

Levesque's *Memoirs* lively, intimate tale

Memoirs by Rene Levesque. McLelland and Stewart. 368 pp. \$24.95.

This is the English version, translated by Philip Stratford.

Not only is this book a close examination of Quebec from the inside, but it avoids delving deeply into the circumstances that saw Rene Levesque left on the outside by his own party and the voters of Quebec.

It is strictly the story of Levesque, not Quebec. From time to time he wanders into a courtroom where sits the inquest on the Parti Quebecois and Prime Minister Levesque. He hurriedly closes the courtroom door and proceeds with his own story; the story of his memories.

The inquest will come later, probably after some extensive re-examinations in the warmer light of tomorrow.

Rene Levesque is as much a fixture in the Canadian story as is Montcalm or Wolfe. He shows his family tree, or *tire d'ascendance*, to illustrate the pioneer Canadian settler, his forebearer who arrived in Canada in the 17th century. But the name of Levesque might have passed unnoticed without the

cynical, chain-smoking, ninth generation Levesque whose dream of Quebec, a nightmare for many other Canadians, was destined to leave the rails after negotiating all the initial curves.

The reader who is confining his attention to Quebec in the Levesque years is facing disappointment. This is the story of those circumstances and incidents that shaped Rene Levesque to the contours of the Quebec prime minister's chair. It is

the story of his transition from childhood rebel to adult rebel. It is the day-by-day tale of living in Quebec, thinking in Quebec. And it is, of course, the story of the transition of Quebec from the traditional to its sudden adoption of the 20th century persona.

How did the newspapers tell it? How do the history books tell it? And how did Rene Levesque see it, live and react to it? It's all there.

The pace is lively, introspective.

It sounds exactly as the reader would expect Levesque to sound. The author was not content to see his province rise to a new awareness; he sought to guide its awakening. For a time he was Quebec. When he spoke it was Quebec we heard. To many of us in the rest of Canada, the words he spoke for his beloved province were unsavoury, unwelcome. But we could not refuse to listen, nor would we, for he was as compelling a voice as any in the land. He generated fervour and begot anger in the remote places of the nation, and all parts of Canada beyond the Quebec borders were remote at that time.

His greatness probably rests in that admiration he could conjure up among those who found his dreams a threat to their own.

This book, somewhat rambling, wandering from a flash in another man's memory to the next is the intimate tale of a great Canadian statesman. It doesn't merely commend itself to every Canadian who is alert to the affairs of the day, it is a book that must be read in order to gain an understanding of the man, the province and our own history.

His next book will undoubtedly bridge the gap between the '60s and the '80s. It would examine the end of the crusade. This book introduces the reader to the background. It shows the shaping of the great crusade which might have carried off the greatest prize in Canadian history, an entire province.

Kick the habit on Cold Turkey Day

A pack-a-day cigarette smoker is more than 20 times as likely to get lung cancer than if he (or she) did not smoke.

Even if he puffed on less than 15 a day, he is still five times more likely to get lung cancer.

A pack-a-day smoker spends over \$820 each year on cigarettes. The smoker's heart, skin and metabolism are affected. His teeth and fingers are yellowed, his senses of taste and smell dulled, and his clothes, house and car are heavy with tobacco odor.

Today (January 21) is Cold Turkey Day. It's the day to go cold turkey, toss out the smokes and join the 65 per cent of Canadian adults who do not smoke.

The Canadian council on smoking and health advises smokers take a second look at those reasons stopping them from quitting. One common argument comes from the seasoned smoker who has been puffing on tobacco for 20 years and feels the damage is done: why quit now?

According to the council, it is never too late to quit because death rates among ex-smokers start to decrease within one year after they toss out the smokes. And within only a few weeks of quitting, the ex-smoker will start to look and feel better.

It helps me relax and I'll gain weight if I quit are two more popular arguments. For the first, the council says, you're right, it does help you relax. However, what most smokers don't realize is that the need to relax is brought on by the smoking: the nervous system learns to expect the regular jolts of inhaled nicotine. Deny your body this nicotine, and it fights back by making the smoker irritable, nervous and tense.

The British Columbia Lung Association has prepared a list of survival tips for Cold Turkey Day.

