingenuity.

Vancouverites smirk at this cleansed version of events, knowing full well that there is a darker side to Vancouver's past: one that shows a lot more shady deals and questionable virtue than the official story lets on.

On the Shady Side—Vancouver 1886-1914, a chronicle of some of the rogues and scallywags who built (and bilked) Vancouver, throws some light on that shadowy past in an amusing, easy to read style. Biographer Betty Keller takes a break from her more formal work (*Pauline* and *Black Wolf*, about Pauline Johnson and Ernest Thompson Seton, respectively) to relate some of the tales of prostitution, thievery, gambling, boozing, brawling and bribery she has come across in her research.

Published by Horsdal and Schubart of Salt Spring Island, the book makes a good counterpoint to Vancouver's centennial celebrations, because many of the rogues in it got their start with the city's origins as a ramshackle collection of hotels, saloons, shacks and brothels.

Keller was on Salt Spring Island two weeks ago to kick off the book's release. *On the Shady Side* has several island connections, beginning with the cover photograph by Ganges photographer Rodney Polden. It shows a Madam peeking from behind her parlour window at a group of wags loitering by the Maple Tree for which Gastown's Maple Tree Square is known.

The Madam is actually a modern-day woman posing in an antique setting, with the original street scene, photographed by the

author's father, superimposed in the window frame. The combined photographs turn a typical archival photo into a somewhat suggestive scene that captures the naughty tone of the book.

Vancouver has always had its share of bars, prostitutes and criminals. The city's modern-day squabbles about where prostitutes should ply their wares seem oddly familiar compared to the debate raging for decades in early Vancouver. And the recent bickering about pub openings and Expo nightclubs getting preferential treatment sound just like the politicking that accompanied beer-slinging in the 1890s.

Corruption was a fact of life in the early police department, when a few kickbacks from hookers and saloonkeepers helped a lowly constable supplement his income, with no one being hurt by the indiscretion. But when zealous aldermen caught wind of the corruption, resignations or firings were common. One sergeant, caught taking bribes and stealing electricity by running an extension cord from police headquarters to his home, caught a steamer for Hawaii rather than

face a messy investigation.

Some other things never change. Today, the city views parking meters and ticket-givers as a handy way of cleaning up the streets and adding to the city's coffers at the same time. And business licences are a legal way for the city to dip into the pockets of entrepreneurs.

Saloons, drunks and prostitutes were three early sources of revenue for the fledgling city. Keeping the drunk tank full helped pay the costs of maintaining a police force and the decrepit jail that could neither keep mice out or prisoners in.

Keller's account of Vancouver's naughty side is chatty and enjoyable reading. The research, however, is one-dimensional.

Keller goes to the well of early Vancouver newspaper accounts a few too many times to maintain some variety. The use of some other sources for her work would have helped.

But as a saucy look at early Vancouver characters, it hits the target (or targets).

An index at the back helps relatives search for references to their pioneering kin.



