

PROGRAMS

G.I.P.S.Y.

G.I.P.S.Y., the Gulf Island Program Serving Youth presents an alternative to regular high school for students between the ages of 15 and 19. In addition to the basic required academic courses, students actively participate in a work experience program where they learn vocational skills "on the job." Students have the opportunity for outdoor recreation and participate in field trips throughout the year. They raise money for these trips by such projects as constructing canoes, carwashes and this year they provided a food concession for the Community Centre Craft Faire and a craft booth at which they also raffled a handmade quilt.

The school operates from a house and workshop located behind the Community Centre. This program is jointly funded by the School Board and the Ministry of Human Resources. Len Sokol is the teacher and Patricia Nobile is the youth worker. The program accommodates a maximum of 12 students. For more information phone 537-2851.

Activity Group

This group is designed to meet the needs of our mental health clients. It meets once a week and provides workshops in vocational training (wood working, gardening and cooking) and special needs training in nutrition, budgeting and health issues. For more information phone 537-5251.

Parent Support

Support, information and resources are available to parents of special needs children. For information, phone 537-5251.

Life Skills Program

This program provides a one-to-one worker for developmentally handicapped adults. Its purpose is to ease the transition from an institutional setting to a group home or to an independent living situation. It concentrates on life skills such as social behaviour, budgeting and cooking. It also addresses use of leisure time, community resources and use of transportation. This is a short-term contract usually lasting a maximum of six months.

Recycle Depot

If you've been trashing your tins and bottles and newspapers, stop now and consider the following. Between 50 and 70 per cent of the garbage thrown into the dump could be recycled. While money saved may be the prime motivator when people begin to recycle, the environmental sense it makes has many rewards. For example: less air pollution, less water pollution and tremendous energy savings. Reduce, re-use, recycle: Reduce the amount of overpackaged products that you use. Buy the ones with less packaging. Re-use bags and jars as much as possible and it will save money. Recycle what is not used.

The Salt Spring Island Recycle Depot is processing an ever-increasing volume of recyclables. Please take the time to recycle properly. This cuts down the amount of garbage we have to take to the dump and helps the workers at the depot tremendously.

We accept only:

- Newspapers tied in bundles
- Clean, corrugated cardboard tied in bundles
- Brown paper bags, magazines, computer and ledger paper
- Clean glass bottles and jars with lids removed
- Cleaned, flattened tin cans
- Clean aluminum foil
- Used auto oil

Please note we do not accept window glass, and that glass is colour sorted before it is smashed.

Solid waste disposal has become a problem everywhere but particularly here on Salt Spring with our own dump in a fragile watershed area. Reducing and recycling household garbage will lessen the quantity of garbage going into our landfill. Please do not dispose of pesticides, wood preservatives or other hazardous and toxic wastes at the dump or down the drain. Watch the *Driftwood* for dates of pesticide pick-ups at the Farmers' Market by the Ministry of the Environment.

The depot is run by one part-time worker with help from an Achievement Centre handicapped worker. We need volunteers.

Our depot is presently located in the parking lot in front of Ganges Auto Marine off Park Drive.

We need help fixing up the depot. A work blitz is planned for June 13. Please come and bring tools: hammers, rakes and shovels.

Leisure Buddies

This year, the Salt Spring Island Achievement Centre would like to initiate a leisure buddy program in this community. Based on the same principles as the Big Brothers Association, this program would see volunteers matched up with developmentally handicapped adults of similar interests.

Leisure activities provide many benefits to our clients, enabling them to participate in community-based activities such as Adult Education classes or the Island Cinema. They also promote normalization and appropriate social skills. Those of our clients who have finally achieved independence, living in their own homes, cooking, shopping and managing for themselves, often encounter loneliness for the first time in their lives. Most have come from an institutional setting where one is never alone. A buddy could familiarize them with recreational, educational and community resources, encouraging them to participate and make new friends.

Other clients, most of whom are still living in group settings, rarely have an opportunity to go out on their own. Every social activity is either provided by the group home or the Achievement Centre. It is very difficult to instill a sense of self-esteem and independence in one who is rarely recognized as an individual with individual needs.

This program would endeavor to compensate volunteers for expenses such as mileage, ferry fares and other expenses. It would also train volunteers and provide information on resources available. 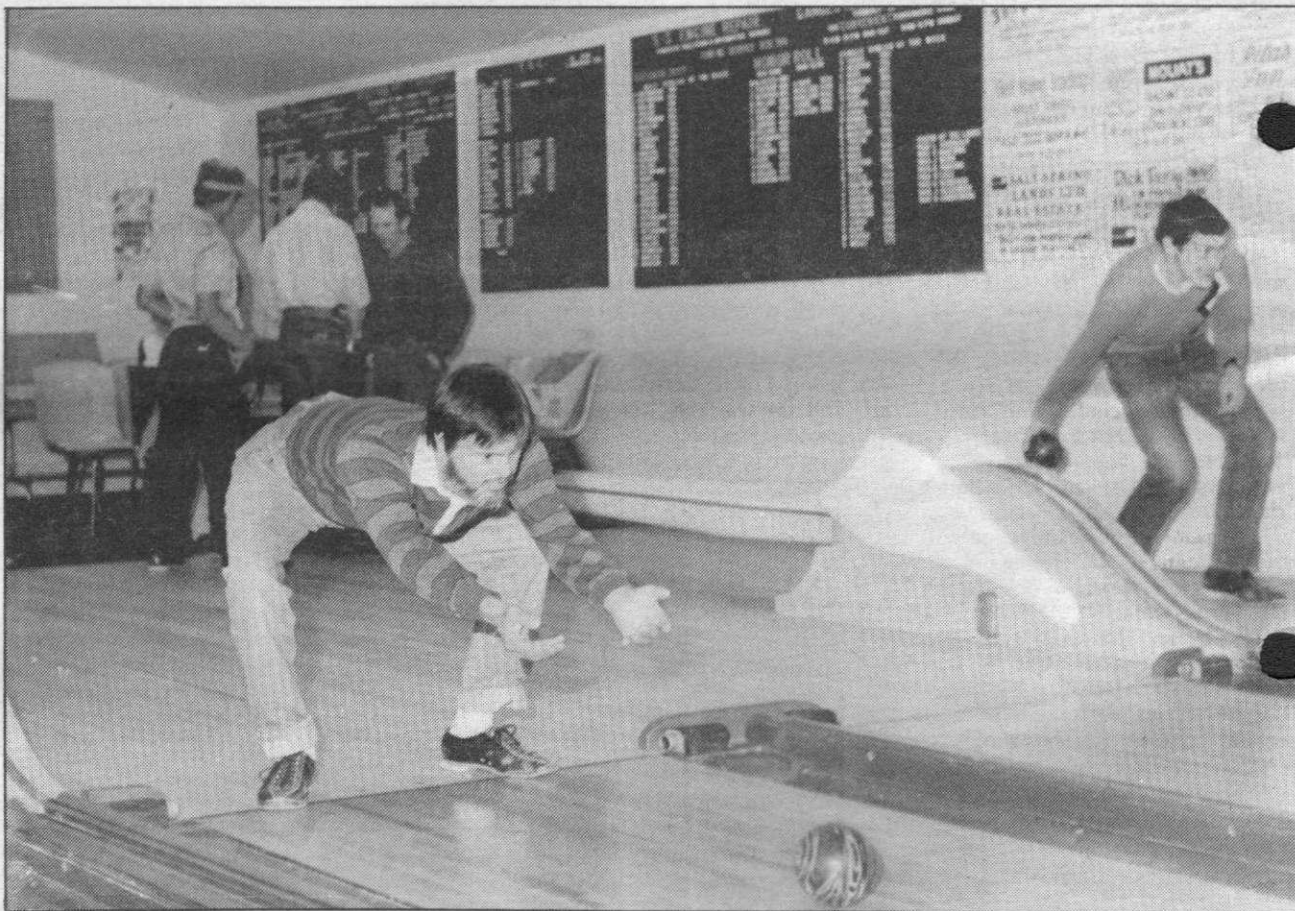
Hands-on Training

