### Salt Spring man sits on ferry board

The newest member of the B.C. Ferry Corporation's board of directors hopes he was selected on merit and not because he lives on Salt Spring Island.

Art Lloyd, named to a three-year term on the corporation's board last Tuesday, told *Driftwood* he believes his background in business and industry earned him the job.

"I suspect the corporation was looking for someone with my knowledge and expertise," he said. "The fact that I live in the Gulf Islands didn't hurt, but I don't think that was the key criteria."

Lloyd retired on Salt Spring Island in the early 1970s after an extensive career in the forest industry. He was involved in log supply work with MacMillan-Bloedel from 1943 to 1952, then handled forest management duties for Federated Co-Operatives at Canoe, B.C., near Salmon Arm. With the latter company, he managed a sawmill and plywood plant in Canoe and another mill in Smith, Alberta. From 1970 to 1972, he was general manager of Finlay Forest Industries' mill in Mackenzie, B.C.

Born in 1927 in Vancouver and a graduate of the Banff School of Advanced Management, Lloyd also served in senior capacities with a number of industry organizations, including the Interior Lumber Manufacturers Association, the Interior Labour Relations Association, the Plywood Manufacturers Association, the North Interior Lumber Manufacturers Association and the Canadian Wood Council.

"That's the kind of background I think the corporation was searching for," Lloyd said, downplaying the ferry corporation's announcement that its newest director "will bring a Gulf Islands perspective" to the board.

"I'm sure the corporation felt it might be handy to have someone from the Gulf Islands, but I like to think I was picked because of my proven business management skills and good record in labour relations," he said.

Lloyd, a past-president of the Salt Spring Island Golf and Country Club and a current member of the Ganges sewer commission, noted that the corporation's nine directors are drawn from various parts of call on the B.C. coast, including Vancouver Island, the Sunshine Coast and Prince Rupert. That diversity helps the corporation understand how its operations affect those areas, Lloyd said, but directors are responsible for all facets of the ferry system, not just those near their homes.

"It's valuable to have a Prince Rupert or Gulf Islands perspective, but we have wider

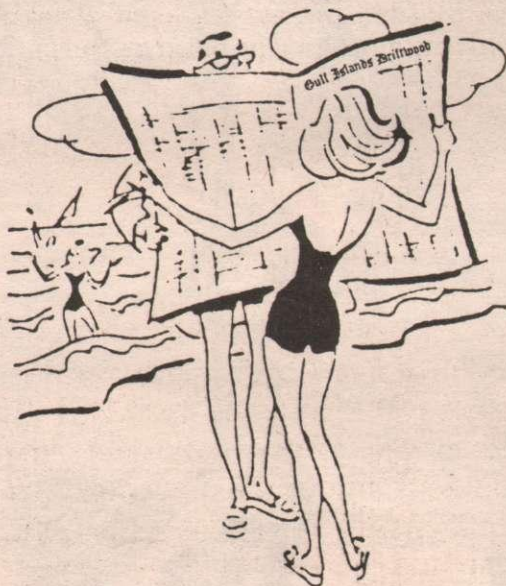

Lloyd, who has attended one meeting of the board since his appointment, will sit on its planning committee.

"That's always been my forte — to look into the future," he said, adding that the corporation has "a lot of thinking and

planning to do to keep abreast of what will probably happen in the future."

The ferry system, he explained, has seen ridership increase from 4.2 million passengers and 1.5 million vehicles carried in 1967, to

8.4 million passengers and three million vehicles in 1977, to 18.2 million passengers and 6.5 million vehicles in 1987.

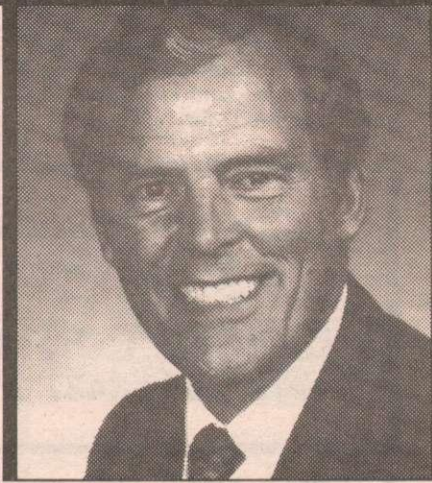
"If that trend continues, there is a pretty big challenge there, a lot of things to do," Lloyd said.

