Finishing touches being put on new Players' production

Final touches are being put to the Salt Spring Players production, of *Mass Appeal*, starring Gordon Wales as Father Jim Farley, and Michael Armstrong as the young seminarian, Mark Dolson.

Gordon Wales has performed in professional theatre for many years in Canada, England, Europe and South Africa. He came to Salt Spring seven years ago to work as a potter; his work is well-known here, in Victoria and Vancouver.

After many years away from the theatre, he joined the Salt Spring Players and has been in two previous productions, *Private Eye* and *Life With Father*. This is his most challenging role to date — the complex priest with a need to be liked, a fear of rejection and a loss of his Christ. Father Jim Farley stimulates Gordon's talent as a comedian while tapping his depth of emotional experience.

Michael Armstrong studied theatre in Vancouver before coming to Salt Spring Island, where his first appearance was in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. He has been a member of the Players

for seven years, during which time he has been active both on the stage and behind the scenes. Recently, he directed the successful *Wizard of Oz*.

He manages to find time from his contracting business to become involved with other areas of the theatre. He directed the Theatre B.C.'s 50th anniversary production of an original Eric Nicol play, which was performed in Victoria, and recently coordinated the 1986 summer Festival of the Arts on Salt Spring.

Mass Appeal is his first stage appearance in two-and-a-half years, and he finds that the role of the fiery young deacon, Mark

Dolson, whose pursuit of truth has eclipsed his ability to express his love, is challenging and one he finds an affinity with.

The combined talent of both these actors, enhanced by the complementary set, music and costumes which set the mood and transport the audience to the parish of St. Francis, promises to give theatre-goers a very exciting evening.

The production opens March 4 with a gala night, where the audience is invited to meet the cast after the performance. Shows will continue until March 8 in Mahon Hall at 8 pm; tickets are at *et cetera* at \$5 and \$3 (OAPs and students).

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Removal of tariff on books won't likely help consumers

The removal of a 10 per cent federal tariff on books imported from the U.S. is unlikely to mean lower prices, the owner of a Salt Spring Island book store said last week.

Roger Coster of Volume II Books in Ganges said elimination of the tariff, announced last Wednesday in Finance Minister Michael Wilson's 1987-88 federal budget, is good news for his industry. However, Coster said the move will not reduce book prices because two other government taxation measures looming "on the horizon" should keep costs at their present levels.

"One fear is that next month's B.C. budget will return the seven per cent sales tax on books," Coster said. "Everyone's holding their breath: (B.C. Finance Minister) Mel Couvelier has said there will be no increase in the sales tax, but that it will be extended to some of the things not taxed now — like books."

The sales tax on books was removed in the early 1970s by the provincial NDP government, Coster recalled, when it was pointed out that magazines received an exemption but books did not. "Our slogan at that time was, *Playboy isn't taxed, but Plato is.*"

Along with the threat of a sales tax being re-applied on books, the industry is worried that a 12 per cent business transfer tax will be imposed. In his budget speech last week, Wilson hinted that such a measure could be introduced later this year.

"If the 10 per cent tariff hadn't been removed, it would be really tough," Coster said. "The three measures, taken together, would have meant an inflationary increase in the cost of books of something like 40 to 50 per cent in one year."

With the possibility of two new tax measures being applied to books later this year, he continued, book publishers and distributors are unlikely to reduce prices now. "They won't drop, but they'll stabilize until the industry sees what happens (in government)."

However, Coster added that the removal of the 10 per cent tariff on imported books would not, by itself, have been enough to cause a reduction in retail prices — even if there was no threat of additional taxes being imposed.

"I would have been very surprised if it had been reflected in the marketplace," he said. "In my 15 years in this business, I can only remember one instance when book prices actually declined. That was about nine years ago, when the value of the British Pound fell in relation to the Canadian dollar."