Three years ago, the Achievement Centre started a hands-on training program. We provided a worker to assist, train and supervise our clients in various jobs. These mainly consist of garden work, wood stacking, rock and slash picking, kindling chopping, seaweed collection and tending to our own market garden. We sell our products at the Farmers' Market and here our clients learn how to make change and manage money.

People interested in having work done, phone the centre and a staff member will go out to visit and assess the site. Job size and difficulty determines crew size and capability. Payment is either discussed at this point or the person can choose to make a donation. This on-the-job training provides our clients with an opportunity to learn basic vocational skills as well as to meet people from the community. Some of our participants have been hired repeatedly for such jobs as lawn mowing, and have developed meaningful relationships with these customers. We have also acquired long-term contracts from some clients who are pleased with our work and enjoy supporting the program.

The Farmers' Market provides an excellent social and educational setting. The community is becoming more aware of us and some support us on an on-going basis. Without this support, we could not continue to run our programs because funding is very limited. Recently, we received a grant from the United Way which has enabled us to continue this program. The hands-on training program permits us to purchase much-needed supplies as well as pay our participants a small stipend. These monies may then be used for camping fees or other outings.

Theatre troupe may visit

Preparations are underway to bring a horse-drawn theatrical troupe to the Gulf Islands in early August.

The Caravan Stage Company told *Driftwood* last week it is contacting various local groups to fine-tune arrangements for a mini-tour through Salt Spring, Galiano, Mayne and Pender islands.

Penny Joy, the group's tour co-ordinator, said she is working to line up community sponsorship of the caravan's site requirements, like feed and water for its teams of horses. A venue for performances has been selected — the schoolground on Rainbow Road — and contact has been made with the Community Arts Council (CAC), Chamber of Commerce, Off Centre Stage and other groups who may be able to help with logistical support.

The company plans to visit Salt Spring on August 6, 7 and 8. It will travel to Mayne Island for performances on August 14 and 15, then to Galiano on August 18 and 19, and finally to Pender on August 21 and 22.

Joy described the Caravan Stage Company as a non-profit group launched 16 years ago in Sooke, B.C. "It's been on the road ever since," she said, explaining that it tours Canada during the summer and is based in the Cowichan Valley during the remainder of the year.

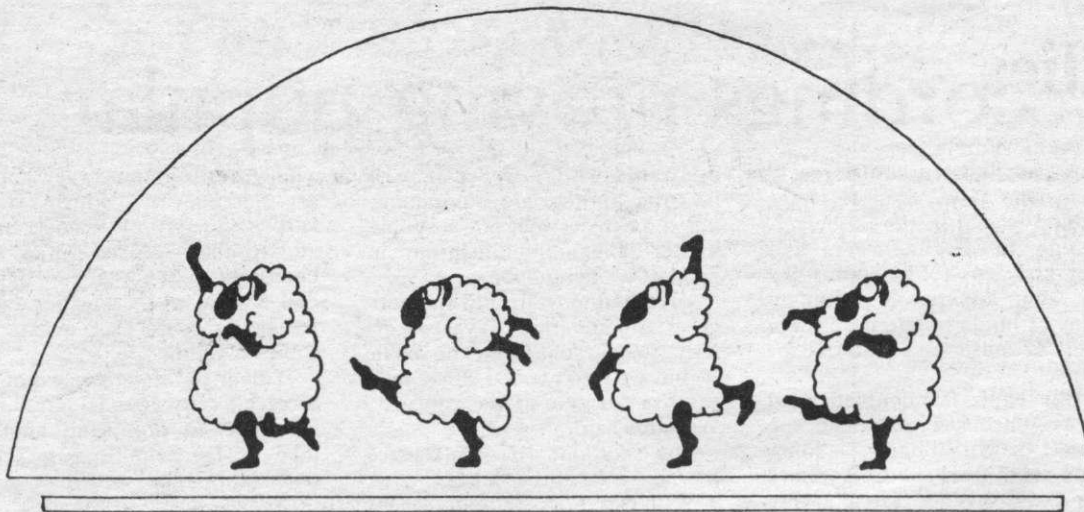
The group includes four caravan wagons drawn by 10 Clydesdale horses, a big-top tent and a company of 17 actors, technicians, teamsters and musicians.

Joy said the philosophy behind the company is to promote and perform works originating from the "grassroots level."

This year, its tour will see performances of *A Good Baby*, written by Leon Rooke, a Victoria-based Governor-General's Award-winning author and playwright. The work is described as an evocative musical satire which questions the institutionalization of both religion and gender roles, "in a manner that is alternately comic and thoughtful."

Joy said the company's Gulf Islands tour — its first-ever — will be part of a larger circuit marking its return to the Vancouver Island area after summers spent in Eastern Canada, the Pacific Northwest and Alberta. Other stops on the tour include most Vancouver Island communities between Campbell River and Victoria, plus Hornby Island.

An information kit supplied by the company notes that rehearsals for *A Good Baby* will be held at its Tzouhalem Road farm in Duncan between now and early June, and that openings exist for actors, technicians, musicians, a farrier and a cook.

Off Centre Stage to offer 'living biographies' session

Off Centre Stage will present *Meetings With Remarkable People* on June 5 and 6.

The performances, set for 8 pm each night, offer audiences the concept of "living biography" introduced by director Alex Bruhanski as part of his theatre training workshops.

Using all available research material, the actor assumes the persona of a well-known historical figure. Three such people will be introduced at the Off Centre Stage event. They are:

- Georgia O'Keefe was an eccentric American artist reputed to be one of the most original painters that country has produced. Her career spanned virtually the entire history of modern American art, and she was the first woman artist whose face and life were of great interest to the public. Her

first exhibit was in 1917, and she died in 1986 while in her 90s.

- American comedian Lenny Bruce's brand of controversial and thought-provoking humor reflected the 1960s. His comedy had serious overtones in its questioning of basic values.

- Mother Theresa has assisted the poor and homeless in the slums of India for decades. For her humanitarian work, she has received the Nobel Prize.

The three personalities will be presented in the forms of alter-egos Yarrow Sheehan, Sid Filkow and Sally Sunshine. Each will be introduced, will address the audience and then be available to answer questions.

