Acis and Galatea performance delights crowd in Galiano hall

More than a decade before the *Sutil* set out on the voyage that brought Europeans to the Gulf Islands for the first time, the music rooms of the English aristocracy resounded with the delights of a pastoral opera by Georg Frederich Handel. It was immensely popular — and little wonder, given its components: a young couple, Acis and Galatea, deeply and passionately in love, he handsome and she beautiful; insane jealousy embodied in a legendary monster of Greek mythology, the cyclops; the vicious murder of Acis by this monstrous embodiment of evil; and then, in the manner of myth, the resurrection of the slain lover as a spring of pure crystal water.

On January 19, this age-old tale lifted from Book 13 of Ovid's *Metamorphoses* and retold in music and an English libretto by John Dryden, lived again for an enchanting two hours in the Galiano Community Hall. The setting lacked the marble, the rich furnishings of courtly 18th century Europe and the fantastical ornamentation of the baroque imagination, but as a space in which to experience this opera, it was far closer to what those first listeners would have heard and seen than our huge modern concert halls with their audiences of thousands.

To help the performance take us yet further back to the sounds of two centuries ago, there was the time machine of the instruments themselves: not the high tech modern instruments we are used to seeing and hearing in our symphonies, but beautifully crafted baroque oboes, recorders, violins, cello, double bass and harpsichord, and some of the

sweetest most delicate sounds that this listener's ears have heard for a long while.

Just as impressive was the dramatic skill of Nathaniel Watson who portrayed the monster Polyphemus with a gusto bordering on identification, the lightness required of an effective baroque vocal style from the two leads, and the clarity of the shepherd-counsellor, Damon, who commented on the action in a gentle tenor. And I was touched by the artistry of baroque violinist

Carlo Novi in his solo work and the curling, improvised ornamentation of oboist Bruce Haynes.

There was a capacity audience of about 90 with a sense of the occasion, in dress ranging from bush jackets to the full Scots regalia of Alistair Ross. The Cecilian Ensemble of about seven instrumentalists and five singers, dressed equally variously from full evening attire to informal turtle-necks, obviously enjoyed bringing this gorgeous work to a receptive audience. As the action got underway, the revolution in the performance of baroque music that has occurred over the past 25 years brought a new dimension of sound to Galiano.

It was an evening of fine music-making, the kind that is remembered long after the event, and the standing ovation which ended the performance suggests that those whose good fortune it was to be at this unique happening knew they had been touched by the magic of great music brought to life by fine musicians. That it happened is thanks to the hard work of a number of people, including Krista Weiss who created beautifully-designed tickets (themselves collectors' items), and Ken Millard, the PhD. in physics and one of North America's finest baroque instrument-and-bow-makers, who is now a Galiano resident, and the contact man for bringing the group to the island.

And just to make sure that some seeds for the future were planted, the group performed a shorter version of the tale in a school concert that morning at Galiano Elementary. A rather special music day for our island.

Announcement made at APC meeting

Pender site of first regional park

One new face was added to the advisory planning commission and several major issues affecting South Pender were discussed at an information meeting held last Thursday.

About two dozen people came to the community centre to listen to Island trustees Steve Wright and Elaine Jacobsen.

Wright said he was happy to announce negotiations between the island and Killam/Lefavre developers had ended after six years. "It's taken three local trust committees," he said.

The key agreement has the developers turn over 310 acres of the property to the Capital Regional District (CRD) to be used as a public day park. "It's the first regional park in the Gulf Islands," Wright said.

In exchange, the community will permit a denser settlement scheme for the proposed 46-lot development. The highways ministry has final approval over how many lots may be developed.

The CRD will develop the park in accordance with the community plan, which calls for horseback and hiking trails.

Wright announced the 1984, three-year zoning status, which allowed a log dump while Killam/Lefavre cleared the land, had expired. The log dump will have to be removed.