He also pointed out that the corporation last year listed revenues of \$166 million, half a billion dollars worth of assets and about 3,000 employees — all big numbers to manage.

Lloyd, whose son Phillip is

employed as a personnel manager at the corporation's Long Harbour terminal, said he feels B.C. Ferries has done a good job of managing its affairs to date.

"That's not to say there are not problems," he explained, "but I think they do a good job."

# "A New Vision for British Columbia"

# Organizers ready to launch Job-Trac program

The organizational structure and workforce for Salt Spring Island's Job-Trac program is being assembled this week by the local Chamber of Commerce.

The program, funded by \$250,000 from the provincial government and another \$15,000 raised locally, involves 14 general projects grouped under two headings. It will employ two project managers and 19 workers for six

months, beginning October 1.

Last week, a four-member committee took one of the Job-Trac program's first major steps by hiring the two project managers. Mike McCormick and Doug Perry were selected from a field of candidates by Marguerite Lee, Gordon Calderhead, Geoff Swift and Trish Nobile.

As of late last week, McCormick and Perry were arranging

interviews for candidates seeking to fill the 19 employee positions created by the program.

Also being put in place were the four committees which will oversee the program. Those committees will be responsible for project control, operations, finances and data processing.

Chamber president Jack Cherry said organizers have not yet decided which of the program's

14 general projects will be tackled first. He was aiming to have the 19 employee positions filled by October 1 (this Thursday) and to schedule crew training sessions for October 1 and 2. After that, he expects the job schedule will be firmly in place.

The training sessions for employees will involve an overview of each project and an outline of skills required for each, plus

instruction in first aid techniques. During the course of the program, employees will also be given training in areas like silviculture techniques and job-seeking skills.

At the conclusion of the six-month program, organizers say, employees will qualify, "at a minimum . . . as general labourers or general construction workers."

## Program covers 14 island projects;

The Job-Trac program approved last week for Salt Spring Island will involve 14 general projects carried out in a six-month span beginning this October.

Following are brief descriptions of the individual projects:

- Linear park development, Ganges — trail and bridge construction and some brushing-out along Ganges Creek. Objectives include assistance in flood control, easier pedestrian access to Moutat Park, and contributions to salmonid enhancement.
- Hiking trail, Channel Ridge — construction of a 5.5 kilometre trail with a well-marked starting point, provision for parking and a safety fence at a viewpoint.
- Hiking trail, south and central Salt Spring — construction of five kilometres of new trail and clearing of 7.5 kilometres of "overgrown, currently unusable trails." Designed in a series of loops, the trails will cross public reserve and MacMillan-Bloedel land.
- Plaza construction, Centennial Park — the area where the Saturday Farmer's Market is now staged will receive concrete walls around a new planting of trees, resurfacing with concrete and brick, reinforcement of the edges, some landscaping and the laying of underground water lines.
- Toilets, Centennial Park — enlargement and improvement of the existing toilets; the present building will be torn down and a new one erected.
- Portable stage and backdrop, Centennial Park — the existing bandshell will be augmented by a portable stage and backdrop which would be available for concerts and other public performances. When not in use, they would be stored in the new toilet building.

- Upgrading, Drummond Park — toilets will be replaced, a volleyball court added and a rock wall built around the mound where the petroglyph now stands. Also scheduled is some landscaping.

- Boat-launching ramps — two existing ramps will be upgraded and one new one constructed in a location that would expand the current cruising range. Ramps will consist of a concrete floor extending from a road to "a firm portion of the inter-tidal beach" and be protected by stone or concrete walls.

