

'Improved communications' goal of meeting

Improved communications will be the goal of a November 29 'Day of Dialogue' for Gulf Islands school district teachers, administrators, support personnel, trustees and parents of students.

The conference, to be held in the Gulf Islands secondary school gymnasium from 12:30 pm to 4 pm, will identify communications gaps within the district, prioritize the problems and select a steering committee to work for improvements.

"This is intended to be a positive process, not a negative, stir-the-pot thing," says Barb Aust, president of the Gulf Islands Teachers Association (GITA). "We don't want to rant and rave — we want to identify problem areas so we can change them. We want to build a higher profile for education and show that there is a willingness by everyone to work together. That way, we can offer a better education to our children."

Aust, parents group representative Liane Huntley and support staff representative Suzanne Gagnon agree the attempt to improve communications was prompted in part by the school district's geographic splits. Islands, they say, tend to become isolated from each other, and "people feel they only know about something (affecting education) after the fact."

Another incentive was the fall-out from the provincial government's fiscal restraint program, which Aust said lowered morale throughout the school district. "People felt there was a need, now, to re-establish communication (to revive morale)," she said.

By inviting parents to take part in the conference, organizers hope to show a "more informal, non-school side" of the education system, one that will invite a free-flow expression of opinions. Too often, Aust indicated, parents can be overwhelmed by the formal structure of the system — i.e., by school board meetings.

A similar rationale lies behind the inclusion of support staff at the conference. Aust said it is important for non-teaching school district staff to be shown that they are "important and equal" members of the local education system.

"We are all in this to educate the kids," she said. "It's important that we communicate and work together."

The conference will open with an address on the basics of good communication, delivered by Lyle Garraway, district principal in Saanich. The audience will then be divided into small working groups to discuss the district's communications problems.

"When we come together again from the small groups," Aust said, "we will prioritize the problems and come up with action plans, then form a steering committee to implement those plans. We don't want to just air the problems."

Cost of the conference is being shared by participating groups. The B.C. Teachers Federation has provided a grant from its outreach program. GITA will dip into its public relations fund, and the Canadian Union of Public Employees and parents groups will contribute refreshments.

Attendance is free but organizers are asking participants to pre-register before November 14. Registration forms are available at district schools.

Outer Islands residents wishing to attend the conference should check with the school district about transportation arrangements being made.

Counting underway Tuesday

Final election results available this week

The official tally of votes cast in Saanich-and-the-Islands in the October 22 provincial election should be completed by today (Wednesday) or Thursday.

Yesterday (Tuesday), the Saanich-and-the-Islands returning office began counting 2,001 Section 80 ballots and an estimated 300 absentee ballots cast for candidates in this constituency.

Returning Officer Jim Robertson said last week he expected the exercise to take about two days. The counting procedure will see his staff remove folded ballots from their individual envelopes and place them in a sealed box. Once all ballots are in the box, the seals will be broken and the ballots counted.

Counting of Section 80 and absentee ballots will not affect the voting result in this constituency, since successful Social Credit candidates Mel Couvelier and Terry Huberts each won with majorities greater than the 2,300 votes still to be counted.

Unofficial ballot results gave Couvelier and Huberts 19,102 and 19,061 votes, respectively. They were followed by NDP candidates David Vickers (15,983 votes) and Carol Pickup (15,383), and by Liberal hopeful Clive Tanner (5,459 votes).

Meanwhile, the October 22 voting pattern breakdowns for each of the Gulf Islands are now available. Party-by-party percentages are as follows:

- SATURNA: SC, 48.6 per cent; NDP, 42 per cent; LIB, 9 per cent; 257 ballots cast.
- SOUTH PENDER: SC, 55 per cent; NDP, 37 per cent; LIB, 7.5 per cent; 345 ballots cast.
- NORTH PENDER: SC, 55.7 per cent; NDP, 37.9 per cent; LIB, 6 per cent; 981 ballots cast.
- MAYNE: NDP, 48.3 per cent; SC, 46.8 per cent; LIB, 4.7 per cent; 734 ballots cast.
- SOUTH GALIANO: SC, 48.3 per cent; NDP, 47.6 per cent; LIB, 4 per cent; 664 ballots cast.

- NORTH GALIANO: NDP, 53 per cent; SC, 39.7 per cent; LIB, 7 per cent; 171 ballots cast.
- NORTH SALT SPRING: SC, 51.4 per cent; NDP, 42.6 per cent; LIB, 6 per cent; 1,891 ballots cast.
- CENTRAL SALT SPRING: SC, 50.7 per cent; NDP, 43.5 per cent; LIB, 5.7 per cent; 2,813 ballots cast.
- SOUTH SALT SPRING: NDP, 61.2 per cent; SC, 32.2 per cent; LIB, 6.6 per cent; 785 ballots cast.

In advance balloting, counted separately and including votes cast by Outer Islands residents, the Ganges polling station reported the following breakdown: SC,

54.8 per cent; NDP, 41.9 per cent; LIB, 3.3 per cent; 535 ballots cast.

Over the entire Gulf Islands, Social Credit topped the polls with 48.5 per cent of the vote, followed by the NDP at 46.6 per cent and the Liberals at 6 per cent. Over all of Saanich-and-the-Islands, Social Credit stood at 50.9 per cent, NDP at 41.8 per cent and the Liberals at 7 per cent.

There was a numerical error in last week's *Driftwood* report on preliminary vote counts. We referred to an absence of ballot-splitting at Gulf Islands polls,

except for a station on Pender that reported 146 votes for Terry Huberts and 53 for Mel Couvelier. The total for Couvelier should have read 153.

Driftwood queried the incorrect total three times in discussions with the returning office in Sidney, and was assured it was correct. Returning Officer Jim Robertson last week apologized to *Driftwood* for the error, which may have resulted because polling clerks were reading individual station counts from large wall charts some distance away from their desks.

