## Picasso sketchbooks offer glimpse into artistic expression, inspiration

Pablo Picasso was probably one of the most prolific and inventive artists of all time. Throughout his life, he continued to explore and renew his art. In spite of the many different styles he initiated and adopted, his work was dominated by figurative elements.

One of the most recent books on this artist is *Je Suis le Cahier—The Sketchbooks of Picasso*. It deals with six complete sketchbooks by the artist, drawn from the major periods in his life, and includes six essays by noted American art historians.

I don't expect you to run out and buy the book. It isn't cheap, but maybe you can encourage our library to purchase a copy. In the meantime, I will do our local booksellers a favour and tell you a bit about it.

One important aspect of the book is that it shows the process by which a great visual intellect discovers and creates his images. It is, in some respects, a visual diary of a working life. Picasso's work expressed what he felt and thought about his world.

He is quoted as saying in 1944: "I have not painted the war because I am not the kind of painter who goes out like a photographer for something to depict. But I have no doubt that the war is in these paintings I have done."

Sam Hunter says in his essay on sketchbook number 110: "The sketchbook is crammed with the vital signs and scribbles of Picasso's powerful artistic personality, and it is astonishing too, for its revelations of an almost dogged ability to home in obsessively on a chosen theme . . . the drawings also vividly persuade us of the artist's limitless depth of understanding for, and curiosity about, the human personality."

Picasso was unabashed in his borrowing from other cultures,

other styles and other artists. He is quoted as saying: "To my misfortune — and probably my delight — I use things as my passions tell me."

The women in his life were most often the models for his drawings and paintings, appearing sometimes in sensitive realistic form, and at other times contorted, abstracted and caricatured. Sexual imagery played a significant role in his work and is amply recorded in the book. So if you're going to buy it, do so before the government outlaws eroticism. It's a book well worth studying.

On now at the Vancouver Art Gallery, to March 15, is the show *European Vision*. It is an exhibition of British, French, Dutch, German, Russian, Italian and Spanish modern and post-modern art which has found its way into private collections in British Columbia. It includes approximately 85 works by artists such as Balthus, Christo, Miro, Henry Moore, Picasso, Kurt Schwitters and Fernand Leger.

If you are in Vancouver and are catching the evening ferry home and can't bear the thought of B.C. Ferries' gourmet soggy burgers, I

have a tip for you: At 49th and Oak, north side, you can duck into Umberto's for a pasta to go. There are 16 dishes to choose from and the service is reasonably fast. ## Each Wednesday

### Family unit explored in film series

A series of six films about protecting and strengthening family relations will be offered on Salt Spring.

The series, *Turn Your Heart Toward Home*, opens tonight (Wednesday, February 11) at Central Hall, beginning at 7 pm. The remaining five films will be shown each Wednesday at the same location, until March 18.

The films were made under the auspices of Dr. James Dobson, described in a release as "America's most trusted family life expert" and creator of an earlier, well-accepted series titled *Focus on the Family*.

In *Turn Your Heart Toward Home*, the release says, Dr. Dobson cites "example after familiar example" in portraying "the pressures today's parents are susceptible to."

It adds: "He reminds them of society's slide toward humanism and the undermining influences of radio, television, films and the press, which can only be counterbalanced by a loving home where Christian values are instilled from an early age."

Dr. Dobson, the release continues, urges individuals to return to the "traditional values upon which families are best created and nurtured."



## Realities, misconceptions of India to be discussed

The realities and misconceptions of modern-day India will be discussed at two sessions to be held in Ganges in early March.

Set for the elementary school library on March 4 and 11, the talks will feature Joe Richardson, whose association with India predates its independence from Britain in 1947.

The two sessions, sponsored by Continuing Education and beginning each night at 7:30 pm, will also feature slide presentations.

Richardson and his wife, Betty, first travelled to India in the winter of 1946, when it was still a colony of Britain. Over the ensuing years, the couple lived through the vast changes and developments in India, as both observers and participants.

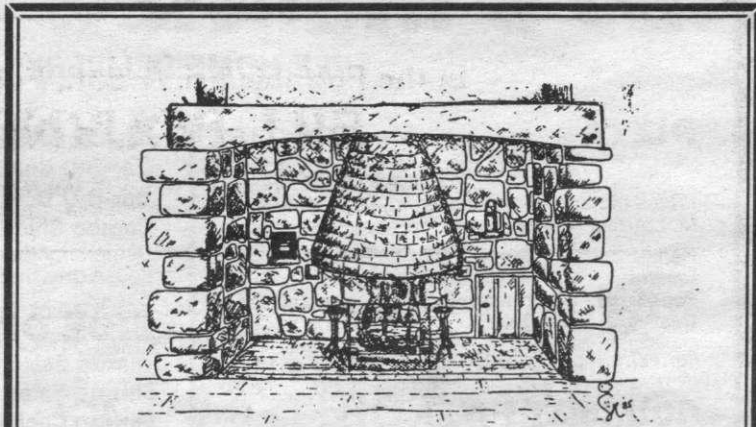
"The Raj, the Maharajas, Freedom at Midnight, the death of Mahatma Gandhi, and political and economic triumphs and failures in India have been important parts of their experience," says a release from the Continuing Education office.

For 15 years, Joe Richardson taught in a college in southern India. In 1960, he returned to Canada and taught in the departments of Asian studies and religious studies at the University of B.C.

Retired in 1963, he is now a professor emeritus at UBC and

continues to respond to requests to deliver talks on aspects of modern India. His main research has been in social and religious movements in India in the 19th century.

To carry out those studies, Joe and Betty have returned to India several times over the years. In 1980, they were in New Delhi for 13 months, where Joe was resident director of the Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute, a research organization jointly funded by India's education ministry and Canada's external affairs ministry.

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# Island magic an attraction for many Canadian writers

Writers have always found an affinity with the islands. Look down the lists of British Columbian writers and recognize the island names.

O. Leigh-Spencer was a *Province* editor and Jack Scott wrote for newspapers, almost literally, from coast to coast. Torchy Anderson came to Salt Spring Island to retire from the editor's chair at the *Province*, and John Sturdy had written for many Canadian newspapers before writing movie scripts during the war and coming to Salt Spring Island as a free-lance writer.

There were others, some less-well-known, some equally famous. Jack Webster hasn't yet retired, but he's nearly here. Ed Gould came here to write before he was tempted to retire. Len Bland moved from newspaper to government in Alberta before moving into his retirement home at Ganges.

Frank Leigh-Spencer came here as a natural

course of events, following his father's footsteps after retiring from a public relations profession that is an off-shoot of journalism.