Fish farms will not be welcomed on South Pender. Wright led the meeting through a discussion of a proposed zoning amendment, to be decided at the February 19 Trust meeting, which

would forbid fish farms in Bedwell Harbour.

Currently, Bedwell is the only water open to the new industry, though none are in place. "We'll try to exclude aquaculture from Water B areas (Bedwell)," Wright said.

There was general agreement to assert the Island's jurisdiction in this area for 1,000 metres from the shore. Beyond that limit, free-floating fish farms can be set up if they have a foreshore lease from the provincial government.

Hugh Griffiths joined incumbents John Henshaw and Jiggs Christie on the advisory planning commission. The men, all retired, faced no challengers for the positions.

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
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
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saturna scene

Six Penderites enroll in acting course

A half dozen Pender residents are enrolled in an introductory acting course taught by a former student of the man who invented theatre sports.

Christa Grace-Warrick, who moved here from Vancouver last fall, is teaching the six-week course. She received a masters degree in movement and dance therapy from San Francisco. She has also worked with Keith

Johnstone, the Calgary man who debuted Theatre Sports, the popular improvisational game which has spread throughout North America.

It isn't surprising Grace-Warrick emphasizes movement and improvisation in her classes.

"Improvisation is to a large extent freeing up, losing inhibitions," she explains.

"You have to get people to know and trust each other, so they can let their imaginations rip."

Grace-Warrick will lead her students through theatre games and improvisational exercises. "We'll gradually work into skits and scenes."

She hopes the students will have fun and learn something about theatre, "so if they go to a movie they see something they didn't see before."

Grace-Warrick writes about theatre for magazines and teaches classes in the Lower Mainland. She says she would like to teach on Salt Spring.

The classes are offered through continuing education under the direction of Diane Allison. Initial response brought four women of various ages and one male who Allison describes as "quite an extrovert."

The course, taught at the community centre, has not yet found a definite time or night due to the conflicting schedules of students.

Museum society meets Saturday

Pender's past may live again amidst the revelry and business slated for the museum society's first annual general meeting, to be held this Saturday night (January 31) at the community centre.

Secretary June Frache encourages people to bring casseroles or

Library's membership increases on Pender

A new chapter has been added to the history of Pender Island's library.

Membership at the Pender Lender rose by 131 persons in 1986, bringing the total to 338, library president June Hall announced at the January 20 annual general meeting.

"The service has grown so the membership has grown," Hall surmised. She detailed improvements to the library made during the past year.

Friday's hours were extended, a book drop was added to the front door and furniture was obtained for the reference and reading room.

Hall said the audio tapes and the large print editions of books have proven surprisingly popular. "We'll have to request more."

A revolving bookshelf service allows the library to rotate some of its stock with other regional libraries. This has provided access to books the Pender Lender did not have on hand. "Someone wanted a book on how to train cockatiels," Hall remembered.

The new services have cost the library about \$8,000, Hall said, and have left the same amount in the bank. "We've spent a lot of money but we're still in the black."

Hall said the library raised \$2,200 through a swap and shop, about \$500 in a book sale and received one anonymous donation of \$500.

Bill Barnes and Michael McCaffrey were re-elected as directors.

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Flute, guitar concert set

Wind and Wood is a flute and guitar duo comprised of Brad Prevedoros on guitar and Mary Reher on flute. Prevedoros and Reher will give a concert on Sunday, February 8, at the Pender Legion Hall, beginning at 8 pm.

Admission is \$4 for adults, \$2 for children from 6 to 12, and no charge for children younger than six years. Tickets at the door.

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Artists' co-op opens exhibit at island gallery

Galiano's week of culture commenced Monday with an exciting performance of Handel's *Acis and Galatea*, which is reviewed below by Cam Trowsdale. Cam is a long-time weekend Galiano resident whose musical credentials are impeccable. Cam teaches in the music department at UBC, has been concert master of the CBC Vancouver Orchestra and has had his own music program on CBC radio. Among his less nationally known accomplishments are violin recitals at the Pink Geranium and the Hummingbird Inn. We are very grateful to Cam for his excellent review.