- Enhancement, Stowell Lake — amenities will be improved by enlarging the beach area, improving the swimming jetty, removing some large rocks to improve diving from the jetty, building a terrace between the beach and

the road, and landscaping behind the terrace.

- Upgrading tennis courts, Fulford — improvements to toilets, provision of additional seating, erection of a fence and some landscaping to improve general appearance.

- Improvements, Farmer's Institute building — insulation of interior and outside walls, upgrading of toilet facilities and addition of a 'knock-down' stage.

- General repairs, Bittancourt Heritage House.
- Permanent barbecue pit, Farmer's Institute grounds.

- Upgrading, Off Centre Stage — improvements will be made to the dressing rooms, the existing ceiling will be raised, and existing seating and staging lighting improved.

## Positions still available

## Antarctic adventure recounted before Pender Island audience

PENDER ISLANDS — The first of Pender Islands' Outreach 1987-88 programs was held on September 9 and featured Gareth Wood, Antarctic explorer-adventurer from Sidney, B.C.

Wood's lecture drew over 300 people, with every chair available in use and latecomers sitting on the floor.

Wood was the only Canadian member of a recent British expedition to the South Pole. He grew up in Victoria, spent 10 years as a printing press photocopy technician, then gave up his job to work at Strathcona Park Lodge on Vancouver Island. Following this he spent two years in Wales with the English Sports Council and there met and made friends with those planning a trip to the South Pole. He was asked to join the group.

Twenty-five people were involved in the expedition. Three of them, including Wood, walked nearly 900 miles to the Pole, each pulling a sled laden with 325 pounds of food, without the use of dogs, mechanized transport or radios. Although others have trekked to the South Pole in the

past 75 years, this was the first unsupported trip made by man alone.

The trip was costly. To raise funds the members spent a year in preparation before approaching individuals or companies. In time they raised the equivalent of \$2 million Canadian in funds.

Who supported their effort financially? Individuals and companies. This was a scientific expedition and Wood has been spending a lot of time since his return compiling all the data and writing performance reports to the

various companies that supported the trek.

Wood arrived back at the Vancouver Airport at Christmas, 1986, after spending the previous two Christmases in the Antarctic, and being away from home for five years. To his astonishment, he was met at the Vancouver airport by reporters and TV cameras and received considerable publicity and accolades at that time.

Wood is an excellent, clear, concise speaker and showed large-size slides covering the trip. He

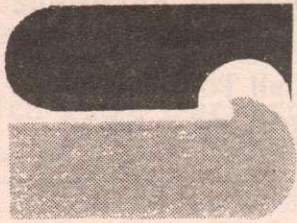

said the special significance of the trip to him is that it showed "what it takes, with great perseverance, for men to overcome disappointments and unexpected obstacles and accomplish an objective".

The company travelled in the footsteps of the Shackleton and Scott expedition of 1910. They had their own ship and their own airplane. Wood's primary job in the expedition was one of logistics.

There is much investigation work going on now in Antarctica; many nations are building bases, scrambling to get a part of the continent. A lot of valuable scientific information has come out of Antarctica in recent years.

The expedition Wood was with established its base in the Ross Ice Shelf area, near the base of Scott's expedition.

The ship dropped the expedition members, and their first job was to unload 60 tons of equipment by hand. This included enough food to last two to three years. It took them six days. Then they built their home, a 16-foot by 24-foot structure complete with a second storey, where they slept.

They then explored their surroundings, visiting the Waddell seal colony, penguin colonies and, most fascinating of all, Captain Scott's hut. It is 75 years old and maintained by the New Zealand government. The hut was 50 feet by 20 feet and housed 22 men. It was fascinating to be shown slides of this, everything having been left as it was found years later—labels on food still sold today, some in edible condition after 75 years in the cold, dry atmosphere.

Wood showed slides of life within their hut. The photographer's work area, "Roger" mending their clothes on the sewing machine, their kitchen and so forth. Wood said there was a lot of psychological pressure in such a confined space, surrounded by a

hostile climate, and they sometimes became irritable and withdrawn. Relationships crumbled.