It was Frank who found a number of newspaper clippings relating to Salt Spring Island in his father's papers. Among them was a piece of advice from the most famous of all Canadian journalists and the one most qualified to offer advice — Bruce Hutchison. Mind you, the piece was written in 1938, when many readers were undreamed of and when Hutchison was a young man exploring his career while the paths were still fresh and the grass of Salt Spring Island still green.

Hutchison wrote in the *Victoria Times* of the first trip he made to the island. He wrote of the people he met and he reached a conclusion that some might believe already too late.

Here is Bruce Hutchison's first encounter with the sane people of Salt Spring Island:

# Bruce Hutchison was enthralled by island, its people and lifestyle

For some reason or other I had never been to Salt Spring Island until the other day. Nearly everybody who reads this has been to Salt Spring and knows the green beauty of its land, the glitter of its inland seas. But what struck me more were the people of Salt Spring.

"They're a gay lot," an old man from Sidney told me. "Oh, sure, a gay, wild lot. You should see one of the big dances over there! How those boys from Salt Spring can hoist 'em! By gosh, yes!"

He did not indicate what the boys from Salt Spring could hoist, but he licked his lips, as if in memory. Well, I know nothing of that. There was no social event under way when I was there to afford me any light on the customs of Salt Spring society, reputedly so vigorous. However, the people I saw appeared to me to be the sanest and the happiest I had ever seen in America, almost as happy as the people of the European and British countryside who, in the shadow of war and universal calamity, are infinitely happier than we are in the world's most advanced state of civilization.

You seem to leave North America altogether when you get off the ferry at Salt Spring. You sigh deeply like a man escaping from something unpleasant. Here is an island, and an island is always a refuge, sheltered by the clean, antiseptic sea. Victoria, of course, is on an island, but rather too big a one to give the full flavor of an island's isolation and protection; and besides, so many people come and go, the place is becoming so large and metropolitan, that you are practically civilized when you are in Victoria. But Salt Spring isn't civilized and that is the glory

of it.

I talked to an old man sitting on a gate (very like the old man sitting on the gate in *Alice in Wonderland*, who spouted the divine poetry about the manufacture of westcoat buttons out of haddock's eyes in the silent night) and he had an air about him of such utter peace as you would never find except on an island, outside the currents of our modern life.

I talked to a business man from the prairies who has fortunately

seen the light in middle age and is half retired into Salt Spring already and finds life better than anyone can think possible on the prairies.

I talked to an old soldier, veteran of many battles in the Great War, and he showed me his boat, his garden, his gasoline water pump with the quiet pleasure of a man who knows these to be the most important things in the world, as they should be, though most people don't understand that. With him I drank home-made plum wine, such as the Liquor Board cannot obtain, and ate clam chowder, fresh from the beach, such as the privileged classes of

London, Paris or New York will never taste.

There seem to be a lot of sane people in Salt Spring who have found out how to live while there is yet time to do it; not too late, as usually happens elsewhere. Nothing should ever be done to interfere with them. Nobody should build a bridge to Salt Spring or run too many ferries. An island in a swirling sea of general lunacy, Salt Spring should be preserved like the mythical kingdom of Shangri La in Tibet so that when the world has gone down in ruin or exhausted itself with excitement and movement, sated itself with pleasure and progress, rushed itself into nervous collapse, then Salt Spring will be left with some sane people to show us how to start living again.

# Chilean arpilleras subject of Voice of Women show

An exhibition assembled by the Salt Spring Island chapter of Voice of Women will end its six-week run at a Vancouver gallery later this month.

The show, . . . *between the lines: Chilean Arpilleras*, opened January 14 at the Floating Curatorial Gallery at *Women In Focus*, 204 - 456 West Broadway in Vancouver. It closes February 28.

On display is a collection of arpilleras: fabric scraps assembled, stitched and mounted on burlap or sections of grain bags. Made in collective workshops by women throughout Chile, they depict "scenes of misery and suffering" reflecting political strife in the country, the gallery says.

The arpilleras, banned in Chile, are sold world-wide with proceeds

being returned to their makers. The Salt Spring chapter of Voice of Women have marketed the arpilleras for the past five years.

The Floating Curatorial Gallery is open Wednesday to Saturday from noon to 5 pm.

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**Warren Langley an accomplished painter**

# Island artist makes more than signs

G. Warren Langley is an artist. If he isn't well known on Salt Spring, it's probably because he hasn't had an advertised art show since he left Ontario seven years ago.

But this isn't to say that his work — at least his commercial work — hasn't gained public exposure here. Quite the opposite is true; anyone who's visited Ganges has seen more than a few Langley originals. In fact, the entire village could be called his gallery, because his works hang everywhere.

Langley, you see, is a sign-maker.

For the 32-year-old artist, success in the sign business has come slowly and only after much sacrifice. In Ontario, after studying art at two colleges, he landed a job with the Prison Arts Foundation teaching art to inmates. However, he eventually decided to try something else, and moved west to Salt Spring.

"I first tried to wholesale sandblasted glass products here," he says, "until one businessman went bankrupt with a lot of my products. Then I ran a store in Vesuvius, and wasn't too keen about the fishbowl effect."

Fortunately, his Vesuvius business was a success. It enabled him to purchase property along Long Harbour Road, where he set up his studio.

Langley discovered that sandblasted cedar signs, because of their distinctive appearance, were in demand. He began designing and creating them for local merchants; as others saw his work, they too became interested, and his business grew.

It's still growing. But his sandblasted signs, being commercial works of art, aren't inexpensive — largely because the process used to create them is costly.

Sandblasting, or the bombardment of a substance with fine-grain materials propelled by compressed air, is costly and time-consuming for a number of reasons. Because the operator of a sandblaster must be completely protected from the material used, such work can only be done in specially-constructed facilities. Langley has a small, self-contained sandblasting unit at his home, but it can only accommodate small items; large signs can only be sandblasted in Victoria using special industrial equipment that costs "a dollar a minute" to rent.

"It's horrendously expensive," the artist noted.

Whenever possible, Langley likes to integrate cedar and sandblasted glass in his signs. In addition to selling his commercial work on Salt Spring, he has found that many off-island businesses are also expressing an interest in the pieces.

"A large amount of my busi-

ness is in B.C., but I also have some in the States and Ontario," he said. "I have an appointment with an architectural firm, designers of large mall complexes. I hope this will open up my work to a larger market."

Larger firms, he explained, could afford to pay the costs of even more detailed and unique sign work. "I'm still not doing the best work I could do (because the cost is prohibitive)," he said.

The statement reflects Langley's approach to his work. He's an achiever who continually strives to improve. Being the operator of a successful business might be enough for most people, but not for Langley; to him, the business is merely a means to an end, a tool for achieving his greater goal of becoming a better artist.