On Friday evening the artists' co-operative opened the *Erotica* exhibition at the Dandelion Gallery. Salt Spring potter and art critic, Gary Chernoff, covers this show elsewhere in this issue. The most shockingly erotic art on display was by Dean, Tona and Holly, but as the crowd of art lovers at the opening night consumed the evidence, there is little that the authorities can do. It appeared that the recipes for these delicious hors d'Eros were supplied by Judy Chicago. During a quiet interval, artist W. Breddels offered some surrealistic comments on the relation of art to society and society to artists.

A film shot by Debra Holmes at Montague Harbour was also shown. It featured driftwood, a shell beach and two feet. It is unlikely that any viewer had ever seen such incredibly erotic feet. It is as well that there were no credits, for if it was known that the feet were still treading the beaches of Galiano, considerable ecological damage might result.

What was especially attractive about the exhibition was, in the words of the TV cereal commercial, "What it didn't contain." Not hung was the portrait, by the junior member of the Galiano Group of Two, James, of Patricia of Greenwater Bay, painted from imaginary memory. Also missing were the semi-abstract entwined pottery figures a local artist spent so much time modelling. It is believed that they were so hot that they exploded in the kiln. Pity!

On Saturday in the North Galiano Community Hall, Wyn Stephen showed slides and spoke of the tour of the USSR which she took last fall with son Robert. They were fortunate to have an enthusiastic and helpful Intourist guide, and enjoyed good health and appetite. Wyn takes minor setbacks in her stride and, artist that she is, enjoyed the multitude of visual delights she encountered, culminating in the highlight of a visit to the Heritage Museum in Leningrad.

The Patersons, on the other hand, were less fortunate. There is nothing worse for the traveller than being sick in a strange place, and being dragged from monument to museum while wishing for nothing more than to be left in peace. Bill valiantly took pictures, and both he and Joan stored up impressions of the people. Although they found individual Soviet citizens friendly and helpful, the barriers to communication rarely came down. A tour group is at the mercy of the organizers and guide, and the itinerary is rarely designed to facilitate getting to know the ordinary people of a country.

Capping off the cultural week is news from Dorothy Livesay that she is to be made an Officer of the Order of Canada. Galiano's resident poet (except in the winter when she moves to town) is also to receive the honorary degree of D.

Lit at the June convocation of Simon Fraser University. Her latest book of poems, *The Self-completing Tree* is into its second printing, an equally noteworthy achievement.

Assault on the Deli

In an operation that had obviously been planned for weeks, the Deli next to Fort Galiano was assaulted and captured last week by a consortium of Silvers and Larry Moulton. The prudence of Bob Bambrick in constructing his palisade in advance of the attack was revealed.

On Wednesday, January 21, the final assault was mounted. It was planned like a military operation, which perhaps accounts for the supervising presence of Lt-Col (ret) Arthur Wood, with second-in-command Wharfinger (ret) Vaughan Cowley. Leading the troops was Bob Knowles, wielding a 24-inch chain saw, and felling trees with a nimble dexterity. No sooner had a cedar been felled than it was trimmed, bucked and hauled to the rear for Bruce Landmark to rip into lumber. Patriarch Doug Silver kept a watchful eye on the ground scene, while Larry Moulton was on hand to lend assistance with the plumbing.

By afternoon the scene had been completely transformed. Instead of the gloomy forest, a clear view extended for hundreds of meters down to Robson Park. The following day a victory pyre was lit and clouds of acrid, grey smoke billowed over the fort. At night glowing sparks floated up into the dark sky. The ground is now cleared for an extension of the premises which might, in the future, contain a self-serve section. Local oenophiles will be relieved to learn that the new establishment has obtained the necessary liquor licence, and that there will be no interruption of supply. The new ownership and expansion suggest that the beverage and booze capital of Galiano will be the *New Deli*.