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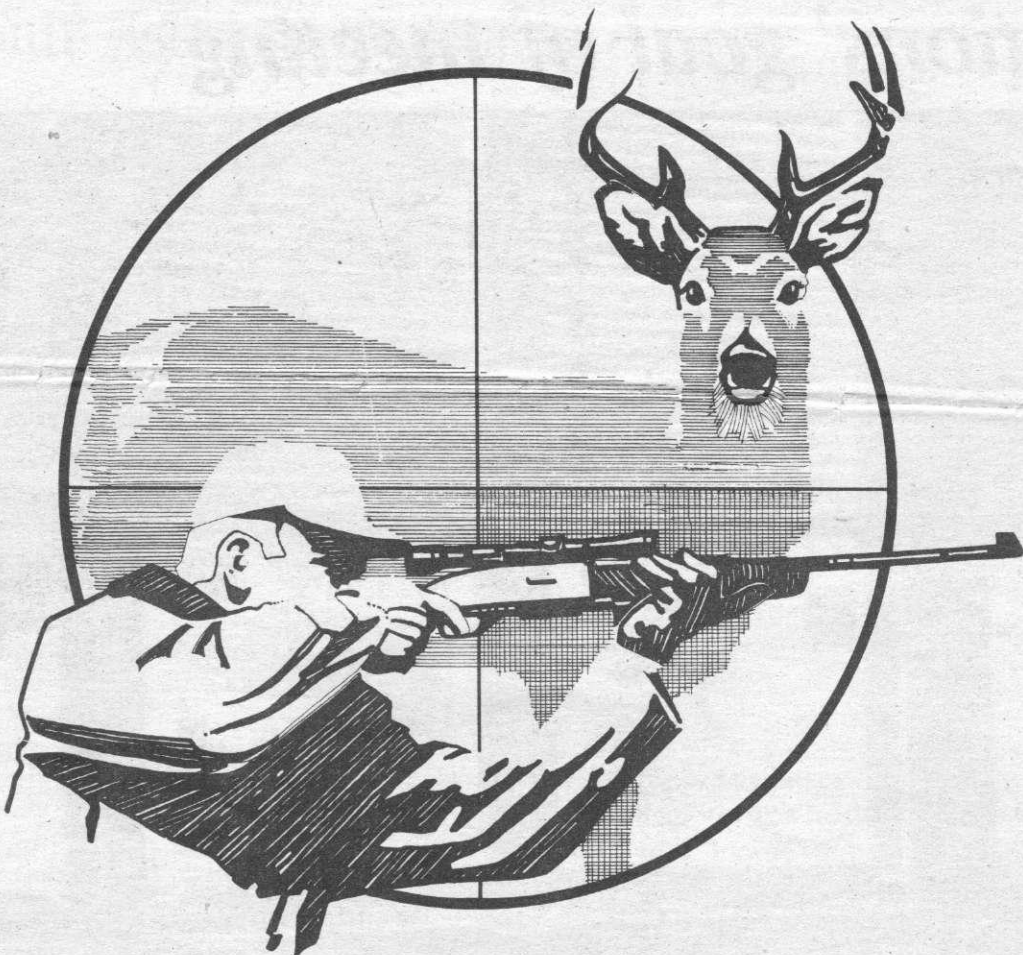

Hunters reminded of rules as special doe season nears

Although deer-hunting season began on the Gulf Islands on September 6, the opening of a new doe season was held back until this Saturday, November 8. In preparation for that opening, hunters are again reminded to check their 1986-87 B.C. *Hunting Regulations Synopsis* before heading out in search of game.

As noted in the synopsis, this year's special doe season — the only one on Vancouver Island — ends November 11. Buck season continues until November 23, with a special opening for bucks with two or more points starting the following day (November 24) and continuing until December 7.

As most hunters are probably aware, they are required to carry — in addition to their regular licence and deer tag — a special licence permitting hunting in the Gulf Islands (Management Unit 1-1).

This \$1 permit, which gives the licensee \$100,000 liability insurance, was initiated by the ministry of environment to afford both hunters and property owners some protection in the event hunting activities inadvertently cause damage to private buildings or property here.

Sportsmen are also reminded that hunting is not permitted

within 25 metres of any public road, or within 100 metres of any public or private building. Hunting with a rifle is illegal here, but shotguns are permitted.

Hunting from a vehicle, stalking at night, and the use of unleashed dogs in any deer hunt are illegal in this management unit and throughout the province.

Hunters are also reminded to afford property owners the respect and courtesy they deserve. Hunting should, for example, never be conducted on private property without permission from the landowner.

Although most hunters, like all sportsmen, obey the rules, there are always a few who don't. The public can help protect the region's wildlife and inhabitants from careless or irresponsible hunters in a variety of ways.

For example, during hunting season, parents should inform their children of potential dangers and keep a close watch over pets and livestock.

More importantly, anyone witnessing a hunting violation should record the date, time and location of the incident, and — if possible — the licence number of the violator's vehicle. This information should be communicated as soon as possible to the RCMP

detachment in Ganges (telephone 537-5555), the ministry of environment's conservation officer in Duncan (telephone 746-1236) or the ministry of environment's wildlife branch in Victoria (telephone 387-9717).



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Man dies in hospital after jumping off ferry

A 34-year-old man died in Vancouver's St. Paul's hospital early Thursday morning (October 30) after jumping off the B.C. Ferries vessel *Queen of Vancouver* as it sailed between Tsawwassen and Swartz Bay.

The incident caused about a two-hour delay before the vessel docked at Swartz Bay.

Delta Police Staff-Sgt. Bob Burns said Thursday afternoon that Cary Ivan Charette, of no

fixed address, died in hospital at 2:17 am October 30, approximately 14 hours after he was pulled from Georgia Strait waters by Coast Guard rescue workers.

According to Burns and B.C. Ferries spokesman Betty Nicholson, a passenger aboard the *Queen of Vancouver* saw Charette

leap over the deck railing at approximately 11:17 am Wednesday shortly after the vessel left the Tsawwassen terminal.

"A passenger saw the man leap over, and notified a crew member," Nicholson said. "A search commenced immediately."

The *Queen of Vancouver* was

soon joined in the search by the B.C. Ferries vessel *Queen of Coquitlam*, a hovercraft and two cutters from the Canada Coast Guard's search and rescue division, and approximately seven other vessels — including a tug.

At 12:10 pm — nearly an hour after he entered the water —

Charette was spotted by a crewman aboard the *Queen of Vancouver*. He was pulled aboard the Coast Guard hovercraft and taken to Richmond General Hospital, after which he was transferred to St. Paul's.

Staff-Sgt. Burns said it appears Charette planned to commit suicide when he jumped overboard. He added that similar incidents have occurred in the past aboard B.C. Ferries vessels.

Union, B.C. Ferries reach an agreement

Negotiators for the B.C. Ferry and Marine Workers Union reached a tentative agreement with the B.C. Ferry Corporation late Friday night, shortly before the two groups' previous contract was set to expire.

No details of the tentative pact have been released. The union's bargaining committee is, however, recommending that BCFMWU members accept the corporation's offer.

The union, which represents

3,200 ferry workers, will conduct its ratification vote during the next three weeks.

Union officials said they were pleased a new contract could be reached without disruption to the general public. The last time the BCFMWU used job action was 1979, when rotating strikes occurred.

Union and ferry corporation officials declined to comment further on the new agreement.

Boating students invited to wine and cheese party

The 21 students who signed up for the annual basic boating course held by the Salt Spring Island Power and Sail Squadron last month will be the guests of squadron members at a wine and cheese party in St. George's hall on Friday, November 7.

