Vessel transfer opposed

Southern Gulf Islands transportation committee members are opposing the B.C. Ferry Corporation's plan to alter its current service between Pender, Mayne and Saturna Islands.

Members of transportation committees throughout the Gulf Islands said recently they are "flatly opposed" to a corporation plan that would see the BCFC vessel currently stationed at Saturna again based in Swartz Bay.

Transportation committee members say the vessel is able to provide improved service on Route 5-A by operating out of Saturna. They add that this schedule, combined with the Route 5 (Outer Islands) schedule, was agreed to by all transportation committee members earlier this year.

David Clegg, chairman of Salt Spring's transportation committee, said Southern Gulf Islands transportation committee members reached agreement on the Route 5 and 5-A schedules this summer "for the first time in years." He added, however, that the ferry corporation has now proposed what amounts to "a step backwards" by indicating it will remove the Saturna vessel and base it at Swartz Bay.

"The transportation committees of Mayne, Galiano, Pender, Saturna and Salt Spring have been meeting with BCFC representatives for many years to address the schedule and service concerns," he continued. "Since restraint, there have been only minor concessions on the part of the corporation, and in some cases, service has been reduced.

"This past year, (transportation committee members) have presented a united direction towards improving service and obtaining satisfactory scheduling on Routes 5 and 5-A, with a couple of minor concerns outstanding. Now, in a cost-cutting move, BCFC has attempted to take a step backwards again by reducing service on these routes and by attempting to impose an unacceptable schedule — a move flatly opposed by committee members in response to their various communities' input."

A spokesman for the ferry corporation has said that last summer's decision to base the Route 5-A vessel on Saturna was never more than a temporary

Saturna ferry base 'too costly'

A spokesman for the B.C. Ferry Corporation suggested last week that Gulf Islands travellers will not see any reduction in service when the ferry now stationed on Saturna is returned to Swartz Bay.

BCFC spokesman Betty Nicholson said Thursday that the corporation will base the Saturna-Pender-Mayne ferry (currently on Saturna) in Swartz Bay for the upcoming winter months. After the move is made, the ferry corporation will return to the Gulf Islands Winter 1987 schedule, "with the exception that this year, there will be more sailings from Swartz Bay and the Gulf Islands on weekdays, and as many on weekends."

Nicholson said stationing a

ferry on Saturna to link that island with Mayne and Pender is simply not economically feasible during the winter months. She added that operating a ferry out of Saturna was only a "temporary" plan put in place for the summer.

"The cost of placing a crew there is just too great," she said. "We only temporarily based a crew down there for 90 days. We feel we can't make it a permanent move for people until the whole

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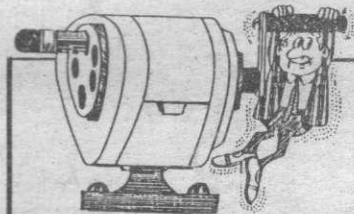

Simona Germain excitedly told her dad how she had found at the toy table lots of things that were missing from their house, and she had bought them. Dayle Johnson brought a biting rabbit for sale (I'm bringing kittens next year) and the hardware department run by Cal Hollings and Bill Trafford (men know about such things) was the only sale I've been at where the salesperson beat down the customer's offer. A friend of mine, resting on the sofa in the 'hardware department' with a newly-purchased apple pie in her lap, was offered a red hot deal on a fork and a cracked plate. It was a good sale and a fun day.

Last week, several people mentioned that the Women's Club was thinking of disbanding and holding a wake at their last luncheon. My first thought was, *How sad, they've been meeting forever.* My second thought was, *Yikes, they can't do that. Who will do the — and run the —*

- Yes, who will?
- keep the hall properly equipped, keep an inventory of the kitchen supplies, keep an eye on the state of the rugs and chairs, have an open hand when it comes to repairs and renovations and new purchases?
 - keep Hazel Trickey supplied with money to keep the medical clinic stocked with what she decides is necessary, keep the clinic boxes and garden blooming?
 - give the achievement cup and have it engraved for the student who meets the requirements?

- send the community members expressions of concern and caring (cards, fruit, books or flowers) when they are in hospital, or the remaining family in the case of a death, or help a family whose home has been burned down?
- be available to cater weddings, teas, luncheons and memorial services, either for a fee or for a reasonable donation?
- take their turn cleaning the hall?
- assist at the barbecue and run the hot dog, tea garden, handicraft and candy and cigarette stalls?
- Make donations to the Community Club, fire hall and other worthy causes?

Well?
Lorraine Campbell remembers that the group started up in 1949. The hall hadn't been cleaned in awhile, after some Red Cross teas, so a group of island women got together and scrubbed the hall so they could have a party. The Saturna Women's Club came into being.

(Lorraine remembers the date because Jimmy Jr. was two and got into a fight with another child under the chairman's chair.)

Some of the original club members were Mrs. Lorraine Campbell, Mrs. Cowan, Mrs. Gilbert, Mrs. Louisa Money, Mrs. O'Connell, Miss Vi Rush, Mrs. Joan Ralph, Mrs. Kay, Mrs. Edna Slater and Mrs. Ruffles.

Lorraine said that the meetings served a much more important social need at the time. Everyone was more isolated, no roads connected to the Gulf side, and more women came by boat. Everyone brought their kids and it was just great seeing everyone. There was no parents' group at the time; the women's club had a school committee which kept in touch with school needs.