While he worries about the taxation "clouds on the horizon," Coster said he was "very happy" about removal of the 10 per cent tariff. The



publishers, sellers and distributors launched a lobbying and petition campaign in protest. Their argument was that the tariff penalized Canadian readers by narrowing the range of books available to buyers, caused a net increase in the price of all books — not just those produced in the U.S. — and threatened Canadian publishing houses with the loss of foreign funds used to subsidize printing of books by Canadian authors.

As well, Coster said last week, it represented an imposition in the "free flow of books, ideas and information."

He added: "Anything that does that is bad for us as a community. We live in an English-language community, and we can't have barriers that interrupt the cultural interflow."

While the tariff was in effect, it did not necessarily cause a drop in book sales, Coster said, but it did mean a decline in purchasing power.

"The people who buy books will always buy books," he said. "But the person who spent \$10 a month on books and who used to be able to buy two books could now buy just one. Their purchasing power was eroded."

About 65 per cent of the books sold in Canada are published in the U.S., 25 per cent are from Britain and 10 per cent are published in Canada.

measure, applied last June on books imported from the U.S., was Ottawa's retaliation for an American decision to levy import duties on Canadian cedar shakes and shingles.

"It was such a stupid gesture, really," Coster says. "It didn't make any sense at all — the best thing they could have done was to forget it."

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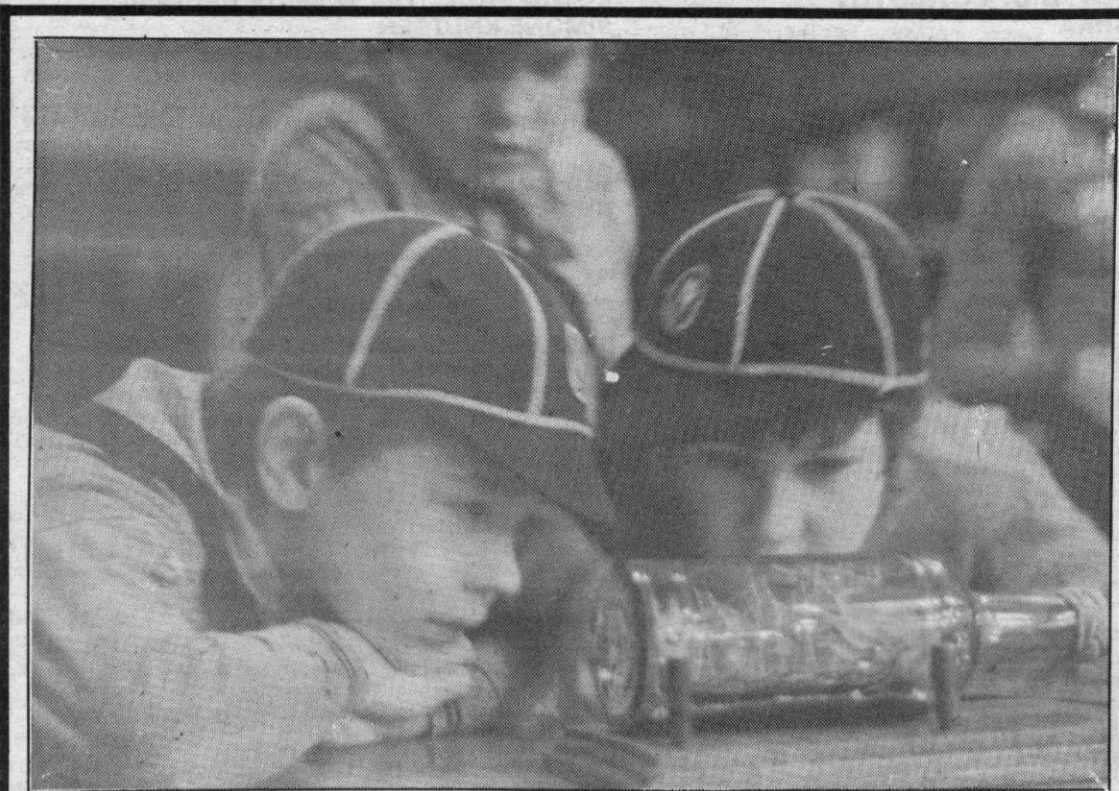
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Boys' night out

CRD islands rep gives resignation

The Outer Islands representative to the Capital Regional District (CRD) has resigned his position, effective March 1.

