# Final performance of kids' play set

The play, written by Jeremy Davis and performed by a cast of Grade Eight students from Gulf Islands Secondary School, will be staged this Saturday, May 2, at Off Centre Stage. Showtime is 8 p.m.

Tickets for the event, available

at the door only, are \$3 general admission and \$2 for seniors, students, children and the unemployed.

*Give Peace a Chance* concerns a 12-year-old girl, played by Debbie Gosnell, who is frightened by the prospect of nuclear war. Determined to do something about it, she enlists the aid of a friend — played by Kathleen Huebert — and the class presi-

dent, played by Cathi Gay.

When the plan produces fame, the boys — played by Dominic Wales and Malcolm Shoolbraid — want to jump on the bandwagon. 'Keeping the peace' becomes difficult until the 'bad boy,' played by Kris Luker, shows what peace really means.

Author Davis, who also directs the play, says he has been impressed by the talent and

professionalism found in his young cast. "Most of them had little or no experience before rehearsals started," he says, "and it's been wonderful to just watch their characters get richer and more varied with each performance. They've done a super job."

Davis has applied for a Canada Council grant to make a film version of *Give Peace A Chance* next winter.

## Active PASS production shows two faces of cold-blooded killing

At Off Centre Stage this past weekend, two plays — *Killer's Head*, by Sam Shepard and *Easy*, written by Christopher Coe — were juxtaposed under the performance title *Killing Time*.

*Killing Time* — when we speak these words do we say them as if we were about to butcher a lamb or do we merely mean passing time, waiting? The performance is produced by Active PASS, directed by Lynda Jensen and features Jeremy Davis in both roles.

*Killer's Head* presents us with a simple vision of a man in an electric chair expressing his distress with involuntary straining and tensing, an isometric struggle with the machine that restrains him. We are party to his recollections — not a reliving of his past but a fragment of his passion for life and embodied in his love of horses.

People who do bad things rarely do them for more than five per cent of their waking hours. The rest of the time they appear and act according to what we consider normal. We are not instructed as to the circumstance leading to the prisoner's deliverance, but we begin to question why a man with a passion for life must be handed such a mechanical, dispassionate death, or death at all.

The second play, *Easy*, introduces us to the good life on the terrace of a well-to-do residence with the son speaking to the audience candidly about the calculated dispatch of the "carnivore" who was his father.

He says, without remorse that "when life is easy, it is easy to take a life." The way he does it is by loosening the screws which anchor the top end of a cable ride on which a person can quickly descend over rocky terrain to a splash in the lake below.

His only justification is that he must secure his inheritance before his father's parade of wives squanders the loot. Money is the only currency in this scenario. Compassion is absent from the father, the son and the wife Carmelita, who as it turns out has also given the screws a turn.

Didn't this happen to kings and sultans? Does privilege allow one

to ignore moral conventions which bind us together? I always thought Mao's idea of sending the privileged out to till peasant fields ensured the binding respect of man for man.

The electric chair we see in *Killer's Head* is another manifestation for the cold-blooded killing we see in *Easy*. It is an abdication of responsibility for the consequences of the kind of society we sponsor and encourage. We see in *Easy* that the loosening of the

screws is a metaphor for cheating, fudging, giving fate a nudge and the defaulting or moral accountability for the welfare of the group to the aggrandizement of the individual.

The criminal in the death chair is a symbol of our preservation of the values of society — but is it the appropriate moral stance? Or is it only a savage, ritual gesture signalling limits to behaviour?

There is much to consider in

these two plays. It appears to be a hallmark of Active PASS that we are challenged to think about real issues. However, in this instance the distance between the two segments feels large and the connections circuitous.

In the first part we are not convinced that we are viewing the death chamber. Textural devices which generate tension are absent. There is no sound to the silence and the agitated breathing of the prisoner needs a supporting environment.

The second play leaves us much more convinced about the character and his sinister depravity. Jeremy Davis plays both roles well, but his physical mannerisms are particularly successful in *Easy*.

One quick announcement: a representative from Canadian Pacific Craft Fairs will be on Salt Spring on May 10 to discuss the Christmas exhibition at Canada Place. The meeting time will be on Sunday, May 3, from 1 to 4 pm in the Mahon Hall board room.

# Authors to attend annual writers' conference

Four Canadian authors will be in Ganges this Saturday — May 2 — to take part in Salt Spring Island's second annual *Celebration of Canadian Writers*.

The program, part of National Book Festival Week, will see writers Jane Rule, Ellen Godfrey, Alan Twigg and Hilary Stewart speak at afternoon and evening sessions at Mahon Hall.

The schedule has Stewart speaking at 1:30 pm, followed by Godfrey at 3:30 pm. Rule and Twigg will speak at the evening session, which gets underway at 8 pm.

Cost of attendance is \$3 for each afternoon event, \$5 for the evening program or \$10 for all three sessions. Tickets are available at Volume II Books, *et cetera* or at the door.

The authors, in order of their appearance at Mahon Hall, are:

- Hilary Stewart is an artist and author of several books on the West Coast Indian culture, including *Cedar*, *Looking at Indian Art of the Northwest Coast*, and *Artifacts of the Northwest Coast*.

Born in the West Indies, Stewart was educated in England and arrived in Canada in 1951. In 1972, her interest in coastal Indian archaeology led her to abandon a 14-year career in TV design to write and illustrate a major book on Indian artifacts.

Stewart has subsequently researched, written and illustrated books on Indian art, fishing methods, teas and other drinks made from wild plants of the area, and on the many uses the cedar tree had in Indian life.

*Cedar*, her most recent book, shows how the tree enriched the life of coastal Indians from the cradle to the grave — it provided materials for baby diapers, housing, clothing, transportation, fishing gear, basketry, utensils and burial boxes.

Stewart's session is expected to include sketches, demonstrations and a large, touchable display of items used in the Indians' daily and ceremonial life.

- Ellen Godfrey is the author of two murder mysteries, *The Case of the Cold Murderer* and *Murder Among the Well-To-Do*. A third mystery, *Murder Behind Closed Doors*, will be published next spring.

