Fr. Bergin celebrates half-century of service

Rain or fine, storm or sunshine, a short, happy islander may be seen walking, walking, walking through Ganges. The figure of the Rev. Fr. P.A. "Gus" Bergin is familiar to many of his neighbours.

"I have to get the exercise," he explains.

Pastor of the Roman Catholic churches on Salt Spring Island, as well as the island communities of Galiano and Mayne, for the past 13 years, the parish priest has made many friends in the community.

Going up to the Lady Minto Hospital, he walks: for the exercise. He enjoys walking. And he enjoys talking. On his daily jaunts he encounters friends and strangers and he is always happy to exchange greetings. He likes people.

Fr. Gus Bergin has a lot to talk about. He has the experience of his 76 years and he has the satisfaction of reaching the end of his first half-century in the service of his church. For 50 years he has celebrated mass daily. Indeed, he has celebrated this keynote service of his church so often that he can only make a guesstimate of the number of times he has celebrated the Eucharist. That guesstimate goes somewhere more than 20,000 times.

On June 5, 1938, the 26-year-old student Bergin became Father Bergin, dedicated to bringing the Eucharist and the sacraments of his church to Canadians in many parts of the land.

Fifty years is a long time in any man's life. That half-century justifies the greying hair and the recalcitrant muscles, but it also brings a vast experience and a host of memories. Like meeting an apparent stranger in Ganges recently.

"Do you remember us?" asked the stranger.

The priest admitted that he could not recall the woman or her husband.

"Well, you ought to," responded the visitor, "You married us 42 years ago!"

That was one marriage of the 200 or so that he has performed in his 50 years.

What makes a man so determined to live the lonely life of a Catholic priest? The island priest explains that he has no clear recollection of debating the question. From boyhood he had but one ambition — to be ordained a priest. Today he recalls that his mother, a daughter of Ireland, was not wholly convinced. She could not attribute to her young son all the virtues she looked for in a man of God.

Born in an Ontario community that is now part of the city of Ottawa, Manotick, he grew up in the capital city.

When he was 15 years of age he left home for a boarding school in the United States. The school in Erie, Pennsylvania, was termed a pre-seminary college. The students were given a classical education and enjoyed four years during which time they might decide to go ahead with their plans or to abandon further thought of entering the priesthood. He was 19 when he returned to Ottawa, no whit shaken from his original convictions.

For a year he attended St.

Finances discussed at annual Club meeting

To the relief of the executive, the annual general meeting of the Galiano Club on Saturday, May 28, was able to conduct its business, as the required quorum of 25 members was exceeded despite a rival attraction at Retreat Cove. The reading of the minutes of the last AGM and four 'extraordinary' general meetings held during the year occupied the attention of the members for a considerable time, as they were extensively annotated with supplementary information by secretary-treasurer Don Macdonald.

During the past year the constitution was revised, the first of three phases of the hall renovation completed, the possibility of renting six UREP lots from the province explored, and the Deed of Trust and a management plan for Bluff Park examined. The SWDA creates recurring problems for the club, and the possibility of 'dumping the dump' has been considered.

It having been ascertained that the provincial government no longer requires them to be professionally audited, the club's financial statements were issued and certified as fair and accurate by W.W. Coward (Lt.-Col., retired), who generously provided his services gratis. Major items of income were hall rentals (\$3,648) and fund-raising activities (\$3,413), with the Blackberry Festival contributing \$1,221 and dances \$1,493. President Bill Scoones praised Ella Johnson, who was the director in charge of this aspect of the club's activities. The major expense was renovations at \$4,388. There was a surplus of \$1,022 on the year.

Separate accounts are presented for SWDA and Bluff Trust. The balance in the Trust account diminished by \$2,266 during the year, accounted for by installation of gates at both road entrances to

the park and the erection of signs executed by Keith Holmes. The solid waste disposal area funds are in good shape, totalling \$8,018. Although expenditures rose considerably over the previous year, the purchase of a cardboard baler accounts for most of this increase.

Three important resolutions were considered. Bob Riddle presented the report of the renovations committee and proposed that the club proceed with phase two, the modernization of the kitchen which would be extended, re-wired and equipped with a commercial dishwasher and other fittings to comply with the health inspector's recommendations.

Estimated cost was up to \$26,000, half of which would be obtained from grants. There was discussion over priorities as the stage, dressing and storage-rooms are also in urgent need of improvement. The amount of the authorization sought was also controversial as the notice of motion read "renovation expenditures over \$2,000," which seemed a trifle misleading if the actual cost to the Club was to exceed \$10,000. Nevertheless, the motion carried with a 90 per cent majority.

The current problem with the dump, apart from lack of volunteers for recycling and misuse by the public, is the fact that it prevents the Galiano Club from obtaining charitable status with Revenue Canada. Donations to the club cannot be considered tax-deductible. The club has been advised to have the SWDA administered by a separate and independent society. It was decided to set up such a society, and that a committee consisting of two representatives each from the Galiano Club, the North Galiano

Community Association and the Chamber of Commerce be appointed to bring the new society into existence.