Kelly Scott will move back to Vancouver to accept a job offer in the retail sector. Currently employed at Pender Lumber, he has lived on North Pender for the past six years and served as the Outer Islands' CRD director for the past two.

Scott is pleased with several developments which occurred during what he jokingly refers to as his "short but illustrious career" as director. "I'm happy there was a parks and recreation commission established on Mayne Island."

The pending establishment of the Outer Islands' first regional park, on South Pender's Mt. Norman, and the CRD's current review of the waste management plan to deal with garbage, have also been positive developments, he says.

The garbage problem will be a major issue for future Outer Islands directors, Scott feels. "I hope they find appropriate solutions for each of the islands, because they are different."

He also wants the CRD board to recognize the unique characteristics and lifestyle of the Outer Islands.

Scott says the departure is all the more regretful because cooperation from the public made the job less difficult than it could have been.

Former CRD director Vern Roddick will perform Scott's duties until a by-election is held, probably sometime in May, according to Roddick.

Roddick, a director from 1981 to 1985, is Scott's designated alternate. He says he has no present plans to run for the vacated seat.

Saturna homes burn

Two Saturna homes were destroyed in fires this past month.

Saturna firefighters had to transport men and equipment by boat to extinguish a house fire on Trevor Island in Saturna's Boot Cove.

A neighbour spotted the house — which belongs to Thomas Coulton of Seattle — on fire at about 1 am on February 17 and reported the blaze. The cause is

still undetermined. Randy Miller of Staples Road lost his home and possessions in a February 12 fire which regional fire marshall Brian Brown suspects may have been started by burning candles.

Though both homes were destroyed, Brown complimented the Saturna firefighters for confining both blazes to the houses and keeping flames from nearby brush and buildings.

Crime rate nearly double

Pender RCMP receive 34 cases

Pender RCMP have received 34 new cases so far this month, for a 1987 total nearly double the crime rate for the same period a year ago.

There have been 80 reported incidents for the first seven weeks of 1987, compared to 47 last year, Cnst. Brian Brown said last week. He does not know why there appears to be more crime on the Penders, Mayne and Saturna islands this year.

"I wish I knew, because if I did, I'd change it."

A Mayne man has been charged in connection with an automobile accident. The driver of a Camaro lost control on a corner and struck a pickup truck, "shaking up" the driver and two children inside, Brown said. Peter Hlady of Mayne has been charged

with driving without a license and failure to confine a vehicle to the right-hand side of the road.

A Mayne homeowner was cleaned out in a break-in that was reported February 8 — but which police say could have occurred anytime during the previous two months. A stereo, liquor and clothing were taken from the Leighton Lane home.

Radio equipment was among the items taken from two boats broken into in Horton Bay on Mayne. The incident was reported February 8.

RCMP are investigating a case of four-wheeled vandalism on North Pender Island. A vehicle tore up the ball diamond in Magic Lake, by driving in circles, and knocked over a sign by PJ's General Store.

Saturna club to get grant

A provincial government grant for \$50,000 has been approved for the Saturna Island Community Club.

The grant, supplied from the Expo Legacy Fund, will go towards construction of recreation

facilities on the island. In announcing the grant last week, Saanich-and-the Islands MLA Mel Couvelier said the Saturna project would include recreation facilities, a gymnasium for school children, a postal station and a permanent library.

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Anglican Church a key institution on Galiano

St. Margaret's is an Anglican Church within the Diocese of B.C., but as it is the only church on Galiano it has come more and more to emphasize an ecumenical role and provide a spiritual home for Christians of other denominations.