In June, 1985, a 28-day trip of 150 miles was undertaken, with tenting in 24-hour darkness. On this trip, they encountered the Emperor Penguins who chose this spot every year to produce their young, at a time of the year when the wind and temperature are at their worst.

This was a trial trip when the men learned a lot about themselves and their equipment, and made some major changes. To survive and work in this climate, a man needs a minimum of 5,200 calories per day, a large proportion of which is from fats.

On August 20, 1985, the sun returned and the final preparations for the trip to the Pole began. Three men were chosen, Wood being one of them. Their aim was to walk to the Pole unsupported. They had to cover nearly 900 miles.

The temperature was minus 33 degrees Centigrade, and each man was pulling his own sled, weighing 325 pounds. A Christmas-day celebration was tea from two precious tea bags. Normally their drink was chocolate. Always, they wore sun goggles to guard against the sun and snow blindness. Each carried a compass and sextant, and an odometer was attached to each sled.

Their navigation was perfect with their primitive instruments and when the United States South Pole Station appeared directly in front of them in the distance, their jubilation knew no bounds. They had done it.

It was soon cooled with the news the U. S. authorities had for them. Their ship had encountered an accident in the waters near their base camp and sunk. It meant a year of waiting at their camp before another ship could return to bring their equipment and records out to civilization, and Wood was one of the men who chose to remain behind.

Wood concluded his story by saying that "great personal sacrifices were made by all who were part of this historic trek, but the dream became a reality and there was great personal satisfaction because of this."

There are South Poles for everyone to get to in life and it is his hope that hearing this story will be an inspiration to others.

# Club meeting takes last stab at missing quorum

The constitution of most democratic assemblies has a clause stating the minimum number of members who must be present before business can legally be conducted. The phrase begins with the words of *whom*, the latin for which is *quorum*, which has now come to stand for the concept. The U.S. Senate and House both require that a majority of the members be present for a quorum. This stern requirement is mitigated by the fact that discussion is permitted with less than half the members present in the chamber, so that the legislators do not have to spend endless hours listening to each other's boring political rhetoric.

In Britain they are more realistic, for the nearly 700-member House of Commons has a quorum of 40. Those who have observed this parliament in action will recall that there are long periods when even this small number of MPs are not in their places on the benches of the House of Commons. After all, there are many other activities for them to engage in even on the premises. There are committees to attend, meals to eat, offices to run and constituents to meet. Then there are the extra-curricular activities so entertainingly portrayed on the recent TV series *First Among Equals*.

The British House of Lords is even more parsimonious. The quorum is three, each of these, as far as can be ascertained, living but not necessarily conscious. The Canadian House and Senate operate on similar lines to the British with regard to a quorum.

The Galiano Club is much less practical when it comes to a quorum. The constitution demands that 24 members be present before a general meeting can begin and business be conducted. Why 24? The theory is that the executive, consisting of 12 directors, would be unable to dictate to the general membership by requiring that at least as many ordinary members be present as there are directors. There would still be the possibility of a tie vote, but by tradition the president, in the event of a tie, would vote against the motion, regardless of his preference.

What if the general membership fails to turn out in sufficient numbers to constitute a quorum?

On the last two occasions when the directors have called a general meeting of the Galiano Club in order to conduct important business, a quorum has not been reached. Apathy cannot be allowed to impede the conduct of essential business. The constitution has another clause to deal with this situation. The meeting is

automatically adjourned for exactly one week at the same time and place. The meeting of the Galiano Club called for Wednesday, September 23 at 7:30 pm in the South Community Hall failed to produce a quorum and was therefore postponed until Wednesday, September 30. At this meeting the quorum consists of those members present at the time the meeting is called to order.

### Blamed on flaw

## Broken window a shocker

It was like the blast from a shotgun.

That's how Trudy Rasmussen describes the sound she heard when a large floor-to-ceiling window in her mother's home at 287 Price Road shattered without warning on September 18.