Connie Kennedy presented the report of the Bluffs Trust. For three years the club has been considering whether and how to revise the 1951 Deed of Trust as, in some respects, it is not suited to the changed economic and social conditions of today. There is some doubt as to whether the deed could stand a legal challenge in a possible liability action. Advice was sought from Jonathan Oldroyd, and a modification of the deed presented for approval. The intention of the original trustee, "to hold the area as a public park for the recreational uses of the general public ..." is regarded as sacrosanct and has been retained with minor changes of wording, such as substituting "nature conservancy area" for park. The directors of the Trust must operate under a management plan approved at a general meeting by the members (of the Galiano Club). This restricts the "unfettered discretion" of the directors provided by the wording of the original deed. The motion proposing the modification of the Deed of Trust was passed by 29-3.

The meeting was adjourned until Saturday, June 4th, same time and place, for the election of officers for the ensuing year.

As a postscript to the report on the SWDA, Jim Scoones reports that at some time in the 24 hours following the meeting, somebody 'borrowed' the stock of bundling wires used for securing the bales of cardboard. They may be returned at any time to Jim or to the recycling shed.

Fire

During the second two weeks of May, the South Galiano Volunteer Fire Department received eight calls. Two of these were false alarms. One was a report of

smouldering at the dump.

Another was for a brush fire on Sticks Allison Road. Permission had been given for a small fire to burn trash, but too much was put on the fire, which got out of control and required the assistance of the department to put it out.

Another fire needed attention in Bluffs Park. Some foolish, casual visitors started a fire in a log, feeding it with wood from a long-dead and very dry stump. After scattering empty beer cans and garbage about, these unwelcome guests left without making sure that the fire was out. The fire was reported by Fran Whipple, fortunately before it had time to develop into a forest fire.

The latest call came in at 12:57

pm on Saturday from the former Wally Graham residence opposite the entrance to the Rod and Gun Club. By 1:05 pm, the department was on the scene and came very close to saving the old building, which now belongs to Nancy Holland of Vancouver. The house was occupied by Robin Bracht and her five children, who all escaped safely, although two of the children received oxygen from the ambulance crew who were standing by.

Although the house was insured, the contents were not. As usual, the community, both individually and in groups, rallied round to help the victims of the disaster. Quickly, large hampers were

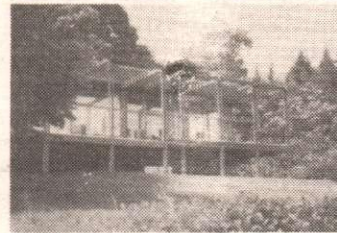

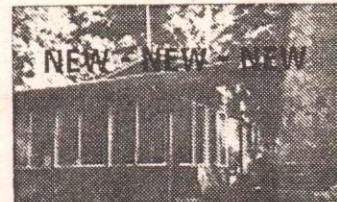

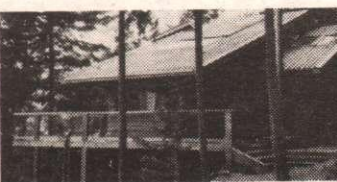

'Ten Spot' property owners conducting selective logging

NORTH GALIANO — When driving to North Galiano, travellers will have noted some logging being carried out near Retreat Cove. This is selective logging, the removal of mature and diseased trees, and is being carried out by loggers employed by the residents of what is familiarly known as the "Ten Spot" — at present, eight householders who run the property as a limited company. Their policy is to log the 158 acres — the former Frank Graham holding — a little each year, in order to enhance the property and improve it esthetically.

Forester Bob Knowles is consultant for the logging and Bruce Landmark with helper Peter New is milling the lumber, some of which is sent off-island and eventually finds its way to the Japanese market.

The area was last logged extensively about 1947. At that time the cove was used as a booming ground. The cookhouse and camp sleeping quarters were located at the corner of Porlier Pass Drive and Retreat Cove Road. Mrs. Williams (later Kingsmill) ran a store near the government wharf, and there was a public school nearby for several years.

In his surveying of the timber, Knowles has found evidence of other earlier logging in the area, and the remains of a mill site.

Fire Siren

The North Galiano Volunteer Firemen tested their new fire siren on Sunday. The object of the test was to determine the effectiveness of the siren and the area over which it could be heard. Underhill has published several books on the subject, using his photographs as illustrations.

