

### Cross-country tour to tackle free trade

A Salt Spring Island man is preparing to embark on a five-month, coast-to-coast "crusade" against the free-trade deal negotiated between Canada and the United States.

John Wilcox will leave Mile Zero near Victoria on April 1 and make his first stop on Salt Spring on April 2 before moving on the Vancouver and points east.

Wilcox will take to the road as "Johnny Canuck," and travel in a 1941 Chevrolet half-ton truck decorated in accordance with his anti-free-trade stance.

The coast-to-coast tour is backed or supported by national bodies like the Council of Canadian Coalitions against free trade; and "the pro-Canadian network," Wilcox said last week. A number of Salt Spring residents and business organizations in

Victoria and Sidney have also been supportive, he said.

"This venture will involve the rebirth of Johnny Canuck as he comes again to the aid of Canada," Wilcox said. "All this is in answer to the need we all have regarding the desperate, railroading attempt to lay this (free trade) deal on us."

Wilcox estimates his journey will cover 10,000 miles and take five months to complete.

When he arrives on Salt Spring on the second day of the trip, Wilcox will set up in the Saturday Farmers' Market in Ganges. The Raging Grannies of Salt Spring are scheduled to appear with Wilcox, *No Deal* hats and tee-shirts will be sold to help finance the journey, and balloons and a soapbox will be on hand. Pamphlets will also be distributed.

### Municipal Affairs asked to examine 'county-style' government structure

The ministry of municipal affairs has been asked to conduct a cost-benefit analysis of establishing a county system of government on the Gulf Islands.

In an interview with *Driftwood* last Saturday, MLA Mel Couvelier said he passed the suggestion to the municipal affairs ministry after it was first aired at a recent public meeting on Mayne Island.

The ministry will decide whether to proceed with the analysis, Couvelier said, adding that the chance of a study being undertaken depends on the fate of recommendations made in the Mercier Report.

Municipal Affairs Minister Rita Johnston is expected to soon announce how her ministry will proceed with the recommendations made in the Mercier Report. Prepared after a review of the Islands Trust mandate and performance, it calls for a reorganization of the Trust along regional district lines, including an assumption of the service delivery function now held by regional districts.

The bulk of the recommendations in the Mercier Report have been challenged by the Islands Trust, and by the Capital Regional District.

Couvelier told *Driftwood* he was not endorsing a county system of government for the Gulf Islands as an alternative to the Islands Trust or to the CRD, but that he felt bound to pass the suggestion on to the minister.

Still, the MLA and finance minister said he believes the suggestion should be considered. "If we are trying to simplify government, there may be some merit in it," he said.

A county-style government would involve one set of local representatives being responsible

for local functions now administered by the board of school trustees, the CRD and the Islands Trust.

Couvelier said the benefits of such a system would be elimination of "contradictions" in the different interpretations local bodies place on their duties and the

introduction of better coordination in local decision-making.

The system would probably only work for the Southern Gulf Islands, area, he continued, because county-style governments are tailored to small geographic areas and small population levels.

### Local man dies in crash

A single-vehicle accident at the corner of Fulford-Ganges and Hereford roads last week claimed the life of an 82-year-old Salt Spring resident.

A police investigation indicates James Gilson may have suffered a heart attack immediately prior to the accident.

The incident took place March 23 at 4:10 pm. Gilson's vehicle struck the curb and then a utility pole.

Three other passengers in Gilson's vehicle were taken to Lady Minto Hospital. They were treated for minor injuries and released.

Coroner Ivan Dare is continuing his investigation into the possible cause of the crash.

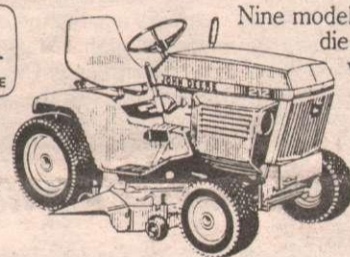

## Ottawa agrees to pension hike

Old Age Security (OAS), Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) and Spouse's Allowance (SA) benefits will increase in April to keep them in line with the cost of living, the federal government announced last week.