The students, who are now well into the course, and their hosts will hear a talk by Mark Parkenham,

chief safety officer of the Canadian Coast Guard, Victoria. The speaker will present an illustrated talk on the latest boating safety and rescue equipment now being employed by the Coast Guard.

All squadron members are asked to attend the reception, which will get underway at 7:30 pm.



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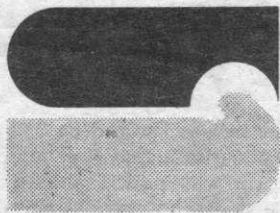
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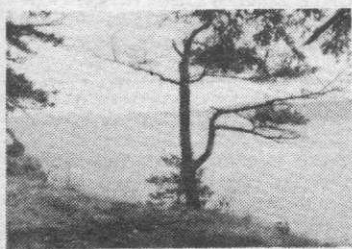

Two Trust seats open on Saturna and the Penders

Elections will be held November 15 to fill two seats on each of the Saturna, North Pender and South Pender Island Trust committees. Each race features three candidates — one incumbent and two newcomers — challenging for the positions.

The races on each island involve the following:

SATURNA

• **JOHN MONEY:** The incumbent trustee was born on Saturna, then moved away before returning eight years ago. He has held a Trust seat for four years, is a member of the local community club and was the island's fire chief six years ago. Money is a general contractor and part-owner of a sawmill.

• **JIM CAMPBELL:** A Saturna Island resident for 42 years, Campbell has spent all but one of them a farmer. His previous political involvements include 10 years as Outer Islands representative to the Capital Regional District (CRD), seven years of which was spent as board chairman. Campbell also served 12 years as a school board trustee.

• **JON GUY:** A Saturna resident for eight years, Guy has been a member of the island's Advisory Planning Commission for the past four years. After working as a tree-faller and mechanic, he subdivided one section of his land and is now building the property up as a farm.

NORTH PENDER

• **PETER CAMPBELL:** The incumbent has served as trustee during four of the eight years he has been an island resident. Campbell's other involvements include work with the Sea Scouts and Lions, chairmanship of the Fall Fair Committee for the past three years, and membership on the Legion executive.

• **DOREEN YORK:** A retired civil servant, York has not slowed down in her golden years. Her involvements include presiding over the newly-formed Museum Society, acting as secretary of the Hall Society — a post she has held for the past four years — and holding down a position on the

executive of the Western Square Dancers Association.

Previously, York co-ordinated the island's fall fair, in 1983 and 1984, and was instrumental in organizing the historical display at the 1982 version of the fair.

Born on Pender Island, York returned there five years ago to live in the family home.

• **BEN MANNING:** The current chairman of the Advisory Planning Commission on North Pender has been a member of the body for two years, and is also the past-president of the Magic Lake Property Owners Association.

A communications engineer, Manning has been working in planning for several years, and still runs his own consulting business. He moved to Pender four years ago.

SOUTH PENDER

• **STEVE WRIGHT:** The incumbent has served two terms as island trustee.

• **ELAINE JACOBSON:** A substitute teacher at Pender Island School, Jacobson has been a teacher for 14 years. Currently on the executive of the Gulf Islands Teachers Association, she has also served the B.C. Teachers Federation in the fields of bargaining, research and workshops. She still works part-time for the BCTF and sits on its pension committee.

Familiar with Pender since 1981, Jacobson moved to the island 18 months ago.

• **CHARLES ILSLEY:** A former management accountant, Ilsley has worked on the planning and management of industrial camps in Labrador, Greenland, James Bay and Saudi Arabia. He is the on-island representative of the South Pender Property Owners Association, a former vice-president of the Lions Club, and a member of the Health Care Society. A visitor to Pender for close to 40 years, Ilsley moved to the island permanently in 1982.

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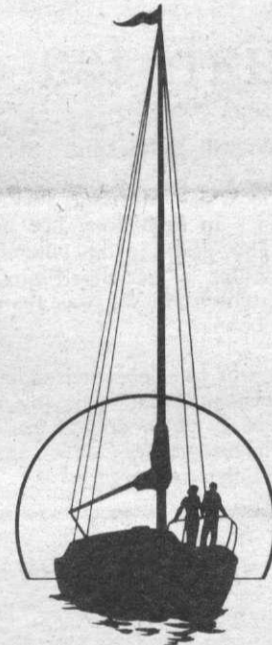

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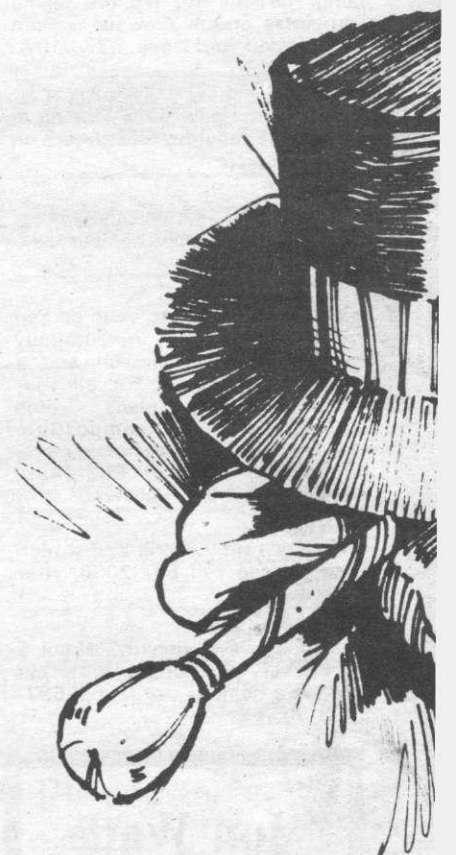
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Vancouver shop, gallery a happy diversion

I am a fan of architects. I am amazed at how a person can sit down and manipulate a great diversity of materials into a functionally and aesthetically integrated habitable form — all on paper. To do it well one must have vision; a sense of completed form before the building has commenced.

"A designed object is very much a completed thought." My thoughts have yet to be completed about my house and probably won't be for some time to come. The above quote comes from a student whose thoughts on design have been published in a new magazine called *Architectures*.

I found it in an interior design studio in Gastown, called *Inform*. This magazine, published in New York, combines superlative design with intelligent writing about architecture, art and writing. There are no colour fold-outs here — everything, including photos and graphics, is in black and white. Be prepared for a slow read and lots of thinking.

If you like narrow steep stairways climbing inside dingy dilapidated brick buildings, you might try the Coburg Gallery on Cordova Street in Vancouver — if for nothing else but the atmosphere. The current exhibition at the Coburg is about garbage and junk. Now, for most people, that may not seem appealing, but for me it's fascinating.