Cassette tape sold well

Singers' recordings proving popular

The Salt Spring Singers are proving to be as popular on tape as they are in person.

The 45-voice singing group, which regularly packs local halls for concerts, has produced a one-hour cassette tape featuring favourite selections. And the tape is in as much demand as a ticket to a Singers concert.

Helga Williams, credited by the group with being the driving force behind production of the cassette, said last week that all 90 copies of the tape were sold out within a few weeks of first being offered to the public. New copies are now being made to meet the demand.

Williams explained that the tape is a fund-raising project

related to the group's recent expansion. The Singers have doubled in size in the past year, growing to 45 members, and embarked on refinements like new stage apparel. It meant an outlay of funds to purchase more sheets of music and material for outfits.

"Our expenses doubled, and our audience size remained the same," said Williams, adding that a grant from the Community Arts Council is the group's only outside source of funds.

"We bought the music and bought material for the outfits, then found we had no money — so we decided to make the tape and sell it," she continued.

Recording was done with the

assistance of Ray Newman, who had the appropriate equipment, but the project was not a simple matter of standing the group in front of a microphone.

"We had to wait until we were close to our (mid-May) concert date, so everyone knew the music — but we also needed 90 copies" to offer for sale at the concerts, Williams said.

The solution? "I didn't leave the house for three days."

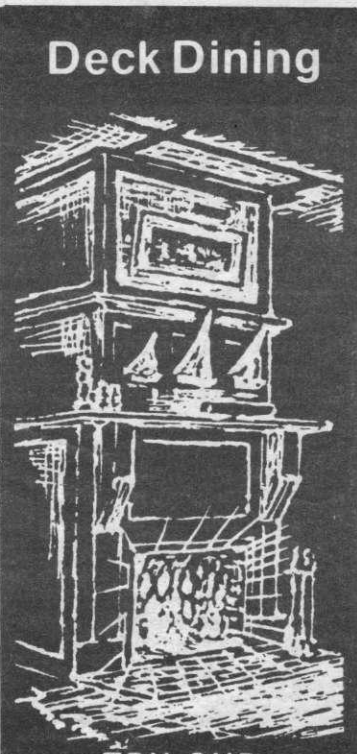
With Newman, Williams spent five hours editing and applying production techniques to the master tape. Then she used a high-speed dubbing cassette deck in her home to produce copy after copy of the tape.

The effort proved to be worth-

while. "We sold quite a few copies at the concert, which really surprised us," Williams said, adding that 90-plus copies had been sold — at \$5 each — by the end of last week. Further tapes are being made as requests for copies come in.

Williams said the success of the project is causing consideration to be given to producing another tape of favourite Singers selections, this time a collection of Christmas music to be offered in conjunction with the groups annual Yule concerts.

Tango's alluring qualities remain, as album by band Quartango attests

I sat in the corner, feeling secure in my shadowy recess, my table bearing discarded tomes and scholarly discourses. The mahogany panels, the large globe secured to the inaccessible ceiling fixture by tarnished chain, dust webs clinging stubbornly, the not uncomfortable but somewhat musty atmosphere — these details encouraged introspection. This was a place for serious pursuits or dilettantish indulgence, an antiquarian dealer to be sure, with rows upon rows of volumes occupying the perimeter.

I could view clients as they arrived through the door on the wall to my left. The door on the wall; it felt as if there was no outside, that this was the only place.

At the far corner of the long room, opposite the portal, were two steps to a landing, a turn to the left and two more steps to a curtain concealing the brackish annex. A table stood between the portal and the steps.

That afternoon a client arrived from the outside, a leaden pallor intruding and then diffused. He adjusted his spectacles, acknowledged my presence and moved to a chair at the far table. He sat toward the wall opposite me secluding himself. From the back he appeared as one waiting for the physician to beckon, thumbing anxiously through the journals.

A woman crossed the room to him. In a deep-throated, sultry voice she said: "Did you come to dance?"

He rose to meet her gaze, her simple unadorned garment responding to her frame as she turned. She tilted her pelvis and said "Tango?" Passion flared, Latin rhythms ignited the air. His lifeless London Fog fell to the ground. Oh my God, I thought, is this for real? A warm welling

current of air played on the annex curtains, the murky interior now lit with the taste of tango.

I don't want to spoil the mood but this is only one of many fantasies that could be constructed around *Tango*.

Two years ago I had the pleasure of hearing and seeing a quartet called *Quartango* at the Vancouver Folk Festival. These guys are not your average folkies but are classically trained musicians who bring scholarship and skill to a complex musical form, one which has its roots in the immigrant communities (mostly of "unloved men") of Argentina at the end of the 19th century.

Tango spoke of passion, exploitation and unrequited love in a place where social values and working conditions were dismal. The musical sentiments are not unlike what we hear in the black American blues and jazz traditions. But the Latin origins remind us of the stop-start flamenco dances of Spain and the more melancholy Portuguese melodies of Brazil. The liner notes in *Quartango's* first album state that "the tango has an alluring quality linked with hot sinuous rhythm, said to echo the act of love by working up faster and faster, suddenly to die — a veritable confession of love with the feet." Be careful!

Although its beginnings are humble, the tango gained great

popularity in the elegant social circles of Europe and America before the First World War. However, its condemnation by the Catholic Church prevented it from gaining respectability in its country of birth, particularly for women and the "cultured class."

Rudolf Valentino's films popularized the dance in North America, and it was not until acceptance was gained elsewhere that Argentina embraced and celebrated this element of its history and culture.

Quartango's album features Romulo Larrea on Bandoneon, an instrument of the accordion variety; Adolf Bornstein, violin; Richard Hunt, piano; and Rene Gosselin, double bass. The album is distributed on the Musica Viva label by CBC Enterprises catalogue #MV 1014. Tango, anyone?

The Vancouver Folk Festival at Jericho Beach Park will be on July 17, 18 and 19 this year. Early bird cheap tickets must be ordered before June 30. More info is available at the festival office, 3271 Main Street, Vancouver, V5V 3M6.