A big part of the work done was to keep a good entertainment calendar going. There were two free dinners a year — the

Hallowe'en venison dinner and Christmas dinner, after which the kids put on the Christmas concert and Santa arrived with toys provided. Later, the candlelight dinner at Christmas time started, followed by the Easter bake sale and the fall craft bazaar and the barbecue booths, which are how the club raises its funds (along with the 25 cent charge at Wednesday and Friday bridge).

Some of the projects the women have sponsored with the money they raise have been to furnish a room at Greenwoods, \$1,000 to supply a child with special needs at Perks Institute in Victoria, giving several hundred dollars a year to the Salvation Army, and

sponsoring a child in the Philippines for 12 years. The major part of the money goes back to the community to meet needs that the women feel should be met.

Lorraine felt the most important aspect of the group is its flexibility — that with time or money, the women can step in a fill a gap.

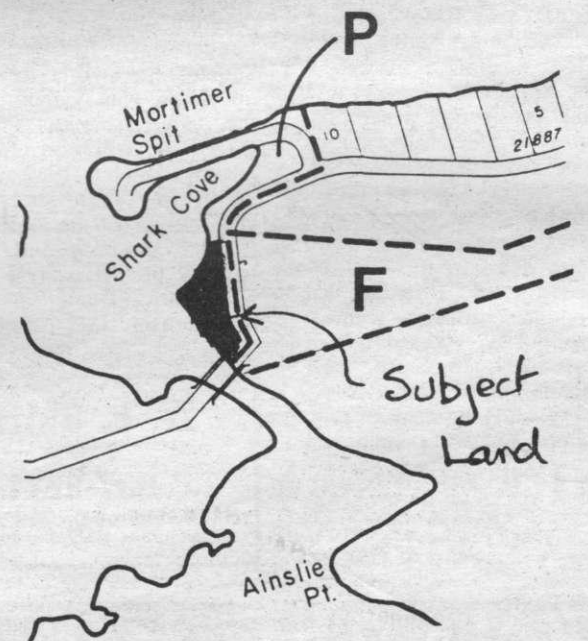

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Islanders learning about mushrooms

PENDER ISLAND — If people are going to eat wild mushrooms, they should stick to varieties with which they are familiar.

That was the message delivered at a Pender Island Outreach lecture by author-naturalist J.E. (Ted) Underhill.

Underhill told his audience that to protect against accidental poisoning, mushroom-lovers should probably only pick and eat three or four easily-recognizable, common varieties of this fungus.

He recommended Shaggy Manes (*Coprinus Commatum*), Prince (*Agaricus Augustus*) mushrooms, Puffballs (white-fleshed) and Morels picked in late April.

Learning to recognize these varieties isn't as difficult as it sounds, according to Underhill. Public libraries abound in mushroom books. Furthermore, local natural history clubs sponsor frequent mushroom forays, as they are called, into the fields and woodlands.

"Then," he added, "try the many recipes for cooking mushrooms. Delightful! You're a gourmet cook overnight."

Mayne theatre group prepares to stage play

MAYNE ISLAND — *The Handle That Cradles The Rock*, by Canadian playwright Warren Graves, will be presented November 12 to 14 at the Agricultural Hall in Miners Bay.

Produced by Mayne Island Little Theatre, the play is a fast-paced comedy revolving around a role-reversal theme. Alex, the wife, is an interior designer while her novelist husband stays at home to look after the couple's baby girl.

Director Brian Crumblehulme has given the play a new look by adding music and dance. Michael Crovato provided choreography for the dance vignettes, while Eleanor Gamble — assisted by other seamstresses — designed costumes.

Tickets for the production are on sale at the Centre Store and the Trading Post.

Mayne Island Little Theatre produces two plays a year and is involved in several other community events. Members who recall the group's founding in 1981 say it has come a long way since then.

Support from the Gulf Islands Community Arts Council and the Mayne Island Agricultural Society led to replacement of the former lighting system — "Mott's Clamato cans, painted black, with large wattage lights" — with Fresnel lights, and provided storage space for all of the group's props, lights, costumes and equipment.

PENDER ISLAND — The first full symphony concert on the Outer Islands is already sold out.

Members of the Pender Lender Library — sponsors of the Victoria Symphony Orchestra's planned November 15 concert on Pender — were relieved to learn that ticket sales have already generat-

ed enough money to pay the orchestra's \$3,000 fee and incidental expenses.

A total of 325 tickets have been sold, most of them \$12 adult passes. A few \$6 children's tickets were also purchased.