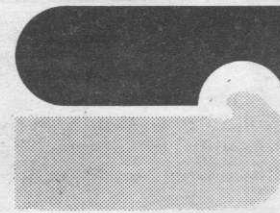

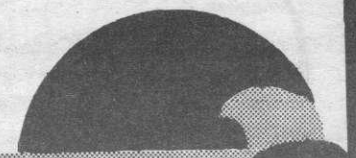

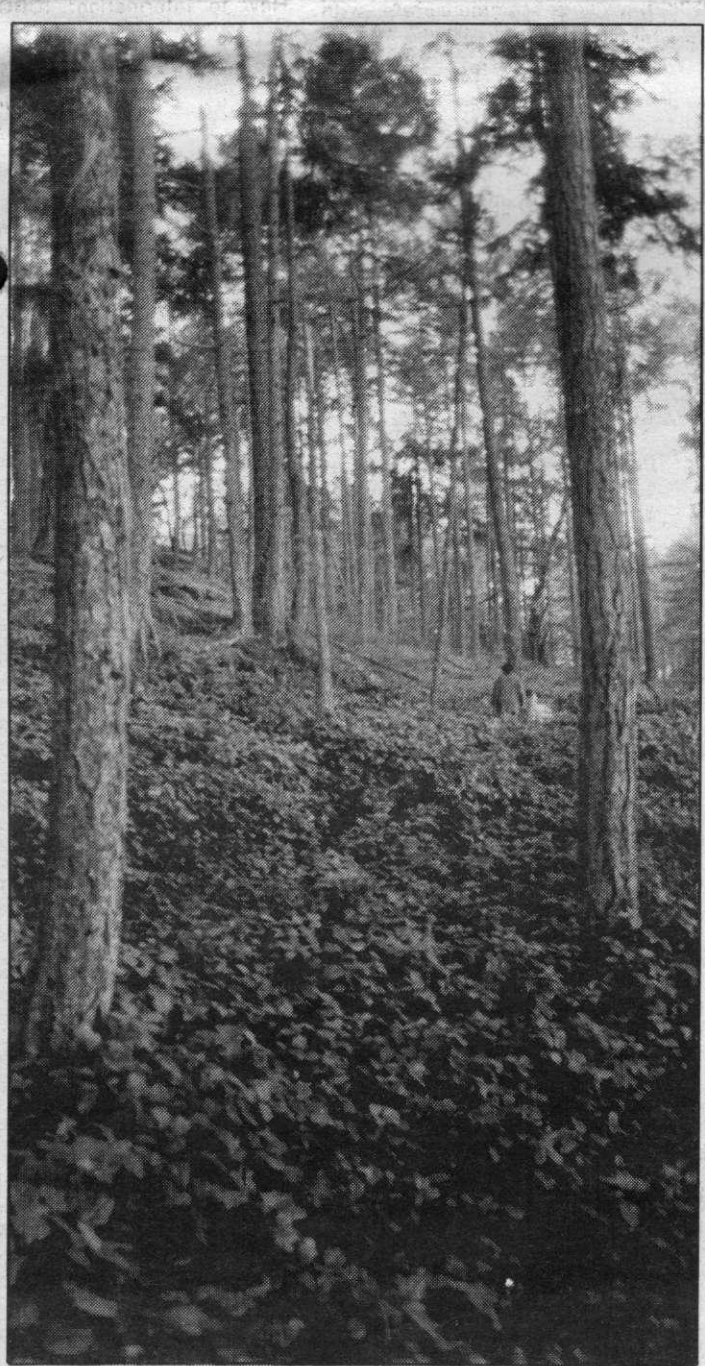

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Parks commission hears reports, recommendations

The Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission made public a series of six policy recommendations at its annual general meeting held January 19.

The recommendations, passed by the commission at its December meeting but not made public until last week, were developed by members after they reviewed the results of their 1986 questionnaire.