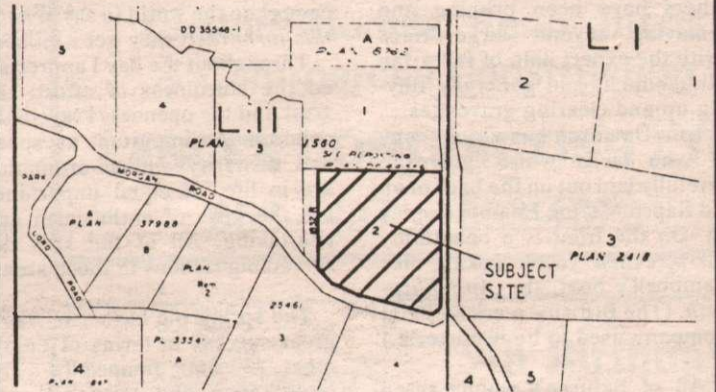

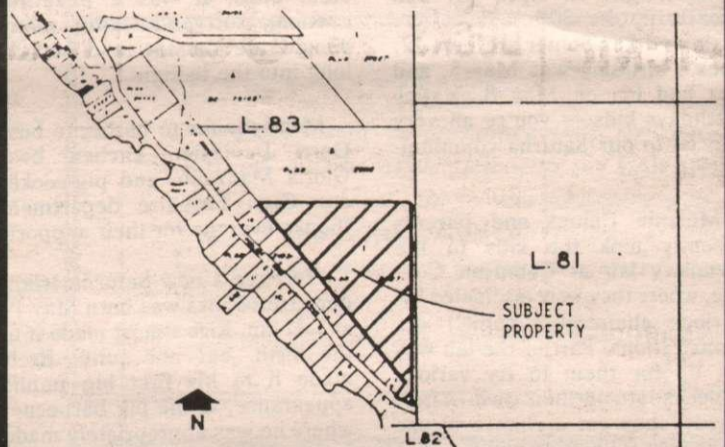

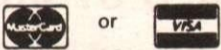

Minter book recalls Yukon railway

There are more than a few ex-Yukoners living on Salt Spring and the other Gulf Islands who have affectionate memories of travelling aboard the White Pass Railway.

While powerful engines hauled the old-fashioned parlour cars up or down the mountainside along a narrow-gauge track, there was always something marvellous to

see — the sudden tunnels, the sky-wide views off to one side and the granite rock blocking the other, and the darkness relieved by tumbling waterfalls or the glitter of frost and walls of snow.

Passengers will have eyed the cruel trail of '98 by which, in harder times, men and their supplies made it over the pass, and considered the fortitude of those

visionaries who were responsible for construction of that most remarkable of railways.

The story of those builders of the 175-kilometre line between Skagway, Alaska, and Whitehorse, Yukon, is told with gusto by a writer perhaps most qualified to take on the task — Roy Minter of Vancouver.

Minter was born in England and educated in Vancouver, and served with the army during the Second World War and the Korean conflict. In 1955, Minter found himself at Whitehorse with the Northwest Highway System, back when the army was responsible for the Alaska Highway. Two years later he retired, joined the White Pass & Yukon Route in an executive capacity and began a new career promoting the railway and the area it served.

Later, Minter said of the Yukon that: "it covers the land like a magic parka, and once you have felt it you are never quite the same again." That fascination led him to research and write this book about the White Pass, and the railway that conquered it.

Completing the account was a singularly difficult task, with old records far-flung or destroyed, people he might interview hard to locate, and files and other research material scattered between Vancouver, Ottawa and Britain.

The result of Minter's effort is a splendid work whose characters take on substance, their tasks shown in all their enormity, from

financing to construction to operation.

The White Pass was the secret pass used by the coastal Indians who traded with others living along the great river behind the snow-covered mountain chain. It was the elusive "low pass" that beckoned Captain Billy Moore, was surveyed by William Ogilvie and named for his expedition's sponsor.

It proved to be a route over which pack animals could be used and, upon discovery of gold in the Klondike in 1896, it became all the more valuable for transporting supplies — a fact recognized by the promoters of the White Pass Railway.

The trail conquered, the railway began running in July 1900, at which point the book ends, leaving this reader, at least, with a great sense of anticipation for the next chapter in the White Pass saga.

The White Pass — with 394 pages that seem destined to last, fine maps and photographs to give shape and size to events in the story, and with bibliography, notes and index — is a handsome volume with print that is exceptionally clear and easy to read.

Its foreword, by Pierre Berton, illustrates the impact the railway line had on those who travelled it.

Berton's enthusiasm for Minter's work is based on his own writings about the Klondike, the Yukon River and many other northern features.

'Key to economic survival'

Communities seek shared use of Stein Valley

LYTTON — Ask anyone on the streets of Boston Bar, Lillooet, North Bend or Lytton what should be done with the Stein Valley and the answer is invariably to share it. "Share the Stein" has become the motto of a coalition of forest companies, civic officials and a lot of ordinary citizens trying to sway public opinion and government action in favour of logging part of the Stein Valley.

So far, the battle has been all uphill. Opponents of the Share the Stein Committee — environmentalists and preservationists — have been winning the fight for public opinion by pressing anyone in favour of logging the Stein into the role of the villain.

Residents of the three Upper Fraser communities consider their detractors city slickers who have little or no interest in the area, other than destroying its economic base by preventing the logging of the Stein.

They have no understanding for the single-mindedness of their opponents who want to "Save the Stein," regardless of the cost to the area whose future depends at least to some degree on the outcome of the Stein controversy.

"We are real people. We are concerned about the future of our community," says Ray Dechambault, a resident of Boston Bar and a member of the Share the Stein Committee.

Dechambault works as a driller-blaster for B.C. Forest Products' Boston Bar logging division. He says the controversy has received only one-sided coverage.

"Nobody has told our side of the story. This community would probably cease if the mill is shut down, and the future of the mill depends on whether or not we can log the Stein," he says.

Mill officials aren't much more optimistic. They don't foresee the immediate closure of the mill if they can't log the Stein, but won't make any bets on the future.

Bob Shore, manager of the BCFP's lumber mill in Boston Bar, says claims by the anti-logging group that the mill's future is in doubt with or without timber from the Stein are nonsense.