The first step is to list all your reasons for quitting and to keep that list with your cigarettes. Keep carrots, celery, sugarless gum, toothpicks, fruit and juices

on hand to curb "the munchies."

Stay away from coffee, tea and alcohol which are common triggers for smoking. Practice saying, "I don't want that cigarette," and avoid common smoking situations, such as bars. Get rid of leftover cigarettes, matches, lighters and ashtrays. Try deep breathing or other relaxation procedures when a craving comes, and if the urge is particularly strong, try some form of exercise such as walking or running.

The association warns there will be side effects, or signs of recovery. These include feeling irritable and spaced-out, sore throats, itchy hands and feet, coughing, sleep disturbances and being sad or depressed at "losing a friend."

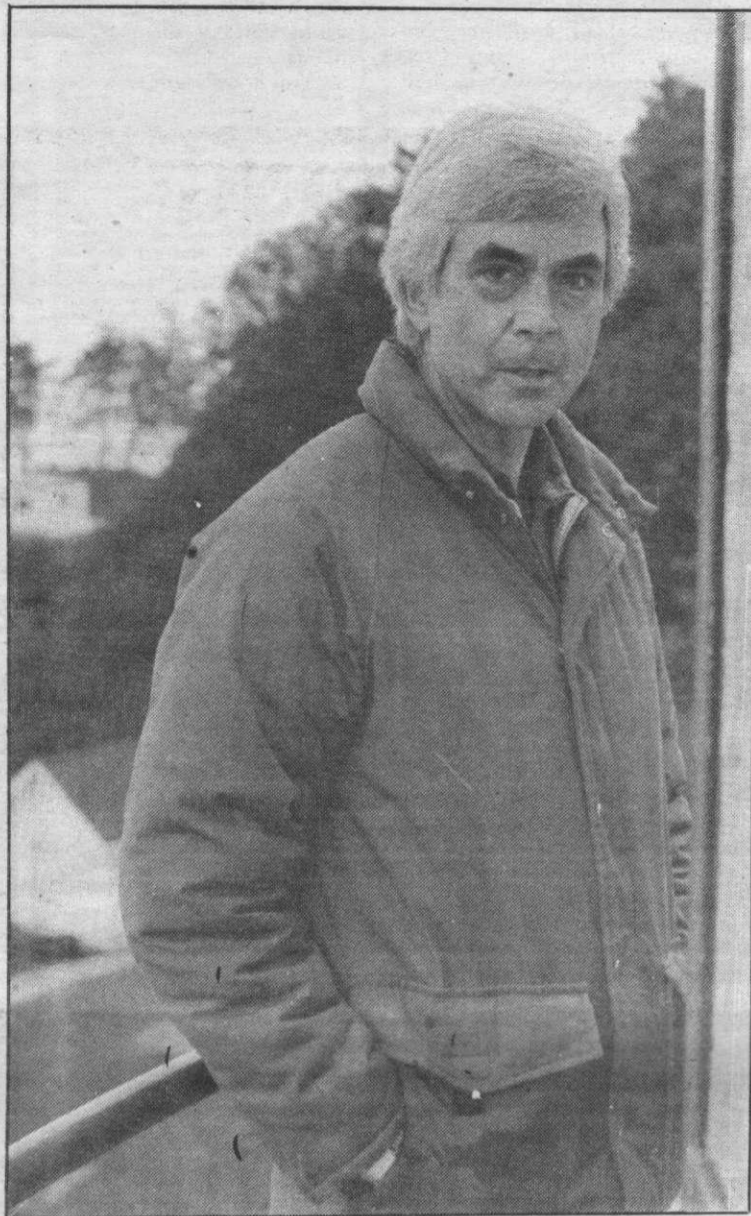

Don DeRoussie

Lighthouse keeper:

'Can't be afraid of heights'

It's right up there with joining the circus or the Foreign Legion. But while working in a lighthouse remained a childhood fantasy for many of us, it's a lifelong reality for Don DeRoussie.

DeRoussie's lighthouse is one of the west coast's most visible; he operates Mayne Island's Active Pass tower, observed by hundreds of ferry travellers each year.

"It's hard to describe the type of person who would be good lightkeeper material," Don explains in the recently-renovated dining room of the house which came with the job. "Most that stick it out are pretty independent, they're adaptable to different situations."