One of the recommendations — the proposal that a referendum be held here this fall on the issue of building an indoor swimming pool — was announced earlier in the month. However, commission chairman Glen Woodley last week outlined five others that dealt with such matters as the creation of bike paths and the search for suitable boat launching areas.

In its first recommendation, the commission approved the hiring of a recreation director. The director, a student the commission hopes to hire under the University of Victoria's co-operative education program, would oversee recreational programs here between May and August.

The commission also plans to pursue the matter of bike paths. A significant number of residents surveyed in 1986 indicated they wanted to see more bike paths on the island. In working toward meeting that request, the commission has decided to write to the area's MLAs, the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce and the ministry of tourism to inform these organizations of its desire to see more bike paths here.

The commission also hopes to obtain a map showing all public beach accesses and work toward letting the public know more about these entry points. A recommendation dealing with the search for suitable boat launching areas was also approved. Many of those surveyed in 1986 also asked that more beach accesses and boat launching areas be provided on the island.

One other recommendation dealt with the future creation of a suitable fitness area "attached to the pool" facility (if the latter is approved in this fall's referendum). Complete details were not available.

In other news from the commission's annual general meeting, members received and discussed reports from the organization's treasurer, chairman and Capital Regional District (CRD) representative. The reports from a number of committee chairmen were also discussed.

Hugh Borsman, commission member and CRD representative, indicated he felt 1986 was a "busy, productive and pleasant year for the commission."

In his report, Borsman noted

that "Centennial Park and its problems seem to be on the verge of resolution."

"This year," he continued, "the park, in effect, was transferred from the provincial government to the community. Provincial legislation gave the CRD, and hence the parks and recreation commission, control over community parks, and our local park-use bylaw spelled this control out in some detail. As a partial result, mid-week vending is being controlled and will result in funds being raised towards park maintenance. I anticipate that the liaison between the commission and the vendors will eliminate the problems of recent years."

Borsman pointed out that between 1983 and 1985, the controversy over vending in the park caused a number of commission members to resign. He said, however, that "1986 has seen a virtual end to this completely unwarranted conflict (over vending). From my standpoint, the outstanding development this year is the return of harmony and a strong spirit of co-operation amongst the members of the commission."

Borsman said each member of the parks and recreation commis-

sion made a significant contribution in the past year.

He noted that the two-year terms of five parks and recreation commission members — Spencer Marr, Phil Hume, Jocelyn Holmes, Jim Ballantyne and Merv Walde — ended this year. He added, however, that with the exception of Waldie, all other directors have agreed to serve for another two years.

Waldie — whose work, Borsman said, "conflicts with his commission duties" — has been replaced on the board by Wayne Taylor, a local teacher and member of the Salt Spring Swimming Pool Society.

The commission now looks toward 1987. In his report, chairman Woodley thanked all members for their efforts during the past year and said the coming year will probably be a busy one for the commission.

Woodley said he remains "a little worried" about mid-week vending and the farmers' market, and the controversy surrounding both matters. However, he noted that the commission is working with both groups to resolve the situation.

"It looks like it could be an exciting year for the commission," he noted.