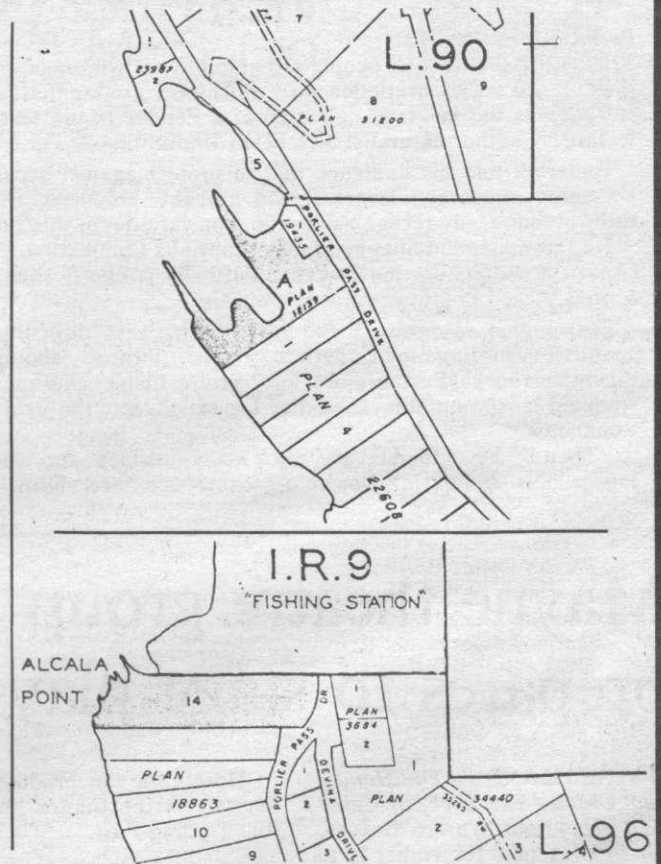
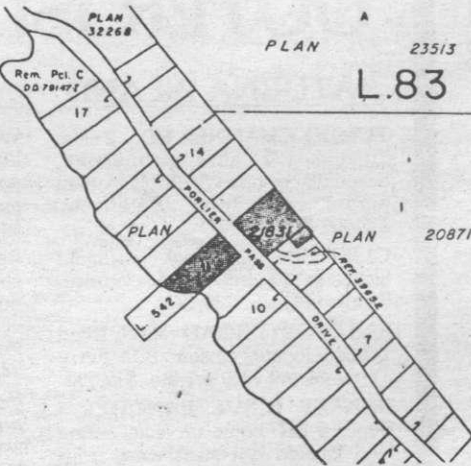
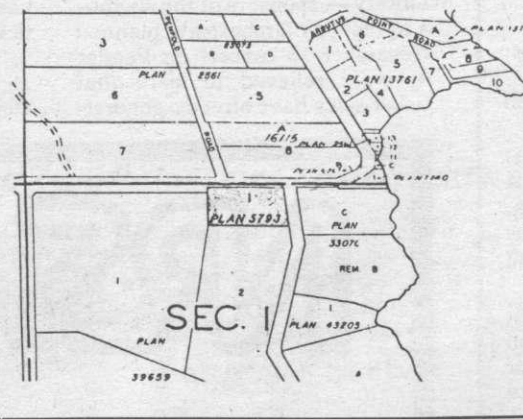

In general terms:

1. Proposed Galiano Island Trust Committee Bylaw No. 52 cited as "Zoning Bylaw, Galiano Island and Area, 1978, Amendment Bylaw No. 2, 1987", is a bylaw to amend the Galiano Island Zoning Bylaw, cited as "Zoning Bylaw, Galiano Island and Area, 1978", by:

- a) adding a new zoning classification entitled, "C4-Commercial 4" in which the principal uses permitted are tourist accommodation facilities such as hotels, motels, resorts, lodges, cottages and cabins providing temporary accommodation for the travelling public in individual tourist accommodation units. Secondary uses permitted, only in conjunction with principal uses, are restaurants and cafes, licensed liquor establishments, boat ramps and boat rental facilities, retail uses accessory to principal or secondary uses, and a one-family or a self-contained dwelling unit for the owner. Proposed regulations for the zone are: Site coverage - floor area of all buildings and structures to be not more than 20 percent of the C4 zoned land; Number of Tourist Accommodation Units - not to exceed nine units per acre for the first two acres, six units per acre for the third acre, and four units per acre on additional land; Height - no building or structure to exceed 30 feet or two complete storeys. Setbacks - no building or structure, except a fence or pumphouse, to be within 25 feet of any lot line or within 50 feet of the natural boundary of the sea; Storage - unenclosed storage use to be bound on all sides by a landscape screen of not less than five feet in height; Off-street parking - to be provided at a rate of one space per tourist accommodation unit plus that specified for any additional uses.

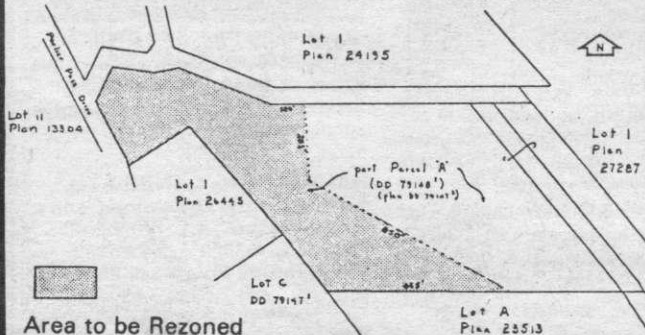

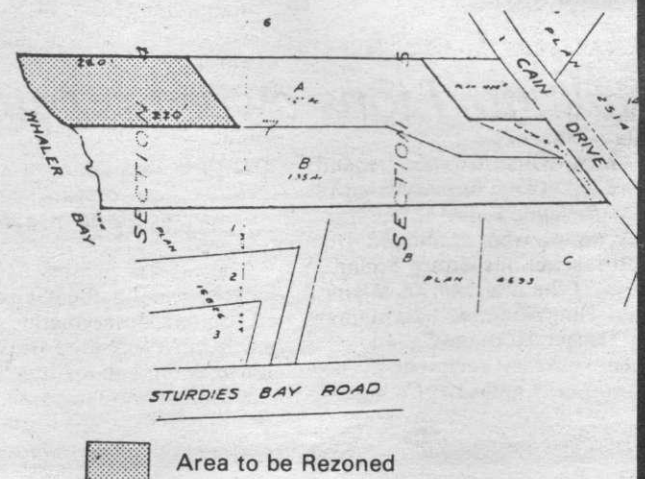

- 2. The maximum density shall be 9 cabin units with a maximum floor area of 74.5 square metres per cabin.