For many years it has been unable to support a full-time Rector. An off-island priest holding another position is unable to devote much time to parish work. Visiting the elderly and the sick is a priestly function that many feel important in the parish of St. Margaret's.

During the past year Bishop Shepherd approved a change of status for St. Margaret's. The parish is now under the care of a Titular Rector, Rural Dean Father D. Malins. He will act as advisor to the Wardens and Church Council, who will be wholly responsible for the work of the church within the guidelines laid down by the Bishop. The Rector's Warden, Wendy Roberts and People's Warden, Ian R. Hooley, are assisted by Lay Readers Kathy and Michael Sharp to be joined in April by Margaret Edgar.

The services will be shared on a six-week cycle between Rev. Pocock as Anglican priest, Lay Readers and guest ministers of other denominations. There will be the occasional Roman Catholic evening service.

The annual Vestry Meeting is the main democratic component of the Anglican structure at the parish level. At the meeting held February 7, a sheaf of reports was circulated and elections held. Unfortunately, there was insufficient time given to study reports, ask questions and make comments. The meeting, the shortest on record, lasted 50 minutes.

In addition to the Wardens the following officers were elected: Kathy Sharp, secretary; Les Woodbridge, treasurer; Margaret Edgar, Christian education and newsletter; and Cliff Coolidge, missions and outreach. Ena Hooley, meanwhile, will be president of the Altar Guild.

The Fabric and Finance Committee of Les Woodbridge and Michael Sharp will have an important task if the proposal to build an addition to the church materializes. During the year the Rectory was sold and the money placed in an account with Synod. The capital may be used to pay for future changes to the church fabric.

Margaret Edgar reports in addition that it was generally felt that 1986 had been a successful if challenging year for St. Margaret's; the congregation had grown and there had been an increase in community and outreachwork, which will hopefully continue with the added participation of parishioners.

Advance notice is given of the celebration of the World Day of Prayer on Friday, March 6 at 3 pm in St. Margaret's. This year is the 100th anniversary since people of many denominations in many countries have gathered together share in a program of music and readings prepared by lay persons. All islanders are welcome.

Gardening Time

The Garden Club began the 1987 season with enthusiasm and verve — demonstrated by a well-filled show table, a stimulating program by two of its own members and an appreciative

audience. Dawn Christian shared her knowledge of gardening under glass and plastic obtained by wide reading, attending workshops and personal experience. Wendy Roberts brought professional expertise, good humour and a truckload of demonstration material to show members how to seed and plant in the greenhouse from January to June.

During the winter break the club's library was re-organized with a simple card catalogue system based on the Dewey. Members may borrow books over the period of one meeting to the next. There will be a fine of 50 cents on overdue books. Annual fees for club membership are \$5 and are now due. Visitor fees are \$1 a meeting.

A wealth of information on gardening is available at club meetings, always held the second Wednesday in each month at 1:30 pm in the North Community Hall. The March 11 speaker will be Dr. David Tarrant of UBC and CBC's Western Gardener, speaking on the subject of *hanging baskets*.

sexes and all ages, somewhat in the manner of the historic Eton Wall Game. Galiano School has frequently fielded a formidable 11, winning inter-island competition and competing in Victoria. Now Galiano has a properly equipped junior team which developed out of the soccer program of the Summer School of the Arts. Looking very smart in their orange and black or green and black vertical striped uniforms, the boys and girls train enthusiastically under the direction of coaches Bob Walker and Terry Hart.

On Sunday, February 22, the team played its very first match. The team with its two coaches and 18 supporters travelled to Salt Spring where they took on a team from Fulford. For the first attempt the team did exceptionally well, leading by one goal at the interval eventually losing by a score of 2 to 1.

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Trust member not sold on new Pender zoning

One Island Trust representative is not convinced that the new zoning for a planned seniors' housing project is the best thing for North Pender.

The February 19 North Pender Island Trust meeting changed the zoning for the existing health centre and proposed seniors' housing site from public use to community service. The wording change was meant to create a zone specifically for seniors' housing, since public use includes a wide variety of functions, local

trustee Peter Campbell said.