"Since 1985, we've spent in excess of \$8 million on improvements and expansion. We have developed secure markets for our products in Japan, China, Algiers, France and England. If anything, our future looks good," Shore says.

But to continue supplying those markets, the mill needs lumber, and part of that lumber is expected to come from the Stein.

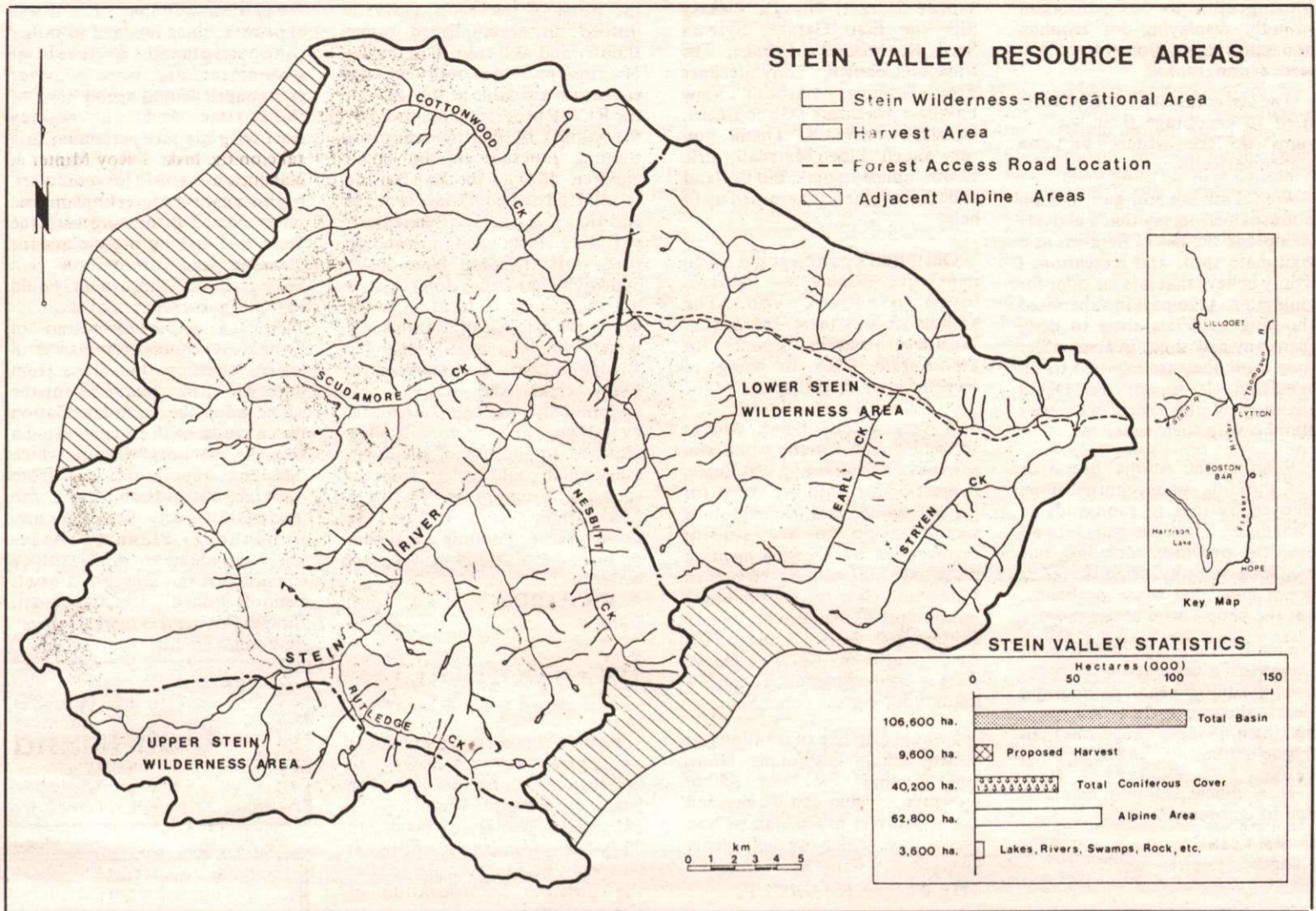
The mill is a model of efficiency. Its computerized machinery has increased the recovery rate of processed lumber by 15 to 20 per cent.

The mill supports an annual payroll of \$7.5 million. The logging division's payroll surpassed the \$20 million mark last year.

Ted Mattice, woodlands manager for BCFP, says the economic impact of the mill is felt as far away as Chilliwack.

"A lot of the trucks you see here, are bought in Chilliwack. Other equipment comes from Hope. Some of the contractors hauling logs are also from Chilliwack," Mattice says. Close his mill and a lot of people get hurt, not only in Boston Bar.

A few miles further up the valley, in Lytton, Lew McArthur owns and operates Lytton Lumber, a medium-sized sawmill that employs 70 people, most of



them from Lytton. His annual payroll is about \$2.3 million.

McArthur doesn't look like much of a lumber baron. Dressed in heavy work clothes, hard hat askew, he could easily be mistaken for one of the yard workers. McArthur first started the mill in 1963 on Indian land at Bottany Lake, 20 kilometres outside Lytton. In 1969, he moved his operations into town.