Island Historians

On Tuesday, October 27, the Gulf Islands Branch of the BC Historical Federation went on a field trip to Vancouver. Members from Pender, Mayne and Galiano travelled by chartered bus to Chinatown to visit the Sun Yat Sen Garden, completed one and a half years ago through the joint effort of many individuals and groups in Canada and China at the federal, provincial and grass roots level.

On arrival at the garden, islanders were met by three docents ready to conduct them around this uniquely beautiful place, so different from the Western concept of a garden with lawns and flowers. Here the walls enclose an oasis of tranquility, that seem far removed from the noise and bustle of the streets outside.

The design of a classical Chinese garden, which has been perfected over a period of 2,000 years, includes buildings such as pavilions or halls, and water, rocks and plants arranged to represent the Yin and the Yang — the serene and restless side of nature. As one walks around, different vistas are revealed. The primary aim of the designer is to make the viewer feel happy and relaxed, free from all worry and care.

After a nourishing Chinese dim sum, members spent the afternoon at the Museum of Anthropology, where the curator is Dr David Pokotylo who is a specialist on the Montague Harbour midden. Members may remember the rewarding day Dr Pokotylo spent with them on a field-expedition there in June, 1986. Although himself unable to spend time with the group at the museum, he mapped out a program for the three docents. This included viewing artifacts from the Gulf Islands and illustrations of the seasonal activities of the Coast Salish and what life must have been like in our area in pre-contact times.

Thanks are due to Frances Margolis, a senior docent for the

Chinese Garden, who arranged the tour there, although she was ill in hospital and couldn't conduct us personally as originally planned.

The next branch meeting will be on Thursday, December 3, on Galiano when members from the other Outer Islands can arrive at Sturdies Bay at 5:45 pm and return to their homes on the ferry leaving Sturdies Bay at 8:30 pm after the meeting at the school.

The speaker will be Greg Foster of Whaler Bay Boat Yard who will tell of the *Discovery Re-enactment of the North West Bicentenary Expedition* planned for the summer of 1992 when replicas of the ships' boats of the British and Spanish survey of this coast will re-enact the survey of 1792 from southern Puget Sound to the northern tip of Vancouver Island — under oar and sail.

Painting Students' Show

Molly Bobak, formerly of Galiano and now of Fredricton, has been visiting her daughter Anny for the past several weeks. Molly's painting career began on Galiano, before she became an official war artist with the Canadian Armed Forces in the

Second World War and then artist-in-residence at the University of New Brunswick.

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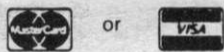
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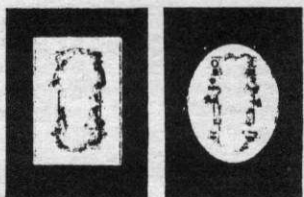

Counselling clinic open in Sidney

Confidential birth control counselling will be available to Salt Spring teenagers at a clinic being opened in Sidney by the South Vancouver Island Family Planning Society.

Donna Dippie, president of the SVI Family Planning Society, said the clinic was established "in response to a request from the Peninsula Community Association's interministerial committee for children and youth."

The clinic opened Thursday, October 29. It operates from the Capital Regional District (CRD) building at 2440 Sidney Avenue each Thursday between 7 and 9 pm.

"All clinics offer confidential one-to-one birth control counselling by trained volunteer counselors and nurses," said Dippie on Friday. "Patients wishing birth control will be seen by a doctor."

Dippie said a clinic is being set up in Sidney because the B.C. Ferry Corporation schedule makes it impossible for Gulf Islanders to visit the Victoria clinic and return home later the same evening. The opening of a birth control clinic in Sidney will make it possible for Salt Spring youths to take a ferry to Sidney, obtain the birth control counselling they seek, and then ride the Swartz Bay-Fulford Harbour ferry home in the evening.

Dippie said concern over the number of teenage pregnancies in the Sidney area led directly to the Sidney clinic's establishment. She said probation officials, schools and public health professionals agreed the clinic was needed.

Anyone wishing to visit the clinic should telephone the CRD (388-2201) for information. Appointments are necessary.

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Isabella Point terminal proposal draws opposition

The manager of a Salt Spring land-development and resort company is protesting the B.C. Ferry Corporation's consideration of a new terminal at Isabella Point.

Charles Bazzard of Maracaibo Estates Ltd. said last week in a letter to the corporation that he is "apprehensive about the effects" of the terminal proposal.

Bazzard, who sent a copy of his letter to *Driftwood*, told the corporation he believes its proposal would cost islanders more money for a lessened service and have serious detrimental spinoff effects.

The corporation's proposal is to construct a new terminal at Isabella Point to replace existing terminals — and services — operated at Fulford Harbour and Long Harbour. Maracaibo Estates is located near Long Harbour.

In itemizing his concerns, Bazzard said an Isabella Point terminal would mean:

- increased road travel time for the majority of island residents, who live in the northern portion of Salt Spring;
- higher travelling costs, since a family of four can reach Tsawwassen from Long Harbour for \$25.25 but must pay \$44.30 if they go via Fulford Harbour and Swartz Bay;

- difficulty in integrating the current Long Harbour reservation system into one serving Swartz Bay;
- inevitable loss of employment on Salt Spring, which would in turn have a harmful effect on the island's economic base;
- the "death of most of the Fulford Harbour commercial enterprises";
- significant and costly road system improvements, including a bypass of Ganges, a new road to the proposed terminal site and upgrading of north end roads;
- severing of a direct link between Salt Spring and the Outer Islands;

- loss of "an attractive and alternate ferry route" for tourists; and
- an insignificant saving in sea time between the Fulford and Isabella Point routes, compared to the cost of the project.