OAS payments, for those age 65 years and over, will rise to \$313.15 a month from \$310.66.

The maximum GIS payment for single people and for married persons whose spouses do not receive OAS or SA benefits will increase to \$372.16 a month, up from \$369.21. The maximum GIS for married people whose spouses also receive OAS or SA will increase to \$242.39 from \$240.47.

The maximum SA, paid to low-income people between 60 and 64 years who are married to GIS recipients, will increase to \$555.54 from \$551.13. The maximum SA for widows will increase to \$613.33 from \$608.46.

## Annual daffodil drive raises funds for cancer

Salt Spring Islanders contributed \$1,000 to cancer research last week — and received bouquets of daffodils in exchange.

The annual fund-raising drive, organized by Betsy Dosco of the local branch of the Canadian Cancer Society, fell just short of reaching the amount raised last year.

Some 20 volunteers helped Dosco set up daffodil sales throughout Ganges and Vesuvius last Saturday. The volunteers also sold cookbooks which feature preventative and "clean eating" recipes.

Cookbooks are still available through Dosco.

In 1988, it is estimated some 96,000 Canadians will be diagnosed as cancer victims. This will bring the total number of patients under medical care for cancer to approximately 300,000.

More money is donated each year for cancer research than for any other disease. Scientists believe that, in time, cancer will be beaten.

Even many people who have cancer today can expect to live longer: one out of every two patients treated for cancer will survive at least five years, compared to one in five during the 1940s.

The 1988 Canadian Cancer Society goal is to raise \$38 million for cancer research and public education on preventative measures.

## \$950 donated for Kopp at potluck benefit dinner

A potluck benefit dinner held at the Legion last week to raise funds for Darlene Kopp went "really well," organizers said Monday.

Some \$950 was raised at the Saturday event, which saw entertainment provided by the Byron family. Those who attended contributed food towards the dinner. There was no cover charge to get in: all funds were raised through donations and raffle ticket sales.

Dawn Byron, one of the organizers spearheading the drive to

raise funds for the local cancer victim, said she was pleased with the amount of money raised. She said the evening was well attended.

In the Legion-initiated drive, the community previously raised over \$5,000 to send Kopp to the Mayo Clinic for diagnosis of two suspected tumours.

The 35-year-old daughter of long-time islanders Terry and Marg Byron is presently back on Salt Spring, undergoing treatment here.

## Island ranked tops in generosity

The \$6,000 Salt Spring Island raised in 1987 for the Terry Fox Run ranked the community among the most generous in B.C.

among communities in the Vancouver Island region — just behind the \$8,629.47 raised in Victoria — and seventh in B.C.

and Salt Spring (\$5,938.20).

The 1987 Terry Fox Run raised a total of \$333,903.81 in B.C. for cancer research. Across Canada, the total raised was \$4.1 million.

The 1988 version of the Terry Fox Run — the eighth annual — is scheduled for September 18. As in 1987, the Salt Spring Island event will be sponsored by Driftwood.

Province-wide totals released recently by Fox Run organizers show Salt Spring Island contributed \$5,938.20 through the event held here in 1987. That total put Salt Spring in second place

Port Coquitlam led the way with \$25,527.41. Next came Prince George (\$12,683), Victoria (\$8,629.47), Dawson Creek (\$7,036.55), Kamloops (\$6,519.79), West Vancouver (\$6,024.12)

# Police investigate robbery on Pender

**PENDER ISLANDS** — An RCMP investigation continues into a break-in and robbery at the Browning Harbour Marina on North Pender Island in the early hours of Saturday morning.