And for Fred Douglas it appears to be a major preoccupation in his photographs.

Consider for a moment what junk is. It is devalued stuff. It is stuff from which usefulness has been extracted. It is in the process of being recycled, of becoming a natural resource again — except that it still bears the signature of its past life. It has symbolic content, it has a history and it has had experience.

Fred Douglas teaches photography at the University of Victoria's Fine Arts department. His photographs are carefully constructed still lifes of particles of experience. It takes time to read these photographs — to read the experience.

art seen

Each of the many elements in an image conjures up a story and all of them together add up to some vague drama about a picnic half-remembered. The partial hand colouring on some of the prints remind us, perhaps, of intrusive bits of coloured debris on homogeneous landscapes: man's leavings, artifacts. Like middens, his images are archeological digs; diverse objects in puzzling but not irreconcilable juxtapositions.

The Coburg Gallery wasn't the only happy diversion in

Vancouver. Jim Jarmusch is one of the most talented film directors now living in the U.S. *Down by Law* is his new low-budget black and white film set in the seedy section of New Orleans. It is a black comedy about two local scumballs who end up in a jail cell through their own stupidity. In the great American tradition of free enterprise they do little more to help each other than to co-exist. These two roles are ably played by Tom Waits and John Lurie.

Enter the poor immigrant, played by Italian comedian Roberto Benigni, speaking little English but possessing great powers of observation and creative intelligence. "Bob" becomes the

third cellmate and initiates the great escape. The trio endures all sorts of hardships, but most of the time "Bob" has the solution while the other two flounder in indecision or panic in desperation — the product of a society in decline, no longer vital or innovative.

I won't let you in on the ending but Bob does get his reward and the other two depart unchanged by their experience. The film is fresh and possesses none of the intoxicating glitz which often replaces intelligent writing. It is also very funny.

This Sunday at Off Centre Stage, direct from Fan Tan Alley, artist Jeannie Kamins will present

her work and show slides. There will be a general meeting of the arts co-operative at 6 pm, and the exhibition will open at 7:30 pm.

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Lute experiencing a rebirth with help from Victoria musician

The lute is an archaic string instrument that no one plays anymore, right?

Wrong. Just ask Peter Titus.

Titus, a Sooke resident who works out of Victoria, is one of the world's premier lute players. In 1984, he was a finalist at the first international lute competition held in Toronto.

The 26-year-old musician said last week that the lute has experienced a 're-birth' during the last 50 years, and particularly in the last decade.

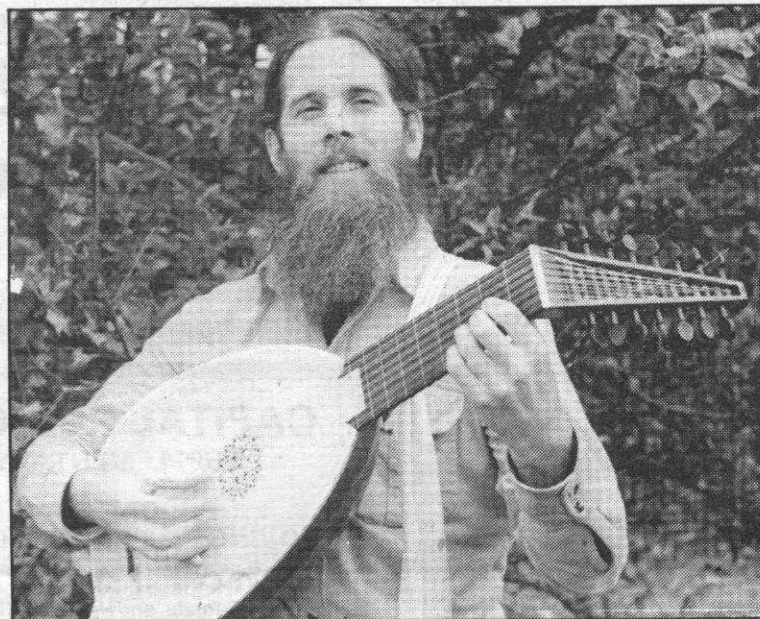
Originally a product of North Africa, where it is known as the *ud* and is still played, the lute was brought to Europe during the Crusades. It quickly gained favour in European society.

Today, there aren't many lutenists. However, there are a few, such as Titus, who are 're-discovering' the instrument.

With 14 years of music study to his credit, Titus describes himself as a "serious" lute player. A guitarist as well, he has studied in both Spain and England, and plays everything from classical solos to Elizabethan ayres and madrigals.

"I studied under Andre Segovia's top protegee, Jose Thomas," he said. "That was in Spain. I have also performed throughout the United States, and in Quebec and B.C."

Titus will be performing this Saturday (November 8) at Off Centre Stage in Ganges (concert time 8:30 pm). During the first half of Saturday's program, he will perform some classical guitar solos — including some of the

work of Tarrega and J.S. Bach. He will then sing some German lieder, songs modelled after the folk music of Germany's classical period. He transcribes the latter from piano music so he can accompany himself in true troubadour fashion.

In the second half, Titus will introduce the audience to his eight-course lute by performing

the ayres and madrigals of Elizabethan England.

These concerts are educational as well as entertaining. Titus performs in period costume, and provides his audiences with historical background on the music performed.

"There'll be a question and answer period after the concert," he noted.

Nicaragua topic of movie to be shown next week

On Monday, November 10, at Central Hall, Tools for Peace will present a film night featuring the hour-long documentary, *Living at Risk*. About this excellent film of contemporary Nicaragua, Jay Carr of the *Boston Globe* writes:

"*Living at Risk* isn't the first documentary about Nicaragua and the Sandanistas, but it's the most powerful, and the first built around a middle-class family. The members of the Barrios family who stayed after the Somoza government was overthrown — Miguel, Federico, Alberto, Mauricio and Martisabel — are valuable citizens."

Educated, dedicated to the revolution, they possess the kind of technical abilities Nicaragua needs. Miguel is a regional director of land reform. Federico is an agricultural planner. Alberto works for the health ministry. Mauricio is a doctor. Martisabel works for the agricultural ministry. Her husband, Eduardo, is vice-minister of agriculture.

"They allowed Alfred Guzzetti, Susan Meiselas and Richard Rogers to film them freely at home and at work. Sometimes the results

are surprising in a genre we have come to associate with peasant insurrectionists: we see a maid serving dinner, a seaside vacation."

"But the film makes it clear that the Barrios don't have much leisure time. Their facial expressions bespeak their belief in what they're doing, despite living in a nightmarishly tense country,

where Contra raids supported by the United States have killed many and continue to cripple Nicaragua's attempt to build its battered agricultural economy into a self-supporting one.