Looking at the present terminals, Bazzard suggested the corporation would be better off maintaining the Long Harbour service while writing "a schedule that coincides with the capability of the ship."

He explained: "All the travellers want to know is when to catch the ferry. They cannot accept the ferry being one to two hours off

schedule as a general rule. If this is accomplished, I suspect most of the complaints will stop."

About Fulford, Bazzard said the terminal and service should remain much as it now is, but that two or three ferries a day could be rescheduled to allow for easy transfer to Swartz Bay departures bound for Tsawwassen.

He also suggested that the corporation purchase land in Fulford to develop as a parking lot for employees and commuters, and that it should acquire a portion of the government water lease north of the dock to be filled and developed as a larger parking area.

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
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Solid FC effort carries team to 6-0 whitewash of Peninsula

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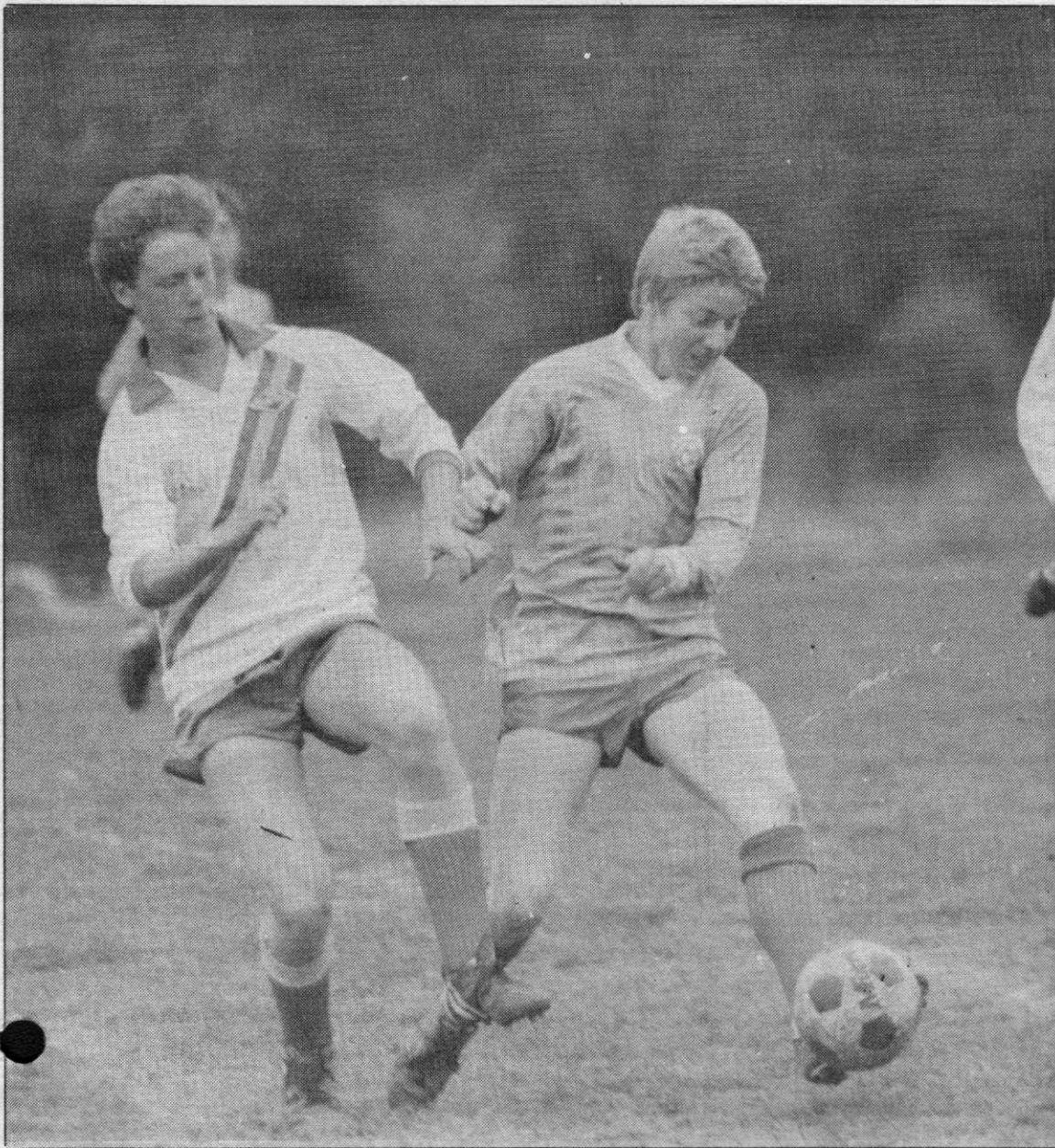

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Computer mapping opens new doors

Don Peden presses a button on the keyboard of his Namtec computer, then sits back as the machine goes to work. A light flickers on the hard-drive, and with startling speed, a series of lines appear on the colour monitor mounted above. Within milliseconds, the computer's invisible hand — guided by a micro-chip mind capable of assimilating and storing 42 million bits of information — traces a rough rectangle on the screen, in one corner of which is etched the instantly-recognizable shape of Ganges Harbour. Next to appear is a cobwebbed pattern of property lines, which slowly rolls down over the rectangle like a lace blind.

After a few moments, the hard-drive falls silent. To the average individual, the image remaining on the monitor is just another map of Ganges. But to Peden, it is the face of the future.