Quiet and laid-back, McArthur is ill at ease when it comes to politics and controversy, but says he will do everything he can to secure his lumber supply. Without logging the Stein, he says, that supply will be threatened.

Lee Nokleby, who owns and operates the Lytton Hotel with her husband, Cliff, believes that their business will be ruined unless logging in the Stein goes ahead.

"We're getting out of here if the

Stein is going to be closed to logging. What do we think will happen? There's going to be a lot of people out of work and on welfare," she says.

"I say, go ahead with the road. What good is a wilderness area if you can't get into it. They should build the road and have a dozen or so picnic sites along the route, so

you can sit down, have a bite to eat and enjoy the wilderness," she says.

Chris O'Connor, woodlands manager for Lytton Lumber, says the amount of lumber to be cut in the mid-Stein Valley won't leave huge scars on the landscape. Maximum clear-cuts, he says, will be limited to 40 hectares, and the annual cut from the area won't exceed 125,000 cubic metres a year for 30 years.

The total amount to be logged, O'Connor says, represents about nine per cent of the valley's entire area and 25 per cent of the forested area, but he adds that both the Lower Stein and Upper Stein Wilderness Areas will be left untouched.

One of the bones of contention is a proposed 30 kilometre road through the Lower Stein Wilderness Area. The road is needed to get to the timber in the mid-valley. The path proposed for the road follows the Stein River, past a number of Native heritage sites, including some pictographs. The natives are dead-against any road being built through the Lower Stein Valley.

B. C. Forest Products, on the other hand, has gone to great lengths to prepare a detailed inventory of the heritage sites and has agreed to make sure that none of them are disturbed.

The government's Wilderness Advisory Committee recommended a few years ago that no road be built until an agreement has been reached with the Native Indians over their land claims, which include the Stein Valley. Attempts by the provincial government to reach an agreement with the Indians have failed, so far.

An alternative route into the mid-Stein, suggested as a compromise, would not touch any of the wilderness areas, but would have a number of disadvantages from the company's point of view.

Brian Taylor, divisional engineer with BCFP, says the alternative route would reach an elevation of 6,200 feet at one point.

"The weather at that elevation would be so adverse that our logging season would be restricted to about six months a year. The route would also double the distance the logs will have to be hauled, and that's an expensive proposition," Taylor says.

The Share the Stein Committee also has an ally in Jack Munro, president of the International Woodworkers Association. Munro says it's insane to declare "every damn valley in the province" as a personal refuge for someone or other.

"People who should know better have decided to jump on some bandwagon to save every damn tree and turn this province into a job-free zone," Munro says.

One of the most worried people in Lytton is Mayor Joseph Chute. He is beating out his brains every day, trying to come up with ideas to broaden the town's tax base, but has to spend most of his time responding to those who would shut his town down.

"If we can't go ahead with logging the Stein, it will be a severe blow to this town, as well as the other small communities around here," he says.

Chute says he often wonders whether those who propose to "save the Stein" aren't selfish. He would like to see at least one campsite for handicapped people along the road into the Stein.

"Most people who come here don't hike and back-pack. We get families who want to be able to drive somewhere and then, maybe, walk around," he says.

Lytton Lumber, Chute says, is the town's largest employer and has been good to the town. Even when times were bad, the company went out of its way to keep operating and keep people working.

"We need that road into the Stein, and we need that lumber," Chute says.

Eastern third of Stein to be wilderness area

The Stein Valley is located northwest of Lytton and covers a total area of 106,000 hectares. The total area to be harvested over a 30-year period is 9,600 hectares.

The eastern third of the entire valley, the Lower Stein, is to be set aside as a wilderness area. A smaller area in the south-west corner of the valley is to be set aside as the Upper Stein Wilderness Area. No logging is to be permitted in those two areas, which together comprise about half of the entire valley.

Logging is to proceed in the mid-valley. Annual cut in the valley is not to exceed 125,000 cubic metres. That amount is roughly equivalent to the annual

production of B. C. Forest Product's Boston Bar lumber mill.

The forest in the Stein consists mostly of fir, lodgepole pine, balsam and spruce. There are no giant trees to be found. Average diameter of the trees is 15 inches.

The Forest Service estimates that more than a million cubic metres of timber in the Stein is dying from pine beetle infestation. The company says these infested trees still have a commercial value, if they're harvested soon. Left alone, they are extremely prone to fire by lightning.

The Stein Valley has been included in the Forest Service's long-range harvesting plan for 30 years.

Incorporation

Sir,

Possibly a few comments might place two recent letters to *Driftwood* in perspective. The letters are from M. Bendick (May 18) and M. Williamson (May 25). They both, from slightly different perspectives, condemn the idea of the possible incorporation of Ganges Village.

Both writers complain about the opposition to incorporation of the whole island, and suggest those same opponents are pushing for incorporation of Ganges. That is not my observation. Despite a very excellent study of incorporation of the whole island, it failed to arouse any interest. There may have been people opposed to it, but the main problem was that any of those in favour of it failed to come forward.

I can't recall a single person who actively opposed the idea.