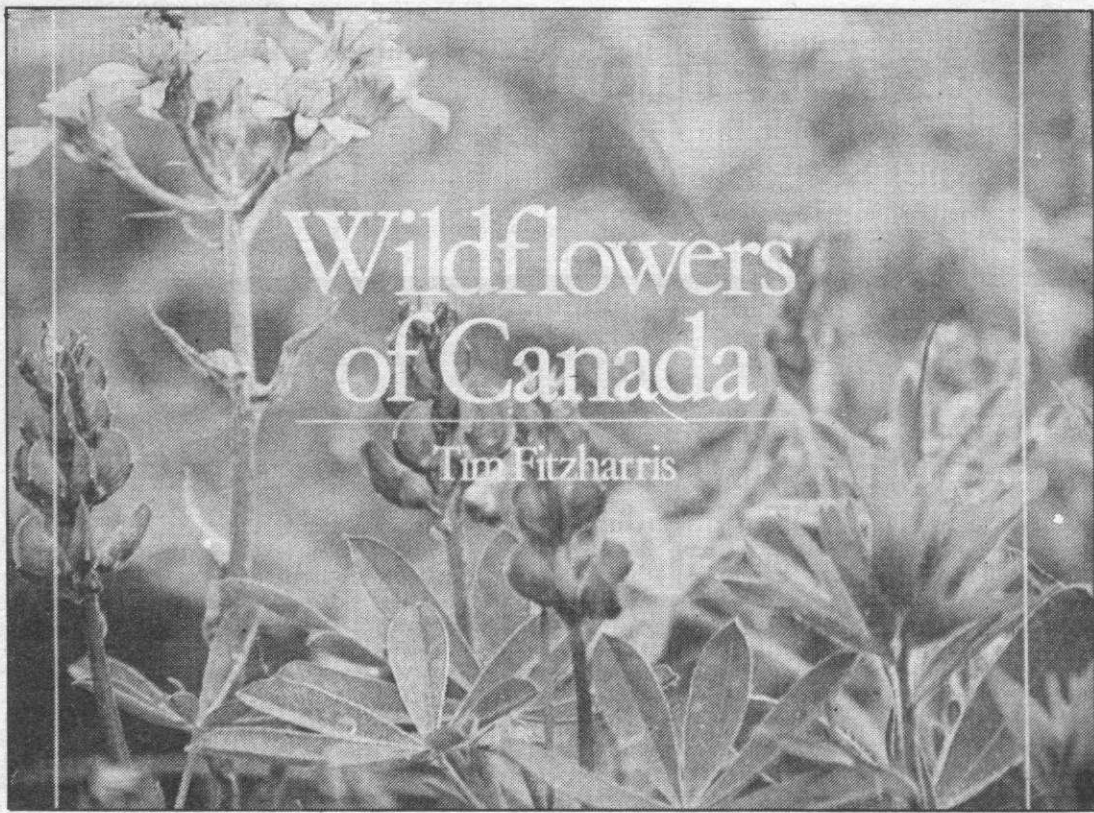

Fitzharris' book on wildflowers another visual and cerebral treat

Wildflowers of Canada, by Tim Fitzharris. Published by Oxford University Press.

Tim Fitzharris has a knack for combining visual entertainment with education. His 1986 book, *British Columbia Wild (Driftwood review, November 12, 1986)*, showed us the staggering beauty of this province's flora and fauna while supplying enough text to use as the basis for an advanced high school natural sciences course.

Fitzharris has since taken the same formula used in *British Columbia Wild*, applied it to the realm of Canada's wildflowers and emerged with another visual and cerebral treat.

Wildflowers of Canada is much more than a book of pretty pictures, although those alone will tempt many prospective book purchasers. The book contains all the elements needed to turn a browse into a learning experience: delicate line drawings by Diana Thompson point out the differences and proportions of flower to stem and leaf, allowing the outdoor enthusiast to make proper identifications in the field; complete species descriptions by Audrey Fraggalosch (who worked

with Fitzharris on *British Columbia Wild*) gives us a synopsis of every plant featured, including habitat and tidbits like which animals eat the seeds or leaves; and a text by Fitzharris which divides the homes of Canada's wildflowers into four regions — woodland, wetland, prairie and meadow, and alpine tundra — and explains the peculiarities of each.

Other strong points to the technical side of this book are the easy-to-read and use glossary, index and references contained on the back pages. Of particular help is the glossary section which explains the scientific terms for species, and the reference section guiding interested readers to other helpful books on topics covered.

Aside from the photographs, which are more than up to the usual high standards of work Fitzharris has established in his previous books, the real beauty of *Wildflowers of Canada* is the effort made by the author to share with us the inside secrets that make his photographs of wildflowers so stunning.

Without perching himself on a high horse, Fitzharris notes that

"dramatic, definitive portraits (of wildflowers) require considerable skill and effort" — and then tells us exactly how to achieve something close to the results that have become his signature.

(None of us is likely to do just that, but we can still applaud the magician's willingness to let us backstage and see the rabbits before they are put into the hat).

It's all there: equipment, types of film to use for certain results, lighting choices and artistic arrangements, all covered in an easy-to-understand manner that tempts you to dash into the backyard and try the methods immediately.

I can't say enough about *Wildflowers of Canada*. It succeeds as a reference manual, a textbook, an album of photos, a photographer's guide and a collection of field notes. Any one of those attributes makes the book a worthy addition to a library — taken together, it's a must.

Other works by Fitzharris include *British Columbia Wild*, *The Island: A Natural History of Vancouver Island*, and contributions to magazines like *Beautiful B.C.* and *Equinox*.

Well-known wildlife veterinarian gives entertaining talk on Pender

Dr. Helen Schwantje, the only woman wildlife veterinarian in Canada, gave an informative and amusing lecture — complete with slides — at the Pender Island Community Centre on May 14.

The lecture, part of the Outreach series organized by the Pender Island Reading Society, was about the veterinarian's role in wildlife management.

Dr. Schwantje's interest in animals began at an early age, mainly as a result of reading Gerald Durrell's books, and led her into the veterinary field.

The places she has worked, including Australia and the Arctic, are almost as varied as the animals she has worked with. Dr. Schwantje is especially interested in big-game species, doing her post-graduate work on Rocky Mountain Bighorn Sheep. These animals are more numerous in British Columbia than anywhere else in the world, and few other places have as many species — Rocky Mountain, California, Stone and Dall.

Dr. Schwantje was curious as to why the Rocky Mountain Bighorn Sheep have gone through periodic 20 year die-offs, so she started a project to study the health of the animals. After much observation and examination, she was able to make certain recommendations to the B.C. Fish and Wildlife Association, which included maintaining the proper sheep numbers in specific range areas, controlling the number of elk and mule deer to reduce competition for food, and supplementing the mineral intake of the herds.

Dr. Schwantje also found large

numbers of lungworms in many sheep.

Another project that Dr. Schwantje worked on involved determining the range and distribution of Dall sheep in the Arctic area. Everyday, a helicopter flew the researchers out to the Richardson Mountains, close to the Arctic Ocean. By firing net-guns (guns that fire triangular pieces of net weighted with leads) out the open helicopter door, they were able to capture 13 rams. The rams were then fitted with radio collars so their positions could be monitored.

Dr. Schwantje is also interested in big-game farming, and worked on a study to determine the feasibility of herding musk-oxen. Thirteen calves were captured to study their reproductive cycle. These calves are now four years old

and have completed three successive breeding seasons. To help fund this project, the wool from the musk-oxen was harvested. The wool, called *kivia*, is eight times warmer than conventional wool, is lightweight, waterproof, and sells for about \$150 a pound.

When asked about this year's apparent scarcity of deer on Pender Island, Dr. Schwantje said that because no actual studies have been conducted, nothing specific could be said. She did mention, however, that low deer numbers can perhaps be attributed to an increase in parasite levels, to a decrease in foraging areas, or to fewer births. In high density areas, low birth rates can be the result of females re-absorbing the fetus to prevent overpopulation.