However, Trust vice-chairman and South Pender representative Steve Wright opposed the motion because of a wording loophole which would permit far more units than the community wants.

The bylaw states no more than one quarter of the four-acre lot may be built upon. The buildings can be as high as three stories. Wright argued the bylaw needed a density restriction since a three-story building on 25 per cent of four acres could allow

several dozen units where the community expects "eight to 16."

Wright acknowledged the seniors housing society does not want or plan a high-density project, but said the new zone should be specific.

"The community expects a specific bylaw for a specific purpose. It's not specific, it's wide open."

Campbell said the Trust should

pass the bylaw as is, then draft an appropriate amendment about density.

"It's better to have an unspecific bylaw which you can amend fairly quickly than have no bylaw and go back to square one," Campbell said.

After trustees passed the rezoning, Wright abstained from Campbell's motion to draft an amendment.

Wright said later the entire

bylaw should have been redrafted since the amendment will still have to go through four readings, ministry approval and a public hearing, just as a redrafted bylaw would have.

The seniors' housing society's acting chairman agreed the density would have to be defined. "Our plans now are only for six units, and a recreational building . . . with room for three more (units)," Vern Roddick said.

Pender firemen elect not to share system

North Pender's volunteer firefighters have decided against sharing a paging system with their Mayne Island counterparts.

The effort to cut costs by involving both islands in obtaining a pager system proved too complicated, North Pender Island Fire Protection society secretary-treasurer Doug Stevenson said. "We'll do it on our own."

Volunteer firemen are currently contacted over the telephone.

Pender's plan to go it alone, which involves giving each volunteer a beeper, was outlined at the society's annual general meeting on February 10.

The 36 people in attendance also learned the society will issue

its own burning permits. It will cost about \$300 per year for printing but will take control of burning on the Penders from the provincial forestry ministry. "It gives us full control," Stevenson said.

Elmer Bowerman and Tim Appleby were re-elected as society directors. Peter Hunt was elected to replace Dave Williams, who did not seek another term due to other commitments. All three men won by acclamation.

There were a couple of car fires, a half dozen bush fires, and no house blazes during 1986, Stevenson said. "We did have problems with idiots burning stumps and rubbish."

Fire alert system set

Mayne Island firefighters were issued pagers last week as part of their new fire alert system.

The pagers will replace a siren which alerts the department's 20 volunteers. Sixteen pagers have been issued, according to assistant chief Harry Lane.

A provincial lottery grant of \$20,000 helped pay for the \$68,000 project. Equipment costs for the pagers, encoders and base station equalled \$28,000, Lane said. Mayne's municipal taxes

cover the remaining costs.

Mayne's base station is capable of handling the paging systems for other islands, though Saturna is the only one which has said it will join in at a later date.

"We've been negotiating with the other islands for four years," Lane said.

Victoria's CHEK TV allowed the fire department to attach their repeater to the station's transmitter tower on Saturna Island, providing free power.

Septic fields outlawed

The few remaining septic fields in North Pender's Magic Lake suburbs will come to an abrupt end.

The Capital Regional District (CRD) has sent notices to the homeowners who have not connected their plumbing to the sewerage system built five years ago. If they do not connect them within the next two months, the CRD will do it and bill them.

Magic Lakes Sewer Commis-

sion chairman Peter Hemphill estimates there are about a dozen unconnected homes. "This is the final cleanup," he warned.

Homeowners will pay the \$1,100 connection fee plus the cost of laying pipes, which varies according to the terrain.

The absence of septic fields should ensure Magic Lake's safety from eutrophication by water vegetation which feed on the effluent, Hemphill said.

Committee backs boaters

The North Pender Island Trust Committee would rather see the waters off James Island used by boaters than fish farmers.

The Trust said last week it will inform the ministry of forestry and lands that its first reaction to possible salmon farms off James Island is one of concern.