"We have two suspects," Pender Constable Brian Brown said Monday morning. "They are from off-island and left by ferry Saturday morning. I have the name of one suspect and will have the other one in a short while. There's a better than 75 per cent chance we'll have them in custody before the end of the week."

The robbery took place after someone broke through a wall into the Browning Marina office between 2 and 3 am, then smashed

a window to gain entry into the Marina Store, which is just below the Browning Pub. Taken were tee-shirts, sweatshirts, fishing poles and other merchandise from the store.

Four boats at the marina were also vandalized. Someone smashed windows, set off fire extinguishers and cast one vessel adrift.

The two suspects are men in their 20s who arrived on Pender the Friday morning before the break-in. "I was down at Otter Bay when they came off the ferry," says Brown. "It's a small island and you somehow sense when something or someone is not right."

Most of the stolen merchandise was recovered and is being held.

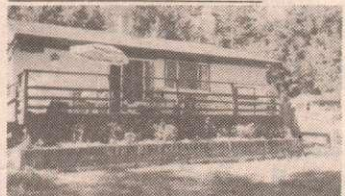

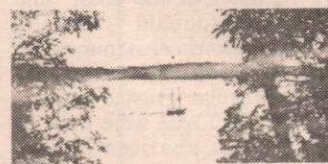

# Scoones leads Galiano Chamber of Commerce

**SOUTH GALIANO** — The AGM of the Galiano Chamber of Commerce took place on Saturday March 26 in the South Community Hall. While a rival attraction drew twice the audience to the Golf Club, about 40 Galiano residents turned out to support the chamber, see a B.C. Ferries promotional slide presentation and hear a few benign words from our MLA, Mel Couvelier.

Various sub-committee chairmen reported on what has been a not-particularly busy year for the chamber. The most successful activity seems to have been a membership drive led by Fran Whipple. This netted 58 work business memberships, 40 individual Galiano residents and 48 off-islanders, and an additional sum of \$700 donated by supporters not wishing to become members.

Arising out of a Tourist Strategy Report commissioned by GIVA (Galiano Visitors Association — an off-shoot of the Chamber but now more or less independent) and being prepared by Ed Andrusiak, the chamber has asked for this to be expanded into an Economic Development Plan for Galiano due to be completed by May of this year.

Elections were conducted by Fred Robson, past president and one of the founding members of the chamber, who spoke of the value of the work of the chamber to island residents. The following slate was elected by acclamation: Jim Scoones, president; John Allen, vice-president; Mike Fenwick, treasurer, and Allan Buttery, Shirley Coulter, Carmen Braund, Geoff Gaylor, Jim Ford, Larry Moulton, George and Jean Tully, directors. The board will have to find a secretary as no one has been found willing to accept this responsibility.

## Couvelier Comments

When Mel Couvelier was asked 'to say a few words' at the Chamber of Commerce meeting on Saturday, he mercifully and tactfully took his instructions seriously. By condensing his budget speech into five minutes, he earned the gratitude and applause of the audience.

The one feature he did dwell on was the change of philosophy of the Ministry of Health budget of \$3.9 billion, 33 per cent of provincial expenditure. Much more emphasis is to be placed on programs and expenditures contributing to keeping healthy rather than devoting all available resources to curing sickness. Amen to that.

During a question period a tactful audience avoided the budget but complained about the lack of co-ordination of some government services. A glaring example is that ferry schedules direct traffic flow to Swartz Bay and Victoria, but hospital service for the Outer Gulf Islands are provided at Lady Minto on Salt Spring. Volunteer ambulance attendants are ordered to send patients to Ganges, where serious cases are often re-routed to Victoria. This results in loss of valuable time and additional stress to the patient.

This lack of co-ordination led Mr. Couvelier to suggest that Galiano be included with Mayne in a cost-effectiveness study of local government. He seemed to suggest that a 'county' type government might be simpler. Possibly so, but that might not necessarily be better.