Later, while climbing the dizzying spiral staircase of the 54-foot lighthouse in his front yard, DeRoussie will joke that keepers also can't be afraid of heights.

DeRoussie loves the sea. He grew up on Mayne Island, and moved to a lighthouse on the west coast of Vancouver island when he was 19. "I needed a job," he explains.

That was 30 years ago. Since then, DeRoussie has served at six sites and has always been awakened by the sound of ocean tides lapping at the base of his home.

There are other benefits: "All last summer we could watch the fireworks from Expo, if it was

clear," DeRoussie says. The greater attraction of his work, however, is "the freedom to determine what you do." DeRoussie doesn't follow a nine-to-five schedule. "Because it's your home and your job, it's hard to differentiate. It's more like a lifestyle."

He is primarily a caretaker and it is up to him to keep the light, the horns, the engine room and even the buildings and grounds in top condition. The first three are for obvious safety reasons, while the concern for appearances is due to the year-round visitors. "We get 6,000 a year."

Some of whom are more memorable than others. DeRoussie has had three wedding parties come to the Mayne tower to take pictures.. "A big yacht showed up and asked us which way to Alaska," DeRoussie's wife, Tracey, says.

"We pointed them in the right direction," Don adds. That happened while they were stationed on Vancouver Island, as did the time another yacht pulled in and the owners asked if their dog could use Don's lawn for a bathroom.

"Your main reason for being here is to ensure those aids to navigation are always operable."

The other side of the job, which is not required but which is inevitably carried out, is rescue operations. The keepers at the 41 lighthouses on the west coast helped 1,400 boaters in trouble last year, according to DeRoussie.

"I've been involved in more incidents than I can remember," he adds. The closest call was in 1984 when DeRoussie spotted two men who were obviously having trouble navigating their small boat. Fighting the wind and trying to reach the beach, their boat was caught up on a jetty of rocks. DeRoussie ran along the shore until he could yell to them to throw him a rope.

"They were Vietnamese and they didn't talk very good English," DeRoussie explains. After repeated tries, the boaters understood his instructions and cast him a line, with which he pulled them to safety before they could be blown out to sea.

The largest among several certificates which DeRoussie keeps in a box is for service and

Price paid for hair makes indignation bearable

Melissa spat indignantly as Muriel Wallace tried to hold her still and comb her hair.

Melissa became increasingly agitated. A purebred, she no doubt disliked being made to do anything. However, it is her hair which makes Melissa so special — in stores, it is sold by the quarter ounce.

Melissa is a seven month, seven pound white angora cotton-

tail rabbit. Wallace, a Pender resident, bought Melissa and Rupert, a male, for \$20 each from a Vancouver breeder. Wallace wanted their fur to use as trim for the sweaters she regularly knits.

Each rabbit is supposed to yield 12 ounces of fur a year. The

growing pile of fluff next to Melissa looks like it might weigh half a pound, but Wallace compresses it in her fist, down to the size of a walnut.

The hair is combed out weekly. "Once it's matted, it's no good for spinning into wool," Muriel

explains.

The rabbits are kept in cages with wire floors to prevent the pellets from staining the fur. The droppings fall through the wire to the floor.

A piece of plywood prevents the rabbits from seeing each other. "The male would raise hell

if he couldn't get to her," says Gordon, Muriel's husband.

The rabbits are fed alfalfa pellets. They are so domesticated they won't touch carrot or lettuce.

Muriel has ordered two lilac-coloured cottontails, but says she does not want to breed any of them. She wants it to remain a hobby and is afraid the workload would get out of hand if they mated.

"You know rabbits."

Melissa's agitation likely due to her breeding

rescue efforts. Awarded in 1981, it is signed by then-transport minister Jean Luc Pepin.

The certificates are one type of award for good service, but DeRoussie hints the best result of his record is that he was selected for the popular Mayne Island posting. Keepers compete for desirable postings and Active Pass, because of its nearness to urban centres, is coveted. "It's considered a downtown lighthouse," DeRoussie explains with a

Few lighthouses are as accessible as the Active Pass station. DeRoussie has worked at lighthouses which could only be reached by helicopter. When he, Tracey and their two sons left, the move took a month because everything in the house had to be airlifted out.

"You don't just call up a moving van."