# Left is right and right is wrong —no matter what your politics

It's only 40 years!  
Forty years ago I used to live like this. At least, it was nearly like this. It's only 40 years since I drove where left is right and right is wrong and when you switch on you switch off and trucks are lorries and lorries fill every road.

It wasn't the same after the Second War.

It isn't the same now.  
I was new in Canada during that war and the thing that I took issue with was the custom of putting the bathroom switches in the hall outside. Anyone with malice in his heart could switch out the lights and keep it anonymous.

Then it all changed and the minister of light permitted the switch to move in on the victim in the bath. At last we could take a bath without being left in the dark by one humourist or another.

So I came back and what did I find? The minister of upside-down switches had taken the switch off the British bathroom wall and stuck it on the ceiling.

And that's another thing. Nearly half a century ago I took it for granted that when you switched the light on you pressed the switch down. But that was a long time since. Now I find it just a wee bit odd that I switch on for off and off for on.

The driving on the left is not too tough and many a visitor has mastered it before I got here. But the drill is not so easy. You get in the car and close the door before you realize you're in the wrong side. You look around to make sure no passer-by was watching you climb nonchalantly into the passenger's seat.

You then climb out and walk round to the wrong side of the car to get in and drive it. The fact that the wheel is over that side tells you you got to be on this side. Most of the time it does. The hairy deals are when it doesn't.

You simply have to get used to the drill. Left is right and right is wrong no matter what your politics are.

It's the driving that is really different. There are laws and regulations covering all aspects of driving, just like anywhere else. Only thing is that nobody seems to take the slightest notice of them.

Little signs tell you the maximum speed in the city. It's mostly 40 miles per hour. Even the police cars pass you when you keep down to 40. And that's another thing: we drove about 150 miles and only saw three police cars and one of those was a military police.

Maybe there are drivers who read and obey but I haven't found them yet.

There are two major differences between British roads and North American roads. Here we find a merry-go-round at every intersection. They call them roundabouts or islands. A mile or so away there's a sign, "Reduce speed now".

Roughly translated, it means "Gunnit!"

You get to the merry-go-round and wait your chance. If a car is coming up from your right you're supposed to wait for him. The traffic sign way back showed that you have to take off from the island at one o'clock. But there's a massive combo-rig on your left and another on your right. You can't see the turns off the merry-go-round until the trucks turn off and then it's too late.

Mind you, I can get lost without those trucks helping. Driving across country I go 50 miles forward and 30 backwards trying to find the right road. I can do that in British Columbia, except that there are less roads there to get lost on.

The real test for macho drivers is the motorway. Some Brits won't tackle them. They are massive, controlled, cross-country traffic routes. And they are fast, fast, fast!

As you approach the limited-access motorway you are expected to keep up the pace of traffic, although a huge sign tells you that the maximum speed is 70 miles per hour.

There are three traffic lanes each way. The left lane is the slow lane for trucks and slow-moving traffic. The centre lane is for overtaking. Heavy trucks passing other heavy trucks may use the centre lane. The right-hand, or outer, passing, lane is for passenger cars only, which includes buses. The left lane moves at 50 to 60 mph. The centre lane moves at better than 70 mph and the right lane ranges between 80 and 100 mph, or more.

For instance, I was driving a small Ford and, simply by driving along British roads, I would estimate that at least half of the cars on the road are Fords. I discovered that that particular model tends to "float" at speeds over 90 mph. When overtaking a

big rig it will lose its grip on the road at about 85 mph because the cross draft created by the larger vehicle is like a massive cross wind.

After you have driven for a day or so you learn the basic tenet of driving in this great land that has lent its language and its customs to so many parts of the 20th century world.

Every Brit has a God-given right to overtake the car in front.

Once that is clear you get kind of used to cars passing on corners and over the double line and in every place where it is very clear that it can't be done even while it is being done.

Mind you, I'm not beefing!  
It's an exhilarating way of life and it has that spicy part that you're never quite positive you're going to live through it. Driving on these roads is a lot like Russian roulette. I'm just thankful I'm not loaded when I'm doing it.