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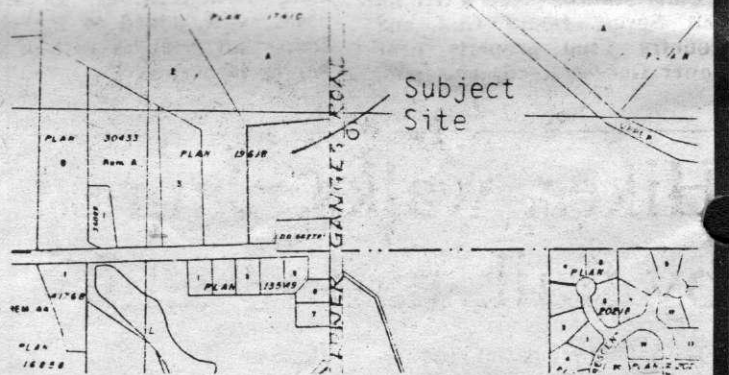
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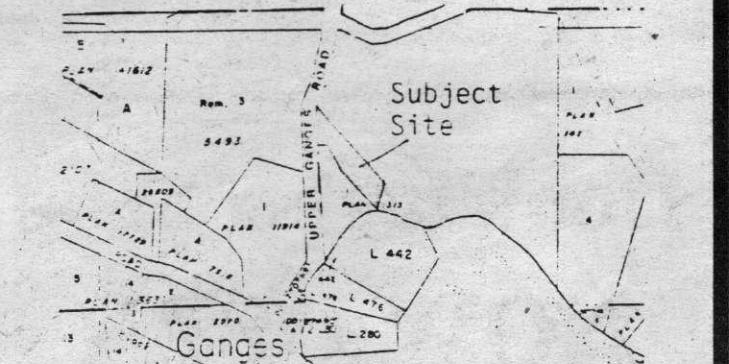