The editor at Victoria's Press Porcepic since 1972, Godfrey has also written a non-fiction work, *By Reason of Doubt*, about the much-publicized recent case of Vancouverite Cyril Belshaw, who was alleged to have murdered his wife in France.

- Galiano resident Jane Rule is one of Canada's best-known novelists, essayists and short-story writers. Her first novel, *The*

*Desert of the Heart* was written in Vancouver in the 1960s and subsequently made into a film. Her latest books are *A Hot-Eyed Moderate*, a collection of wide-ranging essays, and *Inland Passa-*

*adian Writers*. Last year, he switched his focus to politicians and wrote *Vander Zalm: From Immigrant to Premier*. Twigg also writes for the *Province* newspaper and several national magazines.

Salt Spring's *Celebration of Canadian Writers* has been organized by a committee which includes Liz Armour, Susan Underwood, Roger Coster of Volume II Books and Maralyn Horsdal of Horsdal and Schubart Publishing. # Four performances set for Mahon Hall

Price's choice as best play, meanwhile, will advance to the B.C.-wide competition set to begin May 25 at the McPherson Playhouse in Victoria.

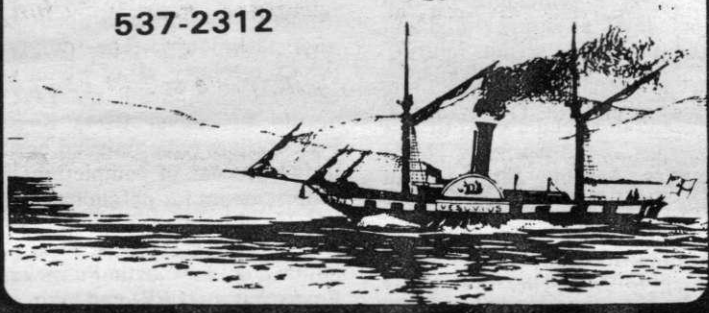

## State-of-the-art fitness program helping islanders stay in shape

Feeling tired and creaky? Want to recover a semblance of that "glory days" physique and vigour without suffering serious injury?

Cheer up, help is available. And there's no need to travel off-island to attend a good fitness class — Salt Spring's Salty Sweat's Aerobic Fitness Program probably already offers exactly what you want.

Salty Sweat's was established here approximately nine years ago by Marianne Hume, and has grown into one of the most unique fitness programs of its kind in the region. As instructor Rosemary Trump pointed out last week, it has been adapted to serve the needs of a small community — no mean feat on an island with a population as diverse as that of most cities.

The island fitness program, Trump pointed out, offers a variety of fitness classes. There's literally something for everyone: *Easy Does It* for those who aren't ready for a strenuous exercise program; *Beginners* for individuals who feel they are ready for a more active workout; and *High Gear*, a class designed to challenge the more active individual. The program also includes light weight training classes. *Aquafit*, exercising in water, is conducted during the warmer summer months.

At present, there are approximately 180 people attending Salty Sweat's fitness classes on the island, and they aren't all young and athletic. Elderly people find programs for them, as do overweight individuals. Fitness is a personal matter, and those who attend fitness classes do so for their own enjoyment and health; they aren't there to show up others.

"What I think makes it (Salty Sweat's) unique is that it has adapted to a small community," said Trump last week. "If it wasn't working, we'd know about it, too. In the city, people might go and attend a class in a spa a couple of times, and if they didn't like it, they'd just drop out. Here, if someone is unhappy... it gets around."

As Trump noted, this 'feedback' has resulted in Salty Sweat's instructors being extremely well-informed about fitness techniques. The program has 10 teachers, all of whom are certified through the YM-YWCA or the Vancouver Parks Board. Five of them have finished or are in the process of completing the requirements for obtaining membership in the B.C. Parks and Recreation Association. They are all trained in Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and maintain it at a high level.

But Salty Sweat's instructors

don't stop there. They attend frequent workshops in other communities to ensure their classes employ 'state of the art' fitness techniques.

Several weeks ago, a group of local instructors attended a three-day workshop in Victoria. On their return to Salt Spring, the instructors organized a spring workshop to acquaint local residents with the information and techniques they learned.

Today, there's a lot more to being a fitness instructor than simply being fit. All instructors here prepare taped music for their classes, said Trump, and

exercise routines are carefully planned. "We're not bubble-heads with biceps," the fitness teacher stressed.

As instructor Kathy Ball noted, much has changed in the fitness industry during the past 13 years. She pointed to the change in fitness wear — particularly running shoes — as an example of how research has changed the industry. Today, many companies market athletic shoes specially designed for specific fitness programs; there are shoes for joggers, shoes for those who attend aerobics classes — even shoes designed to make walking safer.

Trump agrees, adding that techniques have changed as well. "Eight or 10 years ago, when it (fitness) started to take off, there were a lot of injuries," she noted. "People were going out in \$1.49 Day running shoes and hurting their ankles, their back. Then the industry began to police itself, to certify instructors."

Salty Sweat's will undoubtedly continue to serve the community for years to come. It provides a much-needed service on the island, and residents support it.

Its organizers will continue to upgrade their skills as well — thus ensuring that residents of the area have access to a top-notch fitness program.

"We're changing a lot of what we've been doing," Trump stressed. "We really want to educate people as well as keep them fit."