Fifty-four join in walkathon for local society

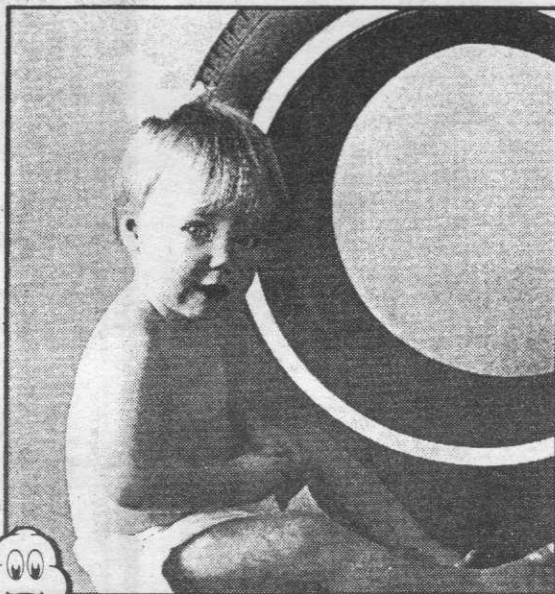

Ferry schedule imperfect, but not without merit

The summer schedule for the Gulf Islands sailings of the B.C. Ferry Corporation has now been approved and is posted in the ticket booth at Sturdies Bay. The service to Tsawwassen is not much changed, leaving Galiano at 0830, arriving 0920, returning from the Mainland 0950 and calling at Sturdies Bay at 1045 — but only on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday does the *Queen of Burnaby* proceed to Long Harbour.

Visits to Ganges are, therefore, for all practical purposes, restricted to the three mid-week days. (How on earth will the Galiano column get to *Driftwood* by the usual Monday deadline?)

The evening ferry will call at Sturdies Bay at 1745 for Tsawwassen and the return sailing will depart at 1910 except on Monday and Thursday which are late sailing days. The mid-day ferry on Sunday will leave Sturdies Bay at 1230.

The changes to the Swartz Bay schedule are more drastic. The vessel for the Outer Islands run will be the *Queen of Tsawwassen* which, with its greater capacity, should be able to take all Galiano vehicles bound for Victoria. However, this ferry will sail from Sturdies Bay and leave at 0640, except on Sunday when you are allowed an extra 15 minutes in bed. Arrival at Swartz Bay is timed for 0815. There is the same schedule for the *Queen of Tsawwassen* each day of the week except Sunday. The sailing at 1005 from Swartz Bay becomes the mid-morning ferry for Galiano leaving Sturdies Bay at 1145, arriving Swartz Bay at 1315. The afternoon ferry will leave at 1430 from Swartz Bay and arrive at Galiano at 1610, continuing back to Swartz Bay by 1715. The evening ferry will leave each day at 1915 and call at Sturdies Bay at 2020. This schedule is due to commence on Thursday, June 18.

Shirley Coulter, Galiano's representative to the Outer Island Ferry Schedule Committee, anticipates that there will be the usual howls of outrage. Obviously one cannot please all of the people all of the time and it is not too difficult to displease most of the people part of the time, but Shirley thinks that on the whole it is not a bad schedule, and that for Galiano ferry users there are more gains than losses. It seems a pity that the committee cannot publish a tentative schedule and allow some public input, thereby deflecting some of the criticism before the actual schedule is finalized.

Saltery Bay

In last week's column in *Driftwood* we discussed the petition being circulated regarding the proposed development of the Saltery Bay area. The present status of the foreshore residentially zoned lot and the Water C (Commercial) Zone was described. Shirley Chambers reports on the public meeting held in the North Galiano Community Hall on Saturday, May 23, as follows.

The first part of the meeting, under the chairmanship of Bill Cook, was devoted to ascertaining the facts regarding the proposal of Peter Klauai of Galiano Fishing Charters to develop Saltery Bay as a marina. Klauai has asked the provincial government to disregard the results of the Island Trust public hearing which resulted in a bylaw to downgrade the zoning to Water A. After three readings this bylaw has gone to the ministry of municipal affairs for

approval.

Klauai has applied for a water lease for his company, and an inquiry by the ministry of forests and lands into the feasibility and acceptability of this proposal is in progress. Several other provincial and federal departments are to be consulted, but so far there seems to be no provision for consulting the public, particularly neighbouring property holders and those most affected.

Copies of the developer's proposal, including a rough sketch of the area, were passed out at the meeting. Klauai declined to comment on his plan on the grounds that all the information was available in the proposal. The plan shows a large area of dredging, addition of fill to straighten the present shoreline, the construction of a boat ramp and parallel to this, running into the dredged area a wharf. The underpinning of the wharf would be secured by riprap. A 20 by 25 foot storage building would be built on the residentially-zoned land. As many as 25 mooring buoys would be anchored in the bay, and Klauai has applied for an extension of the water lease to encompass several more hectares of the adjacent water.

David Nichol of Reid Island was in favour of any proposal that would give him and other summer home-owners on Reid Island more convenient access from Galiano to their property. It was pointed out that there are other alternatives such as obtaining permission from the Kuper Island Indian Band to use Baines Bay, or repair of the launching ramp by Spanish Hills Store. Island Trust representatives noted that the Coon Bay area is expected to be given provincial park status by October, and that there will almost certainly be a launching ramp constructed there.

Residents in the Saltery Bay area are concerned about the limited area for parking, the destruction of the kelp beds, the loss of the beach area and the various kinds of pollution that would inevitably result from a development of this sort.

The public meeting was then adjourned but those interested were invited to remain to discuss setting up a society to fight the marina proposal. More than 30 people agreed to work together and formed the Saltery Bay Preservation Association, electing Shirley Chambers as president, Elizabeth Ocsko as secretary and Norman Russell as treasurer. This group would doubtless welcome support through additional memberships, signing of their petition and private representations made to our two local MLAs, the two Galiano trustees and, since the federal government is involved, our MP.

Elsbeth has sold her home and is leaving for Shawnigan with the best wishes of a host of her friends and admirers.

The Spanish Hills Store has changed hands. The burden of operating the store during the long illness of her husband, and after his death alone, has proved too much for Vivienne Brooke-Hart despite valiant help from her son and friends. Now Vivienne has sold the store to Paul Piotrowski and Carmen Braund. This young couple have been on Galiano for about three years renting on Alder Way and then living on their boat in Whaler Bay. Reports read at Pender service society meet

PENDER ISLANDS — The annual general meeting of the Pender Island Community Service Society, held May 11, heard reports from officers and elected an executive for the coming year.

The meeting, held in the community room at the school and conducted by president Muriel Wallace, elected the following

slate for the 1987-88 term: Kay Cowton, president; Anita Blanchard, vice-president; Mary Ripley, corresponding secretary; Barbara Fraser, recording secretary; and Eleanor Carey, treasurer.

In addition, Phoebe Galpin was given responsibility for publicity, Jean Chalmers was placed in charge of scheduling the work-

hours timetable and Viola Stoltzmann was named head of the finance committee.

The treasurer's report for the 1986-87 year listed a profit of \$14,038.39 — an increase of about \$3,000 over the past year. It was also noted that donations of \$8,321.73 were made by the society to various community causes.

The society has approximately 70 members who take turns each month working in various ways at the Nu-To-Yu shop located at the James Auchterlonie Centre. The store is the society's source of funds.