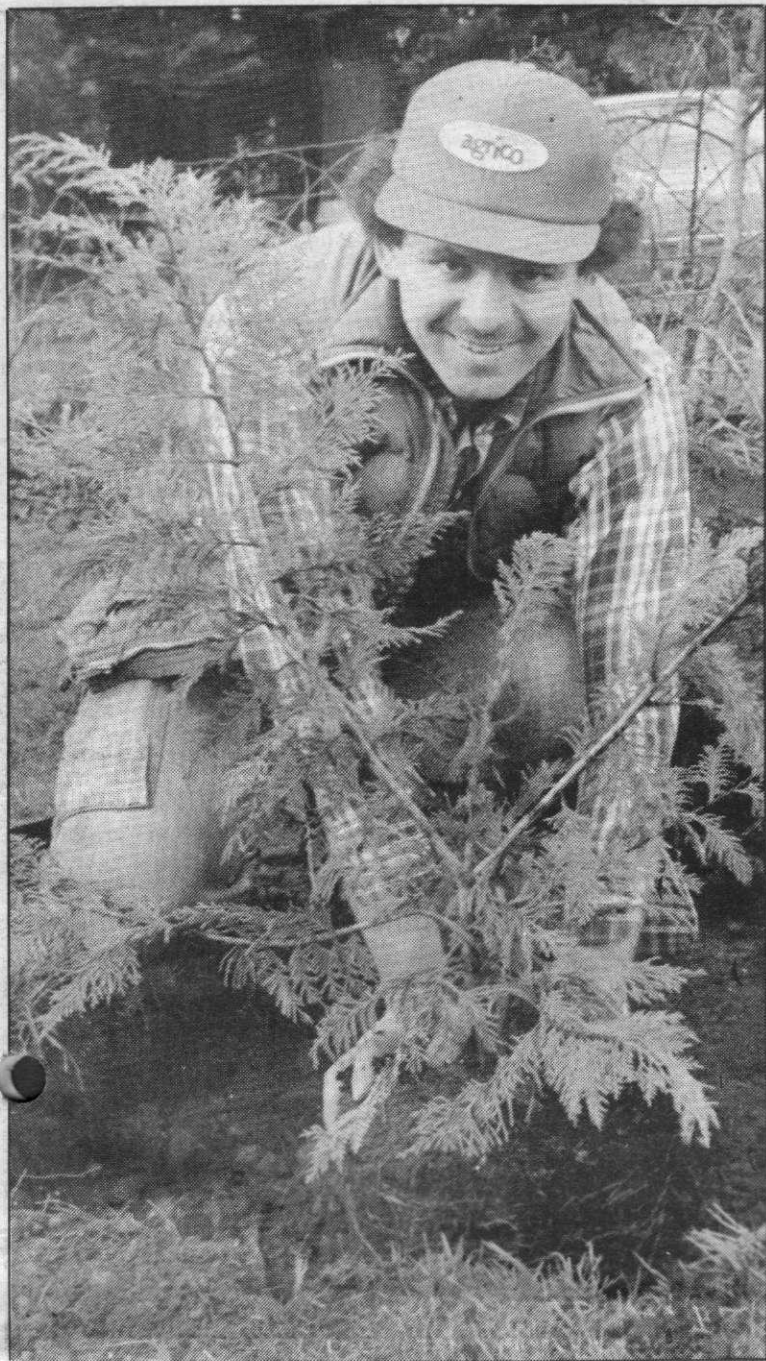

Golf course gets sprinklers, trees

The Salt Spring Island Golf and Country Club's property is receiving some improvements.

Malcolm Robertson, manager of the golf course, noted Monday that extra sprinkler heads attached to the course watering system have been installed along the first fairway. The fifth fairway will also receive additional sprinkler heads.

The sprinkler system keeps the course green during the long, dry summer months. Robertson noted that six years ago, the club installed as many sprinklers as it could afford. It has taken until now to save enough money to continue the project.

"This isn't the end of it, either," he added. "There are some areas that need to be done, so we may be doing others in the future."

Evergreens have also been planted along the golf and country club's property where it borders Lower Ganges Road. But

contrary to what passing motorists might think, the trees are not designed to prevent golf balls from flying across the road.

"That's not the purpose of the trees, although that's what I assumed most people would think," explained Robertson. "The trees are there to provide some privacy to the golfers. It's nice to have a row of trees along sections of a golf course bordering a road. It helps deafen the noise."

Robertson said the exact cost of the course upgrading work is not yet known. "However, I would say it will probably be somewhere in the neighbourhood of \$5,000 or \$6,000," he estimated.

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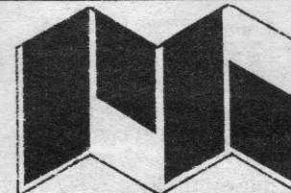

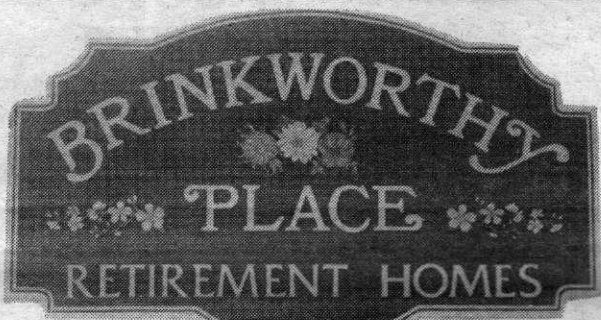

Twenty-five years ago

• An official of the B.C. Toll Ferry Authority says an option on property at Long Harbour has been picked up. While all plans have not been completed, the property is likely to be used as a winter storage area — although it could also be used for other purposes.

Use of the property as a winter storage area, it was also announced, could mean stationing of a maintenance crew on Salt Spring.

• C.R. Horel was re-elected president of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce at the organization's annual general meeting.

Other officers elected were: W. Fisher, vice-president; C.W. Harrison, treasurer; and nine others. Nearly 100 people attended the meeting to elect the new reps and listen to committee chairmen give reports on the previous year's highlights.

• A report by the island's fire chief says the Salt Spring Island fire department responded in 1961 to 32 alarms, for a total of 100 man-hours. There were 12 chimney fires, 11 bush fires, one house fire, two car fires, a boat fire and a tractor fire.

The chief said five fires resulted in significant property damage. The damage totalled \$1,750.

• A local merchant's sale offered hamburger at 49 cents a pound and two cake mixes for 25 cents.

Twenty years ago

• Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital has inherited a legacy from the Salt Spring Guild of Sunshine.

The philanthropic society has closed its doors, but from its assets donated a \$200 government bond to the hospital. The hospital's board of management, in turn, will allocate the money to an endowment fund for the children's ward.