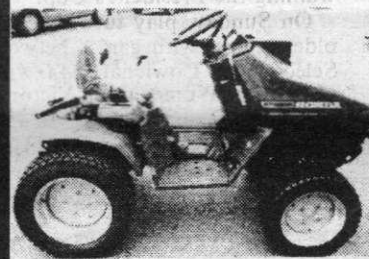

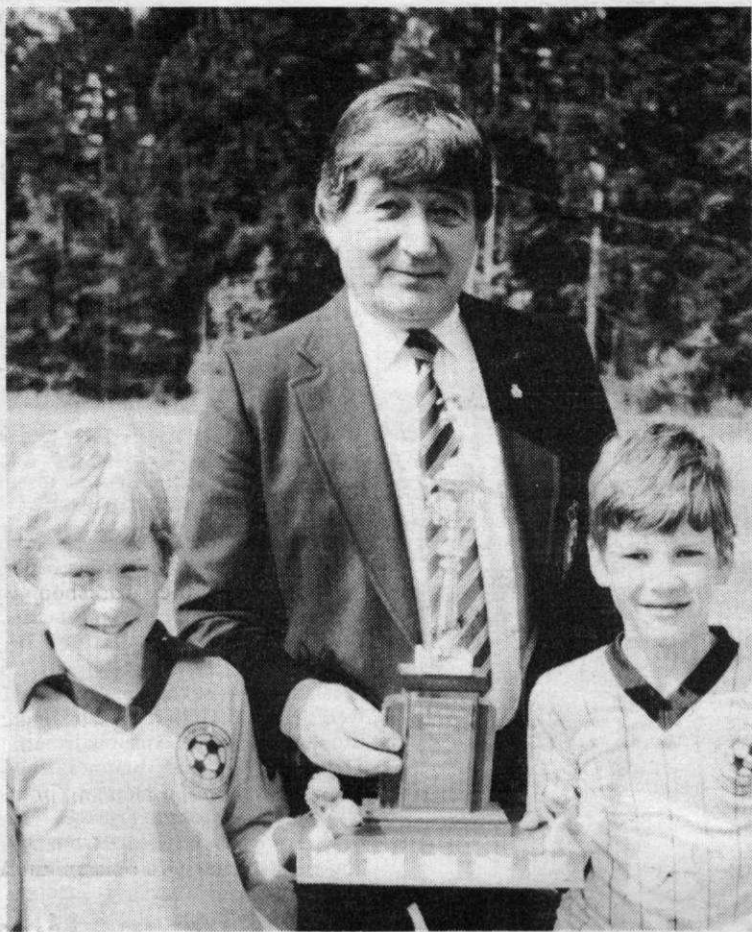

# Official opening held to mark shift of post office premises

PENDER ISLANDS — Postmistress Valerie Melville and her assistant, Sharon MacDonald, welcomed the many visitors who called when the new Pender Islands post office officially opened on Friday, April 10.

The day saw visitors tour behind the scenes for a first-hand look at all facets of mail sorting and delivery.

C.D. Stewart, director of postal operations for the Vancouver Island Pacific Division, was present at the opening to give visitors explanations of various post office operations.

Also on hand was Steve Clark, the post office's field manager for the Vancouver Island region, which counts the Gulf Islands as part of its territory.

Clark said there are a total of 100 rural post offices in the region. The smaller ones, known as revenue offices, are open less than 40 hours a week and operate from rented premises. Usually — but not necessarily — the office is a section of a general store, like the Pender Islands postal stations that used to be in the Port Washington and Hope Bay stores.

One step up from the revenue offices, Clark said, are the semi-staff offices. They open for more than 40 hours a week and use premises and equipment provided by the federal government.

Up one more step are the larger stations like the Sidney and Victoria post offices. The final step is to the largest operations, found in major centres like Van-

couver, Toronto and Montreal. Those offices, Clark said, "are a completely different operation."

Attending the official opening with Clark and C.D. Stewart were Jim Sharp, postmaster from Sidney, and Bill Bartlett, from the Saanich post office. Bartlett was the Pender Islands' popular

postmaster until two years ago, when he moved to Saanich and Valerie Melville became postmistress here.

Those attending the post office's opening had a chance at a draw for a souvenir stamp collection. It was won by Betty Duthie.

## More to mail than office

Mail service on the Pender Islands involves more than a post office.

There are 33 rural route mail drops on the island, plus individual delivery boxes in front of the balance of Pender homes. Bonnie Lynn Green is the rural mail carrier for the islands.

All mail is addressed to Rural Route #1; North Pender gets delivery five days per week, South Pender residents receive their mail every other day.

Mail for Pender is picked up at the ferry terminal each day at 8:45 am by George Logan and Syd Kent. The two share the work, alternating every two weeks.

Valerie Melville is the postmistress, while Sharon MacDonald is the part-time, assistant postmistress.

Directing letters directly to homes or rural mail drops is not the only way the post office handles its duties. The office will also hold mail for residents who are on vacation, register it or re-direct mail.

The new Pender post office has general delivery boxes in the main lobby, which are open day and night for mail pickup.

## Trust hears views on bed and breakfast

PENDER ISLAND — North Pender Islands Trust Committee meeting was held April 25 at 1 pm in the community room at the school, with 30 people in attendance.

Islands Trust officers present were Nick Gilbert, chairman; Stephen Wright, vice-chairman; David Morris, staff planner; and Peter Campbell and Doreen York, North Pender Island Trustees.

Earlier correspondence from the law firm of Harmon Wilson and Company of Victoria, regarding Cliffside Bed and Breakfast on Armadale Road was read by table officers.

Letters from near neighbours of Cliffside Bed and Breakfast were read. Eight adjacent property owners spoke. All were against any changes in zoning that would allow Cliffside Bed and Breakfast to become a potential commercial development in the quiet residential area.

In every case, by letter or verbally, the Trust was asked to comply with the present bylaws.

Lorena M. Staples of the law firm of Harmon Wilson asked that the Cliffside Bed and Breakfast operation be given consideration, on compassionate grounds, to subdivide the property.

David Underhill, the surveyor who recently re-surveyed the property, also suggested the same consideration be given.

At the April meeting of the Advisory Planning Committee to the Islands Trust, when the Cliffside Bed and Breakfast matter was discussed, four of five members voted in favour of the Trust abiding by the bylaws.

Peter Campbell of North Pender Islands Trust advised that Angus McMoonie, Wilf McGeahey and Dave Jamieson had been appointed to the North Pender Island Advisory Planning Commission for a two-year term. Bob George and John Sabbagh continue on the committee.

# Wright: CRD, Trust roles pose no conflicts

Pender Islands Trust representative Steve Wright said Friday he doesn't feel his candidacy for the Capital Regional District's vacant Outer Islands seat creates any conflicts.