There are other adjustments to be made, but Don believes he and his family have coped with the changes. Don's son Steven, 17, says his old home was so isolated that moving to Mayne was like coming to the city. "I'd never even had ideas about what it would be like to live with other people."

Steven completed his first eight years of school by correspondence. When they moved to Mayne, he was able to attend Gulf Islands Secondary School.

"There's not really much to do. You have to make your own fun," Steven says.

Don himself had no trouble adapting to the lack of amenities; when he grew up on Mayne, the island was without power.

Much has changed since. DeRoussie came into his field at a time, when the old style of oil-powered light was giving way to the electric beacons found today. The early lamp revolved because counterbalanced weights drove it "like a cuckoo clock" and had to be rewound every few hours.

Technology did not leave and now lightkeepers are fighting the implementation of unmanned lighthouses. As shop steward for the Victoria marine district, DeRoussie is involved in the battle between the keepers and their employer, Transport Canada.

"We've been getting outstanding support from the media and user groups," DeRoussie says. A *Financial Post* reporter recently

called him for his opinion. Besides the elimination of their jobs, the keepers are concerned automated lighthouses would provide the navigation focal points but exclude the safety and weather observation aspects.

Transport Canada announced the staff reductions last spring as a cost-cutting measure. The move to unmanned lighthouses on Canada's east coast had gone ahead smoothly because the keepers did not organize against it. "We immediately went on the offensive," DeRoussie says of the west coast effort.

DeRoussie's union wants the government to set up a public enquiry. Until that happens, unmanned lighthouses may slowly be introduced here. Six are currently on schedule for the west coast.

DeRoussie's job description hints at how he spends much of his day "...check ...replace ... maintain ...lubricate" The question he is most frequently asked is if he ever gets bored. "I tell them there isn't time."

His grounds host the tower, engine room, bulk fuel tanks, and his home. Most anything mechanical has a backup system, including the light and the air horn. The mighty light bulb isn't much bigger than the one in most living rooms but can be seen for 12 miles, will last at least one year and costs \$104 to replace.

DeRoussie will retire in six years, and he will probably turn his hobby into a business. He produces native carvings and the buyers are standing in line. The only piece he has kept is a large wooden chest.

"I tell my wife I want to be buried in it and she says *No way, it's too vulnerable.*" Don is part Haida — "A very small part, but it's back there."

"I liked the style of native art and 10 years ago I tried my hand at it. People actually pay you for it!"

Last year he carved a totem pole for a Mayne Island business, where it is currently on display. The proprietor's wife, a goldsmith, made rings for Don and Tracey in exchange. Don's ring shows glinting metal twisted into crashing waves. The design breaks and smoothens in a thin line which rises above the waves. The line is crowned by a diamond — a lighthouse.

Galiano Island eagle tally added to B.C.-wide count

Sunday, January 11 was eagle count day in B.C. Organizing the count on Galiano was George Griffiths who divided the island into six areas. Sixty-nine sightings were recorded as follows: Porlier Pass, 23 (observed by the Chambers); North Galiano, one (Bill Stafford); mid-island, 10 (Griffiths); Georgeson Bay, nine (the Kennedys); Arbutus Point, 20 (Bill Scoones); and Whaler Bay, six (Benger). The count, which attempts to cover most accessible areas of the province, is organized by the ministry of environment and parks.

Last year, despite inclement weather, the total for B.C. was 1,756 eagles, which was a greater number than in any state of the U.S. with the exception of Alaska. Perhaps Canada should be selling bald eagles to the U.S., for they are unlikely to put an import tax on their national bird.

Speaking of birds, Dennis Oldroyd, unofficial warden of Bluff Park, reports that two Steller's jays have been bullying the small birds at his feeding table. The birds are terrorized and scatter in panic when a sharp-shinned hawk perches on a snag at the edge of his clearing. Lower down Bluff Road, Roy and Mary Harding and Debra Holmes noticed cattle egrets wintering in the Gulf Islands four years ago.

The show, which lasts until February 16, will be opened at 7 pm by artist Wilhelm Breddels, and the theme is erotica. Keith Holmes, one of the organizers, contributes these comments.