Though few people may know it, Langley's first love is not sign-making but painting. He talks freely and openly about his business, but makes it clear he considers himself a painter first and a sign-maker second.

Anyone seeing his paintings would tend to agree. Langley is a sign-maker of exceptional talent, but he's an even better painter.

Ironically, it was his desire to paint that launched his business career. At one time, he made a living as an artist, taking commission jobs painting scenics for other people. His artwork was good, but he didn't enjoy it.

"I got tired of painting to try and survive," he said. "My technique of painting takes a lot of time. I found my painting was becoming strictly financially motivated. Commission work wasn't spiritually rewarding."

"The idea was that by establishing my own (sign-making) company, it would buy me the

time to do the painting I want to do."

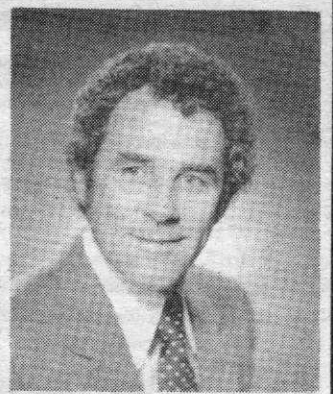
It is only recently that Langley has found the time to set up his easel and begin painting again. At present, he is working on a type of painting known as a *mandala*. He describes it as an ancient form of "magic art" originally designed, through the use of certain symbols and colours, to guide the individual along a spiritual path. "It conveys a spiritual message, relaxes one's mind," he noted. He began the *mandala* five years ago, and this is the first opportunity he has had to continue it.

Langley lives to paint. But

between sign-making and painting, his schedule is more than full. "In the morning, I usually do my banking jobs, make my business contacts," he said. "In the afternoon I do the design work and set my helper up to do his work. In the evenings, I usually paint until one or two in the morning."

Eventually, he hopes the sign-making business will be operated by a manager, giving him the opportunity to concentrate strictly on his oil painting.

"Good art," he said with a smile, "reflects the individual. This is the first time in years I've been able to do it."

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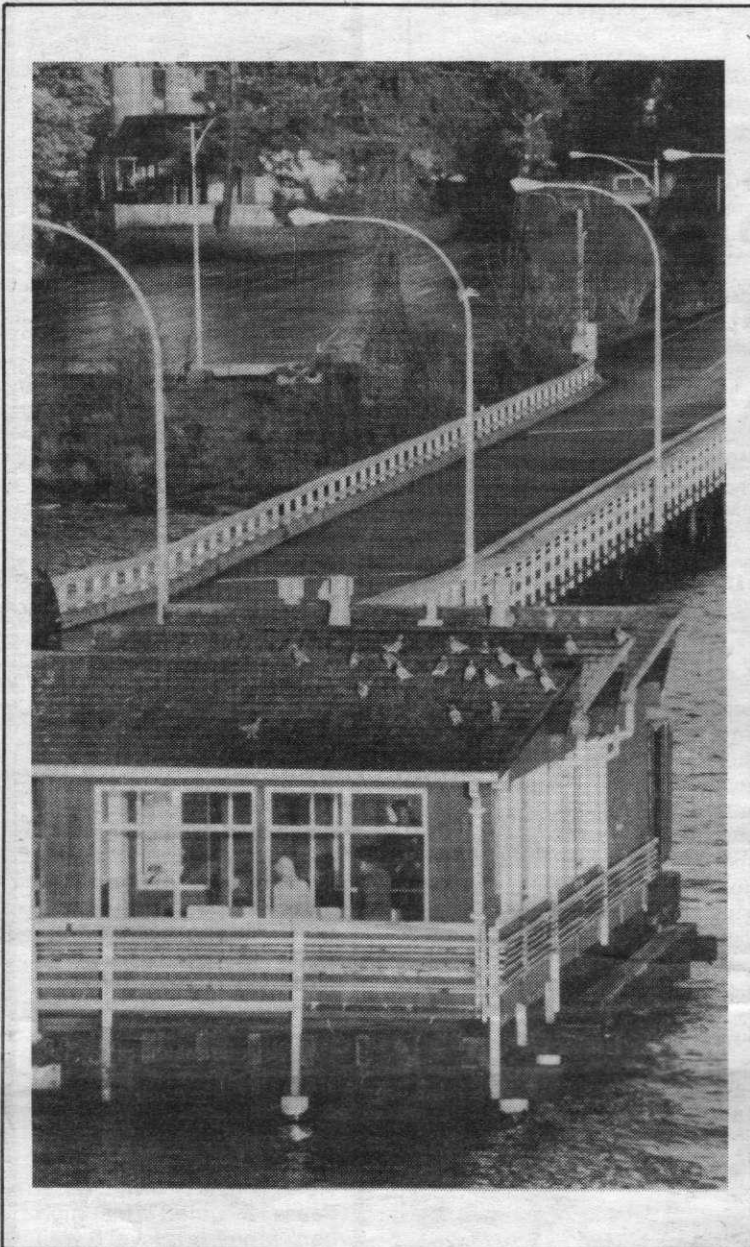

## Firms withdraw requests for Mayne salmon farms

The two companies trying to establish salmon farms on Mayne Island have withdrawn their applications in the face of opposition from the public and the local Island Trust Committee.

Javier Serrano, manager of Corsa Ocean Resources, said his company has asked the provincial lands ministry to cancel a temporary license which allowed it to conduct feasibility tests in Navy Channel.

The decision was made shortly after a December 19 meeting of

Mayne's Island Trust Committee changed the definition of mariculture — which had been permitted by Mayne bylaws — to exclude fish farms.

At the same meeting, the Trust also removed mariculture as a suitable use for Mayne's W2 waters, which are intended for purposes such as recreation, Mayne trustee Louis Vallee said. The Trust will create a more specific zoning for mariculture to encompass existing oyster and algae farms.

The changes will force prospec-

tive fish farm companies to apply to the Trust to rezone W2 water, which will in effect hand over some power in the matter to the local level. "Before, the local people didn't have a say," Vallee said.

Aqua-Nor, a Vancouver company, has also discarded plans to set up a free-floating salmon farm in Campbell Bay. The company is currently examining the possibility of establishing a different type of mariculture farm in the area, consultant Paul Orrazietti said. He called the earlier application "extremely controversial" and questioned the Island Trust's motives.

Aqua-Nor, he added, has not decided if it will retain its feasibility license as it does not know if it will pursue some kind of activity.

"I think Islands Trust did it in a hurried way," Serrano said. His company had purchased \$200,000 of waterfront land and conducted about \$100,000 in preliminary research with the understanding a salmon farm was permitted by Mayne bylaws, he said.