Wright, currently serving his fifth year as Islands Trust member from South Pender Island, filed nomination papers two weeks ago for the seat vacated earlier this spring by Outer Islands CRD rep Kelly Scott.

"No, I don't see a conflict," Wright said. "I won't have a lot of authority (as Outer Islands representative), I'll just have two votes out of 54. It's not a large job, either. It works out to two days a month, depending on the number of committees you're on."

Wright said his current duties as Island Trust representative are not so demanding that he cannot serve the Outer Islands as their CRD board member. However, he

added that he gave the matter careful thought before announcing his candidacy.

"My workload as a trustee won't create any problems, either," he said. "My Trust duties are well in hand. I have some time, so I've decided to do this when I was asked to run."

Wright feels people should always have a choice of government representatives, and this belief influenced his decision to

become a candidate for the CRD Outer Islands seat. He noted that fellow South Penderite Vern Roddick, a former member of the CRD's board of directors, is the only other candidate for the position.

"I hate acclamations," he explained. "It looked like there would be no election in the area, and that offended me."

Wright said he doesn't feel there are any major issues in the

election campaign. "Garbage removal is a concern, and there's the noise bylaw, but there are no large issues," he said. "It will simply be a matter of the people's choice as to who they want representing them."

Wright said he is a strong believer in local government. As one of the area's Islands Trust representatives, he also negotiated the transfer of acreage from South Islands Estates.

## Election time, places set

Polling station locations and hours of operation have been announced for Outer Islands residents, who will vote this Saturday — May 2 — to elect a representative to the Capital Regional District (CRD).

Polling stations, open from 8 am to 8 pm on voting day, will be set up at Galiano Elementary School on Galiano Island, Pender Island School on Pender Island, Mayne Elementary-Junior Secondary School on Mayne Island, and the Saturna Island Community Hall on Saturna Island.

An advance polling station was opened earlier this week at the CRD office in Victoria. It closes today (Wednesday) at 4:30 pm.

Voters will cast ballots for either Vern Roddick or Steve Wright. Both are South Pender Island residents.

The successful candidate will succeed Kelly Scott, who was elected to the CRD in 1985 but resigned his seat earlier this year when business interests prompted him to move to the Lower Mainland.

The result of this Saturday's election will see the successful candidate complete the remainder of Scott's term, which expires this November.

## Building activity increases on all four Outer Islands

Current building activity on the Outer Gulf Islands is proceeding ahead of the pace of a year ago.

Figures released recently by the Capital Regional District (CRD) building permits office show construction work carried out on Mayne, Pender, Saturna and Galiano islands in February, 1987, was up substantially from the level reached in February, 1986.

The statistics also show that the combined permit totals for January and February of this year are almost double those of the same period in 1986.

Building permit statistics for February, 1987, with comparative figures for February, 1986, in parentheses, are as follows:

- permits issued, 24 (15); value of work, \$240,497 (\$150,508); and permit revenue, \$3,197 (\$1,656).

Year-to-date building permit statistics for January and February, 1987, with comparative figures for 1986 in parentheses, are as follows:

- permits issued, 53 (31); value of work, \$454,214 (\$238,902); and permit revenue, \$5,949 (\$3,028).

The bulk of the Outer Islands building activity is taking place on the Penders, where 30 permits have been taken out to date in 1987, compared to 13 a year ago.

The Pender totals for 1987 include three permits for single-family dwellings, one for com-

mercial industry, 14 for plumbing work, five for chimneys and seven projects described as 'other.' There were also five demolition permits issued.

A year ago, the Pender figures were one building permit for commercial industry, four for plumbing and four for chimneys. The higher plumbing permit figures for 1987 are likely linked to a February order from the CRD which outlawed septic fields in Pender's Magic Lake area, requiring homeowners to connect their plumbing to a sewer system constructed five years ago.

Building activity is also up on Galiano, where residents took out 14 permits in January and February, compared to 10 in the same period of 1986. Galiano's total includes two permits for single-family dwellings, three for commercial industry, five for plumbing, three for chimneys and one for 'other' work.

On Mayne, eight permits were taken out in the first two months of 1987, compared to six a year earlier. Mayne's total included two for single-family dwellings, two for plumbing, three for chimneys and one for 'other' work.

Saturna, meanwhile, took out one permit in early 1987, compared to two a year earlier. The Saturna permit was for a plumbing connection.

# All-around effort helps production succeed

The production of the musical *Oliver* by Galiano School, with community participation and co-operation, has so much to commend it. With four juvenile leads, a dozen adult roles and a chorus of sixty children it is impossible to praise individually any member of the cast without congratulating all for a job well done.

Perhaps most remarkable was the concept of a joint production, with its happy integration of the experience contributed by veterans of the Galiano Players and the enthusiasm and spontaneity of 60 kids with an average age of about 10 years. School performances have had the assistance of the adult community before but never to this degree.

The school staff are to be complimented for so many aspects of the production, but first is their choice of *Oliver* for this venture. Too much effort in entertainment is expended on trash, so it is especially important that children are introduced to proven classics such as *Oliver*.

Also worthy of note is the continued association between the school and the Galiano Club, which runs the Community Hall. Despite their straitened circumstances, the club executive

provides the facilities of the hall gratis, and the school continues to use the inadequate premises for its public performances. The directors of *Oliver* worked miracles in manipulating a large cast and overflow audiences onto a miniscule stage and confined auditorium.

The young stars of the production were the two *Olivers*, Christopher Walker and Meghan Anderson, and the two Artful Dodgers played by Kate Hennessy and Brett Gaylor. Adult newcomers to the Galiano stage who impressed were Bill Eaton as Fagin, Michael Hughes as Sykes, and Heather Martin as Nancy. Too numerous to mention are the supporting players, stage crew and all the other 'credits' that contributed to the outstanding result. However, as Frank Greenhalgh, co-director, remarked; without two people there would have been no performance. Steve Nemtin was both stage manager and director and Elizabeth Brinson was producer, impresario and musical director.