• Salt Spring Island land surveyor Adrian Wolfe-Milner was named president of the corporation of B.C. Land Surveyors at the group's recent annual convention in Victoria.

The convention was attended by more than 120 surveyors and their wives, who came to the B.C. capital from across Canada.

• Several sheep have been harassed and killed in the vicinity of Cranberry Road, near Ganges.

Ganges RCMP officers were checking the Cranberry area for stray dogs, and it was noted that any canine found attacking sheep would be shot.

• New kitchen facilities were completed at Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital.

The kitchen has been renovated and brought into keeping with the developments of the past few years. Floors were being resurfaced with seamless covering, and a new utensil unit steam table and electric fixtures have been installed. The kitchen was also getting a new coat of paint.

Fifteen years ago

• The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce will not fold. Although only a few members attended the chamber's annual meeting, there was enthusiastic support for continuation of the organization.

President Frank Richards had earlier warned that unless support was forthcoming, the business group could fold. However, a committee consisting of chairman Jack Russell, Tom Toynbee, W.E. Delmonico, Jim Wilkinson and Gunther Berger was appointed to interview island residents and come forward with a proposed program for the year.

• Hugh Ross noted that the pond at the Salt Spring Island Golf

Course was 12 to 15 feet deep, and warned that children should not be skating on it.

The pond was frozen, but the ice was not strong enough to support any great weight, Ross said. "Don't let your children come near it," he added.

• It was announced that no airstrip — public or private — could be established on Salt Spring Island without the approval of the Capital Regional District.

Dennis Young, executive director of the CRD board, told *Driftwood* that the island's rural zoning prohibited the use of any property as a landing strip. The matter became a topic for discussion after a private land owner expressed an interest in establishing a landing strip in the Burgoyne Valley, parallel with the main Fulford-Ganges Road.

Ten years ago

• Landed immigrants living in the Gulf Islands are not eligible for reduced ferry rates given to other residents.

The resident identification cards issued to islanders are not being granted to landed immigrants; only resident electors were eligible to receive them. The B.C. Human Rights Commission, however, is concerned that the policy might be discriminatory and is expected to make an announcement on the matter in the near future.

• A Salt Spring Island farmer lost 63 sheep on the range near Cape Keppel and estimated that 40 others had been killed by dogs.

Tom Akerman of Fulford Har-

bour noted that the kills had all occurred over a three-week period. He was unable to assess his loss in dollar terms, but noted that each ewe lost was worth approximately \$80. *Driftwood* calculated the damage to Akerman's flock at between \$7,500 and \$10,000.

Five years ago

• Ron George of Salt Spring Island was chosen as one of the representatives for the southern Vancouver Island region at the upcoming B.C. Festival of the Arts.

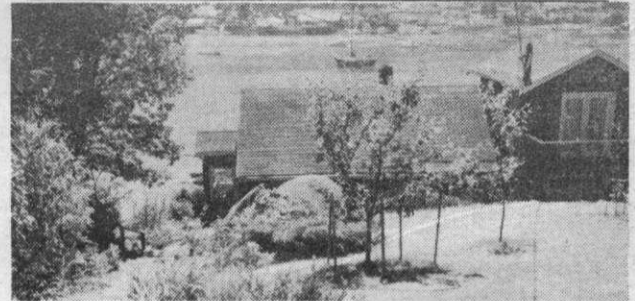

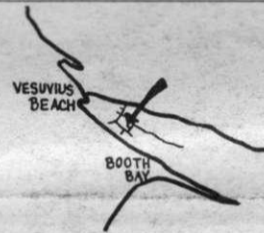

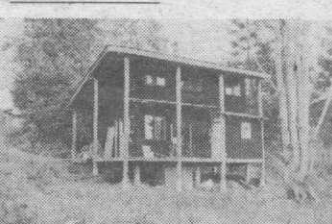