A Salt Spring Island resident since the summer of 1986, Peden has only become deeply involved in the field of computer mapping in the past few years. Yet with the aid of today's sophisticated technology, he and a number of other people around the world are pushing back the frontiers of computer-assisted mapping — and perhaps changing the way people use these documents.

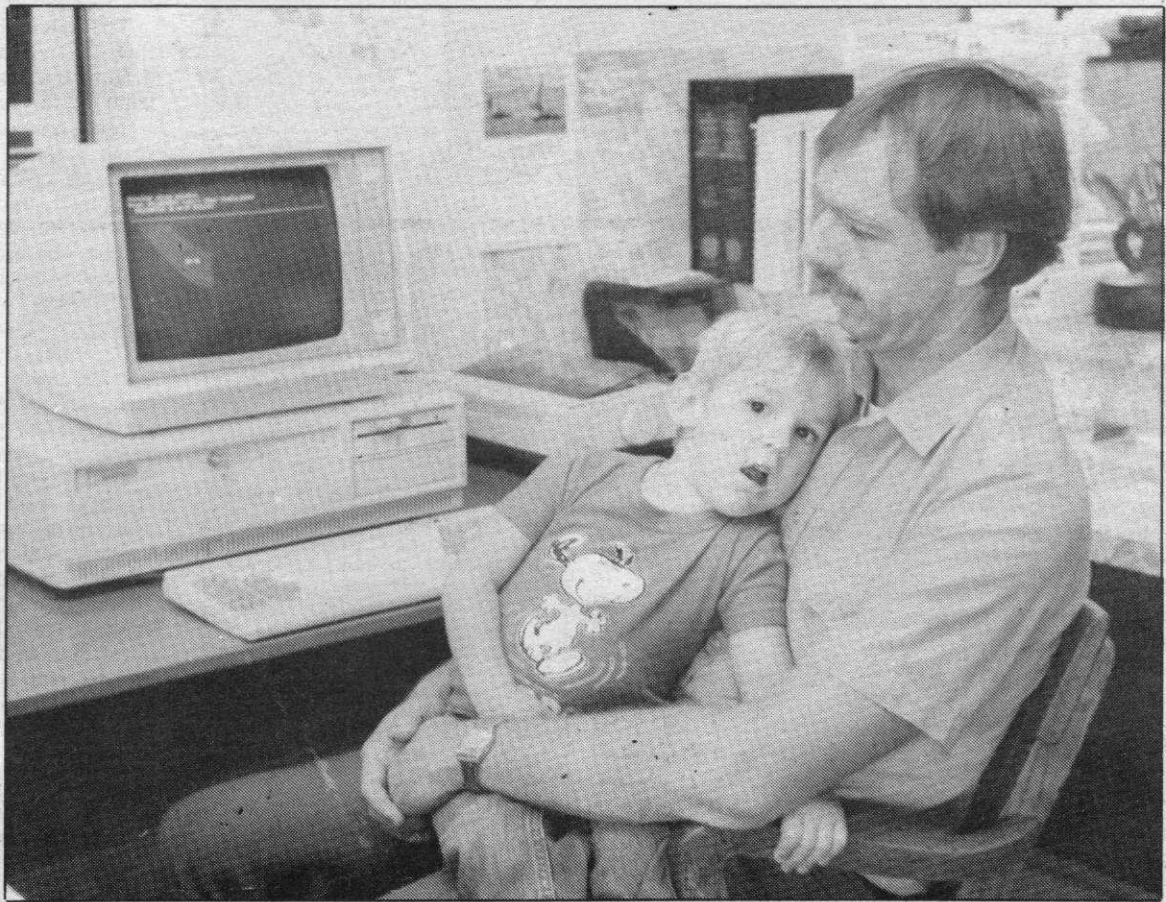
Peden, a University of Victoria graduate in biology and botany who also possess degrees from Aberdeen in the United Kingdom and Colorado State, grew up in Victoria. For eight years prior to his arrival on Salt Spring, he worked in East Africa as part of the Kenya Rangeland Ecological Monitoring unit, a group supported first by the World Bank and later by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA).

It was in Kenya that he first became directly involved with the use of computers for mapping, data-base planning and management. Last year, he decided to take a sabbatical, acquired a computer system of his own, and began working in computer-assisted mapping.

Using his Namtec computer — an IBM/AT clone — and specialized computer mapping software developed by Environmental Systems Research Institute, Peden is able to program a series of maps into his computer, using a digitizer. The digitizer, which looks like a small magnifying glass equipped with crosshairs, enables the computer to 'see' the lines on the map; by moving it over the map surface and touching a special trigger device, Peden can load the map into the computer hard-drive. "Digitizing" an existing map is a time-consuming process, but as Peden notes, once it is stored in the computer's memory, it can be recalled at any time.

Although Peden can reproduce incredibly accurate, multi-coloured maps using the computer and his plotter printer — and even generate his own — he feels this is not the major benefit offered by computer-assisted mapping.

Peden, unlike most people,

sees a map as a "window into a data base." A map placed in a computer's memory can become a tool for the retrieval of information useful for planning and other purposes. He points out that his computer can not only store a number of maps, but can combine maps of different scales — thus creating one map from many.

For example, Peden — who has been doing some volunteer work for the Islands Trust — has painstakingly loaded all the information contained on a soils map of Ganges into his computer's hard-drive storage system. This has been combined with information contained on a map showing property lines and contours. Now,

er mapmaker is limited in his work only by the capacity of his computer storage system. If he has enough time to digitize any number of existing maps — and a computer storage system capable of handling them all — he can make maps so detailed that they could show every building and tree on hundreds of pieces of property in a given area.