Nevertheless, it is hard work. After a decade of it I would probably face up to it like any experienced Brit. After a 40+ years' absence I shake a bit at the end of the driving day. Mind you, it could be that driving around Salt Spring doesn't prepare you for the big-time automotive circus.

It's not just that the motorways are hard work. Every road is busy. It's nose-to-tail driving on every main road, with a big rig at least every fourth vehicle. You find yourself on a narrow-gutted stretch of road in a stream of traffic doing 60 to 70 miles per hour with trucks passing and only inches between them. And it's not just one isolated incident: every main road is like that.

The simple truth is that there appear to be about twice the logical number of vehicles on the road. There are too many cars and trucks and not enough trains.

And the shippers will tell you the answer very promptly and very angrily. They told me! They can't use the railways because of the strikes, I was informed.

There is no assurance that a shipment will get to its destination by rail.


The more politically minded will add that a busy railway exerts a stranglehold on the economy.

Hence, the tracks are clear and the roads are choked.

Those things don't touch me. I'm just enjoying this trip back to the world I once knew when it was different. And so was I!

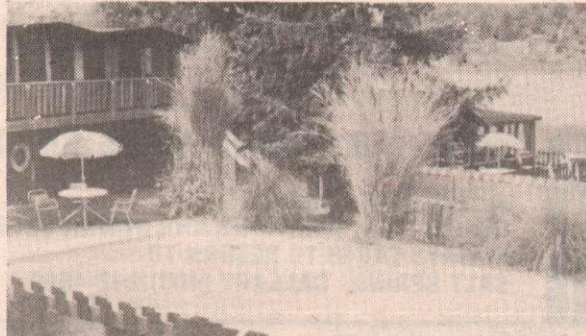

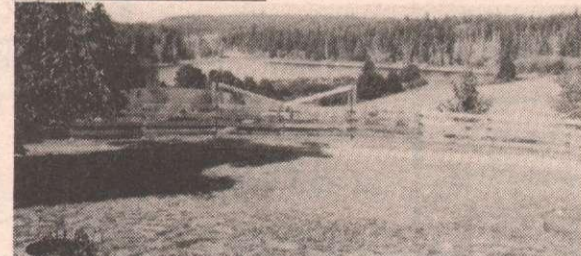

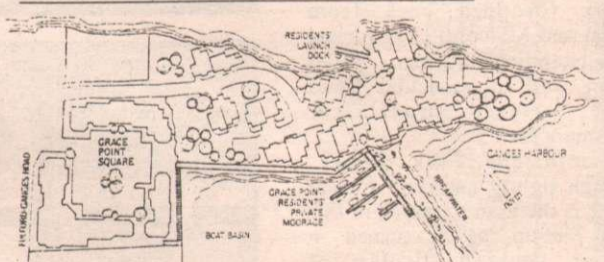

### Twenty-five years ago

• The toll authority announced that the contract for a new car ferry to service the Gulf Islands had been awarded to Burrard Drydock.

The new ferry was expected to be 236 feet long, with a cruising speed of 16 knots and a carrying capacity of 40 cars and 400 people. She would be sailing from Tsawwassen to Long Harbour.

• Warren Hastings purchased Ernie Watson's shares in Ganges Boat Yard Ltd.

The firm would continue to operate under the management of Hastings, with Wes Addy — who had been with the firm four months — continuing as a staff member.

• A Salt Spring Island community tag day in aid of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind was being organized by Mrs. V.C. Best and Mary Fellows for the Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire (IODE).

As part of the campaign, Miss G. Mortimore — Victoria field secretary for the CNIB — was slated to make her annual visit to the island's blind people. She was also scheduled to address the IODE at its monthly meeting in the United Church Hall.

### Twenty years ago

• Maxwell Lake was preferred over St. Mary Lake as a source of domestic water, island residents agreed at a meeting held at the Legion Hall in Ganges.