Serrano said the company's owner, Pedro Vivancos of Montreal, did not want to incite a public confrontation. Vivancos is not currently considering seeking a rezoning of the Navy Channel property, Serrano said.

Serrano contends many residents opposed Corsa's application because they were actually disturbed by the Aqua-Nor application. Corsa's proposal should have been viewed differently because the waters of Navy Channel would take fish effluent away from shore, Serrano said.

## Two plan amendments no issue on Pender

North Pender residents appear unconcerned with two proposed amendments to the community plan intended to direct commercial development on the island.

Only five people attended a recent public review of the amendments, hosted by Island Trustees Peter Campbell and Doreen York at the community centre.

"I can't see that there is any great push for or against it from the people of Pender Island," Campbell said.

The two amendments will recognize changes to the island since the community plan was written in 1974. They were given first reading last fall and will appear for second reading at a February 19 Trust meeting.

A section which limits commercial development to Port Wash-

ington, Hope Bay and Magic Lake Estates will be changed to limit it to existing developed sites. York explained the older, more specific section was obsolete since the high cost of waterfront property made commercial development in those areas unlikely.

"We are making it very difficult for someone to come along on any other road in Pender and set up a commercial business," Campbell said.

The other change would see a new section added which will prevent commercial development near the Driftwood Centre from crossing the road.

The section will limit development to the west side of the road to prevent encroachment on adjacent agricultural land.

during flights.

"The concern is (because) it's a new noise," Sitnam said. "The level is not any noisier than other aircraft in terms of decibels." He estimated the helicopter produced a 60- to 65-decibel noise.

"It's like having a train by your home when you haven't had one there for 20 years," Sitnam said.

Sitnam was doubtful his company would consider following the Canada-US border over open water, as some Saturna residents have suggested. "It would take too long."

Ilio Bertolami, of Saturna, spoke to a Helijet official last month who told him the service was popular but it would cause a five per cent cost increase to fly around the islands. "I said raise the costs (to the user) five per cent if it's that well-liked," Bertolami said.

In poor weather, Transport Canada requires the craft to fly below the clouds, sometimes as low as 300 feet. Bertolami learned from the official the helijet had flown over his house at 1,000 feet above sea level one day. "That's 500 feet above my head," says Bertolami, who lives in an elevated area.

Transport Canada's regional manager of public affairs says only two complaints from Saturna residents have been received on Transport's noise

complaint line. "We've had some complaints from the Vancouver area," says Steven Rybak.

Rybak said the craft is louder than most helicopters because it has the noisier propeller-blade arrangement found on the larger, twin-engine copters. Rybak praised Helijet's efforts to deal with the situation, and said they go beyond Transport Canada requirements.

Any change to Helijet's flight would require a route re-application to be approved by Transport Canada. "The primary objective has to be keeping the flight as safe as possible," Rybak said.

The taxi service's future may lie outside its hands because the city of Victoria, which leases the helipad which the copter lands on, may not allow the craft to land there. The city is leasing the James Bay pad on a six-month trial basis — which began in November — and will judge the service against the public's reaction in Victoria.

The helicopter flies over the Penders, though reaction there seems muffled. South Pender Island Trust Committee representative Steve Wright has heard no complaints while North Pender resident Gordon Wallace has heard the copter fly over the Magic Lake area.

"It's just one more aircraft flying too low over the Gulf Islands," Wallace said.

## Helicopter ambulance slow to arrive at night

Gulf Islands residents injured during the evening may have to wait longer for a helicopter ambulance to arrive than if the mishap had occurred during the day.

That's the conclusion being drawn on Saturna Island, where two recent evening emergency calls resulted in two-hour waits for a helicopter ambulance. Volunteer nurse Hazel Trickey, who said a normal response time is about half an hour, expressed concern that the service may be declining.

The manager of support services and operations for Emergency Health Services (EHS) disagrees, however, saying the longer evening waits appear to be the result of the federal transportation department's 1986 restrictions on night flights of helicopters.

EHS sends "whatever helicopter is quickest to respond, based on availability," spokesman Rick Hedges says. However, federal regulations have reduced the number of available craft because only twin-engine helicopters can fly at night.

The first Saturna incident noted

above occurred January 14 when it was feared a baby might be suffering from meningitis. A helicopter from Comox arrived two hours later, according to Trickey. "They usually come from the pad at the Jubilee (hospital)."

On January 21, a senior citizen who fell off a ladder and onto his shoulder waited on the ground two hours before a helicopter arrived to move him, Trickey said.

Previous calls were answered within half an hour, Trickey explained in wondering if there has been a policy change regarding service to the Gulf Islands.

Hedges says the health ministry has made no policy changes and that any change in response times is due to the federal air traffic regulations.

A health ministry employee who declined to be identified said EHS will try to locate a Victoria helicopter first — but if nothing is available the craft could come from Comox, Vancouver or the Okanagan.

EHS contracts the services of several helicopter firms.

## Wind and Wood

The duo of Mary Reher and Brad Prevedoros has been playing together for several years, yet each performance seems better than the last. Their repertoire has become more technically challenging and offers a greater variety of musical styles.

This is gentle music, yet not without passion and verve. It is without percussion and the cacaphony which is now so popular with the young. This is music of the heart and head — a judicious blend of light classical, jazz and modern compositions.

Apart from writing their own arrangements for each item, many of the compositions were their own, including a group of four commissioned as scores to accompany videos, but delightful enough to stand on their own.

The blending of flute and un-amplified guitar produces a most pleasing combination of sounds. Adding to the enjoyment of the evening was a shared commentary both modest and informative. Although suited to a small space and audience, this performance deserved a much larger attendance.

Those who missed this concert will have another opportunity to hear Brad with singer Heather Martin and pianist Barbara Landmark next Saturday evening at the Pub.

## APC a Failure?

The APC is due to hold its annual meeting at 1:30 pm on Saturday, February 21 in the South Community Hall. There will be elections to fill three vacancies on the commission. Presumably there will also be some kind of report. What is the role of the APC?

It is *not* a secret society, although the last set of minutes

made public were those for September, 1985, still gathering dust in the Post Office file, and the commission rarely, if ever, publishes an agenda. It is *not* a development association, although most of the present members are directly or indirectly involved in activities that benefit from development. Its duty is *not* to inform Galiano residents what they may or may not do on their property. Its responsibility is not to accept advice from Island Trustees, who sit ex officio on the commission, but to give them advice.

As originally conceived, the Advisory Planning Commission was a device to give Galiano residents an opportunity to have input with regard to decisions pertaining to land use. The commission drafted the zoning and subdivision bylaws. Its job was to advise the Galiano Island Trust Committee on matters referred to it. The Trust rarely rejected the advice of this locally-elected committee. Former members such as Hart Scarrow, Betty Steward and Mimi Wishart had no vested interest to advance or protect. If the public no longer cares what the APC does, or who sits on the commission, then the APC is a failure. Apathy will just allow a handful of people to control who sits on the commission and how it operates.