The annual general meeting, attended by about 40 society members, saw incoming president Kay Cowton present retiring president Muriel Wallace with a

silver tray. Cowton, in turn, was given a new hand-made gavel by Wallace. It is a society custom that each retiring president keeps her gavel as a permanent memento of her service to the organization.

Last year, the society handed out a bursary to a Pender Island student continuing studies after high school. This year, the members plan to do the same.

Rally set to protest noise from copters

Several Outer Islands residents are expected to attend a demonstration scheduled for 5 pm today at Victoria's Camel Point heliport.

Murray Rankin, a part-time Outer Islands resident and Victoria lawyer, said Monday the rally has been organized to protest the rapidly-increasing number of helicopter flights between Vancouver and Victoria, as well as growing use of the Camel Point heliport.

"There will be people there from Pender and Saturna, and possibly from Mayne, as well as some from community organizations in Victoria," Rankin continued. "There will be a Vancouver representative attending as well,

as there are people there concerned about this as well."

Helijet Airways, a Lower Mainland company, is flying eight or more commuter flights daily between B.C.'s two largest cities. Its flight path extends over several of the Outer Islands, and residents say noise created by the helicopters' passage is a nuisance.

"With more people on the islands out with their barbecues, it (noise from the helicopters) is only going to be even more annoying," Rankin noted.

Rankin encouraged island residents opposing the helicopter service to attend today's rally.

"We're all in this together," he said.

Galiano resort to get loan from government

Government officials announced last week that Bodega Resort Ltd. of Galiano Island has been awarded a \$142,600 low-interest loan to assist its \$600,000 expansion project.

Federal tourism minister Bernard Valcourt, B.C. tourism minister Bill Reid and economic development minister Grace McCarthy made the announcement at a press conference held May 15.

The funding will be used by Bodega Resort to complete renovation and expansion work already in progress.

Stephen Ocsko, who assumed ownership of Bodega Resort approximately five years ago, said he has already added a large lodge complex as well as several chalets.

"It was two years ago when we applied for this," said Ocsko, who indicated the government's low-interest loan has made upgrading work on the resort possible. "The project went ahead without it, and

we now have seven cabins in operation. Three more chalets are coming, and the lodge has been completed."

Ocsko was in the process of moving into the new 5,000-square-foot lodge when contacted Friday. He noted that the goal of this expansion project has been to make Bodega a "destination resort."

"We have our horse-riding facilities, and several trout ponds are now in. We've done the landscaping for a tennis court that will be completed next year . . . and we have roughed in a swimming pool," he stated. "We're a family resort."

The Bodega Resort project is one of 17 in B.C. to receive funding through a federal-provincial program established under the Economic and Regional Development Agreement signed in November 1984. The loan, which carries an annual interest rate of 2.5 per cent, is repayable in 10 years.

Writers meet on Gabriola to read their manuscripts

Sponsored by New Horizons funding, the group is aiming to publish a book on the islands contained within the Islands Trust area.

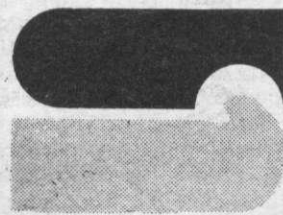
The meeting, held at Gabriola Island United Church, was the third in a series launched last year. It heard writers from Salt Spring, Mayne, Gabriola, Bowen,

The group's next meeting is set for late October and is tentatively aimed at moving towards final manuscript form.



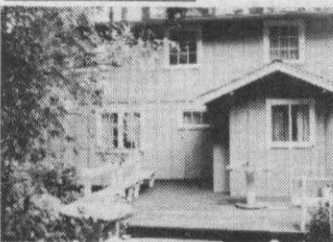

Boaters advised

Know about available assistance and how to call

The vessel ran into trouble just off Saturna Island's East Point. Tidal rips had swamped the boat; it was taking on water and in danger of sinking. A distress call went out.

Word of trouble on the water sent the Canadian Marine Rescue Auxiliary (CMRA) volunteers on Saturna Island into action, followed by the Canadian Coast Guard crew stationed at Ganges on Salt Spring Island.

The Saturna Islanders, first on the scene, took four passengers off the crippled vessel. The boat, its decks awash, was then towed away from the tidal rips.

Next step in the rescue effort was installation of pumps on board the boat. A commercial vessel, standing by, offered its assistance and later towed the craft to safety.

Total elapsed time of the rescue effort was just under two hours.

The above incident is but one of many types of emergencies which occur at sea. Incidents to befall the boater can include the likes of engine breakdowns, fires on board vessels, groundings, sinkings, heart attacks, Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning (PSP) and diving accidents.

The severity of the emergency depends on a number of factors — i.e., weather conditions, geographic location and safety equipment carried on board. The availability and use of life-jackets, flares and fire extinguishers are other important factors. The ability of a boater to perform first aid or minor repairs can often stabilize a situation before it becomes an emergency.

In the event a mariner lacks those skills and an emergency develops, what next? Knowledge of the types of assistance available to boaters, and the ways to

call on that help, is another important factor that can improve a vessel-operator's chances of surviving an emergency. It can help the boater make decisions and provide information that can affect the outcome of a mishap.

When requesting assistance at sea, the first contact will usually be with the Coast Guard operator. Boaters should learn and use

proper radio procedures, and know the locations of West Coast radio stations which maintain continuous listening watches on distress channels — they're at Victoria, Vancouver, Comox, Tofo, Alert Bay, Bull Harbour and Prince Rupert.

Tell the operator what the problem is and that you require assistance. He'll reply by asking

three or four important questions, like your location, the number of persons on board and the name and a description of your boat. If you have not already declared it, he will also ask the nature of your distress and if you are in any immediate danger.

All of the information will be passed directly to the Rescue Co-ordination Centre (RCC) in

Victoria, which operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and is staffed by Canadian Armed Forces and Canadian Coast Guard personnel.

(The Coast Guard station in Ganges says boaters in distress in Gulf Islands waters should contact RCC directly over UHF Channel 16 or Citizen's Band Channel 9. A Mayday is automatically passed onto the Coast Guard.)

RCC has at its disposal fleets of Coast Guard cutters, lifeboats, hovercraft and Armed Forces fixed-wing aircraft and rotary-wing helicopters. RCC also co-ordinates and authorizes the deployment of CMRA and other volunteers along the coast.

RCC will broadcast on the distress frequency, asking mariners in your vicinity to supply assistance. It can also call on divers and Emergency Health Services personnel to co-ordinate a medical evacuation of seriously ill or injured persons from vessel or a remote area.

People on shore who spot an emergency at sea can call RCC by telephone — 380-2333 in Victoria, 666-4301 in Vancouver and (toll-free) 1-800-742-1313 elsewhere in the province.

Callers should provide good information, including the location and nature of the distress, a description of the boat involved, the number of people on board, and weather and sea conditions.

RCC adds that anyone in doubt about the seriousness of an emergency should not hesitate to request assistance. "The Search and Rescue system is there to respond to distress or potential distress incidents. The sooner they are alerted, the sooner help is on the way. It is far preferable to err on the side of safety."