"The word *erotica* comes from Eros, who in Greek mythology was the spirit of love. Later Eros became more strongly associated with romantic love and sensuality, and evolved into the Roman Cupid with his arrows piercing the hearts of lovers, as portrayed on

Valentine cards. Erotica combines love, sensuality and sexuality, and has a connotation of excitement and promise of rich fulfillment. As an art form, erotica's fundamental element of love is ruled by the aesthetic principle of striving towards beauty. Usually erotica is indirect rather than explicit, making use of metaphor and innuendo. A good example of a visual metaphor hinting at erotica might be a representation of a flower, particularly a macro- or close-up view, since it is a beautiful and sensuous manifestation of the procreative phenomenon."

Other Galiano artists have been invited to contribute to the show. Also showing at the opening will be a film by Debra Holmes entitled *Moon, Silence*.

Couples that Play Together

This item has no connection with the previous one. It is merely about duplicate bridge. There is a saying that suggests that families that play together stay together. As far as most bridge players are concerned the contrariety applies. "If you want to stay together don't play together." Ron is too wise to play with Bee, and Fred won't play with Margaret, or vice versa, and Timothy Id will play, at bridge of course, with anyone's wife but his own.

However, there are exceptions to this rule, and it is gratifying to report that these have been rewarded with success at the card table. Last Friday the Patersons, Bill and Joan, scored the most match points, and the Friday before the winners were the Von Hausmanns, followed half a point behind by the Macdonalds, Don and Joan.

Murphy's Law for the Gulf Islands

A pseudo-scientific collection of laws, axioms, theorems and corollaries purporting to describe happenstance and human behavior mathematically have evolved from the original Murphy's Law, which stated that *if anything on a project can go wrong, it will*. It is thought that the basic laws are of global application. While in China we were asked to advise a Chinese engineer who was translating a computer manual from English into Chinese. We were required to explain Murphy's First Law so that a committee of scholars could find an appropriate quotation from Mao Zedong or even Confucius. Despite our best efforts, nothing acceptable could be found.

Even when applied to the Gulf Islands, the propositions of the famous Irishman have to be modified or extended. For example, Murphy's second law, that *any job takes longer than you expect* has to have an addendum to the effect that *except that on a Gulf Island the extra time required to complete the task varies directly with the square of the time the worker has lived on a Gulf Island*. (T equals ky squared, where T is the time in hours, k is a constant, and y is the number of years).

It is well known that Gulf Islanders are eccentric. This fact can be verbally quantified as *the eccentricity of a Gulf Island population increases with time until it shatters into a number of diverging circles of decreasing radius and diminishing civility*. This leads to the Corollaries of Committees. Corollary I: The number of committees on a Gulf Island is inversely proportional to the density of the population. Corollary II: The number of people on the committee is in inverse ratio with the effectiveness of the committee. Corollary III: The ratio of the number of people that *talk* compared with the number of people that *do* increases directly with the size of the island.

The population of the Gulf Islands is also governed by the Regression of Sophistication Equation. Stated non-mathematically, the sophistication of a Gulf Island resident declines in a logarithmic manner on the time axis. Also of concern is the Visitors' Axiom, $V \propto v^3$, where V is the number of visitors arriving and v is the number of visitors actually invited.

Of special interest to Gulf Islanders are the Three Postulates.

Postulates I and II refer to ferries, and III to power. Postulate I confirms the fact that if a Gulf Islander has an urgent appointment in town, the ferry is automatically delayed. Postulate II notes that if an islander arrives late at a ferry terminal, the ferry will have left on time, but if the resident arrives early the ferry will leave later than scheduled. The Third Postulate concerns the probability of a power outage occurring, and can only be expressed mathematically. If the probability is represented by the Greek letter Chi, wind velocity by v, centimeters of precipitation by p, and the number of trees by n, then Chi squared equals the product of v, p, and n plus the number of guests times 10. If this number should exceed .05, leave the island at the first opportunity. (Those readers having moral scruples about using negative powers may instead divide by one million.)

This little dissertation, which was originally intended to start an argument, will start a pamphlet if it is not immediately terminated.