"There's something surrealist-ically grim in a family party photograph because we've seen

how vulnerable those family members are. When Eduardo and Miguel visit an agricultural co-op trashed and torched by the Contras, it makes us feel the precariousness of their lives. Federico is the sole survivor of a squad of 20 ambushed by Somoza's guard.

"Maurico, riding upriver in a canoe to a primitive clinic, speaks in flat tones of how the region's last volunteer doctor, a West German, was murdered by the Contras. In a sobering moment during their weekend getaway, Eduardo, Martisabel's husband, says: "It's not a country where people die of heart attacks. It's a country where people die of a bullet, and the children know it."

Living at Risk, in portraying the Barrios family, touches our hearts and minds in a way more eloquent in human terms than any political slogan or dogma.

The evening on Salt Spring will begin at 8 pm with a short animated film entitled *El Compa Clodomiro*. Admission is by donation, although \$5 is requested. For more information, phone 537-5614.

Tools for Peace sponsors fair

To help increase personal and global awareness and well-being, the Salt Spring Island Tools for Peace coalition is sponsoring the second annual Health Fair for Nicaragua on November 8 and 9.

The fair will present practical and theoretical information about a broad range of disciplines commonly considered part of "holistic health enhancement." Treatments will also be available from local practitioners of reflexology, acupressure and polarity energy balancing.

Why holistic health? One definition of *heal* is to *make whole*, and *holistic* refers to treatment of the whole person, so we might consider the term redundant. However, it sometimes seems that health care in our society is so far out of touch with treating the whole person that this redundancy is justified.

Holistic medicine focuses on the relationship between body, emotions, mind and spirit. Rather than looking for simple cause and effect, we look for the way that all

factors influence each other. Both disease and healing are increasingly understood to take place on many interrelated levels.

For example, thanks to advances in modern science, we recognize that biochemistry and emotional states are inextricably tied to each other. What we eat can affect our emotional well-being just as surely as our emotions affect our bodies. If illness is just "in your head" (as doctors sometimes tell people when they are unable to diagnose the problem), you can be sure that it is in your body as well, since the nervous system is intimately connected with the rest of the body.

Often, the most difficult disease patterns to change are negative emotional and mental programs which we imprint during childhood, and which continually hamper our creativity and productivity, as well as our health. One major focus of the health fair will be methods of reprogramming these aspects of our lives.

ELIZABETH the SECOND, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom, Canada, and Her Other Realms and Territories, Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith.

To all to whom these presents shall come—

GREETING (WHEREAS under the provisions of Section 767 of the Municipal Act the Capital Regional District was incorporated by Letters Patent issued on February 1, 1966.)

AND WHEREAS by Section 767 of the Municipal Act it is provided, inter alia, that in addition to the functions conferred by that Act, a regional district has such functions as are provided by Letters Patent or Supplementary Letters Patent, and for this purpose the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may, on the recommendation of the Minister, provide in the Letters Patent or Supplementary Letters Patent further objects, powers, obligations, duties, limitations and conditions for any or all functions requested under that section:

AND WHEREAS by Supplementary Letters Patent dated December 28, 1967, as amended, the Capital Regional District was granted under the provisions of subsection (7) of Section 767 of the Municipal Act the function of Division VII - Trunk Sewers and Sewage Disposal with all members participating except Sooke and Outer Gulf Islands:

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District has requested that the said function be amended to authorize the exercise of powers under section 611(5)(b) of the Municipal Act within a portion of the Electoral Area of Salt Spring Island and to provide a housekeeping amendment:

AND WHEREAS the provisions of Section 767 of the Municipal Act have been duly complied with:

NOW KNOW YE THAT by these presents We do order and proclaim that on, from and after the date hereof, the following be added to the objects, powers, obligations, duties, limitations, and conditions of the Capital Regional District:

The function of Division VII - Trunk Sewers and Sewage Disposal, granted by Supplementary Letters Patent dated December 27, 1967, as amended, be further amended as follows:

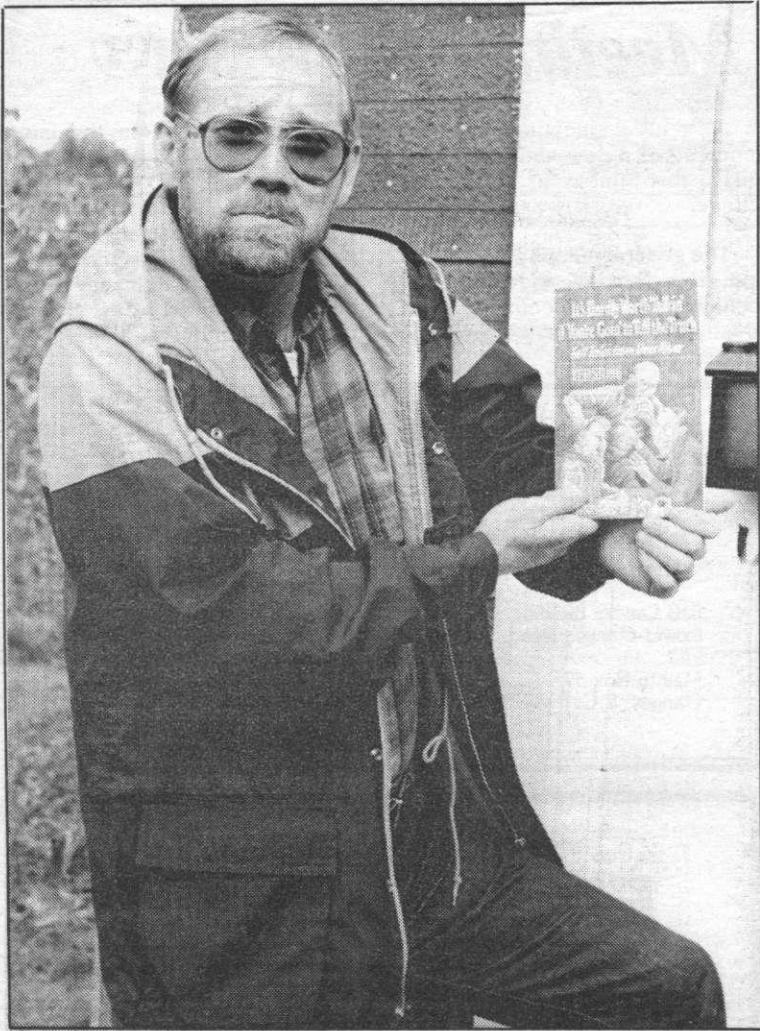
1. "By renumbering section 17, as provided under Supplementary Letters Patent dated March 30, 1978, to read number 18:
2. By adding the following as subsection (c) of section 18:
 - (c) Within a part or portion of the electoral Area of Salt Spring Island defined under Bylaw No. 1328 - "Ganges Sewer Defined Area Bylaw, 1985" pursuant to subsection (a) hereof, the Regional Board may exercise the powers contained in section 611(5)(b) of the Municipal Act."