Finally let us pay tribute to the school staff. Regular teaching is arduous enough, as anyone who has worked in the public school system knows. To add voluntarily to this burden the extra hours and energy-demanding labour of a production of this dimension is devotion to the children and

community far beyond the call of duty. And this was done at a time when teachers are under great stress. The government appears, to teachers and many others, to be attacking their organization—the BCTF — and their professional rights. Whatever our views of the controversy that is raging, we cannot fail to appreciate what a splendid job the teachers of Galiano School are doing, and have done in the production of *Oliver*.

## We Shall Miss Them

There is a lot to be said for paying tribute to people in time for them to know that they are appreciated. The end of April will see the departure of three long-time residents who have contributed greatly to island life.

"Big Mac," as he is affectionately known, came to Galiano from Nelson where he had been fire chief and representative of the fire marshall's department in Doukhobor country. His tales of those years are both hilarious and tragic. During the 1970s he used some of this experience while acting as training officer and fire

chief of the South Galiano Volunteer Fire Department. He put his expertise to use in other ways with the department of highways, and later by installing plumbing systems. His own home, which he built on a ridge overlooking Whaler Bay, contains many ingenious features such as the use of his freezer as a heat-exchange device to warm his living room by means of a duct and fan. Gordon Angus Macdonald is moving to Vancouver for medical reasons. Thanks for everything, Mac.

The Weavers have an equally long association with Galiano. Well known at the North End for the years Pat and Kitty ran the fish-buying station and store on stilts above Lighthouse Bay on Porlier Pass, the Weavers then moved south to their house on the shore of Sturdies Bay. Pat then ran an excavating business. Although prairie-born-and-bred the Weavers spent much of their married life in the Cowichan district where Pat worked in the logging industry and was chief of the volunteer fire department. For many years now Pat has been the 'security cruiser' for M & B's tree-farm area. Nobody knows the terrain of Galiano better than Pat.

Pat has been a great social asset to the community. He has served many years on the APC, but his greater contribution has been his music. At the Fiesta, the Pub and

the community halls, organized or spontaneous, Pat with his 'squeeze-box' has entertained us with his encyclopedic knowledge of popular songs. He is certainly the gregarious one but Kitty is no introvert. She has been a member of most of the women's organizations, to which she has contributed in a more inobtrusive but very effective way. ## Former Galiano resident

# Illness claims Jean Lockwood

There is virtually no area of community life on Galiano Island that was not influenced in some degree by Jean Lockwood. In the two decades she spent on the island she was the island's number one booster.

Jean Lockwood died in Camp Hill Hospital, Nova Scotia, on April 21. She had lived in the Maritimes since leaving Galiano in 1981.

Her sudden death leaves Galiano with a deep sense of loss. From 1963, when she moved to the island, until 1981, she was never idle. From one community project to another, she was identified with almost every development on the island during those years.

Her introduction to community life came with her acquisition of the *Gulf Islander* newspaper, originally circulating in the Outer Islands from her "Hen House" on Galiano. She later sold out her news sheet to *Driftwood*. For years her wit and aggressive demands of government and other services in the interests of her adopted island were eagerly read around the islands and beyond. One of her earliest projects was as secretary of the commuters' group which fought for better ferry service from Vancouver via Swartz Bay.

A love of literature and a long experience with the written word were her qualifications, and her long experience of governments and government agencies were at the disposal of any islander with a problem, as an individual or on behalf of the community.

Her contribution to the drive for power at North Galiano was one of the proudest accomplishments. In 1966 she was one of the group

which planted poles and strung some 20 miles of wire to serve the hitherto-isolated North Galiano community.

The list of organizations and campaigns to which Jean Lockwood contributed her energies would be endless.

President of the Galiano Chamber of Commerce, she also served as president of the Galiano Club. As a clubwoman, she was secretary of the Galiano Golf Club for some years and was partially responsible for the preparation of the bylaws for the Ladies' Service Club. She was there when the regulations for the Galiano Cemetery were laid out.

For some years she was Rector's Warden of the Church of St. Margaret of Scotland and for all the years she spent on the island, she was a hard worker for that church.

With Mrs. H. Barner, she was the first trustee of the Galiano School Memorial Fund. "Jean was always helping someone," recalls a close friend.

She was a friend of the elderly at all times and particularly at Christmas, when she entertained older people who would otherwise have been alone.

When the Galiano Fire Department was established one of the workers of the ladies' auxiliary was Jean Lockwood. She also helped in first aid.

To hundreds of people, on Galiano and elsewhere, Jean Lockwood was Galiano. The "medium was the message" and for a score of years she never let up on the message of warmth and welcome to a haven of retirement.

She came from Halifax and it was to the Atlantic coast that she retired six years ago. A well-travelled Canadian, she was proud of the Canada Centennial Medal which she received from the Secretary of State for "service to her nation."

On the west coast are her family: her daughter, Kathryn Gillett; two granddaughters, Brenda and Karen, of Surrey; three grandsons, and their families, Rick Harding, Bryan and Jo-Ann Harding and Bruce and Jessie Harding and three great-grandchildren, Kerilynn, Joshua and Kevin Harding, all of Surrey; and her former husband, Don R. Edmunds, of Vancouver.

In Nova Scotia she leaves her two sisters, Joan McKenna and Joyce Lockwood, both of Mill Village.

A memorial service will be held in the Church of St. Margaret of Scotland on May 2 at 2 pm.

Donations are invited, in her memory, to the Galiano School Memorial Fund, of which Mrs. F.E. Robson and Mrs. R. Thompson are trustees.

## Lecture audience told

# Gulf Islanders should expect earthquake

PENDER ISLANDS — Seismologist Garry Rogers told an April 9 Pender audience that all indicators point to an earthquake taking place in the Gulf Islands and surrounding areas in the near future.

Dr. Rogers, an earthquake specialist with the Pacific Geoscience Centre near Sidney, told 90 people gathered at the community school that the region is "closer in time to the next earthquake of consequence than we are distant from the last one, in 1965."