Natural History Study Group

Ed Andrusiak, a recent arrival from Edmonton, would like to contact fellow naturalists on Galiano with the object of forming an informal group which would meet to discuss subjects of common interest. Ed, who worked for Parks Canada in Alberta, has films and slides which would be of interest to West Coast naturalists and he himself would like to learn more of the local ecology, particularly of the intertidal zone. There are many projects such a group could undertake, such as taking part in the annual bird count or identifying areas on Galiano in special need of protection. New London newspaper ends 131-year drought

By FRANK RICHARDS

I have been reading the 20th issue of a new newspaper published in London, England. It is *The Independent*. Published October 29 last year, it has something of the appearance of the traditional London Sunday newspaper of the responsible style.

Full broadsheet format, the new newspaper makes it very clear that it is not in the tabloid market in format or in content. Not for *The Independent* the fleshy flashes and the disclosure style of a news story. The publishers explain that it represents the first newcomer to the city's newstands, other than tabloid, in 131 years.

In a city so well-provided with a variety of choices for the news-hungry, a newcomer seems reminiscent of coals to Newcastle, but the population gets no smaller and *The Independent* is testing its own ground.

The Independent offers a broad news coverage with a close parallel to be found in its news columns to any contemporary British Columbian daily newspaper.

Lead story deals with the USA-

USSR exchanges of last October on the nuclear arms race. There is the sad tale of dispute between the British Broadcasting Corporation and a Tory MP, and a Conservative party official. A notable murder trial gets a full page and better.

Several stories and opinions are featured on the hopes of ending the long-standing battle between teachers and the government.

The British government appeared to be wavering between a British aircraft and a Boeing early-warning airplane.

Comment reported from the police agency, Interpol explains that the European nations neglected to take action against drug abuse when it was of minor proportions and let it ride for 15 years during which period it rose to major drug abuse.

From the medical front there is reference to a proposal by the government to reward the diligent general medical practitioner.

And Aids. Many columns are devoted to the country's campaign against the spread of the disease. Advertising

is rather limited, but it would be surprising if the 20th issue of a new publication were plugged with advertisements inserted by eager corporations eager to do business with this newest comer.

The Independent, whose front-page eagle puts the reader in mind of the European *Herald-Tribune*, also devotes a little thought to the new style of scooping a news story in the *News-of-the-World* style when it broke the story of the deputy chairman of the Conservative Party and a London prostitute. The story broke Jeffrey Archer, author and politician, and was a severe blow for the Tories.

The lady of the evening was wired for sound and sent forth to her meeting with Archer while taping everything that was said.

The story caused a furore and so did the revelation of the manner in which the revelation was made. There followed some expressed fear that stories based on such set stages might be less than accurate.

Nothing new, says *The Independent's* story, it happens all the time. There is a constant

market for scandal and suggestive photographs, it reveals, in Britain, continental Europe and the United States.

The publishers of this newspaper must have great courage, to enter so bitterly contested a news market.

Over drab winter months

Begonia hybrid offers welcome splash of colour

Without a doubt, this winter's weather has been mild and everyone is speculating how it will turn out before spring is officially here. It's a hot topic, so this week I'm going to avoid any chatter about gardening out of doors and turn to more reliable, predictable territory — indoor Rieger begonias.

At this time of year when the out-of-doors are predominantly grey and green, a bright splash of colour is most welcome. Rieger begonias were developed by Otto Rieger (appropriately named) in 1955, after over 30 years of research. These hybrids are officially named *Begonia hiemalis*, but they are actually derived from complex crosses made between the hybrid tuberous begonias which we grow outdoors here in the summer, and a bulbous species, *Begonia socotrana*, a winter-blooming native of the northeast coast of India.

In the 30 years since their introduction, numerous varieties have been produced to expand the colour range to include white, yellow, cream, orange, peach, pink, various reds and a few two-toned varieties, with many of the colours in both single and double blossoms.

It is interesting to note that, due to strict control by the grower and plant patent laws, Rieger begonias have only been in the homes of North Americans since 1970 — relative newcomers to our tables and windowsills. Now many of the varieties are no longer protected by plant patents and they may be propagated from leaf cuttings.

As a result of their hybridizing creation, all Rieger begonias are sterile and cannot produce seed; but then again, even if they could they wouldn't likely come true to type, as a result of their complex breeding. Never fear, though, because a good selection is almost always available at flower shops and garden centres.