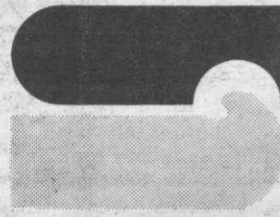
"We do have reservations regarding the impact of fish farms in the area . . . on recreational use" said Trust vice-chairman Carol Martin at the North Pender committee's February 19 meeting.

Mae West, a Vancouver company, has asked the provincial ministry for a license to occupy

two sites off the island for one year to study the feasibility of future salmon farms there.

The ministry, out of courtesy, asked the Trust for its opinion regarding the application because James Island is in North Pender's jurisdiction. The trustees' recommendation carries advisory but not legal power.

If the company pursues salmon farming in those spots, the Trust could refuse to rezone the sites for that purpose. Trustee Peter Campbell urged trustees to put their concerns in writing now. "If you say nothing, presumably you've given tacit approval."



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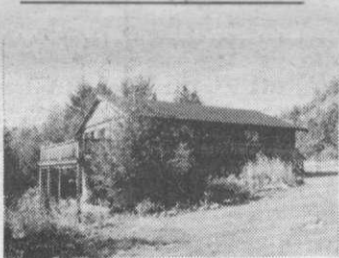

Poor turnout handicaps FC in late-season game

This past week Salt Spring FC found themselves (or, more specifically, a small portion found themselves) pitted against lowly Victoria Rebels in a crucial late-season match. A positive result was essential for a team which reputedly has first-place aspirations. However, judging by another inadequate turnout of players, these aspirations would appear to be suppositions.

FC's line-up at kick-off included a forward line of fullback Rob Tranter supported by two boys drafted from Malcolm Legg's juvenile team — Andrew Aust and

Corbin Scott. In midfield, Michael Brown was flanked by Bruce Hume and Alan Webb. The defense sported Bruce Caspar, Lyle Brown and Malcolm Legg. In goal was Salt Spring's 'Flying Scotsman,' Ken Marr.

Playing with 10 men and missing six first-team players, plus competing at a men's level with two very game but clearly over-matched players, the result should not have been a good one. Understandably this fact was not lost on the players and supporters of FC, who braced themselves for the worst.

At this point however, it should

be remembered that Salt Spring has found itself in similar circumstances recently and overcome the odds on every occasion. FC coach George Legg has instructed his team on how best to play successfully under these conditions. Hints rather than instructions they were; for Mr. Legg only made suggestions, indicated methods and left the team to work out the game-plan in detail.

And this they did very well. A throw-in, flicked on by Gordon Scott, which resulted in a slender chance which Michael Brown exploited into a Maradona-like

field-length dash to spark Salt Spring to a surprising 1-0 lead.

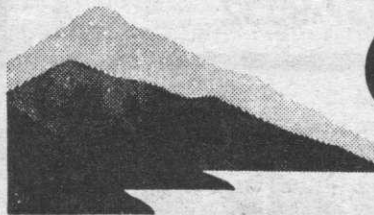
Minutes later a characteristic 35-yard blast by Bruce Hume staked FC to a 2-0 lead, and a rout seemed to be in the making.

Unfortunately, some 20 minutes into the first half Bruce Hume was brutally tackled and had to be helped from the pitch. This left Salt Spring with the daunting prospect of having to play the remaining 70 minutes with nine players.

Sequentially, two very bad goals past an unusually shaky Ken Marr secured a draw for the Rebels but it

can hardly be of any consolation for them. They were very lucky to get a point from a team that was reduced to eight players for a good portion of the second half.

The truly astonishing thing (and this result was just that, astonishing) is that Salt Spring was unlucky not to win. Michael Brown dribbled through the entire Rebel defense only to be robbed from less than sixty yards. Corbin Scott headed a cross from Michael just over the bar; another cross from Michael to Corbin late in the game only failed to connect because of fatigue.