## APC

Once a year the Advisory Planning Commission holds a public meeting, the main purpose of which is to elect members of the commission to serve a two-year term. It is to be expected that the chairman would give a report of the work of the commission during the previous year but, as usual, this information had to be elicited by questioning.

An APC may be set up by a Trust Committee under the Municipal Act, but the way members are chosen varies from island to island. The procedures by which the APC operates also vary. Some island APCs hold open meetings; others, such as Galiano, operate in-camera.

To rectify the ill-defined and rather secret way the Galiano APC has been operating, the Galiano Trustees have drafted a bylaw which will come up for discussion at the next Galiano Island Trust Committee meeting.

The annual meeting to elect two members to two-year terms on the APC was held on Saturday last in the South Community Hall, with Judy Pattison in the chair, and Trustee Macdonald there to answer questions in his inimitable, subtle and erudite style, supported by the avuncular Trustee Woods.

About 30 citizens were there to pepper the chairman with questions about the APC's activities. Four candidates were nominated for the two vacancies on the commission, from whom Louis Gauthier was chosen on the first ballot. To break a tie, a second ballot was called for and this resulted in the election of Fred King.

## Sensitive areas

The approximately 80 members of Clear Cut Alternatives and the

interested public who attended the meeting held on Saturday, March 19, to identify 'sensitive areas' of Galiano with regard to logging, showed a considerable degree of unanimity. Although seven groups work independently, their conclusions differed only in minor details and order of priorities.

Corridors or screens at least 50 meters wide should be left alongside Porlier Pass Road, streams, freshwater lakes and especially beaver ponds. Logging completely to the shoreline and to the summit of ridges such as Bodega and Stockade is aesthetically undesirable. On the south-west coast of Galiano a series of bluffs expose clear-cutting to the gaze of the occupants of the estimated 50,000 boats that pass up and down Trincomali Channel. The remnants of the east coast trail should be preserved.

The meeting concluded with wide-ranging discussion on topics such as lowering of the water table, destruction of habitats and allowable cut. It was revealed that compliance with regulations concerning Management Areas (Forest Management Lands has now replaced the term Tree Farm Licence) is supervised by the provincial Assessment Authority. Allowable cut is 1/60th (based on the 60 years it takes a fir to grow to marketable size) of the old TFL 19 area of which Galiano forms less than two per cent. Thus regulations would permit the complete clear-cutting of the remaining mature (nine inches diameter of trunk!) trees in one logging season. To apply the allowable cut formula to Galiano alone would, according to MacMillan-Bloedel spokesmen, be uneconomic.

Almost every proposal that can be made to make logging practices on Galiano more acceptable could be construed *in the short run* to be uneconomic. In the longer term more imaginative, innovative management of Galiano properties arrived at by consultation between professionals and concerned, informed residents might well result in more profit to the company. Unfortunately, the larger the company, the more diversified and multinational its operations, the remoter the control, the more is the likelihood that maximization of immediate profit becomes the dominant motivation for policy.

Clear Cut Alternatives have arranged additional field trips for those wishing to obtain first-hand information about the logging situation. On Sunday, April 3,

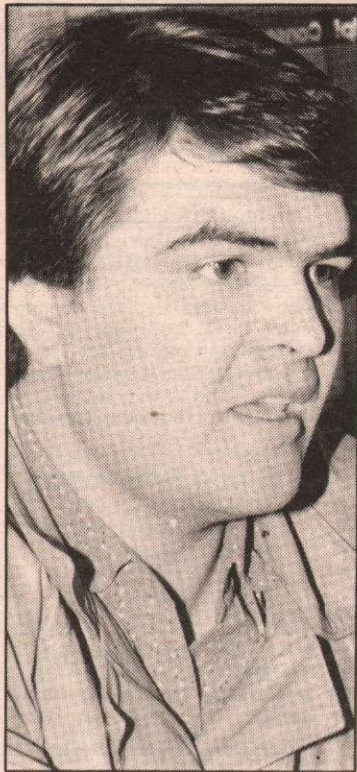

# Island lawyer announces candidacy

The race for the NDP nomination in the new federal riding of Saanich-Gulf Islands has grown to a field of four candidates.