AND THAT the Letters Patent, as amended, of the Capital Regional District be deemed to be further amended accordingly.

Manitoba author's books keep storytelling alive

Yep, boys, storytelling is almost a dyin' art. Not too many oldtimers around who can spin them yarns for the younger folks.

But there is one young feller' who's doing a pretty good job of keeping storytelling alive. It's that writer fella' from Eriksdale, Manitoba. Name is Ted Stone, I think. He ain't no oldtimer, but I heard Fred Harrison say last week down at the barber shop that this Stone tells tales that will just knock yer socks off ...

It's Hardly Worth Talkin' if You're Goin' to Tell the Truth is Eriksdale, Manitoba, author Stone's second book of tall tales from the fictional town of Deer River. It's a follow-up to his highly successful best-seller *Hailstorms and Hoopsnakes*.

Stone's newest work, published by Western Producer Prairie Books of Saskatoon, is a collection of tall tales gathered through conversations not only with family and friends, but with people from across the country.

It's Hardly Worth Talkin' is written in the first person. All the tales are told by a fictional oldtimer named Sparky Anderson, who introduces the reader to a host of raconteurs who could easily qualify for the storytellers' hall of fame — should one ever be established.

Stone's easy, conversational style makes this book a pleasure to read. It's a welcome relief from the bulky, over-descriptive and sometimes tedious anthologies sometimes produced. Indeed, *It's Hardly Worth Talkin'* is storytelling at its finest; the 17 humorous tales contained within its 118 pages are simple yet immensely entertaining — the type most people remember hearing when, as wide-eyed children, they 'sat in' on their parents' conversations with friends.

Stone, who visited Salt Spring Island last week to rest from a gruelling, cross-Canada book promotion tour, said he wrote both

It's Hardly Worth Talkin' and *Hailstorms and Hoopsnakes* because he felt oral storytelling was a dying art. On his tours across the country, however, he has found that storytelling is making a comeback among the young as well as the old.

"There's something magical about storytelling that people don't want to lose," he said.

Stone is right. And as long as he keeps publishing entertaining books like *It's Hardly Worth Talkin' if You're Going to Tell the Truth*, the art of storytelling will be preserved for future generations.

Forester to speak on management

An ecological approach to forest management will be explained to a Salt Spring audience this Saturday, November 10.

Dr. Bob Green, a research pedologist with the provincial forests ministry, is scheduled to address a morning session at Central Hall before taking his group on a walking tour of Crown-owned Block 43 at the southern end of Salt Spring.

The day-long event, sponsored by the Gulf Islands Woodlands Association, will be both an information exchange and an introduction to small-scale forest management techniques, Dr. Green told *Driftwood* in a telephone interview from Burnaby.

"Most woodlot management methods used in B.C. are large scale," he said. "We will be discussing management on an individual scale."

Dr. Green recently completed a biologically-based management plan for Lasqueti Island's woodlands, and earlier performed the same task — on a smaller scale — for Salt Spring's Block 43. The latter project was a pilot study done to test the methods later used on Lasqueti.

His approach calls for woodlands to be mapped according to environmental zones, and management strategies to vary according to each zone.

"It's an ecological approach to woodlot management," he said, adding that information on each woodland zone must be compiled before effective management can take place.

After explaining the approach to his Salt Spring audience, Dr. Green will take the group on a walking tour of Block 43 to point out different ecological zones and the most appropriate management techniques for each.

Participants are asked to bring a lunch and meet at Central Hall at 10 am for the classroom portion of the event. The tour will take place in the afternoon and conclude at about 4 pm.

and Spinners Guild, said Thursday that her group will definitely be participating.

"We'll have some demonstrations there, too, hopefully," she noted. "I'll be doing the book-keeping."

Lee Sollitt, vice-president of the potters' guild, said some "exciting and new" examples of pottery will be available for sale and viewing at the upcoming show. Sollitt indicated she will display some of her distinctive raku pottery.

She said, however, that it is unlikely the potters will offer any demonstrations at the show. "It's just too difficult to do," she explained. "Even a throwing demonstration would be difficult."

Karen Reiss shows faire items made at Achievement Centre

Community Centre's craft faire gets underway here this Friday

Salt Spring's Community Centre will launch its major fund-raiser of the year this weekend when doors open for its annual Christmas Craft Faire.

"We spell *faire* with an *e*," says Karen Reiss, one of the event's organizers, "because we want to put across the idea that this is a folksy, community-type craft fair."

The *faire* will be open this Friday night, November 7, from 7 pm to 10 pm, and on Saturday, November 8, from 9:30 am to 5 pm.

Variety of sale items is the fair's main drawing card, Reiss indicated. This year's event will see about 35 booths offering pottery, jewellery, knitted goods, paintings, baking, Christmas decorations and clothing.

"We'll have big items and small items, in all price ranges," Reiss said, "We'll even have a blacksmith who will have some work for sale."

A major contributor to this year's fair will be the society-run Achievement Centre, whose residents have constructed the likes of baskets, toys, wrapping paper, herb boxes and marionettes for sale.

Other highlights will be wandering musicians on Friday night, and the sale of refreshments and snacks on both days. Saturday's food will be provided by members of GIPSY (Gulf Island Program Serving Youth), with proceeds going to their programs.

Reiss explained that the Community Society will keep 15 per

cent of an item's sale price and use those proceeds to help fund its programs.

"This is definitely our major fund-raiser of the year," she said.

It is also the first Christmas craft fair of the season on Salt Spring. Last year, the *faire* also attempted to be the first out of the gate, but a sudden snowstorm forced its postponement for several weeks.

"This year," Reiss said, "we decided to be early, to be the first one. Hopefully, it won't snow."

A general meeting and the opening of a new show will take place this Sunday at Off Centre Stage.

The general meeting opens at 6 pm this Sunday, November 9, followed by the opening of artist Jeannie Kamins' show of works at

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Twenty years ago

• Dr. William Lockhart — or Doc, as he was affectionately called — would have been 99 in February. He died here, and his funeral was held in Vancouver. His passing left islanders with a hollow feeling that was mingled with disbelief, because he was not only a fine old man, but almost as part of the island as the trees and lakes.

• Officials of the Galiano fire department expressed concern at the low state of the organization's funds due to a lack of support from local residents.

When formed by the Galiano Chamber of Commerce, it was felt that with adequate support it could be maintained as a community effort without recourse to an improvement district.

• A meeting of the salary chairmen of the Vancouver Island branch of the B.C. School Trustees' Association was held in Duncan.