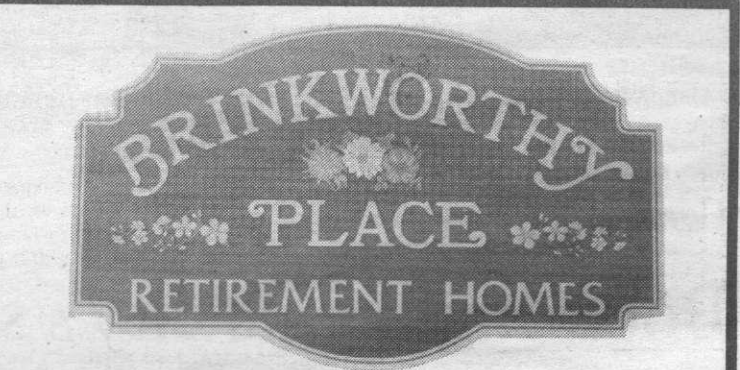

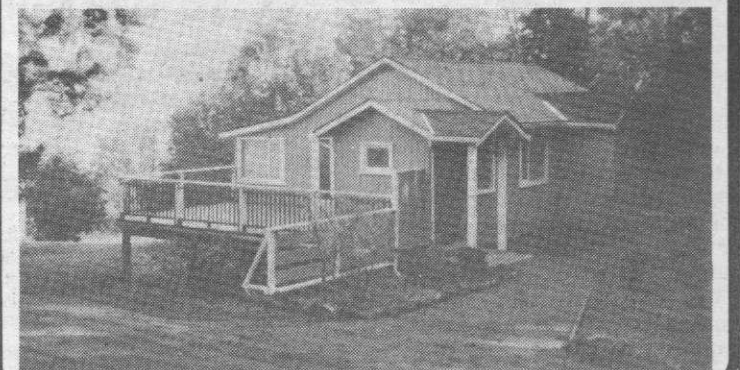

Band student enjoys musical companions

Local high school student Mary Sinclair learned how it felt last weekend to be one of 28 trumpeters in a band: "You have to play a lot quieter," she says.

Sinclair was one of four Gulf Islands Secondary School students invited to participate in the University of British Columbia's fifth annual band festival. Trombone player Eric Donnelly, flautist Susan Box and percussionist Erin Fewings were also invited; they were, however unable to attend.

"It was quite fun," says Sinclair. "I learned a lot and made new friends."

The 250 British Columbian grade 11 and 12 students who played at the festival had the opportunity to learn under guest conductor, Maestro Johannes Somary. Somary is the founder and director of the Amor Artis Chorus and Orchestra in New York City, which has recorded extensively with the English Chamber Orchestra in England. Many of Somary's recordings have been nominated for Grammy awards.

"He's funny. Really crazy," Sinclair says.

The students, broken into two bands, alternated between instruction from Somary and UBC Director of Bands Martin Berinbaum. According to Sinclair, the weekend was intensive: the students studied music theory and practiced four to six hours a day.

The festival culminated in a concert at UBC's Old Auditorium. For the grand finale, all 250 musicians crowded the stage to perform *Stars and Stripes Forever*.

"There must have been 50 flutes," says Sinclair, who at this point had the experience of playing with 27 other trumpet players.

The four grade 12 GISS students invited to play at the festival were selected on the recommendation of local band director Dwaine Prosk.

Sinclair is highly positive about the experience: "You don't get opportunities like that very often," she says.

Groups receive grants

Three provincial lottery fund grants totalling \$51,750 were handed out to two Gulf Islands organizations last week.

The largest single grant was a \$30,000 award to the Galiano Parents Advisory Committee. Provincial Secretary Hugh Curtis, who announced all three grants, said the committee will use the money to complete a multi-purpose playing field adjacent to the school on Galiano. Specifically, it will cover the cost of turfing

and fencing the field.

The other two grants, worth \$21,750 in total, went to the Pender Island Agricultural and Recreational Hall Society. A grant for \$18,750 will cover the cost of paying the community hall parking lot, Curtis said, while the remaining \$3,000 will go towards drilling a well at the James Auchterlonie Centre.

The centre houses the Pender Lender Library, a play school and other community service outlets.

Luncheon to raise orphanage funds

A benefit luncheon for the Mendies Haven orphanage in Kathmandu, Nepal, will be held at St. George's Hall in Ganges on Friday, November 7.

The occasion is quickly becoming a fall tradition of Salt Spring Island. For the past several years, sums in excess of \$2,000 have been donated towards the upkeep of Mendies Haven, and organizers are confident this year will be no exception.

Betty Mendies, a Canadian from Ontario, has been running her orphanage for over 30 years, housing 50 or more Nepalese children each year: feeding them, clothing them, taking care of their

health and seeing that they get an education. She is assisted by her husband, son and daughter-in-law.

The Betty Mendies Haven relies entirely on donations and has come to depend on the generous response shown each year by Salt Spring residents. Several islanders have visited Betty Mendies and returned

home deeply impressed with her faith, dedication and care of destitute children.

Volunteers will provide a simple lunch at the Ganges benefit, where a money tree will stand ready to receive donations great and small. Income tax receipts will be available for those who wish them. Time of the luncheon is 11:30 am to 2 pm.

Twenty-five years ago

• Swans have invaded Prevost Island. An observer counted 35 of the white birds on that island and several more were seen on parts of Salt Spring.

• With a note that editorials are not to mould public opinion, but to keep it from getting mouldy, *Driftwood* questioned the wisdom of the PTA for choosing to endorse a candidate for the election of school trustees.