He said the earthquake will come as the Juan de Fuca plate and the continental land plate make an overdue adjustment to

relieve friction strains that have been building up for over 20 years while the Juan de Fuca plate has been sliding slowly under the land plate.

Dr. Rogers pointed out there is no way of predicting the severity of the earthquake when it occurs, but that it could be severe enough to cause some physical damage. When it arrives, he said, people should stay in their homes — preferably under a table and away from outside walls, bookcases and windows.

A severe earthquake, he added, could also damage deep wells and disrupt power services.

The address by Dr. Roberts, who has been researching earth-

quakes since 1967, was the second in a series of four free spring lectures sponsored by the Pender Island Reading Centre, which operates the Pender Lender Library.

(The lectures are believed to be unique in B.C., in that they are directly sponsored by an all-volunteer library group.)

The first lecture, held in mid-March, featured marine biologist Gordon Green, who is also curator of the provincial museum. Green gave Pender school children a talk and slide show about the tremendous variety of marine life in B.C.'s waters.

The next lecture in the series will be on May 14, when Dr.

Helen Schwantje will discuss her experiences with wildlife and zoo animals under the theme, *B.C. wildlife and the vet*. Dr. Schwantje, one of Canada's few women wildlife veterinarians, will address students at the Pender Island school during the day, then deliver an evening talk.

Following Dr. Schwantje, the lecture series will present a June 11 address by Dr. James E. Hesser, director of the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory and one of Canada's most well-known astronomers. He will discuss the question: *Is Anybody Out There: The Search For Extra-Terrestrial Life*.

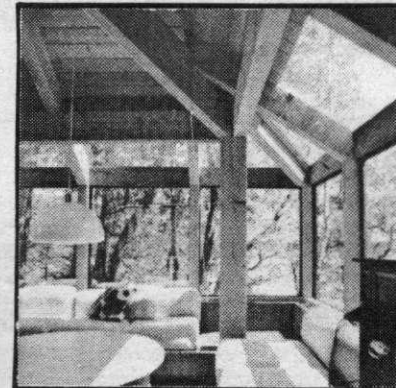

# Regional parks programs launched by ministry

Four programs will be launched this summer in provincial parks in the Gulf Islands region.

Sponsored by the provincial ministry of environment and parks, the programs provide information to visitors.

Three of the four programs are new to the region, while the fourth is a continuation of one launched last year.

The new programs include:

- provision of a naturalist at Montague Harbour Marine Park on Galiano Island, to give groups of students information on attractions there;

- provision of a naturalist at Montague Harbour Marine Park, Sidney Spit Marine Park (off Sidney) and Ruckle Park (on Salt Spring) to conduct free visitor information programs; and

- an adopt-a-park program involving South Pender's Beaumont Marine Park and Princess Margaret Marine Park on Portland Island, south of Ruckle Park.

To be continued, meanwhile, is the campground host volunteer program launched last year.

The Montague Harbour program for students will be in effect Mondays through Fridays from June 1 until the end of the school year. It will see a naturalist offer guided trips, demonstrations and talks to provide "hands-on" learning for participants, ministry

spokesman Cathy Mackin said. Montague Harbour Park, Mackin explained, is a perfect outdoor classroom since it has archeological middens, and a salt-water lagoon teeming with inter-tidal life.

The program will also offer a special campground price for classes — \$1 per person up to a \$30 maximum per group — and a guarantee that each class will have a three-hour session with

the naturalist. Groups must register by calling 387-4363.

The Montague Harbour sessions will be led by Salt Spring resident David Fraser. Once school ends, Fraser will host the visitor information programs to go into effect at Montague, Sidney Spit and Ruckle parks.

At present, Fraser's schedule will see him at Ruckle Park at 8 pm on Fridays, 2 pm on Saturdays

and 8 pm on Mondays; at Sidney Spit Park at 8 pm on Saturdays; and at Montague Harbour Park at 2 pm and 8 pm on Sundays, and at 2 pm on Mondays.

The adopt-a-park program, meanwhile, is a new effort aimed at inviting boaters to take more interest in marine parks.

Already, the Pender Island Yacht Club has 'adopted' Beaumont Marine Park and the Royal Victoria Yacht Club has done the

same with Princess Margaret Marine Park.

Mackin said adoption means yacht club members will take turns acting as hosts at the parks throughout the summer. They will tell visiting boaters about park services and programs, and provide information about the area.

The program could later expand to involve the clubs in planning, development, corporate sponsorship of new facilities like mooring rafts, or maintenance like trail-building and brushing-out of some areas.

The final parks program is one inviting volunteers to act as hosts. Initiated last year, the program asks local residents — couples preferred — to spend one month in a campground to give visitors information about camp and area services. The hosts camp for free and are asked to devote four hours a day, five days a week, to the job.

"They serve a public relations function," Mackin said, "and are able to offer some services our regular staff cannot always find time to provide. Plus, we've found that in other areas, the hosts can help to deter vandalism."

# Electric heating cost cut eyed

A provincial government proposal to give Vancouver Islanders lower electrical rates for space heating could save area homeowners hundreds of dollars each year.

Energy Minister Jack Davis said in the Legislature recently that he expects an announcement from B.C. Hydro sometime in the next week or two confirming that Vancouver Island residents will get electrical rates for space heating comparable to those paid by mainland residents whose homes are heated with natural gas.

Davis was unavailable for comment last week. However, ministry information officer Graydon Gibson said Thursday the minister is giving the proposal "serious consideration," but no details have yet been announced. He did not know, for instance, whether the Gulf Islands would be considered part of Vancouver Island, for the purposes of receiving a discount.

Gibson said ministry officials were surprised by Davis' statements in the Legislature. "This came out of the blue," he said. "It surprised me."

Although exact details of the proposal are not yet known, Gibson said it is designed to help utilize B.C.'s current surplus of electricity while at the same time giving island residents a reprieve from high heating costs. He said

completion of the Revelstoke dam gave the province more hydro-electricity than it can use, a surplus that could exist for another five or 10 years before demand catches up.