Trustees gave a detailed review of the salary demands of the Vancouver Island teachers' group. Costs to boards ranged from 10 per cent to 30 per cent, with increases to individuals of up to \$7,400. Most of the teachers' groups demands were in the 15 per cent range.

• An enjoyable Hallowe'en party was held at the Salt Spring Island Rod and Gun Club hall.

The clubhouse was decorated in a Hallowe'en theme by Thelma and Carolyne Reynolds, who convened the supper.

Fifteen years ago

• The first candidate for the Capital Regional District (CRD) on the islands announced his entry into Salt Spring Island affairs.

James R. Wilkinson was nominated for the position of regional director to fill the seat on the CRD that was scheduled to be vacated in December.

Wilkinson had a background in engineering, general construction and logging. He had worked in these fields as both an operator and a manager, and served with the RCAF during the Second World War.

• Two Salt Spring Island groups were pressing for a footpath between the Pioneer Village and the commercial centre of Ganges. The ratepayers association re-

ported that a committee was currently negotiating with the department of highways in Victoria.

The Salt Spring Island Lion's Club indicated that Saanich-and-the-Islands MLA John Tisdalle had been a guest at a recent dinner meeting and had promised his co-operation on the footpath in the fullest.

• Recreation came in for a series of jolts when the heads of various Salt Spring Island associations met for breakfast.

Ed Williams of the island recreation commission explained that without referendum funds, the swimming classes presented every summer for a number of years would be impossible. Williams also spoke sadly of the lack of a cinder track on the island for young athletes.

• Late in the summer, two flags disappeared from the Centennial Park at Ganges.

Col. P.R. Bingham of Ganges commented on their disappearance when he met Rear Admiral Richard Lear, top man in the Pacific command.

There was no suggestion that the military forces had been responsible for the disappearance. The two flags were returned, however, and were placed in safe-keeping.

Ten years ago

• Fire destroyed the main lodge of the Bedwell Harbour resort on South Pender Island.

One of four cabins near the lodge was also burned to the ground. Partially destroyed was a games room housed in a separate building.

"It was a tremendous effort on the part of volunteer firemen of South and North Pender, and citizens, who were largely responsible for containing the fire," Pender Island Fire Warden Dave Schofield said.

• Central Hall, built in 1896 by the community near the intersection of Upper Ganges Road and North End Road, was scheduled to get a \$30,000 facelift.

Margaret Cunningham, secret-

ary-treasurer of the Central Community Hall Society, said that a grant of \$11,000 had been approved by the provincial department of recreation and travel. The money, she said, would be used to help renovate the building.

• Two all-candidates meetings were to be held in Ganges next Monday, Gerry Bourdin, president of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce, said.

The first public meeting, at which candidates for the school board were scheduled to speak, was to be held in the activity room of the elementary school.

The second was slated for November 15 in the gymnasium of the secondary school. It would feature candidates running for a seat in the Islands Trust.

Five years ago

• Contract talks between Gulf Islands teachers and the school board broke down, but then again, they might still be going on.

Michael Hayes, president of the Gulf Islands Teachers' Association, said the negotiations with the school board had come to a halt.

School board chairman Strick Aust, on the other hand, said the two sides were still talking. The executive of the teachers' association had requested a meeting with the full board, he said, and the two sides were scheduled to meet Wednesday.

• Gulf Islanders had fun on Hallowe'en and the RCMP had an easy night.

According to police sources, not one complaint of mischief was reported on either Salt Spring Island or Galiano Island.

"We'd like to compliment residents of both islands for the way they conducted themselves on Hallowe'en," Sergeant Mitch Hanks said.

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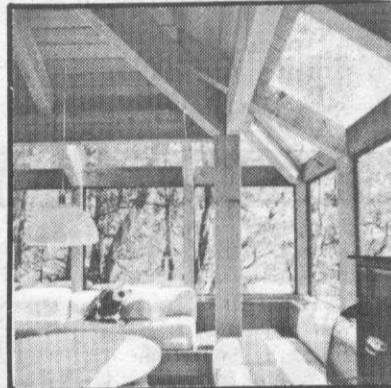

Canada's criminal justice system is designed to uphold the laws of the land. It focuses its efforts almost entirely on catching 'bad guys' (those who transgress the law), sentencing them and, whenever possible, rehabilitating them.

Yet in recent years, those who work in the justice system — as well as those whose lives are touched in some way by it — have realized that its preoccupation with offenders has left another group of people 'out in the cold.'

These often-forgotten individuals are the victims of crime — the people most affected by the actions of society's lawbreakers. Until recently, there were few services available to these individuals; but now, all this is changing.

And it's changing here on Salt Spring Island, too.

Local residents who become victims of crimes have long had access to services offered through the Salt Spring Island Community Society. Yet as early as next year, those who have been affected by criminal activities here will be able to obtain additional help through a new Victims Services Program.

According to Martin Bach, co-ordinator of counselling services for the Salt Spring Island Community Society, the idea of establishing a program offering aid to victims of crime was first discussed with members of the local police detachment. In February, organizers of the new program met for the first time; a committee was established that now includes (among other individuals) representatives from the community society, the RCMP, School District 64 (Gulf Islands) and Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital.

"There was no question of need," said Bach in an interview last week. "But we weren't going to have to offer all the same kinds of services offered in Victoria and Vancouver. We'd don't have a lot of murders here. What we have is a seniors' community that is sometimes bothered by break-ins, that type of thing."

Some funding for the program has already been obtained. Bach noted that the Capital Regional District (CRD) has provided a \$500 grant, and some additional money may be sought from the provincial government.

However, he noted that the program won't likely require a lot of funding to operate. Most of the work will be carried out by volunteers trained in helping people deal with the emotions associated with being a victim.