The potential offered by computer mapping boggles the mind. On Salt Spring, Peden feels the use of a computer mapping and data-base system would make planning much easier for organizations like the Islands Trust and the Capital Regional District. The decision to rezone a piece of

engineers. In the event of a fire in Toronto, the computer — once given the location of the blaze — can plot the most direct route to the fire in a matter of seconds.

Similar systems are also being used to provide police with accurate information on the whereabouts of people with criminal records. One system, for example, is capable of telling police the occupants of a specific home, as well as their criminal record, if any.

It is only in the past few years that computer mapping software and data-base systems of this type were developed. However, Peden expects it will be big business in the future.

One expert told him that market sales and service of computer systems designed specifically for urban planning will likely total \$74 billion during the next five years.

Although the application of computer technology of this type offers significant benefits to mankind, Peden noted that it may also create some new problems. It would be relatively easy, using this technology, for governments and organizations to manipulate data for their own purposes.

He knows, for example, that one African government does not show its military bases on any maps. Those locations carry designations for swamps on all maps put out by the government. It is also quite simple, he pointed out, for skilled computer operators to breach security and substitute data on government or business records.

Peden says he doesn't really know where the computer technology of the type he uses will take mankind.

"I'm still grappling with that," he said. "I haven't really got an answer."

after considerable work, he has one map stored in his computer than shows all of these things — and can call it up onto the monitor at random.

But that's not all. He can also zero in on a specific part of his Ganges map and enlarge it until its exact shape and size is visible on the computer monitor. This makes it possible for him (and the Islands Trust) to look at any parcel of land or piece of property in the Ganges area and know instantly its contours as well as the soil types present.

It is this ability to place large amounts of information on one map contained within the computer's memory that makes computer mapping so useful, notes Peden. Theoretically, the comput-

property would be made easier, for example, because Trust officials could "zero in" on the subject property and in minutes know everything about it. The computer could even be programmed to make the decision for them, based on a set of guiding principles outline by Trust officials.

Although computer mapping of this type is relatively new, Peden notes that organizations around the world are already finding hundreds of uses for it.

The City of Toronto, he said, is already using a computer mapping and data-base storage system. City street maps and traffic flow patterns have already been stored in a central computer system, and can instantly be recalled by

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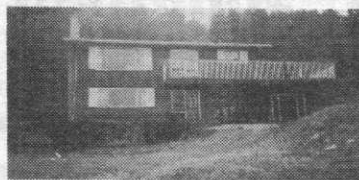
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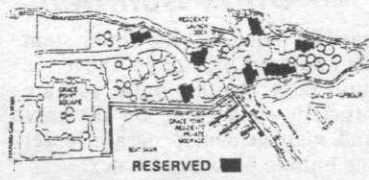
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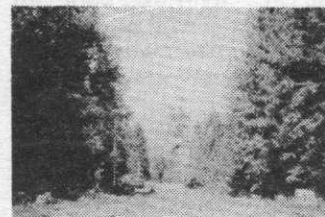
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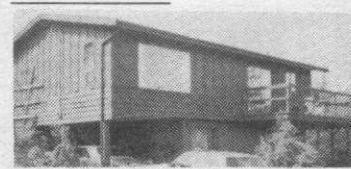
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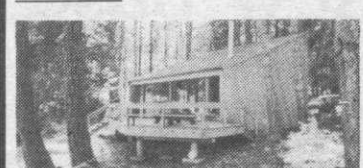

situation in the Gulf Islands — and that includes Isabella Point — is looked at.”

Nicholson said it costs the corporation \$80,000 a month to keep a crew on Saturna. As a result, she said, the plan is not economically feasible during the winter, when demand for the service is lower.

“It’s costing us \$80,000 a month, over and above our basic operating costs,” she noted. “As you know, the entire Gulf Islands route is heavily subsidized already. Cost-wise and demand-wise, it’s just not feasible. We simply can’t do it.”

She added that the Saturna vessel is also used for dangerous cargo sailings to the area. It is difficult, she said, to offer these special sailings when the vessel is based on Saturna.

The corporation, Nicholson said, will move the vessel from on Saturna to Swartz Bay.

“We’ll have to move it back for the winter, but we may possibly look at putting it out there (on Saturna) again in the spring — although that’s not definite,” she said.

measure. The corporation has also stated that basing the vessel on Saturna is not economically feasible and would cost an additional \$80,000 per month.

John Allan, Galiano’s representative on the transportation committee, disagrees with the ferry corporation’s stand that stationing a vessel on Saturna was temporary. He is also concerned about how the corporation’s move to return the ferry to Swartz Bay will affect Gulf Islands ferry service.

“We are totally opposed to this move,” Allan said, adding that “the minutes of every meeting since this was brought up show that the B.C. Ferry Corporation wanted the stationing of vessel on Saturna to be a permanent thing.”

Allan said he is convinced that the corporation’s proposal will mean “reduced service” to the Gulf Islands.

“We’re not exactly in a time of restraint,” he noted, “so why are they (BCFC officials) taking a step back now?”

“The minister of tourism has allocated \$500,000 for promoting the Gulf Islands . . . and here we have the B.C. Ferry Corporation cutting back on service. It certainly seems counter-productive.”

Ferry corporation officials have indicated they plan to return the Saturna ferry to Swartz Bay this winter. Allan said he doesn’t know if there is any way Gulf Islands transportation committees can stop the move.