Last week, lawyer Jack Woodward of Salt Spring Island announced his intention to seek the NDP nomination. The other three hopefuls are Salt Spring teacher Irene Wright, poetess Elizabeth Woods of Victoria, and Lynn Hanson, a Victoria-area resident employed by OXFAM-Canada.

Woodward has practiced law for eight years and is based in Vancouver while living full-time on Salt Spring. A 1978 graduate of the University of Victoria law school, he previously worked as a commercial fisherman.

A candidate for the NDP in the 1980 federal election, when he contested the Vancouver-Burnaby seat, Woodward later served in Ottawa for two years as executive

assistant to MP Ian Waddell. He has been a member of the NDP since 1972, been active in numerous Vancouver and Victoria election campaigns, served as chairman of its energy policy subcommittee, and been a delegate to several federal and provincial conventions.

Throughout his legal career, Woodward has been involved in cases concerning individual rights. He has acted as legal counsel for the Meares Island Indians, for the Western Institute for the Deaf (obtaining a CRTC ruling establishing Canada's first message relay system for the deaf, as per page 19 of your telephone directory), for the Electric Consumers Association in their fight against the takeover of West Kootenay Power and Light by an American company, and in

a Canadian energy policy case contesting the shipping of Alberta natural gas through a pipeline authorized only to transport gas from Alaska.

More recently, Woodward authored the legal opinion used by the Concerned Citizens of Salt Spring to contest an application to truck logs across an ecological reserve at the south end of the island.

Woodward, who is a part-time professor with UVic's faculty of law, said he decided to seek the local NDP nomination because he believes "the country needs experienced, responsible people in

Ottawa who care about the country — people who are not there for personal reasons."

The local NDP riding association will choose its standard-bearer in early May. MP Jim Manly, who currently represents Salt Spring in Ottawa, will not seek re-election in the newly-defined riding. Saanich-Gulf Islands will be carved out of parts of two existing ridings — Manly's Cowichan-Malahat-the-Islands, and Esquimalt-Saanich.

Pat Crofton, the Progressive Conservative MP for Esquimalt-Saanich, will seek his party's nomination in the new riding.

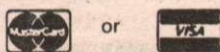

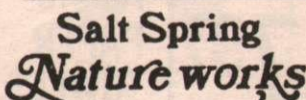

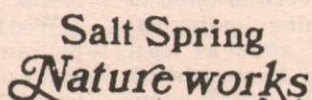

# Salt Spring FC finishes number one in league

This was a very satisfying weekend for Salt Spring FC. Entering Saturday's game against Prospect Lake, F.C. needed at least three points to clinch first place. Through a complicated series of circumstances, F.C. trailed Victoria Royal Elks by two points but held a game in hand.

Saturday's game, a decisive 4-0 win at Prospect Lake, pulled F.C. level both in games played and points.

Having had troubles scoring in recent weeks, F.C. was determined to hit the net. Arnie Hengstler, who was missing in last week's 0-0 tie, proved to be the catalyst in a one-sided match against the lowly Lakers.

Arnie's return to the back wall allowed Carlo Legg to push into a more attacking centreback position — something which, with the absence of Trevor Tamboline, was much needed in that position.

Carlo's superb skills, combined with Jack Braak, Michael Brown, and Tony Legg, produced a formidable mid-field — soccer's equivalent to the 'Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse'.

On a large, even playing surface, F.C. dissected the Lakers defence at will. David Toynbee found himself on the end of numerous through-balls and displayed his incomparable dribbling skills. David's unselfishness limited him to three goals; on several other occasions, he had the Lakers defense totally befuddled, only to try and set up someone else.