## Burns Night

The North Galiano Hall was filled to capacity last Saturday evening to celebrate for the sixth time the birthday of the bard. Every year the Cairngorm Dancers have come from Vancouver to enhance the party with their pipe music, dancing, costumes and good friendship. They have seen the progression from a derelict, disused school hall to a well-equipped community facility. This year, as a token of appreciation for the chief architect of this renovation, Arne was made an honorary Scot by renaming him McHaksi and was presented with an authentic tam o'shanter, which he proudly wore for the rest of the evening.

The supper was prepared by a team of more than 30 Galiano chefs. The haggis, cooked to perfection by Monica Roots, was piped in by Angus Wilson and his son, who also played a lively solo. Experienced listeners observed that Bob Currie had never narrated the *Ode to the Haggis* with such feeling. She saw at once that the intruder was a huge owl perched on a low branch. She approached slowly, talking in a low voice. The owl did not move except to blink its yellow eyes. The owl's only contribution to the conversation was an occasional quiet enquiry, "Who?" or a sibilant hiss of mild disapproval.

After developing a friendly relationship the lady informed the bird that, although she bore him no ill-will, he would have to leave as he was disturbing her regular boarders. With a swish of air he slipped from his perch and on silent wings left the garden. If you hear a great horned owl hoo-hooing with a southern drawl you will have corroboration of this story.

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# Care unit members learn to help those in grief

By ELEANOR HARRISON

Neil Madu, co-ordinator for the grief support service of the Peninsular Community Association at Sidney, gave an all-day counselling workshop to members of the Pender Islands Palliative Care in December. The group met for three sessions — morning, afternoon and evening — at the Legion.

Madu holds a M.Sc. degree

from the University of Victoria, and has spent 17 years as a counselling psychologist.

He said death is encountered at all ages of life — even in childhood — and that help resolving grief is essential for the grieving person to achieve complete recovery. The normal grieving process should not last longer than two years.

"If people are dying, they don't want to be labelled so," said Madu.

He went over the stages that people go through in facing a terminal illness and he stressed that prospective counsellors in his audience should find a way of "doing nothing" themselves and thus develop a power within to respond at a deeper level.

"Remember, when two people are talking, often nobody is listening," said Madu. "Listening is a skill."

Pender Palliative Care intends to hold two meetings a month during this year — on the second Monday afternoon and the fourth Monday evening of each month. All meetings will be held at the Legion. "At the evening meetings a speaker is planned."

The afternoon January meeting saw Phyllis Kimmerley placed in charge, assisted by Ruth Murray, Jean Rogers and Mary Ripley.

The society brought Peggy McDowell, R.N., and Lona O'Gorman to Pender for a two-day week-end workshop last November, which 24 residents attended. A similar workshop will be held on a week-end in March to accommodate those unable to attend the first workshop. These ladies come from the Victoria Hospice Society.

## Pender farmers hear overview of activities

Next Wednesday evening at 7:30 pm the whist drive sponsored by the senior citizens will take place in Page Drive Lounge. Anyone is welcome.

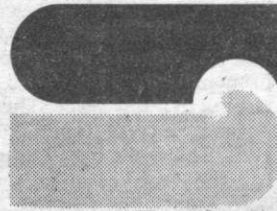

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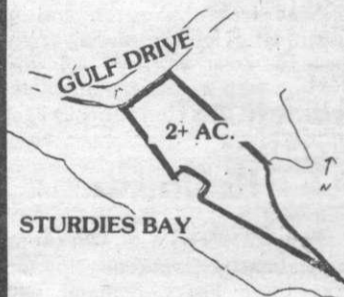

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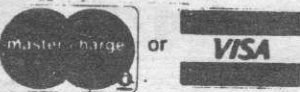

If all the players can come up with the type of commitment turned in by Juda, Justin and the defence, there is no reason the Selects cannot beat teams of Gorge's stature.

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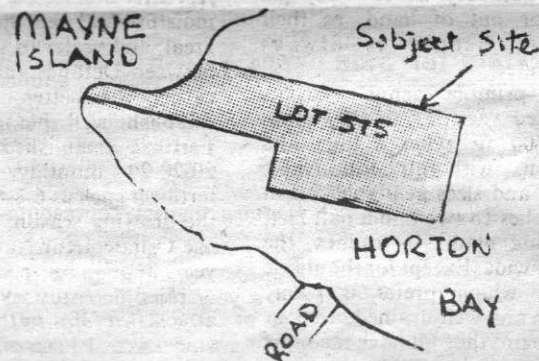

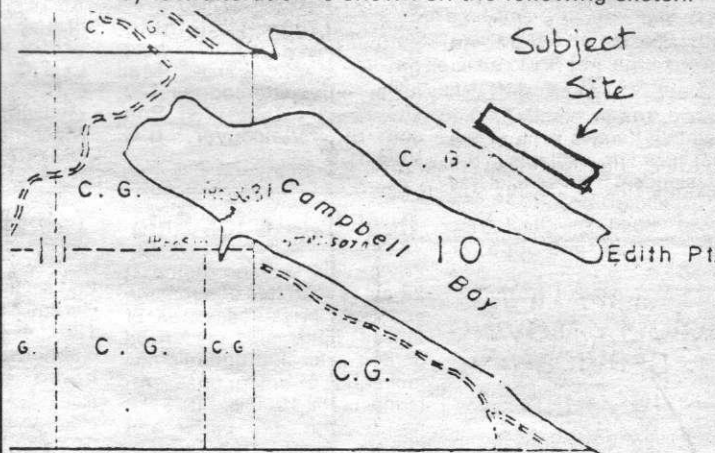

Proposed Mayne Island Trust Committee By-law No. 38 being "Mayne Island Planning Area Zoning By-law, 1980, Amendment By-law No. 1, 1987," is a By-law to amend Mayne Island Trust Committee By-law No. 14 being the "Mayne Island Planning Area Zoning By-law, 1980." In general terms, the intent of the By-law is:

- To amend the definition of "Mariculture" to permit only the cultivation, rearing and harvesting of bivalve molluscs and to add a definition of "Algae Culture".
- To add a new zoning classification W-3A (Water Commercial A) Zone in which mariculture is a permitted use, and to establish regulations pertaining to permitted structures, the height of structures, and the prohibition of buildings on floats in the W-3A (Water Commercial A) Zone.
- To change the zoning of an area of Crown Land covered by water in Horton Bay from the W-2 (Water Moorage) Zone to the W-3A (Water Commercial A) Zone. The general location of the land covered by water which is subject to the by-law alteration is shown on the following sketch:



- To add a new zoning classification W-3B (Water Commercial B) Zone in which algae culture is a permitted use, and establish regulations pertaining to permitted structures, the height of structures, and the prohibition of buildings on floats, in the W-3B (Water Commercial B) Zone.
- To change the zoning classification of an area of Crown Land covered by water in Georgia Strait from the W-2 (Water Moorage) Zone to the W-3B (Water Commercial B) Zone. The general location of the Crown Land covered by water which is subject to the by-law alteration is shown on the following sketch:

# Gardens lack colour during winter

If there's anything the garden lacks at this time of year, it's colour. We are blessed with a mild climate and thus have a great range in texture and form of evergreen foliage, from ferns and ground covers through rhododendrons and broad-leaved evergreens on up to our coniferous evergreen shrubs and trees, but the absence of colour is more obvious with the presence of all this greenery than if we were under several feet of snow and couldn't expect to see any flowers until April or May.

Without the colour, the yard seems even more drab and we go out into our gardens in search of the first bright splashes of colour to warm us up for the approaching spring. The snowdrops and winter aconites are out, and the winter pansies situated in sunny locations have gone on blooming all this past winter, but without question the most vibrant show and brightest colours are to be found in primulas.

Over mild winters such as the one we're experiencing the primulas start blooming in November and keep going right on through until late spring. Depending on the severity of the winter, the actual species or variety being grown, and the growing location, primulas may be evergreen, semi-evergreen or may die right back to the crown during cold weather.

During droughts or severe heat, they may also go into a dormant state, only to rise again when the cool, moist autumn arrives. Many of the species self-sow and can naturalize themselves in small areas, but they never really get away or out of hand, as their delicate beauty is always appreciated.

The primula genus and its cultivated varieties number more than 600 in type, colour and selection, with all conceivable colours and sizes available. From four inches to two and a half feet, from bog plants to alpine species, which prefer a sunny location and well-drained sandy or gritty loam, they all have the same general requirements.

Primulas like a rich, deep, moist, loamy soil which has a high organic matter content and fairly good drainage — i.e., not waterlogged. A sandy loam to which compost, leaf mould, peat moss and bonemeal have been added is ideal. They like a pH of 6.0 to 6.5 and ample moisture, preferring regular deep waterings rather than frequent sips which never reach their relatively deep root zone. The vast majority of primulas enjoy a partial sun position, with from three to five hours of sun each day.

For the most part they are hardy, tough plants and don't do too well when primped and coddled, but do clean them up periodically, removing any lower

leaves that have gone yellow or spotty, are browning or starting to develop grey mold. Good sanitation will keep down risks of rots and improve their general appearance. Also pick off any spent blooms unless you wish to propagate them from seed.

Growing from seed is relatively easy, but propagation by division is the easiest and ensures that plants will be true to colour. Lift the plants, wash off the crowns, and use a sharp knife to cut away the side crowns or offsets. Replant them with their roots well spaced out in a planting hole to which you have added a spoonful of bonemeal, and water them in well.

Some texts say to do your dividing just after bloom, but I feel that the moisture and heat stresses are too great, and prefer to see them done between October and March, the earlier the better, so they can establish well before blooming. Fertilize established plants with 20-20-20 monthly, a granular fertilizer such as 6-8-6 twice during the growing season, or cheat and use Osmocote or Nutricote once a year, applying it in March.

The only really severe pests that attack primulas in these parts are vine weevil larvae, sometimes cutworms, only occasionally slugs and, infrequently, deer. With the deer it depends on where you live, how hungry the deer are and where your plants are located.

Hopefully we have enough space to permit a quick rundown on some of the Primula species and varieties available and worthy of a

place in your garden.

The alpine *Primula auricula* is a sun tolerant, six-inch-high plant with smooth, leathery leaves and often fragrant blooms that have purple or reddish corolla margins and yellow or whitish centres, a striking, unusual primula that likes good drainage and some sand or granite grit added to the soil.

The drumstick primula, *P. denticulata* prefers moister, humus rich soil and yields clear, bright shades of mauve, violet, pink and white in globular heads on 12-inch stalks. With bright green rosettes of crinkly leaves this is a gorgeous species for any garden.

The candelabra primula, *P. japonica*, is a self-sower that produces ascending whorls of bloom that progress up the stalk as it grows to its 2 to 2.5-foot height. The rich deep pink blooms are produced for two months or more and this plant does well beside streams, pools, ponds, or even in the bog garden.

*Primula juliae* is the primary parent of the Juliana hybrids, tight, four-inch-high plants with abundant bicoloured blooms. These delicate beauties are great for border, bed or accent plantings.

The cowslip, *P. veris*, produces fragrant, lemon-yellow blooms on six to eight-inch-high plants, that naturalize well and endure the summer dry spells even in a clay soil.

*Primula vulgaris* is the English primrose which produces single blooms on separate four to six-inch stems. The colour range is limitless and the varieties too numerous to mention, but it is

significant to note that this is the primary parent of the polyanthus primulas.

*Primula polyanthus* is the name given to hybrids of *P. vulgaris*, some *P. veris* and some *P. julia*. Polyanthus or "Polys" are available in almost any colour, and are noted for their abundant, large (up to two inches) blooms, most often borne in bunches atop four to eight-inch stems. These free-bloomers will often produce a hundred or more flowers in a single season.

At this time of year when bright hues are almost absent from the garden, the primula gives a welcome splash of colour and a delightful hint of the seasons ahead.

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# Enquiry participants debate role of Canada's military

*Editor's note: Late last year, a 'people's enquiry' into Canadian military policy was held in Edmonton, Alberta. Galiano Island resident Woodrow W. Coward, a retired Lt.-Col., attended the two-day event and has since prepared three articles concerning its content. Following is the second of those articles.*

*The True North Strong and Free?*, the public enquiry held late last year in Edmonton, attracted 5,000 participants and well-known speakers like military historian Gwynne Dyer, scientist Dr. David Suzuki, diplomat George Ignatieff and others. Here is a selection of remarks made by some of those participants:

• George Ignatieff, chancellor of the University of Toronto and a former Canadian diplomat, spoke strongly about the need for civilian input into military decisions: "There can be no incineration without representation."

• Dr. David Suzuki, internationally-known scientist, educator and communicator, blamed the world's ills on "science and technology being out of control." This, he said, is because most politicians are scientifically illiterate.

"A classic example is Mr. Reagan. Here is a man who grew up in a time long before there were any computers, television, jets, rockets, satellites, nuclear bombs or birth control pills. He is making a major commitment to SDI because he was nurtured on Buck Rogers comings, but he understands science and technology so little that he believes in biblical creation."