“I don’t know (if we can prevent it),” he said. “Maybe handcuffing someone to a B.C. Ferry Corporation dock and disrupting service (would do it).”

Twenty-five years ago

- An Adult Education class sponsored by School District 64 was being taught by David Anderson, a well-known Deep Cove artist.

Anderson was described as the most completely trained graphic artist in Canada, having spent 20 years studying art in many forms. Following graduation with honours from the Ontario College of Art, he did post-graduate work at art schools in New York.

- An open house was being held at the school board and public health building in Ganges.

The public was invited to attend the building's opening ceremonies, which were to be conducted by school board chairman Gil Humphreys. Various health department officials were also expected to attend.

- According to Ganges weather observer Howard Carlin, the highest temperature for the month was recorded on October 21, when the temperature was 68 degrees Fahrenheit. The month's lowest temperature — 41 degrees — was recorded on October 4 and 5.

A total of 4.3 inches of rain fell during the month, nearly a full inch more than the amount recorded in the same month a year earlier.

- Sixteen volunteer drivers and 32 Sea Scouts collected 10,000 beer bottles during a drive on Salt Spring.

Twenty years ago

- Reconstruction of the wharf at Vesuvius resulted in schedule changes for the Crofton ferry.

Fraser River Pile Driving was hired to complete the necessary repairs, and the firm was making slow but steady progress.

- The Gulf Islands were officially recognized as an organized territory when an order-in-council was passed bringing the electoral areas of Salt Spring and the Outer Islands into the Capital Regional District.

However, not even delegates named by the order-in-council were informed of the procedure. According to provincial government officials, the islands were included in the CRD so ratepayers could elect their own representatives, rather than have them appointed by the government.

- Les Ramsey, president of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce, said that although he felt the Gulf Islands would benefit from membership in the CRD, he objected to the way the matter was handled.

"There is nothing democratic about the way this was done," said Ramsey. "It has been pushed down our throats."

- Ted Akerman of Fulford Harbour reported another incident of sheep shooting to the RCMP.

The sheep, according to Akerman, were shot and killed on the west side of Salt Spring Island.

- Water was desperately needed at Southey Point, the most northerly portion of Salt Spring Island.

Many residents of the area were having water trucked to their homes, while others hauled it home in jugs. Yet when the chairman of the public water meeting in Ganges said Southey Point could have water any time, residents were angered. Many had applied for service but been told that no water was available.

Fifteen years ago

- Veterinarian David Lott was back to work in Ganges.

Lott had spent several weeks in Ethiopia, where he was examining stock breeding practices employed by Ethiopian farmers. He was sent there by the Canadian government and was scheduled to make a report to Ottawa upon his return home.

- Despite pouring rain and heavy mist, a fair crowd attended the dedication of the memorial cairn at Peter Arnell Park.

The cairn was erected by the Corporation of B.C. Land Surveyors in memory of Peter Arnell, who was accidentally shot and killed while surveying on Galiano in 1968. His former employer and partner, Adrian Wolfe-Milner, introduced the afternoon's ceremony with a brief tribute to Arnell.

- One candidate announced her plan to seek election to the Gulf Islands school board in December.

Bertha Matthews, who had already served a two-year term on the board, was willing to stand for re-election on Pender Island. None of the other incumbents — or any newcomers — had indicated any intention to seek office.

Ten years ago

- Rev. Thomas F. Wright, 82, and Grace A. Wright, 76, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary with a quiet family dinner at a local restaurant.

Both were born in Ontario, but met and married in Detroit, Michigan, where they worked at the Detroit Episcopal City Mission. After living in Britain during the Second World War — where Thomas served as a chaplain/squadron leader in the Royal Air Force — they returned to Canada, eventually retiring to Salt Spring Island.

- A Committee of Concerned Citizens requested that the Ganges sewer project be cancelled "because of irregularities."

The committee felt the sewer project should be cancelled because "misleading and insufficient information was presented . . .

with driftwood

by canvassers" and "intimidation was used to obtain affirmative signatures."

- Agriculturist and teacher David Stacey announced his candidacy for the Gulf Islands school board.

Stacey suggested that his chief function on the board would be to listen to both parents and teachers, and — within provisions of the Public Schools Act — help bring about optimum educational growth in the community.

Five years ago

- A coroner's report on the death of a bicyclist on Galiano Island made four recommendations aimed at increased safety for cyclists.

Paula Rimmer of Vancouver was struck while riding her bicycle on Porlier Pass Road. Following an inquiry into the incident, coroner Hugh Ross of Ganges recommended that the department of highways and the provincial government's tourism department considering constructing bicycle paths — particularly along roads leading to ferry terminals.

- After a bitter attack on the community plan by regional director Yvette Valcourt, the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee rejected a Windmill Farms plan to build a small shopping mall along Lower Ganges Road.

The committee also suggested that the community plan be reviewed and amended where the community saw fit.

- The Capital Regional District was asked for details on the cost of the Ganges sewer project.

A meeting of the Salt Spring Advisory Planning Commission voted to ask for the information when Arvid Chalmers reported he had been unable to gain satisfactory data on the subject.

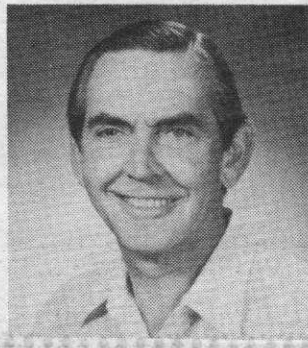
ONE MAN'S DIARY . . .