While stating teachers should have political leanings and the right to express them, the editorial wondered if it was right for teachers as a group to decide who to support as their employer.

• The Salt Spring Island Lions were preparing for a talent night as a means of raising money. The event is open to all comers in two classes, junior and senior. The judgement of an applause meter will decide the winner.

• Officials from the B.C. Toll Ferry Company were on Salt Spring Island on Tuesday to inspect sites in Ganges, Vesuvius and Isabella Point.

• The principal of the Salt Spring Elementary School, Jack Evans, has earned his master's degree in education. Evans received the scroll at the fall convocation at the University of British Columbia.

Twenty years ago

• The Gulf Islands branch of the B.C. Historical Society met on Mayne Island. Guest speaker at the event was a representative of the Vancouver Indian Centre, who explained some of the problems facing native Indians in education and in trying to fit into contemporary society.

• Arrangements for Remembrance Day were discussed at a meeting of the Gulf Islands Legion on Saturna Island. Another item on the agenda was the decision to raise annual membership fees to \$6. Pensioners would be charged one dollar less.

• Classified Ad: For sale: Pumpkins for Hallowe'en, all sizes, 10 to 75 cents.

• For the band, the occasion was a rehearsal, but for young Salt Spring Islanders, the three hours of music was a break from the

usual routine. The weekly meeting of youths at the Ganges United Church included music by the Nite Lites as well as the viewing of a film.

• The Centennial Caravan is on its way to Salt Spring Island. The caravan — two trailers of displays documenting Canadian history and heritage — is touring the province as part of the nation's 100th birthday celebrations.

Fifteen years ago

• Long-range development plans for the Gulf Islands are being completed by Capital Regional District (CRD) planners. The plans, with three variations, are being awaited with anticipation by residents.

One set of plans envisions a bridge from the Saanich Peninsula to Salt Spring, connecting with another bridge to Galiano Island. The choice of plans is to be left with the planning committee of the CRD.

• The weatherman reported a high temperature for September of 72 degrees and a low of 42. The rainfall measured 2.78 inches. Last year the statistics read: high 74, low 43, rain 1.94 inches — compared to 1969 readings of high 80, low 45, and rain 4.58 inches.

• A Ganges resident expressed concern about access to the village from Fulford if a serious accident should occur on Ganges

Hill. In a letter to various officials, the resident pointed out the volume and make-up of traffic using the two-lane highway could result in serious difficulties should an accident occur.

• Thunder echoed across the harbour, and lightning split the skies as a storm lashed Ganges and left large hail stones littering the ground.

Five years ago

• The 65-year-old Harbour House Hotel at Ganges closed its doors last week after suffering financial losses during the past year due to a poor tourist season. Manager Irene Tranter told *Driftwood* the hotel is not in receivership, but the owners — Penn Lake Properties — "are making decisions" about the hotel's future.

• Salt Spring Island Transportation Committee and the ministry of highways have come up with a dual proposal for Ganges traffic routing. The first priority goes to maintenance and possible recapping of Ganges core area roads — projects which will be co-ordinated with the sewer installation program.

• The Salt Spring parks and recreation commission will be bringing the swimming pool referendum to the voters, probably in early February. Commission chairman Glenn Woodley said modified plans for the pool are being completed.

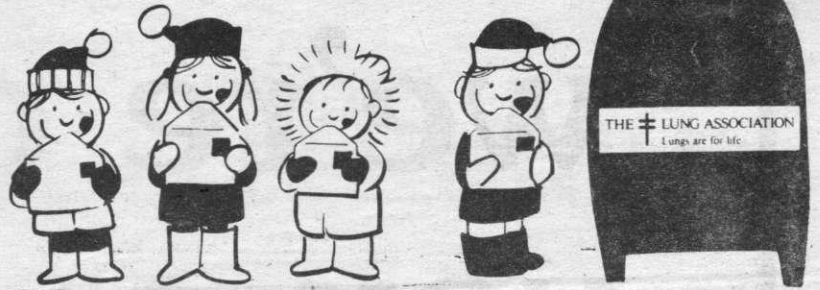

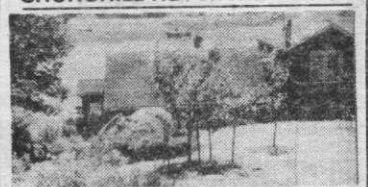