Plan ahead for emergencies

The Canadian Red Cross Society says planning ahead can help boaters avoid many mishaps.

In the interest of safety, the society recommends that boaters:

- check daily weather forecasts and learn to recognize weather signs, such as sudden shifts in wind and fog, choppy waves and dark clouds;
- take a chart and compass along, and know how to use them;
- leave a travel itinerary, includ-

ing expected date or time of return, with a friend at home;

- wear Department of Transport approved lifejackets; and
- carry a well-equipped first aid kit at all times.

The Red Cross also advises boaters against mixing alcohol and aquatic activities, explaining that statistics show 33 per cent of all drowning victims were intoxicated at the time of death.

"Ignorance and alcohol are

major factors in most boating accidents," says Steve Borthwick, chairman of the Red Cross Water Safety Service.

Statistics compiled by Borthwick's office show that in the B.C. and Yukon region, 75 per cent of boaters who drowned in 1985 were not wearing lifejackets. In 40 per cent of those cases, lifejackets were on board the vessel but were not being worn by passengers.

Voice of Women

Visit to UN offers lobby opportunity

Two Salt Spring Island residents have returned from a recent one-week visit to the United Nations with a message for everyone concerned about nuclear weapons: the disarmament movement is making its voice heard in the world forum.

However, both Beth Hill and Bev Unger stress that as much as the movement is gaining momentum internationally, work at the grassroots level is far from over.

"All of the people we talked to at the UN said they can only move as quickly as the peace movement," Hill said, "and they appealed to us to work even harder. Governments will not move unless their citizens demand change."

Hill and Unger attended a week of conferences and meetings at the UN from May 3 to 10, as part of an 18-member Voice of Women delegation sent from Canada to discuss disarmament and related issues with representatives from countries around the globe.

Voice of Women, a registered Governmental Agency (NGO)

at the UN, was following up the progress being made by countries to adhere to specific "forward-looking strategies" on women's issues made at a conference held in Nairobi in 1986 to mark the end of the UN'S Decade for Women.

Unger pointed out that while many countries at the UN decline to recognize the link, women's issues are connected to disarmament, particularly in developing nations.

"You can't separate disarma-

ment and development when there is money being gobbled up by the war machines and armaments industries, and the Third World suffers from a lack of funds for development," she said.

Hill added that Third World

countries also suffer from being used as testing grounds for conventional weaponry being developed by the world's superpowers.

Unger said the Voice of Women's UN agenda included talks

with representatives — called 'missions' — of various countries and attending several conferences. The group maintained a schedule that began at 7:30 each morning, ended at 6 each night, and was filled with discussions and meetings throughout the day.

"One feeling we got from talking to the missions was that everything we do, individually, is important," Hill said. "Every little effort we make contributes to change — writing a letter, marching."

Unger said her impression of Canada's presence at the UN is that its ambassador — Steven Lewis — is held in high regard but Canada itself is seen to be closely tied to US policy positions on disarmament.

"The Canadian people need to help change that by writing letters and electing representatives who really want peace," she said.

Hill added: "The power in the UN is shifting to a more equitable balance, and it is up to us as Canadians to influence our government to be more supportive of UN programs and divorce ourselves from our ties to the US positions."

Among the bright spots of the Voice of Women visit was attending a conference staged by the Quakers, Unger said, where they were heartened to learn that there is a strong peace movement in the US.

children from writing letters or from receiving reading material, food or musical instruments.

In asking Salt Spring residents to write letters of protest to the government of South Africa, Saw-

den said the tactic produces results. He told of a meeting with a man recently released from a South African jail, largely through the impact of international letters of protest.

Islanders asked to protest jailings

One of the founders of Amnesty International's Salt Spring group is asking islanders to protest the imprisonment of children in South Africa.

Gary Sawden, a former resident now working in Botswana, passed the request onto local Amnesty International members in a letter sent from Africa in early May.

Sawden's letter details the plight of black children installed in prisons last year during the government crackdown on apartheid protesters. Most are still being detained without trial, many have been mistreated, and three are known to have died, he said.

Enclosed with Sawden's letter were clippings from South African newspapers explaining that it is illegal to protest the imprisonment of the children, and that new regulations have been adopted to allow police to cut off visits to the children and prevent the

"Reagan's position is not fully accepted," Hill said.

The Quaker conference, she continued, argued that people should not become too enthused about disarmament talks between the Soviet Union and the US. "We can get suckered into a feeling of security when the reality is that even if the superpowers reduce their arsenals by 50 per cent, all it takes is one per cent of that arsenal to wipe out the world."

Hill said another highlight of the visit was obtaining a copy of *Our Common Future: The World Commission of Environment and Development*, a report on the state of the world which she calls "a blueprint for the future."

Hill said the report sold out quickly so she could only bring back one copy. However, she will be requesting local bookstores to stock and sell the book.

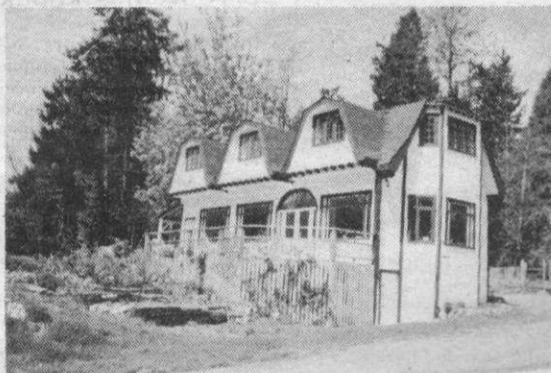

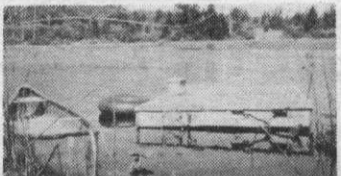

An RCMP spokesman said a motorist was driving along Vesuvius Bay Road toward the ferry landing at approximately 2:50 pm Saturday when another automobile approached at high speed from the west. The approaching car, described as a silver late-model Ford Mustang, went out of control, sideswiped the victim's vehicle and sped away toward Ganges.

Damage to the victim's car has been estimated at \$1,500. The other driver has not yet been located, and anyone with information concerning this incident is asked to contact the Ganges RCMP detachment at 537-5555.

Police apprehended a young offender operating a motorcycle along Beddis Road last weekend without insurance.

Motorists here have complained recently about dump trucks travelling at high speeds and spraying gravel on local roadways.

Gravel truck operators are advised to drive within the posted speed limits and check their loads to ensure they are secure. Carrying an unsafe load is an offense under the Motor Vehicle Act.

Board considers water taxi bids

School District 64 has received two bids from local companies interested in providing water taxi service to school children throughout the Gulf Islands.

Trustee Ian Fraser said at the board's recent regular meeting that tenders were received May 7 from Gulf Islands Water Taxi and Gulf Islands Sail Charter.

G.I. Water Taxi offered to assume responsibility for ferrying

island children to and from school for \$188,200 per year.

Gulf Islands Sail Charters' tender was broken into three categories, according to Fraser.

In the first year, the company estimates the cost of providing water taxi service at approximately \$215,000. The estimate increased to \$267,000 in the following years.