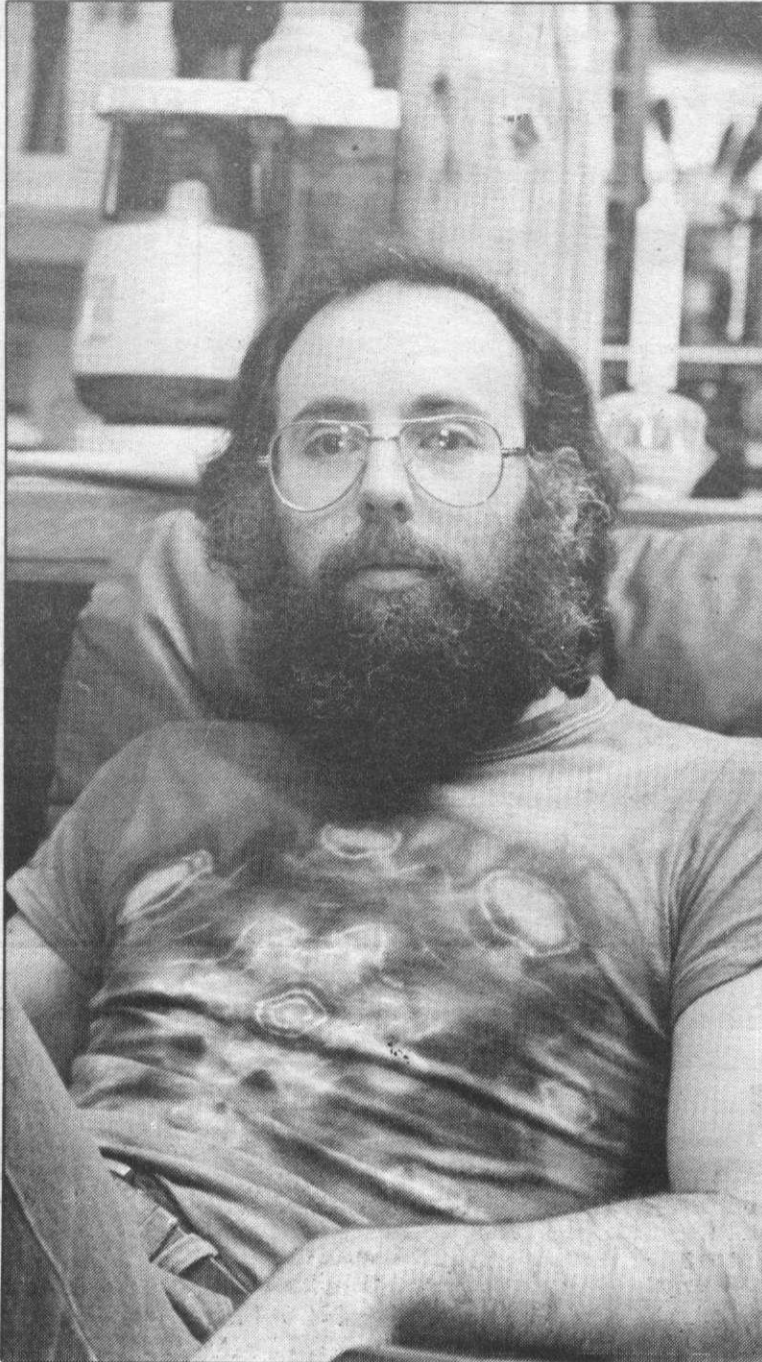
"Even if we don't get that extra funding, it won't make a difference," he noted. "We'll still be able to go ahead."

So exactly what services will this new program offer the residents of Salt Spring Island?

According to literature provided by the community society, the Victim Services Program will:

- Provide immediate emotional support and informed assistance to victims at the time of the crime;
- Provide information about the court process, and about the specific court proceedings related to each individual's case;

- Refer victims to helping agencies, such as the criminal injuries section of the compensation board, legal services, community counselling services (or other mental agencies) and the ministry of human resources;
- Facilitate a close liaison between each victim and the police, or other agencies such as the criminal justice system;
- Ensure that each victim is accorded the dignity and respect due to any individual who seeks the protection of the criminal justice system; and
- Prevent victimization by working in close liaison with the police to promote the various crime prevention programs available.

When the program officially gets underway, individuals who feel they need one or more of these services will be able to obtain them by simply contacting the Victim Services Program directly. Others may simply be referred to program workers by the RCMP.

Bach said the program could actually be in operation here as early as "post-Christmas." All that really needs to be done now, he said, is obtain "five or six volunteers" who will in turn be sent to a special VSP training session to be offered December 13 in Victoria.

Volunteers are being sought within the community, the co-ordinator of counselling services noted. Anyone interested in helping victims of crime should contact the Salt Spring Island Community Centre and leave their name and telephone number.

"The key thing a volunteer must be able to do is listen and not judge," he said. "There are no education requirements, and you don't have to have a background in a particular field. The major concern is that you be there to listen and not judge. We'll train volunteers, teach them everything they want to know, and a few things they don't want to know."

"There is one thing that may prove uncomfortable with a few people, and that's that they must undergo a criminal record search. But I don't think there will be many restrictions, though obviously, we're not going to accept anyone who's been a violent rapist. But still, that (search) could make some people feel uncomfortable."

In many cases, all a Victims Services Program volunteer will be required to do while 'on the job' is listen to the concerns of a person whose life has been directly affected by crime. Bach recalled two such cases.

"We were called to deal with an elderly lady whose husband had died the year before. He had a workshop in the basement of their home that, because of her physical condition, she was unable to enter.

"She was getting a neighbor or a friend to come into the house to do odd jobs for her, and he was using the basement workshop. One day, she had another male relation visiting, and he went down into the workshop and found that, well, stuff was missing.

"The woman called the police. She wanted to blame the neighbor who was coming in to do the work, but she didn't know if he was responsible, because she was unable to go down into the basement workshop and didn't know what was there. She felt guilty, angry, violated. Here it appeared that things had been stolen, but she didn't even know what.

"The police interviewed her, but they couldn't do much. We went in and listened to her, talked to her for 45 minutes to help her deal with the fact that she felt violated, angry and frightened. Then, we helped her to decide on better ways of securing her house."

Bach continued: "Then, there was a guy who'd been involved in a hit-and-run. He met me a couple of weeks later, and said that now, when he went into parking lots, he spent his time parking as far away from people as he possibly could.

"I told him what he was doing was normal. Anyone, I said, who'd had his car smashed into would probably do the same thing. He said: 'Gee, that makes me feel a lot better.' His wife had been teasing him about it, and he thought he was really being weird.

"A lot of the time, it (being a Victims Services Program volunteer) is just being there. If they want to cry, they cry. But they know you're not judging them."

Although sometimes stressful, being a Victim Services Program volunteer isn't unrewarding, said Bach. "Working with people can be very rewarding, and it can be very comforting. You can not only help people, but you can learn a lot about yourself."

Bach is excited about the new Victims Services Program. "If we line up the volunteers for the training session, we could start post-Christmas. There's nothing to hold us back.

"We're ready to go. We've played with it, and now we're set to start."

Corporal Thorogood of the Pender RCMP reported an "extremely quiet and safe Halloween" on the island this year.

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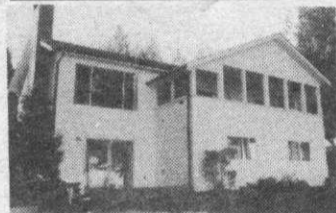

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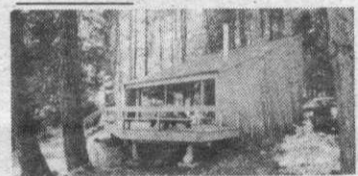