After you have purchased a new begonia, you should take great care to get it home healthy and safe, as they are very sensitive to cold temperatures — i.e. below 40 F. If they have been chilled or frozen, blossom petals will either fall off right away or they will turn a tan-brown colour and then drop off. The foliage will also likely suffer damage, as it is quite succulent and juicy. The leaves and stems are somewhat crisp and brittle too, so take care to get them home quickly and without any rough handling.

Choosing the right location in your house for this lovely plant is fairly important, as they will flower best in bright, indirect light and at this time of year they can take at least half a day of full sun. If the sun is too intense the leaves will let you know by turning brown on the exposed surfaces.

Also, favour any location that has good airflow or cross-ventilation and is a little on the dry side. They like a relative humidity of 30 to 40 per cent, and resent being misted, sprayed or watered on the leaf, as this all only promotes infection by their one great enemy, powdery mildew. Ideally, daytime temperatures

should be in the 65 to 70 range, and at night, 60 to 65 F. would be best.

Water the plant thoroughly once the top half-inch of soil is dry and, if possible, set the pot to soak for a few minutes in a couple of inches of tepid water, to see that the leaves don't get wet and ensure that the soil is well-watered.

The soil should be fast draining and no water should be left in the saucer after watering is done. Water in the morning so that things have all day to dry off, as protracted wet periods invite infection by mildew spores.

Feed Rieger begonias monthly with a water-soluble balanced fertilizer such as 20-20-20, as long as the plant is in bloom. If all goes well the plant may bloom for four months or more before taking a well-deserved rest.

By the time flowering ceases, the stem growth will most likely

appear a bit leggy and sparse or sprawling. This is the time to take a sharp knife or razor blade and cut the stems back severely to about three to four inches in height. These begonias don't form a tuber, nor do they take a rest and go into dormancy, so there is nothing to lift and divide or store — merely cut it back and repot it into a slightly larger pot (up an inch or so). Use a soil mix consisting of equal parts of sterilized potting soil, peat moss, and perlite or vermiculite. Take care to avoid any disturbance of the roots and water in well after repotting. Hold off on the fertilizer until growth commences again and then use biweekly doses of half-strength 20-20-20. Be a bit cautious with watering as the plant is just re-establishing itself and there's not as much foliage as there was before.

A bit earlier I mentioned the risk of infection by powdery mildew and perhaps this little problem should be dealt with. Exercise good sanitation, cleaning up the soil surface and picking off dead or dying leaves and stems and promote rapid drying of the soil surface and leaves by watering in the morning, preferably from below. Also, provide or keep good

airflow around the plant, and if or when mildew does show up, isolate the plant right away and prune it back to remove the infected tissues and two or three inches more stem, as the mildew growth is systemic and travels back down through the leaf stems into the rest of the plant.

Be sure to wash your hands and sterilize your tools after you are done, to ensure you don't carry the spores over to another plant. Spraying with benomyl is the only

way to control already-infected plant material, whereas garden sulphur may be used as a preventative spray. This all starts to sound a bit negative but I just want you to have all of the facts should something happen to go wrong.

If you remember to pick off the spent blooms, these cheery bright characters will go on blooming for several months and carry you right through the drab winter months.

The Firebirds beat the Eagles with Jamie Wilkinson playing a strong game.