On the risk of accidental nuclear war, Dr.

Suzuki said "there is no such thing as foolproof technology unless you remove the fool, which is every human being."

• Col. W.C. Weston, a Canadian Forces policy analyst, said it would be hard to defend against Soviet supersonic cruise missiles aimed at North America.

"The primary purpose of our (Canadian) air defence role is not to shoot down every missile and bomber but to give strategic warning so . . . American retaliatory forces can be ready to strike."

• Liberal MP Lloyd Axworthy, participating in a debate involving representatives from the Conservative, NDP and Liberal parties, said Canada is being dragged into a new US version of North American defence which supports Star Wars and threatens our independence.

"In the integration of defence and security systems, the strategy has been fundamentally changed by the Americans and we are, step-by-step, accepting that change without posing an alternative."

• Conservative MP Tom Hockin, the secretary of state for finance and co-chairman of the recent parliamentary committee on external affairs, said Canada's ability to make decisions unfavourable to the US is not threatened.

"Canada is completely opposed to any expansion of American nuclear weapons in contravention of the SALT II treaty (a move the Americans have hinted at). If the US hasn't heard, it should read our speeches again. We have said that Canada would be profoundly disturbed about a breakout of SALT II."

• MP Dr. Pauline Jewett (NDP) suggested

Canada should have been an effective force for peace and global disarmament if it had not only refused to become a nuclear power but declined to manufacture the components for nuclear weapons and their delivery systems, refused to allow the cruise missile to be tested in Canadian airspace, and removed itself from NORAD and NATO, and "had it declined to get involved in defence production arrangements with the US in the postwar period, and almost totally integrated its economy into the US war economy."

• William Arkin, director of the arms race and nuclear weapons research project at the Institute for Policy Studies in Washington, DC, has in the past two years revealed secret US plans to place nuclear depth bombs on Canadian soil, and other data concerning Canadian-US military involvements.

He said Canada "is one country that can't wipe its hands clean of Star Wars by merely making an announcement. Strategic defence of North America, which includes defence against bombers and cruise missiles, depends upon Canada. SDI will not work without reliance on the early warning system of NORAD."

• Brig.-Gen. Don MacNamara, director of curriculum at the National Defence College in Kingston, headed the large and able Canadian Forces delegation to the enquiry. He welcomed the opportunity to be part of the enquiry's interest in matters "near and dear" to the military profession, "because we believe we are wearing the uniforms of Canada's oldest and largest peace movement . . . the Canadian Forces. The first

and fundamental responsibility of a sovereign government is to ensure the survival and security of the nation."

That aim, he said, could be accomplished "first of all, (by) the deterrence of war through participation in collective defence arrangements . . . NATO . . . NORAD . . ."

• Gwynne Dyer, historian, film-maker and journalist, told the conference Canada must re-think its alliances.

"We've had our alliances for 40 years and it's time we re-thought them. By taking our alliances apart, Canada can alter the perceptions that the US and the Soviet Union face a serious threat from each other. Canada's alliances such as NATO and NORAD extend the potential area of conflict between the superpowers, by bringing a host of other countries into the US orbit."

He also said the alliances support a polarized view of the world, one in which each side perceives the other as evil. "Canada, possibly in concert with other Nordic countries, could create an arctic buffer zone between the superpowers. Such a zone would be significant psychologically as militarily."

"One of the beneficial aspects of a Canadian policy of non-alignment is that it shows Americans that it just isn't commies and geeks who think these awful thoughts."

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## Month-long art display tied to stage production

The Salt Spring Island Painters Guild is holding a month-long display of works at the Metro Theatre in Vancouver.

The display opened February 6 to coincide with Metro's production of *On Golden Pond*, and features paintings which reflect the mood and setting of the play.

Participating guild members are Jack Avison, Jackson Barker, Brien Foerster, Libby Jones, Olive Clayton, Mollie Houston, Evelyn Napper, Chris Pattinson, Marguerite Pearce, Sally Robinson, Jo Stone and Marg Threlfall.

Metro Theatre Centre is owned and operated by the Metropolitan Co-operative Theatre Society, a non-profit association formed to promote and develop theatre arts on a non-professional level.

The society's theatre is operated as a regional training centre for the benefit of various little theatre, operatic and other stage art groups who form part of its membership.

Its annual, co-operatively produced series of plays and musicals not only provides the necessary medium for training but also provides demonstrated standards of quality and production for the non-professional theatre movement.

The present play is a sensitive portrayal of the *Golden Pond* characters. There is an excellent balance of humour and drama,

and the leads, Marcel Maillard as Norman Thayer Jr., and Audrey Wills as Ethel, wisely avoid any reflection of the well-known film portrayals.

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# Cancer society work explained on Pender

Jane Procter, co-ordinator of the Vancouver Island District branch of the Canadian Cancer society's B.C. and Yukon Division, spoke recently to a group of over 30 men and women residents of the Penders at a gathering at the home of Mrs. Anita Blanchard.

Procter explained the set-up of the society and showed two video tapes. The first told the story of Camp Good Times, for children who are cancer patients and have been forced to spend their childhood in hospitals undergoing therapy — not a cheerful environment. *Camp Good Times* was a sad and beautiful video to watch — happy children playing freely amidst the trees and sunlight, engaged in normal childhood camp life.

The second film showed another part of the society's work — visiting and communicating with adult cancer patients.

The Pender group is learning how to establish a similar unit on the Islands, and how to use the available services.

"Eighty per cent of cancers can be prevented with education; 30 per cent of cancers are due to smoking," said Procter.

It is acknowledged that diet plays a part in cancer prevention. Procter suggested using the new cookbook, *Smart Cooking* by Ann Lindsay.

and unable to return home each evening may find the Vancouver Island lodge in Victoria of help. The cost is \$13.50 per day, \$35 for a spouse. A registered nurse is on duty 24 hours per day.

The *Reach to Recovery* is an emotional support program of volunteers who receive training and have often been cancer patients themselves.

The Cancer Society has many programs. Another is the Emergency Aid program. It can supply financial aid, transportation, food supplements, treatments, wigs, wheelchairs and so forth. Volunteers are available to drive cancer patients to doctors, hospitals and clinics.

The Cancer Society needs funds to carry on its programs. Funds come from their yearly April campaign carried on by volunteers

and by donations received "in memoriam" and in bequests in wills. The target for 1987 is \$3.6 million in Canada. Donations may

be made at any chartered bank.

Money from the Terry Fox Run goes to the National Cancer Institute of Canada, where research applications are reviewed by doctors and scientists. Money from Steve Fonyo's run goes to all projects, especially to increased education.