Michael Brown supplied F.C. with its fourth goal, expertly picking the corner on a well-taken breakaway.

On Sunday, F.C. found themselves relaxed and needing only a tie to clinch first place and promotion to the third division.

A greater degree of cohesion has blossomed in the Salt Spring ranks during the recent away matches, in large part due to the increased familiarity of the midfield and back wall (which has been juggled for much of the year), but also due to the inescapable fact that a

skillful team playing on proper playing surfaces (i.e., green and flat) can be more creative.

At home, F.C. has a tendency to put the ball in the air at every opportunity — not because we're superior in the air, but because we try to avoid the capriciousness of a ball played on a lumpy pitch. While a ball in the air is fodder for our defense, it's a disadvantage for our midfielders and forwards who excel with the ball on the ground.

Despite this fact, Salt Spring kept the ball on the ground long

enough for David Toynbee to score three more goals and send F.C. into the third division.

It's difficult at this juncture to evaluate F.C.'s success and form a conclusive explanation for it, but I do have a viable hypothesis for it: all the players representing Salt Spring F.C., who all reside here or have lived here in the recent past, take a strong sense of community onto the field. I think it's present with all Salt Spring clubs, competitive or otherwise; an intangible feeling that one

represents the little rural guy against the heavily-favoured urban guy.

In the F.C. experience, time and time again during the last two years the players have risen against almost insurmountable odds to win the day. This weekend the combined skills and efforts of all the players produced a happy result, although not an unexpected one.

Once again Salt Spring wins the league; next year another deserved

step forward.

# '87 crimes: categorized, compared

Local RCMP have compiled a breakdown of crimes occurring throughout the local jurisdiction area in 1987.

- Robberies last year were up 100 per cent over 1986. The total for 1987, however, was still only one.
- Total assaults for 1987 was 54, compared to 49 the year before.
- In 1987, police attended 87 break-and-enter offences. That total in 1986, was 77.
- A 100 per cent increase in theft over \$1,000 in 1987, brought the total to 14, as compared to seven, the year before.

- Thefts under \$1,000 came in at 158, up two from 1986.
- Fifteen fraud charges were laid last year, taking a 50 per cent drop from the 1986 total of 30.
- Police attended 300 property offences in 1987, compared to 299 the year before.
- Total property damage offences came in at 91 last year, up one from the year previous.
- In 1987, local police laid 86 charges under the Motor Vehicle Act. This compares to 77 in 1986.

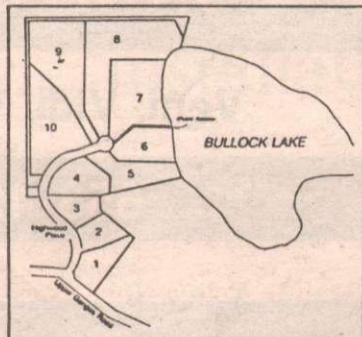

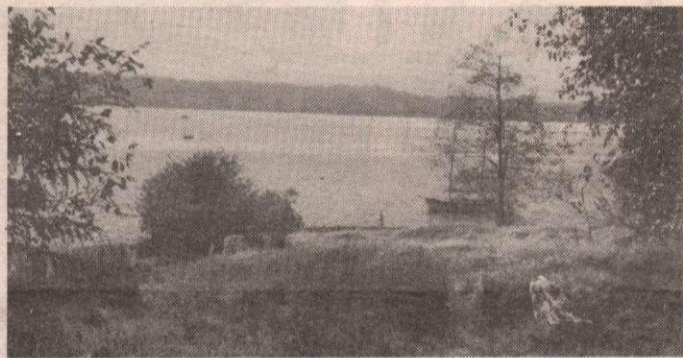

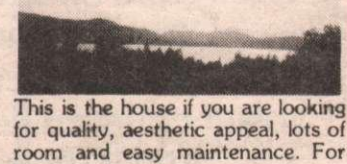