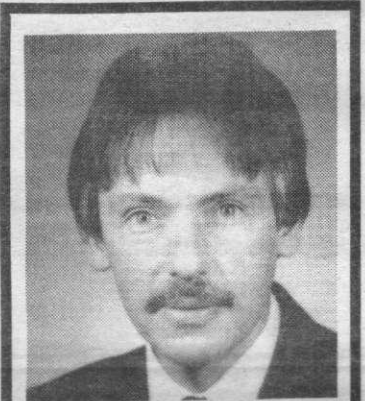

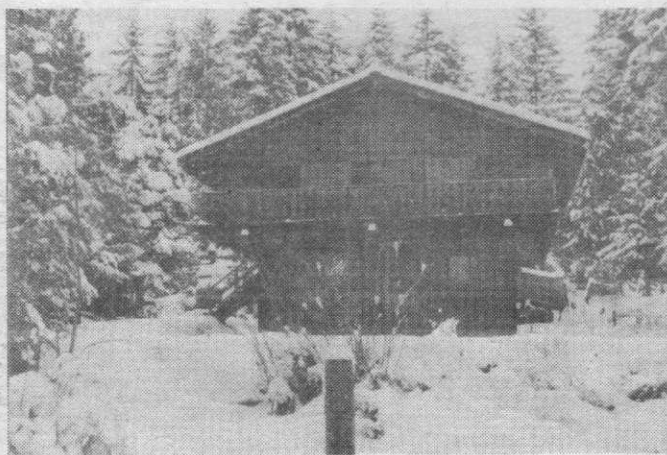

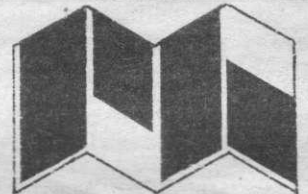

with Driftwood

Twenty-five years ago

•The hundreds of friends of Mrs. A.J. Smith of Vesuvius were saddened to hear of her passing on January 15 at the King's Daughters' Hospital in Duncan.

Smith, a grand and lovely lady, was a resident of Salt Spring Island for 58 years. She was 85 at the time of her death, the widow of Andrew James Smith, former magistrate on the island. Born in Scotland, she came to this island in 1904.

•Premier W.A.C. Bennett announced that two new boats would be built for the Nanaimo-to-Horseshoe Bay run. Construction tenders were to be called in the summer, and the vessels were expected to be in service by 1963.

As soon as the new vessels took over, the two Black Ball boats currently operating on that run were to be reassigned to the Gulf Islands.

•The local parent-teacher association heard D. Morris discuss British Columbia's "diluted education." A crowd of 60 or more heard Morris, a senior language teacher at the Ganges school, support Hilda Neatby, author of *So Little For The Mind*. In that book, she said that democracy was the unseen enemy of education.

Twenty years ago

•Education Minister Leslie Peterson had withheld approval of an early submission of the three school building votes defeated in December.

Three referenda called for new vocational training facilities at Gulf Islands Secondary School in Ganges, as well as three new classrooms, rebuilt dormitory facilities, and a teacherage at Pender Island. The department of education was not convinced that the ratepayers of the islands would make a better showing in attendance at the next presentation of the bylaws.

•L.J. Armstrong of Pender was named chairman of the board of trustees for School District 64 (Gulf Islands).

Accepting the nomination and

giving thanks for the confidence of his colleagues, Armstrong observed that he had given tacit assurance before leaving home that he would not accept the nomination again.

Fifteen years ago

•The first firm proposal for subdivision controls on Salt Spring Island was offered by the Salt Spring Island Community Planning Association.

Under the proposal, the minimum average lot size was six acres. Directors of the association unanimously supported the proposals for easing up present restrictions and for establishing a permanent control on subdivision.

•School District 64 (Gulf Islands) could not meet the provincial government figure for costs of operating schools.

The ministry of education required that costs of operation not exceed 110 per cent of the basic education formula for the province. Operating costs for School District 64 in 1972 shouldn't have been more than \$651,855, but the local board of trustees had estimated them at \$767,393 — \$108,538 above the allowable maximum.

Ten years ago

•A new federal job incentive program entitled Canada Works and how it would affect unemployed islanders was outlined at a meeting held in the community centre.

Jack Lieberer, a counsellor of

Canada Manpower's job creation branch in Victoria, said \$300 million was being made available early in the year to finance work incentives and ideas for projects in communities.

•Ed Sibold of B.C.'s ministry of consumer services, was scheduled to hold a seminar on personal finances at the Salt Spring Island Community Society.

The lecture and two films to be shown were geared to assisting the individual and family to find an intelligent approach to credit and budgeting from the point of view of their own needs and circumstances.

Five years ago

•Tickets were selling briskly for Lerner and Loewe's hit musical *My Fair Lady* which was scheduled to open here at the end of the month.

•The Islands Trust was losing a planner as Deane Strongitharm moved on to other work.

Strongitharm, planner for the Gulf Islands, was on his way to Qualicum, where he was scheduled to become planning director for the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District.

•B.C. Telephone pole number 2348460891 was injured.

A Ganges man was driving on the Fulford-Ganges Road when his 1976 Oldsmobile went out of control, entered a ditch and struck the pole. When RCMP arrived on the scene, the man was no where to be found. However, he later turned up and was given a traffic citation for driving too fast for road conditions.