My view was that since it was expensive, since it added to rather than displaced a level of government, and since a mayor and council would spend most of their time and our money discussing matters pertaining to a developing area like Ganges, it held little attraction for most of us. It also might have resulted in that same council dispensing with the Trust and making other plans for planning and zoning on Salt Spring. I join those who would have been disturbed by that.

As far as incorporation of Ganges is concerned, it was a logical question that arose from rejection of incorporation for the island. But the recommendation that a study be done came from a Ganges Advisory Group which included representatives from most of the island committees with interest in Ganges. Examples are: Community Planning Association, Advisory Planning Commission, Design Panel, School Board, Islands Trust, Ganges Ratepayers representative,

Centennial Society, Chamber of Commerce and a few others.

The decision to ask for a study was unanimous, but there was no indication whether the group would be for or against incorporation. The recommendation was not originated by "a relatively small group of people ... who exert a remarkably large influence on the life of the island", as stated by M. Bendick.

Both writers appear to feel that the business community will dominate decisions. As far as an election is concerned, homeowner voters would outnumber eligible business voters by at least 2:1. Secondly, since anyone on the island is eligible to stand for election, there might be no one elected from the designated area. Finally, members of the Incorporation Committee have been asked to keep their opinions to themselves. The report, when completed, will be presented to the public; and if there should be any merit to the proposal, it would go to a vote. Until the proposal is presented, it would appear reasonable not to prejudice the situation, nor to inflame people to belabour old issues.

Grant funding to assist islands television society

The Mayne Island based Gulf Island Television Society has received a \$47,428 grant from the B.C. Program for Educational and Entertainment Services (PEETS).

"We've been seeking the funding for quite some time and were a bit surprised it came through this fast," said Bob Clark, who heads up the Mayne Society.

The grant funds will go toward construction of a receiver and re-transmission station on Mayne Island that will broadcast Knowledge Network programming to about 3,200 people on Mayne, North Pender and Prevost, as well as the west end of Saturna and the east end of Galiano.

"Our next step is to put out a request for construction bids," said Clark.

"There is no time constraint on construction," says grant co-ordinator Perry Hunter. "It is our experience that while you have a group of volunteers who care and are involved in making a project go, time is not a factor."

The Communications Grant Program is administered by the ministry of the provincial secretary and government services and is designed to aid in the development and extension of communications systems in British Columbia. The B.C. Lottery Fund provides the dollars which support the grant program.

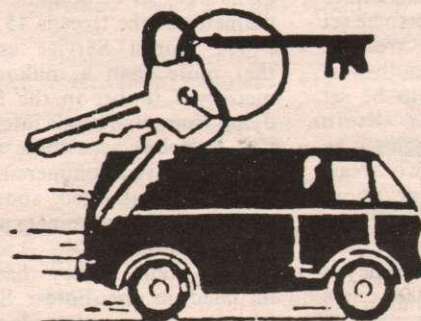

Stained glass memorial gifts

Clements completes first of church windows

When men observe the most recent stained glass window made by Jack Clements, many interpret the outlined figure as Jesus standing by the sea. Women, however, almost always see Mary.

"It's up to your own interpretation," says Clements, who enjoys the challenge of creating a piece of art with no "carved in stone" theme.

The figure in his first of three windows to be installed in Ganges United Church later this month is outlined, but has no solidity. The colours are misty in some areas, solid in others, and flow through the figure without definition.

Two of the three memorial church windows have already been commissioned. The first is completed and ready for installation, while the other two are in their preliminary stages.

Clements says the windows are tied together in a common theme, but that the theme is more of a shared feeling than a definite subject. The designs are "contemporary enough to get different interpretations," he says, but are based on a feeling of the islands, with sea and rolling hills. "People see many different things in them."

"It's up to your own interpretations ..."

Clements, who has a number of hobbies and is known as a folk artist, has been working with stained glass for some 20 years.

The process is a many-stepped one, beginning with an idea and an on-paper design. "Totally

different from sketching," he says, since the design must consider colour and create shapes which can be cut. The original drawing is then enlarged to scale, and each glass segment numbered.

The selection of glass — with the wide range of colours, intensities and textures available — allows much artistic expression to those working with stained glass. As Clements states: "the glass has a life of its own." Some colours are misty, others streaked, and others wavy.

After placing the full-scale design on a light-table, Clements lays out the selected glass to determine the compatibility of colours. Special scissors are used on the pattern to cut a thin strip along the lines, allowing space for the lead. From here, each segment is cut and numbered according to the design.

The glass pieces are diverse in size and shape. The completed

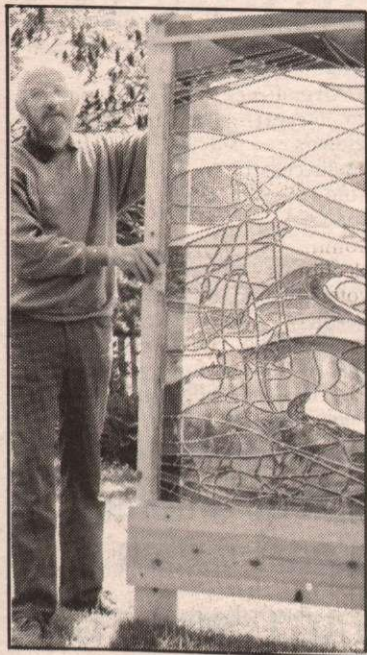
church window is composed of some 400 pieces — each of which is encased in a lead "frame." The entire piece is then soldered, and polished twice with a polishing compound.