"What they're trying to do is find ways to use this electricity, rather than just let it spill over the dam," Graydon said. "There has been some success with the electricity discounts for industries, some of which have been as much as between 25 and 50 per cent. This is only for increased production, though."

Gibson would not speculate on how the proposed electricity discount for space heating would be organized. He said indications are, however, that the discount would not be applied to all electricity consumed in the home, but only that used for electrical space heating.

"I would think it would be a fairly complex issue," he said. "They (B.C. Hydro officials) would have to determine what constitutes heating costs, and the amount of electricity used by the individual for heating."

Gibson added it is unlikely the discount program will be permanent.

"But the minister has indicated he believes the program is viable on the island," he said. "We're not yet on the natural gas network like Vancouver, where home heating costs for people using gas are 60 per cent of what it costs us to heat our homes here."

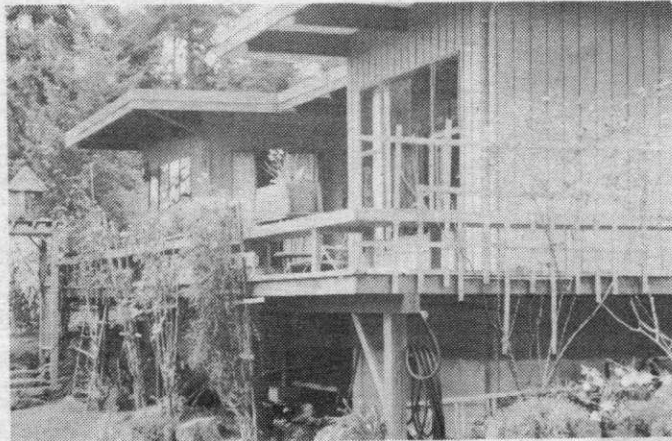

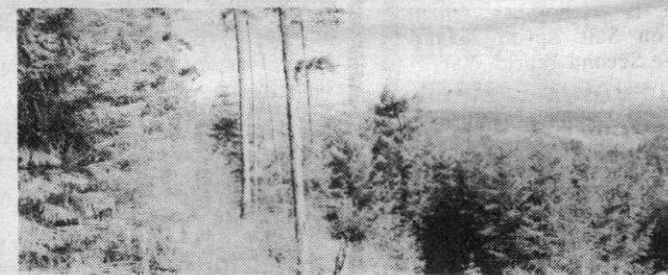

# Air show set up in Victoria

Directors of a non-profit society in Victoria have organized the region's first-ever professional air show.

To be staged at Pat Bay Airport on August 3, the show will feature aerobatic demonstrations, precision flying, military jets, helicopters, experimental and vintage aircraft in the air. On the ground will be dozens of airplanes arranged in static display.

Organizer Pat Phillips told *Driftwood* the show will attract top movie stunt pilots from the U.S. and Canada.

"We've got the performers lined up," he said. "Our show is three days before the one in Abbotsford, so the performers will come up early."

Phillips said tickets to the air show will probably be pre-sold, and that he expects a turnout of between 50,000 and 60,000 people. Attendance of that magnitude is possible, he said, because an estimated 250,000 people live within 30 miles of the show site.

The air show will be a one-day-only event, with performances staged from 11 am to 5 pm. Aerobatic and demonstration flights will be held from 1 pm to 3 pm.

Establishing an air show has been a project of the Victoria Airshow Society since it was formed in November, 1985. The society is connected to the Commonwealth Military Aviation Museum Society, which is dedicated to preserving the aircraft and history of the Royal Canadian Air Force. Among the aircraft in its collection is a bomber which crashed on Salt Spring Island during the Second World War.

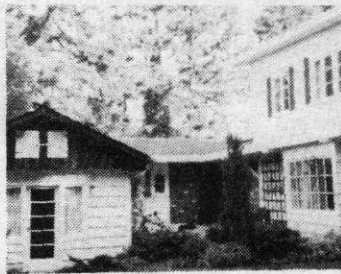

# Inflation, currency troubles hit travellers in Argentina

When writing about Argentina it would be much more pleasant to concentrate on the beauties of the country, avoiding mundane dollars and cents. But it wouldn't be realistic — visitors have to spend a good deal of time in the banks or the cambios (exchange houses), and they soon learn to shop for money as they would at home for groceries. Argentina is a financially sophisticated nation, but it has had a rocky road in the last few years. In foreign currency transactions, we're talking *caveat emptor*.

Inflation was so bad a couple of years ago that the peso, the monetary unit, was worth only a tenth of a Canadian penny. Now it is infinitely better, thanks to an economic policy presided over by economists instead of generals — it is only 10 per cent a month. The new unit, worth 1,000 pesos, is the *austral*, and the critical comparison is with the American dollar, which, when we were there, was worth A: 1.30.

That was the official rate, but there are three other rates, each getting progressively closer to the real value. There is the parallel rate, available at some exchange houses outside of Buenos Aires; there is the black market rate, quoted by shady characters who neglect to mention that as a bonus you may get free room and board in the calabozo; and there is the market rate, which offers purchasers of goods two prices, the austral being sometimes double the dollar.

We were sad to see that in this horse-trading our own Canadian dollar came in last — it was only exchangeable at the official rate.

Having seen all of the TV hype about the awful fate of travellers without American Express traveller's cheques, we converted 80 per cent of our hoard before leaving Canada. It was a big mistake, at least in Buenos Aires, because at best the low official rate prevailed, and to beat the system by converting back into U.S. dollars was almost impossible.

Even the good, grey Royal Bank of Canada, Buenos Aires branch, extracted a 10 per cent fee, and took half a morning to do so. The warm feeling we got when we saw the Royal Bank logo in the southern hemisphere quickly cooled when they hit us with this all-Canadian heist.

Argentine military history isn't really extensive. In the last century and a half, except for the ill-starred Falklands adventure, it has consisted of a war of extermination against the Indians, occasional small-scale huffing and puffing with Chile, and some internal battling between the spear

carriers of political groups.