Only a handful of consumers supported a proposal to tap St. Mary Lake for domestic water for consumers in the North Salt Spring Water District. The alternative plan, to bring a water line over Mount Erskine from Maxwell Lake, was expected to cost \$60,000.

Dr. J.L.M. Whitbread noted that existing legislation did not give the board of health the power to force Ganges residents to install a sewerage treatment system. However, he expressed concern over the serious health hazard created by the discharge of raw sewage into Ganges Harbour.

• The annual meeting and dinner of the Social Credit Association of Saanich was held at Holyrood House in Victoria.

Head table guests included public works minister W.N. Chant, G. Driediger (president of the Social Credit League of British Columbia), and local MLA John Tisdalle.

### Fifteen years ago

• Archdeacon G. Hedley Holmes died at the Lady Minto Hospital on September 5 at the age of 90, exactly 31 years after he first arrived on Salt Spring with his family.

Born in Liverpool, England, Holmes came to Canada in 1906. He attended Emmanuel College

in Saskatoon and graduated from the institute in 1912 with his Licentiate of Theology. He came to Salt Spring in 1941 and served as rector until 1962.

• A dog from North Saanich was found on Salt Spring Island by youths, who then took it to the animal controller in Saanich.

It was the latest case of dog theft in the Saanich Peninsula. In that region, valuable dogs were being stolen for resale, while less valuable ones were sold for medical research, according to a North Saanich report.

• Tourism was down on the island due to a shorter-than-normal summer.

Only resorts and hotels with considerable advance bookings remained busy throughout the summer. Most of them, however, reported a drop in transient traffic, with fewer casual visitors to augment firm bookings.

• A weekend holiday on Galiano turned into disaster for Hilding Lindroth.

Lindroth travelled to the island for some rest and relaxation. While driving to Montague, however, he noticed smoke billowing out from under his vehicle's dashboard. He stopped, and as he and his wife were removing their possessions from the car, it burst into flames.

### Ten years ago

• Subject to approval from the ministry of education, a school bus would begin travelling up Cranberry Road to pick up local students.

There were 20 students in the area, all of whom were being transported to school each day by their parents. A minibus belonging to C&R Taxi had been contracted on a trial basis to make four round trips a day up Cranberry.

• Two proposed programs were discussed by the Gulf Islands school board.

A hospital-homebound program was being considered to aid children unable to attend school due to injury or illness. An adolescent rehabilitation program, designed to help dropouts and potential dropouts, was also discussed at considerable length.

• The Legion Hall in Ganges was the target of burglars on Sunday night.

RCMP were investigating the incident, which involved the theft of some liquor and a few dollars.

• Roma Sturdy, a long-time Ganges resident and trustee of the Gulf Islands school district, was named counsellor for the aged on Salt Spring Island.

Sturdy, a resident of Drake Road, was eager to hear from islanders on matters relating to the well-being, recreation and entertainment of the island's senior citizens.

### Five years ago

• Enrolment figures for Gulf Islands schools showed an increase of 67 students.

The totals were being watched closely by school trustees, because the ministry of education had tied approval for the proposed south Salt Spring school to a significant increase in elementary school enrolment.

"The figures are significantly more than anyone expected," noted Mike Marshall, superintendent of schools for the Gulf Islands. "We really need that Fulford school."

• Two women who practised rowing on St. Mary Lake during the summer placed third in the world rowing championships.

Lisa Roy and Janice Mason represented Canada at the races held at Lucerne, Switzerland. Soviet rowers placed first in the same event, followed by East Germany's contingent.

• An Alberta man was quick to respond to a story about the theft of firewood from Greenwood's.

Gordon Utas of Edmonton, who said he read with dismay *Driftwood's* story of the theft, sent a \$100 cheque to the intermediate and personal care facility to cover the cost of replacing the firewood.

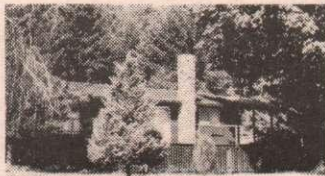