Clements will spend anywhere from 100 to 150 hours on a stained glass window. "The speed ranges," he says. "I'm overly fussy at times: I like it to fit snug." The amount of time spent is also determined by the glass. Sometimes it "cuts like silk," he says. "Other times . . ."

There is one hazard to the art, Clements agrees. When he taught stained glass techniques to beginners, a box of band-aids topped his list of items to buy. "People have quit because they couldn't stand all the nicks."

To Clements, a self proclaimed hater of jig-saw puzzles, the work offers many rewards.

"It's a fascinating craft," he says, "because to me, it is such a challenge."

Multitude of day-camp activities will centre around theme weeks

An expanded day camp program on Salt Spring Island this summer will offer children crafts, sports, drama and games centered around special theme weeks.

The program, scheduled to run for eight weeks through July and August, is sponsored by the Parks and Recreation Commission and co-ordinated by Recreation Program Director Sandi Geiger.

Pre-school children aged three to five years will be offered bi-weekly day camp sessions, while those in the six- to 11-years age group will have the opportunity to attend camp five days a week.

The pre-school session — featuring arts and crafts, finger plays, movement education, beachcombing, games and snack and story times — will run every Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 am until noon. The camp will be located at Ganges United Church and a monthly or daily drop-in rate is available.

Islander Leah Kitchen, 21, has been hired as director of this year's Summer Discovery Day Camp for 6- to 11-year-olds. Kitchen, who worked as a counsellor last year, says this year's program is based on the one used at the 1987 summer day camp, but has been expanded in several areas. The camp runs from 8:30 am to 3 pm, Monday through Friday, and costs \$50 a week, or

\$10 per drop-in session.

The introduction of several new theme weeks will add variety to the program, Kitchen says. The theme attached to each week will dictate the character and direction of games and activities.

The first week's theme will be wilderness survival and nature. This will be followed by holiday week, then carnival, seashore exploration, safety, Olympic games, art and talent, and summer

fun weeks.

This year's arts and crafts program has been expanded to include use of materials found in nature, such as beach and forest items. The nature component has also been expanded, offering forest, woodland and intertidal activities.

Children attending the day camp will be split into three co-ed groups, according to age. Counsellors, who will attend a staff training weekend prior to start-up of the camp, will supervise theme-oriented activities such as "quiet" and "co-operative" games, crafts, drama, sports, fishing, wilderness activities, swimming (four weeks only), hikes and beachcombing.

Luncheon funds to be directed at Nicaragua water

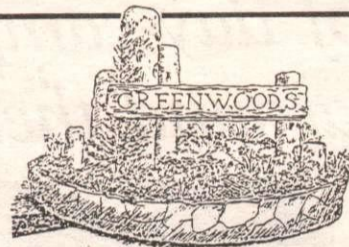
A luncheon has been planned to help raise funds for a clean water project in Nicaragua.

Many changes seen by "old school" priest

only one still living ... and still active.

It has been a long journey from Ottawa to Salt Spring Island.

The biggest milestone in that half-century was probably the switch from Latin to English in the Catholic services. A church whose services had always been distinct and distinctly different by virtue of the use of Latin throughout, was now using the language of the community.

Bergin is one of the old school. He did not only learn Latin in school, but he spoke Latin. And more than speaking it, he attended classes in which the only language employed was Latin. There was a reason for this, beyond the use of the dead language in the liturgy. During his training he studied under anglophone and franco-phonese as well as many a tutor speaking only foreign languages. Latin was still, in his day, the original Esperanto, the international language.

Despite the abandonment of

Milestone observed with Latin to English switch

Latin as the language of worship within his church, Bergin feels that the loss of Latin in high school has resulted in a poorer understanding of English and grammar. Looking back on his student days he finds Latin a useful and basic learning.

Other changes he has seen are less sweeping. He has welcomed the unprecedented communication between ministers of different Christian sects. Within his own parishes he has seen a greater awareness.

"People are better educated in their religion than they used to be and they are finding answers," he says.

At the same time he finds his people more turbulent and more questioning than was once the case.

His first appointment, in 1938, was to Lethbridge, in Alberta. For five years he was in the Alberta city.

"A different place today!"

And he has seen a lot of changes among the communities he served. Some of those changes were of his own making.

In Penticton he was parish priest of the only Catholic Church in the community. When he left, there was a Catholic school and a second church was planned.

For four years in B.C. and for 12 years in Ottawa, he was engaged in preaching "missions." He spent each fall and Lent travelling western Canada during the latter part of the Second World War. Later, he lived in the Polish Embassy in Ottawa to serve in the same capacity. (The building had not yet, in his day, been acquired by the government of Poland for its diplomatic mission).

What is a mission?

It is a revivalist meeting, the priest suggested. The mission priest preaches on the basic principles of religion and offers encouragement. His purpose is

also to encourage the less regular adherents to return to their devotions. Many people will more happily talk to a stranger, he explained.