But in the early 1800s it was another matter, and the military glory from that time continues to illuminate the soul of Argentina. Early in the century the British attacked Buenos Aires, and were twice thrown out by the brave portenos. Then came the war of independence from Spain, and its heroes are commemorated in the squares and streets of virtually every town. Jose San Martin was a truly great leader, who defeated the Spanish army, and then led his gauchos over the Andes to liberate Chile and Peru as well. His name has been given to thousands of main streets and plazas and parks, as have those of his lieutenants, such as Guemes and Belgrano. Others are called after significant independence dates — the first of May, or the ninth of July.

Every city of any consequence has statuary of one or more of the great generals, often with a company of soldiers, horses and all.

Stupendous or modest, these are scattered all over the country, whereas we Canadians are content with the occasional verdigris-green statues of our usually ho-hum legislators. But such gloria isn't for us — we inherited the deep-seated British mistrust of the military, and it is probable that even if we had as stirring a leader as San Martin, we still wouldn't spend much on statues. We would honour, but not glorify him.

Argentina's turbulent history proves the saying (which I paraphrase) that a too powerful military, without prospect of an external enemy, will find one at home.

## Twenty-five years ago

• According to a trustee's report, taxation loomed as a possibility for ratepayers of the North Salt Spring Waterworks District.

The district board recommended that all trustees give careful consideration to all requirements and then contemplate the fairest form of taxation necessary to support a loan for the purpose.

• Judge Joseph B. Clarihue of Victoria handed down a decision in favour of J.M. Evans, a Ganges school principal who sued School District 64 for payment of part of an increment awarded by an arbitration board in 1961.

The amount of money involved in the law suit was \$150. According to the judgment, it was a friendly test case designed to secure an interpretation of the award by the arbitration board. It was not known if School District 64 planned to appeal the case.

• Several members of the local Progressive Conservative group met at the Harbour House Hotel to organize the party's members on Salt Spring for the coming election.

Officers of the group were: Maurice Atkins, Des Crofton, Mrs. George Laundry and Dorothy Atkins.

• A free trip to the World's Fair, given away by Salt Spring Island firemen at their annual dance, was won by Fred Morris.

## Twenty years ago

• Representatives of the Masonic Order on Salt Spring Island offered to take over Central Hall if the public should continue to be apathetic about its future.

William Palmer, president of the hall committee, explained that when no one attended the earlier annual meeting, J.G. Reid called and suggested that the Masonic Order might be interested in renovating and using the hall if some agreement could be reached with the community.

• Two Victorians did well when they went fishing on Salt Spring during the weekend.

Eric Marles and Terry Newberry took nine bass totalling 25 pounds in weight. The fish ranged from one to three pounds each.

• Col. D.G. Crofton reported an attack on his sheep during the weekend.

Two sheep were mauled by dogs and one was killed. Ganges RCMP repeated the warning that dogs may not wander at night. Any dog found wandering at night was a legitimate target and could be shot on sight.

• *What Does the Future Hold for Lady Minto Hospital?* might well have been the title of an address given by Douglas Cavaye, chair-

man of the hospital's board of management.

Cavaye discussed present and future problems that he felt needed to be solved by the board. The new legislation governing regional hospital districts and how it would affect Lady Minto hospital was a concern to all board members, he added.

## Fifteen years ago

• It was reported that the population of North Galiano could reach 10,000 if MacMillan Bloedel developed its property there.

Capital Regional District executive director Dennis Young made the prediction after a series of discussions with the lumber company. The company, he said, was considering developing the property at a projected rate of three lots per acre.

• One man died when a car left the road at Ganges.

A sailor serving on the *HMCS Cowichan* died when the vehicle in which he was a passenger left the road and plunged into the water. Scuba diver Don Irwin had helped attach a cable to the car so it could be pulled out of the water.

• A Lower Ganges Road resident reported that her cat had been wounded by a .22 calibre rifle shell.

The cat managed to drag itself home after being shot in the leg

and shoulder. It was being treated by Dr. David Lott, and its owner was hoping the cat would survive.

• Two large fishboats were set adrift in Whalers Bay, but owner Bud Baines was alerted to the danger before his vessels ran aground.

Baines, owner of the 45-foot *Helenside* and the 34-foot *Jessica*, was angered by the incident and was hoping to locate the culprits.

## Ten years ago

• New and expanded facilities at Harbour's End Marina were only the beginning of a massive program of expansion and development, according to owners Chuck Hankins and Adam Morrison.

With mooring space now available for approximately 65 vessels, they were looking to add another 200 berthing spaces before the year was out. They also hoped to construct a breakwater to enable the marina's patrons to moor their vessels there all year long.

• Correction notices were to be given to various Ganges businesses ordering them to upgrade their sewage disposal systems.

Health Inspector Don Iffe told *Driftwood* that 27 dye tests had been carried out to date, 13 of which had indicated malfunctioning sewage disposal systems.

### Five years ago

• School trustees accepted a proposal from the Gulf Islands Teachers' Association that would allow six classroom aides to keep their jobs until the end of the year.

The aides had received letters from the school board indicating their positions would be terminated at the end of April. The job cuts were necessary, according to trustees, to cope with funding cuts imposed under the provincial government's restraint program.

• Construction of the Ganges sewer system was a go.

The Capital Regional District brought the sewer debate back to life by passing a resolution to lift the moratorium on construction of the system.

• The regional board approved a resolution calling on the ministry of municipal affairs to form Salt Spring Island into a district municipality.

The resolution urged incorporation on the grounds that it would eliminate the division of jurisdiction between the CRD and Islands Trust.

• Children with special needs attending Gulf Islands schools were scheduled to receive help through the efforts of a special needs team.

The concept was introduced at a school board meeting by acting director of instruction Larry Holbrook, who suggested the proposal be phased into full operation by September.

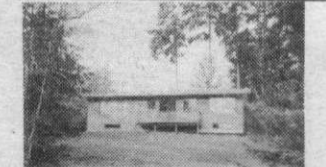

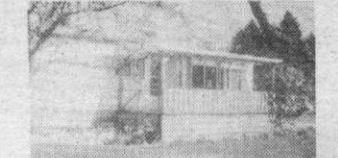