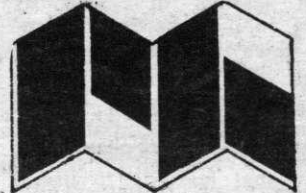
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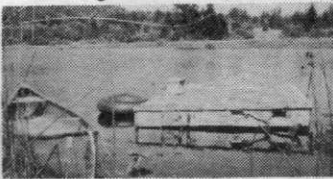
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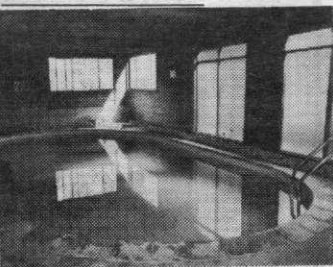

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## Mayne Island mini-conference

# School computer teachers discuss instruction

Teachers from Mayne, Pender and Saturna Islands met at the Mayne Island school recently to learn how to teach children to use a computer keyboard.

Students at the three schools are beginning an eight-week series of lessons developed by teacher John Cameron of Fernwood Elementary School, the goal of which is to teach them keyboarding techniques.

School district computer coordinator Tom McKeachie explained that learning to use a keyboard is the first step in the local program. He noted that when students know how to 'keyboard,' it is much easier for them to learn the many other uses of computers.

"The kids are flying," he said. "Once they know how to keyboard, they can deal with the issue of learning computer skills."

School District 64 employs a small, plastic keyboard run on four batteries to teach students keyboarding techniques. These machines — 24 of which have been ordered by the district for use here — are not sophisticated computers, but electronic keyboards equipped with small liquid crystal screens. Students learn touch typing on them.

The keyboarding program,

which has been tried in other district schools, apparently works well. McKeachie noted that some Grade Six and Seven students in the district can already type more than 70 words per minute.

McKeachie added that contrary to what some parents might presume, learning to keyboard at

such a young age apparently does not adversely affect a child's handwriting. In fact, he said, the opposite is true.

"One of the side effects, surprisingly, is that the students' handwriting improves," he said. "Improvements in their handwriting and spelling have been

found. Typing apparently makes them more aware of the significance of the written word."

School District 64 is hoping to expand computer instruction in its schools during the coming years. The education ministry has allocated approximately \$60,000 from its *Fund for Excellence* in

Education to the district for the purchase of computers and computer related items this year.

District residents familiar with word-processors are invited to contact school board chairman David Eyles and indicate their opinion of the usefulness of computers in local schools.

## Auto demolition services offered to island residents

Sure, that rusty old Chevy and the dead Volkswagen in the front yard were great island cars in their day. But with neighbours complaining about their appearance, it's probably time to dispense with sentimentality and give those wrecked autos the heave-ho.

Derelict motor vehicles are unsightly, and as Islands Trust chairman Nick Gilbert noted last week, if left in the open they are also illegal.

Gilbert noted at the Salt Spring Trust Committee meeting Thursday that derelict vehicles are a

perennial problem on the island.

"As time goes by, vehicles tend to accumulate on people's property," he said. "But zoning does not allow for storage of any unlicensed or abandoned vehicles unless they are suitably screened or housed."

Gilbert suggested those people with a vehicle collection that puts them at odds with zoning regulations should take advantage of the services offered by SAM, a firm that removes scrap cars.

SAM is scheduled to visit the island February 15.



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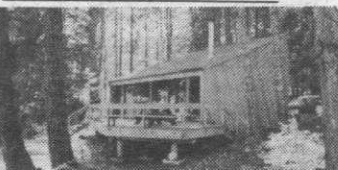

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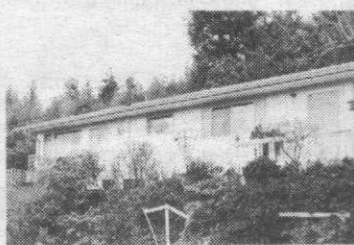

### Twenty-five years ago

• Deep concern over ferry service was shown by 40 Fulford Harbour residents who turned out to discuss a suggestion made by the Toll Authority that the wharf be moved to Isabella Point, with ferry service being continued from that site instead of Fulford.

The plan would involve construction of a highway to Isabella Point to connect the new wharf with the main Salt Spring road system.

Fulford residents felt they faced disaster if the suggestion was adopted, saying loss of the ferry would cripple the \$26,000 waterworks system just installed.

• The federal works department announced it plans to spend an estimated \$185,000 on construction of a small boat basin in Ganges Harbour.

The basin would be located in the bay outside the causeway in the area near the end of the peninsula. While complete details were not available, it was generally thought that considerable dredging would be required and that a breakwater would be built.

A visitor to Salt Spring Island, returning home to the mainland aboard the *City of Victoria*, leaned over the ship's rail to watch another vessel in Active Pass. He leaned too far over, and a case containing his reading glasses fell from his pocket and landed on the 'bumper' ledge just above the vessel's waterline.

There was no hope of the glasses riding out the crossing of the Gulf on such a perilous perch, so the gentleman told a crew member, who in turn passed the word to the ship's captain.

After leaving the swirling waters of Active Pass, the captain stopped the ferry and a man was swung over the side in a bo'sun chair. The glasses were retrieved.

• Fred Morris will serve another year as president of the Salt Spring Island branch of the Royal Canadian Legion.

Serving with Morris are vice-president P. Bingham, second vice-president J.H.M. Lamb, sergeant-at-arms W. Eagles and directors C. Archer, B.A. Hedgcock, W. Bates, E. Groff, J. Waterfall, R.H. Anderson, K. Ralph and Harry Loosmore.

### Fifteen years ago

• Queen of the Lanes at Leisure Lanes was won by Lucy Moore of Ganges.

Moore, who bowls in the Tuesday afternoon ladies' league, had a score 129 pins over her regular average. Fifty-eight women entered the contest.

• Telephone facilities serving the Gulf Islands are scheduled to receive \$240,000 worth of improvements.

B.C. Tel customer service manager L.A. Huxtable said in Victoria that the expenditure is required to keep pace with growing demands for telephone service here.

B.C. Telephone's budget includes funds for the expansion of telephone services on Saturna, Mayne and Galiano Islands.

• When the Laszlo Bedocs family of Salt Spring Island lost their home in a fire, Rev. Frank Sutherland promptly launched a campaign to help them. Within a week, local residents donated more than \$600 to the homeless family.

### Ten years ago

• The Salt Spring Island Community Planning Association will

look into establishing an elected council to give better local representation in matters related to planning.

The resolution followed a recommendation by Henry Schubart at the annual general meeting of the association. Schubart proposed that the organization investigate the possibility of an elected body to give Salt Spring residents more control over planning on the island.