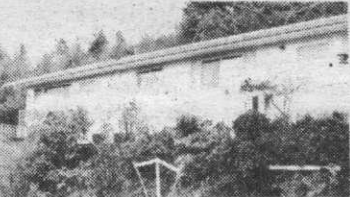

Twenty years ago

• Two navy vessels are scheduled to visit the Gulf Islands.

The HMCS *Columbia*, an anti-submarine destroyer escort, is due in Ganges April 5. A second destroyer escort, the HMCS *St. Croix*, is scheduled to visit Pender Island on April 19.

Both vessels are calling at the islands in celebration of Canada's centennial year.

• A blaze caused by a faulty fireplace did considerable damage to the home of Harry Baines Jr. of North Galiano.

The house was occupied by Baines, his brother and family, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Baines and a 19-month-old daughter. The fire was discovered by Mr. and Mrs. Rennie Weatherell, who were returning home to the South End of Galiano.

• Three persons were convicted of vagrancy on Salt Spring Island and sentenced to short terms in jail.

Fifteen years ago

• Winds gusting to 95 miles per hour smashed into the Gulf Islands, leaving damage and injury in their wake.

Two houses were destroyed on Salt Spring Island and uncompleted homes on Galiano were demolished. Henry Geigerich of Beddis Road suffered a broken collar bone and other injuries when a building collapsed on him. He was recovering in Victoria hospital.

• The Gulf Islands are experiencing a real estate boom, land development spokesman and realtor Jim Spencer told a small group of Ganges residents at a meeting Saturday.

The realtor said land values here were on the rise. Part of the increase was attributed to the freeze on subdivisions, he said. "There is every indication that prices of serviced lots will double this year," he said.

• Late afternoon flights between the Gulf Islands, Vancouver and Victoria are now available, according to John R. Sturdy, agent for Victoria Flying Services.

The afternoon flight leaves the islands for Vancouver at 3:55 pm, and for Victoria at 5:25 pm. Morning flights remained unchanged, and are offered every Monday through Saturday.

Ten years ago

• The Islands Trust came of age when Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis announced amendments to the Islands Trust Act that will give the organization responsibility for planning, zoning and subdivision approval.

The amendment Act (Bill 25) was unveiled by the minister, who is also the islands' MLA. The main purpose of the bill is to improve the planning and land use regulation process in the Islands Trust area.

• It was panic stations in Ganges for a few minutes Wednesday morning when the oil barge unloading at Bruce Fiander's wharf discharged heavy black smoke.

The fire department was notified, and firemen discovered that an electric motor driving the barge's pump had overheated. As a precaution, the barge was pulled out into the harbour for a short time.

• The Galiano Chamber of Commerce has a new president. Judge Mervyn Ferguson — former president of the Canadian Lacrosse Association, president of the Canadian Sports Federation and president of the Hall of Fame — was chosen to lead the organization.

• Islanders were told they had greater control over land use in the Gulf Islands than ever before.

Marc Holmes, chairman of the Islands Trust, said the new Trust

regulations gave islanders greater administrative authority. Holmes, a Salt Spring property owner, said the government proposal made the islands legally different from other parts of the province.

Five years ago

• A 25-mile mystery car rally will be held on Salt Spring Island to raise funds for the Gulf Islands Secondary School graduating class.

Student David Dahlgren explained that approximately 30 vehicles are expected to take part, most of them driven by students. Checkpoints along the route will provide clues as to the route, and the rally winner will receive a trophy donated by the Ganges RCMP detachment.

• The Grade Nine program at Pender school could be axed if parents didn't support it by sending their children to school there.

School District 64's board of trustees passed a motion to that effect after discussing a proposal to send Grade Eight and Nine students to school on Mayne.

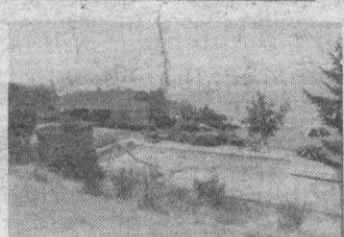