"These tenders have been received and we will deliberate further," Fraser noted. No decision has been announced.

The water taxi contract, in the past issued for a year, has been extended to three years with a fourth option year. The length of the contract was increased to afford the successful bidder an opportunity to improve his equipment.

Twenty-five years ago

• Sgt.-Major Ken Byron, a Salt Spring Islander serving with the 2nd Black Watch of the Royal Highland Regiment of Canada, wrote home from his station in Germany to say he had been selected warrant officer in charge of the party scheduled to receive the regimental colours from Her Majesty the Queen.

He left Germany and travelled to Camp Gagetown to organize and train the colour party.

• The B.C. Toll Ferry Authority announced that the *Queen of Vancouver* and the *Queen of Victoria* would sail at odd hours from Tsawwassen and Swartz Bay and connect with Gulf Islands ferries. This change, it was suggested, would eliminate the missed connections that had been so prevalent since the two old Black Ball ferries began sailing local waters.

• At a meeting in Ganges, External Affairs Minister Howard Green defended his government's recent actions.

Green disagreed with arguments that the Progressive Conservative government had lowered the country's prestige abroad. He concluded that a government led by John Diefenbaker would be a humanitarian government with a great interest in the individual Canadian.

• Mrs. W.D. Stewart announced the marriage of her eldest daughter, Margaret, to John S. Duncan, youngest son of Mrs. Donald L. Stewart of Galiano Island.

Twenty years ago

• The Galiano Chamber of Commerce was presented with the B.C. Chamber of Commerce's community service trophy for its achievements.

Accepting the award on behalf of the Galiano group was Mr. Driftwood, president of the Galiano chamber. The award, presented annually at the B.C. organization's banquet, was given to the chamber of commerce group with the greatest accomplishments in community service, government liaison and civic responsibility.

• The women's auxiliary to Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital voted to spend \$2,300 — nearly all of its funds — on furnishings and equipment for the health institution.

Close to \$1,000 was spent on wall-to-wall carpet for the hospital's sunroom, with another \$600 being applied towards the purchase of an oxygen tent.

• Local taxpayers were going to the polls in three separate school district referenda.

Voters were being asked to decide whether to go ahead with the construction of a teacherage on Pender, the addition of industrial education facilities at Gulf Islands Secondary School, and the extension of dormitory facilities.

• Earl Flanagan of Vancouver was fined \$50 in Ganges court on two charges of creating a disturbance.

Another Ganges man was fined \$35 for driving without due care and attention. The man was the driver of a car that rolled over a bank between the secondary school and the elementary school.

Fifteen years ago

• Premier W.A.C. Bennett formally opened the new wing of Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital. The premier formally declared

the hospital opened before a crowd of approximately 300 people. He spoke briefly on the advances made in hospitals throughout the province and outlined the numbers of new hospital facilities under construction.

• Peter Bingham was selected president of the Centennial Park Association in Ganges.

The association, responsible for maintenance and administration of the park, was formerly led by Dorothy Kyle. Tom Toynbee was chosen vice-president of the group, while Dorothy Wheeler assumed the position of secretary-treasurer.

• Salt Spring's new airstrip was christened when a plane unexpectedly arrived at the site.

A project of Gordon Cudmore, the airstrip aroused some opposition in the Fulford area. Although some islanders opposed the airstrip, the pilots of small planes here and on Vancouver Island welcomed it as an alternative landing field when other nearby airstrips were closed.

• Doris Anderson had been busy.

After a tour around the world, she had returned to Salt Spring to show pictures of her travels to island audiences. At these showings, donations totalling \$49 were collected for Oxfam and the Save the Children Fund.

Ten years ago

• Health inspectors announced that Ganges schools would have to clean up their sewage disposal systems within 60 days.

The upgrading work, which entailed the construction of an improved sewer system, was expected to cost up to \$150,000. The addition of sewage holding tanks was not feasible, according to School District 64 chairman Charles Baltzer, who said that the island's two septic disposal companies could not dispose of effluent even if they operated around the clock.

• Danny Reynolds, 14, won four provincial trophies at the B.C. Trap Championships held in Kelowna.

Two of the trophies were for the B.C. Junior Singles Championship and the B.C. Junior Handicap Championship.

• Two provincial cabinet ministers, Jim Nielsen and Hugh Curtis, visited the Galiano Golf and Country Club.

• A *Driftwood* poll showed that a majority of island residents favoured retention of the Centennial Park farmers' market.

A total of 225 residents voted in favour of retaining the market in its current location, while eight indicated they felt it should be moved.

• Commander Ted Coombes relinquished command of the Salt Spring Island Power Squadron to Commander Peter Bingham at the organization's annual change-of-watch ceremonies.

The power squadron's new executive consisted of Don Clarkson (public relations), Ian Waterlow (training officer), Jack Poole (secretary), Frank Cunningham (treasurer), Lance Hardie (supply officer), Joe Stewart (MAREP officer) and others.

• Robert Calkins, son of Betty Calkins of Ganges, was awarded an open scholarship at Shawnigan Lake School.

Calkins was one of the three boys in the province to win the major award. He was slated to begin Grade Eight at the school, which also had his brother Blair as a student.

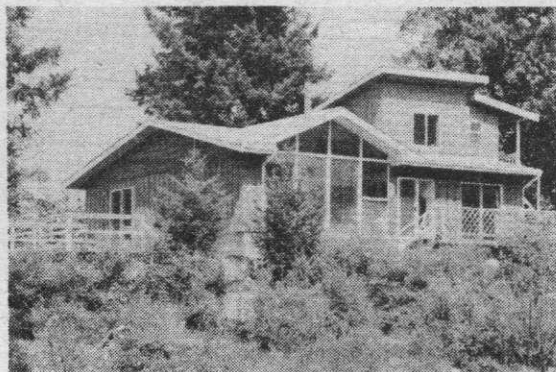
• A boat moored at the Fulford dock was a target for thieves.

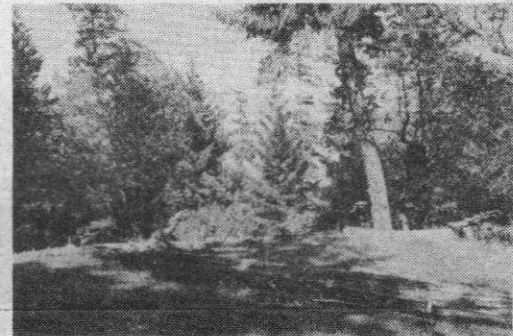

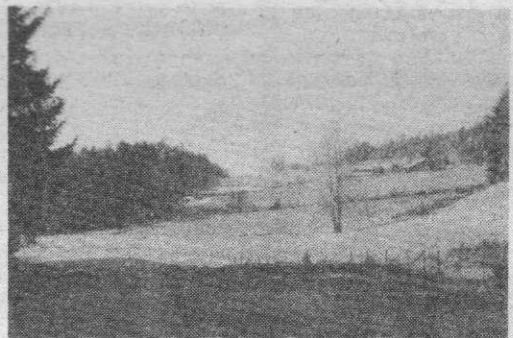