After five years in Saskatoon he asked for a rural parish and in 1970 moved to Lancer, and later to Carstairs, before his switch of 13 years ago to Ganges.

Retire? Not on your life!

Bergin is entitled to retire from parish duties any time he likes. But he doesn't like. The calling he

heard more than half a century ago is still ringing in his ears. It is his challenge in life to preach the gospel as long as he is able and accepted.

"When the island priest celebrated his first mass, his opening prayer was: 'Introibo ad altare Dei,' or 'I will go unto the altar of God.'"

After 50 years his only desire is to continue to do so among the parishioners who need him.

down through the years

Twenty-five years ago

- Fahrenheit temperatures on Salt Spring Island hit the low eighties, a sharp contrast to the weather of just 10 days before when sleet and snow fell on Fulford-Ganges Road. The sudden hot spell caused wilting in the gardens, and brought school classes outdoors.

The fire hazard rating at the local forestry station jumped to "high."

- An island visitor became an initiate in the local Polar Bear Club, following a log-rolling demonstration. The lady walked on a log to get aboard a cruiser. The log, which happened to be loose, started to roll. After a valiant effort to regain her balance, the woman toppled into the sea.

- The usual serenity of the Fulford Post Office was interrupted when a Ganges resident paid a visit — car and all.

The brakes on the man's car failed as the vehicle drove down the hill en route to the ferry docks. Rather than risk a cold plunge into the sea or hitting another car, the driver swung into the empty Post Office driveway, and consequently into the side door of the building. No one was hurt.

Twenty years ago

- A youth was charged with two offences arising from the death by fire of Sylvia Birch on Rourke Road.

The 15-year-old boy faced charges of arson and criminal negligence resulting in death. The charges were laid after a fire at Birch's home on April 17 resulted in the death of the sole occupant of the house.

- Traffic came to a standstill in Ganges when Gavin Reynolds and Bob and Morry Akerman displayed the carcass of a 150-pound cougar. The predator had been taken from the slopes of Mount Maxwell, following a three-quarter-mile chase by a hound dog.

For weeks prior to the killing, sheep and deer had been mauled and killed all over the island.

- Ganges juvenile court commit-

ted two juveniles to Brannan Lake after they were charged with three incidents of theft and one of wilful damage.

The charges followed a wave of fire extinguisher thefts in Ganges.

Fifteen years ago

- A heavily laden tandem dump-truck ran down most of Ganges hill without brakes, charged through Ganges at speeds up to 50 mph, shot past the Bank of Montreal building and came to rest in Mouat's loading yard with the front wheels hanging over the bank above the beach.

The driver of the vehicle was shaken but uninjured.

- Cocktails, property damage and a near-riot highlighted holiday weekend events on Galiano and Salt Spring islands.

Several hundred visitors, largely in the 15- to 23-year age bracket, arrived on Salt Spring for three days of drinking and carousing.

- The large central stairway in Mouat's Store, which had been there almost since George Vancouver sailed past, was removed.

Ten years ago

- Eurasian water milfoil was discovered on Pender Island. The provincial ministry of the environment found the weed growing on

with driftwood

Magic Lake.

- About 50 people attended a meeting at Mahon Hall to question trustees of the Gulf Island School District about the new Fernwood school.

Five years ago

- RCMP were investigating a possible case of embezzlement of up to \$25,000 from the Greenwood care facility on Salt Spring Island.

Greenwoods administrator Jonna Mattiesing said an investigation was under way, but could not comment further. Officers of the commercial crime section from Victoria had been called in to help with the case.

- After performing several tests on dead fish found in Active Pass, a federal fisheries supervisor concluded the hake died from unusually strong tides in the area.

With a strong tide, the fish are carried out from their homes 200 to 300 feet beneath the surface. When they rise to the surface they experience a form of the "bends." It is the sudden surfacing, the supervisor said, which caused their death.

- The Advisory Planning Commission took its first step in the anticipated review of the Salt Spring community plan. The group decided public input would be limited to written submissions.

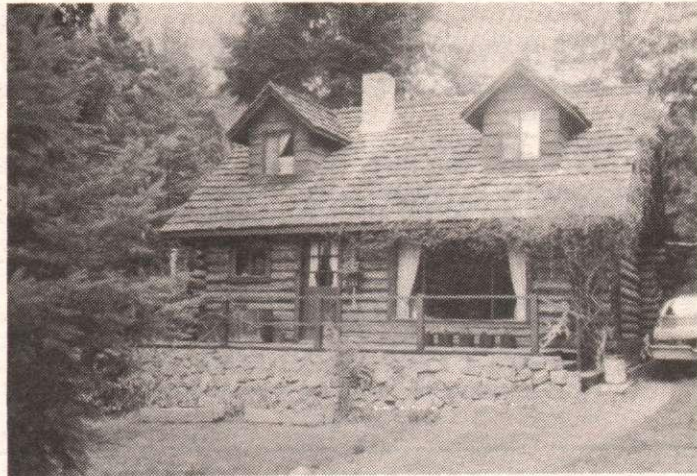

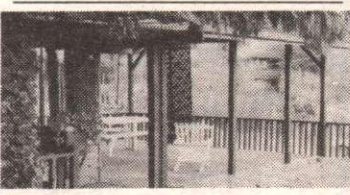
